FIRST MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Standing Committees Appointed And Other Business Was Transacted.

The first meeting of the newly elected town council was held on Monday evening in the firemen's hall. His Worship Mayor McKay in the Chair, with Councillors Chamberlain, St. Onge, Belle-Isle, Bisset, Moore, Wallace, Duncan and Patterson present.

In calling the meeting to order, His Worship addressed the councillors briefly, calling their attention to the fact of their having been elected on the platform of economy, and he felt sure that each and every one of them would fulfill the pledge made. The ratemakers in this regard. There was a question of the ratemakers' approval of such a policy. However it was a matter which the council could after getting down to work discuss and decide as to whether it would be advisable at the present time to submit the question to the ratemakers for approval or rejection. He briefly referred to the overdraft and unpaid bills and expressed the hope that when their year of office expired both would be considerably reduced. He also expressed the hope of having the rate lower this year than that of last year, and pointed out the necessity of appointing good assessors, in order that there would not be so much inequality in the assessment as in former years. The assessors should be appointed within a few weeks in order that the assessment could be got out early. Another important matter His Worship referred to was the importance of Councillors giving notice of motions in order that the various councillors would in the meantime have an opportunity of looking into them before being called upon to vote upon the question. He also stated that each committee would be held responsible for the management of their various departments, and it would be up to each committee to see to it that the employees under their charge satisfactorily performed their duties. In concluding his remarks he pointed out the necessity of giving a fair and impartial consideration to all matters brought before the board and expressed himself as satisfied such a consideration would be given such all questions with which the council had to deal.

At the conclusion of His Worship's address the minutes of the last two previous meetings were read and confirmed.

On motion the regular order of business was suspended in order to nominate the standing committees for the ensuing year.

His Worship appointed Councillors Patterson, Moore, Belle-Isle and Bisset a committee to draft the standing committees. On returning Councillor Bisset as Chairman of the Nominating Committee reported recommending the following constitute the standing committees for the ensuing year:—

By-laws and Legislation—Mayor, Bisset and Belle-Isle.
Finance and Auditing—Duncan, Mayor and St. Onge.
Assessment and Appeals—Belle-Isle, Patterson and Wallace.
Police and License—Patterson, Chamberlain and St. Onge.
Public Property and Streets—Wallace, Chamberlain and Patterson.
Water and Sewerage—St. Onge, Duncan and Bisset.
Electric Light—Bisset, Mayor and Duncan.
Fire Protection—Moore, Wallace, and Belle-Isle.
Education and Improvement—Mayor, Belle-Isle and Moore.
Public Charities—Chamberlain, Moore and St. Onge.

DELEGATION TO GO TO FREDERICTON

Board of Trade Bound to Get Bridge if Pressure Will Bring It.

At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade held Tuesday afternoon in W. H. Miller's office it was decided that the delegation named at a recent meeting to go to Fredericton to press the bridge matter upon the local government, leave Tuesday February 8th.

This delegation will be composed of Messrs. A. T. LeBlanc, W. H. Miller and John Harquail. They will set the whole matter fully before the government and endeavor to procure a pledge of twenty-five per cent. of the cost from the New Brunswick government. With such an assurance it is felt the Dominion government can be prevailed upon to place an amount in the estimates this year and the work commenced.

CAMPBELLTON WINS AT FREDERICTON

Exciting Game Played Wednesday Night—Score 5 to 4.

Campbellton won from Fredericton last night before over 1,500 people in one of the most sensational hockey games ever played on local ice by a score of 5 to 4.

The winning goal was scored by Starrak, the Campbellton team's star centre ice player, on a pass from Big Pete McLean, their big defence man, after the teams had battled through the regulation game and eighteen minutes overtime.

It was the first overtime game played this season in the New Brunswick Hockey League and the result has probably eliminated Fredericton from further consideration as a contender for championship honors.

Campbellton played with a grim determination after Fredericton had started off with a lead of 2 goals, before the visitors could score. It was fast and hard played hockey all the time with the score see-sawing continually from the time it was tied up in the closing minutes of the opening period. With the overtime period started the teams were both showing signs of fatigue and pretty soon it became a case of which could outlast the other.

Substitutes were shoved into the game by both teams but the managers apparently failed to take chances with anybody but their regulars. The players were all at high tension and once Fred McLean of the Fredericton Club and Thomas of Campbellton took a couple of swings at each other with their hockey sticks and almost clashed in fistfights, for which they were banished for ten minutes each. Campbellton took the largest number of penalties as the rugged brand of hockey they play is bound to draw penalties.

McKenzie in the Campbellton net put up a far stronger game than did Bidlake, the local goal tender.

