





lantic and in the Pacific, but you must not count the enemies' ships for the purposes of calculation in home waters and count them again as preying on our trade in the Pacific or other seas. If there is any subtraction from an enemy's ships for that purpose, an equal subtraction must also be made from ours There is, indeed, no additional peril for which no provision has been made."

The Daily Telegraph in its editorial comment upon the debate says:
"Are we to have the mere shadow of a fleet in the Mediterranean and a fluadron which is not under imperial control in the other seas? We should have only six or seven ships on an average, or ten when the Canadian ships or their substitutes become available. What is to be the action of the dominions? They are no longer colonies, but nations. The mother country will next year, probably be faced with estimates amounting to nearly fifty million pounds."

The Mornig Post says: "We have already indicated our feeling in favor of the acceleration of the British programme by the laying down, at once, of the estings to compensate for the hypocical Canadian Dreadnoughts. That buld perhaps suffice were it not that here is every possibility of the three powers concerned, by their combined building, forcing the pace to such an extent that next year's programme must be greatly increased."

The Times advises that Unionists should insist that the three extra, ships should be commenced next spring, inasmuch as the emergency has been clearly demonstrated by the memorandum addressed to Premier Borden by the first lord of the admiralty.

The Daily News (Liberal) says that the Mediterranean position must be our concern only in view of probable emergencies, otherwise England will certainly go bankrupt over its building programme.

Great Success Attends The Boston Convention

DELEGATES ENTERTAINED

Marked Growth of the Order Reported -High Mass in Cathedral of Holy Cross-S. J. Nevins Has Newfoundland Delegates

Boston, Aug. 5—It would hardly be an exaggeration to say that the Knights of Columbus own Boston just now. The annual supreme convention being held here this week has attracted great numbers from all parts of the United States and Canada, and they have not had a dull moment since their arrival. The plans of the committees for the reception of the delegates and their friends have thus far been most successfully carried out, and what remain call for a continual round of activity both from a business and social viewpoint.

It took more than an hour for the large party of excursionists to fill the long line of automobiles in front of the Hotel Somerset, the headquarters of the Columbians during their stay, yesterday, as they were being taken to the steamer for an outing along the North Shore. Flags attached to the windshields, and K. of C. pennants floating from the sides of the cars, gave a gala appearance to the column of fast moving cars as they proceeded through Boston on their way to the boat piers.'

The return to the city was made at 4.30 in the afternoon to enable delegates to be present at the exemplification of the fourth degree, Several St. John candidates were amongst the number.

The plans as carried out by Dr. Timothy Hanrahan, vice supreme master, were the most elaborate ever attempted for the exemplification of this degree, and fourth degree officials are highly pleased with the success attained.

The cexemplification was notable from the fact that at least half a dozen state deputies of the order, as well as some of the national directors were among those upon whom the fourth degree was conferred.


