

FIRST SEDERUNT.

At the City of Winnipey, and within Knox Church there, Thursday the ninth day of June, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-seven years, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening :-

Which time and place the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met in accordance with appointment last year.

The Rev. J. K. Smith, D.D., the Moderator of last year, conducted Divine service, and preached a sermon from the Prophecy of Zephaniah, in the third chapter and sixteenth verse: "In that day it shall be said to Jerusalem, Fear not: and to Zion, Let not thy hands be slack," and with particular reference to the latter clause of the verse.

Dr. Smith then constituted the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the King and Head of the Church, with solemn prayer.

The Roll of the Assembly, compiled from the Rolls of Commissioners furnished by the several Presbyteries of the Church, was called, and the attendance marked as follows:

WITH SYNODICAL POWERS.

ADDRESS OF RETIRING MODERATOR.

Dr. Smith, the retiring Moderator, then addressed the Assembly, offering thanks for the honour done him last year by his election to the Moderatorship, and for the uniform consideration and courtesy which he had received from the members of the Assembly during his occupancy of the Chair, and then announced that the time had come for the appointment of a minister to preside, as Moderator, over the deliberations of this General Assembly.

ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

It was then moved by Mr. Robert H. Warden, of Montreal, seconded by Mr. C. B. Pitblado, of Winnipeg,—That the Rev. Robert Ferrier Burns, Doctor of Divinity, of Halifax, be chosen as Moderator of this General Assembly. There being no other nomination, Dr. Burns was elected by acclamation, was conducted to the Chair by Messrs. Warden and Pitblado, and proceeded to address the House at length, thanking the Assembly for the honour conferred upon him, claiming the usual privileges of the position in which he had been placed, and making extended reference to the state of the Church in the past, her present prosperous condition, and the encouraging and hopeful prospects which lay before her in the future.

REPORT ON LOYAL ADDRESSES.

Dr. Smith then presented a Dispatch from Captain Streatfeild, the Governor-General's Secretary, stating that the Address of the General Assembly of last year to Her Majesty the Queen, had been duly transmitted to be laid at the foot of the Throne, and covering a Dispatch from Mr. Stanhope, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, stating that the Assembly's Address had been duly laid before the Queen, who was much gratified by the expressions of loyalty and attachment which it contained. Dr. Smith submitted also a Dispatch from Captain Streatfeild, by order of His Excellency the Governor-General, covering a Dispatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, intimating that the petition of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, touching the

lt thanks arrangements between Her Majesty's Government and that of France with respect to the independence of the North-Hebrides, had been duly laid before the Queen, and that Her Majesty was pleased to receive it very graciously. There was submitted further a Dispatch from Captain Streatfeild, by order of His Excellency the Governor-General, acknowledging the Address of the General Assembly, and conveying His Excellency's cordial acknowledgments of the sentiments so highly expressed towards Lady Lansdowne and himself.

BEQUEST-MR. ANDREW MORRISON.

Dr. Smith further stated, in reference to a bequest to the Home and Foreign Mission Funds by the late Mr. Andrew Morrison, of Melbourne Township, in the Province of Quebec, in connection with which he was empowered to take all necessary steps to the completion of the matter, that he had given a power of attorney to the Rev. J. R. Mac-Leod, of the Presbytery of Quebec, to act in the case, and that through his diligence the matter had been brought to an issue satisfactory to all parties concerned, and that the sum of seven hundred and fifteen dollars and eighty-four cents (\$715.84) accruing from the estate had been placed in the hands of the Treasurer of the Church, to be equally divided between the Home and Foreign Mission Funds of the Church.

LETTER TO REFORMED CHURCH.

Dr. Smith also reported that he had carried out the instructions of last Assembly, in replying to a Letter from the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America.

ADDRESS ON AUGMENTATION.

Also, that in accordance with the instructions of last General Assembly, he had prepared an Address to the members of the Church in reference to the Augmentation Fund.

CERTIFICATE TO DR. JUNOR.

Also that, as instructed by last Assembly, he had sent to the Rev. K. F. Junor, M.D., late Missionary at Tamsui, Formosa, the certificate for which he had asked.

PROVINCIAL SYNOD, CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

The retiring Moderator further presented the following resolutions from the House of Bishops and the Lower House of the Provincial Synod of the Church of England in Canada:—

" Lower House.

"1. Resolved,—That this House do concur with the message from the Upper House on the subject of Christian union. Carried unanimously.

"2. Resolved,—That the Prolocutor be instructed to convey the resolution on Union, unanimously adopted yesterday, to the Moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly and to the presiding officers of other Protestant bodies."

The report of the retiring Moderator on all the matters foregoing was received, and thanks recorded for his diligence.

RESOLUTION-PROVINCIAL SYNOD-OHURCH OF ENGLAND.

The Assembly took up for consideration the resolution of the House of Bishops and the Lower House of the Provincial Synod of the Church of England in Canada, submitted last night, and recorded in the Minutes of the first Sederunt.

It was moved by Principal Caven, seconded by Dr. J. K. Smith, as follows,—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, deeply sensible of the evils of disunion in the Church of Christ, and their contrariety to the ideal of the Church, as presented in Scripture, and especially in our Lord's intercessory prayer, has heard with lively gratification of the action respecting Christian union adopted by the Provincial Synod of the Church of England in Canada, at its meeting in Montreal in September last; and the General Assembly hereby appoints a Committee to confer with any similar Committee which has been appointed or may be appointed by other branches of the Church of Christ in Canada, and to report to the next meeting of the General Assembly. The Committee shall be as follows:—The Rev. the Moderator, Dr. Pollok, T. Sedgwick, Drs. MacVicar, Moore, Grant, J. K. Smith, MacLaren, Reid, Caven, Proudfoot, Laing, Cochrane, King, and Mr. D. M. Gordon, Ministers; and Messrs. L. W. Johnston, J. K. Munnis, Hon. D. Fraser, J. Stirling, James Croil, G. Hay, Hon. A. Morris, W. B. McMurrich, W. M. Clark, James McLennan, Q.C., G. Rutherford, Dr. Fraser (of London), Hon. Justice Taylor, Elders.

The General Assembly accompanies this action with the prayer that the spirit of wisdom shall so direct any endeavour to secure the greater manifested unity of the Church of Christ, that truth and charity shall be equally promoted thereby, and the glory of the Church's Head advanced.

The Moderator now named the members to constitute the Committee under the resolution of Principal Caven, in the matter of the Resolution on Union, of the House of Bishops and the Lower House, of the Provincial Synod of the Church of England in Canada, and the names were ordered to be inserted in their proper place in Dr. Caven's resolution, which see in preceding Sederunt.

FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on French Evangelization. The Report was submitted by Principal MacVicar, presenting many interesting details of the prosperous condition of the work under the direction of the Board, including the Schools at Pointe-aux-Trembles, and urging the need of persevering and energetic efforts for the enlightenment of our fellow citizens in the Province of Quebec, and of more enlarged and liberal pecuniary contributions in support of this important Scheme of the Church. It was moved by Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Mr. Charles A. Doudiet, as follows,—Receive and adopt the Report, record the gratitude of the General Assembly for the continued success of the work under the care of the Board; approve of the decision of the Board as to the enlargement of the Schools at Pointe-aux-Trembles, and the establishment of a similar institution in the vicinity of Quebec, as soon as practicable, and cordially commend the Mission, together with this special undertaking, to the liberal support of the Church.

The Assembly engaged in praise, singing two verses of the 208th hymn in the Presbyterian Hymnal.

The consideration of the subject of French Evangelization was resumed, when the motion of Dr. MacVicar was supported by Mr. James Carmichael and Dr. J. K. Smith. The motion to receive and adopt the Report was then put to the House, and was carried unanimously.

ADDRESS OF MR. CHINIQUY.

The Moderator then, in a few appropriate words, introduced to the Assembly the Rev. Charles Chiniquy—the veteran Missionary of French Evangelization—who proceeded to address the House at length, giving details of his own experience in leaving the Church of Rome, and embracing the Gospel of Christ, apart from the superstitions by which his mind and life were before controlled, and speaking of his own knowledge of the conversion of his fellow-countrymen from Romanism to Protestant Christianity, and urging upon the Assembly the duty of the Church to prosecute with energy and zeal the great work committed to it in the Providence of God.

THANKS TO MR. CHINIQUY.

It was moved by Mr. R. H. Warden, seconded by Dr. J. K. Smith, and carried unanimously,—That the cordial thanks of the General Assembly be tendered to the Rev. Mr. Chiniquy for his address this evening.

EXCURSIONS.

Mr. James Robertson, Superintendent of Missions, announced that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and the Company of the Manitoba and North-West Railway had agreed to grant free tickets as far as Regina and other points, to members of Assembly who might wish to visit more distant localities, or the Indian Reserves, and to stop over at any station which they might desire; and that he (Mr. Robertson) was authorized by the Passenger-traffic Agents to issue certificates to members of Assembly who were prepared to avail themselves of the generous offer of said Companies. Mr. Robertson announced, also, the offer of special rates by the Canadian Pacific Railway to Vancouver.

Dr. Bryce again announced that arrangements were completed for the excursion to Kildonan to-morrow afternoon, as mentioned in the record of a former Sederunt.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at ten o'clock to-morrow morning, of which public intimation was given, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

FIFTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Winnipeg, and within Knox Church there, Saturday, the Eleventh day of June, one thousand, eight hundred and eighty-seven, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered, at the Moderator's request, by the Rev. John Stewart, the delegate to this Assembly from the Free Church of Scotland.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

REPORT ON ROLL.

Mr. R. H. Warden, from the Committee to Examine the Roll of the General Assembly, and to mark, and report on, any corrections which might be necessary, handed in and read a Report, recommending certain changes in said roll. The Report was received, its several clauses were considered seriatim, and, in accordance with its recommendations, the following corrections were made:—1. That the name of Mr. W. D. Russell be removed from the Roll of the Presbytery of Victoria and Richmond, and retained on that of Wallace. 2. That the name of the Rev. P. McF. MacLeod be removed from the Roll of the Presbytery of St. John, it being unconstitutional for a Presbytery to elect as Commissioner a minister on the Roll of another Presbytery. 3. That the name of the Rev. J. F. Dustan be removed from the Roll of the Presbytery of Halifax, it being unconstitutional to elect as a Commissioner one who is not an acting Elder. 4. That the name of Mr. Peter Nesbit be substituted for that of Mr. Cowan as Commissioner for the Presbytery of Whitby.

ADDITION TO COMMITTEE ON RETIRING MINISTERS.

On motion of Dr. John Thompson, the Assembly ordered the name of Mr. J. K. McDonald, of Toronto, to be added to the Committee to consider the applications for leave to retire from the active exercise of the ministry.

ORDINATION-MR. J. W. HEWITT.

Dr. Reid presented an application from the Presbytery of Barrie for leave to ordain Mr. J. W. Hewitt, a catechist at North Bay, under the inspection of the Presbytery. The application, with relative papers, was sent to the Committee, already appointed, to consider the applications on behalf of students.

DOCKET OF BUSINESS.

Dr. Cochrane, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, reported and read a classified docket of all the business to come before the Assembly to the end of the Session. On motion the report was received and adopted, and it was ordered that the docket be printed, and copies thereof furnished for the use of members of the Assembly.

" "PRESBYTERIAN RECORD."

Mr. R. H. Warden called attention to an omission in the list now submitted, in leaving out mention of the *Presbyterian Record*, and moved that the omission be supplied, and that the Report on the *Record*, now ready, be taken up on Monday afternoon. The motion was agreed to.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS, ETC.

On the recommendation of the Bills' Committee, it was agreed that the unfinished business of one Sederunt be proceeded with at the next, that the Report on Statistics be taken up on Tuesday afternoon, and that on the Home Missions on Tuesday evening.

COLLEGES.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Boards of Management of the several Colleges of the Church.

HALIFAX.—The Report of the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College at Pine Hill, Halifax, was presented in printed form by the Rev. Dr. Pollok, who dwelt at some length on the present condition of the College, stating the number of students in each year, saying that their prospects were never more hopeful than at present, giving

full information on the finances, and suggesting the steps desirable to improve the condition of the College Fund, and to equalize revenue and expenditure. It was then moved by Principal Grant, seconded by Dr. J. K. Smith, and agreed to, as follows: The General Assembly, having heard the Report of the Board of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, expresses extreme satisfaction with the large and unprecedented number of students in attendance; is pleased to know that the various classes have, under the recently introduced system of affiliation with Dalhousie University, been maintained with increased efficiency; is of opinion that the College is entitled to the continued confidence of the Church; expresses hope that the Synod of the Maritime Provinces may take efficient steps to carry into effect the proposed scheme of obtaining, by collections from congregations in the Maritime Provinces, the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), said amount being necessary on account of present engagements, and the diminution of profits from securities; and, in general, expresses deep thankfulness to God for the continuance of His favour to a College that has been the means of educating so large a proportion of the ministers and missionaries of our Church.

MORRIN.—The Report of the Governors of Morrin College was presented by Mr. A. T. Love, showing that of the twenty-five students in attendance, no fewer than fourteen were studying for the ministry of the Church; stating the literary standing taken by some of the students; speaking of the utility of the College as a Protestant institution; the inadequate remuneration of the present officers, and the desirableness that their friends would, in this regard, take the case into more serious consideration; and closing with the statement that the College had last year received from Sir George Stephen a donation of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500). It was moved by Mr. M. W. MacLean, seconded by Mr. Peter Wright, and agreed to, as follows,—That the Assembly has heard with gratitude of the success of this old Institution during the last year, the great stimulus it has given to Protestant education and the cause of the Church in Quebec, and recommend the Institution to the sympathy and liberality of the Church.

MONTREAL.—The Report of the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, was submitted in printed form by Professor Scringer, who dwelt briefly on the present condition of the College; representing the satisfactory results of last session; stating especially that six students had completed the ordinary course, and one a post-graduate course; and the gratifying fact that of the six first mentioned, five spoke both French and English; and stating in regard to finances that the sole indebtedness remaining was that on the building, and that that had been reduced during the year by twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200). The following resolution, moved by Professor Scrimger, seconded by Mr. J. B. Muir, was agreed to,—That Report of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, be received and adopted, and that the Board be authorized to appoint a Lecturer in Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, or Church Government, the salary not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500).

QUEEN'S.—The Report of the Trustees of Queen's University and College was presented in printed form by Principal Grant, who stated, especially, that the number of students last year was 372; that of these 191 were in the Arts Faculty, of whom seventy are students for the ministry of our own Church, and of whom fifty or sixty are willing to go as missionaries to any part of the world; that the staff has been strengthened by several tutors; and that, best of all, a devout, earnest and lofty spirit animates the great body of the students; and that, in regard to finance, it had been decided to raise an additional endowment of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), to be called the Jubilee Fund, in commemoration of the Queen's Jubilee, and the Jubilee of the University. It was moved by Principal Caven, seconded by Dr. John Thompson, and resolved as follows: The General Assembly adopts the Report, and expresses its extreme satisfaction with the increasing prosperity of Queen's University, and with the energy and

Furthermore, the Assembly rejoices in the success which has already attended the Jubileo Fund, which has been instituted to complete the equipment of the University, and recommends to the friends of Queen's the completion of the proposed endowment.

ASSEMBLY TO CONTINUE IN SESSION.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, it was agreed, on motion of Mr. Warden, to sit until the consideration of the Reports on our Colleges be completed.

KNOX.—The Report of the Board of Management of Knox College was presented in printed form by Principal Caven, stating that the Graduating Class at the close of last Session numbered eighteen, a greater number than in any one year since the establishment of the College of Montreal; that the appointment of Mr. R. Y. Thomson as Lecturer, as authorized by the Assembly, had given much satisfaction; expressing regret at an adverse balance in the Ordinary Fund, but that, on the other hand, encouraging progress had been made in the Endowment Fund; suggesting change in the closing day of the Session, and requesting that the Board of Examiners should be discontinued, and its duties transferred to the Senate. On motion of Principal Caven, seconded by Principal MacVicar, the L-port was received and adopted.

Manitoba.—The Report of the Board of Management of Manitoba College was presented in printed form by Principal King, stating that during the year the attendance of students had greatly increased, the total number being ninety-one, of whom fourteen were engaged in the study of Theology, forty-five in Arts and the remainder in the Preparatory Department, or Selected Classes; that five had graduated in Theology, who, it was hoped, would be a valuable addition to the labourers of the Church. Attention was also directed to the financial condition of the College, and the urgent need of increased revenue in order to its equipment and efficiency. It was moved by Mr. R. H. Warden, seconded by Mr. Thomas Sedgwick, and agreed to as follows,-The Assembly receives and adopts the Reports of the Board of Management and Senate of Manitoba College; expresses its great gratification at the increasing prosperity of the Institution, as shown both in the number of students in attendance, in the reduction of the debt in the course of the year; approves of the action of the Senate in opening the privileges of the College to female students; acknowledges gratefully the liberality of the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, the Free Church of Scotland and the Church of Scotland in the continuance of the grants of previous years; approves of the recommendation of the Senate empowering it to appoint Lecturers according to the terms of its request, provided the state of the College Funds justifies it, and again commends the support of the College to the congregregations of the Church.

COMMON COLLEGE FUND.

Mr. R. H. Warden laid on the Table the Report of the Common Fund for Colleges.

CHARTER - MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The Hon Justice Taylor submitted for the consideration of the Assembly the legal basis of the incorporation of Manitoba College, stating that the Act establishing the Institution made no provision for a Theological Department, and suggesting the expediency of taking necessary steps to bring this department now in operation, under similar legal sanctions with the enactments in regard to the literary foundation of the College. It was moved by Mr. Justice Taylor, seconded by Principal Caven, and agreed to,—That Mr. Justice Taylor, Rev. Dr. King, Rev. Messrs. Gordon and Pitblado, and Mr. W. B. McMurrich, be a Committee to prepare a resolution or by-law making provision for the education of students in Theology in connection with the College of Manitoba, in accordance with the requirements of Section Twelve of the Act incorporating the College, and submit the same to this Assembly.

The Clerk was instructed to acknowledge with thanks the courtesy of the Company in this regard.

YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

A communication under the hands of the President and General Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association of this city, cordially inviting the members of the General Assembly to use their Reading Rooms, and to make themselves at home in their Parlours situated on Main Street, corner of Alexander, was received and read. Also averbal message from St. Andrew's Society to a similar purport.

The Assembly accepted the invitations with thanks, and instructed the Clerk to make suitable acknowledgments.

The Assembly adjourned at half-past twelve o'clock, to meet again at ten o'clock on Monday next, which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

At the City of Winnipeg, and within Knox Church there, Monday, the Thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. John Gray, at the Moderator's request, offering prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read, and, with amendments, were sustained.

CHURCH PROPERTY-PUSLINCH, ETC.

Dr. Wardrope called the attention of the General Assembly to certain Church property in the Township of Puslinch, within the bounds of the Presbytery of Guelph, about which action of the Assembly was required. It was ordered that the papers in this case be sent to the Committee on Bills and Overtures to assign their consideration a place in the proceedings of the Assembly.

ALUMNI, KNOX COLLEGE, MEMORIAL OF.

The Assembly proceeded to take up unfinished business from Saturday, when there was presented and read a Memorial from the Alumni Association of Knox College, praying that they should be represented in the Senate of the College, by three members, nominated by the Association, and subject to appointment by the Assembly. The Memorial was supported by Dr. Thompson, of Sarnia. It was then moved by Dr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. J. B. Muir, and agreed to, —That the prayer of the petition of the Alumn Association of Knox College for representation in the Senate be granted in terms of their Memorial.

REFERENCES-SENATE, KNOX COLLEGE.

The Assembly took up a Reference from the Senate of Knox College, representing that a student who is at present in the preparatory course of the College, and who purposes to offer himself for work in the Foreign Mission Field, and has made inquiry of the Senate whether a course in medicine would be accepted by the Church in lieu of certain subjects in the literary course, and praying the General Assembly to take the subject into con-

Stirling, Principal Caven, Concener.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUNDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of Committees on the Funds for the Widows and Orphans of deceased ministers.

MARITIME PROVINCES.—The Report of the Committee on the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of deceased ministers in the Maritime Provinces, giving statements of the prosperous condition of the Fund, and the present number of annuitants, was submitted in printed form by Mr. T. Sedgwick. On motion of Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. E. Scott, the Report was received and adopted.

CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.—Dr. Reid, on behalf of Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal, submitted and read the Report of the Committee on the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of deceased ministers of the late Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, containing statements of the financial condition of the Fund and the number of annuitants. On motion of Mr. J. B. Muir, seconded by Mr. James Carmichael, the Report was received and adopted.

Canada Pressyterian.—Dr. Reid submitted and read the Report of the Committee on the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of deceased ministers of the late Canada Presbyterian Church, containing statements in detail of the financial condition of the Fund, and the names and number of annuitants. On motion of Dr. Reid, seconded by Dr. Cochrane, the Report was received and adopted.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUNDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of Committees on the Funds for Aged and Infirm Ministers.

Eastern Section.—The Report on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers in the Eastern Section of the Church was presented in printed form, and read by Mr. E. Scott, setting forth in detail the financial condition of the Fund, and submitting a series of regulations for the management of the Fund, for the consideration and approval of the Assembly. On motion of Mr. E. Scott, seconded by Mr. L. W. Johnston, the Report was received and laid on the table till after the joint meeting of the Committees, East and West, as ordered by last Assembly.

Westean Section.—The Report for the Western Section was submitted in printed form by Dr. Middlemiss, Joint Convener, who entered into detail in regard especially to the condition of the Fund, and the necessity of further exertions to increase the income of the Fund. On motion of Mr. J. K. Macdonald, seconded by Mr. James Quinn, the same disposal was made of this Report as of the preceding.

OVERTURES ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUNDS.

There was read an Overture, from the Synod of Hamilton and London, praying the Assembly to appoint one or more ministers or members to canvass the Church for the increase of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

BALAKLAVA-TRANSFERENCE.

There was submitted and read a Minute of the Presbytery of Saugeen, transmitted by the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, applying for leave to receive Balaklava Mission Station into said Presbytery from the Presbytery of Bruce. There was read also a communication from the Presbytery of Bruce, agreeing to the proposal to have Balaklava transferred to the Presbytery of Saugeen, with the request that the Presbytery of Saugeen make application to the Synod for the transference desired. On motion of Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Mr. Burson, the application of the Presbytery of Saugeen, agreed to by the Presbytery of Bruce, for the transfer of Balaklava, was granted.

PRESBYTERY OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

Dr. Reid presented and read a communication from the Rev. Moses Harvey, of St. John's, Newfoundland, in regard to the position of the Presbytery of Newfoundland, and asking whether it would be required that they should send up their Minutes, while acting as a quasi-Presbytery, for revision. On motion made and duly seconded, the Presbytery were instructed to forward their Minutes for revision to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces.

COUNCIL OF PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE.

There was presented and read a communication from Dr. G. D. Mathews, one of the Secretaries of the Alliance of Reformed Churches holding the Presbyterian system, in regard to the appointment of Delegates from this Church to the meeting of the Council of the Alliance in the City of London, England, next year, and suggesting the expediency of appointing such Delegates at this meeting of the Assembly. It was moved by Dr. Mathews, seconded by Dr. J. M. King,—That the Assembly now proceed to nominate Delegates to the London Council; that the lists be printed, and that the voting shall take place at a subsequent Sederunt, to be fixed by the Assembly. Amendments were proposed, but before taking a vote were withdrawn, and the motion of Dr. Mathews was carried. The Assembly then proceeded to make nominations in terms of the motion, when thirty-two ministers and thirty elders were named for election.

VOTING NOT LIMITED.

It was moved by Dr. Caven, duly seconded and agreed to,—That in voting, members of Assembly shall not be limited to the nominations now made, but shall be at liberty to cast their ballots in favour of any minister or elder of the Church.

It was agreed that the balloting for the election of Delegates be the first order of the day for Wednesday morning.

MANUAL OF DOCTRINE AND POLITY.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed last year, to draw up a Summary of the Doctrine and Polity of the Church, for the information of the members of the Church and others; and also, the Report on a formula to be used for the admission of members into the communion of the Church. The Reports not being forthcoming the Assembly proceeded to the next order of business.

NEXT ASSEMBLY.

The Assembly proceeded to the order of the day, namely, to fix the time and place for the meeting of the next General Assembly. It was moved by Principal Grant, seconded by Mr. George Hay, that the meeting of next Assembly be held in the City of Halifax. It was moved, in amendment, by Dr. Gregg, seconded by Mr. J. R. MacLeod, that the meeting of next Assembly be held in the City of Toronto. It was moved in

A first vote was taken between Kingston and Toronto, when fifty-five voted for the former and seventy-one for the latter. It was then moved, in further amendment. by Mr. Thomas-Cumming, seconded by Mr. A. Gunn, that the meeting of next Assembly be held in the town of Truro, Nova Scotia. A second vote was then taken between Truro and Toronto, when eighty-two voted for the former and sixty for the latter. A final vote was then taken as between Truro and Halifax, when sixty-six voted for the former and one hundred and three for the latter; and the Assembly resolved that the meeting of the next General Assembly be held in the City of Halifax. It was further agreed, on motion of Principal Grant, seconded by Mr. Robert Murray,—That the next Assembly meet in St. Matthew's Church, Halifax, on the second Wednesday of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening.

" PRESBYTERIAN RECORD."

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the *Presbyterian Record*. Mr. R. H. Warden, for the Convener, Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal, handed in and read the Report. Interesting details were given in the Report of the increased circulation of the *Record*—the disposal of surplus funds to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, and proposing increase of the allowance for the management of this important enterprise of the Church. On motion of Mr. D. M. Gordon, seconded by Mr. Thomas Cumming, the Report was received, its recommendations adopted, and the Missionary *Record*, anew, commended to all the Sessions and congregations of the Church.

BIBLE IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Mr. Thomas McAdam here gave notice that he would, at a future Sederunt, move a resolution in regard to the use of the Bible in Public Schools, and read a copy of the resolution to be proposed.

RETURNS TO REMITS.

Dr. Gregg presented and read the Report of the Committee to which was referred the several Returns to the Remits sent down by last Assembly.

I.—Remit on Marriage Question.

Thirty Presbyteries approve.

Seven Presbyteries do not approve.

Five Presbyteries do not report.

II. - Relation of Presbyteries of Manitoba and North-West Territories.

Brandon Presbytery recommends no change.

Regina Presbytery recommends that the Synod's Home Mission Committee be continued in existence, and that the moneys be disbursed by an agent of the Committee.

Rock Lake Presbytery agreed that the Synod's Home Mission Committee be continued.

Winnipeg Presbytery adopted the Synod's resolutions—(1) That the Synod's Home Mission Committee be continued; (2) That the Synodical Committee shall determine grants on the basis of Presbytery's reports; (3) That the Assembly's Home Mission Committee, on receipt of report of work done, shall transmit to Presbytery amount due.

Synod of Manitoba and North-West Territories agreed—That the Synod's Home Mission Committee be, in the meantime, continued, and that applications from Presbyteries for mission fields and augmented congregations, and also the semi-annual claims for grants, be submitted to and approved by the

III. -Reduction of Salaries.

The Presbytery of Winnipeg reports opinion that the time has not yet arrived for the reduction of salaries, and gives reasons.

IV. - Ecclesiastical Co-operation.

Thirty-seven Presbyteries report-

(1) Of these twenty-three approve the general principle;

Eight approve the Remit simpliciter;

Ten approve the principle, but would refer the matter to the local Courts;

Two approve the principle, and would continue the Committee;

Two approve the principle without further suggestion;

One approves the principle but doubts its practicability.

(2) Twelve Presbyteries disapprove. Of these,

Seven disapprove the Remit simpliciter;

One disapproves on doctrinal grounds;

One disapproves because impracticable;

Two disapprove of co-operation, while favouring the object aimed at;

One disapproves because it would bind the whole Presbyterian Church, but only the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church.

- (4) Five Presbyteries make no report.

The Report was, on motion, received.

NOTICE OF MOTION.

Dr. Gregg gave notice that, at the proper time, he would submit a motion on the marriage question.

LEAVE TO MEET.

Dr. MacLaren asked and obtained leave for the Committee on the Reception of Ministers to meet for business at half-past seven o'clock this evening.

DESTITUTE PLACES IN QUEBEC.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Quebec, in relation to the destitution of regular religious ordinances in large districts of the Province and across its borders, where there is but a scattered English population; and praying the Assembly to provide itinerating missionaries for such districts. The Overture was supported by Dr. Mathews and Mr. J. R. MacLeod. On motion of Mr. P. McF. MacLeod, seconded by Dr. King, the Overture was handed over to the Home Mission Committee for their favourable consideration.

LOTTERIES.

Dr. Bryce requested the addition of the names of Hon. Justice Taylor and Mr. W. B. McMurrich to the Committee appointed last year on Lotteries. The request was granted.

The Assembly now adjourned, to meet at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, of which public notice was given from the Chair, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

EIGHTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:

The General Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Rev. Dr. Dick, of Buffalo, at the Moderator's request, leading in prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Dr. Middlemiss, Convener of the Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, Westarn Section, reported from the joint meeting of the Committee, East and West, to whom was referred, in the morning, the subject of the unification of the rules for the administration of this fund in both branches of the Church, that conclusions had been reached, and were ready to be submitted for the judgment of the Assembly. It was ordered that the report from the joint meeting of the Committee be remitted for consideration to the Committee appointed in the morning to take the whole question of the finances of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund into consideration, and report to this Assembly.

HOME MISSIONS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Committees on the Home Missions of the Church.

EASTERN SECTION.—The Report for fhe Eastern Section of the Church was presented in printed form by Mr. P. M. Morrison, the Agent of the Church in the Maritime Provinces, who spoke briefly on some of the principal aspects of the work, mentioning especially the satisfactory condition of their Mission Fund, and their gratification at being able to meet, in full, all liabilities to the mission stations and labourers under the inspection of the Committee.

AUGMENTATION.—Mr. Edwin Smith, of Stewiacke, presented the Report of the Committee on Augmentation, and dwelt briefly on the very satisfactory and encouraging results which have been reached in carrying out the new scheme for the augmentation of alaries in weak congregations. The following resolution, on motion of Mr. Edwin Smith, seconded by Mr. D. Stiles Fraser, was adopted,—The General Assembly having heard the Report of the Home Mission Committee, and of the Committee on Augmentation, of the Eastern Section of the Church, agree to adopt the same; thank the Committees, and especially the Conveners, for their diligence; express their gratitude to God for the success attendant on the work of both the Committees during the year; sanction the grants passed by the Committee on Augmentation for the ensuing year, and authorize the said Committee to deal, in terms of the Scheme, with the grants to certain congregations from which full information could not be obtained at the time of the innual meeting; and, recognizing the liberality of the people in supporting both the Home Mission and Augmentation Funds so well in the past, commend these funds to their most favourable consideration for the coming year. (Added at the Tenth Sederunt). Adopt the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee, Eastern Section, to increase the remuneration of catechists to seven dollars (\$7) per week and board, and of probationers to ten ten dollars (\$10) and board; said increase to begin on the first of April, 1888.

WESTERN SECTION.—The Report of the Committee on Home Missions for the Western Section of the Church was presented in printed form by the Convener, Dr. Cochrane, who dwelt at length on some of the main features of the work as set forth in the report, speaking escially of the enlarged expansion of the mission fields, and the work in connection with this important scheme, and of the very great progress made in this department within the last twenty years; yet mentioning the fact that, latterly, the funds furnished to

FREE CHURCH DEPUTATION.

There was read from the table a commission from the Colonial Committee of the Free Church of Scotland, under the hands of the Rev. James C. Burns, D.D., Convener, and the Rev. James S. McIntosh, Secretary of the Committee, appointing the Rev. John MacTavish, D.D., Minister at Inverness, and the Rev. John Stewart, Minister at Glasgow, as their deputies to this General Assembly, and instructing said deputies to convey to the Assembly cordial Christian congratulations, and the assurance of the unabated interest taken by the Free Church in the prosperity of the Canadian Church, and especially in their efforts for the supply of the means of grace to emigrants and others in the North-Western districts of the land.

The Rev. John Stewart, of Glasgow, being alone present, was introduced to the Assembly by the Moderator. Mr. Stewart, in discharge of the duties of his commission, addressed the Assembly at length, giving interesting details of the conditions of life, of the state of the Church, and of society at large in Scotland; and conveying, in warm terms, the earnest Christian congratulations of the Church represented by nun to this Assembly and the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the sincere desire of himself, and of the Church in the old land, for the prosperity of this Church in the way and work of the Lord.

The Moderator in suitable terms responded to Mr. Stewart's address, thanking him for his clear and frank statements about affairs in the Old Country; trusting that his journey might be pleasant, and assuring him that he would leave behind him grateful remembrances.

INVITATION FROM THE MAYOR OF WINNIPEG.

Dr. Bryce conveyed verbally an invitation from the Mayor and Aldermen of this city to attend a reception by the city authorities, such as might be arranged, and be suitable to the convenience of the Assembly.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at ten o'clock to-morrow morning, which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

NINTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Winnipeg, and within Knox Church there, Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of June, one thousand, eight hundred and eighty-seven years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, in accordance with adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered, at the request of the Moderator, by Mr. Donald Fraser, of New Westminster.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

HOME MISSIONS-WESTERN SECTION.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the unfinished business of last night, and took up again the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Western Section. On motion of Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded, the Assembly agreed:—(1) That the following words be added to Section VII. (5), of the Regulations: "or until the congregation shall have been dealt with by the Presbytery, and an explanation satisfactory to the Presbytery and the Committee been given." The amended regulation will then read as follows:—"No grant shall be made to any congregation for the year succeeding the March meeting of Com-

On motion, further, by Dr. Cochrane, duly reconded, the Assembly agreed on the recommendation of the Committee:—(2) That the following words be added to Section IV., Note (a): "When the number of communicants is more than double the number of families, the Committee shall have discretionary power to make a grant even though the minimum contribution per communicant be not reached." The regulation as thus amended will read as follows: "In the case of congregations in which the families reported are more numerous than the members in full communion, the contributions shall be at the rate of not less than \$4.50 per family. Where the number of communicants is more than double the number of families the Committee shall have discretionary power to make a grant, even though the minimum contribution per communicant be not reached."

GRANTS-REGULATION FOR MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

It was further moved by Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded,—That the recommendation of the Committee as to grants to Manitoba and the North-West be approved in terms following:—That from this date grants be made to the mission fields in the several Presbyteries of the North-West, as to those of the other Presbyteries of the Church, viz.: So much per Sabbath for services rendered; and that in this respect the work in the North-West be now brought into line with that in Ontario and Quebec, only that applications from Presbyteries, both for mission fields and augmented congregations, and also the half-yearly claims for grants, be submitted to and approved by the Synodical Committee prior to their being laid before this Committee. (Added at next Sederunt)—"But in the event of moneys being required during the six months prior to the meetings of the Committee in October and March, to meet special cases, the Convener be allowed to make the advances required."

It was moved in amendment to the foregoing—without the addition—by Principal Caven, seconded by Mr. D. M. Gordon,—That the Resolution of the Home Mission Committee regarding the matter of making grants be referred to a Committee consisting of Dr. King, Messrs. R. H. Warden, James Robertson, P. MoF. MacLeod, and George Hay, to report at a subsequent Sederunt.

After a free expression of opinion on the subject, as above, and no conclusion reached, the hour of adjournment arrived, and further consideration was postponed.

INVITATION BY MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL.

Dr. Bryce renewed the invitation from the Mayor and Aldermen, mentioned yesterday, stating that the arrangement proposed was that the Assembly, to-morrow, should adjourn at five o'clock, at which time the members of Assembly should be furnished with carriages for a drive around the city—return to the City Hall at six o'clock, where refreshments would be provided—the Assembly being thus able to resume its sittings at the usual hour in the evening. The invitation was cordially accepted.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet again at two o'clock, which was publicly announced, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

TENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met, and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered, at the Moderator's request, by Dr. Archibald, of St. Thomas.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

The Assembly recumed consideration of the Home Mission Report, in relation to Manitoba and the North-West Territories, before the House in the morning, the motion of Dr. Cochrane, and the amendment of Principal Caven being under discussion. Principal Caven asked the leave of the Assembly to have certain names added to the Committee named in his motion in the morning. At this stage it was moved by Dr. Cochrane,—That the addendum following be made to the proposed regulation as to the distribution of moneys to Manitoba and the North-West, namely:—"But in the event of moneys being required during the six months prior to the meetings of the Committee in October and March, to meet special cases, the Convener be allowed to make the advances required." The motion was duly seconded.

Principal Caven said that if the Assembly were ready to accept this addendum he was prepared to ask the leave of the House to withdraw his amendment. Leave was granted, and the Assembly adopted the addition proposed and approved the regulation

with said addition.

MONEY-MODE OF REMITTING.

The Assembly entered upon the consideration of the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee in relation to the mode of remitting moneys to Manitoba and the North-West. It was moved by Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded,—That the recommendation of the Committee in this matter be adopted in terms following:—"That the amount of the half-yearly claims for mission fields and augmented congregations be hereafter transmitted direct to the Conveners of the respective Presbyteries, instead of through the Treasurer of the Synodical Committee."

At this point the Returns to Remits on the question before the House were referred to. The motion, as above written, was then unanimously adopted.

SALARIES OF STUDENTS.

On motion of Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded, the proposed regulation in regard to students' salaries during Sessions of College was adopted in terms following: The Assembly agreed to notify the Mission Committees of the Synods, and of the several Presbyteries in the Synods, that the allowance to students for services during College Sessions in fields receiving aid from the Fund shall not exceed three dollars (\$3) per Sabbath, with travelling expenses, the grants to fields supplied by students being one dollar (\$1) per Sabbath less in winter than in summer.

SALARIES OF STUDENT MISSIONARIES.

On motion of Principal MacVicar, seconded by Mr. James Carmichael, the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee in regard to the salaries of student missionaries was adopted in terms as follows: The remuneration of students for mission services in the summer months shall be increased to seven dollars (\$7) per week, and board, and the distinction existing between theological and literary students is hereby abolished, this resolution to take effect from first April, 1888.

GRANTS TO HORNING'S MILLS AND KILSYTH.

Dr. Cochrane stated that grants were last year made to Horning's Mills and Honeywood, in the Presbytery of Orangeville, of two hundred dollars (\$200) per annum, and to Kilsyth, in the Presbytery of Owen Sound of one hundred dollars (\$100) per year, notwithstanding that the contributions of the people were below the required minimum, and asking the approval of the General Assembly. The Assembly unanimously approved the action of the Home Mission Committee in regard to the grants named.

GENERAL DELIVERANCE.

Mr. R. H. Warden, seconded by Dr. Bryce, submitted a resolution for the disposal of all remaining subjects embraced in the Home Mission Report, Western Section, and the resolution was unanimously adopted as follows,—That the Report of the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, be adopted as a whole, and that the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the Committee, and especially to the Convener, Dr. Cochrane, and to the Convener of the Sub-Committee on Augmentation, Mr. D. J. Macdonnell; also to the Church of Scotland, the Free Church of Scotland and the Presbyterian Church of Ireland for the aid rendered during the year; that the General Assembly place on record its gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the large measure of success vouchsafed during the year, and for the continued growth of the work, especially in the Muskoka and Algoma Districts, and in the Synods of Manitoba and the North-West Territories; earnestly commend anew the Home Mission and Augmentation Schemes to the sympathy and liberality of all the congregations of the Church, so that largely increased contributions, necessary for the efficient maintenance of the work, may be secured.

THANKS TO MR. WARDEN.

On motion of Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Smith, the Assembly agreed to place on record their recognition, with cordial thanks, of the very valuable services of Mr. R. H. Warden, in connection with the operations of the Home Missins, as Secretary to the Committee, the duties of which office he has for many years discharged with ability and zeal.

HOME MISSIONS-EASTERN SECTION. -SALARIES.

On motion of Mr. P. M. Morrison, seconded by Mr. Thomas Cumming, the General Assembly agreed to adopt, as it does hereby, in substance, adopt, the recommendation of the Home Mission Committee, Eastern Section, left in abeyance at the Eighth Sederunt, to increase the remuneration of catechists to seven dollars (\$7) per week and board, and of probationers to ten dollars (\$10) and board per week, said increase to begin on the first of April, 1888. Ordered—That this finding be added to the deliverance at the Eighth Sederunt, which see.

STATISTICS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Statistics. The Report, containing extended details of the several enterprises of the Church, in connection with Congregations, Mission Stations and Finances, was submitted in printed form by Dr. Torrance, the Convener of the Committee, who, at the same time, dwelt at some length on the main features of the Report.

DELIVERANCE.

It was moved by Dr. John Thompson, seconded by Dr. Gregg, and agreed to,—That the Report on Statistics now presented be received and adopted; the thanks of this Assembly given to the Committee, and especially to the Convener for his painstaking labours and untiring devotion to this arduous part of the Church's work; that this Assembly expresses its profound sense of satisfaction with this most admirable document, and especially with that condition of the Church which makes such a report possible. It urges upon all our ministers, elders and office-bearers of the Church the full consideration and study of this Report for practical purposes throughout the Church. And, further, this Assembly regrets that any have failed to send in returns through their Presbyteries, and enjons upon all such congregations the necessity of complying with the requirements of this Church, that next year's Report may be complete, and the Church put in possession of full information.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Committees on the Finances of the Church. The Report for the Toronto Section was presented by Dr. Reid, Agent of the Church—Western Section—containing detailed statements of the receipts and disbursements connected with the Schemes, and instituting comparisons between the financial conditions for several years back and the present. On motion of Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Bryce, the Report was received and adopted.

THANKS TO DR. REID.

The following resolution was moved in warm terms by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, of Toronto, and cordially seconded by Principal Caven,—That the Assembly avail itself of the opportunity now presented to express its deep sense of the value of the services rendered to the Church by the Rev. William Reid, D.D., in his position of its Agent. The Assembly recognizes in the devoted, faithful and untiring services, rendered for the long period of thirty-four years, and in the uniform correctness which has marked the keeping of the numerous accounts of the Church, a high measure of ability and a kind and degree of service which have been but inadequately acknowledged by the salary attached to the office. The Assembly now tenders to Dr. Reid, through the Moderator, its sincere thanks, and expresses the prayerful hope that it may please the Almighty Father to spare him for many years of continued usefulness. The motion was warmly supported by several members of the Assembly, after which it was adopted by a standing vote. The Moderator conveyed to Dr. Reid in appropriate terms, the resolution above recorded. Dr. Reid made acknowledgment of the consideration for his person and services expressed in the resolution so cordially adopted.

WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION.

There was submitted a communication from the Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, expressing the desire of presenting to the Assembly a short address on their work, by a deputation of ladies, and to be read by the President, and asking if such address would be received and at what time it could be presented. It was moved by Mr. Hugl, Crozier, seconded by Mr. J. B. Mullan,—That the request of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union be granted, and that the deputation be received by the Assembly on Thursday evening. It was moved in amendment by Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Gregg,—That a reply should be sent to the communication; that while the Assembly is in deep sympathy with the objects of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the Assembly prefers to receive the proposed address in the usual way in which such communications are received, and presented to the Assembly by its Clerk. A vote being taken, the amendment was carried, and the Assembly decided in accordance therewith.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at eight o'clock, which was intimated from the chair, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

Macdonald, of Toronto, was unanimously adopted, namely:—That the Report now submitted be received, and the General Assembly record their gratitude to God, their sense of the indications in the Church of a growing interest in the evangelization of the heathen; their high appreciation of the successful efforts made by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, and other Ladies' Missionary Societies of the Church, that aid our Foreign Mission enterprise to develop this interest and raise funds for the prosecution of the work, and their satisfaction with the measure in which the work generally has been prosecuted during the year, and they tender their cordial thanks to the Committee, and especially to the Convener.

At the request of the Assembly addresses were delivered on the work under their direction in the North-West Territory, by Mr. George Flett, of Okanase, Strathclair, Mr. John McKay, of Mis-ta-wa-sis Reserve, and by Mr. Hugh Mackay, of Round Lake, Broadview.

Mr. Annand, as soon as it is ascertained that he has settled in Santo. It was moved by Principal Caven, seconded by Dr. J. K. PROTESTANT SCHOOL BOARD, INVITATION FROM.

There was read a communication from the Protestant School Board of the City of Winnipeg, covering a copy of a resolution passed at a meeting of the Board, inviting the members of Assembly to visit their schools. The resolution is in terms following :--" In view of the fact that the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, now in session in this city, is largely composed of gentlemen interested in education, this Board, in welcoming them to Winnipeg, desires to express the gratification it would give the Board to have as many of the delegates as possible visit our public schools, for the purpose of

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at two o'clock this afternoon, intimation of which was publicly given, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

THIRTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at two o'clock in the afternoon:

The Assembly met, and was constituted with devotional exercises. At the Moderator's request, prayer was offered by Mr. A. T. Love, of Quebec.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

MISSION TO SANTO.

Principal Caven asked and obtained leave to amend the motion submitted by him in the morning, by omitting certain words therein contained. The motion will then stand as follows:—The General Assembly receives the memorial, and records its grateful estimate of the zeal and liberality of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society—Eastern Section—and inasmuch as the Church in the Lower Provinces initiated the mission to the New Hebrides, and has hitherto so successfully conducted it, the General Assembly deems it advisable, in the special circumstances, to refer the important matter embraced in this memorial to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, to meet at New Glasgow, in October next, to pass judgment on the same, and to report its finding to the Foreign Mission Committee, with power to act. The Assembly adopted the resolution as above written, and decerned and ordered in accordance therewith.

NOMINATION COMMITTEE-SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT.

Dr. Cochrane, from the Nomination Committee, to whom their first report was re-committed, to recast certain Committees reported in the morning, handed in and read a supplementary Report containing the changes made by the Committee. The Report was received and adopted, and the names therein contained are written in the list of Boards and Committees, in consecutive order, in other pages of this record.

On motion of Dr. Cochrane, the Report of the Nomination Committee was then adopted as a whole. (See Table of Committees.)

REPORT ON TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

- Mr. R. H. Warden reported from the Committee appointed last year to devise a Scheme for the payment of the travelling expenses of Commissioners of Assembly, as follows:
- I. That the number of Commissioners be reduced from one-fourth to one-eighth the ministers on the Rolls of Presbyteries, with a corresponding number of elders.
- II. That a fund be instituted to meet the travelling exponses of Members of Assembly, the expenses being understood to mean the necessary actual outlay for travelling to and from the place of meeting, and shall not include sleeping-car or state-room fares, or meals by the way, cabs, etc.

III. That this Fund to be known as the Assembly Commissioners' Fund, be distributed by a small Committee, to be appointed annually by the General Assembly.

(a) That the Committee shall, prior to the first of January, form an estimate of the total sum required, and apportion said sum among the Presbyteries of the Church on a basis as equitable as possible.

(b) That Presbyteries be instructed to take such steps as to them seem most desirable to secure the amount apportioned, and forward the same to the Treasurer of the Assembly's Commissioners' Fund, prior to the first of May.

(c) That Commissioners present to the Treasurer, prior to the evening Sederunt of

the third day of the Assembly sitting, a statement of their travelling expenses.

(d) That the Committee make an equitable distribution of the amounts received, and hand the same to the several Commissioners before the rising of the General Assembly.

(e) That the travelling expenses of those Commissioners only be paid whose Presby-

teries have forwarded the amount apportioned them by the Committee.

On motion of Prof. MacLaren, seconded by Principal MacVicar, the Assembly resolved,—That the Report of the Committee on the subject of a Fund for the travelling expenses of Commissioners to the General Assembly be received, and sent down to Presbyteries for consideration, with instructions to report on the whole subject to which it refers to next Assembly.

MEDICAL STUDIES IN THEOLOGICAL COURSE.

Dr. Caven, from the Committee to whom was referred, at a former Sederunt, an inquiry by the Senate of Knox College, whether the Assembly would sanction a course in medicing in lieu of certain other departments of study in the curriculum for students in Theology, submitted a Report in terms following.

The Committee recommend,—1. That in the case of students who are preparing for work in the foreign field, medical studies shall have value assigned to them as part of their curriculum.

2. In all ordinary cases a knowledge of the original languages of Scripture and of Moral Philosophy shall be deemed indispensable.

3. Remission of the usual studies shall not take place unless in the case of students who shall either take a complete course in Medicine, or pass examination in the following subjects, viz.:—Such examination in Anatomy and Physiology as is required by the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and shall produce an attested certificate of having attended one full course in Materia Medica, Chemistry, Clinical Medicine, Surgery and Obstetrics. If possible one course in Didactic Medicine and Surgery also.

4. The senate of a college with which a student is connected shall determine, in view of his general attainments, whether remission in the curriculum shall take place in Arts or in Theology, or partly in the one and partly in the other, and, in accordance with the above regulations, shall have full authority to dear with all cases of the kind herein pro-

vided for.

On motion of Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Mr. Thomas Cumming, the General Assembly ordered the Report on a medical course by students of Divinity, as above, to be sent down to the senates of the several colleges for consideration during the year, to report to next Assembly.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Principal Grant, from the Committee to whom was referred the Reports of the Committees on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Funds, and other papers simpliciter, handed in and read a Report in terms following:

I. That they took the regulations for the management of the fund adopted by the Synod of the Maritime Provinces as a basis for regulations for both sections, with the Report of the Committee on these, and now submit the following regulations for the consideration of the Assembly.

The proposed regulations were considered and approved down to the ninth, when it was moved by Mr. Robert Wallace, seconded by Mr. Peter Musgrave, as follows,—The General Assembly hereby agree that each annuitant on this Fund be entitled to ten

sirable dollars (\$10) per year of service; that after ten years of service a minister be entitled to one hundred dollars (\$100) of a retiring allowance, and that for forty years' service a minister be entitled to four hundred dollars (\$400) per annum if the Fund affords it. runt of A vote being taken, the motion was negatived. The consideration of the proposed regulations was then proceeded with to the end, and they were severally adopted without amendment, were adopted as a whole, and are as follows:

REGULATIONS

For the Management of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund in both Eastern and Western Sections of the Church.

- 1. The Fund shall be sustained by annual congregational contributions, ministers' rates, donations and bequests.
- 2. The invested capital shall not be entrenched upon for the purpose of paying annuities, and all bequests made to the Fund shall be added to the capital, unless otherwise ordered by the testator.
- 3. Settled pastors, ordained missionaries, home and foreign, professors in colleges and Church agents, shall, in order to participate in the full benefits of the Fund, pay into it an annual rate of one half per cent on their professional income, after deducting house rent when no manse is provided.
- 4. When a minister resigns his pastoral charge without leave from the General Assembly to retire, but continues in the service of the Church as a preacher, he shall pay into the Fund an annual sum of eight dollars, otherwise his annuity shall be only in proportion to the term of his service as pastor.
- 5. When a minister resigns his pastoral charge, and transfers his services to another Church, or gives himself to another vocation, he shall forfeit all claims to benefit from the Fund, beyond the repayment of one-half of the amount paid by him into the Fund. The Assembly may, however, grant the application of such minister to retain his claim to benefit, corresponding to the number of his years of service in the ministry of this Church, on the following conditions:—(1) That he shall pay an annual rate of fifteen dollars (\$15). (2) That he shall submit to the judgment of the Assembly on any application that he may subsequently make for benefit on the ground of age or infirmity.
 - 6. The rates shall be paid on or before the first of November in each year.
- 7. Ministers who have not complied with number three of these regulations, and may wish to do so, shall pay the prescribed rate, with interest from the date of their ordination, or their becoming ministers of our Church; provided always that such rates shall not be required further back than the year one thousand, eight hundred and seventyseven (1877), and any such minister who may fail to comply with this regulation previous to January 1, 1888, shall, after that date, be allowed to do so only by permission of the Assembly.
- 8. The regular procedure, with a view to the retirement of a minister and placing his name on the list of beneficiaries, is as follows :-
- (a) When a minister from age or infirmity proposes to retire from the active duties of the Ministry, he makes application in writing to the Presbytery, furnishing whatever information may be necessary, and, in case of infirmity, a satisfactory medical certificate. The Presbytery thereupon visits his congregation, and summons them to appear by commissioners at a subsequent meeting, that they may be heard for their interests, and that the Presbytery may confer with them anent a retiring allowance to their minister, to take effect on the acceptance of his resignation, and any other matters affected by his proposed retirement, which then considers the whole matter, records its judgment, and sends up the minister's application, its own judgment thereon, and all relative documents to the General Assembly, through the Assembly's Standing Committee on the Aged and Infirm

Ministers' Fund, which shall carefully consider them, and transmit them with its ownopinion in reference to the case to the Assembly for final determination.

- (b) When a minister has obtained permission of the General Assembly to retire from the active duties of the pastorate on account of age or infirmity, he shall be entitled to an annuity only on application of his Presbytery, such application to include all necessary information.
- 9. When a minister is allowed by the General Assembly to retire after ten years' service, he shall receive an annuity of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) with five dollars (\$5) additional for every year of service beyond ten, up to forty years if the state of the Fund permits.
- *10. A minister who has not paid the annual rate into the Fund shall receive only one half the amount to which he would have been otherwise entitled.
- 11. When a minister is allowed to retire after less than ten years' service in this Church, his case shall be made the subject of special consideration by the Assembly.
- 12. When a minister's health is impaired, but not so much as to render him wholly unable to discharge the duties of his profession, the Committee may grant him half the allowance to which he would be entitled in case of complete disability.
- 13. When a minister, admitted to the benefits of the Fund on account of infirmity, recovers his health sufficiently to engage actively in remunerative employments, the annuity shall be reduced or discontinued.
- 14. When a minister who has paid rates to the Fund attains the age of seventy years, he may claim the privilege of retiring from the active duties of the Ministry, and of being placed upon the Fund.
- 15. When a minister is mainly dependent upon his annuity from this Fund, the Committee shall have power, after careful inquiry, to grant such an additional allowance as the condition of the Fund will permit, such additional allowance in no case to exceed twenty-five dollars a year.
- 16. When a minister is removed by orderly translation, from one Section of the Church to another, he shall, from the date of his translation, pay the rate into the Fund of the Section to which he is translated, and he shall have a claim to an interest in it on his retirement by leave of the Assembly to the full extent of the period of his services in both. Sections.
 - 17. Annuities shall be paid either in quarterly or half yearly instalments.
- The Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers further reported as follows, and the recommendations of the Committee were adopted by the Assembly:
- 2. Subject to the changes made in the Regulations presented in the Report of the Eastern Section, it was agreed to recommend the adoption of the Reports.
- 3. With regard to the Overtures from the Synod of Hamilton and London, and the Presbytery of Brockville, it was agreed to approve generally of them, and to instruct the Committee of the Western Section to do its utmost to secure through Presbyterial action or otherwise, the services of qualified volunteer agents to obtain the much needed enlarged endowment for this Fund.
- 4. That a grant of one hundred dollars (\$100) be made for the expenses of the past year in connection with the work.

DELIVERANCE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

On motion of Principal Grant, duly seconded, the following deliverance on the Report on Foreign Missions was adopted.

evangelizing the world which it presents. The Assembly is specially grateful for the number of labourers offering themselves for the work, and for the spirit that animates the students in the Colleges connected with the Church.

2. The Assembly has heard with great gratification of the kindness received by Mr. and Mrs. Annand on their return journey to the New Hebrides. It also commends the other beloved brethren to the grace of God, and prays that they may all be blessed abundantly, amidst the difficulties with which they are contending.

3. The Assembly is much gratified at the interest which has been evoked towards the mission in Trinidad, and the adjacent coast of Demerara, and the Island of St. Lucia, among the proprietors of estates and the governmental authorities, and even more particularly at the liberality of the native Church. It trusts that the Presbyterian Missionary Society of Demerara will be able to fulfil its obligations, but in case of inability authorizes the Committee to assume the responsibility of Mr. Gibson's salary for this year. The Assembly renders devout thanksgiving to God for the wonderful work in Formosa, where there are now a College, Hospital, Girls' School, and thirty-eight Churches, with native preachers, elders, deacons and 2,546 baptized members. It commends Dr. Mackay, Mr. Jamieson, and the native pastors and other helpers, to the care of the Great Head of the Church, and prays that they may be blessed yet more and more in their work, and assures them that the Church in Canada hears of every onward step with interest and thanksgiving.

4. The Assembly rejoices to learn of the safe arrival in India of Mrs. Murray and Dr. Marion Oliver; of the extension of Dr. Elizabeth Beatty's practice and influence; of the organization of a self-supporting native Church in Indore; of the prosperity of the mission in Mhow and Neemuch; of the planting of the cross in the cities of Rutlam and Ujain, and of the advance that is being made all along the line. It trusts that the organization of a Presbytery will enable the beloved brethren in Central India to prosecute their work with greater efficiency and method than ever, and would assure them of the intelligent sympathy of the General Assembly with them in their assaults on the massive and wonderfully compacted fortress of Hinduism.

5. With regard to the Missions to the Indians of the North-West, the Assembly is gratified to learn that the progress is encouraging, and that we have now eighteen bands numbering 3,500 souls under our care. The Assembly has heard with profound interest the addresses of Mr. George Flett, Mr. John McKay, and Mr. Hugh McKay, and assures those brethren that it will be prepared to consider carefully any proposals that may be made for doing still more for the civil and religious well-being of the Indians of the North-West. It hails with extreme satisfaction the testimony borne by its Superintendent to the excellent character and efficiency of those Government officials with whom he has come in contact, who are intrusted with the administration of Indian Affairs, and their disposition to co-operate in every possible way with the work of the Church among the Indians.

6. The offers made by the Alumni Association of Knox College, and the Missionary Association of Queen's University, to sustain by their contributions, each a missionary in the Foreign Field, and the offer made by St. Andrew's Congregation, Toronto, to place at the disposal of the Foreign Mission Committee a sum sufficient to $\mathfrak{su}_{1:\mathcal{V}}$ ort a missionary, in addition to their usual collection for the Foreign Mission Fund, are hereby acknowledged with gratitude to God for such wonderful tokens of the Spirit He is pouring out upon students and the people generally. These offers are accepted, and Mr. Jonathan Goforth, of Knox College, and Mr. James F. Smith, of Queen's, are hereby appointed as missionaries in the service of the Church, and are warmly commended to the grace of God. The Committee is empowered to select a field for them, and should the Province of Honan, China, be found on full investigation to be suitable, the Assembly instructs that the work there be regarded in the meantime as a sub-division of the work in China. Committee is also empowered to make arrangements for the ordination of Messrs. Goforth and Smith, at such times and places as may be found most convenient.

7. In accordance with the report of the Foreign Mission Committee (Western Section), and their recommendation as presented to the General Assembly, in the year 1886, and again renewed this year,—The General Assembly authorizes and empowers the Foreign Mission Committee, to accept from the Honourable Alexander Morris, of Toronto, a certain sum of money, which he has held, in trust, for many years, being derived from sources mentioned in his letter to the Committee, offering the same to the Assembly, and to apply the said money, with such additions as may be made from time to time thereto, from interest thereon, or any other sources, solely to the object for which he now holds it, namely, the establishment and maintenance of a Mission to the Jews in Palestine, under Presbyterian control; such mission to be undertaken by this Church when a fitting time comes in the Providence of God so to do. And the Assembly, further, authorizes the Committee to make and grant, by their Convener and Secretary, to Mr. Morris, such receipt or other formal instrument, or undertaking, as he may require, accepting the aforesaid Trusts, agreeing to fulfil the same by and on behalf of the Assembly, and exonerating or relieving him from all further responsibility in relation to the said money.

The thanks of the General Assembly are hereby tendered to the Honourable Mr.

Morris, for his care and faithfulness in this matter, hitherto.

8. The Assembly gives hearty thanks to God for His goodness in blessing so largely the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies of the Church. The extraordinary progress made by the Western Division in Auxiliaries, Mission Bands, Presbyterial Societies, and amounts contributed is most cheering, and shows how much wisdom, energy and love must animate the office-bearers and members. The Assembly acknowledges this with joy, and exhorts them to go forward in their divine work with faith in the promises of God.

9. The General Assembly regrets to learn that although the receipts from ordinary sources have been considerably larger than in any previous year, the Fund is now in debt. It is convinced however that it is not the will of the Christian people that any of the operations that are being prosecuted should be stopped, or even curtailed. The occupation of a new field in China will add to the general expenditure. It therefore appeals earnestly to the Church to put the Committee in a position to do the work committed to it with freedom, and on a scale in some degree commensurate with our own privileges and the wide doors that have been opened to us. At the same time it instructs the Committee to practise such care and prudence as shall bring the expenditure for the year within the probable revenue.

In conclusion the General Assembly heartily thanks the Conveners and the members of Committee in both Divisions for their faithful discharge of the duties committed to them, and rejoices to know that now every member of the Church can feel personally responsible for carrying out our Foreign Missions.

Dr. Maclaren here handed in and read an estimate of the probable amount which would be required for the support of the Foreign Missions of the Church during the ensuing year. The Estimate was received, and is as follows:—

INDIANS.

A paper in terms following was presented to the Assembly:-

The Indians of the File Hills Reserves, in the North-West Territories, desire their Missionary Teacher, R. N. Toms, to convey to the General Assembly their thankfulness for the interest the Church has taken in them, and that, although in the past they have had a bad name, they desire to be better, and invite the praying chiefs to visit them on their Reserve so that they may know them better.

PRINCE ALBERT.

The Rev. Dr. Jardine, Missionary at Prince Albert, here made a statement at length of the condition of affairs in connection with his mission, and representing especially the encroachments of the Church of Rome, and urging upon the Assembly the necessity of immediate action which might be effective in counteracting the adverse influence which these encroachments were fitted to exert on the work of the Church in that region.

