The same news sets forth that on the Warsaw front the battle has subsided. The fighting line from the Province of Plock in Russian Poland, as far north as Tilsit, in East Prusia, is virtually con-

A dispatch reaching here from Warsaw says that among the prisoners taken by the Russians in the fighting at the junction of the Bzura River were a number of German women. According to this message, some of these women were found with rifles in their hands in the first line of trenches.







The estimates are not considered such as to arouse any lengthy discussion, and there is no confirmation of the rumor that the Opposition will demand an undertaking that another session must ensue before a general election.

There will be a Conservative caucus on Thursday, preceding deliverance of the budget speech, the subject matter of which, on account of the drastic tariff changes in prospect, is being kept a strict secret. The finance minister will begin his deliverance soon after the House opens Thursday afternoon, but it will be so timed that the new customs schedules will not be reached until after the customs houses have closed for the day.

The fortieth annual meeting of the Shareholders and Policyholders of the London Life Insurance Company was held at the Company's Head Office, London, Canada, February 8, 1915.

The President, Mr. John McClary, occupied the chair, and there were present a number of Shareholders and Policyholders.

The notice calling the meeting was read by the Manager and Secretary, J. G. Richter, F. A. S., after which the following report and financial statement were submitted.

### Fortieth Annual Report

The Directors of the London Life Insurance Company submit herewith the Audited Financial Statement of the Company for the year ending December 31st, 1914.

During the year 49,329 Applications for Insurance, amounting to \$10,630,069.00, were accepted and Policies issued therefor.

The net Premium and Interest Receipts of the year were respectively \$1,174,923.25 and \$289,895.88, a total of \$1,464,819.13. The increase over the previous year is \$168,978.48.

The payments to Policyholders or heirs, for Cash Profits, Surrender Values, Annuities, Matured Endowments and Death and Disability Claims, aggregated \$370,398.23. The increase over the previous year is \$49,147.61.

The insurance in force on the Company's books at the close of the year, after deducting all re-insurances, aggregated \$30,849,326.74, under 16,277 Ordinary and 119,874 Industrial Policies, an increase of 1,729 Ordinary and 10,280 Industrial Policies, for insurance of \$3,730,951.72 for the

The Company's Assets, consisting of Bonds and Debentures, first Mortgages on Real Estate and other approved securities, amount to \$5,294,262.70, an increase of \$648,567.51 over the previous year. The interest and other payments falling due during the year were generally well met. No losses were incurred in this connection.

The liabilities of the Company under outstanding policies, and in all other respects, have been provided for in ample manner, the whole amounting to \$5,038,676.16. The surplus on Policyholders' Account, exclusive of Subscribed but uncalled Capital, is \$255,586.54. After deducting Paidup Capital, the net surplus over all Liabilities and Capital is \$205,586.54.

### Actuary's Report

The basis of valuation of the liability under the Company's policies as at the 31st December, 1914, was as follows:

Issued since 1st January, 1910, Om (5) Table of Mortality, 3 per cent interest.

Industrial Business-Issued prior to 1st January, 1900, Combined Experience Table, 31/2 per cent interest. Issued since 1st January, 1900, Farr's English Table No. 3, 3 per cent interest.

The total Reserves so computed, less the Reserve on policies reinsured in other Companies, amount to \$4,807,888. Of the total business 77 per cent has been valued on a 3 per cent basis

Endowment Policies continue to form by far the larger proportion of the business transacted. Of the total business in force at the end of the year 86 per cent consisted of Endowment Insurance. The mortality experience on such business is bound to be favorable. The ratio of expected to actual losses in 1914 in the Ordinary Department was, notwithstanding some exceptionally heavy claims on comparatively new business, only 41.5 per cent.

For a number of years the profit earning power of the Company has been considerably greater than was formerly expected. It has, in consequence, been possible to allot profits on a higher scale than estimated, and the distributions for the current year will continue on the very liberal scale now in force-one-third, on the average, in excess of estimates under present rates. A considerable number of the Company's Policyholders have enlisted for active service, and in view of the probable unusual strain that will be experienced this year in consequence, it seems advisable to leave the scale of profits unchanged during 1915; otherwise the conditions would warrant an increase.

The Surplus on the Government standard, if advantage were taken of the allowance permitted under Sec. 42 of the Insurance Act, would be \$676,148.54, apportioned as follows:

### Report of Executive Committee

Your Executive Committee beg to report that they have carefully examined the Investments of the Company as at 31st December, 1914, and find same in excellent condition.

All interest in respect of Debentures owned by the Company has been paid, and of the interest in respect of other investments of the Company which fell due during 1914, over 92 per cent was paid within

In every case in which any interest on Mortgages was overdue at the close of the year, a special investigation was made, and your Committee find that much of this has since been paid, and the small remainder will no doubt be paid in the near future.

### STAFF PENSION FUND.

Your Committee have had under consideration during the past year the creation of a Staff Pension Fund for the benefit of employees who grow old in the Company's service.

It is felt that, owing to the special monetary and other unfavorable conditions at present prevailing, it is advisable to postpone definite action thereon for another year, when, it is hoped, conditions will be more favorable. The interim will also enable the details of the plan to be more fully matured before being submitted for approval at the next General Annual Meeting of the Company.

The Premium and Interest receipts of the year show an increase of over 13 per cent, and Total Assets at the close of the year of 14 per cent

In the matter of payments to Policyholders or heirs, the increase over 1913 is 15 per cent, a large proportion of which is due to the greater number of Matured Endowments falling in during the year.

After making provision for every Liability of the Company in the most ample manner, the Net undivided Surplus over all Liabilities and Capital increased about 17 per cent, for the year, and now exceeds

That in a year of pretty general business depression and exceptional monetary stringency, coupled with the disturbing influence of the regretable European war, in which the British Empire became involved the latter part of the year, the Company has been able to make such an excellent showing, affords gratifying evidence not only of the public confidence which the Company enjoys, but also of the efficiency of the Management, the Office Staff and the Field Force alike.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 .- The Belgian legation issued a statement today denouncing a tax placed on Belgian refugees who do not return to their homes by March 1. Minister Havenith after calling at the state department made the statement public. It is as fol-

"Now the German Government imposes a tax, equal to ten times the usual personal tax, to all Belgians absent from their country who shall not be back in Belgium before March 1,

"The German Government after having imposed an enormous war levy of 480,000,000 francs (\$96,000,000) upon Belgium, already ruined by war and numerous exactions made, on December 4, 1914, the formal promise that no further taxes would be imposed upon the country.

"The new taxation laid upon the absent Belgians is therefore not only a violation of The Hague convention, but constitutes the breach of a most sol-