The Campbellton team appeared to be the fastest skaters and had it not been for Fred McLean, whose offensive and defensive work both counted for much, they would probably have won by a much larger score. Bert Burgess also scintillated for Fredericton, while Matthews and Starrak were Campbellton's best forwards. Payne showed a lot of speed in rushes and Pete McLean checked hard.

McKenzie was a stone wall, a regular wizard in goal for Campbellton and made some almost impossible stops and used extra good judgement in rushing out of net.

McLean of Fredericton was unable to get away. Campbellton were by far the fastest skaters and back checked hard.

Starrak and Matthews were all over the ice and always where they were needed most. Pete McLean and Payne made end to end rushes that were features of the game. Campbellton had the big end of penalties drawing 24 minutes to Fredericton's 18. At one time Campbellton had only three men on the ice.

Goals for Campbellton were scored by McLean, Matthews and Starrak. For Fredericton: Lounsbury, Colwell and Burgess.

CAMPBELLTON WINS AT QUEBEC

Bring Home Holt Renfrew Cup—Close Contest Throughout.

The two rinks of Campbellton curlers who last week went to Quebec to participate in the curling bonspiel returned Monday after a most enjoyable and successful trip. They won in the Holt Renfrew cup games, and just as soon as the cup is properly engraved it will be sent to Campbellton where it will remain on exhibition for a time, and then goes back to Quebec, as it is a challenge cup. Thos. Wran skipped the successful rink, and the four members of that rink receive small, but very handsome cups.

Twenty-seven years ago two rinks of Campbellton curlers journeyed to Quebec and won out, so that the next generation show that they are still upholding Campbellton's reputation.

The Quebec Chronicle gives the following description of the game:—

The Final Game.
In the final for the Holt Renfrew Cup, in which Campbellton No. 1 and Caledonia, of Montreal, contested the right to hold this valuable trophy, some fine curling took place. At the 8th end the score was in favor of Caledonia by 11 to 4. From then the Campbellton rink realized that in order to win they would have to play with greater care, and from that point they gradually crept up on their opponents score until the 15th end, when they were only one point behind 12 to 11. From this period the play was one of keen judgment and splendid generalship on the part of the respective skips. Wran's (Campbellton) second played a beautiful stone which became shot and notwithstanding the many efforts of the opposing rink tied the score on the 16th end, which necessitated the playing of an extra end. Through the courtesy of both skips the play was continued from the upper end of the rink, so that all spectators could witness it from the Club House. A regular ding dong battle then ensued, and right up to the end it was anybody's game and in the last shot it was left to the Caledonia skip W. O. Roy to win or lose. He played a well directed runner missing his own stone by one-eighth of an inch, going through the port, and thus gave Campbellton, N. B. the honor of winning the holders of the Holt Renfrew Granite Cup. The spectators were pleased at the result of this exciting game, as it was the first time that Campbellton had entered a Quebec Bonspiel, and they

Secretary LeBlanc hereby report as
follows:—The charges are three in number in
which the Secretary is accused of neg-
lect of duty.The first charge is:—"From April
15th to May 29th, 1920, for 44 days,
although repeatedly asked he refused
to issue a cheque to the secretary of
the Board of Health for the money
Council in January. Dr. Ferguson
voted for Health purposes from your
claimed the reason for this was an-
timony towards and dislike of S.
Blanchard, and a desire to obstruct
the work of the Board of Health." By his
conduct he kept all officers of the
Board of Health out of their salary
for over six months. By contract
though only authorized to pay his own
salary every three months he issued
a cheque every month without per-
mission.After hearing Dr. Ferguson, S.
Blanchard and Secretary LeBlanc, we
find that this charge is absolutely
false. To begin with Mr. Blanchard
stated that he asked the secretary for
the cheque on April 25th not the 15th,
and Mr. LeBlanc did not refuse to
issue it.The annual grant of \$1500 was made
to the Hotel Dieu Hospital, Campbell-
ton.The annual lists of parish officers
as agreed to between the parish coun-
cillors were passed.Coun. Savoie moved that a new par-
ish, embracing parts of the parishes
of Dalhousie, Balmoral and Addington
be formed, and that a committee be
appointed to attend to matter—Motion
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false.

