**DAIDING WOMEN IMMIGRANTS**



In the midst of the city of Montreal, half-way between the uptown and downtown business districts, on the corner of two of the best residential streets, there stands, substantial and comfortable old-fashioned stone dwelling-house. On one of the pillars of the wide hospitable looking entrance is a brass plate announcing the house to be Dorchester House, the Canadian Women's Hostel of Montreal.

This house is the Montreal headquarters of the association, which with the aid of the Government has undertaken to provide a welcome to the women of the old lands coming to make their homes in Canada, no matter what may be their nationality or religion. In these quarters for a welcome to these women from the farthest corners of the Dominion, the most experienced travellers, kindred and assistance during the first days of natural bewilderment in strange surroundings, employment for those seeking work, and a friendly head-quarters for the stranger feels her self firmly established in the new land.

During the five years the association has been in existence the hostel has proved a boon and its workers have comforted thousands of girls and women from the old lands. Since the removal in May, 1920, of the hostel to Dorchester House, its present beautiful and spacious quarters, the promoters of the work have been enabled more than ever to provide a veritable "home from home" for the girls and women newly arrived in Canada.

Montreal, a port city in summer and the great railway terminus of the east all seasons, forms a sort of gateway to all parts of the Dominion west of the Maritime Provinces. Thus the functions of the hostel include the entertaining for a few hours of rest of travellers bound for the distant west of Canada.

An explanation of the methods of work of the hostel shows how every precaution is taken for the safety and comfort of the travellers. Before the boat arrives in dock or the boat train is due at the station the name of every unaccompanied woman and girl on the boat has been ascertained.

As the boats and trains meet the boats and trains no matter at what hour they are retained in some way can identify them by means of a purple badge worn on the arm, and can be provided with a small purple button by the immigration authorities. But whether wearing the official button or not, if in need of help of any kind, if without friends in the country, if disappointed in meeting expected friends, they need only speak to the wearer of the purple badge and their difficulties will vanish before witness and experience.

The strangers are straightway brought to Dorchester House where they may obtain comfortable rooms and board at a very small expense, or if domestic workers without employment remain 24 hours free of charge during which time a post is sent for them. Those going on to the west are taken to the hotel for a few hours rest while the necessary

for the remainder of the journey is explained to them, and they are started on their way. In the meantime the hostess advises friends at the end of the journey of their impending arrival.

If no such friends exist a representative of the hostel in the nearest centre arranges for a church home for the friendless girl in her new home and through this connection ties of friendship are soon formed.

A casual visit to Dorchester House at any hour of the day or evening impresses the visitor that the house lives in every way up to its motto of a "home from home." The girls who have once had a taste of its hospitalities never fall, if in the city to keep in close touch with its good times. There is no trace of "institution" about the home where the girls go and come in the freest possible manner under the kindly supervision of the Lady Superintendent who soon becomes also their mother-confessor and best friend in the country. The big lofty rooms are furnished with artistic yet homely taste, and the girls' own sitting-rooms, with big chairs and couches and a piano, is an ideal spot for friendly gatherings and jolly afternoons and evenings.

During the year of 1920 about 1,400 women and girls from the old land were entertained in some way by the hostel. Many of the girls came to Montreal without prospect of work, without connections or acquaintances in this country. The employment bureau of the hostel kept the official button or not, if in need of help of any kind, if without friends in the country, if disappointed in meeting expected friends, they need only speak to the wearer of the purple badge and their difficulties will vanish before witness and experience.

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No matter how comfortable the home, however, the girl alone in a strange community longs for recreation and the companionship of young people with a glimpse of faces from "over there." This is where Dorchester House again steps in. The house is open to the girls at all times and they may obtain any one of the three meals a day for the small charge of a shilling, a quarter in Canadian money. The use of the recreation rooms is entirely free of charge. There is never a day in the words of the Lady Superintendent, in which the girls do not drop in for tea and a visit. Thursday afternoons and evenings are gala occasions every week, for Thursday is a half-holiday for the domestic in most Canadian homes. The girls come to see alone or in groups, and the meal is not well over when the rugs are rolled back from the sitting-room floor and a dance is in full swing. At all times the girls send their parcels, and get their mail at Dorchester House, and come with their troubles and sometimes "bring a grooch and leave without it" in the words of the Lady Superintendent. In cases of illness the hostel arranges for the girls entering a hospital, if necessary, and if a real illness all that is required the patient can be sent to the hospital.

During the summer of 1920 "Cupid" made of Dorchester House his Canadian headquarters for a few weeks. In one week five wedding took place in the parlor of the host. The brides who had come over to marry their boys were met by the Damessees and brought to Dorchester House, where the marriage was solemnized, and a little wedding party given to celebrate the occasion. Each of the pairs were given a set of their new home, usually in the far distant west.

At Christmas, 1920, cards and letters poured in from all parts of Canada, to Dorchester House, Montreal, from grateful girls.

charges made by Dr. Ferguson against Secretary LeBlanc hereby report as follows:—

The charges are three in number in which the Secretary is accused of neglect of duty.

The first charge is:—"From April 15th to May 29th, 1920, for 44 days, although repeatedly asked he refused to issue a cheque to the secretary of the Board of Health for the money Council in January. Dr. Ferguson voted for Health purposes from your claimed the reason for this was animosity towards and dislike of S. Blanchard, and a desire to obstruct the work of the Board of Health." By his conduct he kept all officers of the Board of Health out of their salary for over six months. By contract though only authorized to pay his own salary every three months he issued a cheque every month without permission.

