BY-LAW NO. 37

TO CONFIRM THE ACTION HERETOFORE TAKEN FOR THE COLLECTION OF TOLLS ON
THE PORT STANLEY ROAD IN THE COUNTY OF ELGIN AND ESTABLISH THE SAME.

Passed 27th February, 1856.

WHEREAS, it is expedient to confirm the action heretofore taken, and establish the authority by which tolls have been collected on the Port Stanley Gravel Road.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the County of Elgin, That the following rate of tolls has been heretofore sanctioned by this Council, and ordered to be taken at the toll bars or gates on the aforesaid road, in the said County of Elgin, and shall be the rates to be taken henceforward at each gate on each time of passing (except when checking each other) with the privilege of the same vehicles and animals and same amount of load, or not exceeding two thousand pounds, including weight of vehicle, returning free of charge once within the same day.

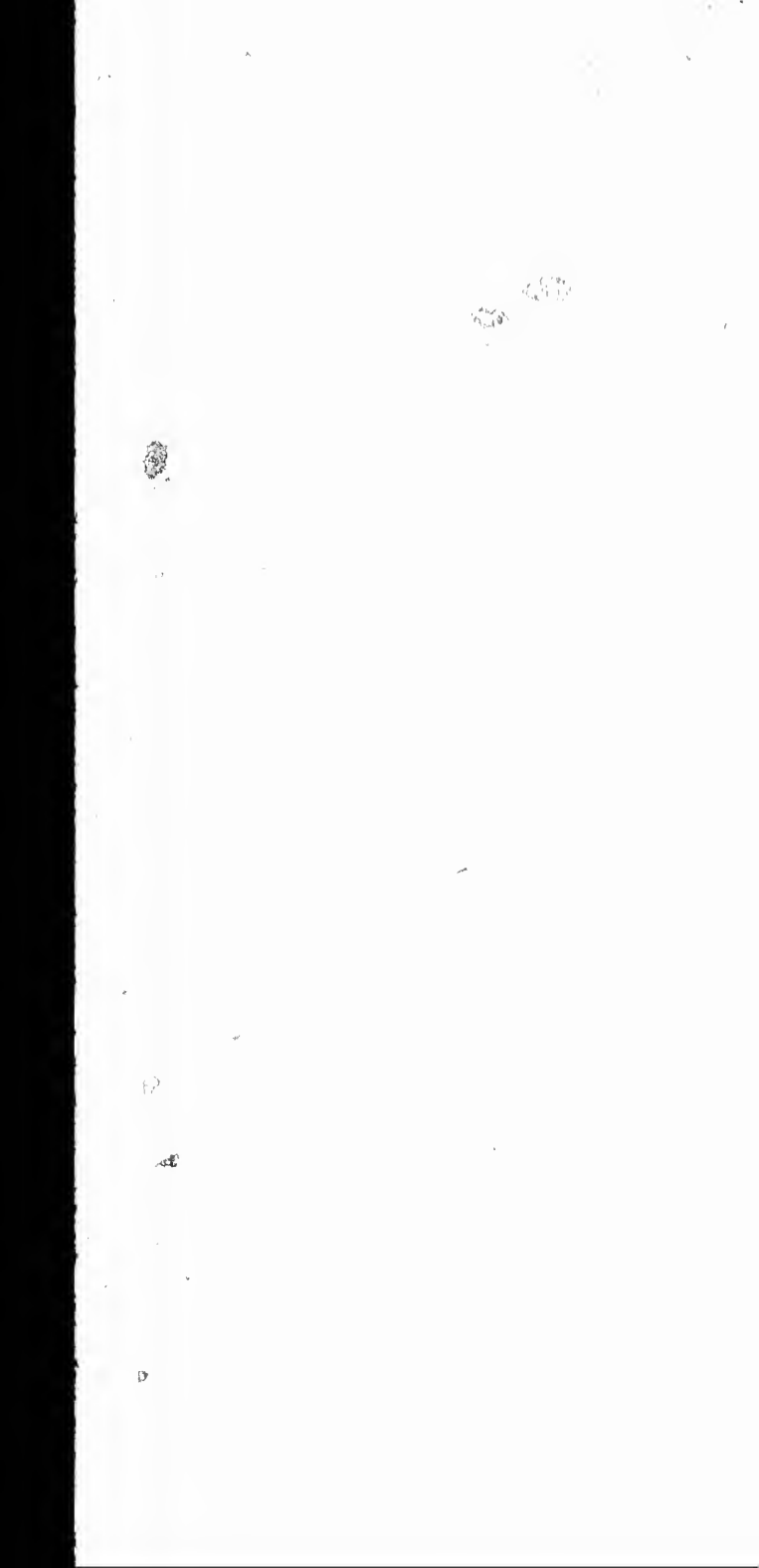
For every vehicle drawn by one horse or animal, four pence.

For every vehicle drawn by two horses or animals, and not more than 2000 lbs. weight, including weight of vehicle, sixpence.

For every additional 2000 lbs. up to 4000 lbs., including weight of vehicle, and the fractional part of two thousand pounds, as two thousand pounds one penny, half penny.

And for every additional one hundred pounds and the fractional part of one hundred pounds, as one hundred pounds over and above four thousand pounds including weight of vehicle, the sum of one half penny.

For every additional horse or beast of draught attached to each vehicle, or for a saddle horse and rider, two pence.



For every score of sheep or swine at the rate of two pence halfpenny per score.

For every head of cattle, one penny.

Wagons having five inch tires to pass by paying half the above rates of toll.

Freeman Ellison to be allowed to pass and repass gate number two, free of toll, when going to and from his saw mill.

All persons passing through either of the check gates shall be allowed till noon of the following day to repass with their tickets the other check gate; also all persons living within one mile of the north side of gate number four on the gravel road, or persons coming to the road within that distance and living within two miles east and west shall pass gate number four for half toll, provided they register their names at the gate.

AND BE IT ENACTED that all persons driving over any of the said bridges on said line of road faster than a walk shall, upon conviction thereof before any Justice of the peace, be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than fifty shillings, nor less than five shillings, together with costs of conviction, to be recovered summarily by distress and sale of offenders goods and chattels.

AND BE IT ENACTED that all persons exempt by law shall pass free of toll, also contractors and officers connected with the road, while on duty or persons having to pass any gate to perform statute labour and all persons on the Sabbath day going to attend, or who have attended Divine Service, also ministers of the gospel while engaged on ministerial duty; and this by-law shall be in force and take effect from and after the 27th day of February, A. D. 1856.

WHEREAS, by the Two Hundred and Seventy-first Section of the Municipal Institutions Act twenty-nine, thirty Victoria, Chapter Fifty-one, "The Council of every Township and County may pass By-Laws for paying the members of the Council for their attendance in Council at a rate not exceeding two dollars per diem and five cents per mile necessarily travelled to and from such attendance."

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Elgin by virtue of the Two Hundred and Seventy-first Section of the Act twenty-nine, thirty, Victoria, Chapter Fifty-one, "That the sum of two dollars per day be paid to the members of Council for their attendance in Council, and five cents per mile necessarily travelled to and from such attendance.

AND IT IS ENACTED that By-Law heretofore passed in that behalf be and is hereby repealed, and that this By-Law shall take effect from and after the twenty-second day of January, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-seven.

BY-LAW NO. 196

TO MAKE REGULATIONS FOR THE PRESERVATION OF PUBLIC MORALS IN THE COUNTY OF ELGIN.

Passed in Council, 9th November, 1870.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the Act Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth Victoria, Chapter Fifty-one, Section Two Hundred and Eighty-four of the Municipal Act of 1866, amended by Thirty third Victoria, Chapter Twenty-sixth, Section Four of the Statutes of the Province of Ontario, power is given to the Council of every County, City and Town, to pass By-Laws for the preservation of Public Morals.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Corporation of the County of Elgin, by virtue and under the authority aforesaid, That it shall not be lawful for any person to give, or sell, intoxicating drink to any child, apprentice or servant within the County without the consent of the parent, master or legal protector of such child, apprentice or servant.

That it shall not be lawful for any person to post any indecent placards, writings, or pictures, or to write indecent words, or to make any indecent pictures or drawings on walls or fences in any streets or public places in the County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person to be drunk, or to utter or to make use of any profane oath or obscene blasphemous, or grossly insulting language, or other immorality or indecency in the said County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to keep a disorderly House, or House of Illfame within the said County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person to keep a Gambling House in said County, and that all Faro Bunks, Rouge, Etnoir, Roulette Tables and other devices for gambling found therein shall be seized and destroyed.

