



After the work had begun a dozen Cossacks from the Russian Consulate appeared on the scene and forcibly ejected the workmen. The captain of the British 2nd-class gunboat Woodlark, especially designed for river gervice, after consulting with their consulate, landed a party of bluejackets and moved forward into firing distance of the ian consulate. For a time a fight eemed imminent, but nothing further occurred. The bluejackets are now guard.