It was moved by Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Dr. Smith, and agreed to,—That the General Assembly expresses cordial approval of the proposal of Dr. Jardine to establish a

Nisbet Memorial School at Prince Albert, and authorizes him to proceed at once to raise funds for the purpose.

FOURTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Finnipeg, and within Knox Church there, Wednesday, the Fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand, eight hundred and eighty-seven, at halfpust seven o'clock in the evening:—

The General Assembly met, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Dr. Cochrane, at the Moderator's request, offering prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read in part, and so far as read, sustained.

ADDRESS-CITY COUNCIL.

The Moderator laid on the table an address to the General Assembly from the Mayor and City Council of the City of Winnipeg, welcoming the Assembly to the city, and expressing the earnest wishes of the Council for the success of the great enterprises, in the highest interests of Society, in which the Church is engaged.

The Assembly agreed to place on record its grateful acknowledgments to His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Winnipeg for the kind consideration and generous hospitality shown to the members of the Assembly, and for the expression of interest in the work of the Church contained in their address.

MAP OF WINNIPEG.

The Messrs. McPhillips Brothers, D.L.S., here presented for the use of members of Assembly, two hundred copies of a Map of the City of Winnipeg, for which the cordial thanks of the General Assembly are hereby placed on record.

MARRIAGE QUESTION.

On motion of Dr. Cochrane, the Assembly agreed to take up the remit on marriage with a deceased wife's sister, etc., as the first order of business to-morrow morning.

RESIGNATION OF DR. MIDDLEMISS, ETC.

Dr. Middlemiss here tendered his resignation of the Convenership of the Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, and the resignation was accepted.

It was thereupon moved by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, seconded by Dr. Reid, and unanimously agreed,—That the Assembly desires, on the occasion of the retirement of the Rev. Dr. Middlemiss from the position of Chief Convener of the Committee on Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund (Western Section), to place on record its appreciation of his untiring devotion to the interest of the Fund, and tender to rim the Assembly's thanks for the signal services rendered by him in connection therewit.

REPORT ON RECORDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the several Committees appointed at the first Sederunt to revise the records, respectively, of the General Assembly, and of the several Synods. The Reports on the Record of the General Assembly, and on the Records respectively, of the Synods of the Maritime Provinces, Montreal and Ottawa, Hamilton and London, and of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, were handed in by Dr. Reid, and were stated to be uniformly of the same character, certifying that all the

Records of the judicatories above were carefully and correctly kept. The Reports were received and the Assembly ordered the several Records aforesaid to be attested in the usual form.

RECORD-SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON.

Dr. Reid here stated that the Record of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston had not reached the Assembly, but that from the well known punctuality of the Clerk of the said Synod, the book must have been delayed on the way.

STATE OF RELIGION.

The Assembly called for the Keport on the State of Religion. Dr. MacNish, the Convener of the Committee on this subject, submitted and read the Report, which contained certain recommendations for adoption by the Assembly. The Report was received, thanks tendered to the Committee, and it was agreed to consider its recommendations seriatim. The recommendations were considered one by one, and were severally adopted, and are as follows:—

1. That Presbyteries be instructed to continue their efforts for the purpose of securing replies to the questions on the State of Religion from all the congregations within their bounds, and that stress be laid upon the propriety of having such questions fully considered by Sessions.

2. That the great importance of holding Family Worship be again earnestly impressed on the members and families of the Church.

3. That, inasmuch as there is in connection with the Church a large number above eighteen years of age who are not communicants, the attention of Sessions be directed to the necessity of impressing upon such persons the solemn responsibility which devolves upon them to make a public profession of their faith in the Son of God.

4. That inasmuch as it appears that the religious instruction of the young is in danger of being left in a large measure to the Sunday Schools, the value and responsibility pertaining to religious instruction in the home be earnestly impressed on parents.

5: That Presbyteries be recommended to prepare a Scheme of special zervices adapted to reach all congregations: ministers, elders and members to assist in conducting them. The Report was then adopted as a whole.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to whom the memorial of Mr. James Bryant and the whole subject of Evangelistic Services were referred by the last General Assembly. Dr. Smith, the Convener, handed in and read a Report to the following purport:—

EVANGELISTIC SERVICES.

1. In the opinion of this Committee there is abundant evidence that in many instances much good has been accomplished by special services of an Evangelistic character, in which the central truths of the Gospel are continuously presented. Reports presented to Presbyteries, Synods and the General Assembly during a series of years seem to leave no doubt regarding this position.

2. The evidence presented on this subject appears further to show that such services should be conducted under the careful supervision of the Church, and not put under the direction of persons who are not connected with the Church, and subject to its authority, nor perhaps not in full accord with its teachings or in sympathy with its life.

3. The Committee believe that Evangelistic functions necessarily pertain to the office of the Ministry, and that every true preacher will faithfully open up and declare the way of Salvation, and deal with the unbelieving in order to their conversion. In the ordinary exercise of the Ministry the work of the Teacher and of the Evangelist should ever be combined.

4. The Committee do not see their way to recommend the establishment of a class or

order of men who shall receive special authorization as "Evangelists," and whose work shall be to conduct, or assist in conducting, special services in organized congregations. The opinion of the Committee rests largely upon the following considerations: (a) It seems to be agreed by all who have carefully looked into the question that the Evangelist of the New Testament is one who preaches the Gospel where the Church is not fully organized, and who corresponds to the Missionary (especially the Foreign Missionary). (b) Evangelistic functions, as above stated, necessary belong to the "pastor and teacher," and it is of the utmost consequence to the well-being of the Church that he should fully exercise them in the entire course of his ministry. (c) It would be extremely difficult satisfactorily to regulate admission to a class who should be adjudged to possess Evangellistic qualifications in such special degree as to warrant the designation of them to Evangelistic service in the home Church as their proper duty. (d) When a Session deems it important that the pastor should have assistance in Evangelistic work it will be always open to them to ask help of brethren whose presence and services may be regarded as specially desirable.

5. Whilst not recommending the establishment of a class or order of Evangelists, the Committee do not for a moment forget that there are brothren who are specially endued with the gift of speaking to the conscience, of arousing the careless and directing them to the Saviour, and they would deem it most important that this and all other gifts should be utilized in the utmost measure for the salvation of sinners and the edification of the Body of Christ.

On motion of Dr. Smith, seconded by Mr. John Gray, the Report was adopted.

ASSEMBLY TO CONTINUE IN SESSION.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, it was agreed to sit for half an hour longer.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools. The Report was presented by the Convener of the Committee, Dr. Jardine, who read portions thereof, and dwelt briefly on some of its main features. It was moved by Dr. McTavish, seconded by Mr. G. Rutherford, and agreed to,—That the Report be received, and its recommendations adopted, and that the thanks of this Assembly be tendered to the retiring Convener, Dr. Jardine, for his excellent services in connection with the Sabbath School work of our Church.

The recommendations are as follows :-

1. That wherever practicable the Registers recommended by the Assembly be used in all the schools; that a full and correct record be kept, and that each Presbytery require from the Sabbath School Committee a report of every school within its bounds, to be presented not later than the March meeting.

2. That each Presbytery decree and adopt some scheme of supervision or visitation whereby the efficiency of each Sabbath School may be ascertained and enhanced.

3. That all pastors and Sabbath School workers be urged to seek more directly and especially the spiritual welfare of those under their care, and that they use every legitimate means of bringing them at as early an age as possible through personal acceptance of Christ into full communion with the Church.

4. That the claims of Missions be urged upon schools, and that each school be asked to contribute something to one or more of our great mission schemes.

5. That the authorities of Theological Colleges be requested to devote some attention to the training of students in methods of teaching and Sabbath School management, and that pastors, if possible, establish weekly meetings for the training of Sabbath School Teachers.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR DEWDNEY'S INVITATION.

Mr. James Robertson, from the Committee to which was remitted the letter from His Honour Lieutenant-Governor Dewdney, inviting the Assembly to visit the Indian Reserves, and promising to provide transportation from the Railway Station free of charge to the Assembly, read a Report, making the following recommendations:—

I. That the offer of His Honour be accepted with thanks.

II. That the Assembly appoint a deputation to such Reserves as are easy of access,

and especially those in which missions of the Church are established.

III. Th. t Dr. Wardrope, Dr. MacLaren, Prof. Hart, Mr. H. McKay, Mr. Flett, Mr. Davidson and Mr. Geo. Hay be a deputation to visit Piapot, Mascopetung, Pasquah, File Hills, and Broadview Reserves; and Dr. Wardrope, Dr. MacLaren, Prof. Hart, and Mr. Flett, the Okanase and Bird-Tail Creek Reserves.

The Report was received, the recommendations adopted, and the deputations

appointed.

The hour fixed for adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet to-morrow morning, instead of the usual hour, at half-past nine o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

FIFTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At Winnipey, and within Knox Church there, Thursday, June the Sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven years, at the hour of half-past nine o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises, Mr. Thomas Cumming, of Truro, at the request of the Moderator, offering prayer.

The Minutes of the Sederunt of yesterday afternoon, and of last night, were read and

sustained.

EXPENSES OF PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE.

Dr. Reid here stated that last year he was instructed by the Assembly to pay a certain sum of money, claimed as the proportion of the expenses of the Presbyterian Alliance due by this Church, as soon as he should be informed by the Treasurer in Philadelphia of the purposes to which such moneys were applied, and that he had not yet received the information sought. On motion of Dr. Mathews, duly seconded, for reasons assigned, the Assembly now instructed Dr. Reid to pay the money asked for, notwithstanding the non-reception of such information.

BOHEMIAN CHURCH.

The Moderator here stated that the amount assigned, by the Council of the Presbyterian Alliance, to this Church, in aid of the Bohemian Church, had been secured and a little exceeded.

THANKS TO DR. BURNS AND DR. REID.

On motion of Dr. Mathews, duly seconded, the thanks of the Assembly were tendered to Dr. Burns and Dr. Reid, for their faithful and successful efforts in regard to the collection of the money in aid of the Bohemian Church.

MARRIAGE QUESTION.

The Assembly, as agreed last night, proceeded to consider the Marriage Question, as presented in the returns to Remits, sent down to Presbyteries last year, under the Barrier Act. It was moved by Dr. Gregg, seconded by Mr. Joseph White, as follows,—The Assembly having considered the returns to Remits on the Marriage Question,

resolves,—That further action on the proposal to prohibit the exercise of discipline in the case of marriage with a deceased wife's sister, niece, or aunt, be delayed, until the General Assembly shall have decided, in an orderly manner, on the propriety of modifying or expunging the Article in the Confession of Faith, which declares that no law of man or consent of parties can make such marriages lawful, so that persons contracting them may live together as husband and wife; or else of changing the questions prescribed to be put to ministers and elders at their ordination or induction.

Dr. Caven read a motion in amendment to the motion of Dr. Gregg.

Mr. Thomas Sedgwick here raised a point of order, inasmuch as the main proposition of Dr. Caven's motion was unconstitutional. The Moderator ruled that Dr. Caven's motion was in order. Dr. Gregg appealed from the ruling of the Chair, and a vote being taken, the ruling of the Chair was sustained.

Mr. W. T. McMullen seconded the motion of Dr. Caven, which is as follows:—1. A majority of the Presbyteries having expressed approval of the Remit Lent down by last General Assembly under terms of the Barrier Act, and contained in the following proposition, viz.:—"The discipline of the Church shall not be exercised in regard to marriage with a deceased wife's sistor, or deceased wife's niece—the General Assembly resolves to pass, and does hereby pass, such Remit into an ad interim Act. 2. The General Assembly sends down to the Presbyteries of the Church under the Barrier Act, the following Remit, with instruction to report their judgment upon it to the next General Assembly, viz.:—Chapter xxiv., section 4, of the Confession of Faith shall be amended, by striking out the last sentence thereof, contained in these words: "The man may not marry any of his wife's kindred nearer in blood than he may of his own, nor the woman of her husband's kindred nearer in blood than of her own."

The hour of adjournment having arrived, it was agreed to sit for half an hour longer. The Assembly after long reasoning proceeded to give judgment. A vote was taken, when ninety-five voted for the amendment of Principal Caven, and fifty-four for the motion of Dr. Gregg. The amendment was declared to be carried.

It was then agreed to divide the amendment of Principal Caven, and a vote being taken on the first part thereof, eighty-seven voted yea, and fifty-three nay.

A vote was then taken on the second part of Principal Caven's amendment, when seventy-six voted yea, and twenty-eight nay. Both parts of Principal Caven's amendment were then adopted, and the Assembly decided in accordance therewith.

DISSENTS.

Dr. Gregg, for himself and all who might join with him, craved to have his dissent marked in the Minutes, with reasons, as follows:

I. This decision is in direct conflict with the teaching of the Westminster Confession of Faith which is held by the Presbyterian Church in Canada to be founded on, and agreeable to, the Word of God; which Confession declares that a man may not marry any of his wife's relatives nearer in blood than he may of his own.

II. It is inconsistent with the ordination vows of the ministers, professors of theology, and elders of the Church, who have pledged themselves to abide by the teaching of the Confession of Faith.

III. It is inconsistent with the decisons of the Supreme Court of this Church, and of the Churches which entered into the Union of 1875, which such Supreme Courts have uniformly required the exercise of discipline in regard to marriage with a deceased wife's sister.

IV. It debars ministers, and elders, who retain their belief in the Confession of Faith, from action in accordance with their conscientious convictions, and their ordination vows, which have been imposed upon them with the sanction and authority of the Supreme Court of this Church.

As for the future, unless the Confession of Faith is modified, or the terms of adherence to it changed, which cannot be done without the consent of the majority of Presbyteries, which has not been obtained, ordination services will be converted into a solemn mockery, inasmuch as ministers and elders will be required to make professions in accordance with which they will not, so far as this Assembly can prevent it, be permitted to act.

VI. It is wrong and unjust to forbid the exercise of discipline in regard to marriage with a deceased wife's sister, niece, or aunt, and to require the exercise of discipline in

regard to marriage with a deceased husband's brother, nephew, or uncle.

VII. It exempts from discipline not only ordinary members of this Church, but even ministers and elders, who have professed, or may profess, that no law of man or consent of parties can make it lawful for a man to marry a deceased wife's sister, niece, or aunt; and may yet marry a deceased wife's sister, niece or aunt, and may thus subject congregations to the ministrations of men whom they cannot help regarding as violators of their ordination yows.

VIII. The natural and necessary tendency of the decision is to tempt men and women to contract marriages within the forbidden degrees, which, in future years, they may discover to be forbidden by the Word of God, and who may properly hold this Assembly largely responsible for tempting them to the commission of sin, which may cause them to feel agony and remorse during the rest of their lives.

IX. The tendency of this decision is to tempt to the contracting not only of marriages with a deceased wife's sister, niece, or aunt, but also to the contracting of the corresponding marriages with a deceased husband's brother, nephew, or uncle, although these marriages are either expressly, or by good and necessary inference, forbidden by the Word

of God.

X. It serves to countenance the popish and unscriptural doctrine, that it is in the power of the Church to grant indulgences for the commission of acknowledged sin in the past, and also to grant indulgences for the commission of sins which may be committed in future times.

XI. This decision furnishes a bad example of the method in which, in an indirect way, the Articles of the Confession of Faith may in other cases be tampered with, and may thus prove to be the first step which may ultimately lead to disruption in our Church, similar to disruptions which have resulted in other Churches from a similar course of procedure.

OTHER DISSENTS.

Dr. W. Fraser craved leave to have his dissent marked in the Minutes, on the ground that the orderly procedure in regard to this matter would have been to revise the Confession of Faith. There joined with Dr. Fraser in this dissent Messrs. Joseph White, Andrew Tolmie, James Fleck, John Currie, Samuel Acheson, John Fotheringham, Alexander Ross, J. B. Hamilton, Ministers; Thomas Wilson, A. I. McKenzie, Robert Harrison, Elders.

Dr. Reid and Dr. MacLaren dissented without specifying reasons.

Mr. Thomas Sedgwick dissented because he considers Principal Caven's resolution to be incompetent, and refuses to be held bound by it. Messrs. A. D. McDonald and A. W. McDiarmid joined in this dissent.

Mr. John Allan dissented from the latter part of Principal Caven's motion.

Mr. Hugh McKellar dissented on the ground that he believes the change made by a majority of the Assembly on this subject to be contrary to the teachings of the Word of God, and therefore interfering with his freedom as a minister of the Church.

Mr. John Ferguson, of Chesley, dissented because: (1) It is in opposition to the teaching of the Confession of Faith on the subject of marriage; (2) The reasons given for making a change are not to his mind sufficiently proved from Scripture; (3) It compels us to accept

as members of the Church and community those who in our judgment, and according to ordination vows, have violated the teachings of Scripture in entering into this relation, and to that extent is a violation of liberty of conscience.

Messrs. D. Wishart and Thomas McPherson dissented simply from the whole.

Messrs. D. Gordon, C. A. Doudiet, John MacLaren, K. McDonald, J. R. McKenzie, Dr. Smellie, Ministers; Joseph Gibson, Hugh Gourlay, James Brown, Elders, dissented on the ground of the Assembly's decision being contrary to the teachings of the Confession of Faith.

INVITATION TO SIT WITH THE ASSEMBLY.

The Rev. Mr. Majoribanks, a minister of the Church of Scotland, being present, was invited to take a seat with the Assembly.

The hour fixed for adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

SIXTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at two o'clock in the afternoon:

The General Assembly met, and was constituted, Dr. MacVicar, in the absence `the Moderator, in the chair, and Dr. Torrance on request offering prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON REASONS OF DISSENT.

The Assembly appointed Dr. Caven, Dr. King and Mr. W. T. McMullen a Committee to answer the reasons of dissent from the decision on the Marriage Question, given in the morning by Dr. Gregg and others.

MANITOBA COLLEGE.

Mr. Justice Taylor, from the Committee appointed at a former Sederunt, submitted a paper containing resolutions to bring Manitoba College under similar sanctions as to the teaching of Theology with those on which the Charter is based in regard to literary subjects. The Report, on motion of Mr. Justice Taylor, seconded by Dr. MacLaren, was received and adopted, and is as follows:—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, deeming it expedient to make provision in connection with the College of Manitoba, and as a part of the proper work thereof, for the education of students in Theology, under the authority and according to the principles and standards of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the General Assembly doth hereby, in pursuance of the power conferred by the twelfth section of the Act passed by the Legislature of Manitoba, in the thirty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign, chap ered thirty-three, and in pursuance of all other forms and authority enabling it on this behalf, establish a Faculty of Theology in the said College, and the said General Assembly doth hereby declare the theological doctrines and principles which shall be taught in the said College, or what are the books and documents in which the said principles are contained as follows:—

That the principles and doctrines to be taught in the College of Manitoba by the professors, tutors, or other persons who shall from time to time, and at all times hereafter, be employed or appointed in giving instruction in the clogy in the said College shall be such and such only as are consistent with and agreeable to the "Confession of Faith," the "Larger and Shorter Catechisms," and the "Form of Church Government," all of which are called the "Westminster Standards," and shall comprise all theological learning consistent with said Standards:

Provided always that the said Standards be understood and taken in terms of the Basis of Union agreed upon by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at Montreal, in the year of our Lord 1875:

The Moderator now took the chair.

RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to whom was referred the applications of Presbyteries for leave to receive ministers of other Churches as ministers of this Church. The Report was presented by Dr. MacLaren, the Convener of the Committee, and was received, and it was agreed to consider its several clauses sertatim. The consideration of the Report was proceeded with clause by clause to the end, and, in accordance with its recommendations, leave was granted to the several Presbyteries herein named to receive the ministers whose names are annexed to their respective Presbyteries—with special disposals as stated below:—

In the case of the Rev. John McLeod, M.D., a minister of the Presbyterian Church of New Zealand, leave was granted to the Presbytery of Huron to receive Dr. McLeod as a minister, as soon as they are able to obtain satisfactory evidence that he intends to reside in the country.

Mr. F. C. Simpson.

In the case of Mr. F. C. Simpson, a licentiate of the Methodist Church, who has complied with all the conditions required for ordination, but as he did not appear personally, the Assembly granted leave to the Presbytery of Truro to receive him as a licentiate, after taking two sessions in Theology in one of the colleges of the Church.

Rev. John Hutchinson.

In the case of the Rev. John Hutchinson, a regularly ordained minister of the Church of Scotland, now labouring in the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, the Assembly

call the attention of said Presbytery to the fact of the absence of any certificate for the last four years, and the absence of the original documents in some instances. Assembly authorize the Synod of the Maritime Provinces to deal further with his case, and issue it on receiving the necessary documents from the Presbytery.

Rev. R. H. Craig.

The application in the case of Mr. R. H. Craig, an ordained minister of the Congregational Church, but who afterwards joined the Baptist Church, was, on the recommendation of the Committee, declined.

Rev. W. E. D'Argent.

The application on behalf of the Rev. W. E. D'Argent, a regularly ordained minister of the American Presbyterian Church, was, on the recommendation of the Committee,

The Report was then adopted as a whole.

INSTRUCTION TO PRESBYTERIES.

The General Assembly, on motion of Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Dr. Cochrane, adopted the following resolution: - Direct Presbyteries to adhere s'rictly to the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly, passed in 1880, anent the reception of ministers from other Churches, in dealing with all applicants, and especially to avoid entering into engagements with such applicants, or giving them grounds for expectations that may be inconsistent with the fullest freedom on the part of the General Assembly in finally disposing of their applications. Further, that care be taken in every case to ascertain that the literary and theological training of applicants is such as is required by the Church of our own students.

RETIRING MINISTERS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to whom was referred the applications of Presbyteries for leave to ministers to retire from the active exercise of the ministry. The Report was presented and read by the Convener, Dr. John Thompson. The Report was received, and its several clauses were considered seriatim, and, in accordance with its recommendations, the Assembly granted the applications following, for the ministers named in connection with their respective Presbyteries, to retire from the active duties of the ministry :-

APPLICATION FOR MR. J. M. M'INTYRE.

An application was received from the Presbytery of Brockville on behalf of Mr. J. M. McIntyre, ask ng leave to place his name upon the Presbytery roll. It was moved by Dr. MacLaren, seconded by Mr. McMullen, and agreed to,—That the Assembly informs the Presbytery of Brockville that Mr. McIntyre's name cannot, in accordance with the laws of the Church, be placed on the roll of Presbytery, but that he is under its jurisdiction.

STUDENTS-APPLICATIONS FOR.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to take into consideration the various applications on behalf of Students, and an application for leave to ordain in a special case. The Report was submitted by Dr. J. K. Smith, the Convener, was received, and it was agreed to consider its several recommendations scriatim.

The various recommendations were considered and adopted, and the Assembly granted

the applications as written below :--

Rock Lake, to admit Mr. Walter Beattio as a Theological Student of the first year, and permit him to finish his Theological Course in three years on condition of his completing during his Course the preparatory studies not yet overtaken.

Orangeville, to refer Mr. J. C. Madill—a special case—to the authorities of Knox College, to assign him his standing.

The Assembly, on the recommendation of the Committee, granted the application on his own behalf of Mr. Erastus R. Hutt, a Student residing within the bounds of the Prosbytery of Hamilton, to be allowed to con inue in charge of the congregation of Dalhousie while attending Theological Classes in Knox College.

On motion of Dr. Smith, the Report was then adopted as a whole.

LOYAL ADDRESSES.

The General Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to draft loyal addresses to Her Majesty the Queen, and to His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion.

Mr. D. M. Gordon submitted a Report embodying such addresses. The Report was received, and the addresses therein contained approved, and ordered to be transmitted through the proper channels.

ECCLESIASTICAL CO-OPERATION.

Dr. Reid presented the Report of the Committee on Ecclesiastical Co-operation. In connection therewith the returns to the kemit on this subject (see pages 26, 27) were taken up and read.

It was moved by Professor Scrimger, duly seconded, and agreed to,—That the Report on Eccl-siastical Co-operation be received, that in view of the returns from Presbyteries the Assembly approves of the effort to attain the object aimed at in the scheme for Ecciesiastical Co-operation, but refers the matter to the several Presbyteries and Synods to take such action as they may deem best.

LETTER-PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES.

Dr. Reid presented a letter, addressed to him as Clerk of the Assembly, by the Rev. W. H. Roberts, D.D., Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, with resolutions of that body in regard to conference with other Presbyterian Churches with a view to co-operation in the work of extending our common faith and order, and especially in regard to unity of effort and organization in mission fields abroad.

On motion of Dr. MacVicar, it was agreed that the Moderator and Clerks should reply to the letter, reciprocating its fraternal sentiments, and that the Foreign Mission Committee be intrusted with any necessary correspondence during the year in regard to co-operation in the Foreign Field.

RESOLUTION FROM THE ANGLICAN SYNOD.

Dr. Reid presented a resolution from the Provincial Synod of the Anglican Church as follows:—

Moved by the Rev. O. P. Ford, seconded by the Hon. G. V. Allan,-"That without prejudice to the opinion of those who desire the privilege of Church Schools on the principle of local option, this House desires to express its earnest conviction that in this Christian Country religious teaching should have its due place, both in our Common Schools, and in our Institutions of higher Education, and that it is the duty of the members of this Synod to press upon the Governments and Legislatures of their respective Provinces such legislation as will ensure not only the daily and reverent use of the Holy Scriptures by teachers and children in our Common Schools, but also the teaching of the elements of Christian truth, as a part of the course of instruction given in such Schools. That to this end the concurrence and assistance of other Bodies of Christians be sought to aid in devising some plan by which these objects may be obtained. That the Prolocutor appoint a small Committee to act with any Committee that may be appointed by such religious Bodies to consider the question, and that copies of this Resolution be sent by the Secretaries to the Presidents of the various Christian Bodies." RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION, QUEBEC-REPORT.

Dr. Reid presented the Report of the Committee on Religious Instruction in the Public Schools in the Province of Quebec, setting forth that on account of no progress being made in the codification of the School Laws in the Province of Quebec, no intervention on the part of the Committee had been required. The Report was received.

MR. M'ADAM'S MOTION.

Mr. McAdam now moved in accordance with his previous notice as follows:

The General Assembly is of opinion that the primary and chief duty of the State in regard to the education of the young is to secure full and liberal socular instruction; and that every School aided directly or indirectly by the State should be required to devote the most of its time to the subject. Also: The General Assembly is of opinion that a grievous wrong is done when secular education is placed in such a position as to disparage Christianity, or to leave the young unacquainted with its fundamental historical facts and moral teachings. Also: The General Assembly gratefully acknowledges the recognition of Christianity in our Schools in so far as provision is made for devotional exercises, and the right accorded of giving religious instruction to the pupils of different denominations under conditions which may occasionally be found practicable, but the General Assembly still adheres firmly to the belief that the Bible should be used in the Public Schools for regular instruction; and the Assembly rejoices to believe that a rule to this effect, combined with a conscience clause, giving full relief to every objector, and with a clause empowering trustees to dispense with such instruction when they deem it expedient, would be most acceptable to the different branches of the Christian Church.

Dr. Bryce moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, as follows,—Receive the Overtures, commend the object contemplated therein, as also the communication from the Anglican Synod of Montreal, and remit the practical carrying out of the object aimed at in the said Overtures and communications to the several Synods of the Church.

It was moved, in further amendment, by Dr. Grant, seconded by Mr. Donald Fraser,—That the General Assembly, deeply sensible of the importance of the subject of religious instruction in the Public Schools of the country, appoints a Committee to consider the whole matter carefully during the ensuing year, to ascertain the state of the law and the actual practice in the different Provinces of the Dominion, and report to the next General Assembly.

The General Assembly receives the Overtures from the Presbytery of Guelph, and the Report on Religious Instruction in the Public Schools of Quebec, and refers them to the Committee hereby appointed.

Furthermore, the General Assembly requests the Moderator to answer the letter received from the Provincial Synod, and to state what action the Assembly has in the meantime taken on this subject.

The Committee to be composed of Principal Grant, Convener; Drs. Laing, MacVicar, Pollok, Torrance, Bryce, Messrs. McAdam, G. M. Milligan, P. McF. MacLeod, R. Murray, L. G. MacNeill, D. Fraser, W. T. McMullen, M. nisters; Messrs. W. B. McMurrich, James Brown, George Leys, Peter A. McDiarmid, R. Sommerville, James MacLennan, Q. C., John Charlton, M. P., Elders.

After reasoning, the motion of Mr. McAdam and the amendment of Dr. Bryce were withdrawn, and the amendment of Dr. Grant was unanimously carried, and the Assembly decided in accordance therewith and appointed the Committee therein named.

SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

On Principal Caven's request, his motion on Systematic Beneficence was assigned the first place on the docket for the evening Sederunt.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

SEVENTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:

The Assembly met, and was constituted with devotional exercises, prayer being offered, at the request of the Moderator, by Dr. Wardrope.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read in part, and, so far as read, were sustained.

SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

Principal Caven submitted a resolution on Systematic Beneficence, seconded by Dr. F. W. Archibald, in terms following,—Whereas there is urgent need of greater liberality throughout the Church in order to the development of the several Schemes of the Church, and even to the maintenance of the degree of efficiency already attained; whereas it is the duty and privilege of all Christian people to contribute towards the support and extension of the Kingdom of Christ as the Lord shall prosper them; whereas we who enjoy the superior privileges of the New Dispensation, and upon whom the responsibility of carrying the message of salvation to the whole world is definitely laid, should not, at least, fall beneath the standard of giving for the Lord's cause prescribed for the Jewish Economy; and whereas, notwithstanding the gratifying increase of contributions which we witness from year to year, the duty of adequate and systematic liberality is as yet imperfectly realized: -The General Assembly appoints a Committee on the subject of Systematic Beneficence, for the purpose of bringing, through the Press and otherwise, the important subject herein referred to earnestly and fully before the whole Church, with the view of promoting, on sound and Christian principles, the heartfelt and continuous growth of liberality in connection with every department of the Church's work. Presbyteries and Sessions are requested to co-operate with the Committee as they shall have opportunity, and especially to assist them in gaining the ear, if possible, of all the congregations and families of the Church.

The Committee shall consist of the following:—The Moderator (Dr. Burns), Mr. E. A. McCurdy, Dr. MacVicar, Dr. Reid, R. H. Warden, H. M. Parsons, D. H. Fletcher, Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Wardrope, Dr. Archibald, Dr. King, M. G. Henry, J. S. McLean, Warden King. J. W. Kilgour, W. M. Clark, J. K. MacDonald, George Leys, George-Hay, George Rutherford, James Walker (Hamilton), Dr. Caven, Hon. Justice Taylor. Dr. Caven and Mr. M. G. Henry, Joint Conveners. A vote being taken, the resolution was unanimously adouted.

TEMPERANCE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Temperance. The Convener of the Committee, Mr. Peter Wright, presented and read the report, with certain recommendations added for the adoption of the General Assembly. It was moved by Mr. Donald Fraser, of Victoria,—That the report be received and the recommendations thereof considered. The motion was seconded by Mr. W. G. Wallace, and supported by Mr. W. Fraser, elder. The several recommendations were then taken up and considered one by one and acopted, with two additional recommendations, No. 6, on motion of Mr. Archibald McLean, duly seconded, and No. 7, on motion of Mr. C. H. Cooke, seconded by Mr. Walter Coulthard, as follows:—

I. That, since Christ alone can uplift and bless the race, purify and save society, and make us a temperate and peaceable people, we give ourselves, in promoting the Temperance Cause, with renewed consecration to the preaching of the Gospel; and that we hold up Christ in our pulpits, prayer meetings, Sabbath schools, Bible classes and families as the only Saviour from sin, and the only guide to true character.

The A report was who spoke On motio resolved,-Assembly acknowledgment of the assistance rendered by the Press and the various Temperance Societies in forming and educating public opinion on this question; and that it cordially endorses the action of such Provincial Parliaments as have onacted laws requiring instruction in our Public Schools as to the effects of alcohol and other narcotics on the human system.

III. That this Assembly again declares its conviction that the liquor traffic is contrary to the Word of God and to the spirit of the Christian religion; that total prohibition is right in principle; that it is the duty of the State to pass a prohibitory law; and that this result is to be earnestly sought by all right means. And further that this Assembly declares its readiness to co-operate with the other Christian denominations of this Dominion in an earnest and united effort to hold fast that which we have, and to obtain, at the earliest possible day, an efficient law for the entire suppression of the liquor traffic.

IV. That this Assembly, with renewed earnestness and emphasis, again expresses the hope that the electors, in their choice of representatives, will elect only able and good

men, who are well known to be in sympathy with prohibitory legislation.

V. That this Assembly calls on all its pastors, elders, teachers and members to use their utmost influence against the deadly power of the saloon, by their public uterances and private life, by personal effort and example on behalf of Temperance, and by a watchful care of the young gathered in our Sabbath schools and homes, so as to awaken the conscience of the indifferent, and save those who are tempted or fallen.

VI. That the General Assembly petition the Dominion Legislature in favour of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic, and that signatures be obtained in all the congregations of the Presbyterian Church, so that a petition be sent to Ottawa praying for this

boon to our country.

VII. That this Assembly, deeply sensible of the demoralizing effect upon the community of a disregard for the law of the land, calls upon the Dominion Government to take all necessary steps for the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act, and to sustain the officers appointed to apply the law and carry out its provisions.

The report as a whole was then adopted.

OVERTURE ON TEMPERANCE.

An Overture on the subject of Temperance was handed in and read. On motion of Dr. Thompson, duly seconded, the Overture was referred to the Committee on Temperance.

WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION.

Dr. Smith presented a document from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, setting forth the objects of the Society, its marvellous growth, and asking for recognition and sympathy, especially in this new land.

It was moved by Dr. Smith, seconded by Principal MacVicar, and agreed to, as follows,—That the Assembly expresses its high appreciation of the great and valuable services rendered in this land, and in many others, to the cause of Temperance, by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, rejoices to learn that the branch in this city is in a vigorous condition, and earnestly prays that the labours of our Christian women, in this most important organization, may be greatly blessed of God to the speedy victory of Temperance and Prohibition in our country.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance. The report was presented and read by Mr. W. T. McMullen, the Convener of the Committee, who spoke briefly of some of the more important features of the subject dealt with therein. On motion of Professor MacLaren, seconded by Mr. C. A. Doudiet, the Assembly resolved,—That the report now submitted be received and adopted, and the thanks of the Assembly tendered to the Committee, and especially to the Convener.

It was moved by Professor MacLaron, duly seconded,—That a Committee be appointed to supervise the movement initiated at this Assembly with reference to the removal of the debt on Manitoba College, at Dr. Reid's office, and that it be cordially commended to the liberality of the Church, the Committee to be as follows:—The Moderator (Dr. Burns), Dr. Reid, Dr. J. K. Smith, Messrs. P. M. Morrison, and R. H. Wardon, Ministers; J. K. McDonald, J. Stirling, Elders; Mr. R. H. Warden, Convener.

OVERTURE-TRAVELLING EXPENSES.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Ottawa on the subject of Travelling Expenses of Commissioners to the Assembly. On motion, the Overture was laid on the table.

MEMORIAL-CHURCH PROPERTY-PRESBYTERY OF GUELPH.

There was submitted and read a Memorial from the Presbytery of Guelph, asking advice in regard to the disposal of certain Church property in the village of New Hamburg and also in the township of Puslinch. The Memorial was received. On motion of Mr. Justice Taylor, seconded by Mr. James Robertson, the following resolution regarding the property in New Hamburg was adopted, -That the Memorial of the Presbytery of Guelph, respecting Church property in New Hamburg, and the accompanying papers, be remitted to the Standing Committee on the "Protection of Church Property," with instructions to inquire into the state of the title to said property, and to advise the Presbytery as to what steps, if any, should be taken to sei and dispose of the same,—the General Assembly, so far as it has jurisdiction, and as it may be interested, consenting to and approving of such sale. That the Presbyting act in this matter under the advice of said Committee. And, in the event of the peing advised that the property can be sold, proceed to a sale thereof, and hold the proceeds subject to the orders of the Goneral Assembly. That the Presbytery report their action in the premises to the next General Assembly, and apply the proceeds arising from any sale which may be effected to such purposes as the General Assembly may direct.

PUSLINCH PROPERTY.

On motion of Mr. Justice Taylor, seconded by Mr. James Robertson, the following resolution was passed in regard to the property in the Township of Puslinch,—That the memorial of the Presbytery of Guelph respecting certain property in the Township of Puslinch, and accompanying papers, be remitted to the Standing Committee on the "Protection of Church Property," with instructions to take such steps as may be found advisable to secure the said property for the benefit of the existing congregations of this Church in the Township of Puslinch.

.CASE OF MR. GILMOUR.

Professor MacLaren made a verbal report in the case of an application last year, by the congregation of Vasey, on behalf of Mr. John Gilmour, a missionary labouring under the Prosbytery of Barrie, with the view of ascertaining whether or not he was legally qualified to exercise the functions of an ordained minister in performing the marriage ceremony. Dr. MacLaren stated, in substance, that he had sought and obtained professional advice in the premises, and that the judgment of counsel was directly expressed, that Mr. Gilmour was not legally qualified to perform such ministerial act as that referred to.

BRANTFORD LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Directors of the Brantford Ladies' College. The Report was submitted and read by Dr. Cochrane, who gave brief interesting details of the prosperous condition of the Institution, and its prospects for the time to

On motion of Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Smith, the following resolution was adopted,—That the General Assembly receive the Report; express its gratification at the success that has hitherto attended the College since its inception, and especially during the past year; and at the high standard of education aimed at by the Board of Directors; commend it to the parents and guardians of our young women as a College deserving of their most cordial support—an Institution where intellectual discipline and accomplishments are subordinated to religious training and the development of all the moral faculties.

The Assembly further, in terms of the request of the Directors, nominate the following twelve Stockholders, from among whom six shall be elected at the next annual meeting, to act on the Board of Directors for the ensuing year:—Rev. Wm. Cochrane, D.D., Wm. Watt, Robert Henry, Dr. Wm. Nichol, Thomas McLean, C. B. Hoyd, Alexander Robertson, Wm. Grant, Robert Russell, Adam Spence, John Sutherland, Alex. Turner; and appoint as Visitor of the College for the coming year, the Rev. J. K. Smith; D.D., of Galt.

OTTAWA LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Ladies' College at Ottawa. The Report had failed to reach the hands of the Clerk of Assembly. On motion of Dr. Armstrong, Principal Grant and Mr. R. H. Warden were appointed Visitors of the College for the ensuing year

REPORT ON SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Distribution and Supply. The Report was handed in and read by Dr. Torrance, the Secretary of said Committee, containing (1) Lists of Vacancies and Settlements; (2) Lists of Probationers; and (8) Lists of the Distribution of Probationers from October, 1896, to January, 1887. There were annexed to the Report recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. The Report was received, and its recommendations adopted, as follows:

I. That Ministers and Licentiates failing to fulfil their appointments without assigning a due cause may be refused further appointments by your Committee, notice of their sails being sout to the Brechyteries by whom the parties were contifed

action being sent to the Presbyteries by whom the parties were certified.

II. They would further recommend that the Committee have power to withhold appointments from any to whom objections have been made, until such time as the Presbytery recommending him shall show cause for his being given his former position.

III. That Presbyteries be instructed to report all vacancies in their bounds prepared

to call, and obtain through your Committee either full or partial supply.

IV. Vacancies reported as requiring supply for a given number of Sabbaths shall be held responsible for the employment of those sent them for those Sabbaths, either in their own pulpits or elsewhere.

On motion of Dr. Smith, seconded by Dr. Wardrope, the Report was adopted as a whole.

OVERTURE, PRESBYTERY OF REGINA-PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

There was presented and read, an Overture from the Presbytery of Regina, praying for the erection of a new Presbytery out of the western portion of its present field, to be called the Presbytery of Calgary. There was read, also, an extract minute of the Presbytery of Columbia, expressing concurrence in the request of the Presbytery of Regina for the erection of said Presbytery. There was read, further, an extract minute of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, setting forth that the Overture of the Presbytery of Regina had been submitted to the Synod, and supported by Mr. Hugh McKay, and that said Overture had been approved by the Synod, and transmitted to the General Assembly, with Messrs. James Robertson and James Herdman to support the

same before the Assembly. Messrs. Robertson and Herdman were heard in support of the Overture.

On motion of Mr. James Robertson, seconded by Mr. James Herdman, the following resolution was adopted, -That the prayer of the Presbytery of Regina be granted; that the General Assembly hereby erects a new Presbytery to be bounded as follows, that is to say :- The eastern limit of said Presbytery shall be the one hundred and ninth degree of longitude; the southern limit, the forty-ninth parallel of latitude; the western limit, a line passing north and south through the western crossing of the Columbia River by the Canadian Pacific Railway; the northern limit, the Arctic Sea: that the following congregations and mission fields, and such as may hereafter be organized within the aforementioned limits, be connected with this Presbytery, that is to say :- Indian Head, Lethbridge, Fort McLeod, High River, Calgary, Edmonton, Fort Saskatchewan, Red Deer, Cochrane, Banff, Anthracite, Donald and Revelstoke; that Messrs. James Herald, Charles McKillop, Richard Campbell Tibb, Angus Robertson, James C. Herdman, Andrew Browning Baird, Alexander H. Cameron, and such other ministers as may be regularly received, constitute the Presbytery; that the name of the new Presbytery be "The Presbytery of Calgary"; that the first meeting of the Presbytery of Calgary be held, and is hereby appointed to be held, at Calgary, and within the Presbyterian Church there, on the third Tuesday of July next, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, and that Mr. Angus Robertson be the first Moderator of the Presbytery.

EASTERN LIMIT, PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

There was presented and read, an extract minute of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, transmitting an application from the Presbytery of Winnipeg to define the eastern limit of paid Presbytery, and appointing Mr. James Robertson and Professor Bryce to support said application before the Assembly. Mr Robertson was heard in support of the application. On motion of Mr. Robertson, duly seconded, the General Assembly ordered that White River be the eastern boundary of the Presbytery of Winnipeg in the meantime.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again to-morrow morning at nine o'clock, of which public intimation was given from the Chair, and the Sederunt was closed with the Eenediction.

EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Winnipeg, and within Knox Church there, Friday, the Seventeenth day of June, in the year one thousand, eight hundred and eighty-seven, at nine o'clock in the forenoon:—

On motion of Mr. Pitblado, duly seconded, the Assembly resolved as follows, —That the Overture be received, and that it be remitted to the following Committee to consider, and report to the next General Assembly, viz:—Mr. J. C. Herdman, Convener; Dr. Jardine, Messrs. Baird, Urquhart, Bell, Dr. King, Mr. Pitblado, Dr. Lafferty, Mr. McCaul and Mr. James Fisher; and further, that the Presbyteries of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories be instructed to consider the subject, and to guard the interests of the Church in this matter within their respective bounds.

CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND.

The Report of the Committee of the Church and Manse Building Fund for Manitoba and the North-West Territories was presented by Mr. C. B. Pitblado, who read portions thereof, stating especially that the erection of ninety-four buildings had been aided to a less or greater amount from the Fund during the year, and submitting, for the approval of the Assembly, amended regulations for the administration of the Fund. On motion of Dr. Thompson, duly seconded, the following resolution was adopted, —The Assembly has heard with great gratification the Report of the Church and Manse Building Fund. We rejoice at what has been done in the interest of our Church through the means of this Fund. The Assembly commend it anew to the continued liberality of our people, and express the hope that moneys may be obtained, by the friends of this Fund, sufficient to carry on without hinderance the great work of the Church.

REGULATIONS.

The amended Regulations submitted and adopted are as follows:-

1. The Fund shall be called "The Church and Manse Building Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for Manitoba and the Nortu-West Territories."

2. The amount to be aimed at in the first place shall be one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000); the Fund shall be raised by subscriptions and bequests.

3. The management of the Fund shall be intrusted to a Board of fifteen members, twelve of these to be appointed annually by the General Assembly. The other members of the Board shall be the Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba and the North-West, the Convener of the Home Missions Committee of the General Assembly, Western Section, and one member to be appointed by the said Committee. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancies made by death or resignation until the meeting of the next General Assembly thereafter. The usual place of meeting of the Board shall be Winnipeg.

4. All applications for aid in the erection of Churches or Manses shall be made to this Board, through the Presbytery within whose bounds the congregation is situated, and, before being considered, must be recommended by the Presbytery, but the Board shall be sole judge as to the merits of the application and the nature and amount of the aid to be given.

5. The money constituting the Fund shall be, at the discretion of the Board, either invested, and the revenue accruing therefrom given in the form of grants to congregations to assist in the erection of Churches or Manses, or the capital shall be employed to make loans or grants to such congregations.

 Such loans shall be for a limited number of years, and at a moderate interest. For good reason the Board may remit interest.

7. The assistance given, when in the form of a grant, shall not exceed one fifth of the total cost of the Building; and when in the form of a loan shall not exceed fifty per cent. of the cost, unless, in either case, the circumstances are by the Board deemed exceptional. The money shall be payable only when the Building can be used for service, in the case of grants. In the case of loans the money voted may be paid in instalments as the work of construction advances. No grant, however, is to be paid, or loan

effected, until the Board is satisfied that a wild title to the property, or a bond to that effect, has been secured by the congregation, and that the deed is in the form approved by the General Assembly.

8. It shall be competent for the Board, with the approval of the General Assembly, to make changes in these regulations, but such changes shall have due regard to the proper preservation of the capital intrusted to the Board.

9. The Board shall report its transactions annually to the General Assembly.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND MANSE FUND.

On motion of Dr. Bryce, seconded by Mr. James Robertson, the Committee on the Church and Manse Building Fund was appointed as follows:—Mr. C. B. Pitblado, Convener; Dr. Cochrane, Messrs. R. H. Warden, James C. Henderson, Alexander Urquhart, Allan Bell, James Todd, Hon. Justice Taylor, D. McArthur, G. D. MacVicar, J. B. McKilligan, C. H. Campbell.

FUND TO BRITISH COLUMBIA.

On motion of Mr. MacRae, seconded by Mr. D. Fraser, the Assembly resolved,—That inasmuch as it is desirable that the privileges of the Church and Manse Building Fund should be extended to British Columbia, this matter be referred to the Board for their consideration.

ELDERS-OVERTURE ON PLACING ON ROLL.

There was taken up and read an Overture from Mr. John Fotheringham, of the Presbytery of Regina, transmitted by the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, praying the General Assembly to appoint and ordain that every elder labouring as a Catechist in any Presbytery have his name placed upon the roll of that Presbytery as a member thereof while so labouring. It was moved by Mr. Fotheringham, seconded by Mr. H. McKellar,—That the Overture be received and sent down to Presbyteries in terms of the Barrier Act. It was moved in amendment by Mr. John Ferguson, seconded by Mr. A. Robertson,—That the Overture be received and referred to a Committee, consisting of Dr. King, Messrs. Gordon, Robertson, Fotheringham, Ministers, and Mr. Justice Taylor, for consideration, to report to the next Assembly. A vote being taken, the amendment was carried, and the Assembly ordered accordingly.

STANDING OF MISSIONARIES IN CHURCH COURTS.

There was presented and read an Overture from the Synod of Hamilton and London, setting forth in substance that it was important that the relation to the Courts of the Church, of Ordained Missionaries, or those appointed without ordination to mission work, should be thoroughly understood, and praying the General Assembly to consider the matter, and give such directions to the Inferior Courts as it may think proper. Mr. G. Burson, under appointment of Synod, was heard in support of the Overture. On motion of Dr. Thompson, duly seconded, the Assembly ordered the Overture to be laid on the table till next year.

LICENSING OF STUDENTS.

There was submitted and read an Overture from the Synod of Ham ton and London, setting forth in substance that, for the reason that the examinations of students at our Colleges have of late years been much modified, Presbyteries in many instances are desirous to arrange for the licensing of students at a period earlier than existing regulations justify, and praying the General Assembly to make such changes in the regulations in this regard as it may judge proper.

Overture—Presbytery of Toronto.—There was read an Overture from the Presbytery of Toronto of a similar purport, setting forth in substance that the examination of students by College examiners and by the Presbyteries, on subjects presented in the Book of Forms, covers practically the same ground, and praying that the General Assembly limit the

It was moved by Dr. Archibald, seconded by Mr. R. Murray, and agreed to,—That the General Assembly receive the Overtures of the Presbytery of Toronto and the Sybod of Hamilton and London anent the licensing of students, and appoint a Committee to consider the same, and to report to the next General Assembly; the Committee to consist of Dr. Laing, Convener; Principal Caven, Dr. Armstrong, Mr. H. M. Parsons, Dr. McTavish, Mr. E. Scott, Mr. G. Burson, Dr. Cochrane, Principal MacVicar, Mr. D. M. Gordon, Dr. MacRae (St. John, N.B.), Mr. R. Laing (Halifax), and the mover and seconder of this resolution.

PROTECTION OF WOMEN AND GIRLS.

There was submitted and read the Report of the Committee appointed last year to prepare a petition to Parliament for the amendment of the law relating to the protection of women and girls, stating that the Committee had prepared such petition, and caused the same—having been first signed by the Moderator in the name and on behalf of the General Assembly—to be presented to His Excellency the Governor-General, and also to the Senate and the House of Commons of Canada. A copy of the petition referred to was annexed to the Report, forming a part thereof. On motion, the Report was received.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

There was presented and read an Overture, signed by Dr. Burns and twenty-two others, members of this General Assembly, reciting that it was now nearly a century and a quarter since the first Presbyterian minister took possession for our Church of Nova Scotia, and one hundred years since the first Presbyterian minister came to what is now the Province of Ontario; that it is important to obtain accurate and full information in regard to the planting of our Church during these years, so that the children may know the deeds of their fathers; that it is possible to collect old records, legal documents and petitions containing the materials of history, as well as newspapers, pamphlets and books conveying information as to Ecclesiastical events and sketches of the life and work of oge pioneers; that it seems feasible to make each College of the Church a centre for the district in which it is placed for the safe preservation and arrangement for use of such materials; that it may be that means may be obtained for those having special tastes in this direction for the publication of interesting memoirs, and for the diffusion of information about our Church among our students and the people generally; and praying the General Assembly to appoint a Committee that may confer by correspondence during the year, and report to the General Assembly, to be held in Halifax, as to the formation of a Presbyterian Historical Society. The Overture was supported by Dr. Bryce, and, on motion of Mr. R. D. Fraser, duly seconded, was received, and the Committee therein prayed for appointed, as follows, -Dr. Bryce, Dr. Campbell (Montreal), Joint Conveners; Dr. Gregg, Dr. Pollok, Prof. Campbell, Prof. Ross, Mr. T. Sedgwick, Dr. MacNish, Dr. George Patterson, Dr. Mathews, Dr. Cochrane, Sir William Dawson, Mr. Robert Murray, Mr. Justice Taylor, Mr. J. H. McCollum, Mr. James Bain, Jr., Mr. William Houston, Dr. W. Fraser, Dr. Reid, and the Moderator (Dr. Burns).

REQUEST-FOREIGN MISSION COMMITTEE.

A request was here presented, on behalf of the Foreign Mission Committee, that a change should be made in the list of Ministers and Elders appointed to visit Indian Reserves. The request was granted, and the names of Messrs. A. D. McDonald, G. Burson and A. Urquhart were substituted for those of Dr. Grant, Messrs. James Robertson, George Hay and Charles Davidson.

PETITION-JOHN RUSSELL.

Dr. Reid presented a petition from Mr. John Russell, Agent, Goderich. Dr. Reid indicated generally the character of the document. On motion of Mr. Peter Musgrave, seconded by Mr. Justice Taylor, the Assembly declined to receive the petition.

BOOK OF FORMS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Book of Forms. Dr. Reid read portions of a letter from Dr. Laing, the Convener of the Committee, and presented a long and exhaustive report of the work of the Sub-Committee during the year, with proposals as to the further steps which require to be taken in order to have the revised edition of the Book completed for the use of the Church. On motion of Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Principal Caven, the following resolution was adopted,—The General Assembly receive the report, authorize the Book to be printed and sent down to Presbyteries for their consideration, and instruct Presbyteries to report to the Committee before 1st March next, that so the next Assembly may be able to take final action.

The General Assembly would also re-appoint the Committee, request Dr. Laing to continue as Convener, and thank him for the great labour he has bestowed on this matter. They would also empower the Committee to appoint a Sub-Committee to attend to the printing of the Book.

The Committee as re-appointed is as follows:—Dr. Laing, Convener; Drs. Reid, Fraser, Bell, Caven, Torrance, and Messrs. Thomas Sedgwick, R. H. Warden, A. McLean Sinclair, R. Campbell, D.D. (Montreal), James MacLennan, Q.C., W. B. McMurrich and Dr. Macdeuald.

COMMITTEE ON FAITH AND POLITY.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed last year to draft a summary of the Faith and Polity of the Church, for the use of members of the Church and others. Mr. Somerville gave an interim report, and moved, duly seconded, that the interim report be received, and the Committee re-appointed with Dr. Moore and Dr. Beattie added, and Dr. MacLaren appointed Convener, with instructions to report to next Assembly. It was moved in amendment by Dr. MacVicar, seconded by Dr. Gregg, and carried, that the report be received and laid on the table.

DECEASED WIFE'S SISTER-ANSWERS TO REASONS OF DISSENT.

Dr. Caven, from the Committee appointed yesterday to answer the Reasons of Dissent by Prof. Gregg, from the decision of the Assembly on the Marriage Question, handed in and read such answers. The answers were received and approved by the Assembly, and are as follows:—

- 1. This reason is satisfactorily answered if the two following positions are established, (a) The liberty of the Church in a constitutional way to revise her Standards. (b) The accordance of the action proposed to be taken with the Word of God. The first of these positions has been universally accepted by the Churches of the Reformation. As to the second, a clear and succinct statement of the Scriptural authority for the proposed change in the Confession is found in the Report of the Committee on Marriage within the prohibited degrees, presented to the Assembly in 1885, and published in the Appendix to the Minutes for that year. It is believed that the arguments there set forth in support of the position are unanswerable.
- 2. To admit the validity of this reason is to deny that the Church possesses any liberty to revise her Standards.
- 3. The statement contained in this reason is admitted, but the whole question involved is, whether the Church had sufficient Scriptural ground for the decisions referred to? According to Answer No. 1, it had not.
- 4. The conscientious convictions of individual members of a Society can never be pleaded as against the right of the Society to revise its constitution with the view of bringing it into more complete harmony with the Word of God.

That all of the Chui earnestly re 5. This reason is fully met by the fact that the orderly methods of ascertaining the mind of the Church, with the view of bringing its Standards and Formula into harmony with the decision respecting discipline, has been taken by the General Assembly in the

action complained of.
6. This argument is deprived of all force by the fact that marriage with a deceased husband's brother, except in a certain specified case, is expressly forbidden by the Word of God.

7. This reason is fully met by the considerations already adduced. It hardly needs to be noted that the Church's code of discipline in regard to conduct must be the same in the case of office-bearers and of ordinary members.

8. This reason has no force, unless the marriages referred to are forbidden by Scripture, which is denied.

9. This reason, like No. 6, proceeds on the supposition that the two cases are strictly parallel, and forgets that the latter are explicitly prohibited by the Word of God.

10. It is enough to say that the General Assembly has not come to the conclusion that these marriages are sinful.

11. This reason is completely met by the fact that by the second part of the decision complained of the constitutional method is taken for modifying the Confession of Faith.

LOTTERIES.

There was taken up the Report of the Committee appointed last year to ascertain the state of the law in regard to Lotteries in the several Provinces of the Dominion, setting forth that in Nova Scotia the law prohibits all kinds of Lotteries, and visits its violation with heavy penalties; that in New Brunswick there is a law against Lotteries, but that doubt is felt as to its force because of assumed Federal legislation; that in Ontario Lotteries in general are prohibited, but exceptions are made in favour of charitable objects for prizes of small value; that in Quebec Lotteries are forbidden in the same terms as in Ontario, but that there is no limit to value of the prizes for charitable objects, that may be offered; and that they had not so far been able to obtain information respecting the state of the law in the Provinces of Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia. The Report contained also several suggestions and recommendations with a view to legislation for the total prohibition of Lotteries of all kinds. motion of Dr. Bryce, duly seconded, the Assembly resolved to receive the Report, and reappoint the Committee, with additional names, to make further inquiry, and report to next Assembly. The Committee as reappointed is as follows: -Dr. Campbell (Montreal) Convener, Dr. Bryce, Messrs. Robert Murray, James MacLennan, Q.C., L. W. Johnston, Rev. J. C. Carrathers, Mr. Justice Taylor and Mr. Thornton Fell.

On motion of Professor Scrimger, seconded by Principal MacVicar, the Assembly resolved that in Congregations in which there are no Missionary Associations, collections for the Schemes should be taken up as follows:—

I. French Evangelization, on the second Sabbath of July.

II. Home Missions, on the third Sabbath of August.

III. College Fund, on the third Sabbath of September.

IV. Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the third Sabbath of October.

V. Assembly Fund, on the third Sabbath of November.

VI. Manitoba College, on the third Sabbath of December.

VII. Augmentation Fund, on the third Sabbath of January, 1888.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, on the third Sabbath of February.

IX. Foreign Missions, on the third Sabbath of March.

That all Congregations and Mission Stations be enjoined to contribute to the Funds of the Church. Further, that Sessions where there are no Missionary Associations be earnestly requested to forward contributions as early in the year as possible.

II. To the minister, elders and managers of Knox Church for the use of their beautifu and commodious church, and to the proprietors of Westminster Block for the use of rooms for Committees.

III. To the ladies of the Presbyterian congregations of Winnipeg for their enjoyable entertainments in Knox Hall.

IV. To His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba for his generous hospitality to members of Assembly at Government House; to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-West Territories for arrangements to visit Indian Reserves by deputations of Assembly; and to His Worship the Mayor of the City of Winnipeg and the City Council for the special honour which they have conferred on the members of Assembly.

V. To the leal-hearted people of Kildonan for the most enjoyable entertainment

which they furnished to the members of Assembly.

VI. To the Committee of Arrangements, and especially to the Convener, Dr. Bryce, for their attention to the comfortable accommodation of the members of Assembly; and to the Superintendent of Missions, Mr. Robertson, in making arrangements for an excursion of members to visit the Pacific Coast.

VII. To the Young Men's Christian Association, to the Historical and Scientific Society, and to St. Andrew's Society for the use of their rooms; to the Post Office for postal facilities in the Lecture Hall, and to the Telephone Company of Winnipeg for the free use of their instruments to communicate with business and other houses in the city; to the Protestant School Board, for invitation to visit their schools; and to the Senate of Manitoba College for entertaining the members of Assembly at a Conversazione.

VIII. To the Hon. Dr. Harrison, Minister of Agriculture, for one thousand copies Maps of Manitoba, and to the McPhillips Brothers for two hundred maps of the City of Winnipeg.

IX. To the Canadian Pacific Railroad for reduced rates of travel, for free excursions, and for the free use of their telegraph, and to other Railroad and Steamboat Companies for reduced rates of travel.

X. To the Press of this city and of other places for extended and accurate reports of the proceedings of Assembly.

CLOSE.

The business being finished, the Moderator addressed the Assembly, and offered prayer. The Assembly then engaged in praise, singing in the one hundred and twenty-second Psalm, verses sixth to ninth, inclusive. The Moderator then said: In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this General Assembly, and appoint and order another General Assembly to meet in the City of Halifax, and within St. Matthew's Church there, on the second Wednesday in June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight years, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening.

The Moderator then closed the Session with the Apostolic Benediction.

APPENDIX NO. 1.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE

(WESTERN SECTION).

The Home Mission Committee, in presenting their Annual Report, desire to express their devout gratitude to God for the continued and increasing prosperity that attends their labours, as seen in the many new fields that have been occupied during the past year. They regret that the funds for Home Missions and Augmentation are both far short of the expenditure. The hopes indulged in at last Assembly, that this year's contributions for Augmentation would at least meet the year's outlay, and probably help to make up former deficits, have not been realized, many congregations still giving nothing to the fund, and others far below their al-lity. The reserve fund for Augmentation is now wholly exhausted; while that for Home Missions has been drawn upon heavily to meet the liabilities of the year. The largely increased demands for British Columbia, and certain other unexpected payments to the Synod of Manitoba, partially account for the large deficit in Home Mission funds; but in any case, the increasing demands upon the Committee, consequent upon the constant expansion of the work in the newer fields, will require for the year 1887-88 an amount equal to the expenditure of 1886-87.

In the Report submitted, there will be found notes of the progress of Home Missions and Augmentation, in the different Presbyteries of the Church, certain changes recommended by the Committee, and a detailed statement of the state of both funds. The reports of the Students' Missionary Societies and the Lumbermen's Mission are also presented, in a condensed form. In the appendix, complete statistics of all the mission stations and augmented congregations are given, and the names of all the Missionaries, Probationers and Catechists, employed under the direction of the Committee Committee.

SUMMARY OF MISSION AND AUGMENTATION WORK.

PRESBYTERY OF QUEBEC

Missions.

Home Mission work is carried on in this Presbytery under many difficulties and discouragements. There is a French Roman Catholic majority in every county within its bounds. These persistently oppose every progressive movement, and they systematically seek to weaken the strength of all English Protestant communities, by buying out as many families as they can; furnishing money at a low rate of interest for the purpose. In some localities the land is very inferior, the average product of a farm ranging from \$100 to \$200 per annum. In these places our farmers are very poor, many of them involved in debt to the full value of their farms; and in order to be able to live at all, have to draw largely upon the earnings of their sons and daughters, that go from home to work in the United States. As a result of this poverty in part [and vice versa perhaps?] education is sadly neglected. In answer to questions on this subject one elder replies:

"There are 18 heads of families and 12 youths past fifteen years of age in this neighbourhood that can neither read nor write."

can neither read nor write.

