Daily Hints For the Cook

SCALLOPED LOBSTER

Butter a deep dish and cover the bottom with fine bread crumbs, put on this a layer of fresh chopped lobster, with salt and pepper, and so on alternately, until the dish is filled, having crumbs on top. Put on bits of butter, moisten with milk and bake about 20 minutes.

NUT CAKES

One cup of sugar, 1/2 cup of butter, 1/2 cup of milk, 2 cups of flour, 2 eggs, 1 cup of raisins, 1 cup of walnuts, 1 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder. Cream butter and sugar, then add eggs well beaten, then milk and flour, in which baking powder has been thoroughly mixed. Add raisins and nuts. Bake 35 minutes in moderate oven.

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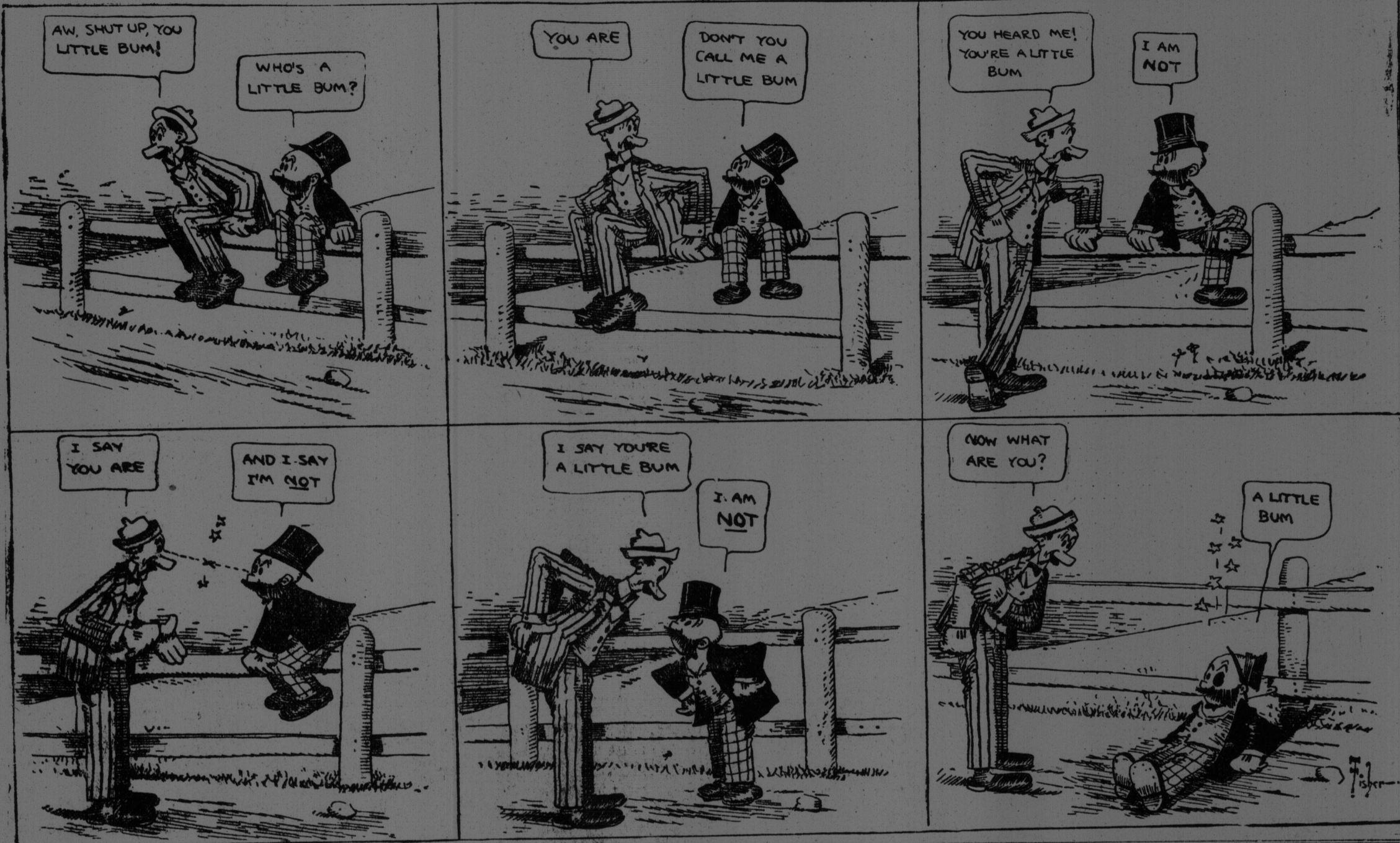