That it shall not be lawful for vagrants or mendicants to be found in the County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person to be found drunk or disorderly in any street, highway, or public place in the said County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person to indecently, publicly expose his other person, or to be guilty of any indecent exhibition within the said County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to be horse racing on any of the public streets or highways in the County of Elgin.

That it shall not be lawful for any person to bathe, or indecently expose his other person; by washing in any waters within this County, lying or running near any public highway, between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and eight at night, unless provided with and clothed in a proper bathing dress, sufficient to prevent any indecent exposure of their persons.

AND BE IT ENACTED BY THE AUTHORITY AFORESAID, that any person or persons guilty of violation of any of the provisions of this By-Law, shall, upon conviction before any Justice or Justices of the Peace, having Jurisdiction in the said County of Elgin, be liable to a fine of not more than Twenty Dollars, nor less than One Dollar, exclusive of costs. In default of payment, to be levied and collected by distress, and sale of goods and chattels of said offender or offenders; and in case no goods or chattels are found belonging to the said offender or offenders as aforesaid, on which to levy any fines or fees as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for any such Justice or Justices of the Peace, in their discretion, to commit the offender or offenders to the Common Jail or Lock-up House in the said County of Elgin, for a period not exceeding Twenty days, nor less than One Day, with or without hard labor, as the said Justice or Justices may determine, unless the fine and costs be sooner paid.

AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED that all fines and penalties imposed and collected under and by Virtue of this By-Law, shall belong to and be appropriated to the use of the Municipality in which the offence was committed.

AND IT IS ALSO ENACTED that By-Law No. 157 of this Council is hereby repealed.

And that this By-Law shall be in force, and take effect from and after the ninth day of November, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy.

TO REPEAL BY-LAW NUMBER TWENTY RESPECTING PAYMENT OF JURORS, AND TO INCREASE THE AMOUNT PAID TO JURORS FOR THEIR ATTENDANCE.

That every Petit Juryman and Grand Juryman attending the Courts of Assize and nisi prius, Oyer and Terminer General Sessions of the Peace or County Court, shall receive the sum of one dollar and fifty cents per day for such attendance, and the sum of ten cents per mile for every mile he travels from place of residence to the said Court.

AND IT IS FURTHER ENACTED under the authority of the said Act, that the Sheriff receive the sum of two dollars for each pay list for Petit and Grand Jurors, and the sum of one dollar per day for checking the same at the opening of the Courts, and certifying and returning the same to the Treasurer of the County.

AND IT IS ALSO ENACTED that By-Law number twenty heretofore passed in that behalf be, and the same is hereby repealed.

NUMBER ONE

To comprise the Village of Vienna and the Township of Bayham.

NUMBER TWO

NUMBER THREE

To comprise the Townships of Yarmouth, Southwold, Dunwich and Aldborough.

BY LAW NO. 412

TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS IN THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE COUNTY OF ELGIN AND THE OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES THEREOF.

Passed 5th June, 1885.

WHEREAS, it is expedient to regulate the proceedings in Council and in Committees of the same and the Officers of the Corporation of the County of Elgin, and to amend and consolidate all other By-Laws relating to the proceedings in Council.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Elgin enacts as follows :

That all other By-Laws relating to proceedings in Council, or inconsistent with this By-Law, are hereby repealed.

PROCEEDINGS IN COUNCIL.

I.

MEETINGS AND ADJOURNMENT OF COUNCIL.

1. In all the proceedings had or taken in the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Elgin, the following rules and regulations shall be observed, and shall be the rules and regulations for the order and despatch of business in the said Council, and of the Committees of the said Council.

2. The hour of meeting on the first day of each session shall be 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and for every other day or sitting in the session, such hour shall be regulated at the previous adjournment.

3. Unless there shall be a quorum present in half an hour after the time appointed for the meeting of Council, the Council shall then stand absolutely adjourned until the next regular hour of meeting, and the Clerk shall, if required by two members, take down the names of the members present at the expiration of such half hour.

4. The Council shall always adjourn at the hours of 12 o'clock, noon, and 6 o'clock, afternoon, if in session at these hours, unless otherwise determined by a vote of a majority of the members present.

5. The Council shall always adjourn at the hour of 11 o'clock p. m., if in session at that hour, unless otherwise determined by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

6. The members of the Council shall not leave their places, on adjournment, until the Warden or other presiding Officer leaves the chair.

II.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS IN COUNCIL.

7. As soon after the hour of meeting as there shall be a quorum present, the Warden shall take the chair and the members shall be called to order.

8. In case the Warden shall not be in attendance, the Clerk shall call the meeting to order, until a Chairman shall be chosen, and the member so chosen to

preside shall take the chair during the absence of the Warden, but at the meeting only at which he has been so chosen.

9. Immediately after the Warden or other Presiding Officer shall have taken his seat at the first session of the day, then the minutes of the preceding day's meeting, or meetings, shall be read by the Clerk, in order that any mistakes therein may be corrected by the Council, and if approved of by the Council, shall be signed by the Warden and Clerk.

10. Every member, previous to his speaking to any question or motion, shall rise from his seat uncovered and address himself to the Warden or other Presiding Officer.

11. When two or more members rise at once, the Warden shall name the member who is first to speak, and the other or others may appeal to the Council, if dissatisfied by the Warden's decision, by the question, "Which member was first up?"

12. Every member present when a question is put shall vote thereon, unless the Council shall excuse him, or he be personally interested in the question, but such interest must be resolvable into a personal pecuniary profit, or such as is peculiar to that member and not in common with the interests of the County at large.

13. When the Warden or other presiding Officer is putting the question, no member shall walk across or out of the room, nor interrupt the speaker, except to a question of order, nor pass between the speaker and the chair, and no councillor shall leave his place during the sitting of the Council without turning to the chair as he retires, and making a bow in such a manner as that any member present may have an opportunity to object to the absence of such retiring member.

14. Any member called to order shall at once sit down, unless permitted to explain; and the ruling of the Warden or other Presiding Officer shall be final, unless otherwise decided by the Council on an appeal from such ruling.

15. No member shall speak disrespectfully of Her Majesty the Queen, nor of any of the Royal Family, nor of the Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governor, or other person administering the Government of the Dominion, or of this Province; nor shall he use offensive words against this Council, or against any member thereof.

16. No member shall speak beside the question in debate.

17. Any member may require the question or motion under discussion to be read at any time during the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member while speaking.

18. No member shall speak more than once on the same question, without leave of the Council, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which

may have been misconceived ; but then he is not to introduce new matter. The mover and seconder may speak a second time.

19. After a motion is passed, or a report adopted, no motion to alter or amend the same shall be considered during the same session of Council, unless the motion to alter or amend is moved and seconded by two members from among those who voted with the majority that carried said motion or report.

20. Upon a division on any question before the Council, the names of those who vote for and those who vote against the question shall be entered on the minutes, if required by any one member of the Council, and the names shall be recorded yea and nay on the minutes as the members vote on the question.

21. Questions under the proper order of the day may be put to the Warden or other Presiding Officer, or through him to any member of the Council, relating to any motion, or other matter connected with the business of the Council or the affairs of the County, but no argument or opinion is to be offered, nor any facts stated, except so far as may be necessary to explain the same ; and in answering any such questions a member is not to debate the matter to which the same refers.

22. It shall be lawful for the Warden or other presiding Officer, subject to an appeal to the Council, to order the doors of the Council Chamber to be closed ; and when the doors shall be directed to be closed, all persons, except the members and the Clerk, shall retire.

III.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

23. The Clerk shall have prepared for the use of the members the general order of the day, containing :

- 1st. Reading the minutes.
- 2nd. Reading communications.
- 3rd. Presenting petitions.
- 4th. Enquiries by members.
- 5th. Giving notice.
- 6th. Reports of Committees.
- 7th. Unfinished business.
- 8th. New business.

9th. Consideration of By-Laws.

The business shall, in all cases, be taken up in the way in which it stands upon the orders of the day, unless otherwise determined by a vote of a majority of the members present taken without debate thereon.

24. No resolution, asking for or making a grant of money, shall be voted upon until one day's notice has been given that such resolution will be offered.