A minister of one of our congregations said: "The schools through this section are open for two and a half months only in the year. I have but one man in my congregation that can keep the financial accounts of the Church."

That such a state of things is a serious drawback to any Christian work among this people will be evident to all—and something should be done to mend this matter. We need to see to the secular education of these people, as well as to having religious ordinances among them, else there can be no permanency to our work.

During the summer, seven fields were worked in this Presbytery under the Home Mission Scheme: Three by ordained missionaries, who continued on through the winter; four by students. Three of these had to be left without supply for the six winter months; leaving about one hundred and sixty families for that period uncared for, further than by sending a student for two or three Sabbaths during the Christmas holidays.

These fields cry for more permanent supply; and the Presbytery is very anxious to be able to respond to that cry. We hope to find one or two ordained missionaries to take the place of the students when they leave the field at the close of this summer's work. Our only hope is in pressing enward more vigorously than ever. Only thus will the Lord be on our side.

The Augmentation Scheme is a most precious boon to this Presbytery. While formerly we had four or five vacancies in the Presbytery continuously, and these lasting, in each case, from one to

The average contribution per family in our augmented charges this year has been \$10.60 per family, and the Schemes of the Church benefit considerably by every settlen.ent effected. The translation of Rev. F. M. Dewey to Montreal, and of Rev. P. Sym to Owen Sound Presbytery afforded us an opportunity to re-arrange these fields. Richmond and Melbourne united, make a strong self-sustaining charge. And the erection of the two Windsors into a pastoral charge, with a pastor to reside among them, has led them to double their former contributions for the stipend of their

As to the rest of our augmented congregations, there are but small prospects of growth.

As to the rest of our augmented congregations, there are but small prospects of growth numerically, for the families are moving away one by one. The settlement of a pastor among them makes the people more contented to stay; it arrests the progress of emigration; it builds the people up morally and spiritually; and the influence of our congregations on the mass of Romanism around

them is greater thereby.

To do its duty our Church needs to cultivate these augmented fields in the province of Quebec much more and make them centres of light, and use them as levers to do French work. Why not supply these fields with pastors able to speak both French and English—men able to superintend reission schools, and have a mission school in every one of these centres, bound to do aggressive Let these small congregations be wiped out, and our Church can never have such a vantage

ground to carry on its evangelization work again.

Augmentation to help these congregations is a move in the right direction. But let the principle be developed with a view to aggressive work. It will take some time to get the people to look at the matter in this light—but unless we adopt that principle we cannot succeed. "He that will save his life shall lose it," expresses the truth, socially, as well as individually; and our small congregations seeking to save their own life, without giving their life for those perishing around them, are sure to die. But, if we shall do our duty, and spend ourselves for the salvation of those around us, we shall live, God will prosper us.

PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL.

Missions

The present year has been on the whole one of progress. A comparison of the Statistics of the year, with those of the preceding one, shows a slight increase both in membership and in the number of year, with these of the preceding one, shows a sight increase both in membership and in the standard of families. Two of the fields are supplied by ordained missionaries, and in at least one other continuous service by an ordained missionary is required if the field is to hold its own. Farnham West, which was on the mission list a year ago, has been erected into a pastoral charge, and is now settled. A new mission station (Trout River Line) has been opened this spring. It is hoped that ere long it may be united with part of a neighbouring congregation, and form a self-supporting charge.

Augmentation.

During the year Laguerre, which was vacant twelve months ago, has been settled, and West Farnhun, which was till lately a mission station, is also settled, the people contributing \$600 per

annum towards salary.

annum towards salary.

A few years ago a French missionary was sent to West Farnham. Finding some English-speaking Presbyterians there he began an English service on one part of the Sabbath, in a little Protestant school building. The cause has gradually strengthened, till now there is a beautiful church property, worth fully \$5,000, and a settled pastor giving his services wholly to inglish work. Notwithstanding the number of Protestant families leaving the Province from time to time, our augmented congregations report an increase of twenty-two families over last year, and notwithstanding the exceptionally high cost to Protestants of education in many districts of this Province, the average contribution per communicant towards salary in our augmented charges is \$6.33, as compared with \$6.13, the average in the augmented congregations in Ontario and Quebec. This scheme has been of very great benefit to our Presbytery, and has secured for our numerous weak charges regularly settled pastors. How it is appreciated by the ministers of these congregations, is shown by the following extract from a letter recently received from one of them, in response to a remittance of the balance of his last half year's grant.

yeor's grant.

"Words can scarcely express the gratitude we poor ministers feel towards God the giver of all good, and towards the Church, for the aid received from this angmented fund. Nor do words suitably express the joy and comfort it brings to our homes, relieving us of difficulties and enabling us better to meet the wants of our children. I had forgotten for the time being that this halance was due to me, and was conjecturing how to meet an account when your letter was put into my hands, containing these delians more than is necessary to meet the present emergency.

"I am so thankful the same supplement is to be given to us another year, for I have no hope of an increase from the congregation, but have reason to four that we shall have to report a decrease of families and members, chiefly owing to removals."

PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.

Missions.

The mission station of Gravel Hill and Front of Roxborough, the only one within the bounds, has oeen supplied during last winter by the Rev. D. D. McLennan, ordained missionary. The prospects are very encouraging. The short line of the C. P. R.—which is on the eve of completion—passes through the field, and is to have a station at Gravel Hill. If the expectations of the residents are fulfilled, there will soon be a self-sustaining congregation.

Augmentation.

There is but little change in the supplemented congregations. Summerstown, partly owing to a change of ministers, but more particularly owing to losses through a severe hallstorm in the beginning of harvest, had to fall back from the advance which they made last year.

East Lancaster have called a minister, who will be settled there next month—the first since they were organized into a separate congregation.

PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA.

In mission work the Presbytery finds great difficulty in securing suitable men to occupy the fields as ordained missionaries. Within the bounds there are several fields which meet the conditions of the Assembly's regulations respect ig fields suitable for ordained missionaries, and for some years the Presbytery has sought in vain for men to occupy them. During the summer months they are faithfully and accept ably supplied by students, but the irregular and sometimes total lack of supply during the winter fails to keep up the interest, and, as a rule, the hopeful results of one summer's work have disappeared before another summer begins. But notwithstanding this serious difficulty, steady progress is being made in the Presbytery as a whole. The wide region embraced by the Presbytery is being more fully occupied. At Casselman, a station but recently opened, a church has been built, and in other stations there are signs of progress.

Augmentation.

It is gratifying to report that in this Presbytery the amount required for the Augmentation Fund is from year to year diminishing. The amount of diminution is not large on account of the somewhat slow increase in the strength of the congregations in this region, and also on account of the pressure that was brought to bear upon them at the time the scheme was inaugurated. But notwithstanding the great advance that was then made in the giving of these congregations towards stipends the Presbytery has, by watchful and persistent effort, secured some advance, and the present year seems to be more hopeful in this respect than any of the past have been.

PRESBYTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW.

Missions.

The lack of men for the work in winter hampers our efforts, and so we have sought rather to consolidate than to extend the work.

The Alice group seems also to have taken a step forward, and steady progress is expected. A new church has been arranged for at Chalk River, an important station on the C. P. R. Mattawa has been holding its own and a little more, which is saying much for the zeal of our missionary at that point. This is one of the towns that boome I and then collapsed. It is now reviving, and "at no time was the congregation larger than it is at present."

Elmsley grew rapidly, and has been transferred to the augmented list, a minister having been settled there last October. Litchneld, on the other hand, became weak and has been transferred from the augmented list, and an ordained missionary has been appointed for two years in the hope that it may gain strength and again become a regular charge. The smaller missions remain very much in the same position as in preceding years. I'ney are all fairly prosperous, and generally appreciate the efforts made to supply them with Christian ordinances.

Augmented Congregations.

Considerable changes have been made during the year, and these have resulted in large saving to the fund.

Dalhousie and North Sherbrooke, drawing \$250 per annum, was transferred to the Kingston Presbytery, and being united with Snow Road Mission, a self-sustaining charge was formed. McNab, drawing \$50 per annum formerly, has become self-sustaining. Middleville and Dalhousie has been removed from the list.

Castleford, drawing \$250 per annum formerly, has become a self-sustaining charge.

Coulonge, a small charge, has made an advance, and the grant is reduced by \$70 per annum.

The reductions in all amount to \$670, against which there is to be set the addition of the newly erected charge of Elmsley, drawing for the present \$50 per annum.

There are no two thoughts in this Presbytery about the benefit and necessity of the Augmentation Fund, and the most earnest efforts have been put forth to secure its success.

We earnestly seek to reduce our demands, and impress upon all congregations the duty of contributing liberally, and in both directions we have had considerable success.

PRESBYTERY OF BROCKVILLE.

Missions.

1. Morton: -This station has been again supplied during the winter months through the Queen's College Students' Missionary Association, who have fortnightly ministered to the spiritual wants of the families in connection with us there. A student has been sent in for the summer season, and

good results are fondly anticipated.

2. Farmersville and Mallorytown:—These stations were opened two year ago, and appear to be continuously gaining strength. The people are united and spirited, and, at both piaces, are anxious to secure better church accommodation, which may lead them to erect churches of their own at both

3. Merrickville:—This field, although limited, continues to prosper, gaining in strength and numbers. The people eagerly desire connection with Irish Creek, which is in another Presbytery, and part of a settled charge. Should the union ever be consummated, the stations combined would

4. North Augusta and Stone's Corners:—This field was opened last year, and has made considerable progress. There are about fifty families in connection with us at both places, and they have had the continuous services of a catechist—Mr. C. H. Lowry—for the past year, who has laboured among them with diligence and success. A student goes in the summer to take up the work.

5. North Williamsburg and Winchester Springs:—These stations have been regularly supplied during the winter with fair encouragement and success. An effort will be made this fall to excite the liberality of the people, with the view of making this field—what it ought to be—an accession to our list of augmented congregations. Our Presbytery continues to feel a deep interest in the Home Mission work within their bounds, and have been encouraged by the prosperity manifested in some of the fields. Our contributions towards the Home Mission Fund have been in excess of those of last year. of last year.

Augmentation.

Our collections for the Augmentation Fund have been about the same as last year—but when it is borne in mind that during the past two years we have removed no fewer than six charges from the augmented list, thus reducing our claims from \$1,300 per annum to \$350—it will be apparent that we have been virtually large contributors to the fund, which is very highly appreciated by us, and has been utilized for the purpose of bringing our people to a sense of their duty to their own minister, which, in most cases, they have evinced a desire to do.

PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON.

All the fields in this Presbytery were fully occupied during the past summer. The Poland district was served continuously and efficiently for twelve months by Mr. Sharp, a student of Queen's College.

The people belonging to Sidney Station, recently organized, have purchased and paid for a neat

and commodious brick church.

Queen's College Missionary Association supplied Mississippi and Matawatchan without expense

to the Home Mission Fund.

Rev. James McIlroy was appointed ordained missionary to Poland, and has been labouring there since last October. We have now three important fields occupied by ordained missionaries, and expect to have two more located ere long, in large and needy districts. We hope then to be in a position to carry on our mission operations more effectively, and supply nearly all our proching stations, at least fortnightly, during the winter months. Several of these were unavoidably left without supply last winter.

Reports from our ordained missionaries and students are on the whole cheering. Attendance on public worship, prayer meeting, Sunday school, and Bible classes indicates growing interest, and shows that earnest work is being done among the people.

Augmentation.

The aid-receiving congregations were visited by deputations. The results, so far, have been that the grant to Roslin and Thurlow has been discontinued, and that to Lansdowne, etc., reduced, the latter congregation increasing its contribution to stipend. Present indications point to the likelihood of other and greater reductions being made in the near future.

PRESBYTERY OF PETERBOROUGH.

Missions.

The reports received from our missionary fields of the work done during the past year have been, on the whole, of an encouraging nature, giving also promise of something better in the future. An ordained missionary has been placed on the Minden and Kinmount field, and thus a pressing necessity met. Hitherto the services, during a few months in summer, were barely sufficient to keep our cause slive, but we now hope for it a steady advance. A like need for an ordained missionary is felt in the Haliburton field, and the want must soon be relieved, if any regranent success is to be secured. Our cause has made decided gains in Havelock, and in Chandes and Burleigh, owing mainly to the fact that they have had services furnished to them during the winter months. In both the

prospects are very encouraging.

Harvey, a strong station, has suffered through the withdrawal of the missionary appointed to it, after eight weeks' service. We expect, however, that the labours of an effective missionary, during

this summer, will repair the loss.

Augmentation.

We have still to regret the want of interest in this cause, manifested by some of our large and wealthy congregations, that prefer to look on their "own things," and not "on the things of others." There has, however, been an increase in our contributions, as compared with those of last year, of over twenty per cent. One of our assisted congregations has become self-sustaining, and has been removed from the list, and two others are likely to reach a like position during the coming year. We thank God, and take courage. A larger knowledge will remove the narrow prejudices with which this fund has had to contend.

PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY.

Missions.

The Presbytery of Lindsay has under its care three mission fields, viz.: Cambray and Oakwood, Coboconk, and Carden. The Gospel is preached at eight or nine points within these fields. Missionaries report progress in all the fields.

At Carden, also, a new church was built last summer. It is a handsome and commodious building, and was opened almost free from debt. Such is the spirit, liberality and nunerical strength developed in this field that it is expected before long it may be erected into an augmented charge with a settled pastor. It is free of debt.

During the winter Cambray and Oakwood, and Coboconk and associated stations have had weekly service from students of Knox College. The Carden group has had service every two weeks from members of Presbytery, the Knox College Students' Missionary Society kindly supplying their pulpits in their absence. In consequence of this regular supply no ground has been lost, while, under the blessing of God, more successful work is anticipated during the summer.

Augmentation.

During the year Uptergrove became vacant through the resignation of the Rev. H. Sinclair. Since that time negotiations have been opened with the Presbytery of Barrie with the view of having it wrought with Longford and Black River. The transfer will probably take place without delay, when a self-sustaining charge may be formed. This summer they are being wrought by one

Leaskdale and Zephyr are making steady progress, although the congregation sustained a heavy loss through the recent death of Mr. James Leask, to whose liberality and Christian activity they owe so much; yet, it is hoped, some time, not far in the future, they may be a self-sustaining charge.

The congregation of Fenelon Falls and Somerville, although weakened by many removals of families from the bounds, is in a flourishing condition.

Sunderland and Vroomanton, that has been so long vacant, has now the prospect of an immediate settlement, and one of such a character, it is believed, as will mark a new era in the history of that congregation.

Two years ago the mission stations of Kirkfield and Bolsover were united and erected into a congregation. They are about to extend a call to Mr. L. Perrin, a recent graduate of Queen's College, who has done excellent work in this field for the two past summers. It is most gratifying to be able to state that the field will be self-sustaining from the outset.

In mission stations and augmented congregations, alike, the prospects have never been so

encouraging as at the present moment.

PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO.

Missions.

Work has been carried on in the following fields: 1. Queensville, etc.; 2. Mt. Albert and Ballantrae; 3. Bethesda and York Station. These last two stations, Bethesda and York Station, are now united with Chalmers Church, York Townline, and thus form a self-sustaining congregation,

and we hope for an early settlement.

During the year two of our mission stations—1. Junction and Dixie; 2. Hornby and Omagh—have become settled charges with good prospects.

In Toronto (city) mission work has been prosecuted with increasing interest and vigour; with few exceptions every church has its mission station, in which a student is employed. New Missions were opened last year by the following churches: Parkdale, Chalmers, West End, College Street, and St. James Square. The Bloor and Huron Streets Mission has made good progress during the year, and a fine Sabbath School room is in course of erection.

Augmentation.

In each of the aid-receiving congregations the work is carried on with great satisfaction. Laskey and East King has become self-sustaining. Three congregations have been placed on the Fund: 1. Leslieville now stands alone, and asks for aid for one year!; 2. Junction and Dixie, just settled; 3. Hornby and Omagh, recently settled.

PRESBYTERY OF ORANGEVILLE.

There are now only three mission fields in this Presbytery. Dundalk, formerly a mission field, is now under the care of a settled pastor, Rev. J. A. Ross, who was formerly the ordained missionary of the field.

St. Andrew's, Proton-An old mission field is now attached to Proton Station, a new congregation

organized during the year.

Black's now stands alone. Gandier has been detached and put in connection with Corbetton and Riverview. The church at Gandier was burnt during the year, but aid having been received from the other congregations of the Presbytery, a new church is being built.

Corbetton & Riverview—Very rapid progress under the care of Mr. J. C. Madill. A new church has been built at the latter place, and is free of debt. The grant required is only one half of that

for last year.

Augmentation.

The six congregations receiving aid from the fund are gradually working up. One has been removed from the list; three have increased their contributions by \$50 each, and the prospects are very good for their being removed altogether from the list in a few years. The other two are only recently settled. The contributions from the congregations towards the Schemes of the Church are not all that might be desired, but a steady increase is noted.

PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.

Missions.

On the Canadian Pacific Railway from Sudbury to Schreiber, Mr. W. Hay, of the Montreal Preshyterian College, laboured as pioneer last summer. As there is a distance of 422 miles between the two stations named, Mr. Hay could not concentrate his efforts upon any one point, but he laboured diligently in distributing his services among the eight stations of his charge as advantageously as possible. On Sabbaths he preached at the more important points, spending five at Sudbury, four at Chapleau, one at White River, and four at Schreiber. During the week he visited the people and held service at these places, and also at Vermilion, Cartier, Mormon Pit and Biscotasing. He established Sabbath schools and young men's Bible classes at Sudbury and Schreiber, which were kept up during his absence at the latter place. He appears to have awakened considerable interest in Church matters among the people on the line. In the discharge of his duties he travelled 6,731 miles on the railway, and required to undergo fatigue, and occasionally privation of food, rest and study. He was enabled to make his journey by the liberality of the Railway authorities, and he expresses, gratitude especially to Mr. White for his interest in securing a free pass on the railway and set gray for leave g' on to hold services in the Court house there. During the winter there was no available missionary, and for that season our operations were suspended. We have now hope that the work will be resumed and permanently maintained on at least part of this long line of stations. Mr. S. Rondean, a distinguished graduate in theology of the Montreal Presbyterian College, has accepted an appointment as ordained missionary at Sudbury, and begins work in June. Mr. W. S. Wallace, of Queen's University, goes to Chapleau for the winter, and Schreiber is to be taken care of by the Winnipeg Presbytery.

For review of the work in Muskoka, Parry Sound and Nipissing Districts, reference is made to the report of Rev. A. Findlay:

Longford and Black River:—These stations were placed last summer under the care of Mr. N. Bethune, student in the University. Mr. Bethune endeared himself to the people by his faithful and earnest labours, the result of which was an addition of twenty-one (21) members when the Lord's supper was administered in the Longford Church in October. For the present summer the Hone Mission Committee have added to Longford and Black River the neighbouring congregation of Uptergrove, in the bounds of the Presbytery of Linday, and thereby effected a considerable saving to the fund.

Waubaushene, Port Severn, Sturgeon Bay and Fesserton:—These stations have been for a few years under the care of the Students' Missionary Society of Knox College. It is understood that

years under the care of the Students' Missionary Society of Knox College. It is understood that they are prepared to pay \$600, and are about to call a minister.

Medente, Vasey and Victoria Harbour:—Since October last this group has been under the care of Mr. Henry Knox, ordained missionary. In Medonte Mr. Knox found the condition of affairs to be very unsatisfactory, owing to divisions in the congregations, chiefly about the location of the new church which they required to build. This difficulty is now happily removed, as a site has been agreed upon, and the building will go on. In addition to the three stations named, Coldwater will be taken up by Mr. Knox in May.

Minesing, Midburst, Craighurst, Knox Church, Flos:—Mr. Geddes, who laboured for about four years in this group resigned, early in 1886, and for the summer following the field was divided, and put under charge of Messrs. T. A. Cosgrove and R. Sturgeon, of Queen's University, who laboured with acceptance. In October the stations were re-united, and placed under Mr. John Gilmour, catechist, whose services have been esteemed at Minesing, Midburst and Craighurst. Two other stations, Gibson and Phelpston, having been recently added to this group, a student will take that part of the field which includes Knox Church. Gibson's and Phelpston for the summer.

Collingwood Mountain and Gilpstlan:—These stations though waintsining their ground have

Collingwood Mountain and Gibraltar:—These stations, though maintaining their ground, have made little progress for some years owing to their isolated position, and the inability of the Presbytery to give supply to them during the winter. It has been found impracticable hitherto to unite them to any other congregation; but there is prospect of a new station being formed at Craigleith. This station will be united to Collingwood Mountain and Gibraltar, and thus there appears the possibility of a new pastoral charge being formed of the group in the future.

Airlie and Banda:—The first named was a part of the pastoral charge of Angus, New Lowell and Airlie, and was separated in the beginning of last year. During summer Mr. R. Henderson, of Montreal Presbyterian College, laboured here and at Smith's Lumber Mills, and Banda. There is no organized mission station at these two places, but they received the missionary cordially and contributed liberally, so that there was no demand upon the Home Mission fund.

The work of the missionaries in former years may have been as faithful and successful as those

of the past year, but the Presbytery has perhaps become more appreciative in recording on its minutes its approval of the work done. It is just to the missionaries to give the following resolutions, viz. — On 28th Sept., 1886. "The work in the mission field has been carried on by our missionaries with On 28th Sept., 1886. "The work in the mission field has been carried on by our missionaries with great diligence and fidelity, and in several of the fields we are happy to state that very gratifying results in the increase of spiritual life and addition of members to the Church have been borne witness to." The following respecting Mr. Hay's work was adopted on the same day: "The Presbytery expresses its thanks to Mr. Hay for his faithful and earnest work in the mission field on the Canadian Pacific Railway, also for his admirable and full reports on the state of the work there."

Augmentation.

This being the first report from the Presbytery of Barrle on the Augmentation Scheme, it will serve a better purpose to review its working from the beginning than merely to report progress for the past year. Going back, therefore, to October, 1883, there were then in the bounds thirteen pastoral charges giving for stipend less than \$750 per annum and a manse. These congregations were visited by deputies, who explained the scheme, and ascertained what increase of stipend the congregations would be able to make, and what supplements were required. The result was that six of the congregations raised the stipend to the minimum, or above it. In another case the promise of an effort to come up to the minimum was made, but the stipend has not since been reported above \$700 enort to come up to the minimum was made, but the stipend has not since been reported above \$700 and manse, and the congregation has not been put on the supplemented list, because the conditions required were not attained. Six of the thirteen congregations were placed on the list as aid-rocelving, but the stimulating influence of the scheme is to be noticed in respect to four of these, for two added to the stipend formerly paid \$100 each, one \$75, and another \$50. The following table will show all the congregations which have been benefited by the scheme, when placed on the list, and when removed; which of them still remain, the sum received by each until now, and the total received by the Presbytery from the Fund :-

It thus appears that of the thirteen congregations which gave less than the minimum in 1883, only two now receive aid from the fund. The demands have nevertheless increased every year, from \$387.50 in 1884, \$830.63 in 1885, \$1,317 in 1886, to \$1,659.60 in 1887. This increase, which arises from the erection of mission stations into congregations, may be expected to continue in this Presbytery, which includes a large mission field with many stations.

MUSKOKA AND PARRY SOUND.

These two districts, lying within the bounds of the Presbytery of Barrie, form a part of the exceptionally large mission field lying within her borders. With six mission fields to the south of these districts, in the County of Simcoe, and the line of the C.P. K. from Nipissing Junction westward to Port Arthur, where the bounds of the Presbytery of Manitoba are touched, this Presbytery can justly claim a prominent position among the mission Presbyteries of the Church. In the districts above mentioned there are twenty-three mission fields. One or two new fields are occupied for the first time this year, while, as the result of re-division, found necessary owing to the growth of some of the older fields, two or three additional fields are found on the list. In general terms, the present state of these fields may be termed one of progress. The benefit of railroad communication with the outside world is being felt in nearly every part of the country, and, as may reasonably be expected, our work is sharing in the general prosperity. That this prosperity is being felt may be illustrated by the fact that the Presbytery, while extending the work more largely than perhaps in any year in the past history of this field, has been enabled to reduce the grants for the current year by about \$1,000 without injuring the interest of any field. And, at the same time, as illustrating the interest felt by our people in these mission fields, in the work of the Church at large, it may be mentioned that during the past year they have contributed over \$500 to the Schemes of the Church. As in former years, the Students' Missionary Association of Knox College is doing good service, occupying six fields. During the past winter nine labourers were employed, some of them occupying double fields, thus extending the sphere of their usefulness, and giving service to many who would otherwise be without the means of grace. About 225 were added to the membership of the Church on this field during the past year—evidence, we judge, of the deeper spi

PRESBYTERY OF OWEN SOUND.

Missions.

The mission work prospers very abundantly in the summer, but we lose ground through lack of winter supply. Suitable men are not available for continuous work, and the cost of getting students from the college is too great to make that method of supply practicable. One of the fields has obtained the services of an ordained missionary, and will soon be self-sustaining we believe. A re-arrangement has made another of our fields self-supporting. A new church was opened in the Indian Peninsula last summer. It is practically free from debt.

On the whole the Presbytery is encouraged in the outlook on our mission fields and augmented concregations.

congregations.

Augmentation.

The augmented congregations are annually reducing their grants. Wiarton has been removed altogether. Kilsyth, etc., will not likely require aid after next year. Euphrasia and Holland will also very soon be removed.

The mission stations which become settled charges will not require very large grants, so that the

Augmentation Fund is gradually being relieved.

PRESBYTERY OF SAUGEEN.

Missions.

There are now only two mission fields, viz., Cotswold, and Ayton and East Normanby. These fields had supply from students during summer. Cotswold has had no supply during the winter. Balaklava was added to Ayton and East Normanby from the Bruce Presbytery, and was sup-

plied by Rev. J. McEwen during the winter, but the stations are so far apart that it was difficult to keep the appointments. East Normanby and Balaklava are both preparing to build new churches this summer.

Augmentation.

There is now only one congregation on the augmented list, viz., Cedarville and Esplin. The contributions to the Augmentation Fund are far below what is asked of this Presbytery, but it is hoped that as the merits of the fund become better known the contributions will advance.

PRESBYTERY OF GUELPH.

Hawksville and Linwood, which formed a pastoral charge on the Augmentation Fund, under Mr. Russell, was reduced to the standing of a mission field after his translation to the Presbytery of Chatham.

A new station has been organized at Metz, in the township of Garafraxa, in connection with the Sixth Line.

Eden Mills is still under the pastoral oversight of Mr. Strachan. A new church is about to be erected on a new site, with the permission of the Presbytery.

Elmira continues under the care of Mr. Hamilton, of Winterbourne, receiving supply on the afternoon of every alternate Sabbath.

Augmentation.

Only one charge was on the Augmentation Fund, Hawksville and Linwood, and it ceased to be so after the translation of its pastor, Mr. Russell.

In the Statistical Reports of congregations, \$630 is the amount returned as contributed to the Augmentation Fund to the 31st December, 1886. This is less than one-third of the amount apportioned to the Presbytery. The following congregations have not contributed: Mimosa, Doon and Hespeler, Galt Central Presbyterian Church, West Puslinch, Moorefield and Drayton, Rockwood, Acton, Hawksville and Linwood.

PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON.

Missions.

The number of mission fields within the bounds of the Presbytery has been considerably decreased during the year.

East Ancaster, which for many years has received supply through the Home Mission Committee has been united with part of the Caledonia charge, forming a self-sustaining congregation. North Pelham and Wellandport were united by Presbytery, and now have a settled pastor. The Fort Eric field, which has given both Presbytery and the Committee considerable anxiety, has made substantial progress, and has been given the status of a pastoral charge. The growth is chiefly at Victoria, at the Canadian end of the International Bridge, which is quite an important railway point.

Merritton has been united with Port Rohinson, forming a pastoral charge.

Cayuga and Mount Healey have been added to the list of stations. This is a promising field, and the Presbytery cherishes the hope that it will soon be in a position to call a ministr.

The other fields in the Presbytery—Port Colborne, Port Dalhousie, Louth, Haynes Avenue, St. Catharines, and Wentworth St., Hamilton, have received regular supply, and have at least held their own.

Louth, which formerly was connected with Merritton is now being wrought with Port Dalhousie.

Augmentation.

The amount required by the Presbytery from the Augmentation Fund during the past year was less than formerly. This was due to changes in the congregations rather than an increase in their contributions for stipend.

There are at present only four settled charges receiving assistance from the Augmentation Fund.

PRESBYTERY OF PARIS.

None of the mission stations in this Presbytery require aid at present from the Committee. They are either self-sustaining or supported by local funds.

Augmentation.

Mount Pleasant and Burford is the only congregation receiving assistance. It is hoped that the amount given may shortly be reduced, as the congregation has in near prospect the erection of a manse.

PRESBYTERY OF LONDON.

Missions.

During the past year Springfield has received constant supply, and the work has been well sustained. In connection with this station services have been begun at Aylmer, some six miles distant. The prospects, so far, are encouraging, and it is inspet that before long these two places may become sufficiently strong to be formed into a pastoral charge. North Street, which was efficiently worked last summer by Mr. Allar. Patterson, student, has, since October, been placed under the care of Rev. J. A. McConnell, of Delaware, who gives regular supply on Sabbath evenings. Under this arrangement no grant is received from the Home Mission Fund.

Fund. East Williams, though nominally a vacant congregation, has been supplied for the last three years as a mission station, being too weak to sustain a settled pastor. The people, however, though few in number, have held well together, and have contributed liberally for the supply of ordinances. They receive no grant.

Augmented Congregations.

The augmented congregations in this Presbytery are: Kintore, Port Stanley, Wardsville and Newbury, London East. While none of these have during the past year been able to increase their contributions to stipend, it is confidently expected that some of them will do so before next year, and thus reduce the amount of supplement at present required.

PRESBYTERY OF CHATHAM.

Missions.

The mission stations of this Presbytery have fairly prospered during the past year. Tilbury Centre is in much the same condition as at the end of last year, but at Windfall, a station connected with it, there has been a decided improvement. There is not much change at Peuce, Renaud Line and Belle River, except that, in the mean time, the last named place has, without any loss, been dropped, and the labour of the missionary confined to Peuce and Renaud Line. Buxton seemed dying twelve months ago, but it has wonderfully revived. The attendance at divine service on the Lord's Day has increased, and our people there are greatly encouraged.

Augmentation.

In this Presbytery there are three augmented congregations. One of them, Essex Centre, is steadily growing, and, no doubt, will, in time, be self-supporting. The other two, in point of financial strength, are just about where they were this time last year. In both cases the field is important, but limited.

PRESBYTERY OF SARNIA,

Missions.

There are four mission fields in the Presbytery of Sarnia. 1. Sombra Village and Duthel Church. 2. Guthrie Church, Black Creek and Wilkesport. 3. Inwood and Brooke. 4. Marthaville and Page's Schoolhouse. Two of these were opened during the past year. The greatest difficulty is experienced in getting suitable winter supply. In the old fields gradual progress is being made. The Presbytery hopes soon to erect two of its mission fields into regular charges.

Augmentation.

The number of augmented congregations is four, 1. Corunna, Mooretown and Knox Church, Moore:—This congregation is rapidly improving financially; the claim for the current year is only half that of the past year.

2. Oil Springs and Oil City:—This congregation made no progress during the past year, owing to losses by removals.

3. Point Edward:—This congregation also seems to have been stationary during the past year. It is not expected that there will be room for much further growth in this congregation.

4. Forest:—This is the most promising of the Probytery's supplemented congregations. It reduced its claim by \$50 for the current year. It is fully expected that within two or three years this congregation will be self-sustaining.

PRESETTERY OF STRATFORD,

Missions.

No mission stations in this Presbytery at present date.

Aurmentation.

There is now but one congregation receiving aid from the Augmentation Fund, Wellcaley and Crosshill. During the past year Millbank became self-sustaining, as Granton did the previous year. Both charges express their gratitude for the assistance given them, when unable of themselves to support Gospel ordinances.

PRESBYTERY OF HURON.

Missions.

Goderich Gaelic is the only mission station in the Presbytery.

Augmentation.

Exeter has become self-sustaining, and is now removed from the list.

PRESBYTERY OF MAITLAND.

No Mission Stations.

Augmentation.

One of the augmented congregations has become self-sustaining and removed from the list. Smaller grants have been asked for two others, with the expectation that they will soon increase their own payments towards the support of their ministers. Dungannon has erected a substantial and commodious church during the past year.

PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE.

Missions.

I. The County of Bruce, comprising fifteen townships, was twenty years ago an almost unbroken sion territory. There were only nine ordained ministers of our Church in this wide region.

mission territory. There were only nine ordained ministers of our Church in this wide region.

II. There are now thirty-one ordained pastors within the bounds of the county, and several mission stations, that will, no doubt, in the near future take shape as pastorates.

III. In the Presbytery of Bruce proper there are twenty settled congregations, which, with the exception of three, are self-sustaining.

There are now no mission stations south of Lake Huron within our bounds.
 North of Lake Huron, and in connection with our Presbytery, there are seventy-three mission stations, or preaching places. In this field there are five ordained missionaries and five

catechists The following outlines of mission work in this widely-scattered Presbytery have been prepared by Rev. A. Findlay and Rev. D. Cameron:

Algoma:—The work in this part of the field is advancing apace. We have to report considerable progress during the past year, both in the way of consolidating the work already undertaken and in extending the field. A larg, number of missionaries have been employed during the past year than during any similar period in the history of this field. Six ordained missionaries and three catechists were employed during the past winter where a year ago four ordained missionaries and two catechists were employed, and this staff of nine labourers will be further augmented by the addition of six student missionaries on the opening of navigation.

The "Sault" is still occupied by Mr. E. B. Rodgers. In Tarbutt and Bruce Mines, Messrs. A. F. Mackenzie and D. MoNaughton have had a busy winter in consolidating the work on their respective fields, and in making "rough places plain."

At Thessalon, Mr. D. H. McLennau, with the assistance of Mr. W. Corbett, catechist, has seen his At Thessalon, Mr. D. H. McLennau, with the assistance of Mr. W. Corbett, catechist, has seen his field, originally of four stations, extended to a field of twelve stations, and these already taking rank as "doers," since they have sent over \$100 as their contribution to the Schemes of the Church. At Gore Bay, Mr. J. L. Campbell is bringing the first year of his appointment to a close with a full record of work done in the way of completing organization over a widely extended and somewhat scattered field. At Manitowaning, Mr. D. Cameron, who might well plead past service as a reason for present inactivity, has set an example which many of our younger men might copy with advantage. In addition to his own large field he has during the past winter given service regularly every month on the Little Current field, dispensing ordinances, and in other ways doing much to strengthen the cause and encourage the people who, but for his kindness, would have had seven or eight months of silent Sabbaths. On St. Joseph Island and at Providence Bay Messrs. H. McLennan and I. Steele, catechists have been doing good service in presenting the way for the ordained missionary or the catechists, have been doing good service in preparing the way for the ordained missionary or the settled pastor. The fields, in addition to the foregoing, to be occupied during the summer, are: under the Presbytery, Cockburn Island and Meldrum Bay, Burpee and Silver Water: and, under the Students' Missionary Association of Knox College, Blind River, Spanish River, and Little Current. much to open up the North Shore for settlement, as well as make the islands more accessible, it will also facilitate the carrying on of our mission work, while it will greatly extend the area to be covered by our operations. In keeping with the character of our Church as a Mission Church the Presbytery of Bruce has secured the appointment of a missionary whose whole time is to be devoted to the men who will be engaged in the construction of this new line of railway.

We cannot limit the possibilities of this district as a mission field. Enough is known to assure us that at no distant day the present population will be many times multiplied. Large quantities of good agricultural land are still covered with the unbroken forest which the extension of projected lines of railway will speedily bring under the notice of hardy settlers. Minerals of great value and in great abundance are lying there awaiting capital, which will surely be inthoming to bring them to the surface. All this means an influx of population to settle the lands or work the mines, and this still further means the putting forth of missionary effort by the different churches to supply the ordinances of the Gospel to those who by their industry strive to build up their own and their country's

still further means the putting forth of missionary effort by the different churches to supply the ordinances of the Gospel to those who by their industry strive to build up their own and their country's wealth. Be it ours to retain the front rank in supplying that without which unlimited worldly riches leaves a man a people poor; with which the poorest are made rich.

Manitowaning Mission Field is a very large one, extending from north to south a distance of twenty-six miles, with five preaching stations. Owing to the barren, rocky, broken nature of the country the people are grouped together in the small valleys and plains from four to six miles apart. Services have been regularly held through the whole field on Sabbath, and occasionally during the week. A large number of children were baptized. In one place all the children of the family, the eldest son taking the vows himself; in another place the father and his child were baptized at the same time. Outside the field there are two places where I have preached occasionally. In one of them there are sixteen families; in the other there are between thirty-five and forty fishermen, never visited before by a minister. Here I gave monthly supply during summer. To accomplish such work I have preached three times three Sabbaths of the month, and the fourth twice, with an average driving of thirty-six miles per week.

Providence Bay Mission Field is also a large one, about eighteen miles between the two extremes, with six preaching stations. I have visited it last winter, baptized eight children, and the father of three of them. Mr. Steele, our catechist, is doing good work, and well liked by the people, as far as I was able to learn.

Little Current Mission Field is pretty large, about eighteen miles from the one and to the other

I was able to learn.

Little Current Mission Field is pretty large, about eighteen miles from the one end to the other, with three preaching stations. A church has been built and finished at the Current, and it is almost free of debt. The people are building churches at the other two stations, which, I hope, will be finished this summer. Little Current is a rising place. Two large sawmills were built here last summer, employing a large number of men. Mr. Mitchell, our student, did excellent work through the whole field. I have given a monthly Sabbath supply to Little Current during winter. To accomplish all my winter work my sleigh-driving will average fifty miles per week, and sometimes in the face of a blinding snow-storm with the thermometer 27° below zero. May the Lord bless the preaching of His word to perishing sinners.

Augmentation.

I. When the Augmentation Scheme was introduced, there were within our bounds nine congrega-tions which fell below the required minimum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750). Six of these were in receipt of aid from the old Supplemental Scheme.

II. Three of these have been dropped or removed, so only three remain a burden on the Scheme.

III. There is every prospect that two of these will ere long be removed, probably by the end of

this year.

IV. There is no prospect that any new congregation will be put on the list, at least no more than one new, and that only in the severance of present connection.

V. The contributions by the Presbytery to this Scheme have not been what they should. The

following things may account for this:

(1) We have no rich congregations; all have what they can do to be self-sustaining and meet

(2) We have no city within our bounds; two small towns and two churches in each till the two in W lkerton united.

(3) All the other congregations are either in small villages, in which you may find the representatives of all the denominations in Christendom, or in purely country places. It is the universal experience that country people are very slow to part with money.

(4) We find a position grainst the Scheme; this crops out in many ways, such as inconvenient questions, for example, when you solicit subscriptions for this Scheme you are asked: Does such a congregation get aid from this fund? Has Mr. So-and-so two stations to preach in? Does he require to keep a horse, etc., etc. We all find that there is a greater readiness to give to the other Schemes of the t hurch than to this. I believe every member of the Presbytery has done his utmost to remove this preinding, and I believe it will be removed or destroyed in time

this prejudice, and I believe it will be removed or destroyed in time.

The Scheme has done much good, and, while I hope this Presbytery will not long continue to burden it, yet other Presbyteries and fields require this or some such to aid them.

MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES.

MISSIONS.

The presecution of mission work during the past year was rendered somewhat difficult through various causes, chief among which was the drought that prevailed over a wide area, and more especially in the central parts of the North-West Territories. The country is depending almost wholly on grain crops as yet, and a failure in these means financial stringency. In many districts of Manitoba there is a noticeable improvement in the financial position of congregations. The extension of branch

lines of railway is gradually filling up districts that were partly abandoned, inasmuch as markets are brought within reach of the farmers. During the summer every field in the Synod was supplied, and the advance made in winter supply will appear when it is stated that the aggregate number of Sabbaths supplied last winter was 1,604, as against 1,253 the preceding winter. From many districts other denominations were compelled to withdraw owing to financial stringency, and our missionaries supplied the whole population with the means of grace. The last few years have made it manifest that the progress of the country is not to be as rapid as was at one time anticipated: Church and State must consequently be prepared to make sacrifices for a few years longer, that the moral and material well-being of the people may be secured. The ultimate result does not seem to be doubtful, but evidently there lies between the people and their goal a stretch and a struggle. The progress made during the year, and the present state of the work, will be better shown by taking the Presbyteries in order.

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

To the list of settled charges Blythfield is to be added, Mr. Douglas having been inducted pastor in March. Greenwood called Mr. McFarlane, and Fort William is anxious to secure a pastor. A mission was organized in North Winnipeg, and a church built; and steps have been taken to build a church in Fort Rouge, or South Winnipeg. Murillo, the centre of a farming district, about twelve miles west of Fort William, and a mining district to the south of Murillo, where about two hundred, men are employed, have been erected into a mission field. One missionary was employed last winter, and two will labour there this summer, one of them acting as teacher.

Schrieber, a town on the C. P. R., about 130 miles east of Port Arthur, is to be occupied this

summer for the first time. The missionary is to labour along the railway as circumstances suggests. By a re-arrangement of fields, Niverville and Clear Springs are united. An effort was made to secure a missionary to spend part of his time in the Mennonite settlements, but a suitable man for such work was not available. A German student, from Union Theological Seminary, is likely to occupy the field for the summer.

Sixteen missionaries at least will be in the mission field in this Presbytery this summer, as against fourteen last year. The gains in the Presbytery have been the advance of Blythfield to the status of a congregation, the organization of two mission fields, and the erection of a church.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

The extension of the Pembina Mountain Railway rendered necessary a re-adjustment of fields. In excension of the remoina Mountain Kallway rendered necessary a re-adjustment of fields. Six fields, with four stations each, have been formed between Cartwright and the Antlers. At Bossevain a neat frame church has been built, a hall purchased at Pilot Mound, and subscriptions secured to build at Killarney. Deloraine and Cartwright are also taking steps to build. The Beaconsfield people lost their church by fire, but they are preparing to build again. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

The gains of the Presbytery were the addition of two mission fields and the erection of a church.

There will be eleven missionaries in the field this summer, there were nine last year.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

Souris called Mr. W. M. Omand; Virden, Mr. A. Currie, and Oak Lake, Mr. D. H. Hodges. The calls were accepted, and these gentlemen are now the pastors of these respective congregations. Binscarth has called Mr. Simpson, and Knox Church, Brandon, Mr. Dustan, of Nova Scotia. The calls have been accepted. Birtle has called Mr. Hodnett. Whitewater, occupied for the first time

cans have been accepted. Brute has canter Mr. Homelet.

Whitewater, occupied for the first time last year, promises to become a good congregation in a year or two.

Churches were built at Birtle, Shoal Lake, Strathclair, and a building bought and fitted up by the congregation of Knox Church, Brandon. A manse was erected at Neepawa.

Grants have been made by the Church and Manse Building Board to erect two churches in the Shell River field, and the congregation of Oak Lake is preparing to build a manse. At Glenboro', Holland, and other centres, the people are anxious to build.

Two new fields are to be occupied this summer, viz., Arden, lying between Gladstone, Neepawa and Louise, in the Tiger Hills district. Twenty-four missionaries were employed during the year, and twenty for the current year. The gains for the year were the erection of one self-sustaining congregation, the advancement of five mission fields to the status of augmented congregations, the organization of a new mission field, and the erection of four churches and one manse.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

High River had a missionary of its own this year for the first time. Dalesboro' and Carnduff, in South-East Assiniboia, and Crescent Lake, north of Broadview, were also organized. Kinistino, in the Carrot River District, and Swift Current, on the C. P. R., had missionaries who discharged the duties of teacher and missionary with much acceptance. Lansdowne, south of Whitewood, was the duties of teacher and missionary with much acceptance. Initiatively, south of whitewood, was erected into a mission field. During the summer two missionaries laboured in the Rocky Mountains among the employés of the railway, and in the towns along the line. They were replaced by others during the autumn. During the summer at least 7,000 men were employed, and 3,000 during the winter. Revelstoke, Donald, Banff and Anthracite are the most promising towns west of Calgary at present. Sorvices are held, however, at every point where an audience can be secured—week evenings being utilized for the less important points. The work is laborious but most important.

The West Carlyle Church was burnt by a prairie fire, and a church at Fort Qu'Appelle, in the course of erection, fell a prey also to the flames. With great energy and commendable liberality, the Qu'Appelle congregation rebuilt their church. At Macleod (Broadview field), Battleford, Winlaw, Roxboro' and File Hills, churches were also erected, and a manse at Lethbridge. A church is in course of erection at Donald, and steps have been taken to build at once at Banff, Anthracite, Yorkton, Orkney, Wallace and Armstrong Lake. The fine stone church at Calgary is nearing completion.

Summing up results, the Synod gained one self-sustaining congregation, six mission fields advanced to the status of augmented congregations, fourteen new mission fields, eleven churches and two manses. It lost two churches by fire. Financial returns were made from only two Presbyteries, viz., Winnipeg and Regina, and in the case of Regina Presbytery they are not complete. A statement based on them would be nisleading. A comparison of the figures of last year with those of this year may be of interes. It may be premised, however, that the returns from the Presbytery of Regina must be very partial, and hence inaccurate. There are known to be about 1,700 Presbyterian families within the bounds of the Presbytery. There is not any settlement of any size where services were not held, and yet the returns give only for all stations about 1,200 families. The figures of congregations appearing in 1885-36, but removed to the augmented list, do not appear in the tables for 1886-37.

The whole number of missionaries employed last year was 81, of whom 36 were ordained. these are added the 19 who ministered to augmented congregations, and the Superintendent of Missions, the number under the Home Mission Committee will be seen to be 101. Besides these there were 10 pastors of self-sustaining congregations, three professors and a tutor, and 14 Indian mission-aries, making a staff of 129—of whom 73 were ordained. The number employed this year in the

Home Mission Field, and as pastors of augmented congregations, will be at least 111 or 112.

In these figures are not included the churches or manses in connection with our Indian Missions, neither are the families or communicants belonging to these missions.

Sabbath Schools are conducted wherever practicable, and the attendance last summer was over 7,000 in the whole Synod.

Presbyteries arrange. for dispensing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and large additions were made to the communion roll. In all congregations in the Synod the figures stand, as far as

were made to the communion roll. In all congregations in the Synod the figures stand, as far as reported, 5,623, as against 4 769 reported last year—a gain of 854.

As in other years, the Missionary Societies of Knox, Queen's, Montreal and Manitoba Colleges rendered valuable assistance during the summer. The students of Manitoba College helped to supply, during winter, all fields accessible from Winnipeg that were without regular missionaries.

Last year mention was made of the generosity of an Elder of the Church in Ottawa, who gave \$600 towards the support of the missionary at Fort McLeod. This grant is continued for the current year. The aid thus given has sustained a mission that has been blessed in doing much good.

Already a number of imprignants have varied and the number this way requires to be larger. Already a number of immigrants have arrived, and the number this year promises to be larger

than for several years past. For all new settlements provision is being made as fast as circumstances

I .-- PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG,

Augmentation.

There are four augmented congregations connected with the Presbytery of Winnipeg, the same number as reported last year. Services were held at eleven stations, and the families number 163, and the communicants, 247, as against 163 families and 240 communicants reported last year. the congregations are provided with manses, and the number of churches is eight. Contributions for the support of ordinances amounted to \$2,810, or an average of \$11.39 per communicant. The sum of \$270.75 was contributed for the Schemes of the Church. Springfield will likely become self-sustaining before the close of the current year.

Blythfield, an isolated settlement, supplied for the past thirteen years, made such satisfactory progress last summer as warranted the Presbytery in creeting it into a congregation. A call was extended to the Rev. James Douglas, the congregation promising \$550 and a manse. Three stations, extended to the Rev. James Douglas, the congregation promising \$550 and a manse. Three stations, with 30 families and a communion roll of 20, constitute the church. The Home Mussion Committee of the General Assembly declined to recognize the congregation as one entitled to receive aid from the Augmentation Fund, although the τ innister was inducted.

II. - PRESBITERY OF ROCK LAKE.

Has four augmented congregations with twenty-two stations, three churches, a hall, and a churchese. The hall was purchased this year by the congregation of Pilot Mound. The families number manse. The name was purchased this year by the congregation of Plot Mound. The families number 226, and the communicants 2°3, an increase of 10 families and 23 communicants. Contributions for the support of ordinances amounted to \$2,35°, or an average of \$9.04 per communicant. For schemes the amount was \$267. The grants voted by the Home Mission Committee are \$1,300 for the current year, as against \$1,400 last year.

III. - PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

Two congregations, Souris and Virden, were added to the former list, making 8 in all. One of these, Burnside, is vacant. The stations number 30, families 455, and communicants 575. Last year the families reported were 316, and the communicants 424. These congregations own ten churches, five manses, and a church-manse. The Neepawa congregation built a manse during the year. The sum of \$1,660, or an average of \$0.95 per communicant, is promised for the support of ordinances, as against \$4,548.50 paid last year. The amount of \$183 was given for the Schemes of the Church. Returns here are not complete. Returns here are not complete.

Oak Lake, with four stations, 40 families and 40 communicants, was erected into a congregation.

The Rev. D. H. Hodges was called and settled, the congregation promising \$580 towards his support. The Home Mission Committee declined to recognize the charge as an augmented congregation,

and refused aid from the Augmented Fund.

IV .- PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

The Rev. W. McWilliam demitted the charge of Prince Albert, and Dr. Jardine, of Brockville, was appointed in his place. The congregation has so increased in size that the present church is too small, and it is contemplated to build another church during the coming summer. There are three congregations, five stations, 97 families, and 211 communicants. These congregations own three churches and two manses. The families and communicants reported last year were, respectively, 98 and 155. There is promised, for the support of ordinances, \$2,400 (last year the amount was the

same), or an average of \$11.32 per communicant. Schemes received \$184.

To sum up for the Synod -No augmented congregations became self-sustaining, two have been added to the list and two refused. The number of congregations on the list is 19, with 68 stations. These own twenty-four churches, nine manses, and two church-manses. The families number 971, and communicants 1,286, a gain of 180 and 237 respectively, on last year's figures. For the support of ordinances, \$13,520 is promised, as against \$12,155 last year. Contributions to Schemes of the Church amounted to \$904.75. The rate per communicant, including manses, for the current year is \$10.51, and \$4,955 is voted by the Home Mission Committee for 19 congregations, as against \$4,245 last year for 17 congregations. Owing to the high cost of living, the salaries in the Presbytery of Regina have been raised to \$1,200 at Edmonton and other outposts. This increases the vote of the Home Mission Committee.

Faithful, conscientious work was done in all the congregations, but the unfavourable season pre vented a financial advance. Congregations are becoming more consolidated, however, and the evil effect of the inflation of 1882-3 is being fast obliterated.

The liberal aid of the committee in the past we cheerfully and thankfully acknowledge, but great sacrifices are made by self-denying men to advance the work, and the policy of the Church towards strengthening congregations and faithful pastors should be as generous as circumstances will permit. We regret to make such large requests for aid, but they are necessary.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT OF THE SYNOD OF MANITOBA.

At the meeting in October there was laid on the table and read a lengthened report from Mr. J. B. McKilligan of Winnipez, who l...d kindly agreed, at the suggestion of the committee, to examine the books and accounts of the Synod's Treasurer.

After full consideration it was resolved to remit Mr. McKilligan's report to the Home Mission Committee of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, with the request that they carefully consider it and intimate to the committee, prior to the first December next, their judgment on the several points therein referred to, and specially,—the necessity of having a competent Secretary-Treasurer, the discrepancies in the statements, and the removal of the reported deficit,—with the intimation that this committee does not feel justified in remitting money after this date to the Synod's

intination that this committee does not feel justified in remitting money after this date to the Synod's committee until it has some guarantee that the books and accounts are being kept in an intelligible and orderly manner. The following were appointed a sub-committee to take such action as might seem best, on hearing from the Synod's Committee: Dr. Cochrane, Messrs. Mitchell and Warden.

It was further resolved to put on record an expression of the Committee's appreciation of the valuable service rendered by Mr. McKilligan in connection with this report, and to convey to him the cordial thanks of the Committee for his gratuitous and laborious work.

At the meeting in March, the report of Mr. J. B. McKilligan, of Winnipeg, was again read. Mr. Warden also reported that at the request of the Home Mission Committee of the Synod, and after correspondence with members of the Executive, he had visited Winnipeg in the beginning of December, conferred with the Synodical Committee, and examined the system in vogue for keeping the books and for administering the work: and that on his recommendation a new system, the agricultars. books and for administering the work; and that on his recommendation a new system, the particulars of which he explained, had been adopted by the Synodical Committee, and that he had written up or which he explained, had been adopted by the Synodical Committee, and that he had written up from the former cash book of the Treasurer a book according to the new system containing all the transactions from the beginning of the present ecclesiastical year—1st April—to 3rd of December. He further stated that—accepting Vr. J. B. M. Killizan's report of the indebtedness to the Bank on 31st March as correct—there was a deficit at the 3rd December last of \$2,742.92, with interest, on the transactions of former years. Mr. Warden read several extract me of the Synodical Home Mission Committee bearing on the matter.

There was submitted through the Synodical Committee a claim for \$459.50, being the amount of a number of chaques charged to Mr. Robertson's private account, chiefly in 1881, which should have been charged to the Synodical account.

After lengthened consideration, the whole matter was referred to a sub-committee, consisting of Dr. Laing, Dr. Campbell, Messrs. Macdonnell, Farries, McKenzie and Warden.

At a later stage this sub-committee presented the following report:

In view of the fact that the annual financial statement of the Home Mission Committee of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, presented in Jone last, was unsatisfactory and inaccurate, the Home Mission Committee requested the Synod's Committee to have an audit made of the books and accounts, and suggested that Mr. J. B. McKilligan's services be secured for this purpose. Mr. McKilligan kindly undertook the work, and forwarded his report to the Committee in October last. While considering it impracticable to make an audit of the accounts owing to the insufficiency of the data furnished and to the way in which the books were kept, and while pointing out discrepancies between the Bank account and the Treasurer's books, Mr. McKilligan recommended the Committee to accept the Bank account as correct, the balance due at 31st March, 1886, being \$2,313.75.

Mr. Warden reported, after a careful scrutiny of the Treasurer's books from 1st April to 3rd December last, that this indebtedness (for services, etc., prior to 1st April, 1886) had been increased to \$2749.99. This indebtedness (for services, etc., prior to 1st April, 1886) had been increased to

December last, that this indentedness (for services, etc., prior to 1st April, 1sco) had been increased to \$2742.92. This indebtedness has been incurred partly by the purchase of ponies for the use of student missionaries in several fields, and there are now twenty-two of said ponies available, for which \$1,751.90 was paid. Your sub-committee recommend that the amount of indebtedness above stated (\$2,742.92) with the interest accrued thereon, be paid from the Home Mission Fund. Your sub-committee considered an application from the Synudical Home Mission Committee for grants to the several Presbyteries to the extent of \$1,700 for the purpose of procuring outfits for missionaries, and they recommend that the ponies above referred by distributed among the several Presbyteries according to their requirements. Your sub-committee further recommend that the claim of Mr. Robertson for \$450.50 baing amount paid by him at various times from his personal account for Robertson for \$459.50, being amount paid by him at various times from his personal account for Missionary services, be paid from the Home Mission Fund. It is satisfactory to be able to report that, at the suggestion of Mr. Warden, a new system of keeping the books and accounts has been adopted by the Synod's Home Mission Committee, by which it is expected that mistakes such as those which have occurred will be hereafter avoided.

The report was unanimously adopted.

Salaries.

At a meeting of the Committee, in October last, it was resolved to ask the several Presbyteries of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, as also the Home Mission Committee of that Synod, to consider whether the time has not arrived when the salaries of missionaries and of ministers in augmented congregations in the Synod should be placed more on a level with those of the older Pres-byteries of the Church, to report at the March meeting of this Committee. At the meeting in March communications were read from the Hone Mission Committee of the Synod, and also from the Presbyteries of Winnipeg and Brandon, in effect recommending that no reduction in the rate of salary he made, the cost of living in Manitoba being about twenty-five per cent., and in the North-West Territories fifty per cent. in excess of the cost in Outario and Quebec. No action was taken by the Committee. the Committee.

Grants for the Year.

Recommendation to General Assembly.

It was agreed to recommend to the General Assembly that the amount of the half-yearly claims for mission stations and augmented congregations be hereafter transmitted direct to the Convener of the respective Presbyteries, instead of through the Treasurer of the Synodical Committee.

Students' Salaries.

It was agreed to notify the Home Mission Committees of the Synod, and of the several Presbyteries in the Synod, that the allowance to students for services during the college session in fields receiving aid from the fund, shall not exceed \$5 per Sabhath, with travelling expenses—the grants to fields supplied by students being \$1 per Sabbath less in winter than in summer.

Grant for Expenses.

There was laid on the table a statement from the Home Mission Committee of the Synod, showing that the sum of \$2,634.29 had been paid for travelling and other expenses during the year anding 31st March. 1887. It was agreed to meet this amount to the extent of \$2,000, the sum allowed in March. last for this purpose.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

During the year the following missionaries were appointed to the Presbytery of Columbia: Rev. Alexander Dunn, Rev. Alexander Tait, Rev. F. McCuaig, and Rev. G. C. Patterson. Mr. McCuaig was, for some time after his appointment in October, laid aside by sickness, and has since McChaig was, for some time after his appointment in October, laid aside by sickness, and has since withdrawn his acceptance of the appointment. Mr. Dunn has been stationed at Albern', and Mr. Tait at Langley. The congregations of St. Andrew's Church, New Westminster, and of Vancouver are now self-sustaining, each paying a salary of \$1,500 per annum. The Vancouver field has been divided, Vancouver City remaining under Mr. Thompson, who was formally inducted in April, and Richmond and Ladnor's Landing being organized into a separate charge. The Nico's field has also been divided, Mr. Chisholm remaining in the Kamloops section of it. The transcence, to the Columbia Presbytery, of Donald and other stations in British Columbia, now under the care of the Presbytery of Regina, was referred to the Synod of Manitoba and the No.t. West.

From the Annual Report of St. Andrew's Church, New Westminster, we make the following

extracts, showing the gratifying progress of the congregation:
"It is of course a drawback to a congregation to be without a settled pastor; and doubtless the fact of our having been in that condition for over a year has militated to some extent against the financial prosperity of the Church; but, notwithstanding this unfavourable circumstance, the managers feel thankful that they can congratulate the congregation on the very satisfactory showing of the Treasurer's Report.

"During the year a handsome and commodious manse has been erected on the lot adjoining the church, at a cost of about twenty-eight hundred (\$2,800) dollars; and when it is remembered that our own people have contributed over fourteen hundred (\$1,400) dollars of this amount, it must be considered evidence of healthy growth and prosperity, that the ordinary revenue has been sufficient not only to meet ordinary expenditures, but to enable the managers to devote a considerable amount to necessary additions, alterations and repairs, to contribute over three hundred (8300) dollars to mission schemes and other deserving objects, and also to meet a considerable part of the vote of the congregation toward the travelling expenses of the Rev. Mr. Scouler, to British Columbia. "Although the church is now scated to its utmost capacity, there are no vacant seats except a few at the back, which have been reserved for visitors; and the managers recommend that the congregation should authorize there to appropriate to applicants only such number of sittings as

RECOMMENDATION.

SALARIES OF STUDENT MISSIONARIES.

The Committee resolved to recommend to the General Assembly that the remuneration of students for mission services in the summer months be increased to \$7 per week and board, and that the distinction existing between Theological and Literary students as to remuneration be abolished this recommendation to take effect from 1st April, 1888.

GRANTS FROM BRITISH CHURCHES.

During the year the following grants have been received: from the Church of Scotland, £50 stg.; from the Free Church of Scotland, £200 stg.; and from the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, £250 stg. At the meeting in March the Committee resolved to place on record an expression of its regret at the contemplated resignation of the Rev. Dr. Wilson, Convener of the Colonial Committee of the Irish Presbyterian Church, and its grateful thanks for his deep interest for many years in our Home Mission work.

MONTREAL COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Report of this Society for the past year not having been printed, the Convener has been unable to secure a copy in time for presentation to the Assembly. If it is received before the Minutes are printed it will be inserted.

The Society has during the past year prosecuted its labours with energy and success.

QUEEN'S COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Missionary Association of Queen's University presents the following report for the year ending March 31st, 1887: The object of this Association is to send out student missionaries to the more destitute parts of our own Dominion, and to support one ordained Medical Missionary in the

The reason for the existence of such an Association is the necessity of bringing students, while at College, into direct contact with mission work, both home and foreign. In addition to this, we feel that through the Association increased liberality is called forth on the part of students, graduates, and other friends.

The following fields were supplied by the Association during the summer of 1886:

ONTARIO.

MATAWATCHAN, ETC .- BY A. FITZPATRICK.

This is a difficult field to work, as there are many drawbacks. The men go to the shanties in the winter season, and are occupied in river-driving until late in the summer. There are those stations, including in all about 45 families, of whom 75 persons are communicants. The field deserves more attention, but doubtless receives as much as many other similar stations. We are glad to say that this field manifests signs of spiritual growth.

