



## SIFTING THE **EMIGRANTS** TO CANADA

How Officials Weed Out The Undesirables In England

SCENES AT OFFICES

Different Reasons That Impel Old Country Folks to Seek Change in the New Land-All Kinds Who Want to Come

(Times Special Correspondence.) (Times Special Correspondence.)

London, Oct. 1—A visit to the various Canadian emigration offices in London brings one into contact with the many ypes of Britons who are contemplating ettlement in the dominion and affords in interesting insight into the methods of election adopted by the officials.

If one were not aware of the reason which brought them there, it might easily be supposed that they were in the waiting room of a physician. All the emoions that the face can express are to be een. Indeed the positions are very much like. The doctor advises as to health; he emigration expert advises on a con-

ous work of a Canadian farm. Indeed it it his only escape from starvation, for he cannot obtain work here. This "case" can be decided instantly. To the discerning official his undeveloped physique and enfeebled frame render him unfit for Canadian farming. He is a townsman.

"Extlent material," says the official, "he will all right after a few months in the donion.

"I don't know what this country is coming to," he says. "It is certainly on the down grade, all classes are overtaxed and I have decided to clear out." You learn he is taking \$10,000 with him.
