## Church Services and Stated Meetings.

**Sabbath Services**, morning at 11 a.m.; evening at 7 p. m. Sabbath School and Bible Class at 3 p.m.; quarterly sermon to the young at 3 p.m. on the last Sabbath of March, June, September and December.

**Weekly Prayer Meeting** every Wednesday at 7.30 p.m., in winter, and 8 o'clock p.m. in summer.

**Sabbath School Teachers' Meeting** every Thursday, at 8 o'clock, p.m.

**Stated Meetings** of Session are held in the Session Room, on the first Tuesday of every month, at 7.30 p.m.

**The Ordinance of Baptism** is dispensed on the first Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month, at the commencement of the prayer meeting.

**The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper** is dispensed on the first Sabbath of January, April, July and October.

**A Preparatory Service** on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said Sabbaths, at 7.30 p.m.

**Special Collections** for the poor are taken up on the FRIDAY EVENING and SABBATH MORNING, on every sacramental occasion, separate from, and unconnected with the envelope system.

**The Executive Committee** of the Missionary Association meets in Session Room, on the last Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m.

**The Regular Meetings** of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of March, June, September and December at 7.30 p.m.

**Stated Meetings** of the Managers are held in their room on the second Monday of every month at 8 p.m. and in the church on the same evening at 7.30, for the purpose of allocating pews.

**Women's Missionary Society** meets on the last Saturday of every month at 3 p.m.

**The Annual Meeting** of the congregation is held on the third Wednesday of January.

**Members and Adherents** leaving the church are requested to give notice to the managers, in order that their seats may be again allocated.

**When members change their residence** they should give notice either to the Pastor or the Elder of the district, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

**FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT**

OF THE

**MANAGING COMMITTEE OF KNOX CHURCH.**

The duties of the Managers during the past year having been merely of a routine nature, simply receiving and dispensing the ordinary revenue, their report at present must be brief as regards financial matters.

Compared with the previous year, the ordinary revenue shows a decrease of about \$400; but, as the expenditure shows a corresponding decrease, it will be seen that the income for the year has been about equal to the demands upon it. The deficit at the close of this year, all accounts being paid, is very little larger than the floating debt of last year.

In consequence of the retirement from the Board of Messrs. J. G. McIntyre, H. D. Cameron, John Donaldson, James McMenemy, Robert Evans and John McClean, and the death of Mr. Andrew MacPherson, the Board was for a time left without a working quorum. Subsequently, by appointment of the congregation, Messrs. Edward Bethune, John A. Moffat, William Macaulay, and Dr. McCargow were made provisional members until the close of the year, but now retire unless re-elected. W. Givin and Dr. R. J. Husband also retire, by rotation.

The resignations of Messrs. McIntyre, Donaldson, McMenemy and McClean are now submitted to the congregation, and, if accepted, it will be necessary for this meeting to elect nine new members to place the Board on a constitutional footing, unless the constitution be amended, making seven instead of twelve the required number, in which case only four more will be needed.

In consequence of the Rev. Dr. James having resigned the pastoral charge of this congregation, which position he has held for the past eight years, the retiring Board take this opportunity of expressing their deep sense of his ability and zeal as a faithful minister of the Gospel and the high estimate entertained for his pulpit ministrations, and would recommend that the sum of three hundred dollars be donated to him as a slight token of the good-will of the congregation towards him and his respected family.

## FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

—OF—

**Knox Church Sabbath School Association.**

The Sabbath School Association would present their Report for the past year as follows :

The total number on the roll are, boys, 165, girls, 183 ; male teachers and officers, 20, female teachers, 25 ; total, 393 ; with an average attendance of 285, made up as follows : 120 boys, 132 girls, 14 male teachers and officers and 19 female teachers. The lowest attendance on any Sabbath during the year was 121, on September 28th, the highest attendance 343, April 6th.

We regret that the average attendance has not been larger, falling as it does, 24 below the average of last year, but we trust that the next annual report will be more encouraging in this respect, and that during the ensuing year special efforts will be made to overcome this deficiency.

The collections during the past year, both for ordinary and missionary purposes, have been very encouraging, that for missions (taken up on the first Sabbath of each month) being an average of \$7.44 per Sabbath, and the ordinary collection being \$5.39, yet there is no reason why the collection for both these objects should not be considerably increased, and we hope that special efforts will be made in this direction also.

The usual quarterly sermons for the school were preached on the first three quarters of the year—the two first by our pastor and the third by the Rev. Mr. Nichols, of Bolton, Ont.—and as a substitute for the fourth, the school attended a union meeting of all the Presbyterian sabbath schools of the city, held in the Central Church, Dec. 14th, and were addressed by the Rev. J. Fraser Campbell, missionary to Central India. This special service, we hope, will tend to increase the missionary spirit in all our Sabbath schools.

The Librarian reports that an average of 100 books per sabbath have been exchanged, which shows a falling off in interest over last year, the average being 150. He also reports that from 50 to 60 of the books are in bad condition, and to keep up the status of the library it will be necessary to make an addition of at least that number to repair the loss.

We are happy to be able to report that the school has now



been furnished with a full supply of the new Sabbath School Hymnal, prepared specially by a committee of our church for the sabbath schools—and under the efficient leadership of Mr. James Johnson, there is no reason why we should not have the best Sabbath School singing in the city.

The scholars have been regularly supplied with papers every month, the older scholars receiving the "Forward," and the younger the "Children's Messenger," and as we believe they are appreciated by the scholars, who no doubt derive great good from them, the association have determined to continue them during the coming year, with the addition of the "British Workman" for the young men's Bible class.

