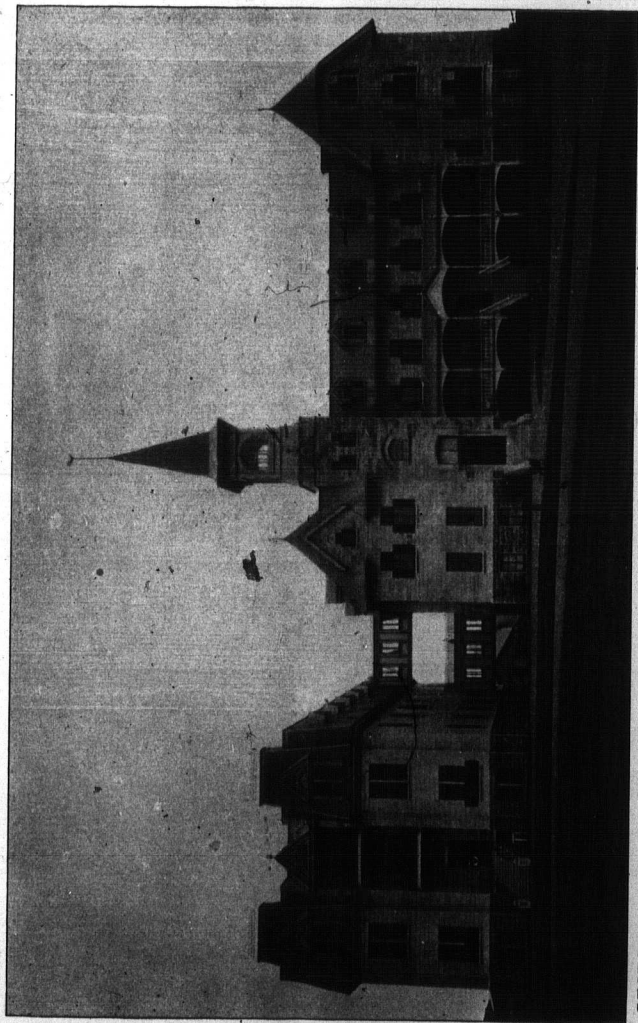

GEORGE MOORE MEMORIAL HOME — AND — OLD PEOPLE'S HOME AT LONGUE POINTE.

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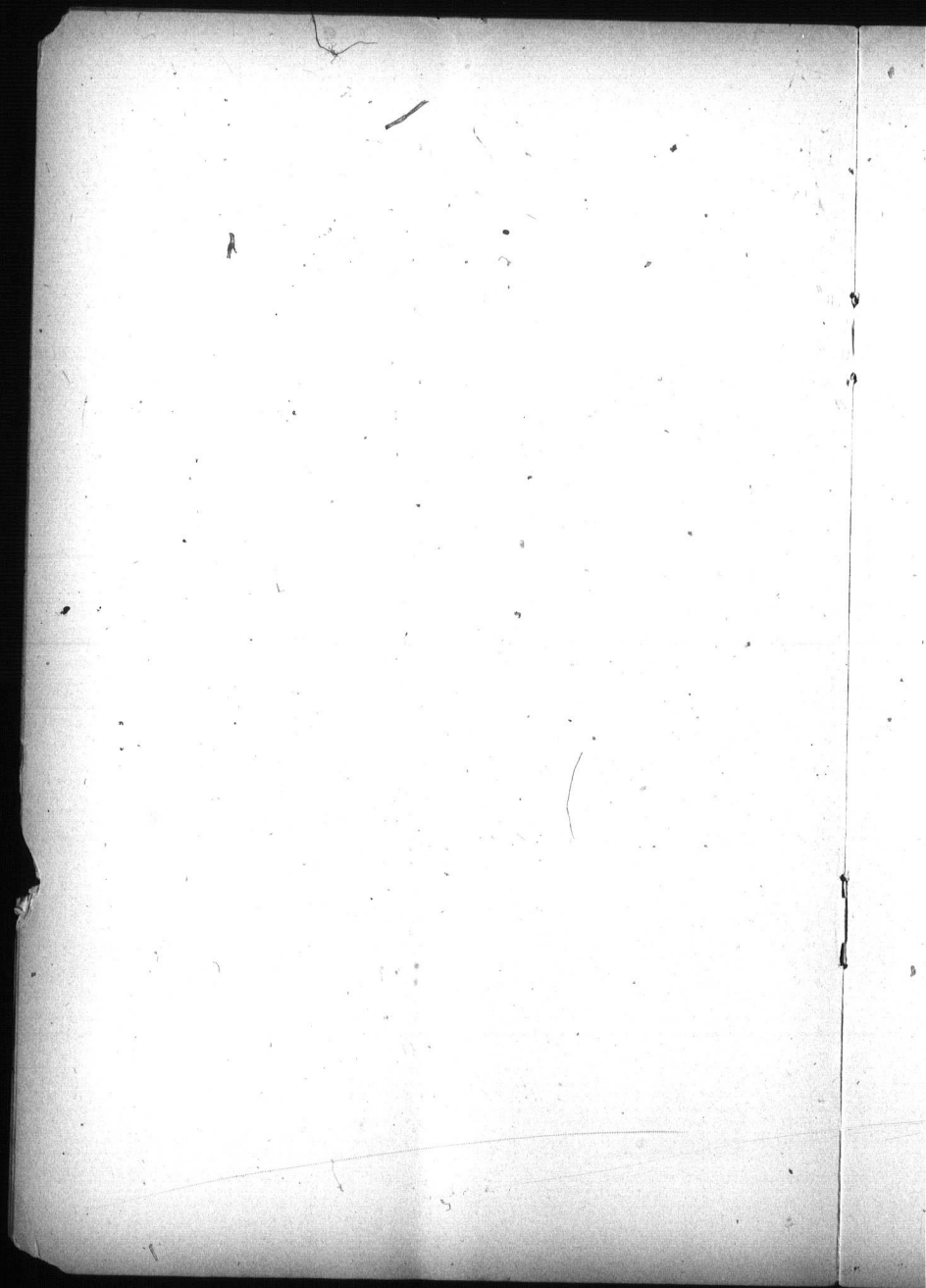
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THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