After hearing Dr. Ferguson, S. Blanchard and Secretary LeBlanc, we find that this charge is absolutely false. To begin with Mr. Blanchard stated that he asked the secretary for the cheque on April 25th not the 15th, and Mr. LeBlanc did not refuse to issue a cheque for a few days to consider the matter. Mr. LeBlanc stated that at that time there was an overdraft in the Bank of over \$6000.00 or \$12,000.00 and had he issued a cheque on the day the demand was made the County would have had to pay 6% for the money and it would have brought 3% only on deposit to the credit of the Board of Health. Both Mr. Blanchard and Mr. LeBlanc agreed that when Mr. Blanchard asked for the cheque the second time, Mr. LeBlanc requested him to do so in writing, and we find Mr. LeBlanc did right in requesting this. They also agree that Mr. LeBlanc brought the matter to Mr. Blanchard's request the next time, by asking for the request in writing. The cheque was issued and any slight delay was not Mr. LeBlanc's fault but due to the death of his son. Mr. Blanchard also stated that at the time the cheque was issued to him there was on deposit to the credit of the Board of Health about \$370, enough to pay the officers of the Board of Health. He also stated there was no animosity between Mr. LeBlanc and himself.

We therefore find that the conduct of Mr. LeBlanc throughout the whole transaction was commendable and in the best interests of the County, and we repeat that the charge was false.

As to the issuing of Mr. LeBlanc's salary every month the County records show that the Council has approved of the Secretary being paid monthly since 1914, and that disposes of the last part of the charge which is also false.

The second charge is as follows:—"According to the Government law officers it is the secretary's duty to supply the Sheriff with copies of the voter's lists; he refused to do this unless the sheriff paid him."

After hearing Sheriff Craig and Mr. LeBlanc in reference to this charge, we find that Mr. LeBlanc is not to supply the sheriff with copies of voters' lists unless the sheriff pays him for them and we believe Mr. LeBlanc's statement that he acted on the advice of the Legal Adviser of the County, the Honourable Provincial Secretary and the Attorney General.

We therefore find that this second charge is false.

The third charge is that the Secretary "attempted to interfere with and prevent the Town Police from prosecuting certain men alleged to be guilty of serious offences: All respectable men will agree with the policeman who said that the Sheriff would be more to his credit considering his official position if he assisted or instead of interfering with him and if he did so again he would put him in jail." In connection with this charge Dr. Ferguson said that it was to policeman Brown that he referred.

Brown being examined by us said positively that this charge was not true; that Secretary LeBlanc did not interfere or attempt to prevent him from prosecuting anybody, nor did he, Brown, ever say to LeBlanc the words Dr. Ferguson states he did. We therefore find that this charge is also false.

In conclusion we wish to point out that these charges were made over Dr. Ferguson's own signature, and in spite of that fact when questioned by us as to what he knew he said that it was only hearsay and that he knew nothing personally in connection with the charge.

We feel it our duty to also point out that Dr. Ferguson being a member of the Board of Health was in a position to know that there was sufficient money on deposit in the bank to the credit of the Board of Health to pay all officials—this was Mr. Blanchard's statement; so that in charging Mr. LeBlanc with keeping all officers of the Board out of their salary for over six weeks, he must have known that he was making a false charge.

We therefore exonerate completely Secretary LeBlanc in connection with the above charges, which we find are all false, in every detail.

The usual motion authorizing the printing of the minutes in English and French was passed.

Coun. Duncan moved that the council protest against the following statement in the Graphic of Jan. 29th, said letter being under the heading of Editor's Mail, and being entitled "Poor Old Dickie." The following words were contained in said letter:—"He has repeatedly provoked the indignation of every one of us councilors until we are now ashamed of him." We wish to state that we are not ashamed of Coun. Dickie.—Carried unanimously.

After the above resolution was passed Mr. Anslow, stated that the letter complained of, was not written by a councillor.

The council adjourned until 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

Council reassembled at 10 o'clock pursuant to adjournment.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Coun. Dickie said that it would be well to know that the Secretary, Treasurer is properly bonded for \$20,000 and that \$20,000 is paid Mr. M. A. Kelly each year, being the annual premium on said bond. The bond is deposited at the Record Office.

It was moved and seconded that Couns. Levesque and Gauthier or Grimmer and Firth and Chesler of Eldon be paid the sum of \$5.00 each as they had been to extra expense in the service of the county.—Carried.

Coun. Shannon submitted the following report re Registrar's request for increase of salary.

Your committee appointed to consider the request of Mrs. H. Mott, Registrar, beg to report as follows:—That the request of the said Registrar be granted.

Coun. Murchie moved that the above report be adopted.

Coun. Dickie asked if the committee had taken into consideration the upkeep of the office, such as light, heat, supplies, repairs, etc.

As for the bonds being sold illegally, all you have to do to brand that statement as a falsehood, is to refer to the capital accounts of the department referred to.

With reference to the bonds being sold at a loss, I can truthfully say that never in recent years have town bonds sold to such good advantage as the \$35,000 worth of five per cent bonds sold in 1917.

Regarding the illegal transfer of amounts to water and light capital. The amount of \$6,000 transferred to light capital was for land purchased for the electric light station, surely if anything is properly chargeable to capital, cash paid for land should be.

Lastly he states that when I went out of office the books showed a deficit of \$36,130.26; that statement is on a par with all his other criticisms, an absolute falsehood. The books show a deficit of \$1,645.21.

You will notice too that he gives us no credit for the \$25,400 worth of bonds which we paid off during my term of office; of course it would never do to acknowledge that fact; the truth is not his motto.

President-Elect relinquishes Active Direction He Has Exercised for Thirty Years Over Editorial Policy of the Marston Daily Star.






