I think life is a good deal more

from the butcher—and warm water.  
Dip a stiff brush in this and rub the  
spots vigorously, going over them  
afterward with a cloth dipped in clear  
tard water and wrung out.

Dried wormwood, which may be  
had at the drug store, is an excellent  
protection against moths when put-  
ting winter clothes away. It should be  
scattered lavishly between the folds,  
and each article wrapped separately  
in a newspaper before packing.

To remove wall paper, take warm  
water that is softened with borax or  
ammonia and apply with a sponge.  
The paper will soon become soaked  
and blistered and may be easily strip-  
ped off. It is well to do this a day or  
so before the new paper is put on.

Sheets of postage stamps that are  
carried in a pocketbook frequently  
stick together. When this happens do  
not soak them apart, but lay them on  
a smooth surface and pass a hot iron  
over them. This will separate the  
stamps without destroying the gum.

If a horse stumbles, give him his  
food on the floor instead of in the  
manger. The position necessarily  
taken in feeding strengthens the mus-  
cles of the knees and so removes the  
cause of the stumbling. A horse just  
brought from pasture does not stum-  
ble.

To prevent drawing in non-  
washable garments from pulling out,  
sew to each end of the tape a brass  
embroidery ring larger than the open-  
ing of the casing. Do this, of course,  
after the tape has been inserted. Then  
cover the ring by buttonholing it with  
thread the color of the tape.

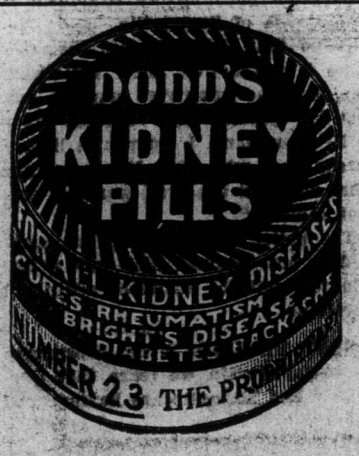

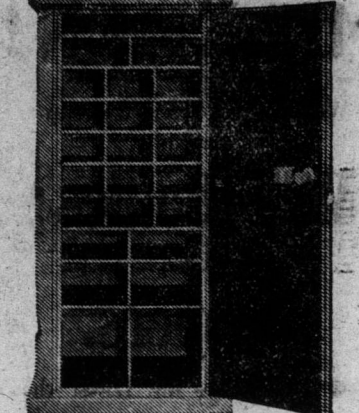

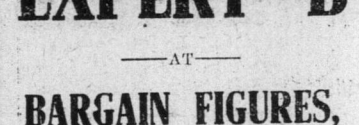

## Amendments to Home Rule Bill

SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM.

LONDON, To-day.

There have already been handed to the clerks of the Commons amendments to Home Rule Bill that fill 28 pages of the parliamentary orders of the day. Most are in names of Conservative members and would not take passage. Many of them make bill as useless as the paper they are printed on. Extreme radical members on the other hand, aim at giving the Irish Parliament more power, making it more democratic, while some of their non-conformist colleagues would have clauses inserted to safeguard their fellow religionists of Ulster. With the exception of Ginnell a Nationalist, with independent leanings, Irish members have not yet tabled any amendments. Ginnell's amendments would enlarge the powers of the Irish parliament and make it more democratic. While months will be spent on the committee stage of the bill, few amendments will receive a hearing. While most amendments proposed by Unionists aim at destroying the bill, some will doubtless receive consideration as tending to improve the measure. It is strange to find two Unionist members, Viscount Castlereagh and Lord Claude Hamilton, both sons of peers, who have been Lord Lieutenants of Ireland, proposing the abolition of that office, substituting a Secretaryship of State. This is a change that has more often been associated with radical policy. A sly slip is taken at O'Connor by the suggestion of one member, that Scotland division of Liverpool, which is represented in the Commons by O'Connor, and the electors of which came from across the Channel, should for the purpose of the Bill be considered a part of Ireland. Others again would have Ulster excluded from the Bill. Some will propose it shall apply to England, Wales and Scotland as well as Ireland, thus bringing about federal home rule which was for a few days the policy of some Conservatives in 1910.

The New Brunswick Legislature is dissolved and the election will take place on June 20th. The standing of parties at the dissolution was government, 33; opposition, 13.

## No Solution to Boston Murder Mystery.

WOMAN STRANGLED IN HER APARTMENTS. SAID TO BE NATIVE OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

Boston, May 22.—The mystery surrounding the murder of Mrs. Lillian Jewer, formerly of Montreal who was strangled in her apartments in the South End, probably on Saturday, was still far from solved at noon to-day.