25. All motions shall be in writing, except to dispose of reports or communications, or to refer to Committees, and shall be seconded before being debated or put to vote; and all motions shall be read by a member rising in his seat with his head uncovered, and shall then be conveyed to the Warden, who shall again read the same.

26. After a motion has been read by the Warden or other Presiding Officer it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Council, but may be withdrawn at any time by consent of a majority of the members present.

27. A motion to refer the main motion to a Committee shall preclude all amendment of the main question until decided.

28. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order unless a vote is being taken, but no second motion to adjourn shall be made until after some intermediate proceedings shall have been had.

29. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received unless to amend it, to postpone it, to adjourn, or to move the previous question.

30. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments of the main question, and shall be put without debate in the following words: "Shall the main question now be put?" and if this be carried in the affirmative, the original motion shall forthwith be put to vote without amendment or debate.

31. All amendments shall be put in the reverse order in which they are moved, except in filling up blanks, when the longest time and the largest sum shall be put first; and every amendment submitted shall be reduced to writing, and be decided upon or withdrawn before the main question is put to vote.

32. In all motions for the appointment of any member of the Council, or of any other person to any office in the gift of the Council, the names of all candidates shall be submitted before any vote is taken, and the candidates shall be voted on separately in the order in which they are proposed.

33. Only one amendment shall be allowed to an amendment, and any amendment more than one must be to the main question.

34. When the question under consideration contains distinct propositions, upon the request of any member the vote upon each proposition shall be taken separately.

35. After any question is finally put by the Warden or other Presiding Officer, no member shall speak to the question, nor shall any other motion be made until after the result is declared; and the decision of the Warden or other Presiding Officer, as to whether the question has been finally put, shall be conclusive.

36. Whenever the Warden or other Presiding Officer is of opinion that a motion offered to the Council is contrary to law, or the rules and privileges of the Council, he shall apprise the members thereof immediately before putting the question thereon, and quote the law or rule of authority applicable to the case, without argument or comment.

37. Members shall always take their places when any division is called for.

38. When the Warden or other Presiding Officer is called on to decide a point of order or practice, he shall state the rule or authority applicable to the case, without argument or comment, when required.

39. The Warden or other Presiding Officer may vote with the other members on all questions, and any question on which there is an equality of votes shall be deemed to have been negatived, if the Warden has voted.

IV.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

40. Whenever it shall be moved and carried that the Council go into a Committee of the whole, the Warden or other Presiding Officer shall leave the chair, and shall appoint a Chairman of Committee of the whole, who shall maintain order in the Committee, and who shall report the proceedings of the Committee.

41. The rules of the Council shall be observed in Committee of the whole, so far as may be applicable, except that no motion shall require to be seconded, but no motion for the previous question, or for an adjournment, shall be allowed; and in taking the yeas and nays the names of the members shall not be recorded, nor shall the number of times of speaking on any question be limited.

42. Questions of order arising in Committee of the whole shall be decided by the chairman, subject to an appeal to the Council, and if any sudden disorder should arise in the Committee, the Warden or other Presiding Officer will resume the chair, without any question being put.

43. On motion in Committee of the whole to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

44. A motion in Committee of the whole to rise without reporting, or that the Chairman leave the chair, shall always be in order, and shall take precedence of any other motion. On such motion debate shall be allowed, and on an affirmative vote the subject referred to the Committee shall be considered as disposed of

in the negative, and the Warden or other Presiding Officer shall resume the chair and proceed with other business.

V.

READING OF BY-LAWS AND PROCEEDINGS THEREON.

45. Every By Law shall be introduced upon motion for leave, specifying the title of the same, or upon motion to appoint a Committee to prepare and bring it in.

46. When a By-Law is read in the Council, the Clerk shall certify the readings, and the time, on the back thereof. After By-Laws have passed he shall be responsible for their correctness should they be amended.

47. The question, "That this by-law be now read a first time," shall be decided without amendment or debate, and shall be read a second time before it is committed, and read a third time before it is signed by the Warden.

48. Any by-law for the appropriation of money, brought in on the report of a Committee of the whole, shall pass through all its stages without being again referred to the Committee of the whole, unless upon special motion in writing.

49. All amendments made in Committee of the whole shall be reported by the Chairman to the Council, through the Warden or other Presiding Officer, who shall receive the same forthwith. After report, the By-Law shall be open to debate and amendment before it is ordered for a third reading. When a By-Law is reported without amendment it is forthwith ordered to be read a third time at such time as may be appointed by the Council.

VI.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

50. All By Laws, after having been finally adopted, shall be transcribed in a By-Law Book and paged and indexed.

51. Every petition, remonstrance, or other written application intended to be presented to the Council, must be fairly written or printed on paper or parchment, and signed by at least one person, and no letters, affidavits, or other documents, shall be attached to it, and shall be presented by a member in his place as soon as that order of business is reached.

52. Every member presenting any petition, remonstrance, or other written application to the Council, shall examine the same, and shall be answerable that they do not contain any impertinent or improper matter, and that the same is respectful and temperate in its language; he shall also endorse thereon the name of the applicant

and the substance of such application, and sign his name thereto, which endorsement only shall be read by the Clerk, unless a member shall require the reading of the paper, in which case the whole shall be read.

53. Any member may move to take up or refer any communication or petition made or presented to the Council during the year in which such petition was made or presented, or during the next preceding year, and whether such communication or petition has been referred to a Committee and reported upon or not; but no motion shall be in order to take up or refer a communication or petition made or presented at any time before the commencement of the year next preceding such motion.

54. All petitions or other written communications on any subject within the cognizance of any Standing Committee shall, on presentation, be referred to the proper Committee without any motion; and no member shall speak upon, nor shall any debate be allowed on the presentation of any petition or other communication to the Council; but any member may move that in referring said petition or other communication certain instructions may be given by the Council, or that the said petition or communication be referred to a Select Committee, and if the petition or communication complain of some present personal grievance, requiring immediate remedy, the matter contained therein may be brought into immediate discussion and disposed of forthwith.

VII.

ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEES.

55. The Committee to strike the standing Committees and all Select Committees shall be appointed on motion of a member by consent of a majority of the Council, and any member of the Council may be placed on a Committee, notwithstanding the absence of such member at the time of his being named upon such Committee, and the Warden shall be, ex-officio member of all the Standing Committees.

56. The Committee to strike the Standing Committees shall in no case consist of more than thirteen members.

57. The member who shall introduce a By-Law, petition or motion, upon any subject which may be referred to a Select Committee, shall be one of the Special Committee to which it is referred, without being named thereon.

58. Of the number of members composing any Standing or Select Committee, such number thereof as shall be equal to a majority of such Committee, exclusive of any ex-officio members, shall be a quorum to do business.

59. There shall be annually appointed at the first meeting of each newly elected Council, the following Committees, which shall compose the Standing Committees of the Council for the year :

- 1st. Finance.
- 2nd. Public Improvements.
- 3rd. Jail and Printing.
- 4th. Petitions and Legislation.
- 5th. Educational.
- 6th. Equalization.
- 7th. House of Industry.

60. Each Standing Committee of the Council, except where otherwise specially provided, shall consist of such members of the Council not exceeding one member from each Municipality as the Council shall name as aforesaid.

61. The members of each standing Committee shall, at their first meeting, elect a Chairman from among themselves, and as soon as such Chairman has been elected, the time of the future regular meetings of the Committee shall be determined by the members thereof, and also the hour at which each of such meetings shall be held.

62. Special meetings of Committees may be called by the Chairman whenever he shall consider it necessary to do so, and it shall be the duty of the Chairman, or in his absence the Clerk of the Council, to summon a special meeting of Committee whenever requested in writing to do so by a majority of the members of the Committee.

63. Members of the Council may attend the meetings of any of the Committees, but shall not be allowed to vote nor take any part in the discussion or debate.

64. The business of the respective Standing and Select Committees shall be conducted under the following regulations :

(1) The Chairman shall preside at every meeting, and shall vote on all questions submitted, and in case of an equal division the question shall be passed in the negative.

(2) He shall sign all such orders and documents as the Committee may legally order.

(3) In his absence one of the other members shall be elected to preside, who shall discharge the duties of the Chairman for the meeting until the arrival of the Chairman.

