### CHINATOWN HAS ANOTHER STORY

New York Celestials Say the Emperor Was Pois-

New York, Nov. 17. - Chinatown has heard a story of the deaths of the Empress Dowager and Emperor Kuang Hsu, which is not that one allowed to pass the cable censor's hands in Pekin to the world's press. Chinatown knew that the real ruler and the shadow emperor had died, 24 hours before the news was printed.

According to the story Chinatown has heard and believes, the Empress Tsi An died, not Sunday, as the press cables had it, but Saturday, which was Friday, our time. The Emperor Kuang Hsu died later than the empress on the same day, not on the day prior to her death, as was announced

by the palace officials at Pekin. According to the Chinatown version Kuang Hsu was poisoned by those who hoped to profit by his death. The poisoners, knowing that the aged dowager was dying, and fearing that the emperor if he lived would again get power in his hands, timed the puppet monarch's death to be as nearly as possible coincident with that of the old woman who had ruled him

Poisoning Ordered. At the office of a firm of Chinese importers on Mott street a young Chiiese woman, who said she was a student at Columbia University, today old Chinaton's version of the sudden

"This firm has a home office in ekin," she said, "and it also has several influential friends in Pekin. Satarday a code cable was sent this firm from its home office through London. "The cable announced that the empress dowager had died Saturday in Pekin, which would be Friday here; that she had died before the emperor,

and that his death followed hers within a few hours. "The cable said that the emperor had been poisoned by his court physician at the orders of a powerful man in control of the court, and it added that Viceroy Yuan Shih Kai was believed to be aiming at seizing the

Four Men Killed and Three Seriously Injured by Carelessness.

Campbellton, N. B., Nov. 17.-Information was received here from Paspebiac, Que., of a most disastrous explosion which occurred at Port Daniel, Que., a short distance below Paspebiac, on the line of the Atlantic and Lake Superior road, in which four men were killed outright and three



"Out of nine reserves in Ontario," said Mrs. Sage, "there are Anglican missionaries on seven. On the reserves are 25 Government schools. Oneida Reserve.

"On the Oneida reserve, which is really made up of two reserves, those of Oneida and Caradoc, there are 1,369 persons. Of these, 270 are in the charge of the Church of England, the pastor being Rev. A. J. Ball, a graduate of Huron College. On this reserve there are three churches, all of which are well attended. Among the Indians their pastors are known as big and little black-coats, according to their importance. "On the Sarnia reserve there are 293

Indians of the Chippewa tribe. Their chief, Fred Wilson Jacobs, has for his wife a London woman. There is on the reserve the St. Clair Government school, which is well attended. The Indians seem to have not the slightest idea of paying debts, and wish, if possible, to have everything done for them without any effort on their part. The men generally make the women do the work, and the women do it willingly. On the whole, these people are short-lived.

"At Kettle Point there is a reserve containing 100 Chippewas. These are being looked after by Rev. F. R. He also explains the position he had taken during the course of the debates and interpellations on this subject in the Reichstag. His majesty the Emperor, received the statements and explanations with great earnestness, and then ex-

pressed his will as follows: "Heedless of the exaggerations of public criticism, which are regarded by him as incorrect, his majesty perceives that his principal imperial task is to insure the stability of the policies of the empire, under the guardianship of constitutional responsibilities. In conformity therewith, his majesty the Emperor, approves the chancellor's utterances in the Reichstag and assures Prince von Buelow of his continued confidence."




