## German Girls Prefer Strike Pay to Work.

ESSEN, May 3. (A.P.)—Thousands of women and girls have been thrown out of work due to the closing of factories in the Ruhr as an outcome of French and Belgian occupation, but nevertheless domestic are as difficult to acquire as in the cities of the United States. This is largely due to the fact that the women and girls draw strike funds of one kind or another, either from the municipalities or from the Berlin government which usually amount to more than they would receive for household services.

In many instances the women are furnished lodging and food by the authorities, and in addition, as part of the passive resistance program, they get a weekly allowance of marks as pin money. Near Essen an old German barracks has been converted into a sort of camp for unemployed women, and in this place alone more than 400 women are quartered.

German say there was never a time in recent years when servants were so scarce as to-day. The French and Belgian officers' families now in the Ruhr and Rhineland have the greatest difficulty in requisitioning cooks, maids and nurses, and often have to pay a premium to the German women as an inducement to come and work for them.

## Dog Acts as Mother to Young Lion.

BERLIN, May 3 (A.P.)—Berlin's Zoo is probably more successful than any other in the world as a breeding place for wild animals. While it lost many inhabitants during the war, care was taken to keep pairs, and the cages are gradually being restocked with animals born in captivity.

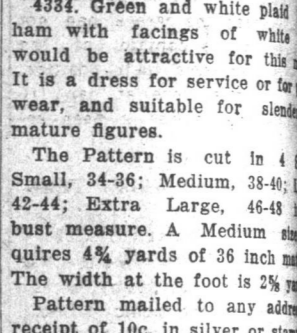

#### SHIFF'S SPIRIT SPEAKS.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31. Arthur Canon Doyle's declared a message from Lord North-

cliffe's spirit saying that only a wave of spiritual reform can save the world from plunging headlong into a catastrophe which will make the world war seem insignificant. The American people are too busy, Northcliffe said, and that was the mistake he made in his lifetime. He understands now that wisdom is lost in the scramble for progress, and when men lose wisdom they invite disaster. Sir Arthur also declared he had received other messages from the spiritual world which verify the statements made by Northcliffe's spirit, some going so far as to predict that disaster will descend during his lifetime.

#### TO COMMEMORATE LOUISBURG.

OTTAWA, May 31. A national park, commemorating the place of Louisburg in the history of Canada, is to be established at Louisburg, it was announced here. Much of the land required for the memorial has been acquired by the Committee and plans are being completed for the establishment of a park and suitable monuments.

#### THE CASUALTIES.

BERLIN, May 31. Forty persons were killed during the recent disturbances in Ruhr, and at least three hundred wounded are still receiving hospital treatment. The men at nine of the mines are still on strike.

#### NEGOTIATIONS FOR CAPTIVES' RELEASE ENTERING FINAL STAGES.

TSAOCHWANG, May 31. Negotiations for the release of the twelve remaining captives held by the Shantung bandits on Paoanlu mountain are entering the final stage and it is expected all will be free within a week.

#### BUSH FIRES IN ONTARIO.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., May 31. Flames from bush fires have entered White River from the East and the people are taking flight, according to information received here. A special train is being loaned to remove them from the danger zone. This afternoon a favorable wind was helping the fire fighters to stave off the danger, but residents and householders' effects were in readiness to depart by special train at a moment's notice.

#### INCREASING THE OUTFIT.

SYDNEY, N.S., May 31. A total of fourteen thousand, three hundred and eighty-five tons of coal were raised yesterday by the Dominion Coay Company compared with eight thousand three hundred and eighty-nine tons on the same date last year.

#### TESTIFY IN BRUCE'S FAVOUR.

SYDNEY, N.S., May 31. Six witnesses called by the prosecution in the case of Malcolm Bruce, Toronto, whose preliminary hearing opened this morning in connection with the Attorney General's charge of seditious utterances at the Glace Bay mass meeting, declared they had not heard Bruce make seditious references to the British flag.

#### CANADA AND THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

OTTAWA, Ont., May 31. The King's birthday, which falls on Sunday this year will be observed on Monday by official proclamation. Parliament will not sit that day.

