ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

THE following Sections of the amended Municipal Act, passed March 22nd, 1910, are published for the information of those interested and the General Public:—

31. From and after the passing of this Act any sort shall not be commenced within the city limits without the permission of the Council, who shall have power to make and prescribe the conditions to be observed and performed by the owner of the land or the lessee in respect of the payment by the said owner or lessee of the whole or a portion of the cost of the laying or introduction of the water or water pipes, the opening or construction of sewers or sewerage, or the making, opening, widening or improvement of the road or street along or to which the said house or building is to be constructed.

32. Whenever after the passing of this Act the Council shall decide upon the opening or construction of a main sewer along or through a street abutting upon or in the vicinity of land which is suitable for building purposes, but upon which no buildings have been erected, and it shall appear that the said main sewer about to be constructed is or will be available for connection with buildings hereafter to be erected upon said land so that the value of the said land will thereby be improved, the Council shall have power to levy and impose upon the said land or any portion thereof, from time to time, a tax or assessment at such a rate either per foot of frontage upon the said road or street or otherwise as the Council shall determine, and to apply the money raised by and under the said tax or assessment to or towards the cost of the opening or construction of the said proposed sewer or sewerage. The said tax or assessment shall be a charge upon the said land or such portion thereof as shall be defined by the Council, as subject thereto, and shall be recovered from the owner or lessee, as the case may be, in the same manner as provided in and by the principal Act in respect of the recovery of taxes, rates and assessments.

33. Whenever it shall be found necessary for the purpose of widening or improving any road or street for the Council to take and appropriate private property and to pay compensation therefor to be determined by arbitration under the provisions of the principal Act, the Arbitrators, in computing or assessing the amount of such compensation, shall consider and determine whether or not the said widening or improvement has affected the value of the land or property adjoining to the land so taken, belonging to the same owner, and in case it shall be found that such widening or improvement has improved or increased the value of the said adjoining land, the amount of compensation to be awarded for the taking of the said land shall be reduced or abated accordingly.

The BURNING MINE. Grief of King and Queen.

The Queen-Mother's Message—Lord Lonsdale's Descent into the Pit.

King George, Queen Mary, and Queen Alexandra are deeply affected by the disaster at the Wellington Pit, Whitehaven, in which, according to a revised official statement, 133 men and boys lost their lives. On Saturday Alderman Braithwaite, Mayor of Whitehaven, received the following telegram from the King and Queen:

"I am commanded by the King and the Queen to inform your worship that their Majesties wish to subscribe one hundred guineas respectively to your worship's relief fund for those bereaved through the terrible disaster at the Wellington Colliery.

"The King and Queen again wish to assure your worship of their heartfelt sympathy with those afflicted by this appalling catastrophe.

"Lieut.-Col. WM. CARNINGTON."

Ever since the news of the accident reached them their Majesties have made inquiries as to the likelihood of rescue, and almost hourly have received reports upon it. Despite their own grief they are filled with the deepest sympathy for the poor women and children left widows and fatherless by the explosion. Happening as it did when His Majesty is on the threshold of his reign, King George was all the more affected by the disaster, and he heard with poignant feelings of regret that the Home Secretary, in order that no more lives should be lost in the burning mine, had refused to consent to the reopening of the pit in which the 133 men are entombed.

The following touching message was sent by the Queen-mother to the Mayor of Whitehaven on Saturday:

"Even in my crushing grief I am not insensible to that of others. Please therefore let all the bereaved widows and members of the families of those poor men who have lost their lives in the terrible colliery disaster at Whitehaven know at once that in my own sorrow my heart bleeds for them. I am sending you to-day £100 as a donation towards the fund which I am sure you will raise for the benefit of those poor sufferers. That God will help them in their affliction will be my earnest prayer.

"ALEXANDRA."

