We notice by the New York Times that there is to be an arrival of Antarctic exploration. It appears that many scientific men believe that there should be a more thorough study of the various phenomena of these regions than has hitherto been possible.

As long as man lives, and the magic circles of the Arctic and Antarctic poles, remain the mysterious regions they are, no expedition will be fitted out money wasted, and lives sacrificed in the endeavor to overcome what now appear certain to be the insurmountable obstacles that intervene.

The Labrador Fisheries are a matter of some importance. The total catching capacity is only 5000 bbls, in comparison with 100,000 bbls, that have been taken in the fishery.

A female Salvation Army was disgracefully mobbed by a crowd of Queen blackguards on the 1st inst. The mayor of the city, much to his credit, did his best to stop such a display of intolerance and bigotry.

The St. John Board of Trade met on Monday last, and adopted the following resolution: "That a memorial be forwarded to the Dominion government from this board asking that in any contract to be made for the conveyance of mails, passengers and freight between England and Canada, the port of St. John shall be included with the view of making this port of the Atlantic terminal of the system of railways now approaching completion, and that no subsidy be given for contracts made with any line of steamers which shall terminate their voyages at any other port than St. John."

The coal shipments are about over for the season, says the North Sydney Herald. The loss of steamships plying between Gouville and Montreal cannot be replaced at this late season, consequently this mine will be lessened. Caledonia and Glace Bay are doing a fair business. The International and old Bridgeport will ship what they can to Montreal if they secure tonnage. The Levee does a fair business at this season with New-Foundland, Victoria and Sydney mines are not having as much tonnage by any means as they can handle.