#### HOW FRENCH SECURED REICHSBANK FUNDS.

BERLIN, May 31. That Ruhr banks are opening in a state of tense preparedness against French seizure of their funds is revealed in a statement issued by Vice President Von Glasenaph of the Reichsbank. He explains the precautionary measures which were in effect in the Essen branch of the Reichsbank when ninety-two million marks were seized recently. Learning that a seizure might be attempted the bank installed a sort of burglar alarm running from the main entrance during banking hours and a watchman to set the alarm in action the moment he detected anything suspicious outside. When the alarm was sounded all the vaults were to be locked and the keys hidden. On the day of the seizure the watchman was on guard as usual but the moment the bank opened in the morning two French detectives in civilian clothes sprang through the doorway and overpowered him. By this time a number of persons had entered the building who held up bank employees at the point of revolvers. Then they proceeded to complete the seizure.

ern members of Congress, such a migration of agricultural labor from the South to the North as to cripple the South seriously. Senator Dial of South Carolina has just taken the question up with Secretary of Labor Davis and the Italian Ambassador, and is trying to make arrangements to secure for the South large quantities of agricultural labor from North-

ern Italy. Senator Dial has received favorable assurances and believes his efforts will have effective results. It is declared that immigration restriction by this country has caused a shortage of common labor in industrial centres and that this is really responsible for the South's troubles. In consequence, it is further said, demand will arise from southern





**City Water Supply.**

SAMPLES FROM WINDSOR LAKE TESTED.

Within the past couple of weeks many citizens were complaining of a disagreeable odor and peculiar taste from the Windsor Lake water supply. The attention of the authorities was drawn to this matter through the columns of the Evening Telegram, and very promptly the Municipal Council communicated with Mr. Davies, the Government Analyst, who immediately visited the Lake, and made an examination. The following report submitted by Mr. Davies will, it is hoped, tend to allay the fears of citizens generally:—"Samples of water taken from Windsor Lake on May 28th and tested at my Laboratory on May 30th, were found to be contaminated with organic matters of vegetable origin (there is not the slightest evidence of contamination with organic matters of animal origin)."

"Though there are undoubted evidences of vegetable contamination I do not think there is any cause for alarm, as this condition of the water is purely temporary and due to what is known as the 'Spring Turn Over'. During the long winter months, when the surface of the Lake is covered with a thick sheet of ice, the lowest or bottom layers of water remain, more or less, stationary, and as there is a good deal of vegetable matter deposited on the Lake bottom, the lowest layers in time become contaminated."

"When the thaw sets in, in the spring, the surface ice melts and the temperature of the surface layers of water gradually rises to about 39 degrees F., at which point water is at its heaviest."

"The surface layers then sink to the bottom, and the bottom layers rise to the surface, and for a few weeks our drinking water may be slightly contaminated with vegetable matter. In a short time the high winds to which the Lake is exposed thoroughly aerate, and purify the water, and for the rest of the year, we, in St. John's, are fortunate in having a pure supply of drinking water right at our doors."

Professor Davies' statement "although there are undoubted evidences of vegetable contamination, I do not think there is any cause for alarm," shows that the complaints of citizens were well founded. Mr. Davies' Report however, is based on samples taken at Windsor Lake, and whilst this might show that the source of supply is safe, it does not prove that the water does not become contaminated before reaching the houses in the city. A test of samples taken from taps in different sections of the town should be made for it may be stated that "the disagreeable odor and peculiar taste" is much more pronounced in some sections than in others.



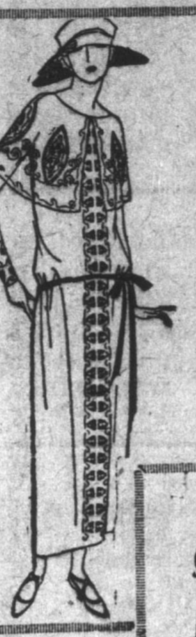

Attention has been aroused and held more forcefully than ever during the past weeks on the need of greater effort on behalf of our city and country. How it that? We might well call it Empire Week for the Empire of which we form a part as "Britain's Oldest Daughter," can only have security in the days to come through the care and training afforded to the young. We read of the work of the Rotarians or preferably the work they hope to do and we listen to an address delivered in eloquent tones to a few whose hearts the Lord has touched and mark you they were the words of the Master of men and "Not one of them shall fall to the ground but shall spring up and bear fruit some thirty, some sixty and some a hundred fold."

Then those interested in Child Welfare have a Tag Day and who shall estimate the good the Child Welfare Association will accomplish despite the fact that the care and oversight of the child can only be followed to a certain age.

Thursday brings Girl Guide Day with its wonderful display of beauty and effect, true, we could have desired to see and hear more from the patrols, and done with less of artistic setting which must have entailed not only long hours of practice and labor but expense, one often wonders if in our desire to please we sometimes overstep. We are reminding ourselves of the disciples of old, who when Mary spent so much on a box of spikenard said, "might it not have been sold and given to the poor?" The "poor" in this case being the Guides who are expected to be unable to procure their own equipment!

