SITUATION MORE HOPEFUL. LONDON, March 27.

(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)-The Times reveiwing the situation last evening, says that it is more hopeful than since the battle began, but is still exceedingly grave; for though the enemy's rush in the northern section is apparently held, it is clearly a race

The enemy south of the Somme has crossed the 1916 Allied line from near Bray to near Roye. Southeast of Roye they are still well within the 1916 line, and this is the point that gives the most anxiety, but also the most ground for

Having slowed down in the attempt to cut through the British line further north where such desperate resistance was offered, the Gernans have now reclaimed virtually all the territory they held at the begining of the battle of the Somme in 1916.
