THE INTER-RACIAL CONVENTION

The inter-racial Convention which was recently held in Indianapolis by many colleges, universities and high schools of the United States is one of the brightest rays of hope that has sone upon this continent since before the day sof emancipation. Writing in the May Crisis, Mr. Willard E. Uphans (white), who attended the convention has the following to say: "I too, a white student, saw several thousand of The New Humanity at the Indianapolis Convention. Irresistible tides of power, immeasureable in consequences were released at the great meeting and are sweeping away the old foundation of prejudice and ignorance, particularly in the universities and colleges. Moreover, if there is one thing above another which impressed me, as a leader of one of the discussion groups at the Convention, it is that the young Negro, as I saw him there, is prepared to assume his full share in our common task. I was so impressed by the reasonableness, the moderation, the ability and the sense of fair play demonstrated by the Negro representatives in my group that I was moved to write to the 48 leaders to see if their experience would coroborate my the Negro Race. own Their testimony shows my optimism is not groundless but

"Writing of the white students one leader says: "Even those whose prejudices were stirred by what took place have had their citadels stormed and they cannot get away from the facts. One white girl in our group was so sincere in her attitude of changing her convictions in the light of new data as to be quite convincing to the group. She said: 'I believe that Christian white and colored people in the South will solve the problem by sharing life-yes, and I am willing to eat with them and I want you to know that it is the first time in my life I have ever said it.'

"Another incident, highly descriptive of the startling transformation that occurred was reported. white girl had been getting violent on the subject of inter-marriage. A direct reply t oone of her remarks by a Negro reassured her so completely she arose and said that although she had lived in the South all her life she had never known that there were such Negroes in the world. Now she could understand how some people liked them, considered them capable and were not afraid they would contaminate all the other races.
