The Planet *Venus* (♀) will be *Evening Star* until September 28th; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Mars* (♂) will be *Evening Star* until October 2nd; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Jupiter* (♃) will be *Morning Star* until April 12th; then *Evening Star* until October 31st; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.—*Saturn* (♄) will be *Morning Star* until March 23rd; then *Evening Star* until October 2nd; then *Morning Star* to the end of the year.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Hon. S. L. Tilley, Charles Watters, James Steadman, G. L. Hatheway, and John McMillan. R. W. Crookshank, Esq., Secretary; George W. Smith, Accountant.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical; black and white

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House. This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 13 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the BuH. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House, (American.) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or ($1\frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can

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be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43, 39, N. long, 66, 8. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in Lat. 45° 43' 18" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's house, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows: Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. 61½ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile, it dries at low springs and has about 2 1-2 fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile, it has 1½ fathoms on its shallowest part at lower water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's House at the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 163 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Brier Island and Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted White.

 A white ditto, [without a ball,] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.
 A blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.

 A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Patridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point LePreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan—or North Channel as aforesaid—to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 80 tons, 10s.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS—(near Saint John.)—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

AGRICULTURAL

OBJECTS AND RESULTS OF MANURING.—Leading objects of manuring are to improve the general *quality* and to increase the *average* quantity or general yield of our arable farm products. All our plants are as much derived from *dead matter* as all our animals, in their substance and structure, are wholly and entirely from the products—in some stage—of *vegetable* assimilation, organization or growth. To the latter rule I know of no exception; to the former I perceive no reason for any. The plant grows by appropriating matter to large extent yielded by the decay and complete disseveration of the structure and substance of previous generations, or crops of similar plants—plants similar in quality or the ultimate composition of their substance or elements. The growth of these precursory plants was equally or more gradual and measured by conditions than that of their successors which we are cultivating. And their decay and decomposition was equally measured and *slow* with their rate of growth, because it depended upon the *same* agencies of heat, humidity oxygenic air. The nature of the forces by which plants are formed and grow, matured and decay, are still the same as aforesaid. Experience or art has not changed, and never can change, any natural process. It can modify *adverse* conditions, intensify natural processes by accumulating the agencies with which nature works. But the conditions being placed, nature does *all* the work, both of production and destruction, of organization and decay. Art does not contribute an iota in either process. Art does not exercise natural power; but only supplies conditions supposed to be more favorable to its fullest force and effect; and in this latter it often fails from imperfection of judgment, and in every failure must recur, before succeeding, to the lessons of nature for instruction.

Now do we not see that growth is *gradual*, little by little, and dependent on *many* conditions? A plant is not a boa constrictor, nor yet a marmot, that takes in a mass of food at *once*, and then sleeps in *inactivity* till its glut has disappeared, or the nature of the season changed. Manure is food to the plant, and its *regular* supply is as important to the vegetable as to an animal. Its activity in favorable weather, is as constant as heat and light, upon which it very much depends. And the simple process by which Mr. Smith of Lois Weedon, raises wheat on a clay soil *without* manure, but by *frequent cultivation*, shows distinctly the propriety and effect of a *gradual* supply of the elements of growth.

Yet in the face of all this it often is the practice to manure *heavily* for corn, which can be fed better than *any* other field crop by *cultivation*, and in this fashion supply the expected demand of *future* crops for manure, one, two, three or four years in *advance*. Paying in advance implies ample funds, but manuring so long in advance *wastes* exceedingly the fund or store of manure, however much or little. It is a *spendthrift* system, reminding one of the *fast young man* who squanders in the dreams of *anticipation* what he never fully realises—a prodigality unwarranted by the facts.

Not only are future crops *cheated in advance*, but the *quality* of heavily manured plants is often injured by being forced to a rank, coarse, disproportionate and especially inedible, *unwholesome* growth. Such is a frequent result incident to the gorge and starve system of manuring.

I have not now time to notice it further, but I have not a doubt that the loss of much of the turnip crop in England, and the club foot, and hand and finger diseases in cabbage and turnips with us is due to gorging with rank or unsuitable manure, and every cultivator must perceive in the fact that plants which owe their excellence to cultivation rather than forcing, are always superior in *quality* to those that are forced with *much* manure—that deterioration in quality is probably much of it due to injudicious modes of feeding, as to quality or quantity or both. An object of manuring is to secure the most *healthy* and *vigorous* growth; but when rank, coarse growth supercedes *healthy* vigor it leads to deterioration of quality, which in reducing its real value for economic purposes sometimes more than counterbalances the greater size or mere gross product. There is too much "haste to get rich" by striving after size, which relatively always indicates coarseness, and often leads toward results in useless or odious forms of mostrosity; and this by manuring future crops in abundance, or several in the lump, and thereby debarring the later ones of a sufficient supply of food or matter of growth, of the very means by which alone they can become either profitable or satisfactory.

Adapting means to ends, or doing the right thing at the right time, is the best guaranty of success in any business, and instead of dressing only *one* crop in a course of three to six, I should prefer to manure the same crop—of wheat particularly, as corn is more accessible to cultivation—*twice* during its growth. *Fall* wheat, besides manuring on the surface lightly after the wheat is covered at seeding, might again be lightly manured just before harrowing, as soon as the ground is dry in the spring. Oats might be manured at sowing time, and harrowed, when high enough, in the same manner. In this way soil would be loosed, abraded and turned; manure divided and broken down, and the crop *twice fed* to the full extent of its absorptive capacity, with truer economy and the best reasons for improved quality as well as augmented quantity of product.—*Correspondent of the Country Gentleman and Cultivator.*

Top-Dressing.—A correspondent of the Boston Cultivator tried an experiment with top-dressing a meadow at three different times in the year. The first was applied early in autumn, when the manure was comparatively dry, and before rain. Another portion sometime afterwards, when the soil was soaked. A third, the following spring. The first portion produced double the crop, well filled with timothy and clover. The second, (applied later and after the rain) did not yield so well. That applied in spring produced little effect, except to increase the "spire grass" at bottom. He thinks the best time is soon after the hay has been cut; last summer he manured a gravelly knoll at that time, from which

the timothy was gradually disappearing. By late autumn, the timothy had outstripped all the other grasses, and was green and fresh, contrasting strongly with the dry red top and spear grass in other parts of the field. The manure was compost, made by spreading a foot of loam and muck under the barn, where the cows were yarded over night, and ploughing it once in two weeks,—an obviously excellent and economical practice.

