31. From and after the passing of this Act the construction of houses or buildings of any sort shall not be commenced within the city limits without the permission of the Council, who shall have power to make and prescribe terms and conditions to be observed and performed by the owner of the land or the lessee in respect of the payment by the said owner or lessee of the whole or a portion of the cost of the laying or introduction of the water or water pipes, the opening or construction of sewers or sewerage, or the making, opening, widening or improvement of the road or street along or near to which the said house or building is to be constructed.

32. Whenever alter the passing of this Act the Council shall decide upon the opening or construction of a main sewer along or through a street abutting upon or in the vicinity of land which is suitable for building purposes, but upon which no buildings have been erected, and it shall appear that the said main sewer about to be constructed is or will be available for connection with buildings hereafter to be erected upon said land so that the value of the said land will be thereby improved, the Council shall have power to levy and impose upon the said land or any portion thereof, from time to time, a tax or assessment at such a rate either per foet or frontage upon the said road or street or otherwise as the Council shall determine, and to apply the money raised by and under the said tax or assessment to or towards the cost of the opening or construction of the said proposed sewer or sewerage. The said tax or assessment shall be a charge upon the said land or such portion thereof as shall be defined by the Council, as subject thereto, and shall be recovered from the owner or lessee, as the case may be, in the same manner as provided in and by the principal Act in respect of the recovery of taxes, rates and assessments.

Coronation Dath.

a great pity that any person of intelligence and education, and particularly so if of strong religious opinion, should think it necessary to raise a controversy of a disturbing quality over the question of the Coronation Oath taken by His Majesty on the day of the crowning, especially in the Colonial portions of the Empire, for the following reasons:-

1st.-Any educated person of ordinary intelligence knows that the duty of a King over the British Empire is primarily to assist in securing strict justice and entire freedom of opin ion in religious matters to every loyal subject in his realm.

2nd.—Religious controversy wherever met with is one of the most disturbing elements of society, and the chief cause of separating those members of it, that would otherwise be good friends and neighbors, when carried to extremes a devastating fire. 3rd -We in the Colonies are all

aware that a subject of such magnitude as the Coronation Oath will receive the most careful consideration in the Imperial Parliament, and therefore we may rest assured that what is wisest and best will be done with a questionable proceeding, which to say the least of it, is most distaste-'ul, nay, intensely painful to the feelings of millions of His Majesty's very loyal and faithful subjects, well proven so on many a bloody battlefield, and also most distasteful to our very noble and tender hearted King himself, and foreign to the desires of the most intelligent of Anglican churchnen the whole world over, and therefore should no longer be tolerated or

insisted upon. Further, we have not yet, despite such an array of theological assertion to the contrary, reached such an accurate knowledge of what really true religion demands, or what really were the instructions left for our guidance by our blessed Lord, beyond the one great central fact, that He suffered in our stead, bore our punishment in his own innocent body, and bids all who would desire to be with Him hereafter to meekly take up their cross and, forsaking all else, follow his wearied footsteps, and to prove our faith by loving one another as Granted in bounteous share, He loved us and gave Himself for us.

(See I. John, cap 4, verse 20.) I ask, how can any man, calling nimself a Christian, desire his King to take an oath that he is sure will inflict great pain upon the feelings of millions of his brethren and fellowcountrymen. Who made us judges in this matter?

It is high time to amend this most iniquitous oath, and thus remove another stumbling block from the path that leads to peace and love of man

I would like to direct attention to another wrong that is inflicted on us haviour. all, i.e., the wording of our National late ruler, King Edward the VII. and score of "sentimentality."



Maker to frustrate the knavish tricks and confound the politics of the very noble potentates, our glorious King sought so earnestly to bind to us with the strong cords of effection and mutual respect. Why it is discourteous to them in the extreme. In this connection I would suggest that our National Anthem should run something on the lines of the following crude attempt:-

From Thee to all: Cause bitter wars to cease Install the reign of peace, All joys on earth increase, God save the King.

To all the world impart Grace to fill every heart With love for thee; May King and peasant low To Thee most humbly bow Praying Thy peace to know, People and King.

Long may his reign endure, His subjects love, aye sure, Trusting in Thee; And send o'er earth's wide space Heedless of creed or race, Love's light on every face, God bless our King.

God bless his Consort too, E'er faithful, constant, true, God bless our Queen. Send to the noble pair All joys the earth can bear.
