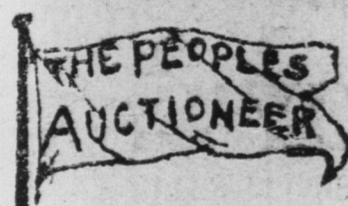

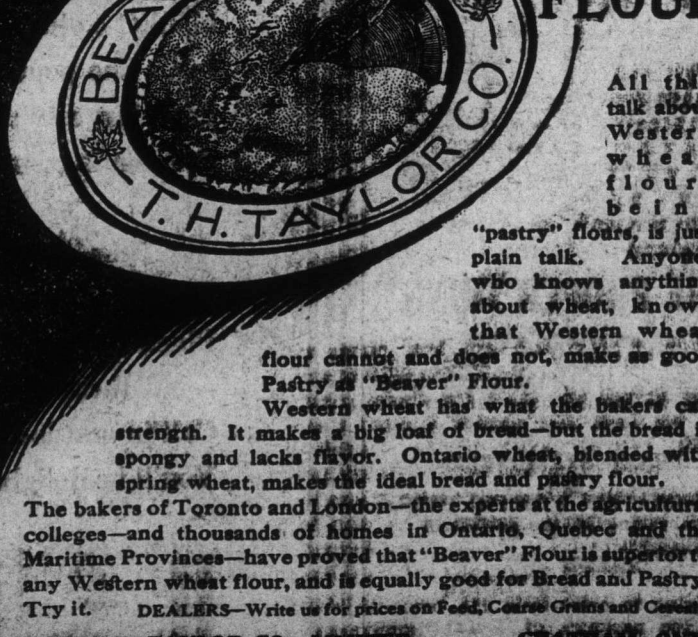
LONDON GOSSIP.

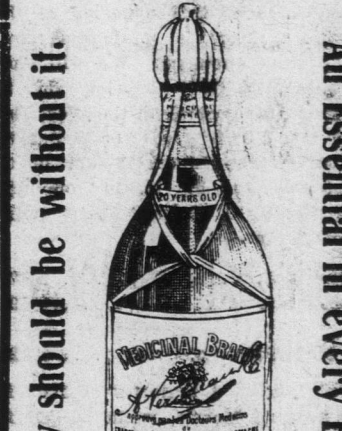

MORRIS SHAKY IN THE WEST END.

Sir Edward Morris is hard up against it in the West End. He knows this full well as everybody else does. This morning an attempt is being made to boom him by giving the votes he polled since 1885. The most significant feature of this "boosting" of Morris for the West End is neither the picture which sets forth that he is Premier, as if the West End was not tired of him as Premier, but the figures which are omitted. The true significance of this omission is that it hides Morris's majorities over his leading opponent. We will show up these and their bearing on his present poor outlook in the West End. In 1909 Sir Edward Morris was the leader on the Liberal ticket in the West End and his leading opponent was Mr. S. G. Collier. They polled respectively:—

Morris	2317
Collier	1059

Majority 1258

This shows a majority of 1258 for Sir Edward Morris, when he led for the Liberals in 1909.

In 1902 he was unopposed, the Tories did not think it worth while to test the Liberal strength.

In 1904 Sir Edward Morris again led the Liberal team in the West End and his leading opponent was Mr. J. J. McCarthy. At that election he did even better as the leading Liberal. The votes of Morris and McCarthy were:—

Morris	2394
McCarthy	1073

Majority 1321

From these figures it will be seen that Morris's average majority, as a Liberal candidate, in these two elections was near 1300. Now mark the significance of the figures which follow when he came out with all the zeal of leader of the People's Party and at a time the tide of public feeling had set in against the Liberal Government.

In the election of 1908, the opponent who scored highest against him was Mr. G. Power. Their votes were:

Morris	2274
Power	1822

Majority 452

What a falling off was there. Instead of a majority of 1321, his majority was cut down to 452. This showed that his personal hold on the district had fallen very much. Here we would ask why the Daily News misquotes the votes Sir Edward Morris polled in 1908 and 1909. The

Daily News gave his 1908 votes as those of 1909 and those of 1909 as those of 1908. Is this misquotation a mere inadvertence or was it made intentionally? As the Daily News gives the figures it is made to appear that Sir Edward Morris received more votes in 1909 than he did in 1908. That is not the case. He polled less. Instead of increasing his vote as Premier he scored less. He scored more in 1908 as leader of the Opposition than he did in 1909 as leader of the Government. In 1908 as mere leader of the People's Party in opposition his vote was 2274, as Premier and leader of the Government in 1909 he polled 2205. His vote was 69 less. Mr. W. J. Ellis had the highest vote on the Liberal ticket. Their votes were:

Morris	2205
Ellis	1858

Majority 347

This was the most significant feature of all. His majority dropped from 452 in 1908 to 347. In other words his majority as Premier was 105 less than it was as leader of the Opposition. This shows what little faith the West End had in him as Premier.

