



Premier Laurier Goes Down to Defeat.

The American-Canadian Reciprocity Pact has been rejected decisively by the Canadian people, and the decision carries with it the downfall of the Laurier' administration which has had an unexampled career of fifteen years duration. Not only is the defeat remarkable for the defeat of candidates supporting the Cabinet, but it is peculiarly significant from the number of Cabinet Ministers who have suffered defeat at the Polls. Almost every Minister, who had a seat in the Cabinet, exclusive of the Premier, Sir Wilfred Laurier, is among the rejected ones. These are Sir F. Borden. Minister of Militia, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, Hon. W. Patterson, Minister of Customs, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Minister of Labor, Hon. W. Templeman, Minister of Mines and Inland Revenue, Hon. (

Frank Oliver, Minister of the Interior, and one other Minister whose name we have not received at the time of writing. The full significance is seen in the defeats of Ministers Fielding and Patterson, who were the