If Mrs. Tait does not pay the fine, she will be compelled to go to jail for an additional month.

PARKER MEDAL GOES TO A BOY

F. Arthur Willett Wins it With Monica McGrath a Very Close Second—Lynman Anglin Third

The results in the competition for the Parker silver medal were made public this morning and F. Arthur Willett was declared the winner with a total of 205 out of a possible 275.

This medal, which is one of the highest distinctions offered to High School pupils is awarded for the highest total of marks made on the mathematical papers, arithmetic and algebra and geometry, which are set at the University matriculation examinations.

The competition was very keen. Miss Monica McGrath, who won the St. Vincent's Alumnae gold medal on the same papers, was but six points behind young Willett, with a total of 199. Her's was the highest mark made by the city pupils on geometry.

Lynman Anglin was third with a total of 180. He made 186 in arithmetic and algebra and led the other students by a good margin on this paper.

On the total marks made on all the papers of the matriculation examinations Mr. Willett was second among the St. John students, his brother, Gordon, being first.

T. A. GOOSDE'S WILL DISPOSES OF ESTATE OF NEARLY \$50,000.

Bequests all to Members of Family—All Personality and Life Insurance

In the probate court today the will of Thomas Amos Goosde was proved. He gives the sum of \$200 to each of his grandchildren living at the time of his death; he directs that his executors and trustees shall invest \$2,500, the income of which is to be paid to his children, namely: Susan H. Vincent—the principal eventually to form part of his residuary estate. All the rest of his estate he directs his executors and trustees to divide into seven equal shares, one share to be given to each of his children, namely: Annie E. Goosde, Ida M. Goosde, Maude E., wife of Samuel J. Smith; Thomas A. Goosde, Nellie F. Goosde, Laura K., wife of Harry King and Harry L. Goosde and he nominates his daughter Ida M. Goosde; his nephew LeBaron Wilson of St. John, merchant tailor, and his friend George Blake of this city, plumber, executors. They were accordingly sworn in. There is no real estate; personalty \$45,000, including \$200 life insurance. Anton A. Wilson, K. C., is proctor.

ON HUNGER STRIKE IN AMHERST JAIL.

(Amherst News)
James Simpson, the keeper of the Amherst Jail, has a prisoner in his charge at present on a hunger strike. The prisoner in question is not a fair subject ready to sacrifice himself for the benefit of the cause but a rather irromantic citizen of Cumberland rejecting in the name of Havelock Carter. Mr. Carter in the halcyon days of his youth won a more than local reputation as a first class temperance orator but in these latter days, he has either seen a greater vision of personal liberty or has wandered from the puritanic principles that governed his early life.

Mr. Carter is just now serving a ninety days' sentence for a violation of the Canadian Temperance Act imposed upon him by Stipendiary Judge of Oxford. He was brought to Amherst just a week ago and since his incarceration he has simply lain in the bunk in his cell and has positively refused to take any nourishment of any kind whatever. Mr. Simpson sent for a physician last Friday who made an examination of the prisoner and the physician was not very seriously impressed with the seriousness of his condition and intimated that he would call some time this week.

William Moses, however, who is at present residing with Mr. Simpson, takes a very serious view of Mr. Carter's condition and he informed the News man this morning that the prisoner's hands and feet were very clammy and cold and that if something was not done, the man was bound to die shortly.