MINUTES OF THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CORPORATION OF THE PROTESTANT HOUSE OF INDUSTRY AND REFUGE, held April 20th, 1898.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. J. F. Renaud.

The minutes of last meeting of Governors were read and confirmed.

PRESIDENT'S REMARKS.

In reviewing the past year we have nothing very special to report, only that the benevolent purposes of our Institution have gone steadily forward in reliance on Divine favour in providing homes for our aged and friendless poor, who from various reasons have to seek a haven of rest in their declining years.

It is a source of gratitude that no untoward accident has happened to cause unnecessary alarm to our inmates. The Home has been one of comfort and of peace.

Again we are reminded by the removal from among us by death of six more of our Governors, teaching the solemn truth that here we have no continuing city.

It will be of interest to mention here the following facts, viz.: that of the first 96 life Governors only 39 remain; out

of 163 elective Governors only 46 remain; of the whole number, 259 Governors, only 75 are now with us, a lesson for gratitude to those of us who remain to be faithful and work while it is day.

The Moore Home continues a noble and valuable adjunct to the purposes of our Institution. The statement in the Report will show how useful it has been and the good work done; numbers of both sexes have had rest and careful attention during convalescence and, regaining strength, have returned to their usual occupations. Others of our incurable inmates are still in the Home and have all needed care. Here, too, however, some have died with even the best attention and medical treatment.

Your Committee, though often discouraged, not seeing others coming to fill up the ranks of those gone from us, having departed this life, yet with cheerfulness continue the duties given them to do, believing the purposes and objects of this work is to the praise of Him who said, "For as much as ye have done it to one of the least of these ye have done it unto Me."

The Honorary Secretary, Mr. Jeffrey H. Burland, was called upon to read the annual report and financial statement for the year.

INMATES.

The average number for the year, 132 ;
 the highest number for the year, 141 ;
 the lowest number for the year, 124 ;
 showing an average of one (1) over last
 year. Number in the House at present
 date, 141.

THE GEORGE MOORE MEMORIAL HOME.

The average number for the year, 32 ;
 the highest number for the year, 41 ; the
 lowest number for the year, 24. In Moore
 Home at present: men 14, women 21,
 total 35; total number received in the
 Home since opening, men 75, women
 140; total 215.

DISCHARGED.

NIGHT REFUGE.

SOUP KITCHEN.