To every bereaved home a copy of this royal message of sympathy was sent on Saturday evening by the mayor. It was printed on a black-bordered sheet of paper, and the document is being prized in many a home

Slattery. Judge Johnson suggested that a Memorial Tablet be affixed in the new building to perpetuate the name of the lamented Superior.

Personal Responsibility

Yesterday we made some remarks on the desirability of cultivating the feelings of personal patriotism, responsibility and duty for the general honesty and efficiency of the administration of public affairs. We referred to the power which is threatening to sap the reality of popular government. We pointed out the tendency of the moneyed interest to seize the public domain by utilizing the forms of popular government. The great danger of the day is not king-craft, priestcraft, aristocracy, but money craft. Government by party is an effective means of ruling the people for the people by the people, provided the people are patriotic enough to do their duty. But if they are not, party government becomes a more effective means of despoiling a country than even Caedron, or aristocracy. The plutocrats provide the money to run political campaigns. Moneyed men pay for the printing of political literature, for the hiring of halls for meetings, the expenses of candidates, and often for the support of those elected. For moneyed interests these subscriptions are but investments. Politicians become their pawns, and a legislative machinery for conveying a country's resources to the millionaire's coffers—in short for converting the public domain into the private domain of the Almighty Plutocrats.

Where there is no King, with royal traditions of duty to his people; where there is no aristocracy dominated by the spirit of noblesse oblige, the rule of the plutocrat seems to grow ranker. Under the guise of freedom and independence, the people are deluded into the belief that they rule because they make marks on ballot papers and because they have been taught to take pride in the cry that Kings have no sway over them, and that there are no families with heritable titles among them, and all the time they are being sheered like sheep and led to slaughter like innocents by Trusts and Combines who fleece their country more unscrupulously than any King or Oligarchy known to history ever did.

Yesterday we made reference to a movement which is on foot in America, where these evils have attained their greatest magnitude, to build up a public opinion, to create a sense of responsibility, to habituate the people to a sense of duty about the administration of public affairs. We made reference to his movement to counteract the evil. This movement is an educational one. It is based on the principle of catching citizens young and training them aright. It is based on the idea that self-government must be made a habit, and that a public opinion must be created and maintained, and that the school is the proper nursery of such a movement. Of this, more anon.

In both instances Father Fyne had a very agreeable surprise and heartily thanked the generous donors.

Hidden Money Found.

About a year ago the post office at Bishop's Falls, of which a young man named White, of Bonavista, had charge, was robbed of \$80 from the safe. White wired the Postmaster General that the office had been broken into during the night, and I. G. Sullivan sent Sergt. Byrne to examine the place. This the officer carefully did, but could find nothing to indicate that the place had been entered.

Circumstances went to show that the money had been stolen by some one having access to the place. Several were in the habit of visiting it, and suspicion fell strongly on a certain party, but no clue could be had to lead to the discovery of the money. White in the meantime had been making good the stolen cash in instalments. He was succeeded later in the office by his cousin, Miss White, and returned to Bonavista to take the place of Mrs. Stabb, his mother.

Who Kept the Post Office There.

The past spring, some children playing about a spot, distant about a quarter of a mile from the post office at the Falls, began rooting under the stump of a tree and came across a large sum of money. They were the children of Mr. Lincoln, head of the construction work, and they took the money to their parents. A further search about the stump was made and altogether \$69.75 was discovered with some things from the post office, which tended to show that it was the cash stolen from there. The find was reported to Miss White and Mr. Colburne, J.P., and to the latter the cash was handed.

Mr. Sullivan a few days ago sent Constable Martin down there from Grand Falls, and Messrs. Colburne and Lincoln were satisfied that the money belonged to the post office. The cash was then handed over to the Inspector General, who in turn gave it to the P. M. G. It had evidently been placed in a tobacco box which kept the notes intact and dry.

Caplin Plentiful.