Since that time, the West End voters have had some four and a half years experience of him as Premier and leading member of the West End, and that experience is not a happy one. They have had their fill of it, and they want to end it. Hundreds of fervent supporters of his in 1908 and 1909 are now up in arms against him. They are to be met all over the West End, and they are as strenuous now in opposing him as they were in supporting him in 1908 and 1909. It is the same in Broad Cove, the Goules and Petty Harbour. The people of Petty Harbour have not forgiven him in changing the first survey which put the Petty Harbour station on the branch line, much nearer their settlement than it is on the line which was actually constructed.

If any confirmation of this feeling of uneasiness in the breast of Morris, it will be found also in the columns of the Morison organ this morning, which is booming him as the friend of publican and temperance men, although Mr. Donald Morison in 1905 taunted him in the Daily News with the same tactics in the following words:—

"If my main object in life was what the man in the street called political success, I might have taken pattern by Sir E. P. Morris, who is such a warm friend of

Temperance and rum-sellers at one and the same time."

The fact is the West End is ready for a change and Morris knows it. There is an overwhelming change of sentiment in the West End and the vote their in 1909 showed that a change of only 69 votes would have put in Mr. Ellis and put out Mr. Kennedy. The West End has made up its mind that Morris Must Go. BOND CAN'T LOSE.

Political Cullage.

The Daily News made a bad break this morning in its editorial "On the Political Culling Board." The People's Party and particularly Mr. M. P. Cashin will not thank the Morison organ for reviving the memories of Cashin's own break in the House of Assembly, when he put the fishermen of the Island on the culling board and threw out those who worked on the Trepansey Branch as cullage. It will only incite the fishermen to be firmer in their determination next November, when they have the candidates of the People's Party on the political culling board to throw them out as cullage. They have not forgotten the contemptuous references made to them by both Premier Morris and Minister Cashin on the appeal the fishermen made to have an election last fall. In solemn session at Bonavista last December they re-affirmed their alarm at the extravagance indulged in by Morris and their determination, when they get the chance, as they will have in November next, to throw out the Morris Government as cullage. Morris Must Go. BOND CAN'T LOSE.

Grand Opera.

The first of the Grand Opera con-
certs brought a full house at
the Casino Theatre last night. While
the main interest and expectation
perhaps was centred in Mascagni's
"Cavalleria Rusticana" yet the con-
cert programme which preceded its
production proved far the more en-
joyable. The honours in this first
part certainly fell to M. Edgar Lit-
tleton and Sacchetti. The former in
"Il lacerato spirito" (Verdi) was
most satisfying in expression and in
tone. A baritone voice well under
control, and accompanied by a sym-
pathetic temperament, will prove in
most cases to be the voice that reach-
es one, and M. Littleton would have
been heard with great pleasure in
more than fell to his share on the
programme. M. Sacchetti has a
smoothly-flowing tenor voice that is
very pleasing to the ear, and his
solo from "La Boheme" (Puccini)
was unhesitatingly encoored. His ap-
pearance in five of the ten items
threw most of the burden on his
shoulders and to him must be given
the palm for making this part of the
programme successful.

Mme. Hutcheson in her solo from
"I Puritani" (Bellini) displayed a
remarkable clearness in the runs
which abound in this piece, but un-
fortunately relied a great deal on
the "vibrato" in the voice; while it
may add sometimes, yet the contin-
ual use of it, besides being unartistic,
is absolutely unnecessary and
unpleasant. Her encore "Laddie"
was one of the most enjoyable items
of the programme. The management
has a difficult task to get together a
fully-satisfying aggregation of singers
but it would not be honest or fair to
say that the majority of those singing
last night were better than we can
produce here. In the Trio, Quartette
and Sextette there was too much
striving after big tone to make the
items satisfying. Clearness and
fineness were certainly lacking and
whether it was that the Hall was too
small for the voices or whatever it
was, the harmonious blending that is
so pleasingly an attribute of part
singing was wanting.