Do we attempt to reckon the possibilities of such a movement and are we forgetting the Scouts whose quiet work which has not received the backing of the men of this city as has its sister movement that of men and women. Looking back over the years one sees much accomplished but bear, dear me, how long shall we yet take to wake right up. We have a City Council, a Fire Department well equipped and yet in our city the drains reek and we wonder and thank God that it is a hilly city for thus and thus only, when the plentiful rain descends, are the germs washed into the sea instead of blowing into our homes. Why do not the mothers request that the drains be flushed each morning; the fire engines and the watering carts might combine and help us out if we appealed to the heads of those Departments—but we only grumble and let it go. Wake up, wake up my sisters!

Now I will just touch a sore, the healing of which is slowly coming! First, the Physician, on being called examines his patient—it may be by probing deeply, then he may take the temperature of the patient. If it happens to be a lady, often he smiles, writes a prescription "just to please her," and ascribes the trouble to "nerves" right here I ask may a woman who has earned her own living from early years, perhaps has brought up a family (they did not come to this planet as do the leaves and flowers, painlessly) in most cases with little or no help in all the making and mending, cooking, washing (not by electricity or with "set in tubs") and ironing have "nerves" as well as the men who need as much consideration because they work for say, eight or ten hours a day to earn a living for their own children? Certainly we do not question that the woman earns here! She often burns the midnight oil mending or making in order that the boy or girl in whom she centres her ambitions may be as well dressed at school as the "other fellow," while dear father smokes happily the pipe of peace and then retires to his well-earned rest, leaving her to follow at will and rise early enough to have a good breakfast for him before he goes forth to the hard world once more. This reminds me of a long-drawn-out sermon in that I have drifted from my theme which was "a sore."

To resume with humble apologies. The "sore" is this—there are to-day in St. John's, not to speak of the other sections of our land, girls of the "teen" age who must be placed as speedily as we can in a Training Home, or spread moral, mental and physical ruin, and thus retard and in some cases make of no effect the good work being done by Child Welfare, Girl Guides, Scouts and Brigades—I write advisedly; I know whereof I affirm.

We have an Association who are doing what they can, but we must have every girl, every woman, every man and every boy who loves her or his country interested. Attend the meeting soon to be held and hear what YOU, YOU, YOU can do.

**Baby Week**

**BABY IN HOT WEATHER**  
Baby will thrive especially during the warm days when there are breezes to keep him cool. His mother must be on her guard to keep baby free from summer complaints. It is not good for baby to be in state of perspiration, particularly about the head, so that it is well to see that his clothes are loose during a hot spell, and that he is in weight and few in number, and bonnets are very best. Baby will not need them if he is out of the sun. Let him sleep in a perambulator in a shady spot, but must go out in the sun with him with a canopy.

Baby will sleep better during the night if his cot is placed in a current of air, with a free draught round it and facing away from the strong light of early summer mornings.

**CLEANLINESS ESSENTIAL**

Great care is necessary with baby's food in hot weather. Baby is naturally fast, wanting cooler, while with bottles the utmost cleanliness is essential, and every precaution be taken to keep the milk cool, and free from contamination. When living in towns it is also wise to bring the milk to the immediately it arrives, cool it with running water, stand in a pan of cold water in a cool place with a square piece of muslin ranged that the four ends are in the cold water.

Mothers sometimes forget that baby is very grateful for frequent drinks of cooled boiled water during a hot spell, and also sponging of the hands and feet with lukewarm water when he needs it. But it is very dangerous to give baby a wash or a drink of quite cold water when he is heated.

**At the City Hall.**

Weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Messrs. Vincombe, Collier and were present. The preliminary business being disposed of, the following matters were given attention:

Communication was tabled from the Secretary of the G. W. Memorial, Garrison Hill, in

which he referred to the necessity of having some of the poles used as stays for the Street Railway and also telephone poles removed. During the week several of the poles which were in the way of the improvements being made at this place, were taken away, but as the removal of the poles carrying the conduit lines would involve a large expenditure, the Council could not see its way clear to arrange for same. A contribution has been promised the Association towards the improvements made, but finances will not warrant

a larger outlay. A largely signed petition was received from the residents and business people along Duckworth Street, protesting against what they considered a very unsatisfactory street sprinkling service. They also called attention to the fact that vendors from the nearby settlements, after disposing of their products, throw hay, moss, boughs, etc., along this street, which gives it an untidy appearance. The Sanitary Supervisor was instructed to arrange to have the main traffic thoroughfares of the city

given better attention as regards sprinkling, and is also to see that the sweepings are regularly and promptly carted away. In many cases the Department is censured for work for which they are not responsible, particularly as regards the above, as same is strewn around after the Department has made its daily rounds. C. F. Garland suggested that the handrail on the west side of Carter's Hill be removed, and that concrete steps and centre rail (similar to that on Garrison and Court House