Mr. Fred. Canning, of G. M. Barr's office, who returned from a trip to St. Brendan's by the express yesterday says that caplin struck in plentiful all over Bonavista Bay Saturday and Sunday, but codfish is very scarce. Most of the schooners were ready to sail for Labrador; a few had gone to the French Shore and Straits early in the week. Mr. Canning was delighted with the scenery to be viewed going down Bonavista Bay in the S. S. Dundee, and says that it is the prettiest and most picturesque of all the bays in Newfoundland.

Enjoyable Trip.

Mr. Russell, who had been out on the line as telegraph operator for the Governor's party, returned to town by the express yesterday. He says that the weather was on the whole very fine, there being only one wet day. The Governor had great sport and the party secured three salmon at South Branch, and after coming east caught a fine lot of trout at Millerton. It is expected that the party will return next Thursday.

BOWLING SHIPS.

Bowlings had the following from Capt. A. Kean to-day from Western Cove: "Prospero reached destination O.K.; no whales, no fish, no ice." The Portia left Placentia at 5 a.m. to-day and is due here to-morrow morning.

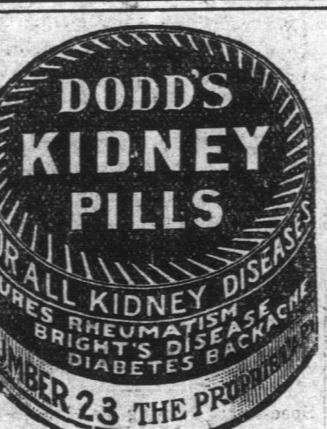

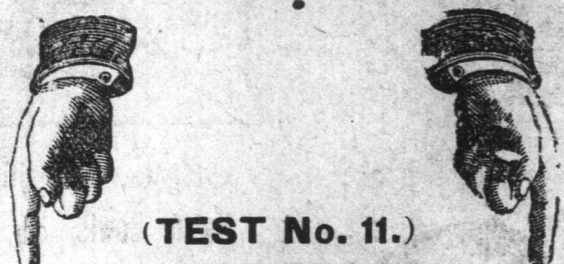

Newfoundland Pulp and Paper Success.

Mr. Barrington Hooper, who has been making a tour of Canada and Newfoundland as special correspondent for the Daily Mail, arrived in Montreal on his way home. He had come direct from Montreal, and was enthusiastic over the success attending Lord Northcliffe's enterprise in that colony in the establishment of big pulp and paper making works. "Despite the dismal prognostications of failure made by jealous New York papers," said Mr. Hooper, "the scheme is proving an unqualified success, and the Harmsworth publications are assured of a paper supply for all time. It is only three years since the scheme began to be realized, and yet all the paper now used in the printing of the Daily Mail is being manufactured at this plant. Besides that huge quantities of pulp are being exported to other paper mills, and experiments are now in progress with a view to making the finer quality of paper used for the magazines of the Harmsworth publications. "There is a population of between four and five thousand people now engaged at these works at Grand Falls, Newfoundland. Lord Northcliffe has built up a model town and a harbor of his own, and now runs four steamships between Newfoundland and England, giving a weekly service. All his workmen are enthusiastic and loyal to him, for he had done everything possible to make them comfortable and prosperous. He endowed a public utility fund for the town of Grand Falls with \$10,000. Then he established a co-operative store, and various other enterprises, all the profit of which goes to this fund, which is used for such purposes as they may decide on, such as providing parks, recreation ground, and numerous other things of public benefit. Since the fund was started it has grown to \$40,000."

Overhauled by Armed Cubans.

Special to Evening Telegram. KINGSTON, Ja., June 6. The British schooner Marion May, which arrived here to-day from Nassau, Bahama Islands, reports being stopped and searched six miles off Cape Mays, Cuba, by the Cuban cutter Balro. An armed party from the cutter boarded the schooner, removed the hatches and overhauled the cargo. The officer in charge insisted upon examining the ship's papers and manifest. No resistance was offered by the crew of the schooner, although the captain entered strong protest against what he termed unwarrantable interference outside Cuban waters. A request for a supply of the necessities, the captain reports, was refused and he was ordered to proceed on the voyage. Representations have been made to the Colonial Government here and the affair will be investigated.

