DIES SUDDENLY

Former Secretary of the Inte-rior Under President Wilson

Rochester, Minn., May 13.—Franklin K. Lane, former U. S. Secretary of interior, died at a local hospital here early this morning. Death was due to an attack of angina pectoris.

Mr. Lane was operated on here May 6 for gall atones and appendicties, and was said to be recovering when heart disease, from which he had suffered from time to time during the past eight months developed.