The Thursday evening meeting for the study of the lesson has been kept up with considerable regularity, and as great good may be derived from these, let us hope that a still greater interest will be shown in them during the ensuing year.

During the past year we have been called upon to mourn the loss by death of one teacher and one scholar, Mr. Andrew MacPherson, who taught one of the advanced classes, and James McQueen, a scholar in Miss Pulling's class. This dealing with us by a loving Father should cause us to be increasingly active in His service, for we know not how soon our work will be done, or how early in life those for whom we are laboring may be removed.

We have also lost by removal from the city or otherwise the following teachers: Wm. Wyllie, Mrs. Creighton, and Misses Catherine Miller, Mary Hyndman and C. Smith.

The following have been added: A. J. Smith, J. G. Gibson, R. McPhaul, Wm. McConnell; Misses Annie Smith, Annie T. Smith, Minnie Pulling, Agnes Mitchell, Jennie McIntyre, M. Dingwall, Agnes L. Park, Ida Malcolmson, Edith Wallace and Jessie Stoops.

In conclusion, we have to thank our Heavenly Father for so much of his goodness as has been vouchsafed to us during the past year, and would earnestly seek the influence of His spirit during the coming year, that "our labor may not be in vain in the Lord," so that we may have the pleasure of seeing those brought to a saving knowledge of Him Who said: "Suffer little children to come unto Me."

# REPORT

## OF THE

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE BAND OF HOPE.

The Executive Committee of the Band of Hope beg leave to present their Report for the year 1884 as follows :

During the past year it was thought advisable to bring the members together at least once a week, and for that purpose meetings have been held every Monday afternoon from 4.30 to 5.30 and this plan so far has worked more successfully in imparting to the children instruction on Temperance subjects than when only brought together once a month at an open meeting.

Our membership numbers about one hundred. The average attendance from February to May was 43 ; but we are pleased to report an increase the latter part of the year, from October the average attendance has been 56.

The children are supplied with Temperance literature, and tickets with a Scripture text, and these are committed to memory, and repeated to those in charge of the weekly meeting. The children are also supplied with pledges for which they each pay one cent.

When this work was first organized under the present management, the adult branch of Knox Church Temperance Society donated the sum of three dollars to assist in carrying on the work ; and on the 18th April, 1884, an open meeting was held, at which a collection was taken up, amounting to the sum of five dollars and two cents, and at present we are pleased to report that we have a balance on hand of four dollars and ninety-eight cents, a portion of which, it is the committee's intention, to expend on badges for the members of the Society.

The committee desire to thank those who have aided them in carrying on their good work in the past, and ask the kindly sympathy, and helping hand, for the future that they may be helped to still increase their efforts for furthering the good work in which the Association is engaged.

# CONSTITUTION

—OF—

## KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON, ONT.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other Houses or Real Estate, now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the Congregation, shall be held in Trust by three Members of the said Congregation, in full Communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the Sixth Day of September, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty-Six.

2nd.—The members in Full Communion with the Congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said Congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the Members of the Congregation, which shall have been called from the Pulpit of the Church, by the officiating Minister, on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of Members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of the Elders shall be determined, from time to time, by the Session as occasion may require; but the election shall be by the Members of the Congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in Clause Third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the Spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the Congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Seven Managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the Congregation, two of whom shall retire annually in rotation—except in every third year, when three shall retire—but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occurring by resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings, without leave, shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall elect their own Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary; hold regular meetings as often as their business may require; and may give notice of their meetings; either from the pulpit on Sabbaths, or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Five Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more Members of the Congregation in Full Standing, they shall, with concurrence of the Session, call a Special Meeting of the Congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof, and no business shall be entertained at any Special Meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a Member of the Congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular Chartered Bank in the City, and deposit, in his own name, as



Treasurer of the Managing Committee, monies from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property, for public and general purposes not connected with the Congregation, shall be under the control of the Managers, with the concurrence of the Minister.

9th.—The whole revenues of the Congregation, from all sources, shall be received and disbursed by the Managers, in payment of Stipend, Salaries and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine Ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of Twenty Dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the Congregation."

The "Poores' Fund," however, shall be distributed by the Session, and contributions for Missionary and Benevolent purposes shall be disbursed by the Associations appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The Members of the Congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor and fix their Salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss, and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door-keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the Congregation for their acts; and shall, at each Annual Meeting in January, submit a full printed Audited articulate Statement of the Income and Expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the Pews on the Sabbath before the Annual Meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of Revenue to be applied to any particular purpose, by the instructions they may receive from the Congregation at any Special or Annual Meeting.

13th.—The Managers shall, annually, arrange for the Printing—in pamphlet form—of the Reports of all the different organizations in connection with the Congregation, together with lists of "Office Bearers," Members and Adherents, with their residences, said Pamphlet to be distributed to the Congregation on or before May 1st.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the Congregation.

15th.—At each Annual Meeting the Congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing Rules shall be in force until altered or amended; and no motion to alter or amend said Rules shall be put, unless due notice of such motion has been given at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation; and, when notice of motion shall have been made, a Special Meeting of the Congregation shall be called to consider the same—not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months, after said Annual Meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing Rules, no one shall be held to be a Member of the Congregation who is not in Full Communion with the same and whose name does not appear on the "Communion Roll" of the said Congregation, and no other than Members in "Full Communion" shall be allowed to vote at any Congregational Meeting.