China Wants National Assembly.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKIN, June 6. On Wednesday next a formal demand will be made upon the Throne for the immediate convocation of a National Parliament. The authors of the exception to be attempted are the delegates to the Provincial Assemblies, who have the support of organizations of merchants. The recently issued Imperial decree constituting the Provincial Assemblies set forth that the way clear was being paved for a general legislative body to be summoned 9 years after the first meeting of the Assemblies.

International Horse Show.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, June 6. The International Horse Show opened at Olympia this afternoon. It will continue throughout ten days. Although lacking the royal patronage, to which it has owed so much in the past, it has been anticipated with peculiar interest as one of the few events of a season that has been robbed of the usual gaiety because of the mourning for the late King. A large crowd was at the opening to see the wonderfully decorated hall, which is a rare spectacle in itself, and the horses housed in stalls lined with various colored clothes and empaneled with the prizes won at former shows.

Indians Sack Town.

Special to Evening Telegram. VERA CRUZ, Mexico, June 6. A most serious uprising has occurred in the State of Yucatan in which much blood has been shed. According to reports received here to-night the insurgents are preparing for a battle with the Government forces, which is sure to come soon. Despatches from Merida, the capital of Yucatan, are to the effect that 40 persons were killed by the Maya Indians on Saturday, and that 5,000 of these Indian insurgents sacked the town of Valladolid, killing all principal Government employees, the Chief of Police and others. They seized rifles and pistols and have instituted a reign of terror. It is reported that many telegraph operators have been killed.

1421 Jews Expelled.

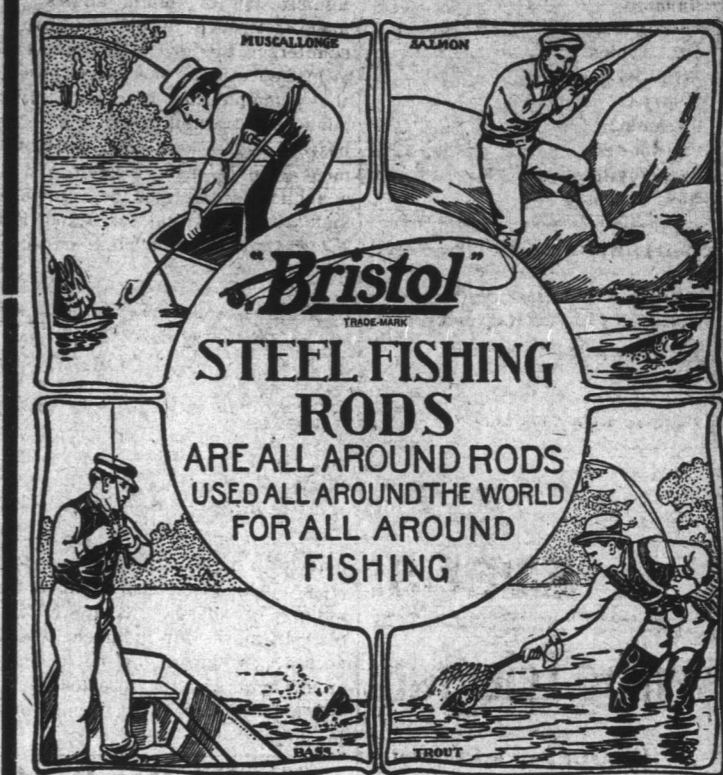

"Roosevelt should go home for the relief of his own country and for his own advantage. The United States is being misrepresented abroad by a toy soldier, by a toy Colonel, who, though unwilling to submit to military discipline for the few days that he was in the army, has been forever since trying to inflict military methods and arbitrary rule upon his own people and others. Roosevelt should go home and study more closely and carefully the free Republican institutions that have made his country."