WILBUR, MUNDELL'S AND CANANTO-BY J. D. BOYD.

These three stations were worked together last summer for the first time. To a field is quite promising. The people turn out to the services very well, and put forth much efficiency assist the cause. During the summer two school-houses were erected. Sabbath schools were started in connection with each station, all of which were well attended. A Woman's Christian Temperance Union was organized at Wilbur, which has been the means of doing much good. During the summer special services were held, and as a result twenty-six made profession of Christian for the first time.

MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST.

MILLBROOK, ETC. -- BY G. R. LANG. B.A.

This field is situated about 13 miles to the south-east of the city of vinnipeg. The field is an interesting one, and there is much in it to give encouragement. It is situated in a part of Manitoba which has many inducements, and the prospects are favourable towards a permanent charge. Sabbath schools were conducted at each station. Collections were take for Queen's Collego Missionary Association as follows: Milicrock, \$3.80; North Plympton, \$2.2; South Plympton, \$2.26.

TARBOLTON, ETC.-BY R. M. PHALEN.

This field is situated about 25 miles north-west of Brandon. It comprises six stations, covering a territory which is about 24 miles from east to west by 16 miles from north to south. Services were conducted fortnightly at each station, and the attendance, in proportion to the number of inhabitants, was very good. The people showed an evident desire for the Gospel. Sabbath school work was carried on at the different stations, and proved very satisfactory. This is a promising field, and the people hope soon to be able to have an ordained missionary of their own.

TOUCHWOOD HILLS-BY W. J. FOWLER, M.A.

This mission field is 324 miles west of Winnipeg, and about 80 miles north of the C.P.R. During the summer, service was held at two stations, viz.: Round Plain and Touchwood. The number of families in the field is about forty, including single persons having homesteads. An Indian population of about 800 is in the neighbourhood of this field, which is therefore peculiarly situated. The Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper were dispensed at the Round Plain station.

ALAMEDA-BY O. BENNETT, B.A.

The Alameda mission field lies about 220 miles west of Winnipeg and 80 miles south of Moosomin, a station on the main line of the C.P.R. This field comprises five stations, the extreme points being 50 miles apart. Boscurvis, the most southerly point in the field, comprises, in addition to Canadians, a few families in Northern Dakota. At Alameda a neat church has been erected. Here a fourishing Sabbath school is conducted. As the settlers are about 80 miles from a railroad, they suffer many privations and discouragements. In spite of these discouragements, and the drought that prevailed last summer, the people contributed very liberally. Through their kindness the student was provided with board free. The efforts of the Association in sending the Gospel here are much appreciated. The amount expended for the year 1886-87, is \$1,573,11, leaving a balance against the Society of \$64.66.

KNOX COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY, 1886-87.

This Society, which was established in 1845 for the purpose of evangelizing French Canadian Roman Catholics, has long since abandoned its original purpose. It now devotes itself to the two-fold object of sending the Gospel to places otherwise destitute of it, and of creating and fostering a missionary spirit among its members. All those who are pursuing their studies in Toronto with a view to entering the ministry of the Presbyterian Church are regarded as members.

wiew to entering the ministry of the Presbyterian Church are regarded as members.

To accomplish its object, Public and Ordinary Meetings of the Society are held. In past years Ordinary Meetings were held monthly, but this year, owing to the increase of work, it was found convenient to hold semi-monthly meetings. At these meetings Reports are read, and the general business of the Society is conducted. There is also provision made for informing the members who attend these meetings in regard to general mission work. The Public Meetings were so encouraging in past years that it was considered wise to hold two during the session instead of one. The first was held November 26th. At this meting two papers were read, one on "Mission Work among the Lumbermen of Muskoka and Algoma," the other on "Work among Western Men"; also two addresses were delivered, one by the President of the Society, on "College Interest in Missions," the other by Rev. P. Wright, B.D., of Stratford, on "Foreign Mission Work." At the second meeting, held February 18th, two papers were read, one entitled "Among the Eskimos," the other "The Great Dark Continent." Mr. Goforth delivered an address on the subject, "Our Treatment of a great Trust," and Rev. G. M. Milligan, B.A., on the "Apologetic Value of Missions." Both meetings were instructive and inspiring.

During the summer months student missionaries are sent to different fields to preach the Gospel and establish stations in the most promising centres. When these stations become sufficiently strong, they take their place among the regular mission stations of the Church. During the past summer 17 fields were occupied by as many students. These fields comprised 68 stations. In 10 of these weekly services were held; 56 had fortnightly services; and two had occasional services; 32 stations had organized Sabbath schools; 15 Bible classes, and nine payer-meetings were held weekly. Every Sabbath 39 services were held, with a total average attendance of 2,838, representing a membership of 657. The summer's work shows an increased membership of 112, while baptism was administered to 73.

The expenses of the Society are met largely by contributions from the different fields. But as the revenue derived from this source does not equal the expenditure, the Society looks for aid to friends outside the fields, without which it would be impossible to carry on the work. During the past summer the expenditure amounted to \$3,012.73, and of this sum the fields contributed \$2,040.33; the balance was met by outside contributions.

The Society gratefully acknowledges that in the past sufficient revenue has been received from this source to keep the expenditure within the income, and it hopes that an increased liberality in the future will render an extension of the work possible.

The following is a detailed account of work done during the past summer: -

SOCIETY'S FIELDS.

MANITOBA AND NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES,

CUT-ARM CREEK-J. J. ELLIOTT, B.A.

This field lies a few miles west of Manitoba boundary, and an equal distance north of the C.P.R. it takes its name from two streams, the Little and Big Cut-Arm, which here empty into the Qu'Appelle River The soil is good; the surface rolling prairie, diversified with numerous bluffs of light timber. The district has been settled some four or five years, but very little mission work was done before last summer. Six stations, three north and three south of the Qu'Appelle, were supplied with regular fortnightly services. The number of families in the field is in the neighbourhood of sixty, about half of whom are nominally Presbyterian.

Owing to the scattered nature of the settlements very little has yet been done in Sabbath school work. A beginning was made by organizing a School at Helburn. A kindly welcome was given the missionary in all parts of the field, and the work was, on the whole, very encouraging. The Sacraments were dispensed by Rev. Mr. Douglass, of Brandon.

Number of Presbyterian families, 30; total number of families, 60; total average attendance, 160; total number of members, 27; total contributions, \$99; total cost, \$249; cost to Society, \$80; time, six months.

BUFFALO LAKE-H. R. FRASER, B.A.

This field lies twelve miles north of Moose Jaw, a town four handred miles west of Winnipeg. It is thirty-five miles long and twelve wide. These years have elapsed since the first farmer settled here, and now the people are living at an average distance apart of one mile and a half. The soil is good; the land is a treeless and rolling prairie.

The children were taught the Word at their homes, as the missionary travelled from point to point. By the kindness of Outario friends the field was supplied with one hundred and forty Sabbath school books, and about as many magazines. They were found very helpful in the work.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed August 25th, by Rev. S. J. Taylor, of Moose Jaw.

Number of families, 22; young men with claims, 30; total average attendance, 77; total number of members, 20: total contributions, \$32.30; total cost, \$234,50; cost to Society, \$80; time, air morths. six months.

RIVERSIDE-A. R. BARRON, B.A.

Riverside is delightfully situated along Lang's Valley and the Souris River, one hundred and eighty miles south-west of Winnipeg. Fortnightly services were held in school-houses at the following stations: Greenfield, Albion, Langvale, Heastip, Pinkham, and River Bank. Three new Sabbath schools were opened, and two old ones reorganized. Seventeen members were enrolled, six by certificate, and eleven by profession of faith. Owing to a fair crop, in spite of extremely dry weather, and increased facilities for marketing their produce, the people are more hopeful than they have been for several years. They gave good support at all the stations, and appreciated the services which we hope were blessed. which we hope were blessed.

On the 22nd August the Sacraments were dispensed by Rev. A. H. Cameron, of Boissevain. Number of Presbyterian families, 38; young men with claims, 30; total average attendance, 159; number of members, 49; total contributions, \$185.59; total cost, \$231.10; cost to Society, \$45.51; time, six months.

LONG LAKE-ALEXANDER MANSON.

The Long Lake field, which is about twenty-five miles north-west of Regina, has made encouraging progress during the two years it has been under the Society's care. Two neat frame churches, worth \$500 each, were erected last summer. Services were conducted fortnightly at Long Liketon, Marieton, Wascana, and Pense, and occasionally at Sussex. Bible-classes were taught at the three stations just mentioned. Cottage meetings were held in different parts of the field. The attendance at all these services was good, and the missionary everywhere received a hearty welcome.

The Sacraments of Saptism and the Lord's Supper were dispensed by Rev. A. Urquhart, of Regina. Seven members were added by certificate, and seven by profession of faith.

Number of Presbyterian families, 45; number of members 57; number of young men, 70; total contributions, \$119.18; total cost, \$248.60; cost to Society, \$80; time, six months.

Note.—The Society received aid from the Regina Presbytery to the amount of about \$150.

ALGONA DISTRICT.

LITTLE CURRENT-A. E. MITCHELL.

Work was continued here during the summer with gratifying success. Five stations were occuwork was continued nere during the summer with gratifying success. Eve stations were occupied. The church at Little Current was completed, and on the 8th of August was dedicated to God's service, Rev. Dr. J. K. Smith, Moderator of General Assembly, preaching in the morning, Rev. A. Findlay, Superintendent of Missions, in the afternoon, and Rev. D. Cameron, of Manitowaning, in the evening. Two other churches, one at Green Bay, the other at Kockvale, were commenced, and will be completed next summer. Rev. Mr. Findlay visited the field and dispensed the Sacraments. Twenty-two names were added to the roll.

Number of Presbyterian families, 65; total average attendance, 226; number of members, 70; total contributions, 8113 · total cost, 8142; cost to Society, \$29; time, four and a half months.

BLIND RIVER-T. NATTRESS.

This field is situated on the north channel of the Georgian Bay. It contains four regular stations: Blind River, Algoria Mils, and Serpent River, situated on the coast, and Thompson Township, ten miles inland, on the Mississauga River. The first three mentioned stations are lumbering villages, the other is an agricultural district. In each of these stations a Sabbath school is conducted throughout the year. The schools at Serpent River and Thompson's were not organized till last

To aid the work 225 books were secured from the Presbyterian congregations at Weston, Woodbridge, and Knox Church, Vaughan. The field itself raised \$55, in addition to ordinary contributions, for Sabbath school work.

Rev. Mr. Findlay visited the field in August, and dispensed the Sacraments.

Total number of families, 80; number of members, 33; total contributions, \$87.70; total cost, \$155.40; cost to Society, \$67.70; time, four months.

MUSKOKA AND PARRY SOUND DISTRICT.

PARRY SOUND -P. M'LAREN.

This field is situated in the vicinity of Parry Sound village. It is connected with the Presbyterian congregation in the village. It consists of three stations, viz.: Parry Sound Road, Christie Roal, and Carling. A fourth station was organized in Carling West, and worked with the other three. These stations were divided into two groups, and services were conducted in each group fort-

BAYSVILLE-D. MACKENZIE, B.A.

This field lies directly east of Bracebridge, at a distance of sixteen miles. It consists of three stations: Baysville, Hamilton, and Menomenee. During the summer, weekly services were held at Baysville, and fortnightly services at each of the other two stations. At Baysville, a Bible-class was conducted every Thursday evening, with considerable success.

During a part of the season Gordon's school-house, a station eight miles east of Baysville, was supplied with fortnightly services. From the attendance and the number of people in the neighbour-

supplied with forthightly services. From the attendance and the number of people in the heighbourhood, there is reason to believe that this will be a prosperous station in the course of a few years. Sacraments were dispensed at Baysville and Hamilton, by Rev. Mr. Henry, of Creemore. Number of Presbyterian families, 30; number of members, 54; total average attendance, 160; contributions, \$110; total cost, \$210; cost to Society, \$100; time, six months.

COBOCONK-D. PERRIE.

In this field a weekly service was held at Coboconk, and fortnightly at Head Lake and Baddow, and during the latter part of the summer at Rosedale. The work throughout the whole field was encouraging. Bible-classes were conducted at Coboconk and Head Lake, with a good attendance

The church in course of erection at Coboconk was completed, and formally opened for worship. A Sabbath school was organized at this station about the beginning of August, and the work of instructing the young is favourably progressing.

The Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper were dispensed by Rev. Mr. Lochead, of

Fenelon Falls.

Number of Presbyterian families, 27; number of members, 40; total average attendance, 285; contributions, \$132.93; total cost, \$210.23; cost to Society, \$73.30; time, six months.

SEBRIGHT-J. GILCHRIST.

This field is better known as "Mud Lake." It is situated in the northern part of the counties of Ontario and Victoria. There are two principal stations: Sebright and Uphill; but, in addition to these, services were held fortnightly at Mud Lake, Dalrymple, and Sadowa. Two Bible-classes were conflucted during a part of the summer, one at Sebright, the other at Mud Lake, and a Presbyterian Sabbath school, the first in this part of the country, was organized and carried on throughout

At Sebright, where the work was very dead for some years, a deep interest was aroused, and, as a result, a comfortable church was erected and nearly completed. The Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper were dispensed by Rev. Mr. Ferguson, of Uptergrove. The ministers of Lindsay Presbytery supply Sebright and Uphill during the winter.

Number of Presbyterian families, 70; number of members, 53; total average attendance, 267; total contributions during summer, \$140.29; for winter supply, \$37; total cost, \$196.15; cost to Society, \$55.86; time, six months.

WAUBAUSHENE-R. J. M. GLASSFORD.

This field contains four stations, viz.: Waubaushene, Port Severn, Sturgeon Bay, and Fesserton. Weekly service was held at Fesserton and Sturgeon Bay, and at Waubaushene and Port Severn on alternate Sabbath evenings. Well-equipped Sunday schools flourish at each of the stations. The libraries at Fesserton and Sturgeon Bay were increased by eighty and seventy-five volumes respec-During the werk well-attended prayer meetings were conducted in each of the villages. A deep and growing interest in spiritual things is noticeable throughout the district. In addition to the contributions, as per "statistical table," the sum of \$35.73, in aid of Foreign Missions, was the amount of a plate collection one Sunday in September. An arrangement is about to be effected, by

which a regular pastor will be placed over this field.

Rev. D. D. McLeod, of Barrie, visited the field in October, and dispensed the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper; upwards of fifty sat at the Communion table, of whom eleven were placed on the roll for the first time.

Number of families, 129; number of members, 45; total average attendance, 482; total contributions, \$447.60; total cost, \$258.60; time, six months.

MORRISON AND RYDE-M. P. TALLING.

Morrison and Ryde are two townships in Southern Muskoka. In each of these townships there are two mission stations. Services were held fortnightly. Deep interest was manifested in the work. In Morrison a neat frame church was erected, and during the Christmas holidays was formally opened. The entire cost of the building was \$625, of which \$90 is still unpaid. The missionary raised \$130 among other congregations. Ryde was taken up for the first time by the Society during last sunmer. A Sabbath school was organized at Buck Lake. Membership in this station is ten.

BYNG INLET-D. G. M'QUEEN, B.A.

The pretty villages of Byng Inlet, North and South, rest securely upon their rocky foundations five miles up the inlet that forms the mouth of the Maganetawan River. The inhabitants are entirely dependent upon the lumber trade carried on here by Burton Bros. in Byng Inlet North, and by Georgian Bay Lumber Company, in Byng Inlet South. To the latter company are due the thanks of the Missionary Society. They have hitherto paid the travelling expenses of the missionary and also paid for his board, while in the field.

There are over forty families in the two villages, and of that number nineteen are Protestants. The work is necessarily limited, but very encouraging. Rev. S. Carruthers, of Kirkwall, dispensed the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in August; seventeen sat at the Lord's table, three of these for the first time. Three children were baptized.

Number of Protestant families, 19; number of members, 15; total average attendance, 85; total contributions, \$150; total cost, \$156.30; cost to Society, \$6.30; time, six months.

BETHUNE-P. J. PETTINGER.

This field, occupied by the Society this season for the second time, consists of two townships, Proudfoot and Bethune. In these townships four stations were occupied, viz.: Bethune, Sandlake, Birchdale, Ravensworth and Eighth Line. Fortnightly services were held in each throughout the

summer months.

Number of Presbyterian families, 15; number of members, 25; other families, 20; total average attendance, 70; total contributions, \$37; total cost, \$140.50; cost to Society, \$103.50; time, six

STURGEON FALLS-E. D. EDGAR.

This place is situated on the north shore of Lake Nipissing, on the Sturgeon River. It is a fair agricultural country, as well as a lumbering centre, and, in addition, some minerals have been discovered. The main line of the C. P. R. passes through the village.

There are fifty-two families in all; about half of these are French Roman Catholics, the rest are English-speaking people belonging to different denominations. A union Sabbath school was conducted every Sabbath, also a Bible class. Services were held every Sabbath, and a fortnightly prayer meeting. Rev. Mr. Mordie visited the field and dispensed the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Number of Presbyterian families, 11; average attendance, 34; total contributions, \$14.57; total cost, \$109.30; cost to the Society, \$64.63; time, eleven weeks.

M'CONKY-E. B. STEELE.

This field is situated north-east of Parry Sound. It consists of two principal stations, Dunchurch and Loring, and some smaller stations. The field is difficult to work, owing to the fact that Dunchurch and Loring are twenty-eight miles apart. Over this tract of country the missionary had to travel fortnightly. To prevent such labour the Society proposes to divide this field during next summer, making Loring and Golden Valley one station, and Dunchurch and Fairholm another.

Number of Presbyterian families, 25; total average attendance, 115; number of members, 51; contributions, \$43.16; total cost, \$161; cost to Society, \$117.84; time, six months.

FRANKLIN-P. M'NABB.

This field stretches along the north shore of Lake of Bays. It consists of three stations, viz.: Dwight, Cain's Curners, and McCutcheons. For some time the field was supplied by the Barrie Presbytery, but this year it was placed under the care of this Society. The work during the past summer was very successful in increasing membership, and in inspiring the Church with greater earnestness and Christian Charity.

Rev. Mr. Henry, of Creemore, visited the field in September and dispensed the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Sixteen members were united on profession of faith.

Number of families,—; number of members, 48; total average attendance, 121; contributions, \$37; total cost, \$172.20; cost to Society, \$115.20; time, six months.

WINTER WORK.

During the session the Society gave weekly supplies to Waubashene, Coboconk, Sebright and Uphill, and Dovercourt. There were ten members engaged in Sabbath school work in the Central Prison, and six in the Gaol. Afternoon services were held weekly in the Hospital for Sick Children, and evening services in the Home for Aged Women. Others of the members were engaged in different mission schools of the city, and in holding evening services in mission stations.

MANITOBA COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY, 1886-87.

This Society had two missionaries in the field during the past summer. The points occupied were Clear Springs and Moose Mountain. The receipts for the year amount to \$315,10.

MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN.

The following is an abstract of the Lumbermen's Mission, presented to the Synod of Montreal

and Ottawa by the Convener, Rev. Dr. Armstrong:
As in previous years, a large quantity of literature has been distributed among the men in the

lumber shantles by missionaries and colporteurs, under the auspices of this mission.

The Rev. D. L. McKechnie, of Mattawa, the Rev. William Shearer, of Aylwin, and the Rev.

Joseph Gaudier, of Coulonge, have done faithful service in the various lumber regions visited by them. Their services have been highly appreciated by the lumbermen, both English and French,

Protestant and Catholic.

Wholesume literature, both in French and English, has also been sent to the men in the shantles by means of the colporteurs of the Ottawa Auxiliary Bible Society and others.

Mr. McKechnie reports that he began work on the 5th of January, and finished on the 25th of March. He experienced more than ordinary difficulty in reaching the shanties this year on account

of the great depth of snow.

He says: "In some of the shanties I visited I found that the men had nothing at all to read. The liberal supply of tracts, papers and books I was able to leave must prove a real boon to them.

One is always meeting with evidence to show that the literature we distribute is well read.

As only a few of the French can read, it is a common sight to see one reading aloud and

others listening. Mr. McKechnie notes "a considerable change for the better among the men engaged in lumbering. This is owing to the influence of the Churches down the country to which the men belong." He says: "Those who are Christians try to keep their own hearts, and, amid unfavourable circum-

stances, to keep the flame within them from becoming totally extinguished. It is to those who are thus trying to help themselves that the visit of the missionary is especially helpful."

He concludes by saying: "Among the French there is also a change for the better. They have a better knowledge of ministers and of Protestantism than formerly. They are not afraid to take and read the papers we distribute. The priests no longer forbid the people to read our tracts, nor order them to burn our Bibles."

The Rev. Mr. Shearer, of Aylwin, was in the woods six weeks. He visited 23 shanties, 17 depôts, and 11 families. He preached thirty-three times to audiences varying from 6 to 67 men.

He distributed 5,000 papers, tracts and books, and travelled 650 miles.

He says: "My reception has been even more hearty than in former years. The papers are

gladly received, perused, and then safely stowed away to be taken home in the spring."

He speaks encouragingly of his work, and says: "It is a grand sight to see big, stalwart, roughlooking fellows sitting in the dark shadows of the low camp, with the ruddy glare from the big, blazing log-pile striking their faces and the exposed parts of their romantic dress, listening to the Way of Life. Many of these men never heard the way of salvation before."

The Rev. Joseph Gaudier, of Coulonge, reports that he distributed literature to 24 shanties, 7 stopping-places, 5 depôts, and 23 families.

Owing to extreme snow-storms and continuous drift he personally visited only 23 of these. Mr. Gaudier, who is a veteran in this work, says: "Knowing well the dearth of the Gospel among the shantymen, I would gladly spend the larger part of the winter in this work, but I am not able to endure now, for any length of time, the fatigue and exposure of long journeys in the forests, over lakes, and often amid great depths of snow, which must be tramped down before the horse can pass on." "It is cheering," he says, "to see the eagerness with which the literature is received and read. Most of these people never get any religious reading except what you send them, and many of them never heard the Word of God read and preached except by your missionary."

The Church should recognize the great zeal and perseverance with which her missionaries to the lumber shauties carry on their work. Even in favourable years it is a work involving great hardship,

and the unusual severity of the past winter taxed their endurance to the utmost.

It is doubtful if any men in the service of our Church either at home or abroad, have been called upon to undergo as great hardships as these self-denying missionaries, who seek to minister to

the lumbermen in the isolated little shanties scattered throughout our great pine forests.

It is a matter of regret to the Committee that they lose for the future the services of one of the most enterprising missionaries that ever entered the field, the Rev. W. Shearer, of Aylwin.

The literature in English, consisting of books, tracts, illustrated papers, etc., has been obtained from the Religious Tract Society, London, which has dealt with the Committee with its usual

Your Committee contemplate making an extra order for literature early in the autumn, so as to have an abundant supply on hand, that not only missionaries and colporteurs may be fully supplied, but that ministers, from whose congregations men go up to the woods in winter, may be furnished with books, tracts and papers to send to them as opportunity may permit.




REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE ON AUGMENTATION.

The results of the past year's work are fairly satisfactory, though it is greatly to be regretted that, owing to the insignificant measure of support given to the scheme by many congregations, especially in Western Ontario, the Reserve Fund has been all but exhausted in order to pay the full amount of

In each of these cases, the number of communicants has greatly increased without any corresponding increase of financial strength.

The Presbytery of Brandon asked a grant of \$370 for Oak Lake. The Committee declined the application on the ground that this congregation should not, in their judgment, have been erected into a pastoral charge, the field being one that should be aided from the Home Mission Fund.

It was agreed to recommend to the General Assembly: (1) That the following words be added to Section VII (5) of the regulations: "or until the congregation shall have been dealt with by the Presbytery and an explanation satisfactory to the Presbytery and the Committee been given." (2) That the following words be added to Section IV, Note (a) "where the number of communicants is more than double the number of families, the Committee shall have discretionary power to make a grant, even though the minimum contribution per communicant be not reached."

The following tables will serve to show the present relation of the several Presbyteries to the fund, and the progress which has been made since the scheme was inaugurated in October, 1883.

Table I. sets forth (as was done last year): (1) The amount asked by the Committee from each Presbytery; (2) The amount actually contributed; (3) The average rate per communicant; and (4) The grants made from the Fund to the several Presbyteries.

On these figures it may be remarked:

1. While about one-sixth less was asked from each Presbytery than in the preceding year (the whole amount wanted being \$30,000 instead of \$36,000), there are fourteen Presbyteries which show an absolute increase of contributions.

2. Two Presbyteries—that of Lanark and Renfrew and that of Toronto—have raised more than the amount asked by the Committee. The Presbyteries of Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Barrie, and Hamilton, though not reaching the amounts assigned, have shown commendable liberality. On the other hand, there are seven Presbyteries which have given less than one-half of the amounts asked, and nine Presbyteries in which the average rate of contribution is ten cents or less-per communicant (the average required throughout the Western Section being thirty cents).

Table II. shows the results of the working of the Augmentation Scheme since its inauguration in October, 1883. Members of the Church, who have hitherto looked with indifference or disfavour on this effort, should examine these figures. They should also read the testimony (as set forth in the body of the Convener's report), which comes from Presbytery after Presbytery, to the good which has been accomplished through the Augmentation Fund.

The scheme has not been a failure. Even were it to cease now, the good done by it would be lasting. There are indications, however, of a growth of interest in it which will make it in coming years a yet greater boon to the weak charges in the church. If Presbyteries will carefully discriminate between cases in which the aid of this fund is really needed, and cases in which it might be dispensed with, the hands of the Committee will be strengthened, and objectors will be to a large extent disarmed.

It will be seen from the financial statements submitted, that the state of the Home Mission and Augmentation funds calls for the serious consideration of the General Assembly. At the present rate of contributions, Home mission work must be very materially curtailed. The Committee asked at the beginning of the year for \$36,000 from the congregations in the various Presbyteries. Of this amount only \$25,181.63 has been given. The balance of the \$47,297.67 expended, has been made up from the following sources: Balance of last year \$2,726.02: Grants from British Churches \$2,426.91: Bequests, \$2,806.46: Donations, \$750: Interest, \$200: taken from Reserve fund, \$11,770.65—in all, \$20,716.04. There never was a period in the history of the Church when there were so many openings for mission work, but with a prospective deficit of nearly \$12,000, and an expenditure of \$20,000 above the contributions of congregations, instead of further aggressive works, there must be retrenchabove the contributions of congregations, instead of further aggressive work, there must be retrenohment, which will be felt most severely by the great mission fields of our Church in Muskoka, Algoma, Manitoba, the North-west Territories, and British Columbia.

As regards Augmentation, in view of the clear and comprehensive statement of the Convener, it is only necessary to repeat that of the \$30,000 asked by the Committee at the beginning of the year, only \$23,808 has been given by the congregations in the various Presbyteries.

APPENDIX`NO. 2.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE, 1886-87

(EASTERN SECTION).

The year past has been, on the whole, one of prosperity in our Home Mission fields. The work has been prosecuted with a good deal of vigour, and, as the reports show, with encouraging results, in most of the Presbyteries. The Lord has been mindful of us and blessed us. He has kept our fields in peace, and our labourers in health, and has given testimony to the word of His grace, by inclining hearts to obey its call, and yield to His love.

In submitting this annual report to the Assembly, the Committee very gratefully acknowledges the good hand of our God upon us, and prayerfully commits the work and the workmen to His

measureless grace.

ORDAINED MISSIONARIES.

For several years past the Committee, in conjunction with Presbyteries, has followed the plan of appointing an ordained missionary to take charge, for a year or more, of a group of stations, so situated that they can be ministered to with some degree of regularity, by one man. This method, where it is practicable, has many obvious advantages. It approaches to the plan of the settled pastoral charge, giving to the people the benefit of periodical services in winter as well as summer, constant sessional oversight, and regular dispensation of ordinances. Some of these fields have been supplied for several years by the same men; so that their organization has become nearly as perfect

as that of settled congregations.

A year ago the Presbytery of St. John went so heartily into this scheme that they arranged eight groups of stations, from which promises of support, ranging from \$400 to \$520 for the year, were obtained. The Woman's Home Missionary Society of the Presbytery, that had previously been supporting a superintendent of missions within the bounds, most generously offered \$50 for each of these fields; and the Home Mission Committee agreed to supplement the salaries up to \$700, Last fall a ninth labourer was added to this staff; and this spring, while one station goes off, becoming

a settled charge, two more are added to the list.

In other Presbyteries four such labourers have been at work for a part or the whole of the year and this spring the number is increased.

CATECHISTS.

Besides the thirteen labourers employed in the capacity of ordained missionaries, thirty-five catechists, most of whom were students of Divinity preparing for the ministry, were at work during the summer, and one of them for the whole year. These men are almost without exception full of zeal and energy, and accomplish much good while engaged in their respective fields. It is much to be regretted that their work cannot usually be followed up by any degree of regularity during the winter months. As a Church we have lost heavily in the past, by not being in a position to garner the harvest of our catechists' summer sowing and watering. Not a few, ready to unite with the Church about the time of their departure from the field, finding no Presbyterian minister to take charge of them, have united with other Churches, and are active workers among them. We regret Church about the time of their departure from the field, finding no Presbyterian minister to take charge of them, have united with other Churches, and are active workers among them. We regret this, not because we do not rejoice in the increase and prosperity of our sister Churches, but because we find our own thereby seriously weakened, and unable to do the work she could otherwise accomplish for our Master. With a view to ascertain how far this evil exists, the Committee, in pursuance of the injunction of Assembly, requested Presbyteries to report as to the supply they are furnishing the vacant mission stations during the winter. In reply, nearly all say they are appointing some of their members to give them services, as frequently and regularly as possible, but none of them state the number left without supply of stated ordinances. With our present agency an occasional service is about all that can be given. That this is not fully satisfactory all will admit; but a more excellent way has not yet discovered and commended itself to the Presbyteries of our Synod.

SUPPLY OF VACANCIES.

This department of the Committee's work has been attended to with great care every month. On the 1st of May last year, our roll of licentiates and ministers, for this purpose, numbered eleven. Of these, one was appointed at the beginning of the year to Harbor Grace, where, if he accepts their call, he will soon be settled as pastor. Three have been settled in our Synod, and the rest have

More men, likely to be called by congregations, are needed still, in order to meet the wants of the several Presbyteries. Our most clamant need for the last year was of preachers of the Gaelic language. To endeavour to supply this lack, we got some of our Gaelic-speaking brethren to correspond with Gaelic students and licentiates in Scotland, with a view to obtain the services of some of them in our field. The result has been, we are sorry to report, not very encouraging. We are looking for one, but are not certain of obtaining even him. We have pressing need of at least five, and would gladly welcome them if they should cast in their lot among us. them if they should cast in their lot among us.

EXTRACTS OF REPORTS.

We submit the following extracts from reports of settled missionaries and catechists, they are mere specimens, but will help to explain the tables appended, and will furnish information about the several stations.

PRESBYTERY OF ST. JOHN.

The Rev. William Stuart, last year Convener of the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee, in writing about the fields of the ordained inissionaries, says of themselves: "They are all too hard worked to furnish many reports, but are doing grand service for the Church."

John Willet, Esq., the present Convener of said Committee, sends us the following report:

The Convener of the St. John Presbytery's Home Mission Committee for 1886 (Rev. William Stuart) acknowledges the substantial aid rendered by the Woman's Home Mission Society to missionaries and their fields, and the same has been attended with most happy results. The grant of \$50 of the ladies, added to the supplement by the Home Mission Board, has in all cases stimulated the fields, in fact the whole Presbytery, to greater exertion in the work. All the mission fields bid fair to come up to the prescribed amount of salary, \$10 per week. Even the exceptions are hopeful, giving much beyond what would have been deemed possible a few years ago. In the report to the Woman's Home Mission Society of St. John, at the end of the year 1886, he reported from the nine mission fields (that there had been collected \$2,852 for salaries) the balance due at that time was \$357. The total for all purposes paid was \$6,797. Add to this \$1,273 contributed by the eight catechist stations for salaries, and \$8,070 was raised by seventeen fields during eight months, as against \$2,460 during the whole year, 1885. Since that date all the fields have satisfactorily arranged with the missionary for year ending 1st May.

As to the present condition of these fields, three of them asked for moderation in a call, and same granted. South Richmond has been settled, St. George Hampton, Greenfield, Black River and Quaco, are ready and anxious 50r call and settlement.

Springfield, an English settlement, contemplates selling old manse property, buying new site and erecting manse, and will then be ready for call.

During the year seventeen fields were wrought, and there were 792 families, the communicants number 1,119, and the average attendance 7,000.

SOUTH RICHMOND-REV. JAMES ROSS.

Although South Richmond was considered a very flourishing mission station, few of the people believed that the field could sustain the burden imposed in securing the services of an ordained

believed that the field could sustain the burden imposed in securing the services of an ordained missionary. How the salary was to be secured puzzled many, and the outlook was neither comforting nor encouraging. However, matters soon assumed a brighter aspect, difficulty after difficulty vanished, and the whole field evinced a growing interest in the work of the Church.

This mission station now settled, and will shortly be self-sustaining, congregation church built at Oak Mountain, manse to be commenced in June. Another preaching station opened—catechist will labour there during summer, at Canterbury. Two Ladies' Societies are organized, nearly every family contributing to support of Gospel more liberally than hitherto. BLACK RIVER AND ST. MARTIN'S.

Attendance at services good, even in the very worst weather; and considerable interest is being manifested in the carrying of missionary work. The people have no desire to go back to the four-month catechetical system, but are enthusiastic over regular supply. Weekly Bible class well attended by scholars from six years old to sixty. The trial of having an ordained missionary in this field for the past year has proved successful. Four baptized (one adult). Four added to the roll. Lord's supper dispensed in each district.

KINCARDINE-REV. DANIEL FOSTER.

Great reason for encouragement; number of workers has greatly increased. In Sabbath school and prayer meeting, there has been most to cheer, and encouragement—active effort put forth to get a settled minister; manse in course of construction. Andover has been added to this field—and will be the centre of operations until other arrangements made (awakening among the young men particularly), several have in view a desire to preach the Gospel; some have evinced a disposition for missionary work.

HAMPTON-REV. PAUL LANGRILLE.

Comprises eleven stations. One day's work; sometimes forty-six miles, and preach three timeswork encouraging; two Bible classes in two of the churches. Remarked that people have read the Bible more in the last six months than in all their lives put together; church at Hampton built; people becoming more liberal.

ST. GEORGE-REV. THOS. STEWART.

Field comprises eight sections—three services are held every Sabbath; extremes of congregation twenty miles apart; St. George, chief station, has about twenty families; work interesting deprecates going back to the old system of mere summer supply.

SPRINGFIELD, ETC .- REV. J. A. CAHILL.

Teachers' meeting conducted, preaches five times a week. Special services held for one week, and prospects good; people earnest.

GREENFIELD, ETC .- ALEXANDER CAMPBELL, CATECHIST.

This field is at present a part of Rev. J. K. Bearisto's congregation. There are about twenty young men—adherents of our Church—who own farms of their own in this vicinity, but who are not yet settled down on them; these, if properly looked after now, will in a few years become the nucleus of a strong congregation in Greenfield; but, if left to themselves, they will likely grow careless in regard to religion, or join some of the other denominations. During the past summer a marked interest in the cause of religion was clearly to be seen in this field among the young people. Twelve joined the Church in Greenfield on profession of their faith, and one from the Baptist Church by certificate. In regard to all our undertakings during the summer we have reason to say, "Hitherto hapth the Lord helped us." hath the Lord helped us."

NEREPIS, ETC .- JOHN HAWLEY, CATECHIST.

The work has been delightful during the summer. The interest in our work over the whole field seems greatly increased. The outlook seems, upon the whole, very encouraging. I hope something will be done towards giving somewhat regular supply during the winter, for it is then that our work is monopolized in the interests of other branches of the Church. Our people look anxiously and hopefully to the action of the Home Mission Committee.

VANCEBORO' AND M'ADAM, -H. B. GRANT, CATECHIST.

Vanceboro', a town of six hundred, came into existence seventeen years ago. It is the eastern terminus of the B. & M. Railway, and hence the headquarters of many railway men. terminus of the B. & M. Railway, and hence the headquarters of many railway men. A tannery gives employment to about one hundred men, and a woodenware factory to thirty or forty. For a number of years there was no church and no regular church services. Three years ago the ladies of the various denominations made the first move towards church building by forming a "Circle." A church, built at a cost so far of \$2,080, bears testimony to their energy. Only \$800 of the above sum was raised by subscription. During the past summer a debt of \$446 has been paid. Of the amount this Circle, by sales and suppers, made \$334, the remaining \$112 I collected by subscription. McAdam.—Prospects good. Needs a hall. Scarcity of dwellings a direct hindrance to the work. Owing to the fact that nearly every house in McAdam is an hotel, the ladies are kept busy, and cannot find time to form a circle or society, and thus aid in Church work. An organ, costing \$85, has this summer been bought and paid for. McAdam should give \$200 to \$300 to support a minister. This is the field now occupied by Rev. J. W. McLennan, ordained missionary.

BAILLIE AND TOWER HILL .- J. T. BLAIR, CATECHIST.

"Five young men united with the Church in Tower Hill, and there is quite an interest in religion awakened among the young people of the section. The people of the field are talking minister and manse, and are likely soon to take active steps in the matter. I return at vacation to give them two or three Sabbaths."

MECHANICS' SETTLEMENT .- FULTON J. COFFIN, CATECHIST.

This field is a very encouraging one. The Sabbath attendance was, during the summer, exceedingly good, and much interest manifested in the services. Two of the stations, viz., Waterford and Markhamville, are growing villages, and with permanent supply and earnest labour this field must grow rapidly. Eleven united with the Church on profession of faith this summer.

HOULTON, ETC .- E. M. DILL, CATECHIST.

The stations of this field are on the American side of the line. Littleton and Monticello have been hitherto regularly supplied by Rev. K. McKay, of Richmond. Houlton has had regular weekly supply this summer for the first time. The outlook is encouraging. In ..der to success there are two requisites—a church and continuous supply. Communion was dispensed at Littleton during the summer by Rev. K. McKay. Four were admitted on profession of faith.

PRESBYTERY OF MIRAMICHI.

ESCUMINAC, ETC .- J. F. SMITH, CATECHIST.

My third summer in this field. Many young people have been gathered into the membership. Twenty-three were added during the past summer. A few more years' faithful working will make it a supplemented charge.

NEW BANDON, ETC .- W. P. M'KENZIE, CATECHIST.

New Bandon has had services for many years, and a church is standing, used till the Union Church (with Clifton) is finished. People are reliable, liberal, a strength to the missionary. Clifton is the weak place, houses crowded more together, hence gossip and evil speaking; carelessness and drunkenness go hand in hand with irregularity in church attendance. But the children are hungry for the Gospel, and work for them will be great in result. The list is ten dollars short of what it might be through the indifference of those trusted to fulfil promises.

Janeville, a farming community, has made a sudden stride to liberality, and will encourage work,

especially pastoral visitation.

CARAQUET, ETC .-- PUTNAM CADY, CATECHIST.

As there are only three Protestant families at Caraquet, the work is limited. The French priest

As there are only three Protestant families at Caraquet, the work is limited. The French priest keeps a close watch over his people, and will not allow them to attend our services.

At Miscou Harbour and Little Shippegan the work is encouraging. Many would have united with the Church had we been able to hold communion services. The people of Little Shippegan Island attend morning service at Miscou Harbour, and the people of Miscou sail over to Little Shippegan for afternoon service. The French priest has little influence over the people here, and many attended our church services and prayer meetings. None, however, are prepared to leave their Church. The people of these two islands have united in building a church at Miscou Harbour. All the necessary timber and nearly enough money has been secured, and the work is progressing rapidly. The people are doing the building themselves, and are anxious to complete the structure. There are only three small families at Miscou Point who permanently reside there. The others who attend the services are from other places, and remain on the island during the lobster season.

These fields, separately or combined, cannot support a pastor. Still they need, and fully appreciate, the Board's assistance. They have no preaching (except once or twice at Caraquet) during the entire winter.

PRESBYTERY OF VICTORIA AND RICHMOND.

THE MARGAREE STATIONS. - J. D. M'FARLANE, CATECHIST.

At Big Intervale station two elders were ordained. They are conducting a prayer meeting every Sabbath forenoon. At Whale Cove station the people are very earnest. Here also a new elder was ordained, who, along with his brethren, conducts prayer meetings on Sabbaths and week days. Two united with the Church by profession. At Cheticamp the attendance was not very large, but I have reason to believe that good was done. I met with great kindness from all the people—those of other described these real. denominations as well as our own.

PRESBYTERY OF PICTOU.

ISAAC'S HARBOUR AND COUNTRY HARBOUR. - J. W. M'LENNAN, LICENTIATE.

This is a field rich in possibilities. The attendance, especially at Country Harbour, has been excellent throughout. It was found impracticable to hold a prayer meeting at Country Harbour; but a Bible class met weekly at Isaac's Harbour, with encouraging results. Presbyterians are few in number, but spirited, and are ready to do more if only services were provided in winter. Country Harbour is in a very promising condition. It is earnestly hoped that the Presbytery will be able ere long to make some arrangement by which these shore stations will be grouped under an energetic ordained missionary.

This hope is now realized, as see Appendix.

WINE HARBOUR, ETC. -A. P. LOGAN, CATECHIST.

This field has four stations. Four new members united with the Church at Wine Harbour, and twenty-two communed. Liscomb Mills is a good distance from Wine Harbour, and has only four Presbyterian families. Beckerton is a Church of England community—there being only one Presbyterian family. Holland's Harbour is a Baptist community, with one Presbyterian family. I gave occasional services to all these places.

CAPE GEORGE .- CHRISTOPHER MUNRO, CATECHIST.

There are here twenty-two Presbyterian families. There are forty-three communicants. We regular preaching, prayer meeting and Sabbath school services on both sides of the cape. PRESBYTERY OF TRURO.

MACCAN, ETC .- W. H. DECKER, CATECHIST.

A new church is in process of erection at River Herbert. Here is held a weekly prayer meeting. Twelve names from this section were added to the communion list.

HARMONY. - JOHN VALENTINE, CATECHIST.

My summer's work was pleasant, and a fair measure of progress was made. Eight united with the Church, two by certificate and six by profession. Many of the families were very regular in attendance at church, and none wholly absented themselves. The people are poor—yet during the summer they painted and otherwise improved the church, and paid the most of the catechist's expenses.

PRESBYTERY OF HALIFAX.

KEMPT, ETC .- F. S. M'KENZIE, CATECHIST.

This field is in a hopeful and encouraging condition, notwithstanding late difficulties. People appreciative of efforts made in their behalf, and eager to assist. Through attention and care this congregation may soon become strong and prosperous. Will call as soon as they can choose.

EASTERN SHORE-WILLIAM ". TUFFTS, CATECHIST.

This is a portion of Rev. Samuel Rosborough's very heavy charge. The people are so scattered that long drives and walks are necessary to visit them, so that pastoral work is carried on with very great difficulty.

Your missionary has to record his deep sense of gratitude to the Head of the Church for showers of blessing—for increasing attendances, for deep spiritual interest and for some gathered under the covering wings. I conducted sixty regular preaching services, maintaining in addition, Bible classes in the various stations, and also conducting school on the Sabbath.

BAY VIEW, DIGBY .- JAMES M. WICKER, CATECHIST. .

As to the number of families connected with each station, I may say that I counted only those that attended regularly, without regard to the different denominations represented. I visited, in all, forty-four families, some of which were not regular attendants—calling on each three or four times during the summer.

The Presbyterians connected with these two stations are few in number, but very carnest, and I have reason to believe that my labours have not been in vain. Many told me they were benefited by my preaching.

BEDFORD, ETC. - REV. GEO. CHRISTIE, MISSIONARY.

Mr. Christie has laboured in this field with fidelity and earnestness amidst many discouragements, for several years. His reports show that the Gospel is winning its way most surely against all obstacles. Additions were lately made to the session, and the prospects are steadily brightening.

BRIDGETOWN, ETC .- REV. JOHN CAMERON, MISSIONARY.

The Bridgetown station seems to be in a hopeful condition, and with Round Hill will very shortly (and probably during the ensuing congregational year) be able to raise the amount necessary to place them under the Augmentation Scheme-this is very desirable, as it would give the minister a competent support. It is impossible for a minister to live here, and do the work properly, on less than \$800 or \$850, a year, and pay rent for a house. I have nothing special to add.

PRESBYTERY OF LUNENBURG AND SHELBURNE.

RIVERSDALE, ETC .- REV. H. CRAWFORD, MISSIONARY.

The missionary here has been quite successful in his work, as he has been abundant in labours. The field has all the advantages of a settled charge. The families are not numerous, and they are very scattered, but are well overtaken by the missionary, and by their contributions show that they appreciate his work.

PRESBYTERY OF WALLACE.

PUGWASH AND OXFORD.

This is the Rev. J. A. McKenzle's charge. About the beginning of the year 1886 he asked through his Presbytery for the assistance of Mr. W. R. Sutherland, a competent layman in whom he bulgreat confidence. The Board cheerfully complied with the request, and granted \$100 for the year to assist in his support. I have in this way endeavoured to supplement the labours of our earnest, active and untring minister, by doing in a very humble way some of the work which he cannot possibly overtake in his scattered congregation.

Mr. McKenzie writes: I believe Mr. Sutherland's labours have been greatly blessed. He has been most faithful and untiring, not only in the work referred to in his report, but also in visiting from house to house, and speaking personally with old and young on the subject of their salvation. He has been most acceptable to the people. His labours have not lessened mine, but he has overtaken work which I could not possibly accomplish.

LINDEN .- REV. W. S. DARRAGH, MINISTER.

I have been preaching in this county of Cnmberland since 1849, and never received in all these years as much salary—or as promptly paid—as last year, viz., \$110 from the people, and \$100 from the Home Mission Board. The Master has not forgotten me, nor does He despise my work. He has blessed me in gathering and feeding His people.

has blessed me in gathering and feeding His people.

Such are some of the statements—or substance of them—made by the men in charge during the year; but no brief report can describe the whole state of the case. About fifty workmen, at different points, have been searching out the scattered families and individuals of our own, and the neglected of other Churches, and feeding them with the bread of heaven. In how many hearts a new life has sprung up, to how many assurance of safety has been brought, how many clouded souls have been enlightened, how many avering, confirmed, how many put in possession of durable riches and righteousness through this instrumentality the Omniscient alone knoweth. But surely the possibility of this blessedness coming even to one should make us all glad to give, and even pray for the upholding and extension of a work so good and grand in itself, and so essential to the existence of the Church, according to the type in our Lord's mind, when He issued the commission, "Preach the Gospel to every creature," and when He stimulated the disciples to immediate activity in the Home Field around them, by the utterance of these memorable words: "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields, for they are white already to the harvest, and he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto eternal life."

FINANCES.

The total receipts for the year were \$5,589.75, and the total expenditure \$5,288.84, leaving a surplus of \$300.91, which, with the balance of \$32.05 on hand last year, makes \$332.96 with which to commence the present year's work. Our people responded nobly to the Synod's call for money to carry on this work, and we are confident that they will do yet more as the need grows, during the coming year. The Committee, trusting to the people's sense of the importance of the work, and their consequent increased liberality in supporting it, have already made promises of fully a thousand dollars more than last year, to new mission fields. We will need considerably larger contributions, therefore, from all the congregations.

We have hitherto been to some extent beneficiaries of the Churches in Britain. Last year, as formerly, the Irish Presbyterian Church sent us £100 stg., and the Free Church of Scotland £80. Our hearty thanks are due, and have been tendered, for these liberal donations. We wish our people to note that these sums appear in the total receipts. The importance of much greater liberality appears clearly in view of the fact that we cannot certainly count on a continuation of these grants, year by year; should we not obtain them this year, with our increased responsibilities, our giving would need to increase nearly fifty per cent. to bring our balance on the right side next suring

In consequence of the action of Presbyteries in the development of self-support, they were in a position to ask for \$1,000 less than at the beginning of the previous year. The whole matter was very fully laid before the Synod, last October, and an estimate of \$9,000 was presented, as the probable amount needed for the year. That amount the Synod allotted to the different Presbyteries for collection from their congregations. The following summary shows what was asked and what has been realized.

That 132 congregations within the bounds of the Synod have contributed all that they were asked for, as against 118 for the previous year: that 33 more have made partial payments, and that asked for, as against in for the previous year; that 35 more have made partail payments, and that only 13, about the half of which are vacant, have failed to contribute, shows clearly that there has been a general and very earnest endeavour, on the part of Presbyteries, to do what was expected of them; and that congregations, also, for the most part, have responded to their appeals. It would be more gratifying were there no blanks at all; but it will be noticed that, of the 13 congregations that are blank, seven are vacant, rendering it more difficult for Presbyteries to deal with them.

It is quite plain, from the many new applications for admission to the benefits of the fund, that much reduction in the future will be impossible; and that the only way an increase can be avoided is by Presl., eries and congregations conjointly putting forth every effort for the fullest measure of self-help. The Committee are deeply grateful for past success; for the future they commit the scheme to the intelligent and prayerful consideration of our people and to the blessing of the Church's Loving Head.

During the year that has passed away since the last report was presented, the attention of the Christian Church has been directed to Foreign Missions as seldom before. This remark may apply to several years bygone. But we are conscious of a rising tide of interest in this great work. For many years the prayer of the Church was that the Lord might open doors of entrance into lands long barred against the Gospel. That prayer has been answered: it may be said with almost literal truth that every door is open now. For many years, too, it was the prayer of the Church that the Lord might raise up and qualify labourers willing to go forth into the great harvest-field of the Gospel. That prayer also has been answered. There are men and women, in numbers that a little while ago would have seemed incredible, full of faith and courage, ready to give themselves to the Lord in this service. Many are ready to go, whom the Committee, for want of means, is not yet able to send forth. But the work is the Lord's. He who has opened up ways of access into heathen lands, and who has touched the hearts of many loving disciples, so that they are saying, "Here am I; send me," can likewise so replenish the treasury of the Church, that she shall be able to send out those who are eager to give to this work the service of their lives. In such a state of things those intrusted with the oversight of the Foreign Mission work, urgently need, and they would fain possess, the endowments of certain men of Issachar, of whom we read that they "had understanding of the times, to know what Israel ought to do."

The last General Assembly decreed that the unification of the Foreign Mission Committees, East and West, should "take effect on and after the sixteenth day of June, 1886, and that the Foreign Mission work hereto'ore carried on by the separate committee as thus constituted, and be the work of the whole Church; and the General Assembly instructed the Foreign Mission Committee, the West of the whole Church; and the General Assembly instructed by

The last General Assembly decreed that the unification of the Foreign Mission Committees, East and West, should "take effect on and after the sixteenth day of June, 1886, and that the Foreign Mission work hereto ore carried on by the separate committees of the East and West respectively, should be under the care of the Foreign Mission Committee as thus constituted, and be the work of the whole Church; and the General Assembly instructed the Foreign Mission Committee so united, to meet on the call of the Convener, who might be appointed by the General Assembly." Owing to the immense distance between the centre of Foreign Mission intelligence in the Maritime Provinces and Winnipeg, the place of meeting for this Assembly, the work entrusted to the committee, which would, even in the most favourable circumstances, have required much thought and care, has had to be prosecuted under circumstances of more than ordinary difficulty, It was not easy to get together, from many different and distant points, all the material necessary for a full report; nor was it easy even to decide where, with most advantage upon the whole, the General Committee shuld this year meet for the revision of it. But there has been the most cordial co-operation on the part of the members, whether from the east or from the west—the utmost readiness to consult each 'ver's convenience, and to meet each other's views. And the difficulties which, to some extent, were witable in our new and untried position, will be removed. With greater experience, the work will become easy: the mountain will become a plain. And even now we have the satisfaction of giving to the Assembly, in this one report, an account of the whole Foreign Mission work in which we, as a united Church from the Atlantic to the Pacific, are engaged. We do so with heartfelt gratitude to Him "whose we are, and whom we serve," and in humble dependence upon Him for the grace which we need to fit us for the work to which He calls us.

In the fields under the oversight of the Eastern Division of the Committee, the year upon w'ich we now look back has been one of evicint progress. The reports from all the missionaries and labourers, though not unmarked with notes of trial, are records of success and expressions of gratitude and hopefulness.

The battle, long waged with idolatry, still continues, but the blows struck in faith have weakened the enemy, and nerved the hearts of the soldiers for more effective warfare. Even now they can "rejoice as men who divide the spoil."

I.-NEW HEBRIDES MISSION.

Mr. Annand and his wife, after about twenty months of home intercourse and labour for the good cause, set out in January on their return journey to the New Hebrides.

After a pleasant run of a few days across the continent, they halted at San Francisco, where they tarried for about a fortnight. They were warmly received by the Christian people, invited to address meetings, and on their departure, as cordially bidden God-speed as they had been by the brethren of their native church. From San Francisco they set sail for Australia on the 14th February, and, after a prosperous voyage of a month. arrived there in safety and in health. After a busy fortnight in Sydney—spent in preparation for their new home on the islands—they sailed thence on the 2nd of April. Ere this they have been welcomed by their old companions in arms, and are preparing for the new post they are to occupy. At what point in the wide domain of heathenism yonder that post is to be, will, we presume, by the consent of all parties concerned, be finally settled at the Mission Synod in July.

The General Assembly having remitted to this Committee the question of appointing another missionary to the New Hebrides, this Committee referred the same to the Eastern Division for their action.

The question, after full and anxious consideration on the part of the Eastern Division, still remaining undetermined, this Committee, while deeply sympathizing with Mr. Annand, and highly appreciating the Christian zeal and liberality of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of Halifax in their offer of support, still, in view of the existing political complications in the New Hebrides, and the necessity for extrans caution is extending our work there and in law of the urgent need of our the necessity for extreme caution in extending our work there, and in few of the urgent need of our own North-West Territories, and the ever-increasing demands of our other missions, and of the new, large and populous fields thrust, by the providence of God, upon our attention, it was resolved that action looking to the appointment of an additional missionary is inepportune, and they agreed to recommend the Assembly to delay action in the meantime.

The reports from this island, on which are the stations occupied by our missionary, the Rev. J. W. McKenzie, so far as the results of Christian work are concerned, are most cheering.

Under date of August 11th, 1886, the missionary writes from Erakor:

A most important event at this village is the erection of a new church, the frame of which -56 A most important event at this village is the erection of a new cnurch, the frame of which—so ft. x 28 ft.—was purchased in Sydney, and brought down in the Dayspring. It cost about a hundred pounds sterling (£100). Of this sum the natives themselves have contributed fifty pounds aterling (£50) in money. The other fifty have been made up from the proceeds of arrowroot, and four contributions sent us from Nova Scotia, to be used as we thought best, viz., \$25 from the Ladies' Helping Hand Society, of St. James' Church, New Glasgow; \$25 from the W. F. M. Society of Truro; \$20 from the W. F. M. Society of Salem Church, Green Hill, and \$20 from a friend. All the work, which in money value would be considerably over another hundred pounds, is gratis. We have also paid out of the proceeds of arrowroot, thirty-two pounds (£32) to defray the cost of printing the Gospel by John, and we have a balance left of thirty-four pounds, fifteen shillings and sixpence (£34, 15s. 6d.) which I am passing over to the treasurer, towards refunding you for the sum paid to Rev. Dr. Steel for the land here. The balance we hope to send you in due time.

PROGRESS OF THE WORK.

The usual Sabbath and week day services and schools have been kept up regularly. For the present, however, the schools have been discontinued, having no proper place to meet in. My class present, however, the schools have been discontinued, having no proper place to meet in. My class of young men continues with unabated interest. Several of them can now read intelligently any part of the "Peep of Day," and translate without much difficulty a chapter in the Gospels or in any of the historical books of the Bible. These I have been sending out to the nearer villages to conduct the Wednesday evening prayer meetings. My object in doing so is twofold, that they may gain experience in speaking, and that they may impart the instruction they receive in Bible history during the week. Two of them, the most advanced, relieve us very much in the children's school, and they will be able, I trust, to take sole charge of it before long.

At Eratap and Pango there is nothing special to report, as the work has been going on much as formerly. At Bufa, the chief and one or two others who were so long opposed to the Gospel, have lately joined us. The death rate has been high there, and several having moved away to other Christian villages, the population is now small. Some months ago they built a small church. At Fila we have had an addition of over eighty. They are now building a commodious, substantial lime church. There are still a few who have not joined us, but they are very friendly, and are gradually coming in. The sacred woman, who in the days of heathenism exerted such an influence on her own as well as on other villages, died a few days ago. She became friendly, but never attended church. In fact none of our natives are willing to do so until they have given up all connection with heathenism. In this the Efatese are, I believe, unique.

Tankaroa, the new village formed by those who moved from the mountains, has had an addition of about sixty. Over a hundred have moved there since the villagewas formed, some two years ago.

Their old villages, twenty in number, have all been deserted. It is an immense advantage having them all in one place, as they were living so scattered, perhaps a dozen families in one village, six in another, two in another, and so on; and many of their villages were miles apart, the paths to which were almost impassable. A short time ago they finished a very neat, comfortable reed church. Others are still joining them from away inland.

The Meli people, so long hostils, are now so far friendly as to allow our teachers to visit them. Unruntubau, the only other heathen village of any size on our side of the island, is in a fair way to be won for Christ. They have expressed their willingness to receive as teacher a man who is now attending the candidates' class, his wife being a native of their village.

At a later date, November 23rd, he writes:

"The good work is gradually progressing. Since the meeting f our Synod in July about sixty heethen have joined us, part of whom have moved from the interior and settled at Bufa. More are

soon to follow.

"My stock of gods is gradually increasing. A day or two after the death of the sacred weman of Fila, which took place about two months ago, I received two. One of them is in the shape of a ring and is about three inches in diameter. It looks as if made from a large bivalve shell. It is the god of Fila; and so Fila is won for Christ at last. It is the strongest fortress on this second of the island yet taken from the enemy, and has endured a long siege.

"A number of the young men of Fila have lately joined our candidates' class.

"A few weeks ago the natives of that village completed a commodious and substantial lime church."

Mr. McKenzie appends the following statistics: Prof. sed Christians, 600, 200 of whom gave up heathenism during the past year; Church members in good standing, 129; Christian marriages during the year, 13; Children attending school, 90.

KROMANGA

Our missionary here, the Rev. H. A. Robertson, has furnished most minute and exhaustive reports of all phases of native Christian life, experience and work.

He mourns over the sad effects of centuries of heathenism on the character of even those evidently

brought under the power of the Gospel.

brought under the power of the Gospel.

After speaking of the unwillingness and, indeed, inability of the natives to make any continued mental application, their natural laziness, their readiness to be led away by the fair speech and cheap gifts of the masters of the labour vessels, and to forsake the instructions of the mission, he says: "I can only fall upon my knees and plead with God to grant a fuller outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our poor blinded people, to make the work more His own and less man's, and to keep us from despondency in its prosecution."

But with the mention of these and other discouragements, certainly to be expected in the case of a people so recently shown the true light, he fills pages with most interesting information concerning the diligence, liberality and zeal for the propagation of the truth displayed by many of the native

After describing the work done for the improvement of mission premises by the missionary and the better class of natives, the report goes on :

SCHOOLS.

For the whole island—twenty-five district school-houses kept up, seven of these built within the year; thirty-five teachers engaged. These are morning schools, five mornings each week for reading. Opened and closed with praise and prayer.

Special class for women, girls and boys, taught by Mrs. Robertson during the months of January, February and March, attendance from twenty-five to forty.

Bible class, every Sabbath at 3 p.m. Candidates' class, every Wednesday afternoon. A class for young men and teachers conducted from January 1st up to 20th April, attended very regularly by twenty-five men and five women. Progress encouraging, specially so with a small number. Subjects attempted: reading, writing, arithmetic, geography and Bible history. The above class taught by the missionary this year, in the forenoon, which he has found an improvement.

BOOKS, ETC.

Our good and obliging agent, Rev. Dr. Steel, kindly got 500 copies of Matthew and Mark bound for us very nicely, and also got 1000 hymn books (a new edition) printed and bound this year in Sydney. These books are very nearly all in the hands of the natives, and they were greatly pleased to receive them. Many of them never had a hymn book before, and the others were glad to get new books with large, clear type. Mr. Laurie this year has kindly printed almanaes for us. This printing and binding in Sydney, the natives have paid for, or I have for them, out of proceeds of arrow-root sales. We have refunded, or very nearly, what the Bible Society paid for printing done for us in Toronto.

I have some thought of correcting Mr. Gordon's translation of Genesis, this summer, and of accepting the Bible Society's offer, made through Dr. Steel, to print it for us in London.

SACRAMENTS, ETC.

The sacrament of the Supper was dispensed in Dillon's Bay in September. There were 525 present, including 150 church members. Five young people were baptized, and joined us in commemorating our Saviour's death. Forty church members were absent, either sick or attending on sick friends, or labouring on other islands.

TEACHERS.

