

ANNUAL MEETING JAN'Y 26TH, 1876.

The Committee of the Canada Sunday School Union, are glad to have the opportunity once more of presenting to the public a statement of their affairs, and a record of their proceedings for the past year. It is a conviction founded on a wide range of observation that the cause of Religious Education cannot be brought too prominently before the attention of christian people; and especially is this so, in an age and country in which the chief energies are being most seriously absorbed in an effort to acquire the material comforts and embellishments of life. In so far as a higher secular education is felt to be needful for the attainment of the amplest development of our modern civilization, considered in its material aspects, we cannot but rejoice; although it must always appear to a well balanced mind rather degrading to our nature if education be cared for only for what wealth and luxury it may be the means of procuring for a community. Taking, as we do, the position that the mind of man is his true, immortal self, capable of a harmonious development never yet realized, and carrying in that development a distinction and blessing above all price, we would prefer to see a greater zeal for ordinary education for its own sake, as the condition of human intellectual progress. And being assured as we are, from the teaching of Scripture as also from the records of history, that the religious element is for time and eternity the conserver and perfecter of all else in education, we come before our friends and all

who care for the best interests of mankind, with the cheerful confidence inspired by a cause at once most holy and beneficent.

This union was originally formed on a basis comprehensive of all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity, and were prepared to keep in abeyance their personal preferences for forms of church polity in order to render, by concerted counsel and action, the work of Sabbath School instruction more efficient and more adequate in its range to the wants of the country. For 39 years it has pursued its useful course; and now thanks are due to God for the abundant success wherewith He has been pleased to crown its labours. So far as we are aware this is the only Catholic Institution in this part of the Dominion that seeks directly and solely the instruction of our English speaking youth, and incidentally the French, in the fundamental truths of the Gospel; and, therefore, with all due modesty and respect to the judgment of others, it may be said to have a claim on the sympathy and co-operation of all who hold truth to be higher than party and brotherly affection stronger than sectional leanings.

During the past year the general operations of the Union have been more limited than usual. A course of exposition of the lessons of the International series was carried through to the Spring by the Rev. Canon Baldwin, whose services were highly appreciated and to whom the Committee tender hearty thanks. A similar course in concert with the Young Mens Christian Association was promoted presided over by various Ministers of the city. The deepened interest shown by the schools of the city in arranging their own means and methods of studying the lessons has rendered the action of the Union, in this respect, less necessary—a result of the stimulus given to Sunday School work in former years over which we may do well to rejoice. In the month of May the Committee deputed the Rev. G. H. Wells, and the Corresponding Secretary to attend the great International Convention of Sunday Schools at Baltimore; and on their return, a statement was made of the proceedings and results of that Convention at a meeting called for that purpose. It having been thought desirable to maintain fraternal relationship with all the schools in the country that have either been originated or fostered by the Union, the Secretary was directed to draw up a Circular to be sent to the Superintendents and Teachers expressive of interest in their work and suggestive of a few practical matters connected with their progress.

At our Anniversary Meetings, the Committee have always given prominence to the department of their enterprise which relates to the formation and maintenance of Sunday Schools in the rural districts, and on the present occasion the necessity of doing that seems to be as pressing as ever. It is an occasion of thankfulness that the pastors and members of most of the settled churches of the country, are becoming increasingly alive to the importance of the Sabbath School, and are doing good service in seeking to render their own Schools more and more efficient. When we consider that during the last thirty years many of these schools were founded by the action of the Union and have since been fostered by occasional visits, and a supply of the most useful teaching material, we can afford to rejoice in any measure of independence of action, inasmuch as that is the aim of our endeavour. At the same time it is earnestly hoped that those who have, in process of time, become strong and influential will see the propriety of combining with us in carrying on the work into regions where, as yet, the benefits of church ordinances are not regularly enjoyed.

