No Confirmation of the Rumored Sea Fight in Which the Czar's Fleet Was Destroyed.

London, Thursday, March 10. dispatch to the Times from Wei Hai Wei, dated March 9, says: "It is reported on good authority that collision between Japanese and Russian troops has occurred near Hai Ju, Korea (54 miles northwest of Chemulpo), which resulted in the defeat of the Russians.

REPORTS UNCONFIRMED.

Up to a late hour last night the legation here had heard nothing of the reported fighting at Port Arthur or of the Russian Vladivostock squadron, but it is considered significant that none of the Russian official dispatches make any mention of Vladivostock cruisers. The news from Washington of the appearance of the Japanese forces at Fung Wang Chang is regarded as important.

A JAP SUCCESS. According to the Tien Tsin corres pondent of the Daily Telegraph the Japanese advanced from the Yalu River, captured Fung Wang Chang and drove out the Russians in the vicinity of the Ta Ku Ling eastern pass, and are in force 70 miles east of New Chwang. The Russians, with 35,000 men are entrenched strongly at Liao Yang and Hai Cheng, where tighting is imminent. Some small engage-

KAMIMURA REPORTS.

Thinks He Did Considerable Damage

to Vladivostock Tokio, March 10.-Vice-Admiral Kaminura, reporting the bombardment of Vladivostock on March 6, says the atack commenced at ten minutes to 2 in the afternoon, and the firing was kept up about 40 minutes. He believes the ombardment was effective and demoral-

ing to the enemy. The Russian forts did not reply to the Japanese fire. Japanese cruisers subsequently reconoitered several adjacent places on the coast, but found no trace of the enemy. The full report of Vice-Admiral Kamimura, who commands the second Japanese squadron, says: "As prearranged, we eached the east entrance to Vladivostock n the morning of March 6, through a rozen sea. 



King Edward Has Forbidden Practice in the Theaters.

Order Expected to Appear in the Canadian Gazette.

Since the Russo-Jap war broke out, popular sympathy has ben with the Japanese, and in London theaters, as well as in the theaters of all other Canadian cities, songs eulogizing the little yellow men, and belittling more or less the bewhiskered Russians, have been sung to the great delight of large audiences. It is a matter of business with the theatrical people, and if the shoe were on the other foot, and Rusinstead of Japan, were Britain's ally, they would be as ready to write and sing pro-Russ songs as they now are pro-Jap ditties. At the Grand last night, a very clever woman in the Aubrey Stock Company brought down the house with a pro-Jap reference to the war, and the audience appeared to be anxious for more.

It is likely, however, that a stop will be put to the singing of such songs in Canada very shortly.