One Eromanga teacher assists Mr. Gray on Tanna; two with their wives assist Mr. Michelson on Tongoa; one teacher and his wife assist Mr. Fraser on Epi, and another teacher and his wife assist Mr. Murray on Ambrim. Thus you see we have thirty-five teachers employed teaching their own countrymen on Eromanga, and five engaged in the same work on other islands. Forty (40) teachers, principally married men assisted by their wives, is a large number to be engaged in the work of Christ, and if some of these have not come up to our reasonable expectations, several have done far better than one would expect of Eromangans, considering their savage state only a few years ago. They are at Dillon's Bay now waiting to be paid for 1886. The murderer of George N. Gordon took a teacher this year, and gave up about two acres of ground for church and teachers' house and planting ground for the teacher and his family. I preached in this new church one Sabbath in October, and had a full meeting. This man, Ukovelie, was present at the Communion Services at Dillon's Bay in September. His wife and children also attend church. You may be sure we are glad to see this change.

LABOUR TRAFFIC.

The Queensland labour vessels have taken away about seventy Eromangan men, lads and young

The Queensland labour vessels have taken away about seventy Eromangan men, lads and young boys, this year, but they were not forced away, but got, in the now usual way, by money and calico gifts to themselves and their relations and tribes. The lad shipping gets a present; and he then gets a present for his friends. The labour traffic people, deeply interested, call it a present; the natives themselves call it by its right name. a purchase, or buying.

Thirty-one (31) young men and boys, including a young teacher, went off, in one batch, a few weeks ago, from the district immediately south of Dillon's Bay, in a Queensland labour vessel. These districts are killed; they will never rally from this blow. All those thirty-one young men and boys attended our schools. It is but fair to the Government Agent of the vessel that took them, to state that he did not know, at the time, one of them was employed by me as a teacher. FRENCH OCCUPATION.

With the strongest protestations of non-interference, the French have combined active measures for the control of the New Hebrides. In August, Mr. McKenzie wrote:

"About the beginning of June a dark cloud began to gather over us. We were notified by the French that they had established a military post in our island. We were daily expecting to hear that they had annexed the group. So far, however, they have not done so." In November he says:

"A French military post, as you are aware, was established on this island some months ago, ostensibly to protect their settlers, but virtually, I believe, and indeed the settlers assert this, the first step towards annexation. I don't believe they ever had the slightest idea of removing their soldiers. I hope I may be mistaken in this but present appearance do not look as if I am."

In a late note from Dr. Steel, our agent in Sydney, N. S. W., there occurs this algnificant statement: "The French, I fear, are intending to occupy the New Hebrides permanently. They are now erecting durable premises for their soldiers and others."

The Jesuit missionary is following in the track of the French soldier. Dr. Steel says that already several missionary priests are settling on the island of Espiritu Santo, and that their agents have been inquiring for all books, maps, etc., of the New Hebrides; this is ominous. Mr. Annand, writing from Sydney, March 18th, says: "According to reports four priests have been taken to the islands to work among the natives—two settling on Efate, and two on Santo." Speaking of the fear of their coming, Mr. McKenzie says: "I need not be informed, though one of the French settlers had the kindness to tell me, that they will oppose themselves to our work."

It thus appears that French aggression, and with it an invasion of Jesuit missionaries, looms up

as an obstacle which must be faced in the further prosecution of this mission.

THE "DAYSPRING,"

The missionary vessel, Dayspring, made two runs as usual, between Australia and the Islands' serving the mission by carrying missionaries and their goods to the desired points. But she is neither large enough nor speedy enough to meet all the demands upon her now. Dr. Steel writes: "On last voyage of Dayspring a very large quantity of goods had to be left, which has occasioned much inconsistent and the statement of the statemen venience. Next trip threatens to be worse, as there will be five new houses and boats to go for the new missionaries, besides what is left, and the extra stores for increased staff. It is absolutely

necessary to charter an additional vessel for this trip."

In this connection the Committee note, with thankfulness, the receipt of a bequest of \$300, by the late Miss Medley Fairweather, for the purpose of aiding in the purchase of a new missionary vessel. It will be forwarded to the proper parties in Australia as soon as the definite decision is reached on the question of providing such a vessel. We urge strongly on all our Sabbath Schools to consider the importance of the Dayspring to the mission, and the necessity for attending to the collections for her maintenance. The receipts this year approximate the expenditure; but only because several liberal contributions came down from the Western Section of the Church.

II.-WEST INDIES AND DEMERARA.

The Rev. W. L. MacRae, who offered his services in the place of the late lamented Mr. McLeod started last September for his field of labour, accompanied by his wife. On the 19th of October he was inducted by the Presbytery of Trinidad into the mission charge of Princestown.

The occasion is particularly memorable on account of the excellent address of the Rev. Lal Behari to the assembled congregation of East Indian immigrants. This native preacher is one of the fruits of this mission, and the harbinger, we have no doubt, of a full force of native pastors soon to appear

and take up the work in Trinidad and the surrounding islands.

Ill health caused the withdrawal of Miss Hilton from the work. Miss Semple was prostrated in October, and had to visit her native land to recover health. She is now nearly restored, and will soon return to her post. In her absence Miss Blackadder had charge of her school at Tacarigua, and temporary provision was made for the Princestown school. It has been arranged that, hereafter, Miss Semple will work at Princestown, and that Miss Blackadder will continue with Mr. Morton.

Miss Archibald was appointed last summer, as a teacher in Couva. She commenced her work there in December, and has commended herself to the confidence and esteem of both missionary and

Mr. Hendrie, the missionary of the U. P. Church at St. Joseph, has been absent for most of the year on sick leave, and may not return for some time to come. In his absence our missionaries have carried on his work with the help of native agents.

TUNAPUNA DISTRICT.

Mr. Morton writes thus:

"Sunday schools had the following attendance: Tunapuna, 37; Tacarigua, 81; Arouca, 19; Orange Grove, 26; Red Hill, 22. Total, 185. A system of uniform weekly Scripture lessons was followed during the year. In this way twenty five lessons from the Gospels and fifteen from Genesis were gone over, and the key text of each committed. The system worked well, and while it left the more intelligent teachers to a large extent free, it set before all a definite lesson to be taught, and on the previous Saturday the native teachers and monitors were themselves instructed in the subject. One new Hindi hymn was committed each month, and the children taught to sing it to an appropriate Indian tune. This helped to keep up the interest and diligence of both teachers and children, and the advantage of it was easily seen when the children of the different schools met

together, as they did at the opening of our new church.

"Catechist's Work.—Ajodhya has been my catechist for the greater part of the year. He is a man past middle age, without family ties, and knowing very little English. He is, however, familiar

This last can be best done by a native catechist, who can sleep among his countrymen, hold meetings, and teach them to sing, sometimes until far into the night, when he countrymen, not interested. Ajothya in taking the circuits allotted to him was often absent for days. There is no doubt that men of his class can be most useful in such work.

"My own work consisted of a Bible class and three services on Sabbath with all that is implied in attention to schools, the sick, personal visitation and outcoor services during the week.

"In the school and Sunday school work, the singing, and in work among the women, Mrs.

"In November I was absent twenty days on a visit to St. Lucia, where I baptized ten adults and nine children, a special report of which has already been presented.

"The baptisms at Tunapuna for 1886 were nine—four adults and five children. The marriages were five, and the number of communicants in good standing is twenty."

SAN FERNANDO DISTRICT.

Rev. K. J. Grant writes :-"Your missionaries have always attached great importance to native helpers. Some on the list have proved invaluable. Ten years ago the Mission Council considered what means could be adopted for their training. About that time a young minister indicated his willingness to your Board to go to Trinidad if this special work was assigned to him. As no agent had been appointed, each missionary did his best in his own sphere. More than two years ago, Mr. McLeod, being too weak for general work, was appointed here, and with the approval of your Board, to do what his strength might enable him in this department. He visited our districts in turn as he had strength. "Observing at the close of last year that he must shortly desist from all work, I resolved to make an effort specially in the interest of my own district. From the country schools I selected a few deserving and advanced young people, most of whom had done duty as monitors, and gave them quarters and arranged for their food on the Mission premises; their parents engaging to do the best they could to support them.

"Only a few weeks had elapsed when a remittance of \$60 came to hand from a few ladies in Toronto to aid deserving young people who wished to attend school, and yet had not the means of support. The gift, so opportune, was entirely unexpected. It would appear that the plans and the means necessary to carry them into effect were of one agent. Nice came from country stations and two from Grenada, and these were classed with the more advanced Indian boys in the school here, and a few gentlemen's sons whose tuition fees materially helped the finances of the school. Extra and a rew gentlements sons whose tutton rese materially neighed the nances of the sensor. Extra lessons were given them by myself in Latin, not so much to make them Latin scholars as to improve their knowledge of English. I usually spent an hour and a half with them daily, always aiming at giving oral instruction on some subject outside their regular lessons. From Miss Copeland they received special lessons in English composition, geometry and algebra, and, I may add, music. From Lal Behari, Hindustani and Bible instruction, which consisted largely in tracing the Divine intimations in the unfoldings of redemption. In all these branches the progress of the pupils was

"Two weeks ago our Governor, Sir William Robinson, attended by the Administrator of Tobago, the Hon. T. A. Finlayson, and the Private Secretary, visited our school and examined it in the presence of the Mayor of the town, the managers of the school, and a large number of ladies and gentlemen, also the parents of the children. We were glad also to have Mr. Wright, Mr. and Mrs. McRae, Miss Blackadder, and Miss Archibald with us. A day later his Excellency returned our Visitor's Book, and from pleasant remarks recorded in it I take the following:

"The impression I left the school with was that the mission was doing a great work... I consider that Mr. Grant and his clerical and law heavers, we entitled to the highest praise for their devotion

that Mr. Grant and his clerical and lay herpers are entitled to the highest praise for their devotion to this educational and evangelizing work, and I most sincerely hope that their labours may be

crowned with tangible and substantial success.'

"These young people are even now valuable helpers. Several meetings are conducted by them. There are services at eleven stations outside of San Fernando every Sabbath, besides the small groups

gathered for worship in scores of places.

"The opening of work in Grenada and St. Lucia increases the necessity for greater attention to training work here. I am happy to state that this district has given two agents to Grenada and one to St. Lucia. A second in St. Lucia, though in Government service, has received honourable mention as a Christian worker. In June, Lal Behari went to St. Lucia to visit Sadaphal, who had suffered much from fever. He remained there twenty-five days, preaching daily. Returning, he remained fifteen days in Grenada, and during his stay seventeen were baptized by the Rev. James Muir, of the Church of Scotland. Church of Scotland.

"A few weeks ago three Christian Indians came here from Grenada to see our work. Babu Lal Behari conducted them to all the mission districts, and they left us apparently resolved to do their utmost to extend the work in their own island."

COUVA DISTRICT.

Mr. Wright says :-

"Our Sabbath services, both English and Hindustani, have been uniformly well attended.

"Our numbers are much the same as last year. Some have removed, some have died, some have

been added.

"The church mentioned in last report is now completed, and was opened Dec. 29. help us very much. It is half paid for, and, with some help, there is hope of removing the debt at

"We cordially thank our friends in Canada for their gifts."

APPENDIX No. 4.

PRINCESTOWN DISTRICT.

Mr. Grant reports from this district :--

"After Mr. McLeod's death the missionaries on the island resolved to continue to supply the vacant field every alternate Sabbath; the catechists and elders the intervening Sabbaths. Miss Blackadder, Annajee, and the elders, C. C. Soodeen and D. Mahabir, took counsel together and their combined exertions materially relieved the responsibility of the members of the Mission Causail.

"Doubtless the protracted illness of the missionary, and the months of vacancy that followed his lamented death, necessarily prevented the advancement of the work; yet we now feel very confident that, under Mr. Macrae's direction, a season of ingathering is at hand.

"The mission premises were put in excellent order for the new missionary.
"The school roll for the year shows 346; daily average, 226. There were six baptisms, two adults and four children. There was one marriage. There are fifty-three communicants in good standing."

DEMERARA.

The mission started, two years ago, among the Coolies of the West Coast, Demerara, by the Rev. John Gibsen, is not behind its neighbour in Triniclad in promise of great success and usefulness.

It has fallen on evil days financially, but we trust for only a brief period. The P. M. S. of Demerara, promised £200 of the £400 salary to be paid the missionary. Last year, through the failure in the sugar trade, the subscriptions to the society fell off to such an extent that they felt the profile our Church that they could not fulfit their promises. Fortunately, however, their fears were not realized, and they were able to meet their obligations. This year, again, the same trial, in an aggravated form, is upon them and they have asked us if we will assume the responsibility of the whole of Mr. Gibson's salary for a time.

After describing the work of four schools in operation during the year, Mr. Gibson goes on thus:

"The principal Sabbath service has been held at Uitolung. The average attendance of adults has varied from twenty to fifty; of children from sixty to a hundred and twenty.

"The Hindustani language is the chief medium of Scriptural instruction.

"Eighteen persons have been baptized, fifteen adults and three children.
"Fifteen names have been added to the Communion roll, five by certificate, ten by profession. The present number of communicants is thirty-one.

The number of baptized persons is fifty-six; forty-six adults and ten children.

"Three marriages have been performed. "The collections for the year amounted to \$41.48.

"Twelve estates, ten hospitals, and five villages have been visited."

The receipts include £100 stg., transmitted by the Western Division through this office, for salary of Rev. Mr. Gibson, Demarara; and £100 stg., first payment by the Free Church of Scotland, for the mission premises at Anelcanhat Aneyteum, and forwarded to Dr. Steel for the opening of

Mr. Annand's new station.

They also include \$800, kindly provided by the Western Woman's Foreign Missionary Society: about \$1,000 sent through Dr. Reid and Pev. R. H. Warden, by western friends, Sabbath schools, and others, principally for special objects; and upwards of \$900 for "Santo Mission," a portion of which is from the west. The remainder, about \$17,000, was contributed by the Eastern Section of the Church. Of this sum, the Eastern Woman's Foreign Mission Society gave \$1,740, being \$140 more than they had promised; and ladies societies, within several of the congregations, contributed about \$300. But for the aid furnished by the women, West and East, the fund would be much farther behind than it is. The Committee tenders them hearty thanks for their assistance.

In this connection it is due to the Government of Trinidad, to recognize its kind support of the mission schools on the island. The Governor, Sir Wm. Robinson, personally visited some of the schools, and addressed the pupils in a way that showed his high appreciation of the work.

The proprietors of estates also, as in past years, contributed liberally to the support of the mission, glance at the Trinidad accounts shows that the Government and the proprietors gave respectively £816, 8s. 6d., and £735. This is a clear toker of their hearty good will.

III.-MISSION TO THE INDIANS OF THE NORTH-WEST.

The Executive Committee for Manitoba and the North-West, appointed by the General Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee, beg leave to present their report for the past year:

Since the last report was presented a group of four new reserves has been taken up, and the work has been faithfully carried on by missionaries in all our older reserves. Much good seed has been sown, and it is our hope and prayer that in due time an abundant harvest will be gathered in. Progress is visible along almost all the line. Generally speaking, when we consider the progress made in any of our reserves during the course of one year, it is difficult to discover much improvement; but when we include several years in our review the progress is marked and encouraging. And when we contrast the present condition of our older reserves with what they were when we began our labours upon them, we are struck with the change. Barbarism has in several of them given place to civilization, paganism to Christianity. The transformation may not in any case be as thorough as we could wish; but that it is as marked as it is at such missions as the Mis-ta-was-sis, Okanase and Bird-Tail reserves vives encouragement for the future. THE STONY PLAIN RESERVE.

This reserve is on the north side of the north branch of the Saskatchewan, not far from Edmonton. It is under Chief Enoch Lapotae, and has a population of about one hundred and sixty. There are some thirty-five children of school age. Our school here is under the care of Mr. M. Anderson. It some thirty-five children of school age. Our school here is under the care of Mr. M. Anderson. It was in a most flourishing condition until two or three months ago, when a rival school was opened on the reserve by the Roman Catholics of St Albert Mission. The Indians had through their council formally and unanimously asked for the opening of our school, and they made no request, they expressed no wish, for this rival school. Its establishment was, therefore, quite unexpected, and most unwarrantable. In spite of the energetic protests, both of the Rev. A. B. Buird and your Committee, the Roman Catholic school has been sanctioned by the Indian Department, acting on its "rule of non-interference in matters ecclesiastical in connection with the Indian reserves and bands," Notwithstanding this severa blow our school is rellying available the and of April the accorded Notwithstanding this severs blow, our school is rallying again. At the end of April the average attendance was eighteen—but little below its average at the corresponding date last year. Our teacher and his wife are doing excellent work and are popular with their people. The pupils are raught not only the elements of an English education, but the boys are taught gardening, carpentry, etc., by Mr. Anderson, and the girls, house-keeping, knitting and sewing, by Mrs. Anderson. Mr. Baird and his congregation take an active interest in this reserve, and give much support and encouragement to our missionary.

About 350 miles east of this reserve, also on the north side of the north branch of the Saskatchewan, and a few miles from Fort Carlton, is

MIS-TA-WAS-SIS' RESERVE.

Here the number of Indians is 204, of families, forty-one, under the Christian Chief Mis-ta-was-sis. Their missionary, the Rev. John Mackay, reports progress in the material prosperity of his people. They had a good crop of wheat last year, part of which they sold, and at good prices. And the Indian Department reports that "this band has substantial houses, well fenced fields, large numbers of cattle, etc.," and is making 'most commendable progress." Mr. Mackay reports progress in spiritual things also. Thirty-nine communicants—six of whom were new members—lately participated in the sacrament of the supper. The occasion was most solemn and impressive. The little meeting-house was crowded. A church that will accommodate about eighty is now in course of erection, aided by a small grant of money from your Committee. The Sunday-school is taught by Mrs. Mackay and her two daughters. The Government school on this reserve is taught by Miss Christina Mackay, and is vary favourably noticed by the Department: and most of the grown up people on the reserve care two daughters. The Chief paid a visit to Ontario last summer, and was greatly amazed at what he saw, and much pleased with the reception given him by those of our church people in the east whom he met. Descending the Saskatchewan sixty or seventy miles, we come to the town of

PRINCE ALBERT.

Here there is an excellent High School under Presbyterian control, in which the right of free rere there is an excellent High School under Presolverian control, in which the right of ree tuition is secured for Indian children. This school is under the charge of Rev. A. Campbell, B.A., and Rev. Dr. Jardine. To this school the Foreign Mission Committee has made a grant of \$600 per annum, in accordance with the direction of the Assembly of 1884. This grant terminates with the present year. The Prince Albert congregation are, according to their agreement, preparing to erect suitable buildings for High School purposes the coming summer. This will be a great help to the school, and when suitable accommodation is provided for bearders from a distance its usefulness will be a phanced and it will be come a creat hours to the transfer from a distance its usefulness will be enhanced, and it will prove a great boon to that portion of the territories in which it is situated. These are all the points taken up by us on the great Saskatchewan. About 200 miles to the south-east of Prince Albert, on the south bank of the Qu'Appelle river, is

CHIEF PIAPOT'S RESERVE.

In this group there are three reserves, Piapot's, Muscowpetung's, and Pasquah's, with an aggregate population of about 700—more than 100 less than the number reported last year. This diminution is caused by the withdrawal of half-breeds, to enable them to share in land scrip. Piapot is the most cunning and unprincipled of the chiefs with whom we have to do. He is a great " man" and conjurer, and knows that his occupation will go as soon as his people become enlightened. He therefore does all in his power to thwart our efforts for the education of the children of his band. Our teacher here, Miss Rose, speaks gratefully of her indebtedness to the Commissioner Governor Dewdney, for his genuine interest in her work, and the great help and encouragement he has afforded her in her difficult and trying circumstances. The school, notwithstanding many drawbacks, is doing very well. It has now been about nine months in operation, and the third quarter was the best, the attendance for a while reaching thirty. In addition to the ordinary school work, Miss Rose, with the valuable help of her aged mother, teaches the women bread-making, knitting, etc.

Your Committee has at last succeeded in securing a suitable missionary for this important field. The Rev. W. S. Moore, of Yorkton, N.-W. T., who last year completed his theological course at Mauitoba College, has been appointed missionary to this group, and will enter on his labours as soon as he is released from his present charge by the Presbytery of Regins.

About twenty-five miles west of Piapot's Reserve, at the foot of Long Lake, is the site chosen for

The Department hopes that these difficulties will soon be removed and the work of erection begun. The plans and specifications are in course of preparation, and they are said to call for a very complete establishment. It is not creditable to the executive capacity of the Indian Department that so long a delay has occurred.

About fifty miles south-east of Piapot's Reserve, and on the same side of the Qu'Appelle, ten or twelve miles south of Indian Head, is

THE ASSINIBOINE RESERVE.

This reserve has a population of some 260, under Chief Jack. They are Assiniboines, and speak a dialect of the Sioux. Up to the end of December our school here was taught by Mr. James Scott, He did good work, and was as successful as could be expected among a band of pagans. Since the beginning of the current year Mr. John McLean has been in charge of the school. He also is putting forth faithful and earnest efforts for the temporal and spiritual welfare of his flock. His attendance at present is twelve. The people on this reserve see no benefit to be derived from either school or church. It is, therefore, difficult and discouraging work to awaken their interest in higher things. But this is nothing new in the history of missions to the heathen. Patient and prayerful effort will in the end he crowned with success. The next group of reserves is the one last taken up by your Committee. It is known as the

FILE HILLS.

This group consists of four reserves, situated on the north side of the Qu'Appelle, about eighteen miles north-east of Fort Qu'Appelle. The population is about 400, all pagans; and they caused great anxiety to the surrounding settlers during the late rebellion. Our school was opened here last September, by Mr. R. N. Toms, and he writes in a very hopeful spirit of his work among both old and young. He has twenty-eight names on his roll, and a fair average. There is room here for considerable expansion, and it will be necessary to erect a mission-house and an additional school-house ere long. About sixty miles to the south-east of this group, on the south side of the Qu'Appelle, are the

ROUND AND CROOKED LAKES BESERVES.

Our missionary here is the Rev. Hugh McKay. The population of the four reserves is about 900. It is now nearly three years since Mr. McKay began his labours among them, and fruitful years they have been. Services are held regularly at Round Lake with an attendance that some-times reaches forty, some of the Indians travelling as far as twenty miles to hear the Gospel.

times reaches forty, some of the Indians travelling as far as twenty miles to hear the Gospel.

There is a communion roll of twelve members, and a good many others are anxious for further instruction. The school has just closed after a five months' session—the most successful yet held. It had the large attendance of thirty-three. It is conducted on the boarding-school plan. The children receive food, lodging and clothing, as well as instruction through Mr. McKay and his faithful assistants. The clothing, as so n the other reserves, came from the generous hands of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society. Food costs about \$700, a little more than half of which was supplied by the kind gifts of the custern friends. The Rev. B. Jones and Mrs. Jones enthusiastically second Mr. McKay's efforts, and render most valuable assistance. Jacob Bear, too, a Christian Cree, renders efficient service. Last summer Mr. McKay spent \$600 in building a school, and is revolving large schemes for expansion in the same direction for the coming summer. With the aid of a grant of \$500 from your Committee with the help of contributions from large hearted friends in the Prephytaries. \$500 from your Committee, with the help of contributions from large-hearted friends in the Presbyteries of Stratford and Huron, and of expected assistance from the Indian Department, more commodious quarters for the school will be ready for use next session. And we hope that every one of the 200 children on the reserves will then enjoy the benefits of a Christian home, and the training that affords the true solution of the Indian problem, and will, in a generation or two, transform our Indians into a civilized and Christian people.

About 100 miles north-east of this group, near the head waters of the Assiniboine river, not far from Fort Pelly, are the reserves of Chiefs Côté and Kee-see-koue. There is here a population of from Fort Pelly, are the reserves of Chiefs Côté and Kee-see-koue. There is here a population of about 440. Mission work was begun here about twelve years ago by our veteran missionary, the Rev. George Flett; some six years ago the field was placed under Cuthbert G. McKay as teacher and catechist. About two months ago Cuthbert was called to his rest and rewerd. As long as his failing health permitted, he did his work faithfully and well. He held his post to the last, and died as he said he wished to die, "in hurness." The Rev. Hugh McKay visited this field a few days ago, and in a letter just received he says, "We were much encouraged by what we saw and heard. The Indians on this reserve are far ahead of those at Round Lake, and show that the labours of our missionary have not been in vain. We did not go far until we were asked if we could have a meeting, and with a notice of half a hour we had a gathering of over twenty. The house in which we met was neat and clean. Every thing seemed in order, and the people comfortable. One asked if he could have his child baptized. The little one was presented by a believing father and mother. The clothing in which it was dressed would do credit to any white woman. One said, We are ignorant and in the dark, we want to be told again and again, that we may know about the Gospel. and in the dark, we want to be told again and again, that we may know about the Gospel. Another said, We always try to have family wording in our home. We found many of the children able to speak English fairly well, and some of them reading in the third book. One of the men said to us, 'We are anxious that our school should soon open again that our children may attend.' One woman said, 'I lost my husband and lately, a boy and a girl, and we have wept much for them. Our hearts are sore. These, 'pointing to three little ones, 'are all that are left me. I wish to bring them up as Christians.' I repeat I was much pleased with what I saw and heard, and I returned to Round Lake more encouraged than ever to work among the poor Indians." The school that Cuthbert taught is on Côté's reserve. The number of pupils reported on the roll is twenty-two. His labours as catechist extended over the two reserves, and included the Hudson Bay Company's post at Fort Pelly. The communion roll contains some thirty-four names.

Laird, B.A., and D. H. McVicar, B.A., who have just completed their Theological course at Manitoba College. Mr. Laird is to take permanent charge of the mission, and Mr. McVicar is to take charge of the school for the next six months. He is also to co-operate with Mr. Laird at the various preaching stations. Mr. McVicar is a full-blooded Cree, and grandson of Chief Mistawasis. He was adopted when an infant, by the late Rev. James Nisbet, as a ward of the Church. About eight years ago he came to Manitoba College. His course was a distinguished one in the University of Manitoba, where he graduated with honours in Natural Science, gaining the Governor-General's medal—the highest honour of the year. His course in Theology has also been very successful. And he is now sent forth to labour among his Indian brethren with high hopes and earnest prayers for his success. He has already had considerable experience as a teacher, and is well known in the school to which he is appointed, as he at one time relieved Cuthbert McKay when failing health rendered assistance necessary.

Over 100 miles down the Assiniboine from Crow Stand, a little below Fort Ellice, at the mouth of Bird Tail Creek, lies

THE BIRD-TAIL RESERVE.

This band presents in some respects one of the most striking instances of progress shown by any of our bands. They are Sioux. They came a little over twenty years ago red-handed from the Minnesota Massacres. Other bands that, like White Cap's band, crossed the borders with them, are, for want of a missionary, as barbarous now as when they came over. As reported last year, this is to a large extent a Christian community. There are about 140 souls on the reserve, and there are thirty names on the communion roll. They have prayer-meetings, Sunday schools, and family

worship, and contribute to Church schemes.

Notwithstanding the acknowledged excellence of their missionary, the Rev. S. Tunkansuiciye, the desire seems general to have a white minister in his place. A deputation from the Presbytery of Brandon is to visit the reserve, and their report will determine the course to be adopted. In the meantime Mr. Tunkansuiciye, has been appointed to spend the next six weeks among the Sioux, near Moosejaw.

Our school on this reserve, under Mr J. G. Burgess, is doing excellent work. The number on the roll is twenty-seven, with an average of a little over half that number.

Some fifty miles north-east of Bird-Tail reserve, on the Little Saskatchewan, a tributary of the Assiniboine, is the

RIDING MOUNTAIN RESERVE (OKANASE).

This reserve is under the charge of the Rev. George Flett—our oldest missionary to the Indians. This band may safely be described as a Christian community. There are forty-one communicants, of whom thirty-one are Indians, and ten whites and half-breeds. They have two services every Sabbath, with an attendance of from forty to sixty. The prayer-meeting is attended by from twenty-five to thirty. The band is reported as making good progress both in Christian knowledge and material comfort. The population is about 130.

Mr. Flett has charge also of two other reserves—one of them on the Rolling River near Minnedosa, and the other near Rossburn. The United States population of these two is 213.

There is a good school at Okanase, under Mr. John A. Lauder. The number on the roll is twenty-three, with an average of seventeen. During the past winter a considerable number of the children (including five from Mr. Flett's new reserves) boarded at the school. Mr. Flett speaks very gratefully of the assistance he received for the school from the ladies of the Winnipeg Woman's Foreign Mission Society, and others, and testifies strongly in favour of the boarding school system. Mr. Flett has just been requested by your Committee to visit Piapot's reserve for a month to bring his eloquence to bear upon that wayward chief. Much good is expected to result from this visit.

The last school to be reported is the one opened a year ago among the Sioux at

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE.

Until the end of December this school was under the care of Miss Sebastien, of Gladstone, who out forth much faithful effort and was fairly successful in her difficult task. Since that time it has been in charge of Miss Jennie Wright, who comes to us from the congregation of the Rev. S. Carruthers, with an excellent record. All things considered, this school is doing very well. It is very difficult to get the children to attend with any degree of regularity. Those that attend regularly are making remarkable progress. The number on the roll is thirty-five, but the average attendance is only five. There are nine resident pupils. The ladies to whom the opening of this school is due, and who are so earnest and active in carrying it on, are worthy of our heartiest encouragement and

our report would be very defective in carrying it on, are worthy of our heartiest encouragement and thanks for the good work they are doing.

Our report would be very defective if it contained no special reference to the great good that has been done in all our fields by the generous gifts of clothing sent out by the different branches of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society. Grateful messages of thanks to the good ladies form the burden of many a letter. The Indian may not see what benefit he is to receive from education or Christianity, but he can appreciate the comfort of being warmly clad, and understand the motive of those through whom that comfort comes, and thus through his lower nature an entrance to the higher and better parts of his being is secured. parts of his being is secured.

This report shows that we have eighteen bands of Indians under our care, with a population of about 3,500. We have ten schools, with an attendance of about 225. The whole Indian population

of Manitoba and the North-west Territories, as reported last year, is 30,578. The number of schools in operation is seventy-six, and the number of pupils on the roll, 2.357. We have therefore but little more than one-tenth of our Indian population in any sense under the care of our Church. The Church is able to do much more, and there is ample room. There remains yet much of the land to be possessed. We have the proof of successful experiment, as presented in this report, that the Indian can be brought under the power of the Gospel. And the larger experience of the Church in the United States bears similar testimony. We have, therefore, abundant encouragement to continue and extend our labours among our Indian fellow-countrymen. Let us, then, go forward in this work, in the name and spirit of our Marter, until no Indian heathen are left in the land Then "shall the wilde: ness be glad, and the desert rejoice and blossom as the rose."

IV .- MISSION TO FORMOSA,

In the report of the Foreign Mission Committee, Canada Presbyterian Church, for 1871-72, we find the following reference to Formosa. The island "is nearly two hundred and fifty miles long, and eighty broad, and has a population of about three millions. It presents, therefore, a field of ample extent for all the labourers who are likely to be sent to it for many years to come." Mr. George Leslie Mackay, now Dr. Mackay, entered upon this field of labour in the northern part of this island in 1872. The report goes on to say: "There seems every reason to believe that the Church, in selecting China, and Mr. Mackay in choosing Formosa, have been led in the right way. It will be some months before Mr. Mackay can master the language, so as to address the natives effectively in their own tongue. We must be content to wait patiently until he has mastered the initial work of conquering a new and difficult language."

By God's blessing on the labour of the intervening years, we now see a well equipped college and hospital in Tam-sui, and native churches in the following stations, every one of them with a native


PROSPECT OF NEW STATIONS.

To this we find reference in letters from Rev. Messrs. Jamieson and Giâm (A-hôa), as well as from Dr. Mackay. Mr. Giâm says, "Pastor Mackay gave me a kind letter from you, for which I thank you with my heart. I went with my best friend on earth to the East Coast. . . . I wish to tell you about one place. It is near the seaside, and we always pass along there on our way to the chapels. The name is Tai-li-kan. There are Chinese and Pi-po-hoan. On this last trip the people heard that Dr. Mackay was coming, and waited several days at a place where they expected to meet him; but they missed us. Then a teacher was sent about twelve miles to a chapel in another place, and he told us that nearly one hundred Chinese and seventy Pi-po-hoan (Foreigners of the plain) wanted to be Christians. The teacher could already sing several of our hymns. Dr. Mackay told the teacher to go back and think over what was meant by being a Christian. By and by we reached the place whence the teacher had come, and we found him and a great crowd waiting to welcome us to dinner. An ox and a pig had been killed. Dr. Mackay thanked them, and after a little rest pressed on to meet his engagements. Besides his determination to fulfil these, he was testing the people." This was in keeping with what we elsewhere learn about the caution which he has exercised in receiving companies of people, as well as individuals, professing a desire to become followers of Christ. In illustration of this, we have the following from Mr. Jamieson, in a brief record of a preaching tour: "After crossing the tableland to Tho-a-hng, I went southward, visiting the stations in turn, Ang-mng-kang, Tek-chham, Tiong-kang and Au-lang, returning for the Sabbath to Tek-chham city, where I dispensed the Communion. This station was never in a more flourishing condition, and many new hearers have been coming. But, according to our rule in this mission, they have not yet been attending long enough to be admitted by Eaptism. The same remark will apply

MISSIONARY AND EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Mr. Jamleson, in a letter of date March 24 1887, says: "It was decided that, in the early part of this month, all the stations should be visited, in order to dispense the Communion, and receive new members. For this purpose we divided the field; Dr. Mackay and Rev. Mr. Giam going to Kap-tsu-lan; Rev. Tan-He taking Tam-sul district, that is, his own congregation (Sin-tiam) and the stations adjacent, while I was to visit the Tek-chham district. Setting out, I spent a Sabbath at Go-ko-khi, where is one of the recently erected chapels. Next to Tam-sui, this is the oldest station in the field. In the early days of the mission, converts came long distances to worship here; now they have chapels of their own. It is a country station, and a young man is in charge, who promises to be a useful worker." Mention has already been made of Mr. Jamieson's work in the subsequent part of this tour. He adds, "I found the preachers each at his post, and the chapels, as usual, clean and in order. It may seem to you strange that we should refer to church buildings being clean, but to us here, accustomed to seeing other places anything but clean, the contrast is striking; and we greatly enjoy a confortable night's rest in one of these chapels, not having to be so very careful about contact with our surroundings. . . . I always go to some station inland from Tamsui for Sabhath services and generally find the sitting-room in the chapels fairly occuried."

Rev. Tan-He, paster at Sin-tiam, writes: "My dear friend, I do not know how to thank you for being so kind as to send me a letter. Well, I am every day at work in Sin-tiam. Here and at other stations round about, I have baptized a hundred: that is, at Sin-tiam forty-seven, at Pat-lihun, eleven; at Go-Ko-khi eleven; at Chin-nih four; at Lun-a-teng four; at To-tin-tia twelve; at Tein-tng-kha nineteen; at Bang-kah eleven. I dispensed the Lord's Supper, and had packed houses in the three new stone churches. I never wrote before; but if I could write a month without stoping, I could not tell you of all the toil, labour and success of our beloved Mackay. We will never, never, see a man like him again. I visit over a thousand sick people in a year. Yours sincerely, Tan-He." About Rev. Tan-He's congregation at Sin-tiam, Mr. Jamieson says: 'Last Sabbath (March 20) I was at Sin-tiam; and, on arriving on Saturday afternoon, I heard a number of children busy with their lessons in the schoolroom adjoining. Most of these are children of church members, and the teacher here is an old convert. They sang a number of hymns before being dismissed for the day. At the service on Sabbath forenoon the children were seated on the front benches, and were attentive hearers. At this station Rev. Tan-He is the faithful and beloved pastor; and, had it not been that nearly all of the members, pastor included, had their property stolen from them at the time of the French attack, the congregation would have been self-supporting by this time."

Dr. Mackay, after referring to the district assigned to Mr. Jamieson, and to that assigned to Rev. Tan-He, goes on to tell of the part taken by Rev. Glam-chheng (A-hòa) and himself in this evangelistic tour. As his description brings the nature of the work and its blessed results vividly before us, we give very full extracts from it. "We started on the 27th Frebruary for Bang-kah, accompanied by Mr. A. C. Colman, formerly of Ceutral Presbyterian Church, Toronto. In the afternoon I preached to a large and interesting congregation. On Monday, the 28th, we began what I rejoice to call a TRIUMPHAL MAROH. Passing through Sek-khau and Tsin-tng-kha, we arrived in due time at Ke-lung, pressed on to Palm Island, then back again to remain for the night. Tuesday, March 1st, under heavy rain, we made our way to Teng-siang-khe, a large chinese town, whore a new stone chapel is going up, and will soon be finished; but in the meantime will be thatched with grass. Fifty crossed the river and welcomed us, saying that they would become converts at once. We spent the night in a damp, filthy hovel. I extracted many teeth, and spoke to many people. Wednesday, 2nd, we struck towards the sea, and arrived at a Pi-po-hoan village, referred to before. The preacher did good work, and in the evening A-hòa and myself baptized 32 (thirty-two), 350 (three hundred and fifty) being present. Thursday, 3rd, pressed on to La-ma-ien (Margaret Machar Hemorial Church), and in the evening baptized 23 (twenty-three), 156 (one hundred and fifty-six) of our people being present. Friday, 4th, under heavy rain, moved on to Bu-loan, where at non we baptized 26 (twenty-six). Then preached to 100 (one hundred); afterwards passed through La-kiet-akoe, extracted teeth, pre

dozen bamboo poles on each side of the open space had oil poured in, which of course only went to the first joint, paper was then put in and lighted, and 500 (five hundred) by actual counting stood before us. A-hôa and I preached the everlasting Goepel; only half a mile away in the woods were the savages, no doubt looking on. The moon was bright. O memory of days gone by—days a dozen years ago—days spent for Christ. I don't know what you all think of what I write; but yonder in years ago—days spent for Christ. I don't know what you all think of what I write; but yonder in that weird, strange, yet sublime church, with mountains for walls, the ground for floor, the heavens for roof, we fearlessly, yet lovingly told of 'Josus of Nazareth passing by.' Wednesday, 9th. Went on to Chin-tsu-bi-kau, again preached outside, baptized 12, 330 (three hundred and thirty) being there. The people killed an ox; we sang till after midnight. Glorious! Thursday, 10th. We proceeded to Pi-thau, and about noon in the chapel baptized 13, 140 (one hundred and forty) being present. On then to Lan-lan-a, and in the evening hald our meeting outside, baptized 2, 151 (one hundred and fifty one) being in attendance. Friday, 11th. Marched on to Ki-liap-pan, in the chapel preached, 140 being hearers, all our own people. In the evening we were at Hoan-sia-thau, where an ox was killed, and also a pig, baptized 12, 130 (one hundred and thirty) were most earnest hearers. Saturday, 12th, went to Lin-a-hau, at noon addressed 160 outside under the sun. Hurried on to Ki-bri-lau, baptized 8, 65 (sixty-five) converts in attendance. Late arrived at Loa-tek-ui, and in the chapel baptized 4, 70 (seventy) present. Sunday, 13th. Forencon at Ki-liap-tau, baptized 12, 130 (one hundred and thirty) present. In the evening at La-ma-ien, where 18 (eighteen) preachers and 214 converts met. We commemorated the love of Jesus who died for us. I preacher, followed by A-hôa's usual sensible words. Then I met all my old student, the preachers, and had a word with them, then with elders and deacons, and sang till long past midnight. In all we baptized 214 (two hundred and fourteen), and addressed between two and three thousand of our converts (by actual counting we know), and don't guess about the matter. Not for name—not for fame—not for gold—not for man; but oh, Lord God, let me die under the blood-st

STATISTICS OF CHURCH IN NORT'S FORMOSA.

The whole number of baptisms since the last Annual Report it has a leady mentioned and one at Tek-chham,) is 315. "Last year," says Dr. Mackay, "we had one out roll 2,247. Three hundred and fifteen, added to that number, would make 2,562; but 16 have died, so that our present number of baptized members is 2,546. Of these 53 are ordained elders; 45 are deacons; and two are pastors. At this date we have 38 preaching stations and 38 preachers; two teachers (native) in the college, and 20 students. EDUCATION.

Referring to the students, Dr. Mackay says: "Beginning in May, 1886, I had students pure diagonal their studies till Christmas . . . During October, November, and December, they were with me in Bang-kah, where I had a better chance of drilling them. In January this year, all came out to Oxford College (Tam-sui), to give one entire month to their own language and classics. Then this month (February) was devoted to the teaching of the Bible. But even in work like that of January, we have Bible first, Bible middle, and Bible last. On hearing that this work was to be engaged in, thirteen preachers in the neighbourhood of Tam-sui, and the two native pastors asked, and obtained permission to attend. All worked with a spirit that was inspiring. For four weeks they were up till past midnight nearly every night. I have just had a review. We began the day they were up till past midnight nearly every night. and obtained permission to attend. All worked with a spirit that was inspiring. For four weeks they were up till past midnight nearly every night. I have just had a review. We began the day before yesterday at 9 a.m., and finished at 9 p.m. I examined on Chinese History, Chinese Poetry, Natural History, Astronomy, Botany, Geography and Physical Geography of Asia, Anatomy, Physiology, Conchology, Materia Medica, and Geology. In this special course of study 36 students preachers and native pastors, took part. They did nobly. The exercises were closed with preaching. They all went to their rooms rejoicing over their day's work. They are a splendid band of young men. May the power of Almighty God keep them near Himself.

"The girls' school was interrupted for a time, but the girls were taught in the chapels. At one place I examined twenty in Scripture Catechism on the Old and New Testaments, and their answers were equal to any I was heard in Canada.

The preaching and the teaching are beginning to produce such results in the way of effort for the maintenance of Gospel ordinances as might have been expected. The mission passed through a most trying ordeal through the invasion of the French. Many houses were made desolate, and many trying ordeal through the invasion of the French. Many houses were made desolate, and many people, once in comfortable circumstances, were left 'with only the clothes on their backa.' Still we have to report that, from March, 1886, to March, 1887, the Church in North Formosa spent \$975,00 in building and repairs. In one place the people themselves put up a neat, commodious building. In other places, they repaired damages done by typhoons, etc. The subscriptions varied from 15 cents to \$100. During the past year the preacher in the Mackay Church was also supported by contributions from the Church generally. Dr. Mackay, in closing his report, which we should have been glad to give entire, says: "Let me express my profound respect and love for the Foreign Mission Committee, and for the whole beloved Presbyterian Church in Canada. You have responded to my poor appeals in a way worthy of a better man; but I have done my best for Christ, and for Him alone. Now 'Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things And blessed be His glorious name for ever.'"

The chief explanation of this doubtless is, that the hostility to foreigners and foreign institutions, awakened by the French invasion of the island, is gradually dying down, and the natives are with much less prejudice recognizing the superiority of Western methods. About one thousand soldiers received advice and medicine during the year. "By far the most successful work," says Dr. Rennie, Physician and Surgeon in charge, "is done amongst the peasantry. If less educated and acute than the town-dwellers, the, seem to be gifted with more common sense in the treatment of their bodily ailments. The patience with which they suffer tedious and troublesome diseases is no less praiseworthy than the decision and fortitude they display in undergoing operations." Rev. John Jamieson, Treasurer, reports an income from contributions during the year of \$1,808.78, with a balance in hand of \$306.92.

"In the Hospital," says Dr. Mackay, "Dr. Alexander Rennie, who succeeded such an able Physician as Dr. Johansen, has carried on the work wonderfully and most successfully, and has to

"In the Hospital," says Dr. Mackay, "Dr. Alexander Rennie, who succeeded such an able Physician as Dr. Johansen, has carried on the work wonderfully and most successfully, and has to report the largest number of patients since the Hospital was founded. During 1886 I extracted 1,237 teeth, and, with all the preachers, dispensed to 5,176, throughout the three districts of which North Formosa is composed. When idols, Tauist and Buddhist priests, sorcerers and native doctors utterly failed, in numerous instances I had the patients out of bed within ten days. Quinine, I believe, is the best remedy known to man at present. Arsenic (Fowler's solution) is good, but inferior. Still, quinine does not kill, nor eradicate, the poison. It is only necessary for one who has it in his system, to get wet feet, to be exposed under the sun, or (with the body a little warm) to sit in a cold place; when it will get enraged like a demon, and render the sufferer indescribably miserable. Now, to prevent small-pox a person is vaccinated, when he can go freely even amongst the dying. What a triumph! I believe a similar triumph is awaiting the killing, eradicating, or keeping under subjection, this devouring poison. It may be by introducing some substance into the system through the skin, or it may be by taking it into the stomach, so that a man can live, work or travel in malarious regions, and remain untouched. May a great discoverer speedily come, and deliver tens of thousands in Formosa, China, the "Dark Continent," India and other lands from this soul and body trying poison. Come when he may, let the astonished world ascribe praise and glory to the Eternal God, who created the star-built universe, and prepared a home where burning fevers, bitter sorrows, heart-rending diseases and malarial poison can never enter.

Last year the General Assembly authorized and instructed the missionaries of the Church ia Central India to constitute themselves into a Presbytery, to be known as the Presbytery of Indore. That was done accordingly; and a step was thus taken in the way of more thorough organization. Beneficial results are anticipated from this; but about these nothing definite can yet be said, as the Presbytery has been as short a time in a sistence.

From the Mission Council we have a full report of the work which is being prosecuted in Central India. The report opens with a grateful recognition of the goodness of God as manifested in His presence and aid vouchsafed during the past year: "The good hand of our God has been upon us in the year that has passed; and though there has been matter enough for grief and humiliation, there has yet been very much to make us thank God and take courage. Our number has been increased by the arrival of Mrs. Murray and Dr. Marion Oliver, and all along our line distinct advance

"The increase in the attendance at the Bazaar S. School, and the Girls' schools at Mhow, and the erection of a commodious temporary building for one of them from funds contributed in this country; the extension of Dr. Beatty's practice, the success of the High School, the organization of the congregation, and election of elders at Indore, and the general prosperity of the work at Neemuch are some of our causes for rejoicing and thanksgiving. The planting of our first station in a native city, Rutlam, is now an accomplished fact, for which we may well be deeply thankful, both for its own sake and for its influence as a precedent.

"In three other native towns, Jaora, Khachrand and Barnagar as sub-stations, a beginning has been made with native helpers. So the work is progressing outwardly at least; and while we have as yet little to report of actual ingathering, it must be remembered by any at home who need more than the Lord's command and His promise to stimulate and encourage them, that seed time must precede harvest; that a large mass will absorb much heat without changing its form till the whole comes to the melting point; and that this applies to the people of India as to, perhaps, no other people. Remembering also how vast is the mass, and how comparatively small the influence applied, they and we must stir up ourselves both to 'take hold on' God, and to put forth the energy He has given; but which, also, is so largely frittered away on 'the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life.'"

Mr. Wilkie's work continues to be as onerous and as varied as in previous years. In regard to it he says: "After the full report of last year it is unnecessary to repeat details of work which necessarily have so much of sameness from year to year. I shall, therefore, only note any changes of the year that seem to be of importance." Among these the Assembly will be specially interested in observing the improved position of the native church at Indore. "It has," says Mr. Wilkie, "taken a step in advance. It has been organized into a congregation, and is prepared to call a preacher who has been taken under the care of the Presbytery with a view to licence, after having taken a four years' course in the Ahmednagar Theological School. As a stipend they promise Rs. 50 per month or Rs. 600 per year, and from the first they will be entirely self-supporting. This year all the expenses of the Boarding School, of the Sabbath School and of the religious papers, the current expenses of the church, together with help to other schemes, have been met from church contributions; and they have a balance of nearly Rs. 1000 to begin the new year with. They have, therefore, resolved to send \$100 to the Foreign Mission Fund of the home Church, and Rs. 50 to the Saharanpur Mr. Wilkie's work continues to be as onerous and as varied as in previous years. In regard to it resolved to send \$100 to the Foreign Mission Fund of the home Church, and Rs. 50 to the Saharanpur Theological School. The membership has been reduced by removals, etc., to forty-three, with seventeen baptized adherents, i.e., sixty in all. Baptisms from heathenism we cannot report. We regret that the Boarding School scheme is practically blocked for want of a suitable building, but we hope, as a congregation, to undertake the building too ere long, since the Church at home cannot do so."

There is the prospect, too, of other native students being soon available as pastors for churches that may require their services. To this Mr. Wilkie thus refers:

"In September last Basist Narayan, with the approval of the Council, was sent to the Theological School at Saharanpur, of the American Presbyterian Mission, under the care of Rov. Messrs. Wherry and Ewing, whose ability and earnest evangelical efforts are too well known to require gny words from me. From the first, that Mission has kindly invited us to avail ourselves of the advantages of the school, though we have only now for the first time found ourselves able to spare any of our men." our men.

We have encouraging and interesting accounts of the High School at Indore, and of a recent prize distribution there :

prize distribution there:

"The High School has continued to grow, the average for the year being 132, but the average for the last few months has been about 150. The total expense to the Mission of the school for the year has been Rs. 674 per month, about \$20, and we hope in time to have it entirely self-supporting.
"At our prize distribution, recently held, Dewhan Bahadur Raghunath Rao, Prime Minister of H. H. Maharajah Holkar, was in the chair, and in the warmest possible way he spoke of missionary efforts generally, and of the school in particular, saying that it was the best school that he had seen in his wide experience of forty-five years. With him were many of the principal gentlemen of the city, though, owing to the Holi and other festivals, several expressed regret in letters of apology for their absence. For our prize funds, over Rs. 200 were given, part of which we have set aside to form a library and a gymnasium. I regret that none in Canada have been able to respond to the anneal of a ever ago for some scholarships, etc., for the school, that we might be on a level to the appeal of a year ago for some scholarships, etc., for the school, that we might be on a level with other competing schools; but we hope our great distance from those at home will not lead to our being lost sight of altogether. I should particularly mention that the Jubilee Committee, consisting entirely of native gentlemen, spontaneously sent us the largest donation received for the prize

ss Rodger reports that the gills' school under her care has been carried on throughout the year without more than the oddinary interruptions. "The girls studying English number about twenty; and they have made satisfactory progress in reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, and Scripture history. . . They have gone over Barth's Scripture history of the Old Testament up to the period of the entrance of the Israelites into Palestine. They know also the chief events in the life of Christ." . Miss Rodger regrets that, throughout the year, as much attention has not been given to Zenana work as usual. "This is not because the women are not as anxious to be visited and hear the Word read, but for want of sufficient time and proper help. A young girl in the city, who has been a widow for several years, has been studying English for some time past, and would soon get a fair knowledge of the language, as she learns quickly, if only time could be given to instruct her. She cannot come out, and must be taught in her own home.

"This is not the only instance that could be given of women willing to be taught in their homes, if there were any one to give them regular instruction."

Miss Ross writes: "In August I opened a new school in the Sarafa (Money-lenders' Street). While endeavours were being put forth to get a house, many were the disparaging statements made about female education. . . Through the kindness of Mr. Wilkie, a room was at length secured

and made ready for the reception of pupils. During the first three days no one came: on the fourth day one little girl came, and for three days had no companion. . . . But the numbers continued to increase. There are now eighty-one names on the roll, although the daily attendance ranges only from twenty-five to thirty-four. The reason of this is, that they go so often to dine with their caste people. Their attendance is thus interrupted and irregular; but they cannot be induced to give up the practice at once. The dolls which the ladies of Canada so kindly sent out have been the source of great interest and attraction. Mrs. Wilkie distributed them, and gave the pupils the privilege of choosing for themselves, which proved most gratifying. It was surprising to see how closely they inspected them. Since the dolls were given the attendance has increased, and the hope is that it will go on improving. At first none would buy their books for school; but lately, over a dozen have paid for theirs: the Christian Vernacular Series is used. The house I have now is very much better than the former one: the landlord has had a wall taken down and one room enlarged, which is a great the former one; the landlord has had a wall taken down and one room enlarged, which is a great

"Through the pupils, admission is gained to the homes. I have received invitations which I have not yet responded to. I have not yet a Bible Woman, and so alone I cannot overtake a't the visiting. I go to twenty houses and six Mohullas. Miss McKenzie, a young woman who lives in Indore, assists me at school, but as yet does not do any visiting. The little maidens here have not been accustomed to school, so that one person cannot satisfactorily teach as many as can be taught in a school of themselved to the mathers do say that they get their requests granted by going to school at home. A number of the mothers do say that they get their requests granted by going to the temples and doing poojah, others confess that it is quite useless, but assert that they cannot give it up and stand alone among so many. With God all things are possible: when His grace enters their hearts they will be enabled to walk in His ways."

NEEMUCII.

Here, as during the previous year, the work of Colportage, of the School and of the Dispensary, has been prosecuted with diligence and perseverance.

Mr. Wilson thus writes: "A vernacular school has been taught by Govind Ram, in the Camp Bazaar. The boys in attendance are mostly low caste and poor. In addition to the poojah days, when they will not attend, much time has been lost to study by several of the boys, who, in the grass-

cutting season, were taken out into the jungle by their parents to aid in cutting grass.

"During the year, however, good progress has been made, several who a year ago did not know the Alphabet, now read fluently in the Third Hindi Book, and have made good progress also in other subjects. The teacher is a native Christian, who has been received by certificate from the United

Presbyterian Mission.

"The Anglo-Vernacular School in Neemuch city, has been taught as before by Balaram, assisted by a heathen monitor. At the annual examination held before Christmas the results indicated much

diligence alike on the part of pupils and teachers.

"A familiarity with Scripture History was manifested which would have been creditable in boys trained in Canadian Sunday schools. The average attendance during the year has been much the

same as last year.

"A girls' school has been opened in the camp in which a native Christian woman teaches, under the superintendence of Mrs. Wilson. This form of educational work is a new thing here, and meets with many prejudices and trying difficulties. The children are very anxious to learn, but ignorant nothers do not see any use in allowing their daughters to read, and are very unwilling to send them

"The Dispensary has been kept open during the year. Medicines are dispensed by a native doctor, who has had two years' practice in one of the United Presbyterian Mission Dispensaries. Many lives have been saved, and much suffering relieved by his services. Dr. Burroughs, one of the army surgeons, has kindly given his assistance in some of the more difficult operations. During the year, 1,886 cases have been treated, and about 355 operations performed. Religious services are held

year, 1,8% cases have been treated, and about 355 operations performed. Religious services are held in the dispensary almost every morning, when an audience varying from five to fifty is obtained. Preaching services have been held in the Bazaar regularly. The attendance varied greatly, but a very encouraging interest has been kept up during the year, the Mohammedans still continuing to preach in opposition. The Christian Sabbath services have been specially well attended in the camp place of worship by both Mohammedans and Hindus.

"The Gospel has been regularly and systematically preached in the villages round about. In this work I have lately secured the aid of a zealous and intelligent young man who was trained in Secunderabad Mission Orphanage.

"During the cold weather, we made four large cities in succession centres of work, and of which we tented for several days. Our plan of work was to go out in the morning to the surrounding villages, when we preached and distributed simple medicines, and in the afternoons and evenings to work in the city, or to hold services of preaching and singing at our tents. At most of the places our message was well received. Jerun, Jawad, Mandesaur and Nimbohera, were the chief places chosen as centres of operation. as centres of operation.

as centres of operation.

"At Jawad, which is reported to contain some 17,000 inhabitants, we were much encouraged by the interest awakened. All classes and ranks, from the chief ruler of the city to the sweeper, came in crowds to the magic lantern exhibition, and to the preaching services at our tents, outside the city walls. Much kindness was shown us by the authorities of the city.

"At Mandesaur, a city of 27,000 inhabitants, notorious for its wickedness and crime, the Gospe message did not find so warm a welcome. One evening when I was not with my two native helpers, they were hooted and pelted, and driven out of the city. However, the next morning we returned and preached again, and the only sign of opposition was a low angry murmur in the crowd as we moved away. A good English school would do much to remove prejudice and prepare the way, but I have not felt at liberty to ask the funds necessary for this work. At Jawad, also, there is a fine opening for school work, and I have been again and again pressed to institute a school there.

Mr. Wilson thus concludes: "Doubtless this Hinduism is being permeated by a power that will utterly break the strength of its life one day; but that day has not yet come. And when one thinks of the deep rooted prejudice, the hopeless ignorance, the childish superstition and credulity, the deadening influence of a bilind fatalism that traces all evil up to God, adamantine chains of custom and caste, and, perhaps, more than all, the feeble efforts of the human ayents, who, one here and another there, in the midst of India's millions are lifting up their voice, and calling men to repentance and faith, it seems as if that glorious day were yet far off.

"But the great Appe springs not from the earth, it comes from above, and is as bright as the prunise of Him who has said, 'that every tongue shall confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father.'"

Mr. Murray is now occupying this field. He has entered upon his work there in the face of difficulties, not greater, perhaps, than might have been anticipated. "It is the oldest city in India, and considered one of the most holy. It is the Benares of Central India. Thousands of pligrims and Fakeers from all parts of India visit the place annually. Besides the yearly melas there is one grand mela held every twelve years, when the place is literally swarmed. A good opportunity will be afforded in circulating the Gospel amongst those people. We hope some of the seeds of truth, in the tracts and books distributed, may yet bear good fruit in many a widely separated home. The city itself is said to have a population of about 33,000. There are no English residents, but state officers and travellers visit the place frequently, and for their accommodation a comfortable Dak Bungalow has been built, in which we also can remain for a few days at a time, when not required by others, in cool weather we can live in tents, but during the hot and rainy seasons this is impossible."

To this place Mr. and Mrs. Murray have gone to tell, as opportunity may be afforded them, the good news of the Gospel. Mr. Murray says:

"Through the kindness of the American Marathi Mission, we have secured two catechist teachers, and their wives and they are now at work. Two vernacular schools for boys have been

teachers, and their wives and they are now at work. Two vernacular schools for boys have been opened; one has an attendance of upwards of forty boys, the other is growing daily. The school for girls has only been open for ten days, and as this is something entirely new for Ujjain, we cannot

gris has only been open for ten days, and as this is something entirely new for Ujjain, we cannot yet speak confidently.

"At our last meeting of Council, permission was granted to open an English school. One teacher, a native of the city, who can speak English fairly well, and whose influence, we hope, may be helpful, has been secured. We expect to open this school at once; or as soon as a place and an additional Christian teacher can be obtained. One of the schoolrooms we use for Sunday school and preaching service. It is not very large, but will do for a little while.

"This is an inviting field for medical work. The sanitary condition of the city is very bad. Indeed filthiness is considered a virtue, and in such surroundings diseases of every type are terribly recorded.

prevalent. A Medical Missionary could reach the hearts and gain the confidence of these poor sufferers, much better than any other can do. One man, who recently lost his wife through improper treatment, or for lack of any treatment, has offered Rs. 800 for a hospital or place where women treatment, or fack or any treatment, has offered as 800 for a nospital or place where women might receive medical attendance. In the hope of securing some one to take charge of the work, we intend opening a dispensary as soon as practicable. Would that an earnest appeal on behalf of Ujain might reach the ears and hearts of some of our young Christian Doctors in Canada. "In selecting this field, we have done so, feeling that strong opposition would be encountered, and even with some fears that failure for the present might be the result. Still, it is the Lord's work, not ours; and it must succeed. O God, increase our faith! O brethren, strengthen our hands! so that, in this ancient and sacred centre of Brahmin influence and heathen darkness, the Light of the world may quickly shine!"

HUTLAM.

Mr. J. Fraser Campbell writes hopefully of the prospects here. He says: "We see profound cause for thankfulness as we glance back at the past year, or rather eleven months, covered by this report. It may be better not to enter into particulars even yet; but, to say the least, our position affords a wide contrast to that of a year ago, and hindrances have, doubtless, been so overruled as to become helps. Our position was certainly somewhat anxious for a time, and our unfinished native house in the city extremely trying in the hot season, and the hot parts of the rainy season. But we were graciously sustained in remarkably good health, and in much happiness, on the whole. It generally takes a long time to get anything done here, but gradually we got our house made more comfortable, so that with other improvements now possible it would be less trying this year. But whatever we may do for the house its situation in a parrow long remains unfavour. this year. But whatever we may do for the house, its situation in a narrow lane remains unfavourable for ventilation, and fatiguingly difficult of access—al nost dangerously in the heavy rains. We, ther fore, feel it to be a matter for much thankfulness that our position is so far improved that we have just obtained the Rajah's consent to our renting, for a time, part of a bungalow now used as a Dak Bungalow, and which is cool in the hot season, though said to be unhealthy in the rains; and

that it now seems settled that we are to be allowed to purchase a site, and build for ourselves.

"The work has been from the beginning interesting and encouraging. Our house in the city, though not in the most favourable situation, yet brought us so far into the midst of the people that numbers soon found us and visited us for conversation and for medicine, as well as to attend our

Mrs. Campbell opened a school in June; one impediment after another was overcome; by the New Year there were twenty-seven on the roll; and such progress had been made as to elicit expressions of gratified surprise from Colonel and Mrs. Martin, who visited the school, and distributed prizes and gifts. In Zenana work, by means of a Lending Library, by the dissemination of Scriptures and tracts, by the employment of native helpers, by frequent visits to villages around Rutlam, efforts are being constantly made to disseminate saving truth. Of the opportunities offered for work in out stations, the case of Jaora may be cited as an example:

"Jaora is a city twenty-two miles north by rail, with a population of 20,000, of whom more than half are Hindoos and Jains, though it belongs to a Mohammedan Nawab: the population of the whole state is 108,434. There is an opening for a good English school if we had a missionary there. Meanwhile Jairam has a boys' school, and his wife a girls' school; the continued ill health of his wife and child, and the death of the latter, have prevented the girls' school from coming to much as wite and child, and the death of the latter, have prevented the girls sensol from coming to much as yet. The boys's chool has gone up to over sixty, and again through silly scares among the parents (such at that the object of the school was to help secure the heads of a large number of boys for the foundation of a bridge), and through other causes, has gone down to less than twenty. Jairam also has a Sunday school, preaches, and sells scriptures and tracts."