The quantity of soup and extra meals
 distributed, 87,749, being an increase of
 5,930 rations over last year.

GENERAL MAINTENANCE.

The cost of maintenance has been
 \$17,021.68. The sum of \$8,944.88 was
 expended for food, being \$210.18 less on
 this item than in 1896-97.

DEATHS.

In the Country Home, 8; in Moore
 Home, 14; in City Refuge, 4; in Hos-
 pital, 8. Men 22, women 12,—total 34.

KINDLING WOOD.

This work is carried on as usual; the
 sales have increased during the year, as
 will appear by the Treasurer's statement.
 A stock of dry wood is kept on hand, and
 it is hoped that the friends of the Insti-
 tution will continue to patrolize our
 industry.

OUTDOOR LABOR.

During the Winter men were sent out
 to work as formerly, and gave general
 satisfaction. The proceeds carried to
 revenue account was \$333.70.

POOR RELIEF.

The Committee met weekly during the
 year, and carefully attended to all the
 duties that relate to the internal ar-
 rangements of both the City and Country
 Houses.

INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

The Ladies of the Industrial Rooms
 and Visiting Committee are entitled to
 the thanks of the Governors and the com-
 munity for their unremitting attention to
 the work committed to their management.
 Their report will be laid before you.

BOARD OF OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The thanks of the Governors and the public are due to the Board of Outdoor Relief for the efficient manner in which they have discharged the onerous duties committed to them. Their report is before you.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The Board desire to place on record their appreciation of the faithful and self-denying attention given by the Ministers of the city, and others who attend to the moral and religious interests of our people, both of those of the Night Refuge and the Country House, and their weekly services at the Country House on the Lord's day.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

Entertainments given to our people, for which the Board desire to express gratitude to the various churches and kind friends who have contributed by social gatherings at both City and Country Houses, with music, songs, recitations, etc., thus giving pleasure and enjoyment with kind words to our inmates, especially during the cheerless winter evenings, and for all such and increasing interest we are sincerely thankful.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF OUT-
DOOR RELIEF FOR WINTER
OF 1897-98.

The Board respectfully submit to the subscribers of the Outdoor Relief Fund the annual report of their proceedings during the past year, together with the accounts showing the receipts and expenditure for the same period.

On December 9th, 1897, a meeting was held of some of the city clergymen, representatives of some of the National Societies, Board of Management of the House of Industry and Refuge, to arrange for the winter work.

After fully discussing the subject of relief, it was resolved that the operations of the Board be carried on as usual, and the following gentlemen were appointed a Committee for that purpose, and to make an appeal to the public through the press for contributions to carry on the work, viz.:—Charles Alexander, Andrew F. Gault, James Moore, Jeffrey H. Burland, Hon. J. K. Ward, Joseph Richards, James Wilson, Daniel Wilson, James Tasker, Rev. F. Reidel and William Reid.

The meeting of the Board for the distribution of relief commenced on Thursday, 16th December, 1897, and were continued weekly during the winter until March 17th, 1898, as shown by annexed statement. Since the Board closed a number of destitute families, widows, and deserted wives are being cared for.

The relief given consisted of fuel, wood, coal and coke, bread, flour and oatmeal, tea and soap, new and second-hand clothing; each case brought under the notice of the Board was carefully investigated, and if found worthy, was relieved.

The Board acknowledge and return thanks for the generous support afforded by the citizens and friends at a distance.

To the city newspapers, viz.: Gazette, Herald, Witness and Star, the Board desire to return sincere thanks.

The Board desire to record the valuable services rendered to them by Revd's Messrs. Patterson, McManus, DeGruchy, Duclos, Roy, and other Christian workers

in attending the Board, visiting and reporting cases that came under their notice.

The demands upon the medical staff have in consequence been considerably less than in some former years. Owing, however, largely to the number of incurables sent to the Moore Home, the mortality is above the average, as most of those cases are received when their ailment is very far advanced.