Hills) be erected. The Council is unable to carry out this suggestion. Thos. Kennedy applied for position as timekeeper on Municipal Works. The Council has no work of this kind to offer, but the application will be placed on file. C. J. Dutoit, on behalf of the Methodist Guards Band, asked permission to hold band concerts in Banerman and Victoria Parks during the coming season. This matter was left in the hands of the City Clerk, as it is more than likely the other Brigades will send in their applications in due course, and the matter will then be dealt with and arrangements made as heretofore. Mr. George Hampton complained of conditions near his residence, Mundy Pond Road. The matter was referred to the Sanitary Supervisor for immediate attention. R. W. Horn asked that water service be extended to his dwelling, Alandale Road. The applicant is to be asked to call at the City Clerk's Office and make the necessary arrangements as regard installation and supply. In the matter of Fish Vendors from the nearby outports throw offal all into the city surface drains and gutters, the Health Officer reported instructions had been given the inspectors to look into same, and the guilty parties will be promptly dealt with. Rev. Dr. Facey stated that he could not, as Principal of the Theological College, Forest Road, withdraw his protest against the erection of machine shop and garage by the Church-hill Marine Engineering Works in that vicinity. He considered such an erection near the College would be a serious cause of annoyance to the students. The protest of the Rev. gentleman and also the application sent in by Mr. Churchill were referred to the City Solicitor. The application of G. E. Taylor to have the sidewalk, Patrick Street, properly graded, was referred to the City Engineer. The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer, and conditional upon the applicants conforming to the Municipal Act:—Mr. J. Smallwood, (annex) LeMarchant Road; P. O'Mara, (new building) Water Street. A. Samuelson, Southside, asked permission to erect dwelling, and George Payne to build garage, Bonclody Street. Permits were withheld, until ground plans are submitted. The question of repairs to the fish market, Steer's Cove, were discussed. As this building is in very bad condition, it was thought advisable to have same replaced by a new market, and the City Engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for next meeting. Councillor Ryan called attention to the necessity of having a dam built at the Mundy Pond River, which he stated would be of great benefit for fire fighting purposes, particularly in view of the water mains not being extended to that locality. The Engineer is to submit estimate of cost of this undertaking. Report of Health Officer for the week showed 18 new cases of Scarlet Fever and three of Diphtheria. Some time ago the City Engineer reported that the old 24 main at Muldowney's Hill was very much corroded, and that it would be necessary to lay a new line of pipe for a distance of some two thousand feet. This work is most urgently needed, and must be undertaken if ample water supply is to be maintained for protection of the city in case of a conflagration. The required quantity of pipe arrived by the S. S. Digby during the present week, and ar-

rangements are now being made to begin the work with as little delay as possible. The City Clerk submitted report on Revenue received during the past few weeks. A great number of motor cars have been registered, but there are still a number of owners and drivers who have not complied with the Regulations. The police are obtaining information with regard to these parties, and summonses will be issued in the course of a few days. It was brought to the notice of the Council that the fencing around vacant property, Duckworth Street, east of the Custom House, should be repaired. The owners of the land will be notified to have this fence made secure immediately. The oiling of streets was talked over. Much as the Council would like to use the Tarris treatment on a larger scale than heretofore, their restricted finances make it impossible to do so. The upkeep of the city works—both repairs and new construction—must be paid for out of the Current Revenue, which at its best is insufficient to meet this season's supply of Tarris is to be placed, and same will be used to the best advantage. Reports of the City Engineer, Plumbing Inspector and Sanitary Supervisor were tabled. Requisitions for several departments were granted, and the accounts for week ordered paid. The meeting then adjourned.

Leach to explain how eleven barrels of wine they had been assigned to watch after a liquor raid changed to water between 6 p.m. January 23, and 10 o'clock next morning. The liquor had been confiscated by prohibition agents, who found when they came to cart it away, that despite the vigilance of the patrolmen on guard, water had been substituted in eleven of the barrels.

