The present mixed condition of politics in the province affords ample grounds for the formation of individual opinion and the determination of personal action. It is apparent that all attempts to draw close party lines must prove ineffectual.

In appointing their delegates to the provincial convention to be held in Vancouver on the 5th of April, the Rossland Liberal Association we consider, acted very unwisely, on Thursday night, in not including Hon. Smith Curtis among the number.

It would be well for the Conservative association to remember this in nominating their candidate at their approaching convention. They have within their ranks in this riding some men who possess the confidence and respect of the community generally—men whom the strongest Liberals acknowledge would make excellent representatives.

The feeling throughout the constituency is strong that the next member shall not only be a thoroughly capable man, but that he shall not be dominated by any one section of the community; that he shall neither lend himself to furthering the interest of the mine owner to the disadvantage of the operative, or be guilty of attempting to excite the passions and capture the votes of the working miners by making promises which he cannot and does not intend to fulfill.