In conclusion we wish to point out
that these charges were made over
Dr. Ferguson's own signature, and in
spite of that fact when questioned by
us as to what he knew he said that
it was only hearsay and that he knew
nothing personally in connection with
the charge.We feel it our duty to also point
out that Dr. Ferguson being a member
of the Board of Health was in a po-
sition to know that there was sufficient
money on deposit in the bank to the
credit of the Board of Health to pay
all officials—this was Mr. Blanchard's
statement; so that in charging Mr.
LeBlanc with keeping all officers of the
Board out of their salary for over
six weeks, he must have known that
he was making a false charge.We therefore exonerate completely
Secretary LeBlanc in connection with
the above charges, which we find are
all false, in every detail.(Signed)

EDWARD SAVOIEOn motion Mr. W. H. Wallace was
granted permission to address the
Council.Mr. Wallace spoke briefly upon the
necessity of making some provision
for the proper care of our poor.A committee composed of Couns.
Doyle, Dickie and Levesque was ap-
pointed to confer with a committee
from Campbellton in reference to the
establishment of a poor farm.Coun. Dugas was excused from at-
tending council.The usual Councillors mileage and
pay was passed.Frank Synette, constable, account
\$24.00 attending Council, was paid.Coun. Firth moved that all lumber
surveyors be county officers.—Carried.It was resolved that the defaulters
lists of the several parishes be handed
to the Councillors and that steps be
taken to collect all default taxes.The usual motion authorizing the
printing of the minutes in English and
French was passed.Coun. Duncan moved that the coun-
cil protest against the following state-
ment in the Graphic of Jan. 26th, said
letter being under the heading of
Editor's Mail, and being entitled "Poor
Old Dickie." The following words
were contained in said letter:—"He
has repeatedly provoked the indigna-
tion of every one of us councillors un-
til we are now ashamed of him." We
wish to state that we are not ashamed
of Coun. Dickie.—Carried unanimously.After the above resolution was
passed Mr. Anslow, stated that the
letter complained of, was not written
by a councillor.The council adjourned until 10
o'clock Saturday morning.

Saturday Morning.

Council reassembled at 10 o'clock
pursuant to adjournment.The minutes of the previous session
were read and approved.Coun. Dickie said that it would be
well to know that the Secretary,
Treasurer is properly bonded for \$20,-
000 and that \$20.00 is paid Mr. M. A.
Kelly each year, being the annual pre-
mium on said bond. The bond is de-
posited at the Record Office.It was moved and seconded that
Couns. Levesque and Gauthier or
Grimmer and Firth and Chesser of
Eldon be paid the sum of \$5.00 each as
they had been to extra expense in the
service of the county.—Carried.Coun. Shannon submitted the fol-
lowing report re Registrar's request
for increase of salary.Your committee appointed to con-
sider the request of Mrs. H. Mott, Re-
gistrar, beg to report as follows:—
That the request of the said Registrar
be granted.Coun. Murchie moved that the above
report be adopted.Coun. Dickie asked if the committee
had taken into consideration the up-
keep of the office, such as light, heat,
supplies, repairs, etc.Other councillors spoke along the
same lines and on vote motion was
lost.Coun. Firth moved that the above
matter lay over until the July session
and that the Public Lands and Build-
ing Committee and the Auditor look
into the matter in the meantime and
report at that session.—Carried.Coun. Gillis moved that the Auditor
be granted an increase of \$100.00 per
year.—Carried.The Premier's letter in reference to
increased cost of maintenance of pa-
per patients at Prov. Hospital was
taken up.Moved by Coun. Shannon, that
whereas the Prov. Hosp. is a Provin-
cial institution and whereas the said
Institution has been kept in the past
from Provincial revenues together
with the maximum charge of \$1.00
per week for each inmate and although
this Municipality realizes that there
has been a certain increase in the
upkeep of said institution, we also re-
alize that the same revenues which have
rendered the necessary increase in co-
st of upkeep have also increased the
revenues of the province in far greater
proportion.Be it therefore resolved that this
municipality does not entertain the
request of the Provincial government
through the Premier, the Hon. W. E.
Foster and furthermore that we
strongly protest against any increase
in view of the decrease in the cost of
all materials and that a copy of this
resolution be forwarded to the Sec-
retary of the Premier.Coun. Duncan spoke strongly again-
st the motion. He thought that we
were paying a very low rate for such
patients. However he said that he
would not agree to paying the increase
until the bill was passed and in force.Coun. Dickie said that he did not
favor the increase. We had just cut
the price allowed for prisoners board
to 50 cents per day, and why should
we stand for this increase. He thought
if all the municipalities were to warn
the premier it might have good results.Coun. Shannon thought the passing
of the resolution might have a good
effect.

The motion was carried.

The council adjourned until 2 o'clock
Saturday afternoon.The council reassembled at 2 o'clock
pursuant to adjournment.The minutes of the previous session
were read and approved.Mr. W. H. Wallace was again given
permission to address the council. He
spoke of the needs of a Municipal home
for our poor and also that he would
like to have his name placed in nomi-
nation as a valuator.Coun. Duncan moved that a valua-
tion of the county be taken this
year.—Carried.The following names were then
placed in nomination for Valutors:
Geo. McIntyre, Colborne.