(4) No order or authority to do any matter or thing shall be recognized as emanating from any Committee unless it is in writing, nor unless it is signed by the Chairman, or acting Chairman, or Secretary thereof, and refers to the minute of the Board or Committee under which it is issued.

65. The general duties of all the Standing and Select Committees of the Council shall be as follows :

(1) To report to the Council from time to time, whenever desired by the Council, and as often as the interests of the County may require, on all matters connected with the duties imposed on them respectively, and to recommend such action by the Council in relation thereto as may be deemed necessary.

(2) To cause to be prepared, and introduce into the Council, all such By-laws as may be necessary to give effect to the reports or recommendations of the respective Committees that are adopted by the Council.

(3) To consider and report respectively on any and all matters referred to them by the Council, the Chairman signing such report and bringing up the same.

(4) It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to present to the Council in June, in each year, a full and particular exhibit of the financial affairs of the Council at the termination of the preceding financial year, together with an estimate of the amount required to be raised by assessment during the current year.

(5) To report to the Council at the June session in each year as to the manner in which the revenue required for the current year should be raised.

(6) To consider and report as often as may be necessary, on the management of all matters connected with railway stock, bonds, or other securities held by the Corporation.

(7) To consider and report on all affairs connected with the leasing or selling of County property.

(8) To advise the Treasurer, when called upon to do so, in all matters pertaining to his office.

(9) To see that all duties and services which ought to be performed by the Treasurer, and the officers in his department are fully executed.

66. In addition to the duties prescribed by law, or by this By-law, or by any other By-law of the County of Elgin, prescribing duties to the Board of Road Directors or Public Improvements Committee the duties especially imposed on the said Board or Committee shall be as follows :

(1) To report and recommend to the Council such regulations for the control of roads, bridges and works, the property of the County, as may be requisite for the public safety and welfare, and in accordance with the Legislative enactments.

(2) To direct and control the County Enquirer and his Staff in the discharge of their duties, and to report to the Council from time to time, on all matters connected with the duties of his department.

(3) To give effect to all orders of the Council in relation to the performance of works on roads or bridges.

67. In addition to the duties prescribed by law, or by the seventy-fourth section of this By-law or by any other By-law of the County of Elgin, the duties especially imposed on the Jail Committee shall be as follows:

(1) To regulate all matters connected with the Jail, Court House, Council Chamber, and all grounds and buildings adjacent thereto, the property of the Corporation, and have the control of the officials appointed to take charge of the same by the County.

APPOINTMENT AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS OF THE CORPORATION.

The duties of the various officers of the Corporation, in addition to those prescribed by law, or by any By-Law or resolution of the Council, shall be as follows:

TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall be the head of the Financial Department of the Corporation, and shall be the principal officer and adviser of the Corporation, through the Finance Committee, in all matters relating to the monetary and financial operations of the County, and especially with regard to its debt, and the estimates to be prepared annually for providing the ways and means for protecting the same, and meeting the annual expenditure, with a careful regard to the maintenance of the County credit.

The security to be given by the Treasurer, as required by law, shall be either by bond, with good and sufficient personal sureties, or the covenant and undertaking of any good and sufficient Company or Association duly incorporated for granting bonds of suretyship for parties holding positions of trust, and as to the amount of the same and all other particulars, shall be subject to the approval of the Council.

The Treasurer shall keep or cause to be kept, according to the most approved system of book-keeping, such books of account as may be necessary to show distinctly the receipts and disbursements, and all other reckonings and accounts of what nature or kind soever, connected with the monetary transactions of the Corporation.

He shall also keep special books and registers for recording the debenture debt of the Corporation, the retirement of the coupons or interest warrants of the same, and all other changes in the same.

He shall use all diligence in enforcing the prompt collection of all rates, taxes, interest, rentals, or other dues of the Corporation, and where necessary, enforce payment of the same by a prompt recourse to legal process.

He shall be the custodian of all titles, and evidences of title, deeds, mortgages, leases, bonds, agreements or other instruments relating to the property and rentals of the County, and shall only allow the same to be taken from his office on the order of the Council or on the requisition and receipt of the County Solicitor, for use in any legal procedure, or on the order to produce of any Court of Law or equity.

He shall further be the custodian of all bonds and securities of fidelity given for the faithful discharge of the duties of the officials and servants of the Corporation, save his own, which shall be deposited with the County Clerk.

He shall be guided in the payments and disbursements of his office by the By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of the Corporation with regard to the passing and verification of accounts by the several Committees, or by statutory or other authority, and by the appropriations made for their liquidation, advising with the Committee of Finance or the Council when requisite.

He shall, as early as may be after the close of the financial year, prepare for publication any statements of assets and liabilities, and such other information regarding the County debt, and any other special accounts of the Corporation, as may be required by the Council.

He shall generally superintend the transactions of his department, and the officers of the same, and duly compare, check, and verify the entries of receipts and disbursements with the accounts and vouchers of the same, and with the books of the office.

The accounts and transactions of his department shall be subject to an audit by the County Auditors, if so directed by the Council at any time, and these shall prepare the Annual Detailed Audit and Abstract Report of Receipts and Expenditure.

COUNTY CLERK.

It shall be the duty of the County Clerk—

- (1) To notify each member of their respective Committees appointed under this By-law, so soon as the appointment has been made, of the time and place at which the first meeting of the Committee will be held.
- (2) To furnish each of such members with a copy of this By-law at the time of serving the notice of the first meeting.
- (3) To furnish the Treasurer of the County, the Chairman of the Committee on Works, and the Chairman of each of the other committees, with certified copies

of all resolutions, enactments, orders of the Council, or other matters relative to the matters over which the said Committees may respectively have jurisdiction, on the day next succeeding that upon which the action of the Council in respect thereof takes place, or sooner if required.

(4) To communicate or convey to the Committees all petitions or other documents referred by the Council.

(5) To give notice to the members of the Council of all special meetings thereof; said notice to be mailed to each member at his residence or place of business.

(6) To have charge of the County seal and only to attach the same to any document connected with the corporation, on the order of the Council.

ENGINEER AND STAFF.

It shall be the duty of the County Engineer—

(1) To report to the Council, at each session if necessary, as to the improvements and repairs which, in his opinion, should be undertaken by the Corporation; and also on or before the first day of May in each year, to present to the said Committee a supplementary report as to any additional improvements and repairs to be undertaken during the year, and which were not included in the last preceding report.

(2) To have the general superintendence and control of all employees of the Department in the carrying out of all works of construction and repair of buildings ordered by the Council or any Committee thereof.

(3) To be responsible to the Council for the due performance of all such works, unless by the resolution, By-law or contract for the same, such works have been entrusted to some other Engineer or Architect.

(4) To decide upon, select and employ such number of foremen, inspectors, mechanics and laborers as may be required from time to time for any Corporation work under his control which has not been let by contract; and such employees shall be paid by the County upon the Engineer's certificate, reported to the Treasurer, and shall be subject to dismissal at any time by him or by the Council without being entitled to any notice of or compensation for such dismissal, and all such appointments and dismissals shall be reported forthwith thereafter to the Council, through the Board of Road Directors.

(5) To examine or cause examination to be made into all complaints of defective roadways or drainage, and to take such measures as may be necessary to secure the conservation of the public thoroughfares and their maintenance against encroachment.

(6) To examine and certify all bills for material and labor against the Corporation, and to make or cause to be made, the surveys and examinations necessary for the purpose.

(7) To have control of all assistants employed in his department, and of all Corporation contractors, subject to the terms of their respective contracts.

(8) To report from time to time to the Board of Road Directors, or to any Committee having cognizance of the matter, or to the Council, as the case may require, any obstruction he may meet with in the course of his duties or any other matter upon which he may require advice or instruction.

(9) To furnish the Council and the various Committees thereof with all plans and specifications required in connection with the roads, bridges, drains, culverts and other Corporation works, and take and furnish all levels, and make all surveys in connection with the same, and also perform all engineering services connected with the Corporation of the County of Elgin as the Council may from time to time require, and be responsible for the supervision and execution of the same.

It shall also be the duty of the Engineer—

To cause a notice of any special meeting of the Board of Road Directors to be mailed to each member of said Committee.

To conduct the correspondence of the said Board, and keep a "Letter Book" containing copies of all letters written by him on office business.

To communicate on the day after any meeting of the said Board, a copy of any order or minute of the said Board, made at such meeting, to such officials of the Corporation or other persons as may be affected thereby, or to whom the Board may order the same to be communicated.