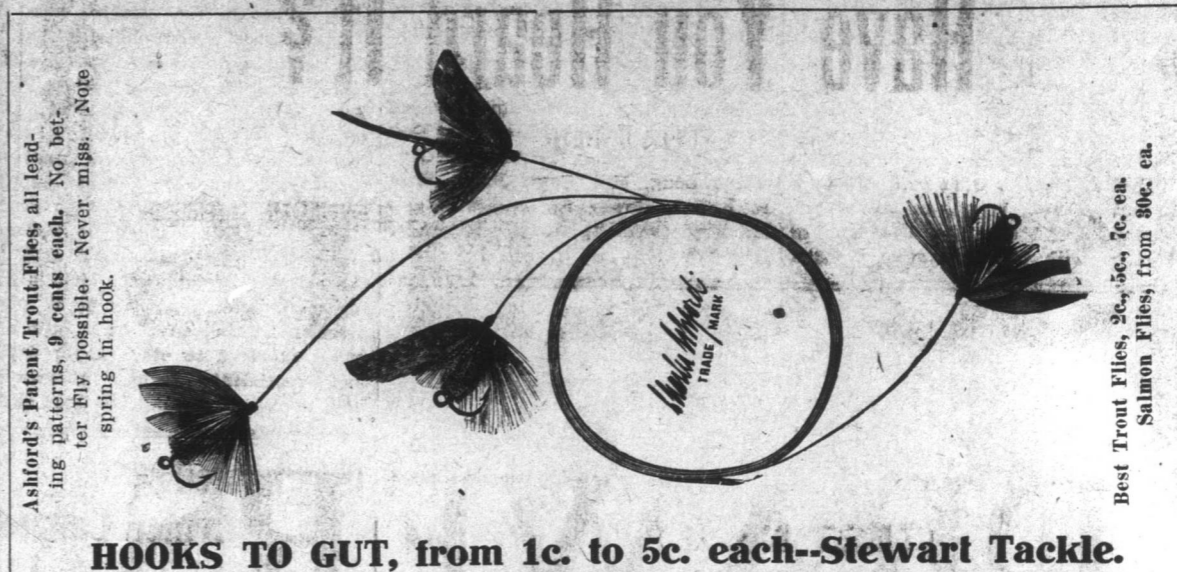

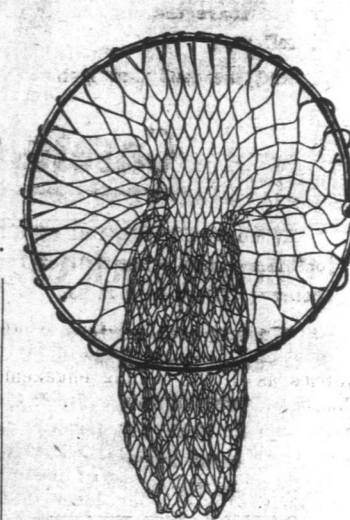

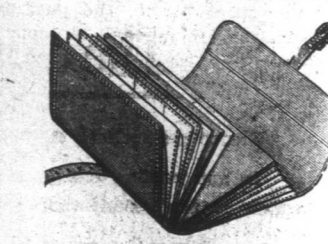

Mr. St. Hill seeing the extreme danger the man was in
JUMPED OVERBOARD AFTER HIM.
The man grasped him tightly and it looked as if both would drown until Mr. St. Hill had to hit him repeatedly and thereby loosed the hold he had on his (St. Hill's) neck. A rope was then thrown from the wharf, and Mr.