Contributions by native Chr. atians (twelve), in this new station, have amounted to Rs. 24. "These," says Mr. Campbell, "tegether with our own contributions, the collections at the united meetings in Pictou County, and Rs. 50 sent by Major-General Van Heythuysen from England, go to our building fund. Considering the poverty of the Foreign Mission Fund, we are very desirous that whatever buildings we get be provided by special contributions instead of draining the general

that whatever buildings we get be provided by special contributions instead of draining the general fund, and thus hindering the sending out of more men, and the opening of new and much-needed

stations.

Mr. Builder, along with Mr. Murray and some native assistants, attended the mela of Onkar, on the bank of the Nerbudda in November last. "Here," says Mr. Builder, "we had many opportunities of preaching and conversing with the people from all parts of the surrounding country but we felt ourselves in a position not unlike that of persons seeking to turn the rushing torrent of an Indian river in the rainy season. The majority of these rivers, however, when the rains are over, quickly spend their force, and the only traces left behind are their dry and rocky channels. This illustrates aptly the religious life of the people, which reaches its height through the influence of these large gatherings but subsides as quickly. They are their times of revival, and teach us, if we are to reach the heart and inner life of the people, that we must infuse into such gatherings, Christian that the contract the left of the people, that we must infuse into such gatherings, Christian the such gatherings. tian thought and Christian faith, and thus make them fruitful of eternal peace to many souls now

seeking rest in vain.

"We also spent three weeks in camp at Dhar, a distance of thirty-five miles from Mhow. Mr. and Mrs. Murray and the Misses Stockbridge accompanied us. Our reception was most hearty, and Mrs. Murray and the Misses Stockbridge accompanied us. Our reception was most hearty, both in the city and villages; we visited the latter usually in the evening, when we made use of the magic lantern, which proved to be a most valuable auxiliary. We had the privilege of exhibiting in the Dhar High School and in the Durbar Hall of the Thakur of Turla, along with other pictures, a series of views in the life of Christ, which afforded an excellent opportunity of giving, in brief, the mission and teaching of our Saviour. The Maharaja of Dhar also invited us to witness the Durbar, held in honour of the Queen's Jubilee, and at the close asked me to speak and offer prayer in behalf of Her Majesty, which I did, and also for His Highness, feeling grateful to Him who controlleth the hearts of all men for this act of recognition."

Here is an incident equally significant and suggestive:

"For a short time a band of twenty-five travelling labourers, living temporarily near one of the villages, came daily for instruction in regard to our religion. Although the result was not their ingathering into the Church before their departure, we trust that many of them carried away and will spread, in their wanderings, the seed of the kingdom. Had a suitable worker been available, we would have liked to have sent him along with them, but this we regret we were unable to do."

Contributions have been received from Mhow congregation, and from friends of the mission, to the amount of upwards of Rs. 400 in aid of various objects; and to the amount of Rs. 450 in aid of Pensionpoora School building. In concluding his report Mr. Ruilder says:

Pensionpoora School building. In concluding his report, Mr. Builder says:

"It gives me pleasure to bear testimony to the marked improvement in the girls' schools, and to the interest manifested in the other parts of the work of the Misses Stockbridge. The average attendance in the bazaar school is much larger than last year. The majority of the pupils are Hind as, but the number of Parsees and Mahommedans is increasing. In Pensionpoora school the number has also improved, and the parents are beginning to show a great deal of interest. One special feature of their work is a women's weekly meeting, which is simply for prayer, praise, and

reading of the Scriptures, and has been attended by as many as thirty-five.

"Our Sabbath school has been a source of much encouragement to us. We have seven classes, and have been assisted by Rev. R. C. Murray and Mr. Drew and the other members of the mission.

and have been assisted by Nev. C. Murray and Mr. Drew and the other members of the mission. The average attendance has been eighty-eight, and for several Sabbaths we had over one hundred.

"We may mention, also, the gathering held at Christmas for the boys and girls of our different schools. Several ladies, Major-General Gillespie, and other English and native gentlemen were present. The children seemed to enjoy the day, especially the prize part.

"Though we have had several enquirers, and some of them hopeful, yet our additions have been few; two by baptism, one by profession of faith; and Yusuf Ram Chander has joined us as col-

porteur from another mission.

Miss Minnie Stockbridge is encouraged by the state and prospects of her school. Religious exercises are conducted daily without any objection being made. She says:

Seeing that this was a success, my sister and I thought it better to amalgamate our women's meetings; and instead of having one once a fortnight, we hold it weekly, and have been very much encouraged to go on, as the average attendance has been thirty-five.

"I still continue to dispense simple medicines. My father kindly gave me Rs. 40 to start with, and the mission has been good enough to replenish my stock. I find that being able to give a little medicine enables me to get access into homes I should not otherwise have the privilege of entering, and so home to continue this part of my work

and so hope to continue this part of my work.

"We feel the want of good experienced Bible women very much. Had we one or two, we should be able to open meetings, and scatter the truth in all the villages round. I have been able to visit four villages occasionally; but time and strength will not permit me to do more, although other invitations are very pressing."

Miss A. Stockbridge says

"The year 1886 has been in some respects a successful one. The Bazaar school under my care has ninety-one names on the roll, viz., Parsees, eight; Mohammedans, six; and Hindus, seventy-seven. The average attendance during the year was sixty-four. Separate from the school, I had a

has ninety-one names on the roll, viz., Parsees, eight; Mohammedans, six; and Hindus, seventy-seven. The average attendance during the year was sixty-four. Separate from the school, I had a class of six young women, whose ages vary from eighteen to twenty-five.

"When the school broke up for the Christmas vacation, we had an entertainment for the children, at which several influential people were present, among whom were Major-General Gillespie, Rev. M. E. Mills, Col. Gibbs, Capt. Smerdon, Khan Bahadoor Bezonjee Sorabjee, Kazi Mahomed Akram, Mr. Dadabhoy and Mr. Cooverjee Cowasjee. All listened very attentively to the little ones as they came forward to read or recite, after which General Gillespie presented the prizes, making an encouraging remark to the children as they came to receive that which was in store for them. I have three helpers in the school, Lakshmibai, Ramkorbai, and Jennibai, from whom I receive much assistance.

them. I have three helpers in the school, Lakshindon, Ramkoloa, and behindon, and receive much assistance.

"I have, in addition to my school work, been enabled to visit thirty homes pretty regularly. At each of these homes we sing, read, and sometimes pray. It is astonishing to see the eagerness with which the women listen to us. One woman desired to learn to read and write, so Lakshmibai visits her daily. In our zenana visiting we often take fancy work, so that while one reads the other does her best to teach the women to work. We have not yet seen any direct fruit of our labour; but slowly prejudices and antipathies are breaking up, and we are looking to our Heavenly Father or strength to enable us to go forward in the great work He has given us here."

Miss Beatty, M.D.—Reference is made in the report of the council to the extension of Miss Beatty's practice. Her labours have been abundant. She is now suffering from fever. Mr. Wilkie and Mr. Wilson, in recent letters, let us know that she is very much prostrated; but they express the hope that she may soon be restored by a residence for a little while in a colder climate. Cashmere has been chosen because of its air being somewhat like that of Canada. Miss (Dr.) Oliver will now be able to render much assistance in Miss Beatty's work; but, when we think of them and of the multitudes requiring their aid, we are constrained to say, "What are they among so many?"

Miss MacGregor.—Some months ago the Committee asked Miss MacGregor to come home on furlough; but she, likewise, is suffering from illness, and is consequently unable to avail herself of the opportunity thus afforded her of re-visiting her home. She says: "It may appear to you somewhat singular that I should prefer to remain in India rather than re-join my friends at home, especially in the present state of my health. When the proper time for my furlough arrived I hesitated to go home on account of a constitutional weakness, which rendered residence in a cold climate inadvisable after living for some years in India. I felt that I could work here with comparative strength and ease, whereas going to Canada would, in all probability, be fatal to my health. This opinion has been confirmed by medical men here, and is borne out by my present illness in its symptoms and development." But, from recent advices, the Committee is glad to learn that her health is so far restored as to lead to the expectation of her early return to Canada.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY (WESTERN DIVISION).

Year by year the operations of this Society are seen to be, more and more, an essential part of the Foregin Mission work of our Church. Without its aid the work among heathen women and children, the extension and prosperity of which it is our privilege to report, could never have been overtaken. In the annual report of that Society we find this statement: It is as a stone of memorial with the inscription 'Hitherto hath the Lord helped us.' ''Ten years ago, on the 17th of April, we gathered as a Society, in Knox Church, Toronto, to celebrate our first anniversary. Truly that was the day of small things; but some of us well remember how interesting were the proceedings, how encouraging the reports, and that a deep under-current of missionary zeal and enthusisam pervaded the hearts of all present. Eighteen Auxiliaries and three Mission Bands were reported, with the sum of \$1,107.99 in the treasury. . . . To-day we meet to commemorate our eleventh anniversary. The little one has not yet became a thousand, but the growth has been steady, and within a recent period even rapid; for this we praise God. . . . Jehovah-Nissi has been the watchword on many lips, and in many hearts, during this the first year of our second decade; and we have enlarged our borders, and increased our contributions, until, from the partial support of two missionaries, with which, as a Society, we commenced work, we can now, with a good balance in the treasury, meet rll the claims upon us this year, for woman's work in the various foreign mission fields of our Church." How fully this statement is borne out, the following exhibit of annual progress in Auxiliaries, Mission Bands, Presbyterial Societies, and contributions, from the organization of the Society in 1976 to the present time, will show the society in 1976 to the present time, will show the society in 1976 to the present time. In 1876 the Society was organized with fifty members. The number of members in 1887 is 8,563 with 152 life members. "The average increase for the later years has been at the rate of 800 members, last year it was 2,000." The Society is "devising liberal thin "not only in the way of supporting the present missionaries, and adding to their number, but in providing increased accommodation for educational work in Central India, and among the Indians of the North-West. We say a hearty Amen to the words with which the Report of the Society closes: "Let us go forward in 'His name,' with faith and prayer, in this great work of elevating and saving the women of the world." world."

VOLUNTEERS READY FOR THE FOREIGN FIELD.

The remarkable interest in Foreign mission work that pervades the colleges of our Church may well be spoken of as a "sign of the times." In Montreal College, in Queen's College, Kingston, and Knox College, Toronto, numbers of students, some of whom have completed their Theological course, are ready to go whithersoever the Church may send them, to publish the glad tidings among those who have never heard the name of Jesus. The Missionary Society of Knox College has actually selected Mr. Jonathan Goforth, and that of Queen's College, Mr. James F. Smith, who are prepared to go to the Foreign field, in the event of their being accepted as missionaries by the Assembly. The missionary Societies just named have become responsible for the support of these brethren whom they warmly commend to the confidence of the Assembly and the Church. In the judgment of the Committee, as well as in that of their fellow-students, these brethren are exceptionally qualified for this great work. Besides this movement on the part of the Colleges, there is an offer on the part of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, to support a missionary, thus following the noble example of St. Paul's Church, Montreal. In view of such indications of a growing interest in Foreign

example of St. Paul's Church, Montreal. In view of such indications of a growing interest in Foreign missions we are filled with gratitude to Him from whom cometh down every good and every perfect gift. We regard them as evidences of a more earnest attention on the part of Christ's people to His great command, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature."

But we cannot conceal from the Assembly the fact that these offers, so encouraging and so generous, have occasioned no small anxiety to the Committee. RESOLUTION IN REGARD TO SCHOOL AT PRINCE ALBERT.

and the same sympathy and support are earnestly asked for them.

The Committee appointed to draft a deliverance upon the communications from Dr. Jardine and the congregation of St. Paul's Presbyterian Congregation. Prince Albert, anent the aid to be given by the Foreign Mission Committee towards the support of the High School at Prince Albert, beg to recommend to the Foreign Mission Committee the following deliverance, viz.:—

The Committee having carefully considered the letters from Dr. Jardine and the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Prince Albert, anent the High School there, while sympathising with the desire manifested for the establishment of a High School at Prince Albert on a solid basis, and recognising the great importance to the people there of such an institution, find,

1. That Dr. Jardine in his communications appears to misapprehend the action of the General Assembly of 1884, and the extent to which the Foreign Mission Committee has become pledged to the support of the High School at Prince Albert. The action of that Assembly contemplates the payment of a sum of \$600 per annum for three years, a period which has now almost expired, and the setting apart of a fourth part of the mission property to aid in the support of the High School, in consideration of the facilities to be secured by that justitution for the training of Indian pupils. The Committee has come under no obligation to maintain a High School to provide education for the children of the white settlers, and they are at a loss to know how such a work can be legitim vely attached to Foreign Missions, which have hitherto been supposed to deal with the evangelization of

2. That the Committee, however, in view of the service rendered by Miss Baker to the cause of Christ among the Indians, and her adaptation for teaching and Christian work, regard with favour the desire expressed by the brethman at Prince Albert to secure her services once more, and therefore they agree to appoint her to Prince Albert, at a salary of \$600 per annum, for a period of three years, in order that she may render such assistance in the work as is contemplated in the request of Dr. Jardine and Mr. Campbell—the sum of \$600 per annum to cover all the expenses except for travelling, to be incurred by the Committee at Prince Albert.

3. That, in reference to the proposed transfer of the land set apart for the support of the High School at Prince Albert, asked for by Dr. Jardine and St. Paul's congregation, the Committee sees no objection to such a transfer being effected as soon as the High School has been duly incorporated,

so that it can hold and manage property; and they are of opinion that some such arrangement as that suggested by the congregation of St. Paul's might secure an equitable division of the property.

4. That this Committee do not consider it expedient in itself, or in accordance with the purpose of the General Assembly of 1884, to sell or encumber the lands set apart for the support of the High School for the purpose of securing the erection of a building for the School. Further, they regard it as essential to the prospect of success that a building should be provided for the School, as was promised in 1884, and that the building shall be free from the encumbrance and the risks arising from debt; but should the congregation of St. Paul's see its way to erect such a building as the plans submitted to this Committee indicate, free from encumbrance, the Committee are of opinion that the promise of 1884 will be sufficiently implemented by their giving to the High School Board a legal right to the permanent use of the lower part of the building, as they have themselves

5. That the Committee recommend St. Paul's congregation and other parties interested in a Presbyterian High School at Prince Albert to take immediate steps to secure an Act of Incorporation for such a School, vesting the property and management in a Board of Directors connected with the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and who shall be appointed by the Synod of the bourds. But before legislation has been obtained, the Foreign Mission Committee will expect the draft Act to be submitted to them for any pacessary revision.

submitted to them for any necessary revision.

6. That when the building has been provided in the manner promised in 1884, or in the way above indicated, and an Act of Incorporation obtained, this Committee will, with consent of the General Assembly, take steps for the immediate transfer to the corporation of the portion of the mission property set apart for the support of the High School.

This deliverance was adopted by the Committee, and ordered to be added to the Report for the

Assembly.

TRANSFER OF TRUST BY THE HON. ALEX. MORRIS.

The Committee renew the recommendation to the General Assembly to receive from the Hon.

Alex. Morris the money held in trust by him for Jewish missions.

Morris was read, representing the following facts, namely: That for many years he had been custodier of certain sums of money to be used in the working and establishment of a Presbyterian mission to the Jews in Palestine. This money came into his hands in the following

The Synod of the Preshyterian Church in Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland, undertook a mission at Salonica, but was obliged to discontinue it. He was the Treasurer of the Jewish Mission Committee of that Church and on the closing of the mission a small sum remained in his possession. 2. In addition he had placed in his hands by the late Rev. Dr. Alton, of Dolphinton, Scotland, as a personal trust, a sum of money which he had collected mainly in Canada, for a mission to the Jews, beginning at Jerusalem, as he (Dr. Alton) hoped. Subsequently, with his consent, a portion of the amount was expended in connection with the Salonica mission, and his authority was given to the expenditure of the residue among the Jews of Palestine. He had during past years cared for the fundar willing from these two sources, and invested them from time to time. He desires now to be relieved from this personal trust, and to have the money placed in the hands of those who might apply them eventually to the object for which they were designed. He stated that the sum of money in his hands now amounts to \$5,400, and is immediately available. He desires that the Foregin Mission Committee, with the sanction of the General Assembly, should be authorized to receive this money, and relieve him of his trust—assume his position—and to hold it to a mission in Palestine among God's ancient people.

The Committee recommend the General Assembly to authorize it to accept this money from the Hon. Alex. Morris, to exonerate and relieve him from all further responsibility as to the money in question, or its application, and to hold the same in trust for the establishment and working of a Presbyterian mission to the Jews in Palestine, when a fitting time comes in the Providence of God.

In presenting its annual report the Board would call special attention to the fact that recent and current events show the urgent necessity of prosecuting the work of French Evangelization on a much larger scale, and with much greater faith and courage than heretofore. Romanism is undeniably strengthening itself in many ways, and becoming alarmingly aggressive on this continent. Its wealth and various sources of revenue are being greatly augmented, and its organization perfected by the appointment of Bishops, Archbishops, and Cardinals to direct the efforts of a vast army of priests, nuns, and friars, so that its ecclesiastical and political power can scarcely be estimated. The restoration, by the reigning Pontiff, of the Society of Jesus to its original status in the Church, and its incorporation Pontiff, of the Society of Jesus to its original status in the Church, and its incorporation for religious and educational purposes by the Legislature of Quebec, are steps full of peril to the morality and the civil and religious liberties of the Dominion. It is matter of history that this order was suppressed in Canada, and their property taken possession of by the Crown; but since their return in 1842 they have steadily increased in numbers and influence. In 1847 they established the College of St. Mary's, in Montreal, which has now about 450 students, and they have since extended their labors to the cities of Quebec, Three Rivers and Guelph; to the shores of Lake Superior and Lake Huron, the Island of Manitoulin and the region of Temiscamingue. The power conferred upon them for acquiring and holding property in various forms is practically unlimited, and is sure to be used with the utmost energy and skill so as to absorb in a larger degree than ever the resources of the country. energy and skill so as to absorb in a larger degree than ever the resources of the country. It is well known that their mission is chiefly educational; and no one conversant with their standard theological and ethical writings can he sitate to pronounce these impure and corrupting; and yet such principles are not only assiduously inculcated in Colleges and Seminaries but also made to permeate the whole system of elementary education in the Province of Quebec. And to such a degree is the influence of their teachings already felt that eminent advocates do not hesitate to ascribe to it the great and increasing difficulty in getting witnesses to speak the truth and to regard the sacred obligation of a judicial oath. Hence the recent attempt to give it additional solemnity by an Act of Parliament enforcing the use of crucifixes in court houses and elsewhere. It is to be regretted that the aggressive movements of Rome are greatly facilitated by the incessant endeavors of political parties to secure and retain the support of Romanists, and by the course followed by a large section of the nominally Protestant press in being scrupulously silent regarding all that makes against the tactics of the Hierarchy, while outspoken in commending certain of its doings and in denouncing as narrow bigotry the efforts of those who oppose them. It must be acknowledged that owing to ignorance of what Romanism is, and always has been, and through self-interest in various forms, Protestant sentiment has in some instances become so weak that not a few contribute funds to the support of popish institutions and openly or secretly countenance raffles and lotteries for the same purpose. Some even go the length of frankly avowing their opposition to French Evangelization, ostensibly upon three grounds, namely: first, that it breeds strife and bitterness between the French and English nationalities; second, that it hinders a great reformation movement from within the Romish Church; and third, that it is an insult which we ourselves would resent were colporteurs and missionaries from Rome sent among our people.

These reasons, it is believed, viewed from a christian, patriotic or historical standpoint are untenable. As to fomenting strife and contention, that is no part of our mission. We repudiate the insimuation; but we do not forget that when Jesus and his Apostles preached the gespel, and pressed it upon Jew and Gentile, they were charged with the same offence and inclared to be guilty of stirring up sedition and turning the world upside down. Our experience, therefore, is truly apostolic in this respect, and the zeal of our messengers has been so intense, in some instances, as to cause them to be stoned or imprisoned. Nor are we dismayed by opposition; because the degree of resentment encountered is often the clearest proof of the necessity, the wisdom, and Divine authority of the work undertaken. And surely the policy of peace at any price in presence of dense spiritual ignorance and aggressive superstitions is not that which was followed by the reformers of other days, and which is to be deemed worthy of a great church and people, who claim to continue the work and honor the memory of Luther, Calvin, and Knox. "First pure and then peaceable" is the old rule, which is still in force.

As to leaving Romanism alone in the hope that a great spiritual movement will thus come from within the church, we know of nothing in scripture or history to warrant such a belief. Error does not cure itself by being allowed to enjoy unbroken repose. It is rather like sin and sinners, when not acted upon in way of restraint from without and above, it waxes worse and worse. Spain, Mexico, and other Romish countries have as matter of fact been left for centuries very much in the condition pleaded for, but where is the record of the spontaneous reformations for which some are willing to wait? That which is dreamed of as the right thing and certain to happen in future has not occurred in the past. Heformation has hitherto been the fruit of the gospel clearly and lovingly presented to the human heart and sent home with saving power by the Spirit of God; and the men of Luta is day were successful as reformers only in the measure in which they held forth and held list the word of life. But is this attitude of waiting and doing nothing compatible with a. lightened appreciation of the truth, and of the dangers to which men are exposed where destitute of it? Is it thus that we manifest our sense of the value of their souls and our own ourselves to be heralds and witnesses for Jesus Christ? Besides, those who ask us to rear Romanism alone overlook the glaring fact that it will not leave us alone. It has not a ne so in the past, and is not doing so to-day throughout the length and breadth of our terminion. To say nothing of political intrigue, of which no one will venture to exoners. So Jesuits, it is notorious that priests and prelates habitually thunder against our faith and our Bibles as utterly false, and, therefore, on the ground of self defence and self preservation, we are bound to act as we do, unless, indeed, we are ready to confess before God and man that the faith which we hold is to us a matter of such little moment that we care not whether it is maintained or destroyed. Finally, as to the work of our Colporteurs and Missionaries being an importinence. The unsupported assumption here is that they are sent to do what is unnecessary, and to do it in a wrong spirit and method, in an insulting manner; all of which we deny. How can it be an insult to offer our most highly prized possession, the Gospel, to any one? It is most necessary that superstition and spiritual bondage should be broken up by a full and clear presentation of God's message of love and freedom to all men. This is all that we charge our agents to do, and if the teaching of the simple Gospel to those who are ignorant of it is an impertinence which should be resented, then we must plead guilty; but if, on the contrary, it is a work stamped with the approval and enforced by the command of the Son of God, then instead of being blamed and censured for it, we justly expect to be heartily supported by all who love and serve Him

COLPORTAGE.

While all the missionaries and teachers are expected to do what they can to place copies of the Scriptures in the houses of their respective districts, the Board employs a class of men whose time and services are given exclusively to this work. Specific fields are assigned to these men, generally one or more counties, and those they are expected thoroughly to can-vass, with a view of supplying the French families, willing to receive it, with a copy of the Word of God, and to converse with them on religious subjects. This work has been carried on to a greater or less extent for the past forty years, so that there is not now a single county in the Province of Quebec that has not been visited by Colporteurs of our own or similar societies. In not a few of the homes in dense Roman Catholic settlements the Bible is known and read, and a visit from a Colporteur is eagerly longed for and highly prized. It is not an unusual thing for several of the neighbours to meet together on the Colporteur's visit, and to spend hours in plying him with questions and in listening to his exposition of God's truth. While fear of persecution and other motives prevent many French Canadians from severing their connection with the Church of Rome, there are not a few, scattered

throughout nearly every county, who read and love the Gospel, and to whom the visits of the faithful Colporteur are of inestimable value. Realizing the importance of this self-denying work, the Beard is most auxious to increase the staff of Colporteurs. Formerly, the great difficulty was to obtain suitable men for the work; now, however, there are at the disposal of the Board the services of more men than they have the means to employ. During the past year eighteen Colporteurs were employed, either in whole or in part. These distributed 1,715 copies of Scripture, 17,160 French tracts and pamphlets, and visited 38,167 houses. Adding to this the number distributed by the other Missionaries of the Board, the total distribution for the year was 3,355 copies of Scriptures, and upwards of 26,400 pamphlets and tracts, being largely in excess of the distribution of any preceding year. A gratifying feature of the circulation is the large number of copies sold, the receipts from sales by the Colporteurs amounting to nearly threefold that of any former year. Besides the Province of Quebec, four of the Colporteurs spent the whole of last summer in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and two laboured for the greater portion of the year in Eastern Ontario. MISSION SCHOOLS.

French Protestants in the Province of Quebec are placed at a great disadvantage in the matter of education. Comparatively few in number, and often separated from each other by a considerable distance, they are unable to comply with the conditions necessary for organizing a dissentient school, and are compelled to send their children to the public school of the district, for the support of which they are taxed. The public schools are entirely under the control of the Romish hierarchy, and are little better than nurseries for the training of children for their first communion. Under these circumstances, the Board is exceedingly anxious to establish Mission Schools for the education of the children of our converts, and such of the Roman Catholics as choose to attend. Even in districts where the Protestants are sufficiently numerous to comply with the law for the establishment of dissentient schools, they are often unable to raise the amount necessary for the erection of a school building and the maintenance of a teacher. In such cases, the Board sends teachers and makes small grants towards their support.

This important department of our work shows a gratifying improvement from year to rms important experiment of our work shows a gratifying improvement from year to year. Four years ago there were reported thirteen schools, with five hundred and thirty-three pupils. The number has since doubled, there being now twenty-nine schools with thirty-four teachers and nine hundred and five pupils. There has been an increase in the past year of four schools and one hundred and one pupils. Two hundred and ninety of the pupils are the children of Roman Catholic parents, the great majority of the others being from the homes of recent converts. Four of the schools are wholly supported by the people of the district. The Board has recently been compelled for the present to decline applications from four other districts desiring teachers, because of its inability to meet the necessary expenditure connected therewith. Last year the sum of \$3,262 was expended in the maintenance of the Mission Schools, exclusive of those at Pointe aux Trembles.

POINTE AUX TREMBLES SCHOOLS.

Owing to impaired health, it was feared that Miss Cairns, the directress of the Girl's School, would be unable to take her place last session. In the good providence of God, however, those fears were disappointed. Arrangements were made to relieve her of part of her work, and her services were thus secured for the session. The Board and the Church are most fortunate in having such a staff of earnest, faithful teachers at Pointe aux Trembles. Messrs, Bourgoin and Wotier, Miss Cairns and Miss Bouchard are an inseparable part of the Institution. Their zeal and fidelity in the discharge of their duties, their love for the work and their self-sacrifice in seeking to promote it, are most worthy of commendation. Of the other teachers—Miss and Miss Lillie Lamb—who have more recently been connected with the schools, the Board can also speak in terms of high proise. All have worked together in the utmost harmony, and with a single eye to the furtherance of the interests of the schools. The session has been one of more than ordinary interest. The buildings have been filled to their utmost capacity, the pupils numbering 120, as compared with 94 the preceding session. The policy of the Board has been to induce the most promising of the pupils to continue their attendance for a number of sessions in succession, with a view to their being qualified to fill higher positions, and thus to further the work of French Evangelization. This policy is now bearing fruit. In no previous year were so many former pupils in attendance, and the schools were never, perhaps, in a more efficient and satisfactory condition than they are now. Fifty-five of last session's pupils are members of the Church, twenty-eight of these having this year professed their faith in Christ for the first time. Of these twenty-eight, twelve were Roman Catholics when they entered the schools. Fourteen of the senior pupils are this summer employed as colporteurs or Mission teachers, and four, if not five, of them purpose entering the Presbyterian College, Montreal, next Fall, with a view to study for the ministry. Four of the students (one of whom took the gold medal) who graduated at the college this spring, and were licensed to preach the Gospel last month, were French Canadians, who received their preparatory training at Pointe aux Trembles. A former pupil, now a missionary in Africa, recently wrote, asking admission to the schools for two of his converts, who desired to prepare themselves for Christian work.

The Church has good reason to thank God for the Pointe aux Trembles schools. the work done is being appreciated by our people is manifest by the large and yearly increasing number of scholarships given by congregations and Sabbath schools, as also by private individuals. As has been stated from year to year in the reports of the Board, the average cost of each pupil is about \$50 per session. To the congregations, or schools, or individuals contributing this amount a pupil is assigned, concerning whose progress reports are sent from time to time. In this way, a Sabbath school contributing a scholarship is put directly in communication with the mission school, and the letters, if read publicly to the Sabbath school children, tend to keep alive their interest in the work. Moreover, the Sabbuth school can, every Lord's day, remember in its prayers the pupil it supports, and can scarcely fail to receive benefit by being thus directly brought into contact with the pupil educated by means

of its missionary contributions.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL.

In presenting the friends and supporters of the Pointe-aux-Trembles Mission Schools with this brief report of our labours during the past session, we desire to draw their attention to our wants and our progress, and to the importance of our mission.

Our object is to spread education among the families who, through the efforts of the Missionaries, have been detached from the Church of Rome, and also among the children of Roman Catholic parents who, on account of poverty or for lack of confidence in the education given by the nuns or by the friars, are willing to send their young people to our Schools.

The French Protestants of this Province are so scattered all over the country that it is only in a few localities that they can gather their children together in a good school taught by a Protestant teacher; many of them are obliged to pay taxes towards Roman Catholic schools where they cannot send their children, because they meet with bad treatment or have to listen to teachings entirely opposed to what they have heard at home. It is therefore of the utmost importance that the families of our converts be provided with central schools, where their children can obtain an education in harmony with the principles they

Though our mission schools have been denounced everywhere by the priests as most dangerous places for the young people of their parishes, the number of applications for admission is increasing every year, and a large proportion of them are from young Roman Catholics who have sought in vain an education in their parish schools, where most of the

time is devoted to praying to the saints and reciting their catechism.

We have thus always two classes of scholars, the first comprising those who come from homes where the light of the Gospel has already penetrated and has done its blessed work; the second composed of young people who are thirsting for education but whose minds are already full of superstitions and prejudices.

We seek to impart to those young people, by our example, our influence and our teachings, a christian education which shall place in their souls the germs of faith, of piety and of

Our great desire is to give them an education which shall shield them against any dangerous literature or against any of those systems which strike at the foundations of morals and of religion.

Our grand object is to form intelligent pupils, pious, faithful to God and to their country, and ready at all times to defend the truth of the Gospel against error and infidelity.

The experience of every year strengthens our conviction that there is no better way to work for the prosperity of our country and the snecess of the cause of Christ than by spreading a christian education among our young people who, in a few years, shall be the men and women of this Province.

The work we are pursuing is a very humble one, one perhaps which does not attract much attention, but who can tell the influence of those three thousand pupils who have left our schools with the Bible in their hands and in their hearts, and who are scattering everywhere the good tidings of the Gospel among our countrymen?

Last Fall we received over three hundred applications for admission, about twice as

many as we used to receive five years ago.

We can but bless the Lord for this large increase in the number of those who desire to be admitted into our schools, but at the same time, when we are obliged to refuse more than we can admit for lack of accommodation, we feel sad to see that the liberality of our christian friends is not equal to the progress of the work.

One hundred and twenty pupils have been admitted into our schools during the last

session, that is as many as we can properly accommodate. Forty-nine of them were children of Roman Catholic parents, and the others belonged to families of converts.

We are happy to state that peace, harmony and friendship have existed among our young people throughout the whole session, and that not a single case of dangerous sickness has appeared within our crowded houses.

Our scholars have manifested an unabated diligence and earnestness in their studies, and their progress, in every respect, has been most satisfactory, as was elicited by our final

examination.

In all our religious exercises we have endeavoured to show them the necessity of accepting Jesus as their Saviour, and we are glad to say that twenty-eight of them have, during the session, given their heart to Jesus and have become members of His Church. Fourteen of those who have about completed their studies at Pointe-aux-Trembles, have been engaged to work during summer as teachers and colporteurs in our mission field. We hope the Holy Spirit will accompany and sustain our young pioneers in their hard work, and that they will be enabled to cheer many homes with some rays of the light of the Gospel.

Feeling that enough interest has not been shown by our former pupils in French Evangelization, we have started a Missionary Society, which all former pupils are invited to join, and we hope that this may be a rallying point, a bond of union among us, and that by our united efforts we may be able to help our Board to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the French Canadians who are still without the true light. The pupils of this year have already subscribed one hundred and thirty dollars to be employed in some branch of French Evangelization. Every year the pupils manifest a greater desire to pay their own way. Now we receive about ten times the amount of school fees that we used to receive some years ago; and, considering that thirty-five of our pupils are entirely dependent on themselves, we think it speaks well for their perseverance and their good will.

In closing this report, we bless our Heavenly Father for His protection over us, and for the success with which He has been pleased to crown the efforts of His servants during the past session. May all the friends of this Institution, encouraged by the success of this year, realize the necessity of enlarging the buildings in order to receive within their walls all the young people who are ready to come under the precious influence of the Gospel.

The description of several properties now for sale in or near Quebec city, and the cost of the same, were laid before the meeting, and, after lengthened consideration, the following resolution was adopted by the Board:—

"That an appeal be made for funds to enlarge the Pointe aux Trembles schools by adding a mansard roof and a wing to the boys' building, and to effect the necessary repairs thereon, with the understanding that the expense does not exceed ten thousand dollars; that the Board approves of the establishment of a Mission boarding school in Quebec, and that in the appeal for the money necessary to enlarge the Pointe aux Trembles schools, the urgent need of the establishment of a similar institution in the vicinity of Quebec be laid before the Church, and an appeal made to secure the necessary funds; it being understood that contributors shall be free to designate their contributions to either object."

It is earnestly hoped that the friends of the work will furnish the means necessary for the accomplishment of both objects, viz., the enlargement of the schools at Pointe aux Trembles, and the establishment of a similar school at Quebec. Of all the means employed in the past none have proved more efficacious and none have more manifestly had the Divine approval. Ten or fifteen years ago it was difficult to secure pupils; now that they are knocking for admission in such large numbers it is greatly to be desired that additional accommodation will be speedily provided so that none will hereafter be turned away.

PREACHING STATIONS.

The accompanying statistical schedule shows that two hundred and thirty-eight members were received during the year. With a few exceptions, these were received on profession of faith, most of them being converts from the Church of Rome:—

As reported last year, the Board appointed one of its ordained missionaries, Rev. I. Matthieu, to visit the several mission fields with a view to encourage the people and to dispense ordinances in those districts suppiled by students and catechists. Mr. Matthieu spent about four months in this work, and rendered good service in many of the fields, receiving forty new members on profession of their faith in Christ.

Grand Falls, N. B.—Mr. Matthieu labored here for several weeks. He found the Presbeterian cause at a low ebb, many of the families formerly identified with our church having removed to the States. He reports the field as fully occupied by other evangelical denominations, and though there are no French services, the want is not felt, as the very few French converts now in the district understand English. Two of the colporteurs of the Board spent several months in the neighborhood last Summer, and gained access to many of the homes of the people, disposing of 120 copies of the Scriptures and a large number of French pamphlets and tracts.

QUEBEC CITY.—The Rev. T. Z. Lefebvre is encouraged in his work here. He reports greater regularity in attendance on the services. Every Sabbath evening an average of twenty Roman Catholics are present, some of whom make it a point to attend the Thursday evening prayer meeting. In January last, a Mission Day School was opened, which is attended by eighteen pupils. The friends in Quebec furnished the room occupied as a school, and meet the rent of the same. One of the colporteurs of the Board has been laboring in the city for the past few months, and Mr. Lefebvre reports very favorably of his work, and of its influence on the Sabbath attendance.

ITALIAN MISSION, MONTREAL.—During the year Mr. Internoscia was gladdened by the reception of eight Italians into the fellowship of the church on profession of faith. Owing to difficulties in the way of securing a suitable teacher, a mission school for the Italians has not yet been opened. During the winter, however, an evening school was conducted without expense to the Board, which was attended by twenty-six of the Italians.

EAST END, MONTREAL.—The Sabbath service is still conducted by Rev. R. P. Duclos, in the American Presbyterian Mission Chapel, at Hochelaga. Last summer a mission day school was opened on Dufresne street, under the care of Mr. Bonnenfant, and was well attended. He also conducted an evening school for adults, and was much encouraged by the interest manifested. More commodious premises have recently been secured on St. Catherine street, and the school is now taught there by Madame Wotier, Mr. Bonnenfant giving his whole time to colportage work. An attractive mission building is much required for this district, in which not only the day and evening schools would be held, but also the Sabbath services. The field is in many respects an inviting one, and with a suitable building the cause would doubtless greatly improve.

NEW GLASGOW, QUE,—The unusual severity of the winter interfered considerably with the attendance at the Rev. Mr. Boudreau's services. He reports an increasing demand for the word of God, and a more free access to the homes of many Roman Catholic families. A young French Canadian in his congregation purposes to study for the ministry.

GRENVILLE, QUE.—Our people here erected a comfortable mission school building during the year. It is only some four years since the congregation built a neat, substantial church, and though many of the young people re leaving the district, the attendance at both school and Sabbath services keeps up well.

ST. MARTIN, QUE.—The missionary in this field last year met with much opposition, and suffered not a little at the hands of some of the Roman Catholics. One of the families connected with the mission had their barn burned down, it is supposed by incendiaries, because of their harbouring the missionary.

Grand Bend, Ont.—The missionary reports that there are thirty-five French families attending his services, and that although most of them were formerly connected with another church, yet he is now the only French missionary in the field, and they are all expected to fall in with his congregation. As a proof of their interest they, though poor, contributed \$70.25 towards his salary last year.

St. Anne, Illinois.—The Rev. C. Chiniquy reports that upwards of three hundred Roman Catholics last year gave up the errors of Popery through his instrumentality. He spent several weeks in Massachusetts in the latter end of the winter visiting the French churches there, and addressing large meetings in the various towns where congregations have of late years been established.

NAMUR AND HARTWELL, QUE.—Mr. Matthieu reports twenty-five converts from Romanism in this field during the year, and seventeen new communicants received into the church on profession of faith.

West Farnham, Que.—Some six or seven years ago the Board sent a French missionary to this field. Finding a number of English speaking Presbyterians in the town, he opened an English service for them in a small school building. Soon afterwards, through his instrumentality, an eligible lot was secured, and a handsome brick church erected at a cost in all of about \$5,000. The congregation recently called an English speaking minister, who was settled over them in January last, and towards whose salary they contribute \$600 per annum.

The Board employs a French colporteur in the neighboring district of St. Brigide, where the

population is almost wholly French.

St. Joun's Church, Montreal.—The following is the report in full, as submitted by Rev. C. A. Doudiet:—

A few years ago Dr. R. S. MacArthur, of New York, wrote of that great city, "Romanism is almost master here in politics, in literature and religion." Here, in the Province of Quebec, we do not need the word "almost." Romanism is master here. It has all the elements that constitute power, wealth, authority and numbers. Politicians of every shade, with rare exceptions, truckle to it, merchants court its patronage, and even some Protestant ministers avoid open condemnation of its errors. Churches will give large sums for the conversion of heathen in India or China, or even for the evangelization of Romanists in Italy and France, but will suffer this French mission of ours to languish for want of means.

Let us not deceive ourselves by vainly waiting for what might be thought more favorable times or circumstances to push the work. "Silence gives consent to error, and permits it to live. Preaching the truth makes truth omnipotent, and in its province error hides, and its power to do mischief dies. Error lives because we let it." (MacArthur.) We have heard French Protestant ministers saying that if a change of government came, and the Liberals had power here, Romanism would be crippled. Alas! for their hopes, a Liberal Premier has presented the "Jesuits' Bill," and a Liberal House has passed it! reminding one of the prophetic words: "Cursed be the man who trusteth in man, and makes flesh his arm." There is but one power that can and will eventually overthrow Romanism here and everywhere. It is that of the word of God, the spirit of His mouth; and the more we preach the word, the more quickly will the great work of regeneration be accomplished. The preaching of the word wrought the overthrow of Paganism, at a time when there were but few written books, and no printing press; why should it not, with all modern facilities of communication to help it, overthrow Romanism in our times?

But some now say, "the cases are not parallel." The Church of Rome is a branch of the Christian Church; its votaries serve the same God that we worship, according to their light. They are as moral as the Protestants, and much more united. Therefore, to preach the Gospel to their is to usurp unwarrantably the functions of their priesthood, and is a waste of energy, of time and of money. To this many add that, with all our expenditure, there have been no appreciable results, that our converts are neither influential nor rich, and that they show no interest in the Gospel, giving nothing for its support, and expecting everything to be done for them. We, who labor among them, if not considered as mere mercenaries, are deemed mistaken enthusiasts and when, after many years' faithful work, we are overtaken by the infirmities of age, and have to leave the work to others, we have no expectation of a jubilec fund being raised for us as an acknowledgment of long, faithful service:

But we do not complain of this, "Our judgment is with the Lord, and our work with our God." We cannot, however, rest quietly without contradicting the fallacies current about this work. The Church of Rome, we claim, is not now a Church of Christ. By its worship of creatures, it has been vainly puffed up by its fleshly mind, and given up its hold of "The Head." The Church that does this is no longer a living body,

but a corpse. The Church of Rome makes a traffic of the gifts of God. If, as Peter said to Simon the magician, "he had neither part nor lot in this matter," viz.: the power to give the Holy Ghost, because he thought that the gift of Goa might be purchased by money, the Church that sells spiritual benefits for money has no share of the power of the Spirit of Christ. And in case any one should disbelieve the statement that spiritual benefits are bought and sold in the Church of Rome, we submit the following translation of a card 4 x 3, bought for 25 cents at the Bazaar of St. Peter's Cathedral, last Summer, in Montreal:—

' TRITUAL TREASURE.

For the low sum of One Dollar in favor of the Cathedral of Montreal, the purchaser will have the benefit of the following advantages: 1,048 Masses a year for four years; 145,133 Communions; 323,808 Ways of the Cross; 515,464 Rosaries; 16,372 Masses heard; 4,300 Strings of Beads of the Sacred Heart; 4,600 Offices of the Holy Virgin; 720 Breviaries of the Precious Blood; 100 Salve Regina, chanted by the Trappists, and several thousands of other prayers, such as "Remember," "Pater," Ave, &c., and once a week the spiritual profits of seven millions of Ave Marias by the confraternity of that name. If space allowed us, it would be easy to show further that the claims of Romanism to practice intolerance and persecution wherever and whenever it can, proves that it is not animated by the Spirit of Christ; and above all, the undeniable fact that Romanism makes light of sin, stamps it as anti-christian, for the Gospel of Christ was written "that we sin not." When the Ministerial Association here, in Montreal, urged the City Council to prevent Sabbath desceration by closing tobacco and candy shops, and stopping Sunday excursions, the Roman Catholic members of the Police Committee voted as a unit against the proposal; and one of them stated that the ministers of his faith were not opposed to sweets and other little refreshments being sold on Sundays, and that, therefore, it would be time lost to hear the deputation, &c. If this is the result of the teaching of Romanism, tell us not that it is a Church of Christ!

It is, therefore, imperative upon believers of the Gospel to preach that Gospel to Romanists, their priests not doing it, and teaching a morality in many points opposed to that of the Gospel of Christ. If this is granted, and it now be asked, "What good has your preaching done?" we can show, in Montreal alone, six congregations of French Protestants, of which St. John's is one. I have been an elder in St. John's when it had a roll of ten members and a revenue of about \$25 per year. The Church has now 111 communicants, 28 of which were admitted during the year, 18 by profession of faith and 10 by certificate. This last item deserves notice, showing that not in Montreal alone, but in other places our Mission work is making itself felt. Whereas, as late as twelve years ago, six or seven baptisms a year was the rule, I baptized twenty-five children this year, and officiated at fourteen marriages and seventeen funerals. The Sabbath attendance on ordinances has varied from 65 to 150, by actual count; that of the prayer meeting has seldom been less than 24, and often much more, and the Sabbath School has averaged 40 scholars, including the Pastor's Bible Class.

Our converts and members are not in general wealthy or influential, although we have a few such, but neither are they paupers. The contributions of the people have averaged \$4.85 per communicant during the year,—no small average in a congregation where only three families have an income of over \$1,000, and where nine-tenths of the people are mechanics, earning from five to eight dollars per week. The total sum collected during the year has been \$525.18, a higher figure than any reached in previous years, and due a good deal to the introduction of the envelope system. I have no doubt that if instead of the building (Russell Hall) now used as a Church, we had more suitable and commodious premises, both for the meetings of the congregation and for the school, the roll of both would be largely increased. Would that some large hearted member of the Presbyterian church imitated on a small scale for us the munificence of the founders of the Victoria Hospital, and sent your Board a sufficient sum to crect a Jubilee French Presbyterian Church, in room of our present building. Dare we hope that this wish will be fulfilled?

If our Province of Quebec is ever to rival Protestant countries in enterprise, wealth and education, the grip of Romanism on the masses must be destroyed. Wherever the Church of Rome has had supreme authority, it has enriched itself at the expense of the toiling masses. It is not the people who own these splendid cathedrals, immense convents and other religious structures. It is the "church," and it can dispose of them at will. Twenty million dollars' worth of such property is held in Montreal alone; this is the published statement of a leading Montreal priest, who certainly did not exaggerate the figures. The city draws no revenue from all this real estate, and yet the City Council lacks money to keep the streets clean. Whenever we see the immense piles rearing their proud cupolas high above the humble dwellings of the people, we feel that we are looking at the gravestones of a nation. As Paul Bert truly said: "Quant un pays se néglige, les maines s'y mettent." "When a country neglects itself, Monks get into it."

What are we, a poor band of Gospel preachers to attack such a mighty power as that of Rome? Nothing!—but we believe still that the Gospel will overcome. "Not by might, nor by power, but my spirit, saith the Lord of hosts."

MISCELLANEOUS.

FINANCES.

As will be seen from the accompanying financial statement, the receipts for the year amounted to \$25,668.81 for the ordinary fund, \$7,512.50 for the Pointe aux Trembles schools, and \$75 for the extension of these schools, making a total of \$33,256—fully \$1,000 in excess of the preceding year's receipts. Among the receipts are included an unusually large number of legacies amounting in all to \$2,216. To the Presbyterian Church of Ireland for a grant of £150 sterling, the thanks of the Board are due; as also to Mr. G. D. Fergusson, of Fergus, who generously contributes \$200 quarterly on behalf of the work, and whose contribution has enabled the Board to continue a larger number of Colporteurs in the field than in any former year. The Board also desires to make grateful acknowledgment of the continued practical interest manifested by Mr. Ignatius Cockshutt, of Brantford, in his annual gift of \$400 on behalf of the Pointe aux Trembles Schools, and of a generous and unsolicited gift of a large box of stationery, etc., for the schools from a friend in Montreal, While the receipts have been considerably in excess of the preceding year, so also has the expenditure—the balance on hand in May, 1886, for the ordinary fund, having been reduced from \$848.59 to the small sum of \$29.49. Owing to the continued business depression in Great Britain, the amount received by Rev. James McCaul is much smaller than under other circumstances it would have been. Mr. McCaul's engagement terminated in April, and he contemplates settling in Scotland. In his receipts is included the sum of £43, collected through the instrumentality of Mrs. Macnider, of Edinburgh, who continues from year to show her heartfelt interest in our work.

STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Students' Missionary Society of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, has resolved to prosecute French evangelization work. At a meeting held in March last the Society decided to establish and maintain a French mission in St. Jean Baptiste, and a committee was appointed to secure a suitable site and to proceed with the erection of mission premises so soon as a sufficient sum of money had been received to warrant this being done. The members of the Society agreed to collect funds in their several districts this summer, and it is anticipated that a building will be erected and ready for use next winter. It is contemplated to open a Mission Day School, and to have Sabbath and occasional week evening services in the building, which, it is hoped, will prove a great blessing to the neighborhood.

CLOSE.

Viewing the work of the past year, as a whole, there are not a few encouraging features "hich call for devout gratitude to the great Head of the Church. A larger number of Colporturs have been employed, and a greater number of copies of French Scriptures distributed than in any forner year of the Board's operations; the number of Mission schools has increased from twenty-five, with twenty-nine teachers and eight hundred and four pupils, to twenty-nine, h thirty-four teachers and nine hundred and five scholars; the number in attendance at the Poin ux Trembles Central Schools was as large as the buildings could accommodate, and the session as one of the most successful ever held, fifty-five of the pupils being members of the Church are welve or thirteen of them having the ministry in view; two hundred and thirty-eight communicants have been added to the membership of the congregations and missions under the care of the Board, and four French students finished their theological course at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and were licensed last month to preach the Gospel of Christ. "What has God wrought?" "This is the Lord's doings, and it is wonderful in our eyes."

To maintain in efficiency this most important department of the Churca's work, the Board earnestly solicits the prayers, the sympathy, and increased liberality of all the friends of the mission, and, above all, the continuance of the Divine favor and blessing, without which all else is vain.







REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNOX COLLEGE.

In submitting their Report for the year 1886-7, 'the', Board have pleasure in stating that the affairs of the College continue in a satisfactory condition, and encourage them to hope that the year on which the College now enters will see still greater progress than in the past.

From the Report of the Senate, transmitted herewith, it will be seen that the number of students in attendance in the Theological Class has been fifty-two, in addition to which, there are fifteen in the Preparatory Department, and a larger number in the University. The total number of students realding in the College was seventy-six.

The Graduating Class numbered eighteen, which the Board are pleased to observe is a larger number than ever left the College in any one year since the establishment of the Montreal College.

The Board regret that they have not yet been placed in a position to secure the appointment of

The Board regret that they have not yet been placed in a position to secure the appointment of a fourth Professor, so much needed, and so long and urgently sought for by the friends of the College. They have, however, during the past year, as authorized by last Assembly, appointed a second Lecturer, and have the gratification of knowing that their selection of Mr. R. Y. Thompson, for that position has given much satisfaction, and proved a source of strength to the staff.

The Board regret that, on this occasion, they must report a balance of \$194 as being due the Treasurer. This may be accounted for by the payment of the salary of the additional lecturer which was not included in the estimated expenditure for the year on the appropriation of the Common Fund.

the time of the century. The Rehoboam ti The total income from all sources, exclusive of last year's balance, has been \$16,508.86, an amount exceeding the receipts of the former year by \$33.83. The item of \$1,002.34 of extra expenditure for much-needed work in connection with the sanitary arrangement of the College buildings, which appears in the Treasurer's Statement, has more than absorbed this surplus. The item of repairs to the control of the College buildings and the control of the contr appears in the Treasurer's Statement, has more than accorded this surplus. The item of repairs to the huilding will necessarily form an increasing charge on the income of the College. Indeed, considerable expense must at once be incurred for painting part of the premises.

The subscriptions paid during the past year to the Endowment Fund amount to \$26,907.15. The total amount subscribed for this fund is \$199,347.67, and the amount paid is \$153,020.55. In

estimating the results of this fund as a source of income, the fact must not be overlooked that there exists a mortgage on the College premises of \$26,500, the interest on which forms a large charge on the revenue. As a decline in the rate of interest on investments must be anticipated, the Board would earnestly press on the Church the necessity of continued effort towards increasing this fund.

The Board has, in view of the decline in the current rate of interest, resolved, that in future only the true amount of interest received from the capital representing each scholarship be paid to the respective recipients of the scholarships.

The Board heg to report that the Examiners and Senate have expressed their desire that the Board of Examiners be discontinued and that their functions be assigned to the Senate. They recommend that the change requested be authorized

The Board believe that it would be more convenient for the examiners, and would tend to facilitate the arrangements for the final exercises of the College, were the day of closing changed from the first Wednesday to the first Thursday in April. They, therefore, request liberty, if they deem it

advisable to do so, to make the proposed change.

The domestic arrangements of the College continue under the careful and satisfactory management of Mr. and Mrs. Fullerton.

The following in an abstract of the Class Reports:

Dr. Caven conducted the classes in Senior Exegetics, Junior Exegetics and Biblical Criticism.

The Senior Exegetical class in the first term heard lectures on the Pastoral Epistles, and on New
Testament Introduction, and in the second term read critically certain Messianic Paslms. The

Junior Exegetical class read in the Acts of the Apostles, in first term, and in Genesis in the second: A series of lectures on the Principles and History of Interpretation was also delivered in this class. Biblical Criticism was taught to the first year, partly by lecture, and partly in the use of text-book. The Greek and Hebrew critical exercises prescribed to the students of the second and third

years were carefully examined.

Dr. Gregg conducted the classes in Apologetics and Church History. In Apologetics, lectures were delivered to the students of the first year on Natural Theology, the Evidences of Revealed Religion, and on several ant sponistic systems. Homilies were prepared on prescribed subjects, which were examined and oriticised.

The students of the second year were examined on a portion of Farrar's Critical History of Free Thought, and on Hodge's Chapter on Antitheistic Theories; they also prepared essays which were

In Church History, lectures were delivered to the first year, on the History of the Church, from the time of the Apostles till the year 787, and to the second year, from this date till the seventeenth century. The students of the third year were examined on Bible History, from the reign of Rehoboam till the return from Babylon.

The senior class (second and third years) heard lectures on Justification, Adoption, Sanctification, Good Works, The Decalogue, State of the Soul after Death, the Resurrection, The Second Advent and the General Judgment. Oral examinations were held on the subjects discussed in the class, and the difficulties of students

The second year underwent a written examination upon "Fairbairn on the Revelation of Law in Scripture.

The junior class (first year) heard lectures on Inspiration, the Rule of Faith, the Attributes of God, the Trinity, and the Decrees of God. They were also carefully questioned on the topics of the lectures, and allowed to put relevant inquiries in reference to the subjects under review.

Dr. Maclaren met with the senior class five hours per week, and with the junior class four hours. Dr. Proudfoot during the first term delivered four lectures weekly on Systematic Homiletics. Dr. Froudfoot during the first term delivered four lectures weekly on Systematic mominetics. Three days per week he heard and criticised discourses. Students were encouraged to put questions and make suggestions in reference to the discourses and to the remarks from the chair upon them. An earnest effort was thus made to enable students to become skilful in the application of rhetorical principles in the construction of discourses. This second part of Homiletical training is carried on every year: thus, in the course of two years, a third more time is given to practical than to systematic Homileties.

The Part D V Thomson M A BD reports that in the department of Old Testament.

The Rev. R. Y. Thomson, M.A., B.D., reports that in the department of Old Testament Analysis and Introduction, forty-nine lectures were delivered during the second term of the college year. The leading points taken up in the class were—the nature and scope of the science of Biblical Introduction, the relation between the Old Testament and the New, the structure of the Old Testament, the Canon, and the special introduction to the Pentateuch, together with an extended analysis of its contents.

The Professors all express satisfaction with the attendance and the deportment of the students.

Both tutors speak with satisfaction of the attendance and diligence of their students, but insist upon the necessity of keeping up the standard of entrance upon the preparatory course. The great inequality of attainment on the part of students of the same year has seriously hindered the work of the classes. Mr. McGillivray further states that the time given for these classes is insufficient.

As in former years, Dr. Gregg kindly conducted a class in Mathematics for students of the first

The Librarian, Mr. J. McD. Duncan, B.A., reports that the Ordinary Department of the Library was open for the giving out of books at regular hours throughout the session. From this department 313 books were taken out. The Consulting Library was much used. Works on philosophy were extensively read, and the additions to that class of books have proved helpful to students, both in Arts and Divinity. Much interest has been taken in works on Missions, of which a large number has been added during the session—some being purchased by the College, and others presented by friends. Besides Parliamentary Reports, etc., the librarian gives a list of 120 volumes which have been received. which have been received.

The College Societies all continue in healthful and useful operation. Mr. C. W. Gordon, B.A., is succeeded in the presidency of the Metaphysical and Literary Society, by Mr. James C. Tolmie, B.A., and Mr. A. J. McLeod, B.A., becomes president of the Students' Missionary Society in succession to Mr. John McGillivray, B.A.

The Missionary Society sends out to the home field for the summer eighteen men. The growing interest of the state of the st

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE.

(FORTY-SIXTH SESSION.)

In submitting this annual report to the General Assembly the Trustees would, first of all, express their gratitude to God for the continued and increasing prosperity of the University. The steady increase in the number of students, that has marked so many years, goes on. Through special gifts and donations the revenue keeps equal to the expenditure, in spite of the decline in the rate of interest. The available capital is larger in amount than it ever was, while the value of the property is increasing annually. The staff has been strengthened by several tutors, who are paid almost entirely from special fees. The laboratories and library are maintained in efficiency from the same source. Best of all, a devout, earnest and lofty spirit animates the great body of the students.

ATTENDANCE.

The total number of students enrolled last session was 372. Of these 191 are in the Arts Faculty, and the rest in the Professional Faculties; 70 are studying for the ministry of our Church; others intend to enter the ministry in connection with sister bodies, and the rest have the legal,

medical, teaching or engineering professions in view, or are seeking a liberal education for its own aske, or for the better equipment of themselves for whatever work in life they may be called unto. We do not include in this enumeration students attending only evening lectures or the summer sessions, because attendance at those courses does not lessen the number of terms required for obtaining a degree. A slight estimate of the magnitude of the work the University is doing may be gained from these figures. While our students come from all parts of the Dominion, the majority are from Eastern Ontario. The special value of the University to the whole higher life of that important section of the country cannot be overestimated, and the importance of n sintaining it in a condition of thorough efficiency will be appreciated by the Assembly. of thorough efficiency will be appreciated by the Assembly.

It was mentioned in our Report for 1885 that the graduates, alumni and benefactors of Queen's, on being consulted, were found to be practically a unit in favour of declining to enter the proposed confederation of colleges in Toronto, and of resolving that Queen's remain permanently in Kingston, and continue to do full university work there. The action taken in accordance with this resolution makes it imperative that no important side of a regular university curriculum should be neglected, and that the endowment should be adequate to ordinary needs. At the instance of the Chancellor the Endowment Association was instituted with this end in view, and branches have already been formed in various localities. A glance at the revenue and expenditure for this year will show that had it not been for this Association we would have reported a considerable deficit; but the ordinary annual fee of the Association is only a dollar, and it is evident that adequate and permanent addition to revenue cannot be expected from this source. Something more must be done. The necessity is apparent. The five years' list, from which we receive \$7.500 of our revenue, ends with this year; the amount to be expected from the Assembly's College Fund is uncertain; the rate of interest is steadily declining; and in order to complete the equipment of the University several additions must be made to the teaching staff. It has therefore been decided to raise an additional endowment of \$50,000, to be called the Jubilee Fund, in commemoration of the Queen's jubilee and the jubilee of the University several staff. made to the teaching stain. It has therefore been decining to be called the Jubilee Fund, in commemoration of the Queen's jubilee and the jubilee of the University; for, while we have just completed our firsty-sixth session, it was in 1837 that the Church first resulved to institute a college in Canada, and two years afterwards Kingston was selected as the site. As part of the Jubilee Fund will be specially for the endowment of the Faculty of Divinity a smaller amount will thereafter be asked from the collection enjoined by the Assembly. It is evident that the sooner our colleges are properly endowed the better, so that the liberality of the Church may flow out with the least possible diversion to the great missionary causes that appeal directly and powerfully to every Christian heart. This policy has been accepted by the Assembly, and the succepted by the Assembly, and the succepted by the Assembly a sess that has already attended it in our own case, and still more in the cases of sister institutions, makes us sanguine that we shall not appeal in vain for sympathy and support in the effort to complete the endowment that is indispensable to the successful carrying on of the great work of the University.

APPENDIX NO. 9.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE PRESBY-TERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE YEAR 1886-7.

The Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, beg leave to present their report for the year, together with that of the Senate, and the Calendar for next session.

The past session has been, altogether, a most successful one. The number of students has been large, the number in the theological classes being the largest in its history. The health of both professors and students has been excellent. Six students completed the ordinary course, and one student the post graduate course. Of the six students graduating, five speak both French and English, making a most important addition to the number of workers available for the special mission work which is every year becoming more needed in the Province of Quebec, and in Eastern Ontario

From the accompanying Treasurer's statement it will be observed that the financial position of the College has somewhat improved since lest year. This is owing mainly to two causes, viz., economy in expenditure to a much greater extent than will hereafter be consistent with efficiency, and to the receipt from friends in Montreal of special contributions amounting to, with two legscies, the sum of nearly \$1,600.

The debt on the ordinary fund has been removed, and every fund, except the Building Fund, shows a balance on the right side. The Building Fund indebtedness has been reduced by about \$1,200.

REPORT OF THE GOVERNORS OF MORRIN COLLEGE, 1887.

The Governors of Morrin College, in submitting their Annual Report to the General Assembly, desire to renew their expression of gratitude to God for the prosperity which has attended the Institution during the past year. The number of students enrolled during the Session was twenty five, of whom no fewer than fourteen profess to be students enrolled during the Session was twenty five, of whom no fewer than fourteen profess to be students for the ministry of our Church. The monthly examinations gave indications of careful preparation and diligent application on the part of the students, and the progress made in every class was very satisfactory to the Professors. Two students took the degree of B.A. in McGill University, one first-class with special certificate for efficiency, and the other second-class. Seven passed the University Intermediate Examination very creditably, a young lady taking the lead and ranking first-class.

Home Mission Work.

Much regret is felt on the part of the Governors that the income of the College is in every way so inadequate to meet its requirements, and they express the earnest hope that the friends of the Institution and the Church may come to its aid, and furnish means for the endowment of additional chairs as well as for scholarships and prizes.

The present officers are insufficiently remunerated for their valuable services, the revenue, as will be seen from the financial statement, being very small.

