In selecting varieties of veg-etables for the garden it is well in many instances to make use of both early and late kinds. On of both early and late kinds. On account of our short seasons only the earliest varieties of corn, tomatoes, celery and onions (from seed) are likely to come to maturity or to give their maximum yields. With some other vegetables, such as caphage carrofs, beets, and cession and lengthens the season during which these vegestables may be had fresh from searly varieties at different date but the later varieties of some vegetables, such as peas, pole beans and beets are of better quality than the early varieties are early varieties.