To preserve and file all communications and tenders addressed to or read before the said Board, and to furnish the said Board, when required, a copy of any account, letter, report, specification or other document in the possession of the said Department.

To prepare and have the custody of, and be responsible for, all such plans and estimates as may from time to time be prepared for the use of the County.

To keep a "Plan Book," which shall contain a list of all plans, profiles and drawings in the department; and no plan shall be allowed to go out of the office until a receipt for the same has been signed by the person to whom it is given.

To keep the time of all men employed by the Board.

To make all measurements of work and material which may be required.

To keep a "Measurement Book," in which he shall enter all measurements of work of repair done and materials delivered for the same, with dates and names, as may be required.

Whenever work is done or material supplied under a written contract, no account or estimate for such work or material shall be certified by the Engineer, or paid by the Treasurer, unless and until the complete execution of the contract and bond (if any) shall first have been certified by the County Solicitor.

THE COUNTY SOLICITOR.

The person appointed as Solicitor shall attend to such duties and give such legal opinions as may be required by the Council, or the Chairman of any Committee thereof—such opinion to be in writing.

That it shall be the duty of all other Officers of this Corporation to furnish the County Solicitor, upon request, with any documents, books or papers, or copies of the same, in the custody or possession of such officers, and to give to the said Solicitor such other aid and assistance as he may require in the performance of the duties of the said office.

MONEY APPROPRIATIONS, ACCOUNTS, EXPENDITURES, CONTRACTS, AND IMPROVEMENTS.

That no tenders be accepted on behalf of the Corporation of the County of Elgin for any purpose unless such tender be accompanied by a good and sufficient guarantee for the performance of the tender, signed by two or more responsible persons, and the guarantee may be in the following form :

We, the undersigned, do promise and agree with the Corporation of the County of Elgin, that the annexed tender of _____ shall be carried out by the said _____ in the event of said tender being accepted.

Dated at _____ this _____ day of _____ 189 _____

Copies of the above guarantee shall be printed, and one or more copies be furnished by the County Commissioner, or County Clerk, or by any member of the Council being aware of the matter tendered for, to parties desirous of tendering.

With the view of preventing members and officers of the Corporation from being interested in Corporation contracts, it is hereby expressly declared that no member of the Council, and no officer of the Corporation, shall be interested in a private capacity, directly or indirectly, in any contract or agreement for labor, or for any materials, goods, wares or merchandise furnished to the County, wherein the County is a party interested.

Any breach of the duty imposed by the preceding section of this By Law, on the part of any officer of the Corporation, shall subject him to forfeiture of his office, and immediate removal therefrom.

No account or claim against the County, arising out of or connected with any contract, agreement, purchase or sale, made contrary to this By-Law, shall be certified by any Engineer or other officer of the Corporation, or approved by any Committee, or the Chairman thereof, or paid by the Treasurer.

Every contract shall contain a clause declaring that the contract is entered into on the part of the Corporation in full faith that no member of the Council, and no officer of the Corporation has any interest whatever therein, and further declaring that the persons contracting, and their representatives, are to forfeit all claims under the contract, and for all work done, or materials, goods, wares or merchandise furnished under it, if it shall appear that any member of the Council or officer of the Corporation is at the time interested therein, or if any interest therein is afterwards given or agreed to be given to him, and providing that no payment is to be required without the declaration being delivered at the time of requiring the same, as hereinafter provided.

The County Clerk, for the convenience of parties, shall provide printed forms for the necessary certificates and declaration, such forms being subject to the approval of the Council.

No money shall be paid to any member of the Council, or to any officer of the Corporation, as paid agent or attorney for any contractor.

No member of the Council shall have power to direct or interfere with the performance of any work for the Corporation, and the officer in charge shall be subject to his superior officer (if any) and to the Council, or to any Committee (while acting in that capacity, and not otherwise), to which the Council may, in any case, give authority in that behalf.

No contractor or other person found by the County Engineer, or person in charge of the Engineer's Department, or by any Committee of the Council, or declared by a Resolution of the Council, or ascertained by a judicial decision, to have been guilty of defrauding, or attempting to defraud the County, shall again be employed in any capacity on behalf of or receive any contract from the County, without the express sanction of the Council. It shall be the duty of the various officers of the corporation to forthwith report all such frauds, or attempted frauds, of which they may become cognizant, to their superiors, and for such superiors to report the same to the Committee to whose department the subject of the fraud belongs.

GENERAL CLAUSES.

No person, except Members and Officers of the Council, shall be allowed to come within the bar during the sittings of the Council without the permission of the Warden or other Presiding Officer.

No standing rule or order of the Council shall be suspended, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

In all unprovided cases in the Proceedings of Council or in Committee, the Law of Parliament shall be followed, and in such cases the decision of the Warden or other Presiding Officer shall be final, and acquiesced in without debate.

Any Officer who shall refuse, or wilfully fail or neglect to perform any duty enjoined upon him by any By-law or resolution of the Council, or who shall in the discharge of his official duty, be guilty of any fraud, extortion, oppression, favoritism, partiality, or wilful wrong or injustice, shall be subject to removal from office.

Every By-law which has passed the Council shall, immediately after being signed by the Warden, and sealed with the seal of the Corporation, be deposited by the clerk for security in the safe connected with his office.

That no report of any Committee shall be amended except in Committee of the whole.

That all communications, petitions and reports laid before the Council be read by the Clerk and handed to the Warden, who shall ascertain the will of the Council respecting them.

ELECTION OF WARDEN.

The first meeting, in each year shall be at 2 o'clock, p. m., when the election of Warden shall be proceeded with in the manner following :

The members present shall nominate one or more of their members for the office of Warden ; every nomination which is seconded shall be voted on. The voting shall be by ballot, and shall be taken as follows :

The members shall appoint from among themselves two persons not being candidates, to act with the Clerk as scrutineers. The Clerk shall provide each member with a slip of paper ; each member will then write on one side of the slip the name of the candidate for whom he wishes to vote, and shall deposit the same in the ballot-box. If any candidate receives a majority of the votes cast, he shall be declared elected. If no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast at the first vote, the same course shall be pursued until one of the candidates receives such majority.

The Warden of the County while acting on any Committee to which he is especially appointed by resolution of the Council, shall receive the same allowance and mileage as are paid to the other members of said Committee.

The County Clerk shall have sole authority to purchase all office supplies and furniture required in the County offices, or for the offices of any officials for which the County is by law responsible.

BY-LAW NO. 481

TO FIX AMOUNT TO BE PAID TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOL INSPECTOR OF THE COUNTY
OF ELGIN FOR TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

Passed 5th June, 1891.

The County Council of the County of Elgin enacts:

That the Inspector of Public Schools in the County of Elgin be paid the sum of Two Hundred Dollars per annum, for travelling expenses.

That the County Treasurer be, and is hereby authorized to pay said amount quarterly, commencing on the first day of July, 1891.

BY-LAW NO. 511.

BE IT ENACTED by the County Council of the County of Elgin that the Treasurer of the County of Elgin be, and is hereby authorized to pay annually to the Treasurer of the Township of Bayham a sum equal to average cost of the maintenance of Inmates at the Elgin House of Industry, as shown by the Inspector's Annual Report.

That the first payment be made on the 15th day of November, 1893, of a proportionate amount to be calculated from the 9th day of June, 1893.

That the amount thus granted shall be applied by the Council of the Township of Bayham for the support of Charles Chivers, an indigent.

BY-LAW NO- 514

TO AUTHORIZE AND PROVIDE FOR THE APPOINTMENT, PAYMENT AND DUTIES OF THE INSPECTOR, KEEPER, MATRON AND PHYSICIAN, FOR THE SUPERINTENDENCE, CARE AND MANAGEMENT OF THE HOUSE OF INDUSTRY AND REFUGE OF THE COUNTY OF ELGIN, AND TO PRESCRIBE RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE GOVERNMENT THEREOF AND REPEAL BY LAWS NOS. 276, 280, 375, 380, 389, 448, 456, 484.

Passed November 17th, 1895.

WHEREAS it is enacted by Section 460 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1892, that the council of every county may acquire an estate in landed property for an Industrial Farm, and may establish a House of Industry and House of Refuge to provide by By-Law for the erection and repair thereof, and in like manner make Rules and Regulations (not repugnant to law) for the government of the same.