The College occupies a very important position in the midst of a large Roman Catholic popula-tion, bringing the advantages of superior Collegiate education within the reach of the Protestants in the eastern portion of Quebec, and helping to furnish the means of grace to the little knots of Protestants scattered throughout the Province. Not a few charges in the Presbytery of Quebec would have been in the past, and would be now, without the advantages of a settled ministry where if not for the supply from Morrin College.

The Governors have much pleasure in stating that a Select School, called "The Morrin College"

The Governors have much pleasure in stating that a Select School, the Line Marrin College, School, has been opened during the past year in connection with the College, and the classes are mainly conducted by the Professors; its object is to supply a felt want in the city and to furnish a training in English, Classics and Mathematics preparatory to matriculating; the number of pupils is limited to forty and already over thirty have been in attendance. Suitable buildings have been erected for this purpose, towards which Sir George Stephen, Bart., contributed the handsome sum of two thousand five hundred dollars.

WORK OF LAST SESSION.

In the Principal's department, the subject of Apologetics was divided into two sections : First, Natural Theology, which was attended on one day in each week by fifteen students; Secondly, The Evidences of the Christian Revelation. The subjects discussed were the doctrines concerning God, His nature, will and works; creation, providence and the fall of man, together with its consequences; also, the history of the revelation of human duty, from the creation of man to the institution of the ceremonial law through

The Exegetic class was attended by all the students. Three chapters were read in the Epistle to the Romans. Homilies and Polemical Theses were read and criticised in former sessions. In Hebrew three classes were conducted—a Junior, an Intermediate and a Senior. The Junior class, composed of the affiliated students, had recitations three times a week, and, commencing with the alphabet, overtook about three-fourths of Green's Elementary Grammar and Reader. The Inter-mediate class, formed of the regular students of the first year, also met three times a week, and went through the Reader. Both classes prepared a number of exercises in translating Englishinto Hebrew. The Senior class, attended by students of the second and third years, met twice a week, and read, exegetically, selections from the more difficult portions of the Hebrew Scriptures, part of the Chaldee of Daniel, and selections from two of the Targums. Occasionally, passages in the easier Hebrew were read at sight. The work in all three classes was subjected to a careful revision. To the Senior Hebrew class was delivered a course of twenty-two lectures on the Criticism of the Old Testament

text. The members of this class prepared Hebrew Critical Exercises, which were read and criticised.

In the class of Church History, the periods from the Reformation to the present time were In the class of Church History, the periods from the Reformation to the present time were studied by means of oral examinations on two days of the week. In the earlier part of the session, a course of lectures was given on the closing scenes of our Lord's ministry. These lectures formed the conclusion of a course delivered during last session on the Gospel history. On two days of the week lectures were given in Homiletics. The time allowed was found to be sufficient to admit of completing this course of instruction. On one day of the week lectures were given on Pastoral Theology. In this case the time allowed was insufficient, and the course could not be completed satisfactorily. The lectures on Homiletics and Pastoral Theology were given to students of the first year. It is open for consideration whether it would in the heater in future to defer the course in Pastoral It is open for consideration whether it would not be better in future to defer the course in Pastoral Theology till the closing year of the curriculum.

On one day of the week the Greek Testament was read in a class, consisting of all students in the college. In this class the last four chapters of the Acts of the Apostles, and the first four chapters of the first Epistle to Timothy, were read with some care. Thus the Greek New Testament was studied by all students in attendance on two days of the week. In the class of Patristic Greek, which consisted of six students, the Epistle of Polycarp to the Philippians, and the Epistles of Ignatius to the Romans, Ephesians and Polycarp, were read. The written examinations held in all these subjects were most encouraging, the marks reaching a high average. The general conduct and diligence of the students were quite up to the standard of former years.

Thirteen discourses were delivered and criticised.

The Degree of B.D. has been granted to Messrs. Dill and Johnson, who have just completed their course, and to the Rev. W. P. Archibald, a former student of the College. This honour has been bestowed as the result of examinations of an exceptionally high character.

ELOCUTION.

During the past winter the students have had the benefit of Mr. W. H. Waddell's instruction in elocution, and the result has been a perceptible improvement in the reading of discourses and in the important exercise of reading the Scriptures. Mr. Waddell is teacher of English in the Halifax Academy, and is a very competent instructor in elecution. He deserves much credit for the industry and ability with which he has, for very little remuneration, prosecuted this work. It is hoped that elecution will henceforth become a permanent study in the College. We are indebted to the Alumni Association for providing the means for what has been done during the past session.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

A course of special lectures has been maintained during the winter upon one day in the week. The course was begun with seven lectures by Dr. Burns, and was continued by clergymen from various parts of the Church. The subject of the course has for the past winter been Missions. These lectures have been most acceptable to the students.

RESIDENCE.

The building, which is elegant and commodious, contains accommodation for resident students. The salubrity of the air, the beauty of the scenery, and the vicinity of the Public Park and the North-West Arm make the locality attractive; and the rooms are convenient and comfortable. The charge for board—heating and light included—is two dollars per week—payable monthly in advance. No smoking is allowed on the premises. Students who break dishes or furniture must replace the same. Applications for rooms are to be addressed to Principal McKnight, on or before the 15th October.

A special service for students, on the second Sabbath of each month, at three o'clock p.m., will be conducted by the Professors in rotation.

FINANCES.

The total receipts of last year amounted to \$9,597, as against \$9,050 of the previous, an increase of \$547. The total expenditure was \$11,028, as against \$10,861, an increase of \$167. This increase is more than accounted for by the purchase of new furnishings rendered necessary by the largely increased demand for accommodation. \$3,450 of the expenditure was on account of Dalhousie College, in which we support two professors.

College, in which we support two professors. It was reported last year that the Board had taken steps to have the condition of the Fund thoroughly examined, and some means adopted of equalizing our revenue and expenditure. The committee appointed for the purpose carefully considered the whole matter; and on their report, it was unanimously agreed, at the last meeting of the Board, to ask the Church for \$3,000 in congregational collections, as this amount is needed, along with the interest and dividends from invested funds, to meet the expenditure of \$10,000 \(\theref{cut} \) year. It was also agreed to suggest to Presbyteries that each of them assume a definite portion of this sum. They were accordingly asked to raise for this object just one-third of what was alloted to them last year for Augmentation of Salaries. It is believed that when the matter is thus brought systematically before the people there will be little difficulty in raising \$3,000 instead of the \$2,000 formerly contributed. This small increase would keep the fund from running farther into dobt. We have been able to make some new investments lately that will help to improve our revenue.

BURSARY FUND.

The Bursary Fund has fallen somewhat into debt, and calls for increased contributions from our people. It has been the means of helping our students very materially, particularly in the way of reducing their bill for board. A small contribution of \$8, on an average, from each of our congregations would place it on a satisfactory basis.

As matters now stand, it is essential to our prosperity and growth. We commend it, for a blessing, earnestly to God; and, for support, to the affections and liberality of our generous hearted people.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1886-87.

The Board begs leave to submit to the General Assembly the following report of the insti-

tution for the past year.

It is gratifying to be able to state that there has been a large increase during the year in the number availing themselves of the advantages of the institution. The total number in attendance was ninety-one. Fourteen were engaged in the study of Theology; forty-five were in attendance in the Arts' classes; the remainder of the number of thirty-three were either connected with the Preparatory Department or taking selected classes.

The Board has pleasure in calling the attention of the Assembly to the fact that five students, whose entire course of theological study has been pursued in Manitoba College, have this year graduated in Theology. The Church, it is believed, will find in them a valuable addition to its

staff of labourers.

In accordance with the permission given by the last General Assembly, the Rev. James Farquharson, B.A., was appointed to give assistance in the teaching of the philosophical and theological classes for three months. The absence of Dr. King through indisposition for a part of the session made an extension of this term necessary in the interests of the work.

As in former years, two of the more advanced students were engaged to give instruction in some of the more elementary branches. This was further supplemented by assistance kindly rendered by two of the graduates of the College. In the absence of any teacher of Italian on the staff, instruction was given in this language to the Modern Language students by Madame

Riedle at her own residence.

A complete and detailed statement, duly audited, of the funds connected with the College is herewith appended. From this it will be seen that a fourth instalment of the mortgage debt has been paid, leaving only another of the same amount (\$4,800) to set the building free from the mortgage, and that the whole current expenses of the institution, including this year the very moderate allowance to the lecturer, have been met, leaving a small balance in the hands of the treasurer.

The entire income of the institution for the year, including moneys received for fees and board, is \$17,984.67. The amount received up to date from congregations in Ontario and Quebec is almost the same as last year, though there seems good ground for believing that, when the whole collections for the year are transmitted, there will be a substantial advance from this portion of the Church over the contributions of any previous year. The Board has noticed with gratification liberal donations to the ordinary revenue of the College from a number of congregations which had not heretofore contributed. The Board regrets to notice, on the other hand, a marked reduction in the amount contributed by congregations in the Maritime Provinces. A very moderate collection—one of a few dollars—by the non-contributing congregations throughout the Church, added to the, in some cases, very generous contributions of the congregations now contributing, would be of great value to the College, in enabling it to remove existing indebtedness and to meet its necessarily increasing expenditure. It will be observed that the sum received for fees and board is more than \$1,000 over that of the previous year, a result due to the larger number of pupils and of resident boarders, the number of the latter being at one period thirty-six.

In consequence of the increased attendance it was found necessary to take the museum, and fit it up as a class-room. Even with this addition it is difficult to arrange for the simultaneous

teaching of all the classes.

The College has continued to receive the aid, now given for several years, of the Presbyterisn Church of Ireland, the Church of Scotland, and the Free Church of Scotland. The Board would record its warm gratitude to these Churches. It is difficult to see how, without their assistance, the institution, intimately connected as it is, not only with the cause of higher education, but with the supply of religious ordinances to the settlements in Manitoba and the North-West, could, at the present stage of the country's development, be maintained. The College is indebted to the Rev. Dr. Laughton, of Greenock, the Rev. Dr. Burns, of Kirkliston and Miss Scott, of Edinburgh, for large and valuable additions to the library, transmitted moreover, without cost to the institution. The cordial thanks of the Board are tendered to these generous and considerate donors; also to Mr. W. D. Russell, for a copy of Dr. Dabeny's "Sacred Rhetoric," presented to each of the students in Theology; to Mr. H. W. Darling, of Toronto, for a contribution of \$100 towards needed furnishings for the College, and to the Rev. Archibald Cross, Edinburgh, a retired minister

of the Canadian Church, for a second liberal contribution towards the reduction of the debt on the College, spontaneously given.

In addition to the amount of \$7,080, the original endowment fund, loaned to the Building and Ordinary Funds, and on which no interest is paid, there is still due to the Building and Loan Association \$4,800, bearing 6½ per cent., and to Dr. Reid's office, \$8,134, bearing 6 per cent. The Board, it is hoped, may still count on the General Assembly's approval of any efforts made to reduce still further, or to liquidate entirely, this indebtedness by appeals to those who may be disposed to contribute towards this object.

The Board, while hopeful as to the future of the College, is not without anxiety as to its maintenance. It cannot count on deriving the same amount as this year from the Marriage License Fund. Large expenditure will be required to put the heating apparatus in a satisfactory state. It will almost certainly be necessary to appoint a second lecturer. In these circumstances the Board trusts that it may continue to receive from the many friends of the College a continuance of the liberal aid which has been so generously given during the past four years.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF MANITOBA COLLEGE FOR THE YEAR 1886-87.

The Senate of Manitoba College, in presenting its annual report to the Ceneral Assembly, would renew its expression of gratitude to God for the increasing prosperity f the institution.

The number of pupils of all classes on the roll of the College during the Session has been

ninety-one, being twenty-four more than the reported attendance last year. Fourteen were in attendance on the theological classes, their standing being as follows:

In this department the students of all the three years read critically with Dr. King in the New Testament the Epistle to the Hebrews, chaps, i. to vi, and in the Old Testament selected passages in Genesis, Fxodus, Leviticus and Samuel, embracing the scriptural account of the Abrahamic covenant, the institution of the passover, the giving of the Law, the Levitical sacrifices, and the Davidic promise. In Systematic Theology the subject of study was mainly that part of Hodge's Outlines extending from the chapter on the Divine Attributes to the one on Providence. The subject of the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper was also briefly

A class for the study of Horne's Introduction, and attended by all the theological students, met every day during the greater part of the Session, under the superintendence of the Rev. James Farquharson, B.A. Mr. Farquharson also gave instruction daily in Hebrew Grammar and translation to the students of the first and second years.

Instruction was given once a week, during the greater part of the Session, in Apologetics by the Rev. D. M. Gordon, B.D.; in Homiletics (with the Sacred Rhetoric of Dr. Dabeny as textbook), by the Rev. C. B. Pitblado; and in Church History, during the whole Session, by the Rev. Archibald McLaren, B.A.

A lecture or a popular sermon was given in the course of the Session by each of the students in Theology, and a critical exercise also by those of the third year.

Written examinations were conducted on the various subjects of study, both at Christmas and at the close of the Session; the results were, in most cases, quite satisfactory, indicating marked progress on the part of some. William H. Spence, an applicant for admission to the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, passed, in accordance with the instructions of the Presbytery of Winnipeg, the examination creditably in New Testament Exegesis and in Systematic Theology.

During the absence of Dr. King, through indisposition for some weeks after New Year, his classes were efficiently conducted by the Rev. Mr. Farquharson, aided by Professor Bryce.

It is not necessary to give the names here of the pupils in the Preparatory Department, which has been more largely attended than on any previous year. Prescribed classes have been taken by Walter Beattie, Peter Fisher, George Lockhart, and A. C. Manson, students having the ministry in view, and, since the close of the College, employed in the mission field of the Church, The Senate respectfully requests the General Assembly to give it permission to admit Walter Beattie to the study of Theology next Session, it being contemplated that he should take the omitted literary studies along with the first and second years of the Theological course.

In the Arts' Department Professor Bryce has taught as formerly the Honour and Pass classes in Natural Science. He gave instruction to three Honour men in the Final B.A. Year, and to three in the Junior B.A. Year. Dr. Bryce took, also, as last year, the work in English of the Modern Language Course and of the Previous Year, and the Euclid of the Previous and

Preliminary Years.

Professor Hart taught, as formerly, the Classics and French, both in the Pass and Honour subjects. Three students have read with him this year in Honour Classics. Eighteen students

of the previous year received instruction from him in Classics and French.

The Rev. James Farquharson conducted some of the classes in Mental and Moral Science; the others were taught by Dr. King. Six students took the Honour Course of Philosophy; twelve took the l'ass Course in Ethics, with Dr. Calderwood's work as the text-book. The German of the Modern Language Course was again taught by Dr. King.

Mr. A. M. Campbell, M.A., a graduate of the College, and now for several years the resident tutor, with the assistance of Messrs. G. Laird, B.A., and Duncan Campbell, and for a time of Mr. Isaac Pitblado, B.A., gave the larger portion of the teaching in the Preparatory form.

Thirty five students connected with the College took part in the examinations of the University of Manitoba in May, 1886 (subsequent to the date of last report). Twelve were admitted to the degree of B.A. Sixteen gained scholarships ranging in value from \$100 to \$60, and five medals, one of these being that given by the Governor-General. Forty-five students are taking part in the similar examinations which are being conducted by the University at the date of this report.

The societies connected with the College (the Literary Society, the Missionary, and the Y. M. C. Association) have been in more or less efficient operation throughout the Session, to the great advantage of the students. The Journal, also, has continued to be conducted, and is now

under the joint auspices of the Missionary Association and the Literary Society.

Application having been made, on behalf of a young lady who had passed the Entrance
Examination of Manitoba University, for leave to attend the classes of the College, it was unanimously agreed to grant the leave asked, and to open the classes to female atudents who are taking any part of the work prescribed by the University, and are prepared to pass the usual examinations thereon. Three have been in attendance during the Session. The Senate can report thus far only favourably on this extension of the privileges of the College, which, it is hoped, will meet with the approval of the General Assembly.

The Senate would call the attention of the General Assembly to the omission, at the time of Dr. King's appointment as Professor of Theology, to constitute a Theological Faculty, such as is required by the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, and would respectfully request it to supply

the defect at its present meeting.

The Senate respectfully requests the General Assembly to continue the power given by last Assembly to secure the services of a lecturer for three months to give assistance either in the Theological or the Arts' Course, and, in addition, to empower it to secure the assistance of another lecturer for the other three months should the requirements of the College next Session seem to demand it, and the state of the finances admit the addition to the expenditure which the appointment would involve.

APPENDIX NO. 13.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

In submitting their brief report your Committee beg to state that, notwithstanding the difficulties in the way, encouraging progress has been made in the Sabbath school work of our Church. Statistics, so far obtained, show that there has been an advance all along the line, and more especially in directions where progress is most desirable.

tics, so far obtained, show that there has been an advance all along the line, and more especially in directions where progress is most desirable.

There are 1,415 Sabbath schools reported this year, with an attendance of 104,684, an advance of 16,577 over last year. This large increase is of course partially due to the fact that the Committee is receiving fuller returns each year; still, even in localities where the returns have for some time past been full and accurate, great advance is being made. The guiding over a hundred thousand children and young people in the knowledge of Divine Truth is a work whose importance cannot be over-estimated. Conducting this great work we have 11,513 teachers and officers, an increase since last year of over 1,934. In this noble army of devoted workers we have what has most fitly been called "the unpaid ministry" of our Church. Without any material reward these thousands of men and women cheerfully devote much of their time in moulding this great mass of spiritual material into the image and likeness of Jesus Christ. Nor have their labours been in vain, if we may judge by the large accessions to the membership of the Church from the Sabbath school and the increase in missionary interest, as evidenced by increasing liberality. Of the 12,562 members received into the Church last year on profession of faith, nearly 3,500 of these have been from the Sabbath schools alone of 293. On the other hand, the contributions for mission schemes have had a correspondingly large increase—the sum of \$20,797 having been contributed for that purpose, a larger amount than was given by the whole Church not many years ago. This amount shows an increase of \$2,532 for the year, and while the average contribution per scholar is about the same there is a large increase in the number of contributors.

But what is generally true of all Christian work is especially true of Sabbath school work,

But what is generally true of all Christian work is especially true of Sabbath school work, namely, that much of its results cannot be estimated by tabulated statement. As well try to ostimate the value of raindrops and rays of sunshine in the growth of plants and flowers as the value of the lessons and prayers and kind counsels of consecrated Sabbath school teachers.

Your Committee are of opinion that, notwithstanding the large attendance and good work done, there must still be a large percentage of children still outside the influence of our Sabbath schools. Over 75,000 families are reported as connected with our Churth. No statistician would estimate the Sabbath school going community of such a number of families as less than 150,000, which leaves over 40,000 still to be accounted for. The inference is that many of these children and young people do not attend our Sabbath schools and Bible classes at all, or they leave them at an early age as being too old to listen to Sabbath school instruction. Notwithstanding the great improvement in regard to reports there must be a defect still, as the figures here given are not up to those given in the Statistical Report, except in one or two departments. It is to be hoped, therefore, that Presbyteries will make more determined efforts to secure full and accurate reports during the present year.

The Committee would also beg to make the following recommendations:-

1. That, wherever practicable, the registers recommended by the Assembly be used in all the Schools; that a full and correct record be kept, and that each Presbytery require, from its Sabbath school Committee, a report of every school within its bounds, to be presented not later than the March meeting.

2. That each Presbytery devise and adopt some scheme of supervision or visitation whereby the

efficiency of each Sabbath school may be ascertained and enhanced.

3. That all pastors and Sabbath school workers be urged to seek more directly and especially the spiritual welfare of those under their care, and that they use every legitimate means of bringing them at as early an age as possible, through personal acceptance of Christ, into full communion with the Church.

4. That the claims of missions be urged upon schools, and that each school be asked to contribute something to one or more of our great mission schemes.

5. That the authorities of Theological Colleges be requested to devote some attention to the training of students in methods of teaching and Sabbath school management, and that pastors, if possible, establish weekly meetings for the training of Sabbath school teachers.

APPENDIX NO. 14.

REPORT OF THE HYMNAL COMMITTEE.

The Hymnal Committee beg to report that during the past year there has been an extensive sale of the Church and Sabbath School Hymnals. Of the different editions of the Church Hymnal without tunes nearly 17,000 copies have been sold, and of the Church Hymnal with tunes the sales have been upwards of 3,000. Of the small Sabbath School Hymnals there has been a sale of upwards of 20,000 copies, and of the harmonized edition nearly 1,000 copies have been sold. Of the tonic sol-fa edition of the Church Hymnal the sale has not been large, only about 400 copies having been sold during the year. Altogether only 1,000 copies of this edition have been sold since it was issued. There has, therefore, been little encouragement for the publication of a tonic-sol-fa edition of the Sabbath School Hymnal. During the past year the Committee has incurred the expense of paying for the plates from which the twenty-five cent edition of the Church Hymnal is printed. Nevertheless, the liabilities of the Committee have been considerably reduced, while the value of its assets has been increased. It is hoped that the resources at the disposal of the Committee during the ensuing year may render it possible, if it is deemed desirable, to issue a tonic-sol-fa edition of the small Sabbath School Hymnal without increasing the liabilities of the Committee. APPENDIX NO. 15.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

In accordance with the instructions given by last General Assembly to the Committee on Sabbath Observance, the following circular addressed to the Churches of the United States and Canada was issued in January of the present year:—

INTERNATIONAL DEFENCE OF THE SABBATH.

Rev. And Dear Sir.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada impressed with the alarming prevalence of Sabbath profanation, especially on Railways, and recognizing the impossibility of dealing effectually with this great evil unless the Churches of the United States and Canada make common cause in the matter, at last meeting instructed its Committee on Sabbath Observance to open correspondence with the Churches of the United States and Canada, with the view of bringing the combined force of Christian sentiment in the two countries to bear upon this question, and of securing concerted action for the purpose of preventing unnecessary Sabbath labour on Railways.

question, and of securing concerted action for the purpose of processing and the "through connections" of the principal lines are urged as the defence of a very large proportion of the prevalent Sabbath labour and traffic. Large classes of the community are, in violation of both the Divine and Civil Law of the Sabbath, deprived of their heritage in that Holy day and its privileges. Many and subtile influences are at work which, if unchecked, will certainly still further develop and intensify this great international evil.

If concerted action be agreed on, the form which it shall take will be a matter for subsequent determination, as the collective wisdom of the Churches may direct. Official communication by deputation or otherwise with the Railway Authorities would probably suggest itself as the prelimination. nary step, which, if it did not result in any appreciable abatement of the evil, might prepare the

WOODSTOCK, January 6th, 1887.

The circular has been sent to the Bishop of each diocese of the Church of England in the Domin. ion and to the official representatives of other Churches in the United States and Canada.

Numerous letters have been received acknowledging receipt of the circular, and in general speak in encouraging terms as regards cooperation. The annual meetings of the respective Synods, ing in encouraging terms as regards cooperation. The annual meetings of the respective Synods, Conferences and Assemblies take place about the time, and your Committee are consequently not yet in a position to report action taken on the circular.

Very full and important information has been received from several of our Synods through the reports of their respective committees. The Report of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa states that action has been taken to secure that an annual sermon on Sabbath Observance be preached by all ministers within the bounds, that Committees on Sabbath Observance have been appointed in the Presbyteries of Montreal and Ottawa, that the Ministerial Association of Montreal have circulated fifteen thousand copies of a letter on Sabbath Observance, and have, by various other efforts and methods, endeavoured to suppress Sabbath profanation in and around that city. Gratification is expressed at the stand taken by certain dignitaries of the Church of Rome against some of the prevalent forms of Sabbath descration in the Province of Quebec.

Two hundred hackmen of Montreal have formed a league to give themselves and their horses

rest on the Sabbath.

The Committee of the Presbytery of Ottawa and the Ministerial Association of that city have been prosecuting a line of effort similar to that already described; and the cooperation of the Evan-

gelical Churches in and around Ottawa has been sought and secured.

From both Montreal and Ottawa come loud and bitter complaints of systematic and flagrant desecration of the Sabbath by the two great Railroad corporations of the Dominion. In addition to the running of freight and passenger trains, it is alleged that under the plea of necessity a great amount of labour is carried on in workshops, and men who once held prominent positions in the Christian Church, have, through yielding to the temptation of extra pay for Sabbath labour, become

the victims of a system of bondage as oppressive as any slavery that ever existed.

The Report recommends that legislation be sought for the Province of Quebec similar to that recently passed in the Province of Outario with respect to the running of Sabbath excursions. This was agreed to, and further, the Clerk of Synod was instructed to send a certified copy of the following Resolution to the Church Courts of the principal Protestant denominations in the United States:-

"That the Synod recognize with satisfaction what the General Assembly has done in seeking cooperation with the Churches of the United States to abate the evil of Sabbath railroad labour, and

recommend the Assembly to continue the correspondence till the evil has been done away."

The Report from the Synod of Toronto and Kingston makes reference in terms of appreciation to the operation of the Act passed recently by the Ontario Legislature for the Prevention of Excursions on Sabbath. The forms of Sabbath desecration to which the Report specially refers are railroad labour and traffic on that day, and street parades accompanied by brass bands.

The Report from the Synod of Hamilton and London refers to the same forms of Sabbath

profanation, and in similar terms.

rofanation, and in similar terms.

In Nova Scotia the friends of the Sabbath have shown commendable activity in enforcing the laws already on the Statute Book and in seeking improved legislation. A bill to "Prevent the Profanation of the Lord's Day" passed its second reading in the Legislative Assembly, but it was mutilated in Committee, and rejected at the third reading. Very keen interest in the Sabbath question was evoked; the discussion and agitation still continue; and it is fully expected that a measure not less satisfactory than that which has been defeated shall become law next Session of the Legislature. Other denominations have made common cause with Presbyterians in this matter.

Another item of interest is the action recently taken by the St. Thomas Ministerial Association

in preparing and circulating throughout the Dominion a petition to both Houses of Parliament asking

for further legislation in the interests of Sabbath Observance.

Your Committee close their Report with the following recommendations:—
1. That Synods be instructed to report through their respective Committees on Sabbath Observance to the Assembly's Committee.

2. That the correspondence opened with other Churches in the United States and Canada be continued, that the combined testimony and influence of all the Churches in both nations may be brought to bear against the stupendous evil of Sabbath profanation. That a convention of representatives of the cooperating Churches be held at an early date, if

APPENDIX NO. 16.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

In the month of December last your Committee prepared a list of questions, and sent a copy of them to every pastor and missionary of our Church whose address could be obtained from the last or them to every passor and missionary of our Church whose address count be obtained from the fast published statistics. These questions were designed to elicit such information as might enable your Committee to present to the Assembly a full and accurate report as to the progress and prospects of temperance work, with special reference to such aspects of it as possess, for the present, a peculiar

importance.

In response to these questions, reports, full and interesting, have been received from all the Synods of the Church. The report from the Synod of the Maritime Provinces furnishes information for only the first half of the Assembly year. It is, for that reason, not constructed in reply to the questions of the Committee, though answers to nearly all of them have been obtained from the excellent material it supplies. Moreover, as a valuable supplement to that Synod's report, the Presbyteries of Truro and St. John have sent replies to the questions, giving information up to the latest date. These replies, together with the recommendations of the several Synods and Presbyteries, represent, we believe, very fully and fairly the mind of our Church on every important aspect of this great question of social and moral reform, as well as the attitude of the country generally toward the entire liquor traffic. They show that the year just closed has been one of steady progress. The experiences of the past, whether of success or failure, are beginning to yield a revenue of practical and valuable lessons. The conviction is deepening and intensifying throughout the Church, and throughout the land, that the liquor traffic is an unspeakable and unmitigated evil; that it is a seductive and corrupting power, making humiliating inroads on the Church herself; and that fidelity to Christ and compassion for men forbid any compromise with a fee so terrible; or any method of to Christ and compassion for men forbid any compromise with a foe so terrible, or any method of

settling the controversy short of its utter extermination.

1. The first question inquires of Sessions: (1) As to the present attitude of public sentiment, in their respective localities, to the question of prohibition, and (2) as to any advance made towards

that goal during the present year.

The overwhelming preponderance of opinion is that public sentiment is already ripe for total prohibition. Even some of those sessions who were unfavourable to the Scott Act, and who still regard it as a comparative failure, explain their attitude by their superior loyalty to the cause, which

regard it as a comparative failure, explain their attitude by their superior loyalty to the cause, which makes them look with distrust on anything short of total prohibition. And those, again, who gladly accept the present Act, and who have wrought with untiring energy to carry and maintain it, admit that it is only a step toward that at which they aim—the complete overthrow of the liquor traffic.

There is less unanimity as to the advance made in favour of prohibition during the year. The Synod of Montreal and Ottawa records little or none, and assigns as a cause the difficulties experienced in enforcing the Act. In all the other Synods there seems less disposition to succumb to these difficulties, but rather a determination to have the law amended and rigidly enforced. One Presbytery says: "It is clear that the general community are more than ever convinced that the liquor traffic must be suppressed, and that throwing the cloak of respectability about the liquor traffic, by the continuance of the license system, cannot be much longer tolerated." This substantially voices the replies given in the majority of cases, from which the inference follows that the great mass of the people have reached a point in this question at which a prohibitory law, with proper provisions for its enforcement, may be safely submitted to them.

2. The next question reads thus: Is there any tendency to lay saide the moral sussion argument?

If so, what chief cause would you assign?

The reports vary considerably in their answers to this question. A few of the Presbyteries The reports vary considerably in their answers to this question. A tew of the Presbyteries distinctly affirm that such a tendency exists, while a much greater number report in an opposite sense, with respect to those localities for which they speak. Others express their conviction that moral suasion has simply been held in abeyance during a period of special conflict, when the legal aspects of the question of necessity bulked largely in the minds of the people. Your Committee venture to think that this last opinion best describes the attitude of the country to the question of noral suasion. The last few years have forced the people to face the legal aspects of this question with an earnestness hitherto unknown. The right to pass prohibitory legislation having been assailed, its advocates have been obliged to defend it; and thus, both on the platform and in the press, the legal aspect may have temporarily eclipsed the moral. But it would be a great mistake to suppose that moral suasion has been thrown aside as effete or out of date.

The drunkard is to be plied with moral considerations to-day as vigorously as in the past. The philanthropic argument—abstinence for the sake of others—still retains all its Christ-like beauty and heavenly power for those who seemingly are in no personal danger. But the belief has ripened into conviction that the time has come when those who manufacture or sell strong drink must be restrained by the strong arm of the law. So moral suasion and legal restraint are wedded together in this noble work, and they must never be divorced. Either will fail of its full effect if deprived

of the strength which the other yields.

3. The third inquiry requests those who live in counties and cities where the Canada Temper-

ance Act is in force to state their experience as to its working and effects.

The three central Synods of the Church are unanimous in their testimony as to the good results accruing from the Act, wherever it has been faithfully enforced. Failure in its enforcement, however, has elicited doleful responses to the question from several quarters. Sarnia Presbytery complains that "the Act has actually increased drinking in the frontier towns and villages by setting aside the Saturday night and Sabbath closing laws. It has taken the traffic away from a limited number of licensed places and scattered it over an unlimited number of unlicensed dens. It has prevented open, honest treating, and paved the way for unlimited drinking on the sly." And yet, among these minor strains, the practised ear detects a note of gladness. It is cheering to find that, even in those exceptionally unfavourable circumstances, the Act has really put down "open, honest treating"—has stamped it as a ruinous and disreputable thing, and chased it to dark hiding-holes, where those who indulge in it must do so "on the sly." The romance and witchery of this new system of treating will be vastly less potential in alluring and slaying our youth than that which springs out of a legalized "open, honest system." Indeed, one of the grandest results of the Act, wherever carried, is that it has stamped as illegal the pernicious habit of treating.

Other good results of this Act, noted in the reports, are the undoubted decrease of drunkenness;

Other good results of this Act, noted in the reports, are the undoubted decrease of drunkenness; drawing the line more sharply between abstainers and non-abstainers; making the liquor traffic more and more disreputable; and the lessening of crime, as testified by many judges and grand

juries throughout the land.

The Presbytery of St. John informs us that the Act works well in rural districts and in mane towns; that even where it has not been well enforced it has had a good influence; that it is gaining ground and doing its work more smoothly; and that convictions for its violation can now be mady with great facility. In the North-West the great hindrances to the working of their prohibitory law are the facility with which permits are granted and the sale of so-called temperance drinks, which, in many cases, possess intoxicating qualities.

4. The fourth question inquires of our Sessions whether they regard any failure of the Act as an

4. The fourth question inquires of our pessions whether they regard any failure of the Act as an indication of unripe public sentiment, and to what other causes partial failure may be ascribed.

Very few of the reports ascribe failure to unripe public sentiment. They declare it to be the duty of the Government to enforce the law, and firmly believe that in so doing it will be amply sustained; and they deprecate the idea of leaving the enforcing of the law to private citizens.

Other causes that prevent the Act from achieving a larger success are the following:—Defects in the Act itself, and the refusal of the Dominion Government to amend it; the long disputes regarding jurisdiction; legal quibbles; want of police magistrates; inefficient inspectors; the unscrupulous nature of the traffic; intimidation by dynamite and incendiarism; and perjury on the Parkan withing has more ambeddened the traffic and account of the property of the part of drinkers and drink-sellers. Perhaps nothing has more emboldened the traffic and encouraged it in its lawless deeds than the false and immoral sentiment abroad that it is dishonourable to inform

against law-breakers whose illegal traffic is spreading ruin and death all around us.

The process of education is held by the great majority of reports to be sufficiently complete for the enactment of the most rigid prohibitory law; that the Act we have is by no means premature, inasmuch as one of its greatest benefits is the educative influence it exerts; and that were the principle admitted that complete education must precede law, it would revolutionize the whole

process of law, human and divine.

5. Do you think the country is ready for prohibition? or is it expedient to continue for some

time to license an acknowledged evil?

This simply asks Sessions to enlarge their vision, and answer on behalf of the whole country a question they have already answered on behalf of their respective localities. Most of the reporting Presbyteries affirm that the country is abundantly ready now; and others, that it is fast becoming so.

One or two Sessions have taken exception to the second part of the question, inasmuch as to

license an acknowledged evil is immoral on the face of it. That is precisely what your Committee believes. The General Assembly of our Church has repeatedly affirmed its belief that the liquor traffic is an evil, yet the only methods of dealing with it that we have heard proposed are license on the one hand and prohibition on the other; and your Committee believe that the alternative, brought fairly before the minds of our people, should have a very wholesome effect. Some take refuge in the fact that license here means to restrict, yet it is confessed by all that license clothes with respectability a destructive traffic, and sanctions that which should call forth our holiest maledictions. Truly the strength of this sin is the law, a law that makes the noblest good of society a dream, and mocks the noblest efforts of Christian energy.

6. The sixth and last question makes enquiry as to the chief means employed to foster and

develop prohibition sentiment.

the great agency relied on for effecting this and every holy purpose is the preaching of the Gospel of Christ. In pulpit, Bible class, Sabbath school, and largely, too, in our temperance societies, Christ is held up as the one hope and sole refuge of perishing men.

The subordinate means are temperance associations, temperance literature and lectures; candidature of prohibitionists for office; bands of hope; personal example; and special mention is made of the great good effected by the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

On the whole, the outlook was never more encouraging. The "conspiracy of silence" i. now completely broken. In the pulpit, in the press and on the platform this subject is freely discussed. There is no man now with any enlightened sense of duty that can stand aloof from the temperance cause, and remain an indifferent w. 1988 of either its struggles or its triumphs. He may not agree with us as to the remedy we propose for the evils arising from strong drink. But, if so, he is bound to suggest something better; for he cannot but sympathize with us in our aims and ambitions-aims that embrace the emancipation of society from an awful bondage, ambitions that will never be satisfied until this deadly curse shall cease, and when, from this source, violence shall no more be heard in the land, wasting nor destruction within our borders.

Your Committee would suggest the following deliverance for the adoption of this Assembly: FIRST.—That, since Christ alone can uplift and bless the race, purify and save society, and make of us a temperate and peaceable people, we give ourselves, in promoting the temperance cause, with renewed consecration to the preaching of the Gospel; and that we hold up Christ in our pulpits, prayer meetings, Sabbath schools, Bible classes, and families as the only Saviour from sin

Fourth.—That this Assembly, with renewed earnestness and emphasis, again expresses the hope that electors, in their choice of representatives, will elect only able and good men, who are well known to be in sympathy with prohibitory legislation.

Firth.—That this Assembly calls on all its pastors, elders, teachers and members to use their utmost influence against the deadly power of the saloon by their public utterances and private life; by personal effort and example on behalf of temperance; and by a watchful care of the young entered in our Sabbath schools and homes so as to awaken the conscience of the indifferent and gathered in our Sabbath schools and homes, so as to awaken the conscience of the indifferent, and save those who are tempted or fallen.

2. The fund shall be sustained by a nual congregational contributions, ministers' rates, donations,

and bequests.

3. The invested capital shall not be trenched upon for the purpose of paying annuities in full; and all bequests made to the fund shall be added to the capital, except when otherwise ordered by 4. Settled pastors, foreign missionaries, professors in colleges and Church agents shall pay into the fund an annual rate of \$5.

the fund an annual rate of \$5.

5. When a minister resigns his charge without leave from the General Assembly to retire, but continues in the service of the Church as a preacher, he shall pay into the fund the sum of \$5 a year, otherwise his annuity shall be only in proportion to the time of his service as a pastor.

6. A minister who resigns his charge and joins another Church forfeits all claim to the privileges of the fund. He shall receive back, however, upon application to the committee, half the amount of the personal rates which he paid into the fund. Should he desire to retain his connection with the fund, the Assembly may allow him to do so on condition that he pay an annual rate of \$15, the annuity to be given him, on his becoming aged and infirm, to be in proportion to the length of his services in the Church.

7. The rates shall be paid each year on or before Nov. 1.

8. Persons joining the fund shall pay their percentage according to the regulations passed by the General Assembly of 1877, with interest thereon, from the date of their ordination, or of their becoming ministers of our Church. This rule shall not apply further back than 1877.

9. Any of our present ministers who may neglect to connect himself with the fund before January 1, 1888, cannot be received into connection with it after that date, except by the special leave of the Assembly.

10. Ministers shall be placed on the fund only on application of their respective Presbyteries, after they have obtained leave of the General Assembly to retire from the active duties of the

ministry on account of age or infirmity.

11. In making application it is required of Presbyteries to state the age of the person on whose behalf the application is made, the date of his retirement from the active duties of the ministry, and the length of time during which he has laboured in this Church. In the case of a person who is under seventy years of age, the application must be accompanied by a satisfactory medical certificate of ill health. of ill health.

12. No person can be placed upon the fund as an annuitant unless he has paid the annual rate required of him.

13. When a minister is allowed by the General Assembly to retire after ten years' service in this Church, he shall receive an annuity of \$150 a year, with \$5 additional for every year's service beyond ten years, up to forty years' service, if the state of the fund permit.

14. The case of a minister allowed to retire after less than ten years' service in this Church shall be made a which to favoid consideration by the Assembly.

shall be made a subject of special consideration by the Assembly.

15. When a minister's strength may be impaired, but not so much as to render him wholly unable to discharge the active duties of a profession, the Committee may grant him half the allowance to which he would be entitled in case of complete disability.

16. In the case of a minister taken on the fund for sickness, thought likely to be permanent, and afterward recovering his strength sufficiently to engage actively in the duties of a profession, the

annuity shall be reduced or discontinued.

17. When a minister who has paid rates to the fund arrives at the age of seventy years, he may claim the privilege of retiring from the active duties of the ministry and being placed upon the fund.

18. In the case of ministers who are entirely dependent for their support upon their regular annuity from this fund, the Committee shall have power, after careful inquiry into their circum-

stances, to grant such an additional allowance to them as the condition of the fund will permit; such additional allowance in no case to exceed the sum of \$75 a year.

19. When a minister is removed by orderly translation from one section of the Church to another, he shall, from the date of his translation, pay his rate into the fund of the section to which he is translated, and he shall have claim to an interest in it on his retirement by leave of the

Assembly, to the full extent of the period of his pastoral services in both sections.

20. Annuities shall be paid in quarterly instalments, on the 1st July, October, January and April, payments to be made on the first of these dates succeeding the receipts of the Presbytery's application to the committee.

21. These rules may be revised once in every five years.

It is to be noted that in the case of all names on the list, down to that of Mr. W. R. Sutherland (inclusive), all amounts in excess of \$200 are supplementary payments made in the beginning of the financial year, from the balance in hand, so as to bring up the annuites of the previous year to the figure of former years. These supplementary payments amounted to \$600, and include \$5 opposite the name of Mr. John Irvine. It will be understood, therefore, that, up to this date, no beneficiary has received more than \$200 as annuity for the year now ended. The Committee, however, has ordered supplementary payments from the balance of \$846.54. These will amount to \$665.

After the great interest manifested by last General Assembly, it is disappointing to see that, while the number of beneficiaries is larger than ever, the income available for current expenditure is

while the number of beneficiaries is larger than ever, the income available for current expenditure is less than that of the previous year. It is to be remembered, however, that, while the congregational contributions now reported amount only to \$7,368.07 as against \$7,706.39 of the previous year, the latter amount included some \$900, contributed in response to the Committee's appeal in May, 1885, when the income for the year was found to be seriously inadequate. But for this appeal, the congregational contributions of last year would not have exceeded \$6,800; so that those now reported really show an advance in congregational liberality to the extent of fully \$550. This is so far encouraging; though it is matter of regret that the increase has not been such as to make the interest of the capital available in the way indicated by the Assembly. It will be seen that there is also a decrease in the amount received from the rate—\$1,910.45 as against \$2,087.43—a difference of \$176.98. The interest of capital shows an increase of \$150.17.

Leaving out balances, bequests and investments, it will be seen that the income available for current expenditure is \$10,318.69, and that the actual expenditure is \$10,573.10, a difference of \$254.41, by which amount the balance would have been reduced had all bequests (\$262) been invested,

\$254.41, by which amount the balance would have been reduced had all bequests (\$262) been invested, standing at \$734.54—a little more than sufficient for the supplementary payments now ordered. It should be noticed that comparatively very little has been contributed towards capital, not withstanding the earnest appeal of last Assembly. The bequests amount to \$262, and no large donation has been received. Some changes have been made in the investments, which now stand at \$15,050—Debentures \$2,500 and Mortgages \$12,550. Following out the Assembly's expression of its mind on the subject, the Committee issued an appeal to the wealthler members of the Church. This appeal appeared in the Canada Presbyterian and the Presbyterian Review some months ago; but as yet there has been no response to it, and probably not much is to be expected, unless personal application is resorted to. cation is resorted to.

It will be seen that the hope of making some addition to the Annuities of beneficaries who are especially dependent on the fund has not been realized. It was hoped that the receipts from congregational contributions would suffice, with the proceeds of the rate, to pay all annuities up to the figure of the last few years (\$220), so that the interest of capital might be available for the addition referred to. But instead of this, it has been necessary to use, not only every dollar of the interest, but almost all the balance, in making the usual payments. It is no doubt well known that all the referred to. But instead of this, it has been necessary to use, not only every dollar of the interest, but almost all the balance, in making the usual payments. It is no doubt well known that all the Presbyteries have been severally appealed to, in terms suggested by their Returns to the Assembly. But though almost all of them appear to have interested themselves, there is not as yet much indication of general improvement, the burden being as before, largely borne by comparatively few congregations, while in a great many cases, perhaps in most, the congregational contribution is not worthy of the name. The Committee cannot renounce the hope of a large increase of congregational liberality, as the result of dutiful endeavour on the part of the Presbyteries. There is reason to think that Presbyteries have not yet exhausted their efforts on behalf of the fund; and there are Presbyteries beyond others indebted to the fund, which, nevertheless, judging by congregational contributions, are beyond others wanting in interest in its behalf.

The Committee, however, are especially hopeful in the direction of an immediate increase of the capital. They believe that all that is needed is to bo had, if only it shall be duly sought from those to whom God has given it, and whose hearts He keeps in His hand. And they would urge that active steps should be taken at once to obtain large donations from those who are able to give them, many of whom would respond cordially to personal application made to them in the name of the Assembly. As the proportion of beneficiaries to the whole ministry may now be regarded as being at its height, very little increase of capital is needed to keep up present payments to all retired ministers, if there be only a continued upward tendency on the part of congregations. If, therefore, there be no delay of action, justice will be done to a number of the fathers of the Church, who are soon to pass away, after long lives of toil and hardship hitherto ill requited.

It is believed that there are other applications, the papers relating to which have, through inadvertence, not been laid before the Committee. ommittee.

A well known and highly esteemed minister of the Church, Mr. Wm. Donald, who has been obliged by the state of his wife's health to remove from Canada, and is now settled in California, and who yet retains the hope of returning to Canada, has requested the Committee to apply to the Assembly for retention of his claim to benefit, in accordance with the regulation adopted in 1884. APPENDIX NO. 22.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION, 1886-87.

Your Committee have to report that their first work was to get the new scheme on Vacancis and Distribution of Preachers which was adopted by the General Assembly in June, 1886, also most careful consideration and discussion, printed and circulated, so that all parties immediate interested, who could be reached, might have the opportunity of making themselves acquainted wit its provisions, and thus be able to co-operate with your Committee in working it faithfully. Thattention of Presbyteries was called particularly to the scheme, with the request that they would furnish the information which was required not later than the meeting in August, and that the would let those Licentiates and Ministers without charge living in their bounds, wishing appoindments, know its requirements, and forward their names with the names of Vacancies for Supply.

'Your Committee held quarterly meetings, and from the Appendices herewith published, the General Assembly and others will see the vacancies reported, the names of those to whom appointments were given, and the Presbyteries to whose bounds they were assigned.

From Appendix No. I., it will be seen that there are twenty-five Presbyteries in the Province of Quebec and Ontario—the only provinces contemplated in the scheme. Of these siztern reported vacancies for each or some of the quarters; three sent in no report at any time; one reported supply wanted; one reported for one quarter, not for the others; two reported "no vacancies, and two which had vacancies reported that they were supplied by students during the summer. For of these vacancies were settled in the course of the year with men whose names were on your Committee's list.

Thirty eight names of preachers were reported for appointments, whose names will be found in Appendix II., with those of the Presbyteries by which they were transmitted. Of these preaches four were called and settled, two withdrew; five accepted offers of mission work; one was removed from the list, and twenty-six are still on.

Some Presbyteries, acting under one of the provisions of the scheme, objected to having certain men appointed to their bounds. In such cases appointments were withheld in the meantime from such, and intimation to that effect given to the Presbyteries by which they had been certified; while their names were retained, and published in the distribution for the quarter, so that those wishing their services might apply for them. Only one Presbytery has found fault with your Committee for thus withholding appointments from those to whom objections had been made.

No scheme of distribution was published for the first quarter. Appendix No. III. contains the appointments made for the three following quarters.

Very few cases have been reported to your Committee of applicants under appointments not taking the work in Presbyteries to which they were assigned. There have, however, been some cases, which have been productive of injurious effects. Your Committee would therefore make the following as their first recommendation:

- I. That Ministers and Licentiates failing to fulfil their appointments without assigning a due cause may be refused further appointments by your Committee—notice of their action to be sent to the Presbyteries by whom the parties were certified.
- II. They would furth: recommend that the Committee have power to withhold appointments from any to whom objections have been made, until such time as the Presbytery recommending him shall show cause for his being given his former position.
- III. That Presbyteries be instructed to report all vacancies in their bounds prepared to call, and obtain through your Committee either full or partial supply.
- IV. Vacancies reported as requiring supply for a given number of Sabbaths shall be held responsible for the employment of those sent them for these Sabbaths, either in their own pulpits or elsewhere.

APPENDIX NO. 23.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF RELIGION, 1887.

In presenting to the Venerable the General Assembly the Report on the State of Religion, your Committee are very thankful to convey the assurance that strong indications of progress are perceptible throughout the various Synods of the Church. The Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London is to the effect that "there is a spontaneous voice of gratitude from every Presbytery, and a unanimous testimony that the past year, with all its shortcomings, has witnessed advancement all along the line of religious enterprise, and the work of the ministery and eldership, and attendance on the means of grace, and Christian activity and liberality, and an exemplary daily

walk on the part of the masses of the people."

Unhappily, there is cause for regret, that in spite of all the diligence which has doubtless been exerted to obtain replies from all the Sessions of our Church to the questions which were submitted by your Committee, the number of delinquents is somewhat large. In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces no Report was received from the Presbytery of st. John, and the Presbytery of Newfoundland. Twenty-five Sessions in the Synods of Montreal and Ottawa failed to make any return. The report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston ought to be more favourable than this statement justifies: "Saugeen with not a few Sessions sending no report; Orangeville with ten, less than one half, and Lindsay with only five, nearly two-thirds of its charges not reporting. Reports were received from all the Presbyteries in the Synod of Hamilton and London. It is stated "That the Reports from Sessions were very full, and almost all reporting." In the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories Reports were received from four out of the five Presbyteries that constitute that Synod. It appears that though "The subject seems to have engaged the attention of the recently erected Presbytery of British Columbia, the returns were so defective that it was not judged expedient to embody and transmit them." In common with the members of Assembly, your Committee regard with great satisfaction the formation of a Presbytery in British Columbia, and the consequent completion of our ecclesiastical organization through the entire Dominion of Canada. Your Committee cherish the sanguine hope, that a report containing instructive intelligence regarding the condition of our congregations in British Columbia will be available for the next meeting of the General Assembly. It is clear that the time has not arrived, when the efforts that are now put forth to secure replies to the questions of your Committee from a!! the Sessions of our Church, can be relaxed. Your Committee are hopeful that by calling attent on to those Presbyteries and Sessions that are in the category of delinquents, an approximation, at least, will soon be reached to the fulness of information which is desirable, and which ought to be furnished respect g the condition and progress of all the congregations of our Church.

Your Committee have particular pleasure in stating that a remarkable improvement is discernible in the zeal wherewith the elders of our Church are performing the duties that belong to their office. These citations are sufficiently explicit and satisfactory: "The elders are becoming faithful, conscientious and painstaking in the discherge of their duties. They are realizing year by year, that important duties devolve upon them, and they are seeking to discharge those duties." "All the elders appear to realize their responsibility in sharing with the ministers the work of the congregation." "There is evidence of very general fidelity and much conscientious service by the elders." "The elders of a French congregation" in the Presbytery of Ottawa, "visit and report every Sabbath." "The elders oversee the Sunday school, assist in the prayer meeting, look after strangers, and the sick are visited by them." "In the absence of the minister, the elders conduct public worship in the church." "Several congregations have elders who in the absence of the pastor conduct the Sabbath service acceptably." It will be generally admitted, your Committee believe, that the best men who are available are elected to the eldership. As very much of the intelligence, and influence, and ability of our Church is to be found in our eldership; and as the citations which have been made indicate in a very gratifying manner, that our elders are as a rule devoting themselves with great faithfulness to their peculiar duties, the hope can reasonably be entertained that an accession of strength such as has not hitherto been witnessed, will be thus made to the Church at large in

carrying on "its many schemes and enterprises."

One or two extracts from the Reports which have been submitted to your Committee, will furnish a somewhat accurate representation of the methods that are suggested for utilizing the services of elders to the best advantage: "Organize. Let there be more method in our Sessions-Divide each congregation into Districts, and place it under the care of one or two elders, and let

By assigning to each elder a district of workable size, in which he may hold prayer meetings regularly, visit the sick, take an interest in the young and strangers, have the oversight of its moral and spiritual interests, and report at regular intervals to the Session the work done by the congregation." Your Committee beg to bring before the notice of the Assembly a remark which occurs in the report of the Presbytery of Quebec: "It is feared that ministers themselves make up the Congregational Reports. It would be well to have the Session make them up. The elders would thus be led to consider their responsibility more deeply." Your Committee are of opinion that the best method that is feasible, is to assign a District to every elder in a congregation, and to carry out as faithfully as may be possible the suggestions which have been cited. Good is sure to result from a careful discussion in the Session of the questions which are submitted by your Committee, and from a frack interchange of opinion as to the answers which ought to be made in the circumstances of the congregation.

The members of Assembly will be gratified to know that the Reports of our Synods concur in testifying that an honest desire prevails, and that a sincere effort is made, to impress on those who are admitted into full communion the duty which membership in the Christian Church of itself involves. As it is evident that the success of the Christian Church in our day depends, humanly speaking, in no insignificant measure, on the character and thoroughness of the organization which may be adopted, there is cause, in the judgment of your Committee, for great thankfulness, not only that those who bear office in our Church are keenly alive to the responsibility which devolves upon them, but also that those who are beginning their connection with the Church, as communicants, are admonished that they are not to be inactive or indifferent members of it, and that they are carefully to avoid the conduct of the servant "who "ad received one talent, and went and digged in the earth and hid his Lord's money," as well as of the servant who "kept his pound laid up in a napkin." The future of our Church can be contemplated with an abundant measure of hopefulness and courage, inasmuch as sedulous pains are now expended to enlist the active co-operation of all our members from their earliest connection with the Church.

In view of the peculiar circumstances of our still youthful country, and of the tendency to be less deferential to ecclesiastical restraint which thus obtains; in consideration as well of the less rigorous discipline which perhaps is exercised in other churches of the land, your Committee venture to state that there is great cause to be thankful to God that the moral life of our people—that criterion to which the friends and foes of Christianity must alike defer—has throughout the past year been so good and praiseworthy as to give little or no occasion whatsoever for censure, or for the exercise of discipline.

In answer to the question: as to how the spiritual life of our congregations has progressed during the past year, such replies as these have been forwarded to your Committee; "On the whole, considerable progress has been manifested among our church members." "The progress is visible and conspicuous." "The spiritual life is reasonably fair, with good indications of further progress." "On the whole, no marked evidence of spiritual progress." "Quietly, but surely." "One of the best years in our history." "A decided growth in spiritual life." "All the Sessions answer with the greatest hesitancy and caution. They fully realize that it is God's prerogative to search the heart. Some speak of the obvious difficulty of arriving at a correct estimate of the spiritual life of the people. Some give it as their conviction that there is no perceptible advance in the matter; while others and more bear testimony to a very marked improvement, and in some instances at points where irreligion and vice have been long in the ascendant."

All the Reports which have been presented to your Committee contain favourable information with regard to the regularity wherewith the services of the sarctuary are attended. "It appears that in the Presbytery of Pictou there is a congregation consisting of 250 families, and that there is not one unrepresented on the Lord's day." "Attendance good, remarkably good." "Attendance on the Lord's day large, and increasing." The Report is sent by a certain session in Maitland, "that a single case of total indifference to the means of grace is unknown." "It is said that the Presbytery of Bruce rejoices in a Sabbath honoured as God's run day, in a manner that will compare favourably with any part of the world." At a time when it is loudly averred in certain quarters that the pulpit is losing its traditional power, and that other educational agencies are quietly supplanting the religious teaching of the sanctuary, it cannot be otherwise than very gratifying to the members of Assembly to be assured on the strength of the evidence which has been presented to your Committee, that through the various Synods of our Church the services of God's house are so highly appreciated, and that there happily is an increase in the reverence which is shown by our people for the courts of God's house.

"Personal dealing, special sermons, and Evangelistic services." "By faithful presentation of the truth from the pulpit, and personal dealing with the careless:" In such a manner there is conveyed a fair representation of the means that are employed throughout our Church for increasing the affection of the more careless and indifferent in our congregations for the house of God, and for leading them to take a warmer interest in our church and its missionary enterprises.

There appears to be an improvement on the whole, as well in the number of those who attend the prayer meeting, as in the assistance which is received from elders and members generally in conducting it. The Report of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces is to the effect, "that prayer meetings have an increased attendance. Valuable assistance is rendered by the elders, ordinary church members, and in some cases women read, pray and speak." A somewhat

doleful Report was received from the Presbytery of Montreal: " The prayer meeting is poorly

attended; it is seldom conducted by any person but the pastor."

In the Report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, such statements as these are to be found: "A very large proportion of the membership never attend prayer meeting." The attendance of some prominent members would cause almost a sensation by their unusual attendance. It cannot always be on the score of business engagements that men absent themselves, nor always on the plea of weariness from the day's labour, for in the one case many who absent themselves from prayer meeting can find time to visit their clubs and lodges more than once a week, while in the other case a woman's work is as fatiguing to her as the man's is to him." It is stated in the report of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories "that some of the replies which have been made in connection with the prayer-meeting are favourable, and that others are discouraging. Some of the elders and other members of the Church take part in leading in prayer." It is clear to your Committee, that when every allowance has been made for extenuating circumstances, the prayer meeting ought to be, and can easily be, more largely and regularly attended.

As the members of Assembly are well aware, there is no question of more vital importance to the cause of morality and integrity and religion in its highest aspects, than that of family worship, and the offering to God of the morning and evening sacrifices of praise and prayer in the homes of all the members of our Church. There is no exaggeration in the statement which is contained in the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London, "When family worship goes, family religion will not long remain, and when once family religion is gone, we have nothing to supply its place. The loss is irreparable." This is the tenor of the Reports concerning family worship; "It is faithfully observed, especially in the country." "The usual confession has to be made regarding the neglect of family worship. Only a portion of the people observe it." "Glad that so many observe, and sorry that so many neglect it." These words occur in the Report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston in connection with family worship. "This feature of the Report calls for deep humiliation, heartfelt confession of sin, and prayer to God that He may guide us in the earnest consideration of this matter to the best steps to have this paralyzing blight upon our beloved Church speedily removed." The Report of the Preebytery of Regina is to the effect, "That family worship is observed in few of the homes, though, even in this instance, the practice is becoming more common. Family worship is observed in some cases by families the heads of which make no profession of religion." Your Committee are convinced that family worship is not receiving the wide and solemn attention which it deserves; and that, therefore, the necessity is urgent of using every available means for impressing on our people the paramount value of having members of the same family worship God with unfailing regularity and decorum in the common home.

The members of Assembly will be glad to learn that there is a continuous increase in the development of the spirit of liberality among the members of our Church. A few citations from the reports which your Committee have received, cannot fail to be interesting and satisfactory, so far as the liberality of our members is concerned. "On the whole the grace of liberality is on the increase." "In one or two congregations the contributions have nearly doubled during the last twelve months." "From year to year, we are progressing in liberality." "There is an improvement in the liberality of the people." "The people abound more and more in liberality." "Almost without exception the reports speak cheeringly of growing liberality." "In the large majority of cases the improvement is very marked." One of the Presbyteries in the Synod of Hamilton and London furnished the very gratifying information that "Some of the brethern faithfully set apart one-tenth of their incomes for the Lord's cause, the average for the year per family being \$42.50." These sensible words are subjoined, "May their zeal provoke many." From the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, the gladdening intelligence comes that there is a continued advance in the contributions of the people for Christian objects. In one case, the average of \$60 per communicant is reported as having been reached, and in

another in the same Presbytery, an advance of fifty per cent.

As to how a spirit of still larger liberality can be evoked, your Committee beg to make a few extracts from the Reports of the various Synods. "If the people are to give, they must be fully informed as to the object to be aided both at home and abroad." "Were more information given concerning the Mission Schemes, and general work of the Church, more business systems followed, and greater attention given to the more frequent ingathering of many small sums, by weekly offerings, and thanksgiving gifts for special mercies, we would yet find a more marked increase." "To promote liberality, recourse is had to teaching from the pulpit, to the giving of information in behalf of the various objects for which an appeal is made, and to the adoption of the envelope system." Your Committee are strongly of the opinion, that as a Church we have reason to be thankful that the liberality of our members is marked and steady in its development; and that as we regard the necessity of undertaking still larger labours for our common Saviour in the time that is yet to be, no reasonable doubt oan be felt regarding the possibility, and indeed the certainty, of obtaining a sufficiency for even extensive operations.

In seeking to ascertain the influence which is excited by the religious life of the members of our Church, your Committee beg to state that they had no desire to demand or to encourage any unwise introspection. They deferred to the criterion which the Son of God Himself has given, and which must commend itself to the judgment of all men: "By their fruits ye shall know them." It is at no time to be forgotten that we are, to a large extent, our brother's keeper, and that those

who profess to be members of the body of Christ, are to be always heedful that their external life, lived as it is and must be, in the daylight of the world's observation, exhibits the spirit of Christ, and is worthy of praise and imitation. Your Committee are not surprised that such answers as these have been returned to the inquiry, of which mention has just been made: "The question is practically unanswersale;" 'Sessions speak with the greatest caution on this point." All refer to the difficulty of definitely ascertaining this influence." The Reports which your Committee have examined, contain, however, such favourable testimony as these citations indicate; "The influence is good in stimulating other churches;" 'The influence is for good, morally and spiritually; "The Christian example set by many of our people excites a salutary influence on society, and also affords hopeful testimony regarding the genuineness of their profession:" "The influence is salutary, wholesome, elevating. The moral tone is leading the careless to attend on ordinances, is sustaining the temperance sentiment of the community, and is promoting the better observance of the Sabbath by those even who are not professedly religious." Your Committee believe, that the members of Assembly will regard with great satisfaction, the evidence which is thus furnished respecting the wholesome influence that the consistent life of those members of our Church is quietly yet powerfully exerting. Nor can there be any hesitation in acquiescing in the pious wish which is contained in the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London: "Would to God that the immense host of God's Israel, constituting this and all the Churches of the land, fully realized the potency and far-reaching influence of their daily life for good or ill, and also the

weighty burden of their consequent responsibility."

