



DECLARES BLOCKADE.

LONDON, March 29. Allied warships have declared a ockade of the Candia coast, says he Times' Athens correspondent and are allowing no vessels to enter or leave port. This step was taken ollowing the alleged discovery in crete by landing parties from French and British ships, that German agents were actively storing and shipping supplies to Austro-German submar-ines. 



Soldier Hero.

(Continued from 8th Page.) We advanced up a hill as best we ould and saw the Germans roll down on us like a cloud. At fifty vards distance they hoisted white flags, and it seemed that every man carried one went over to take them prisoners. when they fired point blank at us. and we had to escape the best way we could. It was the dirtiest-trick I ever

the trueches named after well known hotels and public houses. like the Cecil, the Savoy, the Ritz, Dirty Dick's Canteen, the Spaniards, Jack Straw's Castle, and the Cheshire Cheese

"After a lull of nearly two weeks during which enemy aeroplanes reminded us that we were not forgotten, things began to grow lively as Ypres

was reached." At Ypres the Brigade of Guards did great work, constantly shelled by the enemy's artillery. A shell dropped three yards from Crossingham and missed him. Eight men were blown to pieces on his right and left. He was almost buried alive through the sides of the trenches caving in. The dead and dying lay all around, and men stood firing with gaps between them. Another fellow and he called over to each other at night-time. It was well to have a comrade then.

An Insult to the Cow.

A funny thing happened somewhere near here. A man on outpost duty against a havstack saw something advancing in the darkness and shot it. lext morning they found the carcass of a cow. The sentry had observed the rule: "When' in doubt, shoot." The following verse was written about

> "One night at setting of the sun, A sentry shot a cow; He took her for a German Hun, And begs her pardon now."

"At La Basse," young Crossingham alculates, "the enmy's trenches were not more than ninety yards away. He could see the rising and falling of a shovel in a German trench. When we fired at it and missed, the soldier waved his shovel, as if to say, 'Try

"An officer spotted him, and teleshoned to the artillery. A moment ater the shovel rose higher than be-

fore, and the Hun rose with it." The young guardsman fought his ast battle at La Basse, having just passed his sixteenth birthday. To reach the trenches, they waded waistleep in water, and their teth clattered in their heads. The frost bit the soles of their feet, causing holes in which half-crowns could have been hid. Dead men lay half buried in the

"When the water rose to my armpits I thought I should have died without the enemy's help-drowned like a dog. At last I reached the firing-line, where the water was shallower—only knee-deep. It was Christmas, but not very Christmassy. La Basse buckled me up. The rheumatism got me, and I fell over. Mates helped me out, where the water was shallower-only led me up. The rheumatism got me. delirious with fever. A hospital in Boulogne and another across the Channel at Norwich set me right again, though I limped for some time

afterwards." His Narrow Escapes,

It was at this stage of his military career that Harold's parents, having lost one son at the Front, appealed for his discharge on account of his youth; but he was so keen still on wearing khaki that they allowed him to joint again for home service.

Through all his hardships and dangers Private Harold Crossingham passed without a wound. A bullet travelled through his valise lengthwist. Had it come dead on, Harold reflects that he would have been a "dead-un." Another bullet cut a groove along a button. He modestly tells, how along with

another fellow, he crawled a hundred yards : a field while the bullets whipped the tops off the turnips, and brought a wounded officer back to the

"But," says Crossingham, "if V.C.'s and D.C.M.'s were given for such deeds as that, there would not be enough medals to go round."