AND WHEREAS the County Council of the County of Elgin in the year 1875 established a House of Industry and Refuge in the said County and passed By-Law No. 276 to prescribe Rules and Regulations for the government of same.

AND WHEREAS said By-Law, No. 276 has been amended from time to time by By-Laws Nos. 280, 375, 380, 389, 448, 456 and 484.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable that these By-Laws should be repealed and consolidated in one general By-Law, with such alterations as may be necessary.

The County Council of the County of Elgin enacts under and by virtue of the authority hereinbefore recited :

That Kenneth W. McKay, County Clerk, is hereby appointed Inspector of the said House of Industry and Refuge at an annual salary of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars, and shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council.

That William Aldritt be and is hereby appointed Keeper of the said House of Industry and Refuge and shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council at an annual salary of three hundred and fifty dollars, with board and lodging in the said House at the expense of the Corporation.

That Catherine Aldritt be and is hereby appointed Matron of the said House of Industry and Refuge at a salary of two hundred dollars per annum, with board and lodging in the said House at the expense of the Corporation.

That Leonard Luton, a legally qualified medical practitioner, be and is hereby appointed Physician of the said House of Industry and Refuge, and shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council and shall be paid for his services an annual salary of two hundred dollars, including medicines.

STANDING COMMITTEE OF COUNCIL.

That a Committee of three members of the Council, to be called the Standing Committee on House of Industry, shall be appointed annually at the first session of each year, whose duty it shall be to oversee the management and examine into the state of all matters and things relating to the support and employment of the pauper inmates; to audit all accounts quarterly and report thereon half yearly to the County Council at its regular meeting in June and November; and shall also at the June session in each year present an estimate of the probable amount required for the ensuing year for the support and maintenance of the poor.

BILLS AND CLAIMS.

That all bills and claims against the Corporation for supplies furnished to the House of Industry and Industrial farm shall be duly certified as being correct by the Inspector or Keeper before being presented for audit, and on the same being examined and passed by said Committee the chairman shall be authorized to grant his order on the County Treasurer for the several amounts allowed to be paid by said Treasurer.

ADMISSION OF PAUPERS.

A Reeve or Deputy-Reeve of any municipality in the County, or Inspector as appointed aforesaid, may, by writing under their hands and seals, commit to the said House of Industry or of Refuge to be employed and governed according to the Rules and Regulations and orders of the House:

All poor and indigent persons who are incapable of supporting themselves and who belong to the County of Elgin, and the Keeper of the said House of Industry shall and is hereby authorized to receive such persons and no others. The commitment to the said House of Industry shall be in form set forth in Schedule "A."

EXPENSES OF SENDING TO HOUSE.

The expenses of sending all persons to the House of Industry shall be determined by the parties committing them, and in no case to exceed twenty cents per mile, expenses to be paid by the County.

 BINDING OUT CHILDREN TO SERVICE.

If it is desired by any person of good morals and repute to take any child from the House of Industry and Refuge as an apprentice to any lawful trade, profession or employment or to take one on trial for a short time ;

The inspector may, if satisfied of the character of the person making such application, give his consent thereto, and may cause application to be made to the Chairman of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace to have such child put and bound out as an apprentice, in conformity with the Act respecting apprenticing of minors.

Provision shall be made to have such child sent to school, and also, that at the expiration of the apprenticeship, he or she shall be furnished with an outfit of good and comfortable clothing.

A register shall be kept in the form of Schedule B of this By-law of all children bound out.

BURIAL GROUND.

That a suitable place on some part of the Industrial Farm, lying within the Township of Southwold, shall be selected for a burial ground for the burial of such of the pauper inmates as may die in the House of Industry and Refuge, and whose friends do not claim their bodies for interment. Said burial ground shall be fenced in and properly laid out in tiers or rows, and graves to be plainly numbered. A Burial Register shall be kept in the form of Schedule C to this By-law.

 OFFICERS DUTIES

DUTIES OF THE INSPECTOR.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector to see that the Rules and Regulations hereinafter provided are duly enforced ; he shall visit the House at least four times per month, hear any complaints that may be made, and report the same to the Standing Committee on House of Industry and Refuge at its meetings. He shall also, under instruction from the said Committee or the County Council, authorize the Keeper to procure all necessary help and supplies for the House and Farm, and certify all bills and claims for the same to the Board of Audit, the aforesaid Standing Committee.

The Inspector shall also in conformity with Section 461 of the Consolidated Municipal Act and in books to be provided at the expense of this Corporation, keep the following registers and accounts, that is to say :

A Register of the names of all paupers, vagrants, etc., admitted into the House in the form of Schedule D to this By-law.

A Burial Register, Schedule C.

A Register of children bound out to service, Schedule B.

The Inspector shall also make a yearly report to the County Council for the year ending the 31st October in each and every year, in the form provided in Schedule E of this By-Law, with an additional report upon any other matter or thing that he may consider of sufficient importance to bring to the notice of the Council. He shall also, on or before the 31st of October in every year, check an inventory of personal property belonging to the Institution and value the amount of produce on hand.

DUTIES OF KEEPER.

It shall be the duty of the Keeper to undertake the general superintendence of the House of Industry and Refuge and the Industrial Farm attached thereto, and, when not otherwise engaged, shall devote his time to tilling and cultivating said farm, securing and harvesting the crops, or at other manual labor, according to the requirements of the several seasons of the year, and in order to work such farm in a skilful and husbandlike manner. He shall give his attention and time for the benefit of the Institution, and shall carry into effect all the Rules and Regulations adopted from time to time by the County Council for the government and management of said House.

He shall also furnish the Inspector with a list of all the provisions required, which are to be provided by him, and it shall be his duty to see that the provisions furnished to the inmates are of good quality and sufficient in quantity and such as the Committee may approve of, and he shall not allow any waste thereof, and shall not permit the use of intoxicating drinks by any of the inmates, and all work done on the premises to be done as directed by the Inspector or Committee of Management. The Keeper shall take charge of all raw material for manufacture and working tools provided by the Inspector for the full employment of such of the inmates as are able to work and direct and superintend their work and labor under direction of the Inspector.

He shall also keep fair and regular accounts in writing of all materials, provisions, fuel, clothing and other necessaries provided for the use of the Institution, and of all expenses and charges attending the maintenance and support of the poor, and of all monies received by him from the sale of the products of their labor or otherwise on the premises, and shall submit the said lists and accounts to the Inspector and Standing Committee on House of Industry and Refuge at the meetings of said Committee.

He shall also keep a Wearing Apparel Book and therein keep a correct and particular account of each and every article issued to the inmates, and shall keep a complete inventory of all personal property in and about the place, and assist the Inspector in checking the same for the purposes of the annual report, and also assist in the valuing of provisions, produce, etc., on hand.

He shall also keep a Visitors' Book, in which parties visiting the Institution shall enter their names, with any remarks they may see fit to make of a proper nature.

He shall also examine all paupers on their admission into the House, note such facts in regard to them as are important to be preserved, shall cause them to be thoroughly cleansed and suitably located, having reference to their age, sex and general character, shall be especially careful that the infirm inmates and children are treated with considerate care and kindness, and shall see that proper attention is given to the sick.

He shall also see that every department and all furniture and utensils are kept neat, clean and in order, and that all provisions, fuel and every other article consumed in and about the premises, are used with the strictest economy.

He and the Matron, or their assistants detailed for the purpose, shall also visit each and every occupied room after the ringing of the retiring bell, and shall see that the inmates have all retired, excepting those on duty, and shall see that all the fires are made secure and safe and that all lights are extinguished, save and excepting only where fire and lights are permitted to be kept for the benefit of the sick.

He may also, for violation of any of the rules for disobedience or bad conduct by any of the inmates, inflict suitable punishment at his discretion (but employ no improper means) by confinement or otherwise; but in case of solitary confinement not for a longer period than twenty-four hours, unless by the direction of the Inspector; and he shall not absent himself from the Institution at any time without the consent of the Inspector.

In case of the death of any inmate, for the disposition of whose body no provision was made at the time of commitment, or whose body is not claimed by friends, that the Keeper be required to report the death to the Reeve of the municipality from which the inmate was committed, with a view to having the body claimed for burial instead of being sent to the Inspector of Anatomy as required by the Anatomy Act.

DUTIES OF THE MATRON.