The "tabloid" opera took a little
over a half hour, and in its action

and without the aid of the libretto
does not convey much to the listen-
er. Mme. Gabbi appeared to better
advantage in this than in the pre-
ceding programme, and took her part
with much spirit, being ably helped
by M. Gatti, who has rather a good
voice, perhaps more "robusto" than
M. Sacchetti.

"Cavalleria Rusticana" is practi-
cally the only one of Mascagni's
works that merits any "fame," and
even it is not likely ever to be class-
ed among the "great" operas. The
Intermezzo played by the pianist to
a great extent was unfortunately lost
in the murmur of conversation which
arose during its performance.
The shortness of the opera was a
disappointment and it is to be hoped
that the succeeding ones will be
longer. It is certainly a big under-
taking to bring down even the twelve
persons or so that comprise the com-
pany and with the evident support
which is being given by St. John's
theatre-goers, the manager should be
encouraged to bring absolutely as
good material as he possibly can get.
It looks as if St. John's had put up
the full guarantee for three nights,
and in return they will appreciate the
best.

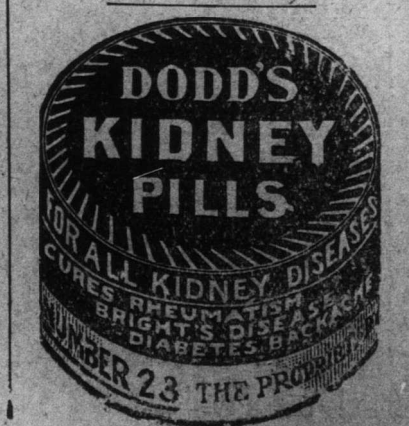

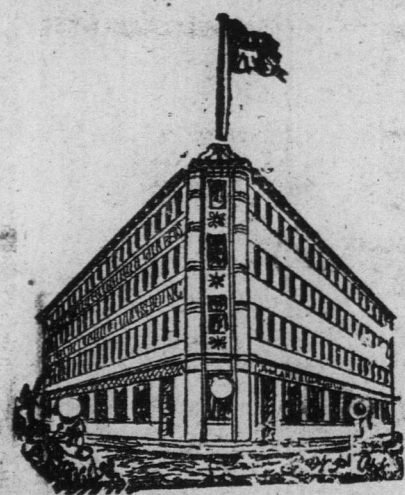

WASHINGTON, To-day. The Senate will vote on the Democratic Tariff Bill this afternoon at four o'clock.

PEKING, To-day. The Chinese Cabinet has been virtually reconstructed and the nomination of the six new ministers has been approved by the Lower House.

LONDON, To-day. The Daily Citizen, the Labor organ, announced that the Duke of Connaught crossed to the North of Ireland last night and precaution has been taken to prevent his journey from becoming publicly known. It suggests that his visit has some connection with the Ulster agitation, as the Duke has been mentioned as the first Viceroy under Home Rule.

CHARLOTTETOWN, To-day. The dredge owned by Bartram, Toronto, sank twelve miles off Rustico yesterday. The tug was on the way to Rustico Harbor, and had left Souris on Saturday. She met with a terrible storm off the Straits on Sunday night, which beat her so fiercely that she sprang a leak. The crew and those attending in the tug, Amherst and Mersey, worked strenuously to save the craft, but with no avail. The crew of twelve just escaped with their lives and the dredge went down. The Amherst and Mersey were unable to make Rustico and turned back to Souris, where they arrived safely.

COATICOOK, To-day. Whl Travers Jerome was acquitted last night on the charge of having gambled on Thursday last, on station property of the Grand Trunk railway here while waiting for the Immigration authorities to pass on the case of Harry K. Thaw. The court apologized for the humiliation to which he had been subjected. When acquitted, Jerome thanked the court, spoke heartily of his reception in Canada, and added he did not attribute his arrest and brief imprisonment last week to the thinking people of the Dominion.

WINNIPEG, To-day. If you are proud to be members of the British Empire, as I believe you are, we, in the Mother country, are no less proud of you as such. The declaration of the Right Hon. Herbert Samuel, British Postmaster General, speaking at a Canadian Club luncheon. Pointing out that the English Liberal party has discarded the little Englandism and that Cobden had never determined the policy of that party, he emphasized the fact that the age when the dominions or the colonies used to be regarded with indifference in the old country had passed absolutely. The people in Britain were cordially in sympathy with the vigorous active democracies of the new countries. He was convinced when Ireland got Home Rule, we might see the people of that country as proud of the Empire, as sympathetic to the great Dominions, and rendering as useful service as any other portion of the Kingdom to the progress and welfare of the Dominions overseas.