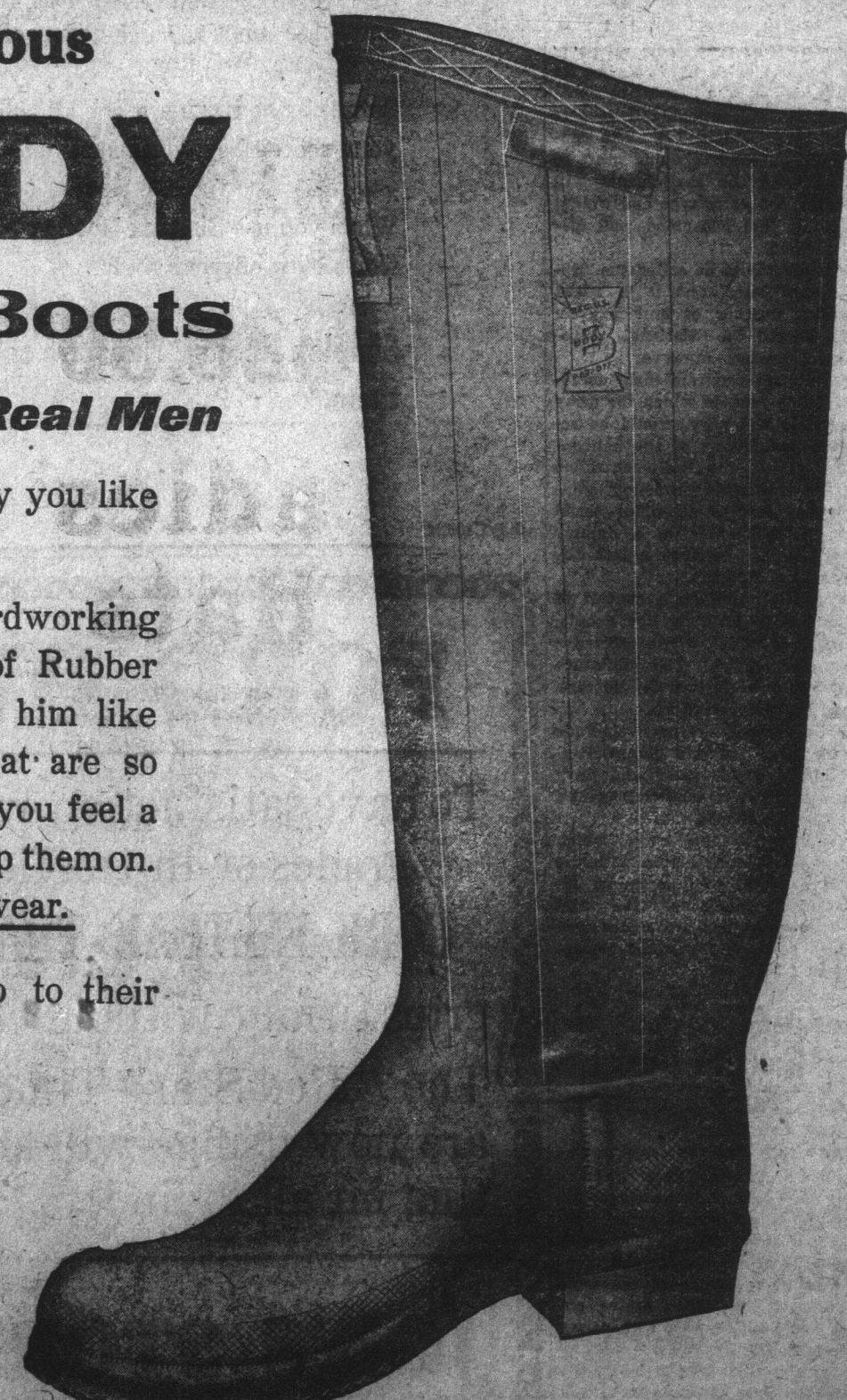

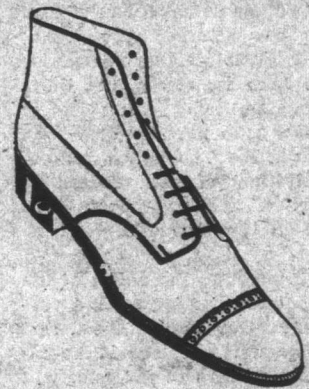

### Says Education Would Check Negro Movement Northward

Oxford, O., May 27.—(A.P.)—The providing of means for the education of the negroes is one way to keep them in the southern states and check the alarming movement of the blacks northward, is the opinion of Dr. H. C.

Minnich, head of the State Normal College, Miami University in a statement made here upon his return from a tour of the negro educational institutions of the south. According to Dean Minnich, one-third of the negro population of the state of Georgia has migrated to northern states.