Several clues have been run down without producing any tangible results and these included the examination of Chas. W. Hopping a writer and his release last night from detention.

Several of the police inspectors pointed out to-day that the circumstances surrounding the discovery of Mrs. Jewer's body yesterday resembled closely those attending the murder of Laura Chamberlain in a waterfront hotel last September. Both women were seen during the evening in various resorts but no clue could be discovered that would lead to the identification of their companions in the room where their bodies were subsequently found.

Hopping told the police last night that he called at Mrs. Jewer's apartments on Saturday night, but could not get in, so he left a note under the door. The note was found as indicated by Hopping. Two women who were examined stated that they accompanied Mrs. Jewer to one of the subway stations late on Friday night and so far as is known this was the last time she was seen alive. They said that Mrs. Jewer had spent part of the evening with them in a palm garden, but she entered the subway station alone.

Chief Inspector Dugan said this afternoon:—

"We have been following every known clue without any definite result. This morning we examined a Mrs. Marsh of Somerville, and she tells us that the murdered woman's name is not Jewer, but something else, that she was never married, and that her parents live in some place in Newfoundland. I am not at liberty to say just who Mrs. Marsh is, nor what she said the dead woman's correct name is."

The police sent for Hopping again to-day, but detained him only a few minutes while he answered additional questions.

## Algerine Found But One Body.

Mr. Munn received a message yesterday from Capt. Jackman, of the S. S. Algerine, which was 45 miles off Cape Race, at the time of its despatch. Capt. The body was embalmed on board ship. Mr. Munn directed her in reply to return to the vicinity of the wreck and cruise for another 10 days, and then report through Cape Race for further instructions. She spoke to the S. S. Montmagny on the 19th. The latter ship has been out for two weeks but found no bodies. She is on her way to Halifax.

### Fishery Up North

By the Fogata we learn that there are signs of a good fishery north. At Seldom traps average 10 to 15 qts, but hook and line are doing poorly. Good trapping was done at Change Islands when the ship was there, and for two days traps averaged from 50 to 100 qts. There is a good sign at Cat Harbor. At the Wadhams and Pickford's Islands they are doing well, while on the south side of Bonavista Bay—at King's Cove, Keel's, Slate Cove, Stock Cove, &c., they are doing well. One man named Brown, at Keel's, has over 200 qts. ashore to date, and others run from 50 to 100 qts. Saturday evening at Grate's Cove a start was made with traps, one man getting 20 qts and the others from 10 to 15 qts.

### L. O. A. Sessions.

The Grand Black Chapter of British America of the L. O. A. will open its sessions at Fredericton, N.B., to-day. Wednesday next the sessions of the Grand Orange Lodge of British North America will open also at Fredericton. From all the Provinces Delegates will assemble, even from as remote a place as British Columbia. From Newfoundland Messrs. R. A. Sculriss and G. Langmead will be the delegates.

TROUBLE WITH STOKERS.—When the Black Diamond steamer Morwenna was ready to sail Saturday night her firemen walked ashore and delayed the ship. The cause of the trouble was the Union men objecting to work with non-union men. Finally Delegate Woods settled the dispute and the ship got away.

The South Hackney bye-election, caused by the retirement of Horatio Bottomley, has resulted in the return of the Liberal candidate, Morrison, by 5,339 against 4,836 for his Unionist opponent, Gibson.

BERLIN, May 26.  
The depth and persistency of the anti-English feeling in Germany, which resulted from last summer's crisis, was demonstrated to-day by the refusal of the Potsdam Board of Aldermen to vote funds for the entertainment of British physicians who are to attend the convention of the Royal Institute of Public Health in July. This convention enjoys the patronage of the highest official circles in Germany. "England treated us abusively and shamefully," "England is hostile to Germany, and wishes to press us against her icy bosom," are among the phrases uttered by the Aldermen of the city in which the Emperor has his residence, when giving their reasons for refusal to do any expense in entertaining British visitors.

ST. JOHN'S, Que., May 26.  
Hall stones, as large as eggs, knocked down barns; lightning struck the Roman Catholic Church here and several buildings throughout the district, and a terrible cloud-burst washed out three big sections of the Boston and Maine Railway line during the most spectacular storm of recent years. Bolt lightning struck St. John's Church, 140 feet up the steeple. Flames broke out and the heroic priest of the church, Father Berleau, and a soldier, were the first to go up into the steeple with a Babcock's extinguisher, and after a line of hose had been brought up by the firemen, led the fight against the flames. At Henryville, Ball as large as eggs fell. Forty windows in the convent were completely broken, and several barns are down.