St. Hill keeping the man afloat with one arm tried to take a turn of it round his body. After some time he was enabled to do this, and those on the wharf hauled both men to safety. Both men were brought on board the Susu and were exhausted from their struggles, drenched and chilled. A change of clothing was given them and Mr. St. Hill was driven home by

Capt. Barbour. Head Const. Sheppard and Const. Lawlor were apprised of the affair, and saw Ryan placed in his berth and well attended to. The man had a bad cut over the eye, and in falling must have struck either the wharf or the ship. Mr. St. Hill's pluck and daring is to be commended for he had not acted so promptly the life of the other man must have been forfeited.

Gotch Easily Wins.

Chicago, June 1.—Frank Gotch of Humboldt, Iowa, to-night successfully defended his title as wrestling champion of the world by easily defeating Stanislaus Zbyszko the Polish champion in straight falls at the Coliseum. Gotch outclassed his bulky opponent in every department of the game, after winning the first fall in the phenomenal time of six and one quarter seconds. It was only a question of how long the Pole could hold out against the brilliant and varied attacks of his skilled rival. The immense crowd had hardly realized that the great match had started before referee Dick Fleming slapped Gotch on the back and declared him the victor of the first fall. The hold which sent the Pole down was a bar arm and half Nelson. After the men slook hands, Gotch had stepped back a bit and then a fierce flying tackle and before the Pole realised what was happening, his shoulders were pinned to the mat. Warned by his sudden downfall, Zbyszko was more careful and it took Gotch 27 minutes and 36 seconds to win the match with a bar arm and wrist lock.

At mid time was Gotch in any danger and when the Pole would secure any advantage, Gotch would forestall his opponent at every turn and it was worse than hopeless for the Pole to assume the aggressive. The result indicated that Gotch was out of condition when he lost the handicap match to Zbyszko at Buffalo. In that encounter Gotch engaged to throw the Pole twice within the hour, but failed to get even one fall.

Coronation Oath.

Dear Editor.—It seems to me to be a great pity that any person of intelligence and education, and particularly so if of strong religious opinion, should think it necessary to raise a controversy of a disturbing quality over the question of the Coronation Oath taken by His Majesty on the day of the crowning, especially in the Colonial portions of the Empire, for the following reasons:—
1st.—Any educated person of ordinary intelligence knows that the duty of a King over the British Empire is primarily to assist in securing strict justice and entire freedom of opinion in religious matters to every loyal subject in his realm.
2nd.—Religious controversy wherever met with is one of the most disturbing elements of society, and the chief cause of separating those members of it, that would otherwise be good friends and neighbors, when carried to extremes a devastating fire.
3rd.—We in the Colonies are all aware that a subject of such magnitude as the Coronation Oath will receive the most careful consideration in the Imperial Parliament, and that therefore we may rest assured that what is wisest and best will be done with a questionable proceeding, which to say the least of it, is most distasteful, nay, intensely painful to the feelings of millions of His Majesty's very loyal and faithful subjects, well proven so on many a bloody battlefield, and also most distasteful to our very noble and tender hearted King himself, and foreign to the desires of the most intelligent of Anglican churches throughout the world over, and therefore should no longer be tolerated or insisted upon.
Further, we have not yet, despite such an array of theological assertion to the contrary, reached such an accurate knowledge of what really true religion demands, or what really were the instructions left for our guidance by our blessed Lord, beyond the one great central fact, that He suffered in His own innocent body, and bids all who would desire to be with Him hereafter to meekly take up their cross and forsaking all else, follow in His wearied footsteps, and to prove our faith by loving one another as He loved us and gave Himself for us. (See 1. John, cap 4, verse 20.)
I ask, how can any man, calling himself a Christian, desire his King to take an oath that he is sure will inflict great pain upon the feelings of millions of his brethren and fellow-countrymen. Who made us judges in this matter?
It is high time to amend this most iniquitous oath, and thus remove another stumbling block from the path that leads to peace and love of man for man.
I would like to direct attention to another wrong that is inflicted on us all, i.e., the wording of our National Anthem. Does it not seem at least inconsistent that whilst extolling so heartily our beloved and lamented late ruler, King Edward the VII. and
