CONTAGIOUS DISEASES. Letter from the Chairman of the He

To THE WORLD : Owing to the preva ence of diphtheria and other contagious liseases in the city, it is highly important that physicians and other citizens should be aware of the penalties attached to on-compliance with the law in such cases. The 18th and 19th sections of the public health act of 1882 make it imperative upon householders and physicians to advise the local board of health when any case of diphtheria, scarlet fever, smallpox, or any other contagious disease has manifested itself, and section 20 of the same act provides a penalty of \$20 for neglect of the same. Further provision is made for placarding houses in which any contagious disease exists, and unless the public observe the foregoing sections, the board have no other alternative than to take the most extreme preventive measures. In a few days every physician in the city will be supplied with full information on the subject and post cards for use in advising the commissioner of infectious cases. As the world has long ago decided that prevention is better than the latter than the subject and the sub word has long ago decided that prevention is better than cure, I conclude with an important paragraph taken from the pamphlet of instructions just issued by the chairman of the provincial board of health:
"Avoid exposure to special contagion of the disease," more danger for child than adults; do not, therefore, let a child go year

adults; do not, therefore, let a child go uear a case. Do not permit any person or thing, dog, cat or other animal, plaything letters, etc., to come direct from a case of these diseases to a child, unless previously disinfected under competent supervision. If you do visit a case, bathe yourself and change and disinfect your clothing before you go where there is a child. See that your a period of national depression, when the your residence, premises, are kept clean and dry; that the sewer connections are well trapped and drains well ventilat-ed. Never allow passages from persons sick with the disease to be placed in water closets or privies, but attend to as in section 8. Give special attention to purity of milk supply. creditably represent any constituency. [Cheers.] He touched upon the Pacific railway contract and the boundary question, which he declared were of more moment to us than the national policy. The liberal party had always been the party in favor of the maintenance of provincial rights, and their principles were always the same. [Cheers.] If returned on the 20th of June he would enjoy no feeling of pride greater than to declare his fealty to the leader of the liberal party, Edward Blake, [Loud cheers.] He believed, from the feeling manifested throughout the country, he believed it was the settled conviction, not only among their friends, but among uld carry the county.
