The wheat area in Manitoba is only 5 per cent. less than it was last year and only 10 or 15 per cent. in the other Western provinces. Given favorable weather, the crop for this year ought to be at least a good average.

Acadia's Anniversary

The exercises attending the celebration of Acadia's 78th anniversary this week, while not so largely attended as usual, have been of an interesting character. Good weather has prevailed and a great many of the friends of the institutions have taken advantage of the occasion to pay a visit to Wolfville. Owing to the lateness of the season there was an absence of the customary apple-blossoms, but the general beauty of Wolfville and its surroundings received unstinted admiration.

The baccalaureate sermon was preached on Sunday morning by Rev. Dr. Cutten, president of the University. He was in khaki as captain of "D" company, 219 O. S. Battalion, and fittingly chose for his topic a militant theme, namely, "Fighting for the Truth," taking his text from the Gospel of St. John ch. 8 vs. 31—"He shall know the truth and he shall make you free."

The formal services began with music, the 8th band, under the direction of Lieut. Dan Mooney, playing with fine tone and expressive phrasing emotionally appropriate excerpts from the Greek epics, and the choir, under the direction of Miss Minnie C. Newey, singing sweetly Handel's setting to "Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty." The invocation was offered by Rev. Mr. Colpitta. The hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers" led by the band, followed. The Scripture readings were taken by Rev. Mr. Hartness and prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Goucher. During the offertory the band played a series of sacred selections for full orchestra and the choir sang an anthem, "I waited for the Lord." Prior to the sermon the audience, led by the band, sang "Fight the good Fight."

The Sunday morning exercises were followed by an invocation of the most appealing character, namely, a Vesper Service by the Seminary choir and soloists under the direction of Miss Minnie C. Newey, with Mrs. J. D. Clark as accompanist. The service was composed of Songs, Choruses, Trios, and selections from hymns. The solo by Miss Jean McKie, the Trio by Misses Gross, Prescott and DeWolfe, and the Solo and Chorus by the Seminary Choir were the features of the program and were highly appealing. In the evening Rev. A. P. Newcomb, M. A. (Acadia '98) pastor of Brunswick street church, Fredericton, N. B., addressed the students and faculties. Mr. Newcomb's theme was "The knowledge which is life." The preacher based his reflections on a sentence from Christ's intercessory prayer contained in John's Gospel, Chapter 17, Verse 3, "and this is the eternal, that they should know Thee the only true God, and Him whom Thou hast sent, even Jesus Christ."

The closing exercises of Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy were held on Monday evening in College Hall, and, as in past years, a large audience of students and visitors was present to witness the function. Dr. W. L. Archibald, principal of the Academy, remarked the successful year the Academy had experienced, despite the untoward war conditions. There was a total gross enrollment of 164 students, 13 of whom were attending in two courses leaving a net enrollment of 154 students in the collegiate and business departments for the year 1915-16.

At the exercises forty-three diplomas and certificates were presented, four members of the senior class receiving the full matriculation diploma, two of whom qualified for the matriculation in Arts and Engineering. Nine other members of the senior class received certificates for as many subjects of the course as they had satisfactorily completed. In the business department five young men received commercial diplomas, eight students received diplomas for the course in stenography and typewriting, and fourteen others received certificates for the various subjects of the course which they had completed.

Tuesday morning in College Hall the graduating class in arts and science held their class day exercises. The opening address was made by the class president, Ralph S. Gregg. A vocal solo was sung by Lieut. Frederick C. Manning, and a piano solo was played by Charlotte H. Layton. The class history was read by Bernard G. Wood. The class prophecy, by Lillian Alice Chase, the valedictory was delivered by Ora Blossom Elliott. Four of the class were in Khaki.

The university feature was the closing exercises of Acadia Seminary. The institution had a very successful year, with a total registration of 339 students. Twenty-two young ladies received diplomas. The graduating exercises were held in College Hall and had a notable feature in the production of a cantata, "King Rene's Daughter," sung and acted by the Seminary Glee Club and Soloists, the principal characters being taken by Misses Jean Mackie, Edith Gross, Gilbert, and Kathleen Prescott. The rest of the exercises consisted of piano solos by Jennie Edith Tozer and Winifred Burbridge Clark, and of essays composed and read by Lena Alberta Keane and Marguerite A. Woodworth.

The convocation exercises were held in College Hall on Wednesday morning with a large audience present. The programme was as follows: Processional, Prayer, Address by members of the Graduating Class, Public Opinion—Ruth Isabella Clark, Canadian Loyalty—Gertrude Ethel Eston, The War and After—Frederick Chas.

What Price do You Pay For Tea?

Conditions in the tea markets of the world have changed considerably since the war. On account of Russia prohibiting the sale of Vodka and France putting the ban on Absolut, these countries have become larger consumers of tea. If anyone has not been enjoying their tea lately they will no doubt find that they have not been getting the same grade or label, consequently it has not tasted so good. The flavor wasn't so full or so rich. But tea at 50, 60 and 70 cents a pound is not dear. In fact, it is the cheapest hot drink obtainable when we consider the great number of cups a pound of tea will make. At 50 cents a pound the cost is only 1.5 of a cent, so small that it is hardly worth considering.

There are more people enjoying tea today than ever before, as what other beverage will give so much real enjoyment at so small a cost? And while tea sells at anywhere near its present moderate prices there is no reason for not enjoying our due share of this delightful beverage.

The fact that, even with live hogs at this figure, shipments of bacon are regularly going forward to England, will serve to illustrate very clearly the demand for that product on the British market. Without doubt, Canada stands in a better position today to develop a permanent bacon trade with Great Britain than has ever been the case before. To do this, however, there must be a volume of supply. There is very good reason to believe that, although prices cannot be expected to remain at the present high level, the demand for bacon, in the face of the supply that can be obtained, will be such as to hold the market in a very firm condition, both during and for a considerable period following the war.

Great Britain's imports of bacon in 1915 amounted to £5,441,460. From Canada she obtained only £3,324,511. The fact that Canadian bacon has been selling at an advance of from 10 to 125 per cent. above American and is not more than 125, under the normal quotation for Danish, illustrates very clearly to what extent Canada could increase her export trade, had she a sufficient quantity of hogs to make this possible. The English merchant and the British consumer will buy Canadian bacon today, qualitatively equal, in preference to that from any other country in the world, with the possible exception of Ireland. Not only so, but an enormous market exists also for hams, frozen pork and pork cuts of various descriptions. This market is as remunerative as the bacon trade, although it is not likely to prove as constant. The West is producing a great quantity of rough grain this year. As compared with wheat, it will probably be relatively low in price. It should, therefore, be a sound business proposition to breed as many sows this spring as would provide each farm nest fall with such a number of feeding hogs as can be conveniently handled and suitably finished. They should, however, be so selected and mated as to maintain the approved bacon type. Unless this be done, we cannot compete with Ireland and Denmark and will lose status on the British market. The development of our bacon trade is a purely commercial undertaking and we must early recognize that we cannot sell to the British merchant unless we give him what he wants. This graded, thrifty management and good feeding should yield a return this year which will more than compensate for all the labor involved.
