Archbishop Montgomery was 59 years old, having been born in Davies couny, Kentucky, December 30. 1847. He was educated at Cecilian College, Kentucky; St Charles College, Maryland, and St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore. In December, 1879, he was ordained a priest at Baltimore. After fifteen years of service in San Prancisco churches he was consecrated Coadjator Bishop of Lis Angeles in 1894. On Jane 10, 1896 Bishop Montgomery succeeded Bishop Mora at Los Angeles, but in Qutober 1904, he was transferred again to San Francisco, as coadjutor to Archbishop Rior-