It shall be the duty of the Matron to take charge and oversight of all the in-door operations; shall see that all the female inmates are provided for according to their respective wants; that cleanliness, both in their persons and apartments, and that good order and decorum be observed at all times.

She shall be careful of all the goods, property and furniture committed to her charge, that the same be not lost or embezzled; she shall direct the detailing of the women under her charge to such branches of labor as in her judgement they are best fitted to perform.

She shall at proper and stated times have all the clothing of the inmates and the bed-clothes changed and replaced with clean apparel; and shall be vigilant over every part of the house in regard to cleanliness, and shall see that the female inmates observe all the rules that may be prescribed for ablution.

DUTIES OF THE PHYSICIAN

It shall be the duty of the physician to undertake the sanitary supervision of the said Houses and to attend all cases of sickness that may occur.

He shall also, in a book to be furnished to him for that purpose, note all cases treated by him, and in case of death to certify therein the cause; and shall also report in such book all the births in said House.

He shall also, when called upon by the Keeper, examine any of the pauper inmates feeling illness, or otherwise as to their ability to work. He shall visit the House at least once a week.

RULES FOR THE INMATES.

I.

At the ringing of the morning bell every inmate in the house (the sick and those in confinement excepted), must rise, dress, wash and be in readiness to proceed to work.

II.

The bell will ring ten minutes before each meal, when all will leave their work and be in readiness, with clean hands and faces, for the ringing of the second bell, when they will repair to the dining rooms and take such seats at the table as are assigned to them by those in charge, where they must observe silence, decency and good order.

III.

At the ringing of the slow bell, after meals, every inmate shall immediately repair to work.

IV.

No inmates shall be allowed to loiter about the kitchen, nor shall any provisions or food (excepting at regular meals) be carried to any part of the house without the consent of the Keeper; nor shall any cooking be done except in the kitchen.

V.

At nine o'clock in the evening, at the ringing of the retiring bell, the inmates must secure the fires, put out the lights, and retire to bed in their respective apartments.

VI.

No inmate shall be allowed to trade or exchange clothing, or any other thing, with any person whomsoever, or beg of those who visit there; nor shall they receive any money or other article from any one, without the consent of the Keeper.

VII.

All persons shall diligently and faithfully perform the duty or task allotted to them by the Keeper, unless otherwise excused.

VIII.

Any person guilty of drunkenness, disobedience, immorality, obscenity, disorderly conduct, profane or indecorous language, theft, waste, or who shall absent himself or herself from the premises without the permission of the keeper, or who shall be guilty of injuring or defacing any part of the house or furniture therein, or who shall commit waste of any kind shall be punished as the case may seem to demand.

IX.

In all cases of solitary confinement, the prisoners shall be debarred from seeing or conversing with any person except the Inspector, the Keeper, or the person employed to supply their wants, and the food of such prisoners shall consist solely of bread and water, unless otherwise ordered by the Inspector or Physician.

X.

Any person who shall have communication, either directly or indirectly, with any one thus confined, without permission, shall be subject to punishment by a like confinement.

XI.

No one shall go beyond the limits of the Industrial Farm, unless by the permission of the Keeper, nor remain out beyond the time specified by the Keeper.

XII.

The Sabbath Day shall be strictly observed, and no irreligious diversion, or unnecessary labor be indulged in. At the ringing of the bell for the purpose of assembling for religious instruction and worship, every person (unless excused by the keeper) shall appear dressed in clean apparel in the instructing room, and shall behave with decency and sobriety. No noise or disturbance shall be made in any part of the house during such exercises.

XIII.

All persons wilfully absenting themselves from the place of meeting, or violating the Sabbath Day, shall be subject to prompt and severe punishment.

XIV.

Every person previous to admission as an inmate of the house, shall be subjected to examination and search by the Keeper or one of his assistants.

XV.

No visitor shall have admission to the house on the Sabbath without the written permission of the Inspector, or by the consent of the Keeper upon good cause shown.

XVI.

All persons aggrieved may refer their complaints to the Inspector when he is visiting the house.

OFFENCES AGAINST THIS BY-LAW.

That any person or persons who shall commit any infringement or breach of any one of the provisions, requirements, enactments, sections or clauses of this By-Law, or any offence against this By-Law, or any such person or persons neglecting or refusing to obey and perform any of the reasonable orders of the Inspector, Keeper or Physician, given in the execution of the duties of their respective offices aforesaid, he, she or they shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Five Dollars, exclusive of costs, and not less than Fifty Cents, exclusive of costs, and in case of non-payment of such fine to be inflicted for any such breach or offence, and there being no distress found out of which such fine can be levied, such person or persons so offending as aforesaid against this By-Law shall be imprisoned, with or without hard labor, in the jail of the County of Elgin, for any period not exceeding twenty days, and upon an information laid or complaint made before any one or more of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace of the County of Elgin, that any person or persons has or have committed or are suspected to have committed any such breach of this By-Law, such Justice or Justices may proceed thereupon and hear and determine the matter of such information or complaint, and such person or persons so offending against this By-Law upon conviction before such Justice or Justices, shall forfeit and pay such fine as may to him or them seem meet, not exceeding Five Dollars, exclusive of costs, and not less than Fifty Cents, exclusive of costs, as aforesaid, (together with costs if ordered), such fine to be paid to the Treasurer of the said County and to form part of the funds of the said Corporation of the County of Elgin, and in the event of the non-payment of the fine imposed by such Justice or Justices, together with the costs, if ordered, either immediately or within such period as such Justice or Justices at the time of conviction, appoints thereupon such Justice or Justices may issue his or their warrant of distress for the purpose of levying the same out of the goods and chattels of the person or persons so offending, and if there be no distress found out of which such fine can be levied, then such Justice or Justices may adjudge the offender to be imprisoned in the Gaol of the said County, there to be kept with or without hard labor, for any space not exceeding twenty days, unless such fine and costs and charges thereupon shall be sooner paid.

BY-LAW NO. 525

TO DETERMINE WHAT BRIDGES THE COUNTY OF ELGIN WILL MAINTAIN.

Passed 7th June, 1894.

WHEREAS the County Council of the County of Elgin at various times by resolution, assumed control and exclusive jurisdiction over certain bridges lying wholly within or on the boundary line between municipalities composing the said County.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable that said Bridges, as well as all other Bridges over which the County Council has exclusive Jurisdiction, should be assumed by By-Law, and that the County Council should determine what bridges they have exclusive Jurisdiction over.

The Municipal Corporation of the County of Elgin enacts :

I.—That the County Council hereby assume and have exclusive Jurisdiction over the following County Line Bridges :

- (1) Bothwell Bridge, over River Thames.
- (2) Wardsville Bridge, over River Thames.
- (3) Graham Bridge, over River Thames.

- (4) Coyne Road Bridge, over River Thames.
- (5) McIntosh Bridge, over River Thames.
- (6) Eden Bridge, between Bayham and Middleton, over the Little Otter.
- (7) Otter Creek Bridge, between Bayham and Middleton, over Otter Creek.
- (8) Catfish Bridge, between Malahide and Dereham, over Catfish Creek.
- (9) Bridge east of Belmont, between North and South Dorchester.
- (10) Belmont Bridge, between South Dorchester and Westminster.
- (11) Bridge west of Belmont, between Yarmouth and Westminster.
- (12) Kains Bridge, over Kettle Creek, between City and County.
- (13) Fingal Bridge, over Kettle Creek, between City and County.
- (14) St. George Street Bridge, over Kettle Creek, between City and County.

II.—That the County Council hereby assume and have exclusive Jurisdiction over the following Township Line Bridges :

- (15) Orwell Bridge, between Malahide and Yarmouth, over Catfish Creek.
- (16) Kingsmill Bridge, between Malahide and Yarmouth, over Catfish Creek.
- (17) Bridge over branch Catfish Creek, between Malahide and South Dorchester.
- (18) Talbot Creek Bridge, between Dunwich and Southwold.

III.—That the County Council assume and have exclusive Jurisdiction over the following Bridges in Villages and Townships.

- (19) Port Stanley Bridge assumed under authority of Act by By-Law No. 260, January 1875, ordering repairs etc.
- (20) Shelburne Bridge, in Port Stanley, assumed by resolution 8th June, 1883.
- (21) Red Bridge, in Vienna, assumed by resolution 8th June, 1883.
- (22) Robbins Bridge, in Southwold, assumed by resolution 22nd November 1883.
- (23) Jamestown Bridge, in Yarmouth, assumed by resolution 22nd November, 1883.