LONDON, May 26.  
The Court of Enquiry into the causes of the London strike, under the Presidency of Sir Edward Clarke, terminated with a dramatic offer of Terry Gosling, the men's leader, on behalf of the strikers, which may possibly lead to a peace conference. If, said Gosling, there is a possibility of a joint conference on the whole dispute, we are willing to accept it. It must be settled as a whole, and I think it could be done by a joint conference, if some understanding could be reached by which employers and men who will not toe the line can be compelled to do so, otherwise there is nothing for us to do but go on and win. If we can, or lose, if we must, Gosling concluded by suggesting Sir Edward Clarke as President of the Conference. Sir Edward expressed appreciation of the offer, pointing out, however, the impossibility of compelling non-unionists to obey the decisions of the unions, or of enforcing agreements upon those who are not parties to them, except by legislation. He intimated that he had reason to believe that legislation might be expected which might do a great deal toward solving the industrial difficulties confronting the country.

**Jottings From Harbor Main.**

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—An event of passing interest and one that has occasioned widespread adverse comment was the departure of Constable Edmund Quinlan from Hr. Main. The popular officer had been doing duty at the Harbor Main Station for the past two years; but now has been transferred to Trepasser. During the time he was attached to this station he gave ample evidence of his vigilance and efficiency. His commanding physique, his fearless discharge of duty, his firm determination to root out, and hunt down law-breakers, all conspired to inspire and command the confidence and good will of the community, and respect and fear for the law of the land. Of course we must reserve those whose corns he had trodden on by his strict attention to duty. He completely stamped out the hop-beer nuisance which was fast bringing our boys to ruin. In addition to this he brought a shebeener to the bar of Justice on two occasions, setting a conviction in one and a dis-

missal in the other. Thus originated the trouble. After that case "Quinlan is going to be turned out" was the latest news on the "Cross," and the Post Office square with the Tory hefters, and even whisperings of it went around the Foundry. Anyway, the Constable is to be congratulated on the good luck of being transferred from the Magisterial Department of Harbor Main. A prolonged stay here might be detrimental to him. He carries with him the best wishes of the people of Harbor Main whose interests he so well looked after and among whom he was so popular that they were moving to petition the Inspector General for his retention. Mrs. Quinlan whose health is not the best has been kindly allowed by the Inspector General to remain at the Station until July.

Those inside the bar will work in harmony and the strictest confidence will exist between them.  
No such appointment will be tolerated long by the people of Harbor Main. We want and must get a police officer as well as "Hollowood" and "Cat's Cove." Even were such an appointment needed for a few months why not appoint such stalwart and robust fishermen as Peter Hannon and Michael Hickey—men who are physically well able to arrest and handle a burly disturber of the peace?  
It looks as if all the Government offices and machinery in Harbor Main District must run concurrently with votes for Woodford. Did any one here see Murphy? What Murphy? Why—Murphy the member for Harbor Main. The heeler general "Mickey" one of his best friends and benefactors remembered him with gratitude when he was arranging with a city medico to leave him off the ticket.  
To make a point, a landlady who was serving her guests and some travelers at table in a northern town of this district, piled them with the following question: "What do you think of the Government? What Government, ma'am? one of the guests observed? Why "the Toole Government," she retorted. He's the Government boss in this district, and has all the fat jobs for himself and his family.  
The roads around here have their mouths open for some of the money that's being wasted by the extravagance of the Picnic Administration. A person need not be a keen observer to note the difference in the roads now-a-days and those of few years ago. Surely roses will bloom again with the election of Lewis and St. John.  
It is rumored that the quarters vacated by Constable Quinlan are going to be refitted and put into hotel shape for the reception of the Premier and his satellites during the agricultural cod next November. We had a meeting here last Sunday. Our people take little interest in this fake. A few interested hard-shelled Tories, their wives and daughters from other sections of the district were present to meet and greet Woodford and Murphy and to get ready for their share of the Agricultural fat and drippings of the Fair.  
What is the result of this great farming fake? The poor fisherman-farmer says it is disastrous to him. After three years' workings of the Society, it has brought canker in potatoes three dollars per barrel, and hay two dollars per hundred weight.

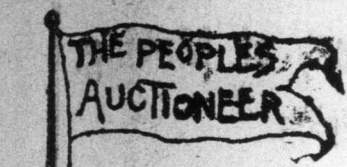