Dean Minnich said that unless the negroes are educated in the south they will continue to move northward. His tour, he said, showed conclusively that the attitude of southern whites has changed from that of hostility to friendship in the matter of education of the negroes. It also showed that the standard of these negro educational institutions is steadily rising and that the number of students matriculated in these various institutions is growing by leaps and bounds.

Chicago, May 29.—(A.P.)—California Pieterje Bloom Mead, a pure bred Holstein cow, owned and bred by the University of California, has just completed a year test which makes her the sixty-seventh Holstein in the United States to produce over 1,000 pounds of butterfat in one year. In 365 days she produced 35,226 pounds of milk containing 1,044.82 pounds of butterfat, according to official announcement from the Holstein Association of America. This fat production is equal to 1,255.77 pounds of butter.

MAIDSTONE, Kent May 4.—(A.P.)—Education on a large scale is being organized for the prisoners here. There are 18 prisoners in the French class, 17 in the shorthand class and seven in the book-keeping class.

### Tris Speaker's Training Rules Ban Cigarettes.

CLEVELAND, May 30.—(A.P.)—A rigid training rule laid down by Tris Speaker, manager of the Cleveland Indians, prohibits players from smoking cigarettes or drinking anything stronger than one-half of one percent. The veteran manager-still believes physical fitness offsets minor playing defects. He expects his men to be the stumbling block of all 1922 pennant aspirants.

The Cleveland outfield, with Speaker in center, Summa in right, and Jamieson in left, is at least on a parity with any in the league, in the opinion of Speaker. He regards Summa as the greatest outfielder found by a major league club since Ty Cobb marched out of Georgia to fame in the baseball pennant wars. In Jamieson he has the "triple-threat" excellent fielder, heavy hitter and ideal lead-off man.

In the infield Speaker admits the attacking force is not so great as when Stuffy McInnis was at first and Gardner at third, but the present initial and far corner sackmen, Guisto and Lutake are expected to offset in great defence, what they may lack in offense. Another valuable addition to the Indian camp is Glenn Myatt, former Milwaukee American Association catcher, who now alternates with Steve O'Neil in catching and waiting for a pinch hitting opportunity.

While not claiming a great pitching staff, Speaker says he has a good lot of pitchers and an exceptionally strong force of substitute players, and pinch hitters. In the outfield as substitutes he has Brower, formerly of Washington, who is also a first baseman, and Joe Connolly, both classy fielders and heavy hitters. Infield substitutes include Gardner at third, and Stephenson at short or third. Five heavy batsmen are thus available as pinch hitters.

Speaker, who says he will never be a bench manager, still has his habit of drawing two lines in the dirt before the plate and knocking the dirt from the cleats of his shoes before taking his position at the plate.

### Plans Made for Great Aviation Meet Next Fall.

ST. LOUIS, May 26.—(A.P.)—A "free-for-all" air race, from all parts of the country with St. Louis as its objective, is on the tentative program of the international air race to be held here October 1-3. The contest would be open to flying craft of all kinds, and the participants will be handicapped as to type and weight of machine, fuel consumed, and distance covered.

The contest is to be called the "Onto-St. Louis" race, and it is hoped to have a number of entries from Canada, should the National Aeronautic Association approve.

The tentative program also includes a dirigible race, in which the army and possibly the navy, would be represented; exhibitions of the helicopter and glider, the radio-controlled plane, the reversible propeller; glider launched from a dirigible; aerial combats and bombing of a dummy fort; and a race between a fast dirigible and an airplane.

There also would be a contest of airplane models built by Boy Scouts, the winner of which would receive a \$5,000 silver trophy. The miniature planes would be driven by motors, operated by compressed air.

Other proposed features include races for army training planes owned by civilians, for army and navy entries, for light commercial planes, and for larger planes.

The Pulitzer Trophy race, which will be held in conjunction with the meet, is expected to take on an international character for the first time, as negotiations are under way to induce some of the noted European flyers to enter.

### Concealed Machine Guns to Guard Bank Treasures.

CLEVELAND, May 27.—(A.P.)—The new Fourth Federal Reserve Bank building here is rapidly nearing completion, and it will be ready for occupancy about June 1. The building has many details of architecture and ingenuity that make it one of the most remarkable in the United States, architects and builders say, with safety and strength the keynote.

The main vault is 39 feet below the street level. Side and rear walls are six feet thick. The front wall is seven feet thick and has the heaviest door in the world. The vault is designed to hold upward of two billion dollars in gold and securities, according to D. C. Wills, chairman of the board.