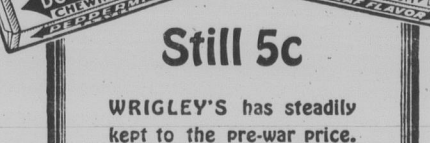

"For a man in this enlightened age to place himself on record as being opposed to vocational training, is sure evidence that he is living in the past, rather than in the present."

EDITORS MAIL.

To the Editor of The Graphic,

Dear Mr. Editor,—

Some time ago there appeared in the Tribune, an article breathing brotherly love and affection and an apparent desire upon the part of the writer, Mr. C. S. O. Crockett, to try how the practice of the Golden Rule would work out in his dealings with the public; but unfortunately the step was too great for him and he has relapsed into his old accustomed methods of falsification and deception.

In the last issue of the Tribune prior to election, when he knew that I could have no opportunity of replying to his unjust criticisms before election day, he made a cowardly attack upon me and my administration of town affairs during the years 1913-1917. Although I was only one of nine men responsible for town affairs he aimed all his criticisms at me as though I dominated the whole council, and its members had to vote as I dictated. Those of you who are acquainted with the gentlemen who were Councillors at that time, are quite well aware that no man could wield that influence over them.

I can stand all the legitimate criticisms that may be aimed at me in regard to public affairs, but when it comes to articles such as appeared in the Tribune, it is time to show up the falsity of the author.

He starts out by saying that in the year 1913 I had an overdraft in the Bank of \$23,205.09, and anyone reading that article would naturally infer that we had plunged the town in debt to that extent; and that is just what Mr. Crockett intended you should understand by it. Had he told the whole truth he would have said that the \$23,205.09 was a debt contracted by a previous council. In fact it amounted to \$28,769.80 when I assumed office.

He also says that \$35,000 worth of bonds were sold illegally, that a large sum of money was lost in the sale of them, and that amounts were illegally transferred from water and light expense accounts to their respective capital accounts.

As for the bonds being sold illegally, all you have to do to brand that statement as a falsehood, is to refer to the capital accounts of the department referred to.

With reference to the bonds being sold at a loss, I can truthfully say that never in recent years have town bonds sold to such good advantage as the \$35,000 worth of five per cent bonds sold in 1917. These bonds were sold at 98.5, and when you take into consideration that during the previous year the Province of New Brunswick only received 95, for their five per cent bonds you will agree with me that we were most fortunate in getting the price we received. It was certainly gratifying to the Council to know that Campbellton bonds brought three and one half dollars per hundred more than did those of the Province.

Regarding the illegal transfer of amounts to water and light capital. The amount of \$6,000 transferred to light capital was for land purchased for the electric light station, surely if anything is properly chargeable to capital, cash paid for land should be. The transfer to water capital was equally justified.

Lastly he states that when I went out of office the books showed a deficit of \$36,130.26; that statement is on a par with all his other criticisms, an absolute falsehood. The books show a deficit of \$1,645.21.

You will notice too that he gives us no credit for the \$25,400 worth of bonds which we paid off during my term of office; of course I would never do to acknowledge that fact; the truth is not his motto.

And now in reference to my having been a candidate for the office of Mayor. I repeatedly refused to consider the matter as I felt that having given six years service at the Council Board I had fully discharged my obligations as a citizen; however a number of the electors persisted in their appeals to me to become a candidate and I finally accepted simply because there seemed to be no one else who was willing to accept the responsibility.

Had I known that Mr. McKay was going to offer I would never have thought of opposing him, but as he did not decide until after I had accepted the nomination and handed my card to the press there was nothing else to do than to allow the election to continue. The best evidence I can give that I was not anxious for the position, is the fact that I did not personally solicit support after I had learned that there was no further necessity for me to twiddle by my agreement not to do so.

NEW RICHMOND.

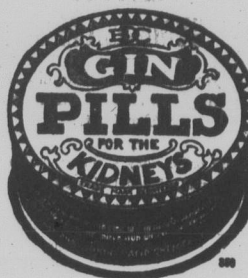

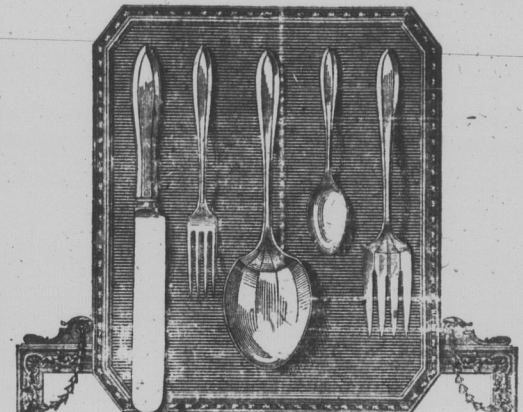