(24) White Bridge, in Vienna, assumed under authority of opinion of County Solicitor, and reported by County Engineer, November, 1884.

(25) Dodd's Bridge, in Southwold, assumed by reports Public Improvements Committee, 1884.

(26) Port Bruce Bridge in Malahide, assumed by reports Public Improvements Committee, 1884.

(27) Gillett Bridge, in Yarmouth, assumed by reports Public Improvements Committee, 1884.

BY-LAW NO. 531

TO FIX THE EXPENSES OF THE ENQUIRIES DIRECTED TO BE MADE UNDER THE ACT RESPECTING LUNATIC ASYLUMS AND THE CUSTODY OF INSANE PERSONS.

Passed June 8th, 1894.

WHEREAS, by Section Thirty-seven, Chapter Two Hundred and Forty-five, Revised Statutes of Ontario, being an Act respecting Lunatic Asylums and the custody of Insane persons,

IT IS ENACTED that the expenses of the enquiries directed by this Act to be made, and of conveying any insane person from any Gaol to an Asylum for the

Insane, shall be paid by the County, City, or Separate Town in which the insane person has been apprehended.

AND WHEREAS, it is desirable to fix the amount of expenses to be paid by the County,

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the County Council of the County of Elgin, that the following Schedule Tariff of fees be allowed by the County in reference to the examination of Lunatics:

BY LAW NO. 541

TO IMPOSE A FEE OF ONE DOLLAR PER MONTH ON ALL COUNTY PUPILS ATTENDING HIGH SCHOOLS AND COLLEGIATE INSTITUTES IN THE COUNTY OF ELGIN AND CITY OF ST. THOMAS, FOR A PERIOD OF THREE YEARS.

Passed 7th June, 1895.

WHEREAS, by section 37 of the High Schools Act of 1891, sub-section 1, it is provided that County pupils shall pay to the Treasurer of the High School Board such fees as the Municipal Council of the County may deem expedient, provided always such fees shall be uniform and shall not exceed One Dollar per month. The scale of fees so fixed shall take effect from the beginning of the High School term next ensuing after adoption thereof by the County Council, and shall continue in force for three years.

The County Council of the the County of Elgin therefore enacts :

That a fee of One Dollar per month shall be paid by all County Pupils attending the High Schools and Collegiate Institutes in the County of Elgin and City of St. Thomas from the beginning of the High School term next ensuing, after the passing of this By-Law.

It is further enacted that this By-Law shall continue in force three years.

BY LAW NO. 545

FOR REGULATING THE AMOUNT TO BE PAID BY AUCTIONEERS FOR A LICENSE TO SELL GOODS, WARES AND MERCHANDISE IN THE COUNTY OF ELGIN.

WHEREAS by Section Four Hundred and Ninety-five, Sub-section Two of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1892, it is enacted :

That the Council of any County, City or Town separated from the County for Municipal purposes, may pass By-Laws for licensing, regulating and governing auctioneers and other persons selling or putting up for sale goods, wares, merchandise, or effects by public auction, and for fixing the sum to be paid for every such license and the time it shall be in force.

The County Council of the County of Elgin therefore enacts :

That from and after the passing of this By-Law, it shall not be lawful for any Auctioneer or other person to sell or put up for sale in the said County of Elgin, any goods, wares, merchandise or effects by public auction, without having first obtained a license to be issued in the manner hereinafter provided.

2. That the Clerk of the said Council is hereby authorized to issue such License to applicants under the seal of the County Council of the County of Elgin, upon payment of the sum of Twelve Dollars, and every such license shall be in force for one year from the date of issue.

3. That no Auctioneer's license shall be transferable, nor shall any person, except the person named in the license, sell, or put up for sale, any goods, wares, merchandise or effects by public auction thereunder.

4. That any person violating the provisions of this By-law shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars nor less than twelve dollars and costs, and if not paid forthwith shall be levied by distress and sale of goods and chattels of the offender. And in case of non-payment or no distress to be found of which such fines can be levied, the person or persons so offending, may be imprisoned with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding twenty-one days pursuant to the provisions of said Act.

BY LAW NO. 546.

TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT OR REWARD FOR APPREHENSION OF THIEVES STEALING HORSES IN THE COUNTY OF ELGIN.

WHEREAS, by Section 494, Consolidated Municipal Act of 1892, it is enacted: That the Council of every County or City shall provide by By-law, that a sum not less than Twenty Dollars shall be payable as a reward to any person or persons who shall pursue and apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, any person or persons guilty of stealing any horse or mare within the said County or City, and such reward shall be paid out of the funds of the Corporation on the conviction of the thief, on the order of the Judge before whom the conviction is obtained.

The County Council of the County of Elgin therefore enacts: That a sum of Twenty Dollars shall be paid as a reward to any person or persons who shall pursue and apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, any person or persons guilty of stealing any horse or mare within the said County of Elgin, and that such reward

shall be paid out of the funds of the Corporation on the conviction of the thief, on the order of the Judge before whom the conviction is obtained.

BY LAW NO. 548

TO FIX THE SALARIES OF THE GAOLER, MATRON AND TURNKEYS OF THE ELGIN COUNTY GAOL.

BY-LAW NO. 561.

TO LICENSE, REGULATE AND GOVERN HAWKERS, PETTY CHAPMEN AND OTHERS—
PASSED 20TH NOVEMBER, 1896.

The Municipal Council of the County of Elgin enacts as follows :

First—From and after the passing of this By-Law, it shall not be lawful for any Hawker, Pedlar or Petty Chapman, and other persons carrying on petty trades, or who go from place to place or to other men's houses on foot, or with any animal bearing, or drawing any goods, wares or merchandise for sale, or in or with any boat, vessel or other craft, or otherwise carrying goods, wares or merchandise for sale, to carry on any of the said trades, occupations, callings or business within any part of the County of Elgin, unless and until he shall have procured a license as hereinafter provided, and any person so licensed shall be subject to the provisions of this By-Law. Provided always that no such license shall be required for Hawking, Peddling or Selling from any vehicle or other conveyance, any goods, wares or merchandise to any retail dealer, or for hawking or peddling dry goods, wares and merchandise, the growth, produce or manufacture of this Province, not being

liquors within the meaning of the law relating to taverns or tavern licenses, if the same are being hawked or peddled by the manufacturer or producer of such goods, wares or merchandise, or by his bona fide servants or employees, having written authority in that behalf, and such servant or employee shall produce and exhibit his written authority when required to do so by any Municipal or Peace Officer.

Second—The word "Hawbers" in this sub-section, shall include all persons who, being agents for persons not resident within the County, sell or offer for sale, tea, dry goods, watches, plated ware, silverware, furniture, carpets, upholstery, millinery, or carry and expose samples or patterns of any of such goods to be afterwards delivered within the County to any person not being wholesale or retail dealer in such goods, wares or merchandise.

Third—The Clerk of this Council for the time being is hereby authorized to issue licenses under this By-Law with the corporate seal of the Council attached thereto, and deliver the same to persons applying therefor upon payment of the following fee : To travel on foot, the sum of ten dollars ; to travel with one horse or other animal, thirty dollars, and for every additional horse or other animal, ten dollars ; to sail or travel with any boat, vessel or other craft, seventy-five dollars. Each license shall be in force for one year from the date of issue and no longer.

Fourth—Every hawker, petty chapman, or other person aforesaid, carrying on any such trade, occupation, calling or business within the said County of Elgin, for which a license is required under this By-Law, shall, upon demand by such Municipal or Peace Officer, forthwith exhibit his licence to such officer.

Fifth—Any person contravening any of the provisions of this By-Law, shall, for such offence, on conviction before one or more Justices of the Peace for the County of Elgin, forfeit and pay a fine of not less than ten dollars, and not more than fifty dollars, in the discretion of the Justice or Justices, together with the costs, and if not paid forthwith, the same shall be levied by distress, and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender, and in case of there being no distress out of which the penalty can be levied the Justice may commit the offender to the common jail of the said County of Elgin for any time not exceeding twenty-one days, unless such fine and costs, including the costs of the committal shall be sooner paid.

Sixth—That By-Law No. 544 be, and is hereby repealed.