The first floor, for the transaction of public business, is finished in Italian marble. Customers can lock themselves behind iron bars when transacting business with a teller.

A gallery of armour plate surrounds the first floor, with loopholes from which guards can see everything occurring below.

Truck driveways lead directly into the mail room. It cannot be "rushed."

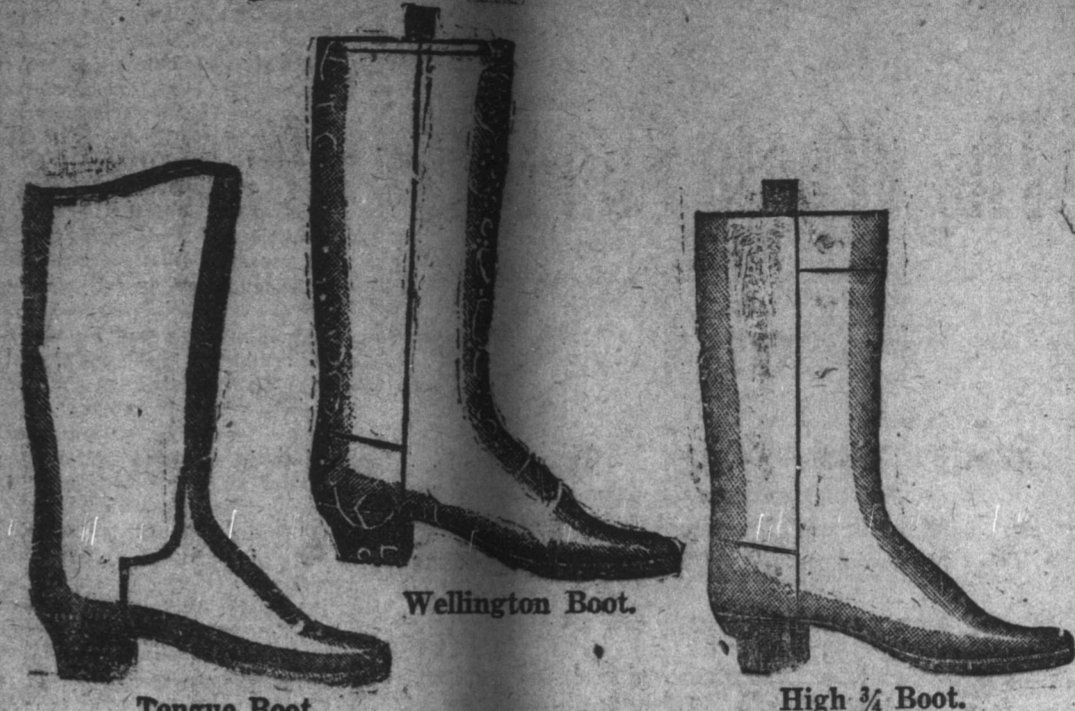
**Canadian Poet for Labrador Gold Fields.**

OTTAWA, May 29.—Lloyd Roberts, author, essayist, short story writer, and poet is leaving for Labrador shortly. Accompanying a party that has been attracted by the lure of gold, Lloyd Roberts is seeking material of another color, in more senses than one. He hopes to secure material that will serve to point a moral and adorn a tale in the furtherance of his ambitions as one of the Dominion's rising young literateurs. The goal of Mr. Roberts and those whom he is accompanying, a party numbering six all-told is Stag Bay, Labrador, over 300 miles west of Belle Isle Straits, and a 1,000 mile sea trip from Halifax. At his home on the south shore of the Ottawa River, near McKellar townsite and with the high water of the river actually lapsing the doorstep, Mr. Roberts indicated the causes that had induced him to take the journey to a land about which, but for the work of Dr. Richard Grenfell, the world-famed medical missionary to deep-sea fishers, practically nothing might be known. The accidental finding by two men of traces of gold has resulted in a small expedition of prospectors being fitted out, and Mr. Roberts has been afforded an opportunity to accompany them, but for his own purposes entirely. The party expects to sail shortly. Apparently nothing will be heard from the party after leaving St. John's, Newfoundland, until it is established by means of drilling in the Big Brook area, whether or not gold is sufficiently plentiful to be attractive to many eager prospectors who are known to be awaiting results, when this news will be witnessed from Battle Harbor, Labrador, the nearest operating station.

