

Must Take Their Medicine.

(From the Montreal Gazette.) But refiners must be prepared to take the risk of trade. Their case is unfortunate and unusual. Not often does the bottom fall out of the market of a staple commodity in the short space of a few weeks, as has happened to sugar. But the public interest is supreme, and no greater folly can be committed than to fly in the face of public opinion, which in this particular instance is wellnight unanimous and immovable. The Board of Commerce was wrong in hampering the operations of refiners a year ago; it is equally wrong in rescuing the refiners now. At what point does the Board of Commerce propose to stay its hand? The sugar refiners' case may be acute, and of an exceptional character, but other manufacturers are confronted with prospective losses on stocks in hand by reason of declining prices. Have not these manufacturers an equal claim to paternal intercession to protect them against loss by prohibition and imports? At what point is Government intervention justified, and at what point should it cease? The answer is obvious. There should be no intervention against the natural current of prices. Markets rise and fall in accordance with supply and demand; merchants and manufacturers take the risk of profit or loss; and by no sound rule nor to any ultimate advantage can the authority of any branch of Government be exercised in the regulation of market prices. If sugar can be imported below Canadian refiners' prices, the refineries must meet the competition. They made money on the rising prices and must accept the consequences of declining prices. Above all, the whole is greater than the part, and the whole is pocket of the Canadian people.





Transparent Marble.

Experience shows that marble cut into thin sheets, 0.02 to 0.01 inch thick, is sufficiently transparent to be used instead of opal glass for electric light shades. Such sheets, however, are too thin for use, but by a special treatment with oil, at a high temperature and pressure, marble shades can be made transparent and give beautifully clear effects. Comparing the transparency and diffusive properties of such marble sheets and opal glass, it was found that the amount of high transmitted was approximately the same in both cases, but that the diffusive power of marble was distinctly better- 55 to 11 in one case and 70 to 60 in another.

LONDON GOSSIP.

THE HAPSBURGS REVIVED.

LONDON, Oct. 2nd, 1920. We are suddenly threatened not only at Budapest but even at Vienna with

attempts to restore the Hapsburg dynasty in the person of the ex-Kaiser Karl. At Budapest the Magyar magnates, undoubtedly encouraged by M. Paleologue's recent project to mobil the Magyar army against the Bolshevists, talk openly of their intentions to flout the Supreme Council. In Vienna the Hapsburg partisans, bearing in mind the strong German Social mocratic Party, which is anti-monarchical, though anxious for reunion with the German Republic, are proceeding more cautiously, but that other interests beyond the dynastic to promote is inconceivable. And Karl's refusal to renounce his rights as Emperor of Austria in order to become once more King of Hungary lends point to Count Czernin's probable orientation.