services of its valued agent the Rev. J. McKillican, who from month to month has furnished detailed reports of districts visited, schools organized, and school materials disposed of. It is difficult for many who live in this city, or in well established towns, to realize the extreme disadvantages in matters pertaining to school and worship of those resident in the remote settlements of our land: nor ought we to overlook the stimulus from without that is requisite to keep up in efficiency schools cut off from the direct oversight of resident pastors and the fostering care of strong churches. Every one interested in education knows how much depends on teachers being provided with the books, expositions, maps and periodicals best adapted to the work they have in hand: yet it would perplex the wisest philosopher to say how these things would be put cheaply within the reach of our back-woodsmen, were it not for the persistent

him a supply of the choicest Sunday School books. There may be a few inclined to let these settlers care for themselves and their children. But we have not so learned Christ. If Canada of the future is to be good and great we must look after the children; or if cities are to be invigorated with fresh healthy moral life from the country, we must make that life pure by the truths of the Gospel. And if Christ has compassion on all the bleating lambs of the forest we may not claim the honour of bearing His name if we refuse to do His deeds.

During the season of passable roads, Mr. McKillican, has laboured in and back of the county of Lanark, on the line of the Madawaska River, and in the Maritime Provinces. During these visits he was the means of accomplishing the following results.

Schools organized 46, embracing 211 Teachers, 1469 Scholars.

Besides this Mr. McKillican, collected for the Union in the country, \$420.55 and in the city, \$170.75.

It would occupy too much space to quote in detail from his report of particular visits. As instances the following may suffice.

"March 15th, Drove nine miles in heavy rain, meeting with "children, and in the evening had a full meeting of parents and "youths in an old settlement destitute of a Sunday School for many "vears, and succeeded in organizing one." Speaking of his work in the Maritime Provinces he says. "Nineteen places on the Canada "Side of the Bay and Restigouche were visited, and a successful "effort made in each. Ten points on the South Side of the River "were visited, and six schools organized, one of them being attended "by equal numbers from both sides, Quebec and New Brunswick. "Thousands of tracts and second hand papers were circulated "wherever we went, and were most gratefully received by the people. "In no previous year has the Canada Sunday School Union Deposi-"tory been of such important service as during the summer in "supplying the various elementary books and other requisites in "Sunday School work." One quotation from the Fall tour on the line of the Madawaska River shall complete this interesting account. "Oct. 26th, Drove nine miles to another settlement further into the "woods. A woman had been doing all she could towards a Sabbath "School, but without books, help or sympathy failed; and there was "no preaching within twenty miles. After some effort a school was "set in order."

A word or two should be said on the subject of spiritual destitution and absence of means of Sabbath School instruction. As already intimated it is sometimes hard for persons living in cities to believe such a thing to be true of Canada. But a few statements may suffice to set that question at rest. If our forests are being cleared and new settlements are in process of formation out of the beat of traffic, then, of course there must be destitution and lack of School accommodation, for though lumberers and farmers find some good things in the woods they do not meet with Churches and Schools.

The strain of the Missionary Societies of all Denominations is continually to provide help for the needy in new and neglected old settlements. Your own Agent gives monthly detailed facts which are as actual as that the sun shines by day. A valued correspondent who has twelve years practical knowledge of the back settlements and has travelled with your agent to assist him says "I have seen enough both of ignorance and destitution, and also of good fruit from seed sown in Sabbath Schools, to prove that the half has not been told on the subject." Another correspondent says, "It is a great privilege to have the schools organized on the new system of teaching; for it cannot be expected that those localities which have been so long left out in the cold can be posted in the new mode of teaching, like those who are settled in towns and other thickly settled parts of the Province." A Magistrate acquainted with Mr. McKillican's work in remarking upon the doubts which had been cast upon the fact of the destitution of some parts of the country gave his testimony in the striking words "here are over sixty miles with a large Protestant population without a settled Minister." Nor aught we to pass by the valuable testmony of Mr. Peter Drummond, of Perth who last year went, at his own expense, with Mr. McKillican through a district of country which in his own private report was described in terms enough to move the heart of every true Christian, and who this summer abstained from visiting England expressly that he might assist, at his own cost, in visiting a district in the Maritime Provinces where for 60 miles there were hundreds of settlers without one Sabbath School. Honour and thanks to Mr. Drummond.