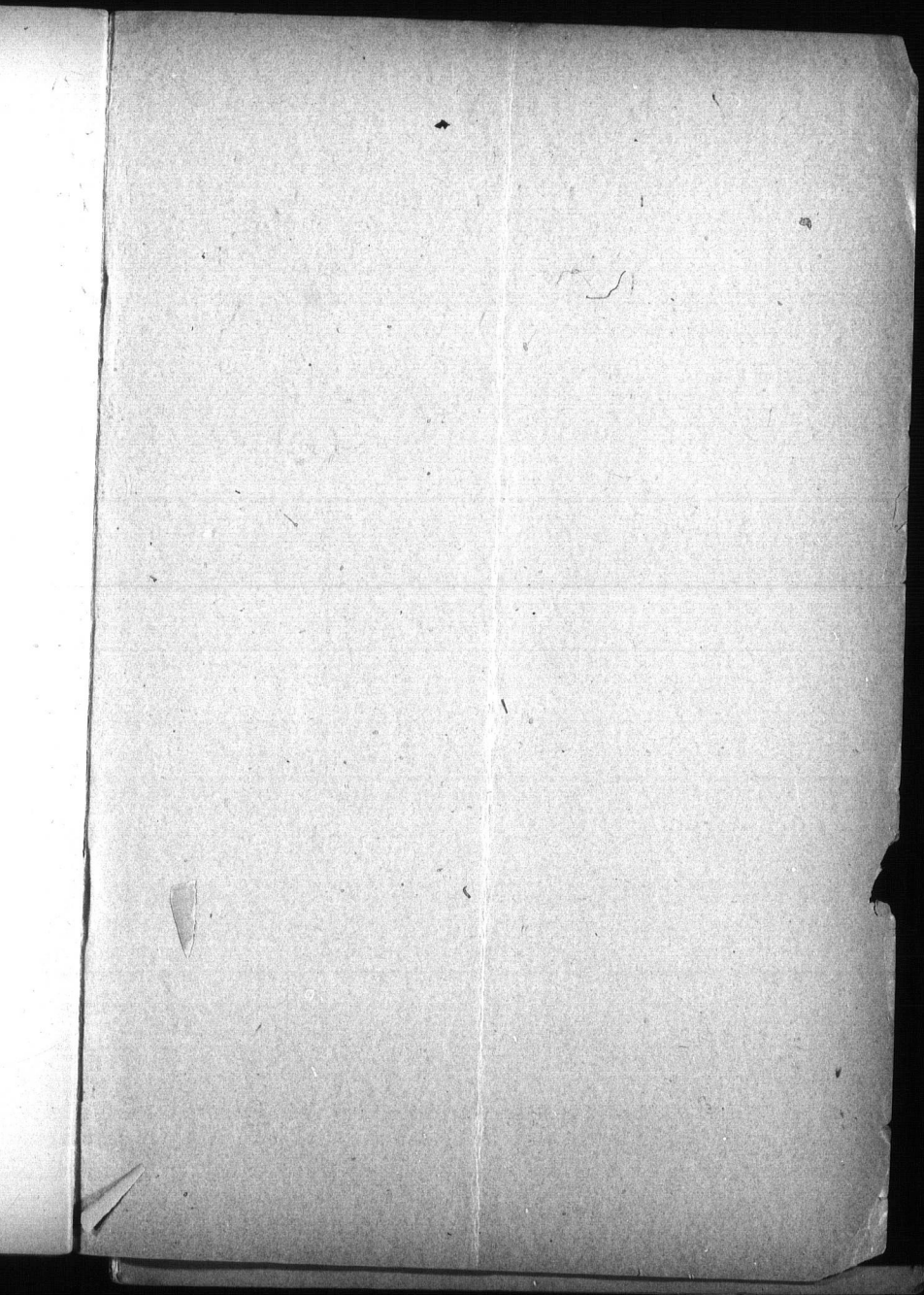

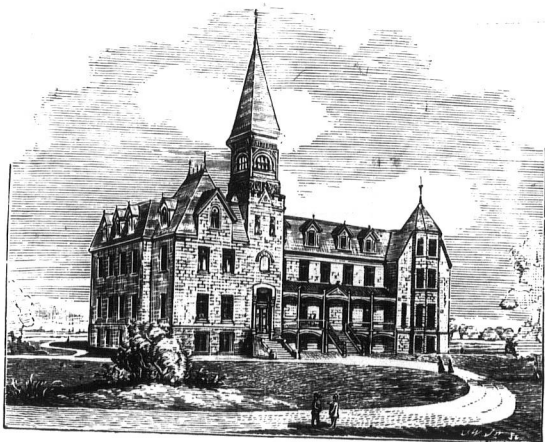