**Our Water Supply.**

Dear Sir—Many complaints have been made by householders the past few weeks, about the water supply from Windsor Lake. The opinions expressed are that the water is contaminated by some deleterious matter and that when drawn from the tap it gives such a foul odor that one is left in doubt whether in its raw, unboiled state it is fit to drink or not. This week we have heard of several citizens who became seriously ill of dysentery by drinking the water and who had good reason to be convinced that there is some foreign matter in it that is injurious to health. They have refrained from drinking the water now unless it is first boiled. Others who have learned of their illness have taken warning and now drink it only after being boiled. After the spring freshets and the melting of the snow and ice the rivers and streams that feed the Lake, no doubt, precipitate a large quantity of decayed vegetable matter into Windsor Lake, and possibly this may account for the bad taste and odor of the water, or there may be a source of contamination in the reservoir. In any case we think that the affair is sufficiently serious to warrant the City Council in having the water analyzed. In an unboiled state it is either injurious to one's health, or it is not. An analysis ought to determine this. If there is no danger in drinking it unboiled the citizens should have that assurance from the Mayor through the Public Analyst. If, on the other hand, it is in its primitive state, the public should be informed so that all could take the precaution of either filtering or boiling it. It is a well-known fact that the water of Windsor Lake is at its maximum height in the spring. The margin of the Lake from ten to fifteen feet that has been high and dry all the rest of the year is then submerged. The public would like to have the assurance of the City Fathers that there is nothing on that margin now under water to cause contamination. The possibility of having bad water would be eliminated by having a proper filtering system at the intake like in other cities; but the cost of this, we are informed, would be so great and our water supply is so much better and purer than that of other cities for the greater part of the time, that the City Council would hardly be warranted in installing such an expensive system. A pronouncement from the Mayor on this particular case would, we assure him, be welcomed by the public.

**It May Not Be The Cow's Fault That The Milk Supply Has Fallen Off.**

If the milk runs short, we are apt to blame the cow, when possibly it is not in the least the cow's fault. The cause is probably deficiency in the food supplies. This matter is well worth looking into. For example, some time ago, some feeding tests were made on a farm with four sets of cows. The local Analytical Chemist reported that "the cows fed on Molassine Meal increased in weight and the butter fats increased from 3.06 to 5.2. There was also a large increase in the amounts of nitrogen in the manure, and in this and every other respect the analysis came out better on cows fed on Molassine Meal than those on other food stuffs." ## "Just Tony."

It is Mix who taught Tony to charge crowded drawing-rooms, to dash up slippery staircases, to throw his rider without trampling him, to follow a whistie, and to carry off a scene all by himself, directed by Mix in the wings.  
He has featured in twenty pictures. He has been taught to answer to a peculiar method of "reining" known only to his master; to none other will he respond. For this reason, there is no fear of his being stolen. Although, as horseflesh goes, he is worth only a negligible sum, Tony is insured for \$4,000.  
Whatever Tom Mix says "goes" with Tony; he is a hard worker, he understands every word, and condescends to obey—except after 4 p.m.  
Tony, in the words of Tom Mix, is a strict trade unionist, and a very rigid one. The ghosts of all his ancestors, with Tom Mix on his back, wouldn't make Tony shake a hoof after tea-time. He seems to know the hours, particularly around the mid-morning interval, and dinner-time.  
He Doesn't Like "Doughboys."  
Tony hates the air lights; he considers the out-of-door heat quite enough to go on with, and he and Tom often have a few words when it comes to an "interior" with the thermometer registering 100 degrees.  
In his off time, or when he feels indisposed to act, Tony occasionally "obliges" sculptors. In fact, provided Tom is smoking around somewhere in the background within earshot, Tony rather fancies himself as an artist's model and takes considerable interest and pride in his posse.  
There is a statue of him on one of the Washington squares, ridden by a "doughboy," but, oh that doughboy! He spent the first minute of the sitting on Tony's back; the second minute he was about ten yards away, having taken up an entirely unheard-of pose on mother earth.  
So, as Tony had to be obeyed, the doughboy was modelled separately, sitting on an old hack, and afterwards transferred to the back of the sculptured Tony! The live one certainly didn't take to the doughboy at all!  
Like Mary's Lamb.  
Tom Mix was born and brought up on a ranch, and he rode before he could walk. He served in the Spanish-American war as a mounted scout, and was with the United States Army during the Boxer rising in China.  
He is said to sleep in the saddle, but as the only saddle he fancies nowadays is Tony's, and Tony is a strict disciplinarian, this is probably not true.  
But the fact remains that, whenever Tom Mix is seen in the stables, he either rides in on Tony's back, or Tony paces nonchalantly behind him, his nozle in the small of Tom's back, ready, at a signal, to sit down beside his master, shake hands affably with his master's friends, and prepare for a friendly exchange of views with fellow "stars."