Some of Mr. McKillican's statements in his report deserve the earnest consideration of all candid men, as they are based on a special knowledge obtained by personal visits in neglected districts where ministers and laymen, engaged in ordinary denominational work seldom or never go. He says, "In one of the oldest settlements "situated from five to seven miles from any church, the Sabbath is "desecrated, the worship of God is neglected, and I was told that "there was not a 'praying man' in it, but profanity was most common and the women are as much given to it as the men. In "another place settled seventy years ago, after the Sabbath School "had been organized an old man stood up in the crowded School "House on the Sabbath and said, 'I was born here and my children "and grand-children were born here, this is the first time I or they "have had the privilege of being in a Sabbath School."

The reason for the absence of schools in some places within a few miles of churches is, thus given. "The Ministers who visit such "fields have all the work they can do. The men are indisposed to open a School of their own denomination when aware that others are equally numerous. They often delay attempting a Union effort, though fully admitting that it only will work, till an agent of the "Union appears on the ground."

With respect to action in places where denominational Schools have been allowed to die out he says. "The Agents of the "Union have never been instructed how long they are to wait before organizing a School. Our business when asked by a unani-"mous vote to reorganize is to do so, leaving with the people by vote to make it denominational or otherwise, and I defy any man to "say that any other course has ever been pursued by the Agents of "the Union." In some small places where extreme denominationalsm has created several Sects and weakened all, the people have wished the newly organized School to be "Union," declaring 'we have tried a Denominational School and cannot succeed, let us have Union and be strong.'

Before passing from the account of Mr. McKillican's labours, in organizing schools, and in occasional collecting for the Union in

towns and cities accessible by Rail, the Committee desire to express their thanks to the many kind friends who have shown him hospitality and in various ways promoted his work. They at least will have the gratification of reflecting on having been permitted to aid in a cause which means knowledge, peace, happiness, salvation to many, and many a soul.

With respect to the Depository the Committee have to report that the Sales of books during the year and the issues of papers and libraries for Schools have been exceedingly satisfactory as to numbers. The figures will be found in the full Report.

In connexion with their subject we would remind all our Sunday School friends that every effort is made to keep on hand the choicest books and papers suited for young people and School Libraries.

It is the duty of the Committee to inform the public that a change is about to be made in the management of the Depository. After eight years of diligent and faithful labour Mr. Muir, has resigned his position which will take effect in a little while, and we would here take the opportunity of expressing our sense of his ever careful conduct and kindly christian bearing, and we cherish the hope that he may be greatly blessed in the holy calling to which he is about to devote the residue of his life.

For the future the management of the Depository will be in the hands of Mr. Stacey, who is coming to us from the Kingston Tract and Bible Depot with commendations worthy of respect.

The financial position of the Union is its weakest point. The Treasurer's Report here appended shows a serious deficit. This unsatisfactory fact may be ascribed in part to the depression of the times, and in part to imperfect methods of city collection, and in part to insufficient interest in our work. Considering the wide sphere of our operations and the amazing good done in the rural districts by our agency, the business and missionary part of our enterprise are conducted on most economical principles. It is urgently desired that with deepened interest there may be a more steady and spontaneous flow of money towards our Treasury.

The record of one years labour and the demand for another years exertion are thus placed before you. It remains to be seen what prompt and generous response there will be to a claim so commanding. No words can adequately express the conviction entertained, by some who strive to carry on the holy work of this Union, of the pressing need there is of continuous, unremitting attention to the religious wants of the occupants of our forest houses, and the hardy children of our scattered hamlets. It seems indeed to be unlawfully luxurious for us to revel in our highly organized schools, our welldisciplined teachers and our varied libraries, to say nothing of the festivals and rewards some of our scholars share in, while all the time there are many men and women in the out-lying settlements unskilled in school organization, borne down on the Sabbath by excessive toils of the week, and children left to roam in idleness on the Lord's day, because there are no means of healthy mental occupation and systematic religious teaching. These have a claim on our sympathy, and on the benefits of the experience we have acquired in our elaborated Sunday School system. And in conclusion it is once more respectfully and earnestly urged that every parent and every teacher, and every child make this broad Catholic Society a subject of deeper thoughtfulness and more generous support, both on account of the tone of elevation it seeks to give to the Sunday School enterprise in general, and the comfort and blessing it is the means of conveying to many a poor child, and hard-toiling parent under the shadows of our great forests, and in the comparative solitudes of our pastorless hamlets.