Your Committee beg to commend very warmly the great interest which is taken by our Church in the education of the young. The truth must always deserve careful consideration and reflection, that the boys and girls of to-day will, in a few years, be the men and women of the Church, who can powerfully affect its vitality and control its operations. There is an ever-accumulating amount of evidence in favour of this contention, that education in working and giving for the cause of Christ, cannot be relegated with safety to early manhood and womanhood; and that, accordingly, as soon as there is even a moderate measure of intelligence, it is wise to instruct children in the principles of the Christian faith, to set before them the all-embracing work which the Christian Church has to do, and the claims which the Saviour of the world has, and which He makes, on the active sympathy and co-operation of the boys and girls and men and women who constitute His Church upon the earth. Your Committee are happy to find that Sunday schools are held through the entire boundary of our Church. Everywhere a large amount of attention is given to the training of the young. "All the reports speak of Sabbath schools, infant, and Bible classes. Sabbath school libraries, in many cases congregational libraries, and addresses to the young from the pulpit weekly, monthly or occasionally." The religious welfare of the young is promoted by Sabbath schools, Bible classes, parental instruction and training;" "A brief address is delivered to the children each Lord's day in one or two cases." Those citations contain a very fair representation of the various means that are employed to advance the religious instruction of the young. Your Committee regret to find complaints in some of the Reports that religious instruction is largely ignored in many of the homes, and that thus obedience is not given to the command of Paul, "And ye, fathers, provoke not your children to wrath, but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." These extracts from the reports which your Committee have received, are unambiguous enough: "There is a sad complaint of lack of parental instruction;" "Parents should be addressed more frequently on their obligations to give spiritual instruction to their children"; "The young are very much without religious instruction in their homes." In the excellent report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston it is stated, "that there is a large amount of faithful instruction given at home by parents to their children, supplementing the influence of Christian example and the exercise of family worship; but that it is greatly to be feared, that in a very large number of families, the instruction is either very imperfect or wholly neglected, and devolved upon Sabbath schools. This is an evil of the greatest magnitude, calling for the gravest consideration and the wisest and most earnest action of the whole Church." The members of Assembly will thus perceive, that very much yet remains to be done before it can be said, that the religious instruction of the young is receiving, in the homes of our people, the continuous care and earnest attention to which it is unquestionably entitled. "Pulpit addresses; the giving of missionary information;" the circulation of suitable literature;" "collections every Sunday, and a special ellection monthly for missions; " "the children are trained to give to all the missions of the Church; "Parents should train each child to give, however humble the offering." Such are some of the replies that have been made to the inquiry: as to what is done to develop the spirit of liberality among the young. The members of Assembly will be gratified to learn that "sums ranging from \$100 to \$700 were contributed last year towards the schemes of the Church, directly by the children," in the Presbytery of Montreal. Your Committee have to state that the means which are adopted to bring the young into full communion with the Church are "personal dealings by pastors and teachers; special appeals from the pulpit, especially at communion seasons: parents are urged to guide their children to acceptance of Christ and profession of His name, and for this purpose to enter into frank conversation with them."

In their desire to ascertain the number of those above eighteen years of age who are not communicants, your Committee had before them the grand ideal of the Christian Church, which involves no less than this that as soon as boys and girls who have been admitted into the Christian Church by the sacrament of Baptism, have gained a sufficient measure of intelligence, they

are to become communicants. Your Committee would take the liberty of reminding the members of Assembly, that the wise and godly men who laid the foundation of Presbyterianism in Scotland, though they refrained from specifying the age at which boys and girls ought to become communicants, were of opinion that no one under twelve years of age ought to be thus admitted. It may be safely maintained that the sessions of our Church are guided by their own wisdom, and by what they know of the character of boys and girls, in determining when the latter are to be admitted into full communion with the Church. Your Committee regret to find, that a much larger number above eighteen years of age than they could beforehand have suspected, are not communicants. When the members of Assembly are informed, that in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there are 225, 200, 145, 80, 85, in certain congregations who, though they are above eighteen years of age, are not communicants; and that in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston there are 150, 145, 124, 100, 200, 70, to whom the same remarks apply, it will be evident that we are very far from approximating the ideal of the Christian Church, and that there is an unmitakable necessity of seeking, by some commendable means, to do ampler justice to the claims which the Son of God has on the avowed homage of those who were baptized in His name.

It is stated in the Report of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces "that there has been a genuine awakening in the Presbytery of Sydney, and that in the twelve congregations from which reports have come, a thousand have been added to the membership of the Church during the past year." Special services were held in several congregations of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa during the past year. The question is asked by the Presbytery of Quebec "whether it would not be well for the General Assembly to appoint deputies to visit the various congregations as the Established and Free Churches of Scotland as now doing?" It appears from the Report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, that Evangelistic services were held in forty-two congregations belonging to that Synod, and on the whole with good results. The views of a certain session in the Presbytery of Toronto are these: "We believe the tendency increasing in the Churches to depend on imported helpers is adapted to weaken the sense of divine obligation resting on every member to be a helper of the Lord in the work, and also to promote on the part of office-bearers, a reluctance in fulfilling the duties to which on their ordination they have been set apart by the Holy Spirit." These remarks are made in the report of the Synod of Hamilton and London: "There is little disposition on the part of Sessions to use any other than the ordinary means. Sessions judging of the utility of special services from an older experience give a more unfavourable testimony. One Report mentions that some years ago special services were held, "many young people made a profession, went to the Lord's table, but have absented themselves ever since." It is obvious, therefore, that a wide diversity of opinion prevails in the Church regarding the permanent value of what have come to be designated Evangelistic or special services. There is cause for thankfulness whenever services of that character conduce to the building up of our people in their most holy faith; and when fruits that are valuable and lasting result from them.

Your Committee beg to make a few citations from the report of the Synod of Manitobs and the North-west Territories respecting the remarkable success which has attended special services that were held in the city of Winnipeg: "During the early part of the year continuous meetings extending over some weeks were held by the Pastors of St. Andrew's and Knox Church, Winnipeg, in their respective cong-egations. As the result, a very deep interest was awakened both among those in full communion, and those who up to this time made no profession of faith in Christ. . . The good accomplished was not restricted to the adherents of the congregations whose pastors had identified themselves with the work. . . At the spring communion in Knox Church ninety-four made public profession of their faith in Christ, and in St. Andrew's 151. . . . The whole work calls for profound thankfulness to God."

So far as hindrances are concerned, your Committee have to acquiesce in the Report of the Presbytery of Montreal, "that they vary very little in the procession of the years." "World-liness, intemperance, indifference," "Too great love of the world, and too little love for Christ," are enumerated as the hindrances which generally prevail. The averment is made in the report of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces: "Religion suffers much from Election-strifes. Political contests seem to injure the cause of Christ." "The social dance, railway traffic and excursions, infidel literature," are elsewhere mentioned among the hindrances which have to be encountered. There is an harmonious concurrence in the Reports that the best and most efficacious method that can be adopted for meeting and overcoming all such hindrances is, the faithful presentation of the truth of God as it is contained in His holy word, along with the firm and judicious employment of private remonstrance on the part of members of our Church.

Your Committee beg respectfully to state, that in their judgment the best and most satisfactory solution of the question: as to how the work of Christ can be performed by us and by our Church at large, in a better and more efficient manner, or rather in the best and most efficient manner, is by the wise and earnest intermingling and enforcement of such suggestions and recommendations as these, occurring as they do in the reports of the various Synods: "A revival of strict Presbyterial visitation." "Stated conferences in each session and congregation." More spiritual life in pulpit and pew." "Let all the members work for the Master, and let none be idle." "A fuller consecration of ourselves to God, a fervent conviction that our work in the world is to advance Christ's cause first, and that each is his brother's keeper."

It does not appear that the recommendations of the last General Assembly were followed with any great degree of faithfulness, nor is it possible to state that there is any agreement in the

Your Committee have thus sought as faithfully and lucidly and succinctly as they could, to present a connected and intelligible summary of the reports which were submitted to them. They venture to express the belief that, in view of the perceptible and material progress which has been witnessed during the past Ecclesiastical year, we have abundant reason to be grateful to God, the giver of all good. They are confident, in consideration of the experience of past years, and owing to the lofty sense of duty which happily prevails among the office-bearers and members of our Church, that a speedy improvement will be effected in the more unfavourable phases of our religious life and ecclesiastical working, to which the attention of the Assembly has been respectfully directed; so that in the time that is before us, our Church will possess a still nealthier and more vigorous vitality, as well as a larger, and a braver and a more conscientious army of men and women; and be thus enabled to achieve more conspicuous conquests, and to gain richer and goodlier laurels for the Prince of Peace, and the King of Glory.

Your Committee cannot omit to advert to the very gratifying reflection that, though this important and very extensive portion of the Dominion of Canada was comparatively unknown a few years ago to those of our members whose homes are in the eastern and older provinces; and though it may be said that the active settlement and occupation of Manitoba and the North-west Territories, dates almost from yesterday, so far as Presbyterians are concerned; it has been possible, through the rare wisdom and untiring energy of the representatives of our Church in this part of our country, and by the liberal co-operation of our members everywhere, to plant the banners of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in the cities and towns and villages, and rural settlements, of this magnificent portion of our Dominion; insomuch that incredible as it may almost seem, we have already reached the dimensions, and have gathered the goodly proportions of a very active, and earnest, and intelligent and powerful Synod—the Synod of Manitoba and the North-west Territories. And if the heroism of warriors in the strife of arms is wont to gather strength and courage whenever and wherever a signal victory has been gained, should not the extraordinary success which through the blessing of God has already crowned our Church in this portion of Canada, infuse a freshness of faith and devotion into the hearts and spirits of all our members, from the Atlantic to the Pacific?

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ECCLESIASTICAL CO-OPERATION.

The Committee on Co-operation with other Evangelical Churches in destitute mission fields beg leave to report that they have not held any conference with any similar committee during the year,

as, so far as they are aware, no similar committee has been appointed by any other Church. Since last Assembly, however, the General Conference of the Methodist Church has had under its consideration the scheme which was then submitted and referred to Presbyteries. As the Assembly will desire to know the precise action taken by the Conference, the Resolution which was

carried may here be given, as taken from the published Journal of its Proceedings, p. 114. It is as follows:—"That the General Conference appoint a Commission in each Annual Conference, who shall be and are hereby empowered to deal with the proposed scheme for the consolidation of the work on certain Missions, having due regard to the principle laid down in the Resolution of a Joint Commission already reported to this Conference; said Commission to be composed of the Presidents of the Annual Conferences, Chairmen of Districts, and five laymen to be appointed by the Special Commistee of each Annual Conference; said Commission to report to its Annual Conference at the next ensuing Session for confirmation, without which their recommendation shall not take effect."

APPENDIX NO. 26.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING BOARD FOR MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORIES FOR 1886-7.

During the past year the Board assisted in erecting fifteen churches, in purchasing two buildings to be used as churches, in removing a mortgage that was to be foreclosed (and the foreclosure of which would deprive a congregation of its place of worship), and in erecting three manses. The drought that prevailed in several parts of the country and the financial stringency induced thereby checked building operations somewhat, but increased activity is shown this spring. Grants and loans were voted for the following congregations:—

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

Emerson.—A town near the international boundary line, on the Pembina Branch Railway, surrounded by a good farming country. Suffered much through the "boom," but is recovering. Loan of \$500 to help remove mortgage that was to be foreclosed.

Fort Frances.—Situated at the outlet of Rainy Lake. Important farming and lumbering district, of which the town is the business centre. Additional grant of \$101.49, making in all \$137.49 on

church worth \$1,000.

Blythefield.—Important farming and ranching district, twenty miles south-west of Winnipeg. Loan of \$340 on manse costing \$680.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

Morden.—Important town on Pembina Mountain Railway. Additional loan of \$250, making \$750 on a church worth \$1,500.

Pilot Mound.—Situated on Pembina Mountain Railway, in the midst of a fertile farming district.

Loan \$500, to purchase a hall that cost \$1,000. The original cost of the building was \$3,000.

Boissevain.—A growing town on the Pembina Mountain Railway, 183 miles from Winnipeg, surrounded by a good farming country. Loan of \$500 on a building costing \$1,000.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

Knox Church, Brandon.—Brandon, the most important town in Manitoba west of Winnipeg. Loan of \$370, to purchase a hall worth \$1,250. Knox Church is the new congregation recently organized.

Necpana.—Thriving town on the M. & N.-W. Railway near the Riding Mountains, surrounded by well-settled farming district. Loan \$400 to erect a manse vosting \$850.

Tummel.—Farming district in Shell River County. Grant o \$100 to assist in building church, to

Tummel.—Far cost \$500.

Shoal Lake.—Town charmingly situated on lake of same name. Summer resort. Loan of \$300 on church costing \$1,200.

Strathclair.—Station on the M. & N.-W. Railway. Fertile farming district. Grant of \$100 on church worth \$900.

Birtle.—Enterprising town on the M. & N.-W. Railway at the crossing of F. Bird Tail River. Loan of \$550 on a church costing \$2,000.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

Fort Qu'Appelle.—Beautifully situated in the valley of river of same name, surrounded by a good farming country. Congregation built stone chur 1, and when near completion it was destroyed by fire. With great energy the congregation undertook to rebuild, and the church was opened in January last. In the exceptional circumstances the Board voted grant of \$400 on a church worth \$2,000.

Of these building 77 are churches, 4 church-manses and 13 manses. Nineteen are built of hewed logs, 67 are frame buildings, 3 brick and 5 stone.

Two of the Churches aided by the Board were consumed by fire last summer. One of these was

insured for nearly three times the amount of the grant made by the Board. The other was without any insurance. Both congregations are building again.

The foregoing statement will enable the Church to understand over how wide an area the operations of the Board extend, and how much has been done to give visibility and permanence to the work of the Church. The aim of the Board has been to assist Presbyteries in planting churches in all centres of population; and the success has been such that no village or town of any size or promise

all centres of population; and the success has been such that no village or town of any size or promise in the Synod is without a church or the prospect of one this season.

The Board are pleased to report that congregations repaid on moneys advanced them \$2,002.15 last year, as against \$322 the previous year. As the circumstances of the country improve repayments may be expected to became more and more a source of revenue. For some time, however, owing to financial stringency, the Board cannot hope to call in its loans. Good security, in the shape of mortgages or notes, has been obtained in almost every case.

The Board feel the debt of obligation under which they lie to members and adherents of the Church in the Eastern Provinces who had so generously helped in this work of church extension. The Board can assure the subscribers to this Fund that every care is taken to grant aid only where there is promise of usefulness, and that steps are taken to see that those who receive aid exert themselves according to their ability.

selves according to their ability.

Grants rather than loans have been made oftener than was contemplated when the fund was Grants rather than loans have been made oftener than was contemplated when the lund was created. The Board regard this method of helping congregations as more economical in many cases than making loans. The circumstances of many congregations preclude the prospect of their repaying any moneys loaned them for several years, if they are to assist in the support of ordinances. Hence small grants were made instead of larger loans, leaving congregations free to support ordinances. As the circumstances of these congregations improve an annual collection will be taken up which will soon recoup the Board for their outlay. The interest received from investments and from money at credit in the Bank has paid these grants in part. Part of them, however, has been made from capital. As the extent of the Board's power to make grants from capital is not clearly defined in the regulations, it is suggested that any apparent ambiguity be removed.

Since the number of congregations and Presbyteries is likely to increase, the Board would suggest that the number of the Board be increased to fifteen, due regard being had to Presbyterial representation. At present the Board is composed of nine members.

From the census (taken two years ago in the Territories, and in Manitoba last year) it would appear that at least one-third of the white population is Presbyterian. Presbyteries are planting stations and organizing mission fields at a rapid rate. It is most desirable that congregations should be delivered from the necessity of meeting in "dugouts" or uncomfortable outhouses. There are nearly 400 separate points at which the services are held, and the churches number about 100, or a church for every fourth station. There are about 110 separate congregations and mission fields

and only twenty-three manses.

There is submitted herewith the Treasurer's statement, and also a letter from the Superintendent

of Missions showing the effect of the Fund on the work of the Church in the Synod.

The Board cordially welcome the Assembly to Winnipeg, and express the hope that Commissioners may be able to visit different parts of the country and see for themselves the effect this Fund has had in advancing the cause of morals and religion.

The Board are convinced that church extension in this country will be greatly impeded without a healthy Bullding Fund, and they are convinced that information only is required to secure the means needed to keep pace with the demands of settlement.

The regulations with changes proposed are as follows :-

I. The Fund shall be called The Church and Manse Building Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for Manitoba and the North-West.

m Canada for Manitoba and the North-West.

2. The amount to be aimed at in the first place shall be one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000); the Fund shall be raised by subscriptions and bequests.

3. The management of the Fund shall be entrusted to a Board of fifteen members, twelve of these to be appointed annually by the General Assembly. The other members of the Board shall be the Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba and the North-West, the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of the General Assembly, Western Section, and one member to be appointed by the said Committee. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancies made by death or resignation until the meeting of the next General Assembly thereafter. The usual place of meeting of the Board shall be Winnipeg.

4. All applications for aid in the erection of churches or manage shall be made to this Board.

4. All applications for aid in the erection of churches or manses shall be made to this Board through the Presbytery within whose bounds the congregation is situated, and before being considered by the Board must be recommended by the Presbytery; but the Board shall be so's judge as to the merits of the application, and the nature and amount of sid to be given.

5. The money constituting the Fund shall be, at the discretion of the Board, either invested

and the revenue accruing therefrom given in the form of grants to congregations to assist in the

erection of churches or manses, or the capital shall be employed to make loans or grants to such

6. Such loans shall be for a limited number of years, and at a moderate rate of interest. For

good reasons the Board may remit the interest.
7. The assistance given, when in the form of a grant, shall not exceed one-fifth of the total cost of the building; and when in the form of a loan shall not exceed fifty per cent. of the cost, unless in either case the circumstances are by the Board deemed exceptional. The money shall be payable only when the buildings can be used for service, in the case of grants. In the case of loans the money voted may be paid in justalments as the work of construction advances. No grant, however, is to be made or loan effected until the Board is satisfied that a valid title to the property, or a bond to that effect, has been secured by the congregation, and that the deed is in the form approved by the General Assembly.

8. It shall be competent for the Board, with the approval of the General Assembly, to make changes in these regulations, but such changes shall have due regard to the proper preservation of the capital entrusted to the Board.

9. The Board shall report its transactions annually to the General Assembly through the Home Mission Committee.

STATEMENT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS.

The Church and Manse Building Fund was born of necessity. For several years before the North-West was connected with the outside world by rail, settlers in considerable numbers were coming in. Their numbers increased as the prospects of a railway brightened. A large proportion of the new comers were Presbyterians. Many of them were young, with characters unformed and with religious convictions unsettled. Some were in quest of homes, others of wealth. The wholesome retraints of settled society were wanting. With the break-up in associations and the absence of restraint there lay the danger of the religious instincts becoming enfeebled and the sense of moral whilestical blunted. If religious instincts are not placed among themselved to the teachings of any obligation blunted. If religious institutions were not planted among them and the teachings of early life followed up, indifference, irreligion and vice were certain to become prevalent. The facts were laid before the Church, and prompt and energetic action was taken. Missionaries were appointed. and money voted to support them.

But no sooner did missionaries appear on the ground than other difficulties presented themselves. There were neither churches in which to hold services, nor houses to shelter missionaries and their families. The Foreign Mission Committee appropriates its money to erect chapels, our chase bungalows or procure health retreats. The moneys of the Home Mission Committee can only be

voted to help pay the salaries of missionaries.

My first tour through our mission fields opened my eyes. Settlement was being rapidly effected. but for the eight years between 1874 and 1882 only fifteen churches had been erected. School houses were very few in number, and when available the low seats and narrow spacing proved rather houses were very tew in number, and when available the low seats and narrow spacing proved rather trying to the long leg and longer thigh of the athletic Manitobans. I shall say nothing of the trials of female dress with its projections and distensions. Services were consequently held for the most part in private houses, and as the ceiling was sometimes low and formed of hay or sod, it seemed a blessing to be short of stature. In summer, stables and stable lofts, hyres and granaries, were fitted up; but the crowing, clucking and cackling of irreverent poultry, the barking of dogs, or the gambols of cattle, were too trying to the risibilities of the young; and odours more pungent than pleasant gave

of cattle, were too trying to the risibilities of the young; and odours more pungent than pleasant gave the sensitive nostril or the refractory stomach an excuse to rebel.

Railway stations and section houses, unfinished stores and dwelling houses, private and public halls were extemporized into churches wherever available; but the rent of halls frequently left little of the revenue to be applied on salary, as such halls were built "on spec," and supposed to pay the three years. Hotel parlours and dining rooms, billiard and bar rooms were secured, but only occasionally. It was feared by the owner that the service might interfere with the legitimate trade of the place. I have preached in the front of the house when the proprietor was selling whiskey in the rear, but I had the satisfaction of knowing that he was fined \$200 and sent six months to gaol. Ludicrous incidents could be given and laughable stories told. But missionaries compelled to labour in this way felt as if they laboured in vain and spent their strength for naught.

The need of manses was greater still. Missionaries could get houses to rent at only a few points, and \$20 per month was asked for very inferior accommodation. When it is borne in mind that the salary was only \$800, it will be seen that it was impossible for a minister to engage a house

that the salary was only \$800, it will be seen that it was impossible for a minister to engage a house at such a figure. I have visited delicate refined women and cultured ministers in houses scarcely fit at such a figure. I have visited defloate refined women and cultured immisters in losses scarcely at to shelter cattle. Dr. Guthrie, in appealing to Scotish audiences for money with which to build manses for Free Church ministers, pointed his appeals with incidents of heroic suffering. Cases of greater hardships could be cited in the history of missions in Manitoba. Disappointment, sickness and diminished power for work followed. Man lost their "spring"—their energy, and the work languished. An effort was made to reach the ear of the East, but a wilderness lay between, and Eastern pastors were busy with their own work.

But why did not the people build? They could not. Many of them were poor—financial pressure drove them from the homes of their youth. For the first few years it was all outgo and no income with them. Building timber could not be had but at a few points; lumber and hardware were dear. Something had to be done to encourage, to stimulate, else the work would fail. Such were the circumstances that called the Fund into existence, and similar circumstances created fands

in the American churches.

The effect of the Fund on the work of the Church has been unmistakable.

R'y; Morden, Manitou, Filot Mound and Boissevain, on the Pembina Mountain R'y, not to speak of Lethbridge and McLeod, Edmonton, Battleford, Fort Saskatchewan, Carman, Fort Qu'Appelle and the rest, all owe their churches to this Fund-During the last five years 82 churches, 4 church manses and 17 manses have been built, or 103 structures in all, and of these 94 were assisted from the Church and Manse Fund. For the eight years prior to the existence of the Fund only 15 churches and manness were built, or not quite an average of 2, while since the existence of the Fund the average has been nearly 2 a year.

The possession of a church has increased the audience, and widened the sphere for the ministers' usefulness. Jones would not attend services held in Brown's house, and Brown honestly paid Jones back; both attend services in the church.

A church affords facilities for the prosecution of Sabbath school work. In a country where religious training is too often neglected at home, the Sabbath school is scarcely less important than the public service. The attendance at the Sabbath schools has increased nearly tenfold since the Fund was organized.

Churches have increased attendance on public service and swelled the revenues of congregations. Until Port Arthur had a church it received \$300 from the Home Mission Fund; with the dedication of its church the congregation became self-sustaining. The contributions of Edmonton went up from \$300 to \$700, and those of Rat Portage from \$550 to \$1,000. Calgary became self-sustaining in three years, and now gives its pastor \$1,200 per annum. Regina, Boissevain, Virden, Qu'Appelle, Oak lake and other centres experienced similar benefits.

The increase in congregational contributions has enabled the Church to extend her constitutions.

Lake and other centres experienced similar benefits.

The increase in congregational contributions has enabled the Church to extend her operations. The money saved in older districts has been available for work in new fields. If to-day there is no settlement of any size or a centre of any promise where a missionary of the Church is not ministering to the religious wants of the people, it is to a considerable extent due to the operations of the Church and Manne Board. The Fund has been a valuable aid in church extension.

It has saved money directly to missionaries and the funds of the Church. Seventeen manses have been already erected. At an average rental of \$15 per month an annual saving of \$3,060 is effected. This sum capitalized at 8 per cent., the ruling rate of bank interest, would amount to \$38,250, or four-fifths of the total amount expended by the Board. Wherever the minister of an augmented congregation is provided with a manse, he receives \$50 less from the Augmentation Fund. These manses have contributed to the comfort of our missionaries, and so removed the reproach of neglect on the part of the Church. It has increased their power to help young people, and so to weld the congregation into a compact whole.

The timely aid extended has cheered the hearts of missionaries and people, it has helped to make the Church one and keep the west closely attached to the east. In their times of political disintegration this is a national blessing.

With all that has been done the work of the Board is only beginning. New fields in considerable

With all that has been done the work of the Board is only beginning. New fields in considerable numbers are being occupied every year. Four-fifths of the ministers are without manses, and three-fourths of the points occupied are without churches.

During last summer several contributors to the Fund, from Toronto, Montreal and other centres, visited the country. They expressed themselves much pleased with the work of the Board, and they have increased their former contributions. Their cordial approval influenced their acquaintances to belot the work. help the work.

APPENDIX NO. 27.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LOTTERIES.

Your Committee to whom it was remitted by last General Assembly to inquire regarding the state of the law on lotteries in the several Provinces of the Dominion beg leave to report thereon, as instructed. They find.—

instructed. They find,—

That in Nova Scotia the law is all that can be desired, visiting raffles or other species of lottery with a penalty of \$40 or a month's imprisonment. But the law is systematically violated at Roman Catholic Church bazaars, and by one of the Secret Societies.

That in New Brunswick there is also a law against lotteries, but there is some doubt felt as to its force.

That in Ontario the law prohibits lotteries in general, but makes an exception in favour of raffles for prizes of small value for charitable objects.

That in Quebec the law prohibits lotteries on the same terms as in Ontario, and makes the same exception, only there is no limit to the value of the prizes that may be offered, on behalf of religious or charitable objects.

That your Committee have not thus far been able to obtain information respecting the law on this subject in the Provinces of Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia.

They find also,—
That the law of God, vindicated by His providence, is that in the sweat of their faces shall men
eat bread—that if they work not, neither shall they eat—that God has called us to honest labour as
the condition of our health, virtue and happiness; and that any temptation held out to men to obtain
subsistence by other means tends to vice.

Parsuaded of the importance of having wholesome views on this subject prevail, and of the danger of allowing the people's minds to get familiarized with gambling in any form as a thing to be tolerated; and as it is the duty of the Church to bear witness against every species of evil and in favour of truth and righteousness, your Committee recommend that it be an instruction to Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions to take order:

1. That the people be warned from the pulpit against trusting to chance in any of the concerns of life, small or great, and, especially, that vigilance be exercised that no form of lottery be sanctioned at Church sales or bazaars.

2. That all attempts to obtain a legal recognition for lotteries where the law does not at present recognize them be vigilantly watched, and that all legitimate means be employed to defeat such attempts.

3. That influence be brought to bear upon the legislators in those Provinces in which the vicious principle is legalized that lotteries are deprived of their immorality when employed in connection with Churches and charities, with a view to having the exceptional clauses referring to Churches and charities repealed.

As the question has been raised whether the matter involved does not pertain to the jurisdiction of the Federal Parliament rather than of the Provincial Legislatures; and as the information relating to the subject designated a year ago has not yet been all obtained, your Committee recommend the reappointment of a Committee to prosecute the inquiry; and would suggest the addition of a member from each of the Provinces of Prince Edward Island, Manitoba and British Columbia.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR 1886.

In submitting their report, your committee would begin by stating that a circular was issued in the month of July last to all Presbyteries, informing them of the action of last Assembly to instruct congregations in their bounds to change their year, where necessary, so as to coincide with the calendar year. In another circular, sent out in January of the present year, one question was, "Do the congregations in your bounds make their year close with the calendar year?" and in the replies which have been received (and only five Presbyteries, namely, Victoria and Richmond, Quebec, Ottawa, Lanark and Renfrew, and Sarnia, have failed to answer) by far the greater number answer in the affirmative. Some give a modified reply, such as, "threy try to do so," "nearly all," "majority," etc., so that it is evident that the injunction of the Assembly has been received favorably, and there is reason to expect that in a very short time all congregations will be found complying with the resolution of the Supreme Court, which was not adopted without time and opportunity for full and mature consideration.

In accordance with this resolution the questions prepared and sent down to congregations were intended

In accordance with this resolution the questions prepared and sent down to congregations were intended to collect information only to the end of December, 1886, whether nine or twelve months, according to the date at which the previous returns had closed. The same form usef followed in the sheets prepared for Presbyteries. From the printed report it will be seen what congregations have made, or required to make, the change directed; and it must be apparent that, as the number is comparatively small, there was no diffi-

change directed; and it must be apparent that, as the number is comparatively small, there was no dimensity in the way of carrying the resolution into general effect.

At this stage your Committee may remark that they would be justified in not instituting a comparison, as on former occasions, between the year ending with December, 1886, and the previous year. The returns for that year covered twelve calendar months, those dealt with in this report are for varying periods; many of them for twelve, some for nine, a few for six, and one even for two months. Yet such comparison has been made in almost all instances, and the agreeable fact presents itself that there is generally an increase in the numbers given, whereas a decrease might have been expected, affording evidence of the continued prosperity of the Church, through the blessing of the Most High, and of the receipt by your Committee of fuller returns from congregations and stations.

The fact that the reports are for varying peciods must be kept in mind when inspecting the table of averages, which has been prepared as usual. It exhibits only an approximate view of the liberality of families and members in full communion to the objects specified. Had all returns been for the full period of twelve months, as in former years, the rate would have appeared considerably higher. On looking at the average contributions, over the Church generally, it will be seen that they are almost equal to those of the twelve months immediately preceding, as given in the report of your Committee for part of 1885 and 1886.

In the report presented at the meeting of Assembly in June last year there are the names of 39 Preshyteries, 11 of which were in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces; 6 in that of Montreal and Ottawa; 9 in that of Toronto and Kingston; 9 in that of Hamilton and London, and 4 in that of Manitoba and the North-West Territories. In this report there are the names of 42; one, that of Orangeville, having been formed in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston; one, that of Colun.oia, in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories; and one, that of Indore, in the Foreign Mission Field, and from which returns to this

Mest Territories; and one, that of Indore, in the Foreign Mission Field, and from which returns to this Committee have not been expected. Altogether there are now 41 reporting Presbyteries.

The number of pastoral charges reported is 775, of which 178 are in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces; the largest number, 30, being in the Presbytery of Halifax; the next largest, 29, in that of Prince Edward Island; and the next, 23, in that of St. John; Pictou has 18; Miramichi, 17; Truro, 15; Sydney, 14; Victoria and Richmond, 11; Wallace, 10; Lunenburg and Shelburne, 9; and Newfoundland, from which only one congregation has reported, 2. Compared with the previous year this shows an increase of 5.

In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there are 151 pastoral charges; 40 of these being in the Presbytery of Montreal; 31 in the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew; 25 in that of Ottawa; 20 in Glengarry; 18 in Brockville, and 17 in Quebec. Compared with last year this gives an increase of 9.

In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston there are 207 pastoral charges; 34 of these being in the Presbytery of Toronto; 30 in that of Kingston; 25 in that of Barrie; 23 in Peterborough; the same number in Guelph; 19 in the newly-formed Presbytery of Orangeville; 15 in Owen Sound; 13 in Whitby, and the same in Lindsay; and 12 in Saugeen. This shows an increase of 11 compared with last year, and while sens of the Prebsyteries have a smaller number now than they had then, this is accounted for by the formation of the Prebsytery of Orangeville which affected the Presbyteres of Toronto, Guelph, Barrie and Saugeen.

In the Synod of Hamilton and London 201 pastoral charges are reported; 39 of these being in the Presbytery of Hamilton; 27 in that of London; 22 in that of Maitland; 20 in each of the three Presbyteries of 3 on the previous report.

Only 38 pastoral charges are reported as being in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories against 64 last year, but these included 12 Mission congregations in the Presbytery of Winnipeg, and 22 in that of Brandon, while there was no report in time from Regina. This year the number of bona side charges is given, and of these 5 are in the Presbytery of Winnipeg; 5 in that of Rock Lake; 12 in that of Brandon; 4 in that of Regina, and 12 in that of Columbia.

The number of Mission Stations or groups is 309, of which, as might be expected, the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories contains the greatest part, namely, 134; of which 66 are in the Presbytery of Rock Lake; 32 in that of Regina; 23 in Brandon; 13 in Winnipeg; in Columbia, none reported. The Synod ranking next is that of Toronto and Kingston, with 69 groups, 27 of these, including 82 stations, being in the Presbytery of Barrie. Four Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, namely, Sydney, Victoria and Richmond, Wallace, Prince Edward Island, report no Mission Stations, One Presbytery, that of Whitby, in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, reports that it has none, and so do two, Stratford and Maitland, in the Synod of Hamilton and London. In all the other Presbyteries Mission Stations, or fields or groups are given, varying from the highest numbers already are refield to one. Mission Stations, or fields or groups are given, varying from the highest numbers already specified to one.

This year 94 vacant charges are reported, 26 of these being in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces: 17 in that of Montreal and Ottawa; 25 in that of Toronto and Kingstor; 23 in that of Hamilton and London, and 3 in that of Manitoba and the North-West Territories. Only 7 Presbyteries report that they have no vacancies, namely, St. John, Peterborough, Whitby, Sarnia, Winnipeg, Rock Lake and Regina. There is thus a wide field for ministers and licentiates of the Church desirous of settlement, but even if all these, so far as their numbers can be estimated or ascertained, were called and inducted into charges there would be more than 30 vacancies for which, at present, stated pastors are not available. Can no provision be made for the stated en ployment of those who are not in the active ministry of the Church? Were they all provided for, there would still be reason for the statement that the harvest is plenteous; and for the

prayer that the Lord of the harvest would send forth laborers into his harvest.

Eight hundred and twenty-three ministers, including those retired, professors in colleges, agents of the Church, ordained missionaries, etc., so far as returns have been received, are reported as having their names on the rolls of Presbyteries, the largest number, 47, being in the Presbytery of Montreal, and the next, 44, being in that of Toronto, the fewest, 2, being in that of Newfoundland. There are besides these 56 ministers residing in bounds of Presbyteries whose names are not on rolls, but this is almost certainly too small a number, as four Presbyteries have not replied to the question, namely, Victoria and Richmond, Ottawa, Lanark and Renfrew, and Sarnia. It may be safely affirmed that there are nearly 900 ministers in the Church, nearly all in active employment, some not at present actively engaged in stated work, but looking for it, some occupying the position of pastores emeriti, some engaged in posts of usefulness and responsibility

for which they have evinced peculiar qualifications.

Of the 775 pastoral charges only 43 have not sent in returns in such time that they could appear in this report. Were those that have come in up to the 20th of May last, after the sheets from Presbyteries were for report. Were those that have come in up to the 20th of May last, after the sheets from Freshyteries were resome weeks in the hands of the printer, and part of the proof revised, taken into the recitoning there would be a diminution to about 40. The greatest number of non-reporting charges, 7, is in the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island. Your Convener wrote for fuller returns, but only one congregation responded. In the Presbytery of Hamilton there are 5. In such of the Presbyteries of Lanark and Renfrew, Brockville and Kingston, there are 4. In the Presbytery of Columbia there are 3. Orangeville, Owen Sound, Stratford and Maitland have 2 each. And each of the Presbyteries of Miramichi, Newfoundland, Montreal, Ottawa, Lindsay, Toronto, London and Rock Lake has 1. If this be compared with last year it will be seen that there is a smaller number of non-reporting charges by 12 than for it; and the Committee do not think that they are too sanguine in expressing the expectation that by another year or two, especially since a change has been made in the date for closing the congregational year, which has scarcely yet had time to be brought into general operation, there will not be a pastoral charge whose statistics will not appear in the printed annual report laid before the Assembly. It is worthy of observation that the greatest number of defaulting congregations are vacancies, and the Committee in different years have had reason to call attention to this and speak of it in way of complaint. There is no reason why vacancies should not be reported as well as settled charges. They have their complete organization and their complete equipment of office-bearers; the only difference being that their Moderator of Sassion is not stated but temporary. Presentations should the only difference being that their Moderator of Session is not stated but temporary. Presbyteries should feel it to be their duty to see to it that the appearance of their statistical reports, as printed, is not marred and disfigured by blanks opposite the names of such congregations, and that the Church is not deprived of the valuable information which is thus withheld.

The total number of churches and stations supplied by ministers is 1,773. Last year there was a decrease in this item as compared with the year before of 154. This year there is an increase of 125. The Synod of the Maritime Provinces, with 178 pastoral charges, contains 491; of which 109 are in the Presbytery of St. John, with its 23 charges; 80 in that of Halifax, with 30 charges; 68 in that of Prince Edward Island, with 29 charges; 43 in Miramichi, with 17 charges; 36 in Sydney, with 14 charges; 35 in Lunenburg and Shelburne, with 9 charges; 34 in Wallace, with 10 charges; 33 in Pictou, with 18 charges; 29 in Truro, with 15 charges; 22 in Victoria and Richmond with 11 charges; and 2 in Newfoundland, with 2 charges.

It will thus be seen that several of the ministers in that Synod have manifold labors in the discharge of their duties from the public and of other nesteral work among the nearly who have hear committed to

of their duties from the pulpit and of other pastoral work among the people who have been committed to their spiritual care. In none of the other Synods with the exception of Manitoba and the North-West Territories are ministers called to such extensive and scattered fields of labor. In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa 253 churches and stations are connected with 151 pastoral charges, not an average of 2 to each: and while in some of the Presbyteries, as that of Ottawa, the average is greater than this, in all the other it is less. The Synod of Toronto and Kingston has 207 pastoral charges, and 372 churches or stations supplied in connection with them. Orangeville and Barrie have an average of more than 2 each; Owen Sound almost two; but all the others fall below this figure. The Synod of Hamilton and London has 201 charges and 320 connected churches or stations; the Presbytery of Chatham having 44 under its 20 charges. Winnipeg, however, has 17 churches or stations and only 5 pastoral charges, but 15 ministers on the roll. Rock Lake has 66 churches or stations with only 5 charges, and 9 ministers on the roll. Brandon has 70, with 12 charges and 26 ministers on the roll. Regina has 105, with 4 charges and 26 ministers on the roll. And Columbia prayer for tation that connection

Is there not in this a call for sympathy and prayer for those who have abundant labors claiming their attention and energy, and warrant for the expectation that our Church shall increase—for will not many of these churches and stations which are now in connection with others become separate and self-supporting?

According to the reports this year there is sitting accommodation for 410,975 persons, being an increase of 30,776 upon the number reported for the previous year. Part of this increase must be ascribed to fuller and more correct returns, and part of it to an increase of church edifices, or the enlargement of some in which worship had been previously conducted. It is a gratifying fact that some congregations have had to provide for themselves new buildings with larger room, and others have had to extend their walls although

they have made no change of site.

they have made no change of site.

Congregations and stations report through their Presbyteries 76,226 families as being connected with them, which gives an increase of 4,315 on the previous year; and 19,697 single persons, about 1,000 more than were then reported. Of the total number of families connected with congregations only 57,441 are reported as contributing to the support of ordinances. The returns on each of these three items are very far from being satisfactory, and your Committee had almost said that their incompleteness—the omissions occurring—are inexcusable. Some sessions do not report the number of families that have committed themselves to their spiritual oversight, and is it uncharitable to conclude that if they cannot do so they are not faithful to the trust they have been called to undertake? May not congregations in most instances, if not in all, and ought they not to be divided into districts, with an Elder specially charged to look after each, who would thus be brought into contact with the families residing in it, and be able to report the number of them? Is not the pastor expected to visit all the families connected with his congregation, and could not he supply correct information on this particular? So, too, with regard to single persons; can they come to the bounds and attend ordinances in the church without some one, either minister or elder, to take notice of them, inquire after their welfare, and encourage them to continue faithful in seeking the God of ordinances? And in at least all city and town congregations would it not be well to have a band of young of them, inquire after their welfare, and encourage them to continue faithful in seeking the God of ordinances? And in at least all city and town congregations would it not be well to have a band of young persons of both sexes charged with looking after strangers that may come to the place, invite them to the house of God, and exercise their influence to encourage them in the walks of Gospel obedience, and report their names to pastor and elder that they may show an interest in their welfare? With regard to the third item—the question first appeared in the report to the Assembly for 1885, and was introduced by the direction of the Assembly of the previous year. The Committee have always had reason to speak of its being not only useless but hurtful. Many congregations have in no year reported the number of contributing tamilies and there have consequently always encountered the number of contributing tamilies and there have consequently appeal compared with the number tamiles, and these have, consequently, always appeared disproportionately small compared with the number of families reported as connected. It is now suggested that the Committee to be appointed for the year now current be allowed to change the question from its present form, and should it also prove contributing to the support of ordinances." Let the question be tried in this form, and should it also prove unsatisfactory let it be withdrawn.

The number of communicants sums up to 136,598. Last year it was 127,611, giving an increase of nearly 9,000. Of that number 18,046 have been added in the course of the year, namely, 12,562 on their own profession of faith and 5,484 on certificate. Last year 10,555 entered into the fellowship of the Church, showing an increase for the year embraced in this report of 2,007, gathered in from the world, and openly and avowedly taking up the cross of Christ to follow him through good and through bad report. In some congregations the accessions have been large, confirming reports that have been published of the outpouring of the Spirit of God in His quickening power in more localities than one. God has been bearing testimony to of the spirit of God in This quickening power in more localities than one. God has been bearing testimony to the word of His grace, and is calling upon the Church gratefully to acknowledge His faithfulness in fulfilling His promise, and to believe and pray that He will bless still and even more largely. Communicants removed during the year are reported as 8,213. The 5,484 added on certificate must include some of these, but the others, not thus included, must not be regarded as lost to the Presbyterian Church, although it is possible that some of them, in removing to new districts, have failed to keep up the church connection to which they had been admitted, or to continue in the improvement of the ordinances which, at one time, they

Baptism was administered to 10,264 infants, during the previous year, an increase of 359, and to 1,051 adults, an increase of 43, forming an aggregate of 11,315, and a total increase of 402.

the average attendance at weekly prayer meetings was 43,708, being an increase of 4,083—figures which again prove that God has been pouring out the Spirit of grace and supplication upon congregations, families and individuals. Who can ascertain, or even conceive, the benefit resulting from the united prayers offered at such meetings to individual saints, to sinners in the way of their conversion, to households, to congregations, to the Church at large, and to the kingdom of Christ in its advancement in heathen lands?

Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes were attended by 108,284 young persons, showing an increase of 7,364; and these were ministered to by 12,070, engaged in Sabbath School work, an increase of 309 on those reported for the previous year.

Volumes in libraries sum up to 183,681, an increase of 154 on the preceding year, while there was a falling off of 2,155 volumes that year as compared with the one immediately going before.

There are 414 Missionary Associations in congregations, with 21 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies and one Ladies' Aid Society. Rock Lake is the only Presbytery in which a Missionary Association does not exist. In Pictou there are 18, one for each pastoral charge. In Toronto there are 32 for 34 pastoral charges. There are 77 such associations in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces with 178 charges; 55 in that of Montreal and Ottawa with 151 charges, but one Presbytery, that of Lanark and Renfrew, reports 17 Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies and one Missionary Association distinct from them. In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston with 207 charges there are 145 Associations, I Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in the Presbytery of Peterborough, and one Ladies' Aid Society in that of Guelph. In the Synod of Hamilton and London there are 117 Associations and 11 in that of Winnipeg and the North-West Territories. Your Committee may observe that in compiling these figures they have confined themselves to the tories. Your Committee may observe that in compiling these figures they have confined themselves to the answers given to the question in the statistical schedule, "Is there a Missionary Association?"

There are provided for ministers 490 manses, 72 rented houses, and 2 not described, in all 564, being an ncrease of 20 on those reported for the year before. 15 manses were built and 36 churches, some of these to take the place of former buildings, and others erected for the first time. One church was enlarged, 2 repaired, and 4 not stated whether they were manses or churches. One hall was also provided.

The following Presbyteries report that they have no Mission Stations in their bounds: Sydney, Wallace, Prince Edward Island, Whitby, Stratford and Maitland. No reports as to whether they have Mission Stations or not have been received from the Presbyteries of Newfoundland, Victoria and Richmond, Lanark and Renfrew, and Columbia. Truro, with 4 Mission Stations, sends no report; Glengarry with 1; Toronto with 7, and London with 2. The Presbytery of Rock Lake with 9 "charges" containing 66 stations, and Regina, with 32 "groups," having 97 "charges," do not report, or else report them without distinguishing them from regular pastoral charges. In the report from Brandon it is stated that there are 8 Indian Missions with 8 missionaries, and 2,432 Indians under religious instruction. The Presbytery of Halifax reports that it has 7 Mission Stations; Lunenburg and Shelburne, 1: St. John, 9 "fields"; Miramichi, 6 stations; Quebec, 8; Montreal, 6; Ottawa, 8, two of these French; Brockville, 4; Kingston, 9 "fields," containing 30 stations; Peterborough, 5 "fields," containing 14 stations; Corangeville, 8; Barrie, 27 "group, 8," containing 82 stations; Owen Sound, 4 groups, containing 14 stations; Saugeen, 3 stations; Guelph, 3; Hanilton, 6; Paris, 2; Chatham, 3; Huron, 1; Bruce, 14 "groups," containing 59 stations, and Winnipeg, 13 stations. Reference has already been made to the other Presbyteries. "groups," containi other Presbyteries.

Your Committee suppose that a distinction has not been observed in the different reports between Mission Fields or Groups, and Mission Stations, so that they are unable to state positively and precisely how many there are each. Looking, however, at the figures given it must be admitted that the Church has a wide, interesting and promising Home Mission Field, and she has warrant to expect that she shall be blessed with such prosperity in the future that these groups or stations shall be erected, and some of them soon, into fully organized congregations under settled pastors.

The reports from these stations have been fuller for the period embraced in this report than for any previous year, although there are not a few defaulters and the returns of some are very incomplete. In the 409 vious year, although there are not a few defaulters and the returns of some are very incomplete. In the 409 churches or stations supplied, according to the returns received, there is sitting accommodation for 19,701 persons; there are 4,400 families, and of these 2,591 are reported a-contributing to the support of ordinances, and 602 single persons. The number of communicants is 5,438, of whom 6,019 were added during the year, namely, 5,438 on profession and 581 on certificate, and 237 were removed by death, or owing to other causes. Baptism was administered to 505 persons, 403 of these being infants, and 102 adults. In these stations there are 196 elders, and 535 other office-bearers. The average attendance at weekly prayer meetings was 2,233, and at Sabbath School and Bible Class 4,396, with 524 engaged in Sabbath School work. The volumes in libraries are returned at 7,425, showing that the children and others having access to them enjoy opportunities of reading works of a religious character and fitted to nowish an intelligent party. Inbrares are returned at 7,425, showing that the children and others having access to them enjoy opportunities of reading works of a religious character and fitted to nourish an intelligent piety. There are 35 Missionary Associations; 32 of these being in the Presbytery of Barrie, the other Presbyteries reporting them being Kingston, Hamilton and Owen Sound, each of which has 1. In the Presbytery of Quebec there are 3 manses in its Mission Fields—Pictou, Brockville and Owen Sound report 1 each, and Winnipeg reports 1 rented house. In the period covered by the report 12 churches were erected in these fields; 2 of these in the Presbytery of Miramichi; 1 in Ottawa; 2 in Lindsay; 4 in Barrie, and 1 each in Owen Sound, Guelph and Winnipeg. This is a gratifying indication of the life and energy that have been called into exercise, and affords promise of future prosperity.

FINANCES.

If it was gratifying to be able to state that the returns on statistics show greater evidence of prosperity than was to be anticipated, it is also gratifying to have to remark that the same thing may be affirmed of

income and expenditure.

On stipend promised from all sources there is an increase of \$15,247, the total amount being \$706,066. These figures, however, do not show the entire sum promised for this purpose; as several congregations, and among these some of the strongest in respect of numbers and ability, do not give any answer to the question. It is difficult to account for the omission on the part of their Treasurers, even if the congregation were vacant, and much more where there are settled pastors. And is there not a dereliction of duty on the part of Presbyteries when such incomplete returns are received by them and forwarded to the Committee without an

effort to procure the information which has been withheld?

The stipend received from all sources was \$667,218. As there was no column under this heading in the forms for last year no comparison can be made. Neither can any judgment be formed as to the actual amount promised, and the actual amount received because of omissions in the replies to the latter question similar to those to which reference has just been made. Your Committee need scarcely be at the trouble of remarking that both these questions are intended for all that comes under the name of stipend, from what

ever quarter it may be derived—whether from the Home Mission, Augmentation or any other fund.

Under the next head "Stipend promised by congregation alone," the aggregate of the returns is \$629,639, which shows an increase of \$954; but in this, as in the two former instances, replies are not full;

and this is true, particularly of charges that have been vacant for the whole or part of the year.

The stipend paid by congregation alone was \$1,100 less than that promised, but \$13,855 less than for the previous year. The aggregate was \$628,539.

Arrears of stipend actually due sum up to \$14,920. It is far from being pleasant to your Committee to have to record this fact, and it is far from creditable to congregations and Presbyteries to have it mentioned against them. In some Presbyteries, and against two or three congregations, the arrears are large and of long standing, although the injunction has been frequently repeated, and, it is to be presumed, has been obeyed, that steps be taken by Presbyteries in which congregations are in arrears to their pastors to have the wallace and Newfoundland—report no arrears. Your Committee have been certified that the last has been paid, as the Presbytery took action \$100 are port no arrears, and the same remark applies to their returns for the year preceding. In all the others there is a decrease on the previous year except Guelph, just mentioned. The total decrease is \$581. In the Synod of Hamilton and London, only two Presbyteries, London and Huron, report no arrears. In the other Presbyteries there is an increase of \$301, the aggregate amount being \$1,914 this year, against \$1,613 last year. In six Presbyteries there is an increase amounting to \$477, and in three a decrease of \$176—the last being London \$37, Stratford \$10, and Huron \$129. In the Synod of Winnipeg and the North-West Territories, the arrears are \$2,540, of which \$148 are in the Presbytery of Winnipeg, against \$1,634 last year; \$436 in that of Rock Lake, last year \$738; \$1,211 in that of Brandon, last year \$1,517; \$745 in that of Regina, last year \$350. Columbia, which appears for the first time in this report, has no arrears. year \$350. Columbia, which appears for the first time in this report, has no arrears.

The amount expended on churches and manses during the year was \$321,297, last year it was \$349,267,

a decrease of \$27,970; and on other strictly congregational purposes, \$292,397, an increase of \$53,867.

The total expenditure for strictly congregational objects was \$1,242,910, or a decrease of \$17,796. Last year there was a still greater falling off in this item, but part of the decrease recorded in this report must be ascribed to the smaller expenditure on churches or manses.

The total contributions to the Schemes of the Church were \$193,453, an increase of \$717. But allowance must be made for some congregations which did not send in remittances owing to the change of the year,

must be made for some congregations which did not send in remittances owing to the change of the year, those which should have appeared in these returns being reserved for next year's report.

Taking these Schemes in their order there were raised for College (ordinary) Fund \$12,479, decrease compared with last year \$595; College (special) Fund, \$24,247, decrease \$1,490; Manitoba College, \$6,134, decrease \$1,551; showing a total decrease of \$3,636. From these figures it will be seen that the falling off is chiefly in the contributions to Manitoba College, and the Special Fund. Your Committee do not think there is any use of tracing this to the different Prosbyteries of the Church. All of these have sent remittances to the Ordinary Fund, with the exception of abose in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, one Presbytery in which, Rock Lake, contributes \$3 to the Special Fund—all contributing to the Manitoba College to the sum of \$1,783. Of this Winnipeg gave \$1,094; Rock Lake, \$59; Brandon, \$423; Regina, \$197; and Columbia, \$10. Only three Presbyteries outside of this Synod have not contributed to the Special Fund, and only two to Manitoba College. The largest amount without any exception raised for this college was by the Presbytery of Toronto, \$1,392; the second by Winnipeg—the sum being already given; and the third, \$741, by Montreal. The smallest amount is from Quebec, \$2; and the next smallest, \$7, from Sydney.

The payments to the Home Mission Fund were \$32,204; last year they were \$32,509, a decrease of \$305. To the Augmentation Fund \$31,256; last year, \$33,077, a decrease of \$1,821, giving a decrease on the two of \$2,126. Last year there was an increase of \$1,534.

For the purposes of the French Evangelization Fund, \$19,884 were reported, a decrease of \$102.

For Foreign Missions, \$50,001 have been contributed, being an increase of \$6,469,—an indication of the fact specially mentioned in the Report of your Committee to last Assembly, that God is awakening the Church to a deeper sense of her duty to fulfil the commission she has received from her King and Head to go Chirch to a deeper sense of her duty to furnithe commission she has received from her King and Head to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. He has been opening to her many doors, and disposing her to enter in. But how much remains to be done that is a waiting the application of the resources. He has placed at her disposal. Your Committee are bound to acknowledge that this increase is mostly owing to the organization and working of Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies under Presbyteries, and in connection with congregations. They are not able to say how much has been raised by the zealous efforts of this new agency. As it appears from the last Report of the Foreign Missionary Society that it has been doing excellent work for years, and prospering therein; as there is evidence that its labors for the year just closing have been even more abundant and funtful; and as it has received the distinct endorsation of the General Assembly, your Committee think that some arrangement should be made to have the contributions General Assembly, your Committee think that some arrangement should be made to have the contributions collected by it reported so as to be published in their Annual Report. It is now suggested, it will immediately appear as a recommendation, that the matter be referred to the Committee about to be appointed for their consideration and action.

For the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, \$7,926 have been raised, an increase of \$36. For the Widows and Orphaus' Fund \$5,782, an increase of \$406. And for the Assembly Expense Fund, \$3,517, a

decrease of \$87.

Collecting the several items which have been thus given, and taking into account some contributions which they do not include, there have been raised for the Schemes of the Church \$193,453, or an increase of \$717 on the contributions of last year.

The average to each under instruction in these classes is about the same for each year, for while there is what must be called a large increase in the income from this source, it must be noted that there is an increase of nearly 8,000 of those contributing. It is good and gladdening to see that our young people are not only brought to receive instruction in Divine truth, but that they are also taught and encouraged to remember those who have not the Gospel, and to help in sending it to them.

For Synod and Presbytery Funds \$7,585 have been raised, giving an increase of \$613; and for all other religious and benevolent purposes, \$82,383, an increase of \$18,423.

Last year the total expenditure for ALL purposes, after adding the returns from Regina, etc., was \$1,580,818, and showed an increase on that of the previous year of \$22,600. The total expenditure for the period embraced in this Report was \$1,533,517. It will be seen that although there is a falling off on the receipts and expenditure of the previous Report yet the change of the year, and the disturbance the ceby made on financial arrangement are more than sufficient to account for it, and that there is abundant cause

made on financial arrangement are more than sufficient to account for it, and that there is abundant cause to acknowledge the goodness of God who has blessed the Church with prosperity as well as peace.

Your Committee may remark here that the Presbyteries of Halifax and Kingston take credit for the payment in full of Professors' and other salaries—only a small portion of which is raised in their bounds. This is not done by the Presbyteries of Montreal, Toronto or Winnipeg.

Your Committee have compiled, as has been done in former years, a table of averages per family and communicant for each of the purposes stated, not taking into account the delayed returns.

These averages are lower than they would have been had the returns been, in all instances, for a full year.

The average contribution per family for stipend alone was \$8.24, and per communicant \$4.60; for all strictly congregational purposes, \$16.30 per family, and \$9.10 per communicant; for the Schemes of the Church, \$2.53 and \$1.41 respectively; and for ALL purposes, \$21.18 and \$11.23. No comparison is instituted between these figures and those for the previous year.

The total amount reported by Mission Stations as raised and paid for the supply of preaching was \$20,855, which was more than \$5,000 in excess of what was promised. For all purposes strictly connected with the Stations, \$30,652 were paid. \$1,106 were contributed to the Schemes of the Church; \$50 of this sum being for Ordinary College Fund, \$135 for Special, and \$37 for Manitoba, from three Presbyteries; \$271 for Home Missions; \$173 for Augmentation; \$168 for French Evangelization; \$228 for Foreign Missions; \$18 for Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund; \$14 for Widows and Orphans' Fund; and \$12 for Assembly Expense Fund. The Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes in only four Presbyteries contributed to Missions; Hamilton sending \$35, Saugeen \$6, Lindsay \$10, and Kingston \$5. The amount contributed to Synod and Presbytery Funds was \$30, and to other religious and benevolent purposes \$400, making an accurage of \$32,188.

aggregate of \$32,188. Before proceeding to give the recommendations with which they would close their report, your Committee may state that from the reports received, 23 Ministers demitted their charges during the year, 4 in each of the Presbyteries of Montreal and Hamilton, 3 in each of the Presbyteries of Barrie and Bruce, 2 in Glengarry and 2 in Chatham, and 1 in each of 15 others. Twenty-six translations were granted and took effect. Ten Ministers were removed by death, 2 of these in the Presbytery of Halifax. Forty Students having completed their course of study were duly licensed, after leave obtained, to preach the Gospel of the Grace of God.

Your Committee would now respectfully recommend:

Your Committee would now respectfully recommend:—

I. That the Committee to be appointed be instructed to alter Question No. 6 in the Statistics, "Number of families contributing to the support of ordinances," so as to secure fuller and more accurate replies.

II. That Presbyteries be enjoined to see to it that the congregations in their bounds carry out the resolution of the General Assembly of June, 1886, by making their year close with the calendar year.

III. That it be a strict injunction to Presbyteries to take steps at once for the payment of all arrears of stipend in their bounds, and to exercise all diligence to prevent arrears from accruing.

IV. That Presbyteries be again reminded of the resolution requiring the appointment in each of a Committee on Statistics, charged with the duty of collecting and tabulating returns from all pastoral charges, whether settled or vacant, and all Mission Stations.

V. That it be referred to the Committee to be appointed to consider the best method of securing reports for publication in the Statistics of the amounts collected from congregations by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, who have been so zealously and so manifestly blessed in their labors.

All of which is respectfully submitted.




REV. JOHN ROSS died at Brucefield on the 8th March, 1887. Mr. Ross, a native of Scotland, was educated at Knox College, and ordained at Brucefield in September, 1851. He was a minister of was concaved at Khox Conege, and ordained at Drucened in September, 1891. He was a minister of great devotedness, good scholarship, conscientious and faithful in an eminent degree. At the Union in 1875 Mr. Ross did not see his way to go along with his brethren, but throughout life enjoyed the confidence, affection and esteem of all who knew him, and exercised a large influence throughout Western Canada, and especially the county of Huron.

REV. J. W. McLEOD died at Tunapuna, Trinidad, on the 1st April, 1887. He was a native of Nova Scotia, studied at Dalhousie College and the Theological Hall, Hallfax. Having been licensed of Truro, he offered himself for Missionary service, and was ordained and designated as missionary to Princestown, Trinidad, on 20th December, 1880. He laboured with great diligence and fidelity, but failing health compelled him to resign his position as a missionary, and confine himself to the instruction of native teachers. In this work he continued to within three weeks of his death.

REV. JAMES PRINGLE.—The Rev. James Pringle, senior minister of Brampton, died on 15th May, 1887. Mr. Pringle, who was a native of Berwickshire, Scotland, was licensed by the Presbytery of Orkney, on 15th May, 1840. In 1847 he came to Canada, and soon after was ordained as minister of Derry West, with which Brampton was afterwards united. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON "THE PRESBYTERIAN RECORD," 1886-87.

There is nothing of special importance to mention in connection with *The Record* during the past year. The managing editor has returned from Europe, and resumed his office work. The Committee have the satisfaction of stating that the circulation of *The Record* has slightly increased since the date of last Report, the number issued for this month (June) being 37,000—the largest in the history of the magazine, and yet there is, the Committee firmly believe, not only room, but need for a very much larger circulation. Many of the congregations are very inadequately supplied with *The Record*. Having in view the rapid growth of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the importance of supplying every member of it with information in regard to the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes under the sapervision of the General Assembly, the Committee respectfully ask the General Assembly anew to commend *The Record*, as its official organ, to the ministers, Kirk Sessions and Presbyteries, requesting them to use their influence so that a copy of *The Record* be put into the possession of every family of the Church. family of the Church.

Finances.—The receipts for the year, irrespective of the balance from last year, were about equal to the expenditure. The balance on hand at this date is \$3,244.18. This, together with the outstanding accounts, represents the amount available for meeting the ordinary expenses of the ensuing half-year. Out of this fund, after careful investigation, the Committee have unanimously ensuing nair-year. Out or this fund, after careful investigation, the Committee have unanimously agreed to make an appropriation of \$1,000 to the Agel and Infirm Ministers' Fund of the Church, dividing the same betwixt the Eastern and Western Sections in proportion to the number of copies of The Record sent to these Sections, respectively. The Committee further recommend that an addition of \$250 be made to the salary of the managing editor from this date.

The Committee take the liberty of explaining that the above named appropriation of \$1,000 fairly represents the accumulated profits of the concern since June, 1880, when a like sum of \$1,000 was appropriated by the Committee on The Presbyterian Record to the Home Mission Funds of the Church, East and West





