MAY LOSE ARMS: OLD BLOW BLAMED

Tragical Outcome of a Brutal Assault, by Farmer on Hired Man.

Albert Hughes, a young man 29 years of age, was this morning brought from the House of Refuge, Strathroy, to Victoria Hospital, where he may have both arms

The case is one of the saddest that has ret come to the attention of the hospital

Hughes came to Canada from England ago-when he had just passed his 17th to load a wagon, and when the farmer returned and found that the boy had not made as much headway as he might have, he was asked for an explanation. Hughes complained of a pain in one arm, whereupon his employer seized a manure fork, and in a fit of rage struck him a blow across the arm, causing a fracture of the bone above the elbow. Hughes' employer was not satisfied at that, for he locked Hughes in a room in the house for ten days before allowing him to consult a physician. When at last Hughes saw a doctor, an effort was made to set the broken arm, but the young man always suffered considerable pain. Hughes eventually went into business in Wardsville, where he remained for ten years, being compelled to retire about two years ago, owing to epilepsy, said to have been the result of the assault committed by the farmer. At first only the arm which was broken was affected, but gradually the disease Imperial Male Quartet Returns After a found its way into the other arm, until now Hughes is unable to do anything for himself. While this was going on Gorvornale suddenly whipped out a revolver and fired three shots in the direction of the two men with whom his brother had been fighting. Two of the bullets went wild, but the third struck Vincenico in the forehead, and with a cry he fell to the ground. Holding his pistol above his head as a warning that two shots still remained, the Italian kicked his way through a rapidly-gathering crowd and dashed through Washington Square,

Canada has had some experience with third parties. There were the P. P. As., a section of the Conservative party, more Protestant than the King, Defender of the Faith, himself, which for a time made quite a noise, but amounted to merely a flash in the eastern contemporaries this lesson: the Canada First party, which attracted some of the best brains of the Canadian people, and was full of promise, but proved to be short-lived; and the Patrons of Industry, a farmers' party which made considerable headway in federal and provincial politics, its representatives at one time outnumbering the Conservatives in the Ontario Legislature. Today nothing remains of these movements.

In Great Britain the Laborites have become a recognized force in politics, through their remarkable showing in the last general election. In the European continental countries the industrial labor classes have identified themselves with the Socialists, who are a steadily growing power. In the Australian Commonwealth, the Labor party has for years held the balance of political power. The promoters of the labor party movement in Canada have no doubt these examples in mind. But it must be remembered that convail in this Dominion. Great Britain and Germany are essentially industrial countries, in which artisans and laborers form the greater part of the population. In Australia, too, where the Labor party, distinct from the Socialone-half the population is urban, and it is chiefly in the cities and towns that a labor movein politics must find recruits. On the other hand, the great majority of Canadian constituencies are peopled by agriculturists, so that the representatives of urban communities, in which are included the members of the labor organizations, form a small minority in on the battlefield.