THE QUANTITIES OF SEED REQUIRED TO SOW A GIVEN EXTENT OF SPACE.—The Messrs. Drummond, seedsmen, of Stirling and Dublin, in their very useful "Directions for Sowing and Cultivating Vegetable Seeds," have given the following quantities, which is recommended to the notice of amateur readers as a safe guide to them.

Peas.—1 pint, or 1 lb., will sow a row from 40 to 60 feet of a single row, in which way peas should always be sown.

Beans.—1 pint, or 1 lb., of the middle sized bean will plant a row of 90 to 110 feet, and the larger size 70 to 80 feet.

Kidney Beans.—1 pint, or 1 lb., will sow a row of about 80 feet.

Onions.—1 oz. of seed will sow a bed (broadcast) 4 feet by 12, or 50 to 100 feet of drill.

Leks.—1 oz. of seed will sow a bed (broadcast) 4 feet by 14, or about 100 feet of drill.

Carrots.—1 oz. of seed will sow 60 to 70 feet of a row.

Parsnips.—1 oz. of seed will sow 100 feet of a row.

Turnips.—1 oz. of seed will sow from 100 to 120 feet of a drill.

Cabbages.—1 oz. of seed will sow a bed 4 feet by 10.

Savoy.—The same.

German Greens or Borecole.—1 oz. of seed will sow a bed 4 feet by 12.

Brussels Sprouts, Cauliflowers, and Broccoli.—The same.

Parsley.—1 oz. of seed will sow 80 feet of a row.

Spinach.—The same.

DON'T COMMENCE PLOUGHING TOO SOON.—By too soon, we mean before the soil is in a proper condition to turn up mellow and lively. Ground should always be allowed to settle after it has been frozen, before it is ploughed.

The soil is rendered lighter and more porous by freezing and thawing; and after it has been frozen and thawed it settles back to its original compactness. Therefore, if it be ploughed before it has settled, it will settle after ploughing, and in a short period of time will be as compact as if it had not been ploughed at all. But let it be ploughed or spaded after it has settled to its former compactness, and it will remain mellow and friable for a long time, unless it is excessively wet.

Every farmer should make some estimate of his ploughing and sowing, in order to know how many days will be required to complete this branch of business; and then, if the weather is unfavorable and the soil too wet, ploughing may be delayed sometimes for a longer time, or until the soil is in a proper condition to be ploughed and harrowed.

These considerations are of far more importance where clay predominates in the soil, than where the soil is sandy or loamy.

CARE OF SHEEP IN SPRING.—It is a prevailing custom among many farmers, to turn sheep to grass as soon as they can possibly get their living. This custom, though widely practiced should not be carried out. Sheep should be kept in a dry yard, till the grass is sufficiently high for them to get a good bite. And even *then* they should be yarded once a day, and fed corn or some other kind of grain. This is my experience, and I have kept sheep for the past twenty years, and have made sheep raising my business for the past eight years. Another practice is widely prevalent, that of letting ewes that have lambed, run with the rest of the flock. Just as soon as an ewe has dropped her lamb, she should be placed in a place separate from the other sheep, and receive extra care. An empty bay, or one that has been cut down and part of the hay pitched out, is a good place for such ewes. Too great care can not be bestowed on ewes with lambs. A little extra care, such as graining and keeping them where it is warm and dry, will be doubly repaid for, both by the extra amount of wool on the sheep and the bulk of the lamb. If your flock be a large one, and you have no convenient place in which to place your ewes, fence off the sunniest and driest part of your yard, and put them in there—or you can put them in some dry or convenient shed.

PEAS.—I cultivated twenty sorts last year, of which I will only mention the most desirable or valuable. The earliest is the Tom Thumb, a dwarf variety, growing 6 to 8 inches high, requiring no bush, and yielding quite as well as many of the tall sorts. Two crops may be grown on the same ground in a season. Next in season is the Dan. O'Rourke, a well known and popular variety, but not a first rate yielder. The Royal Dwarf is but a few days later, and yields better. The Eugenie, Napoleon, and others, mature next in season, and are favorites, but I have not found them reliable, sometimes dwarfing. The Lord Raglan, for instance, failed, the last three seasons. Maturing about the same time, and superior to them all, is a nameless variety received from Nourse & Co., Boston. It was derived from a single pea, found among imported seeds. It is a large white pea, resembling the Epps Monarch, but earlier, and does not grow as high. It is equal to the best in quality, and yields better than any other variety I have. To complete the succession, I plant Epp's Monarch, a splendid pea, late, a great bearer, growing 5 to 8 feet high, and requiring tall and strong bushes. A double row of the Monarch planted in June last, furnished green peas till frost came.—*Country Gentleman.*

WHEAT AND GUANO.—The Genessee Farmer says, if we could get \$2 per bushel for our wheat, guano might be used for this crop with profit. At \$1 it hardly pays, except in rare instances.

CLOVER should be cut immediately after blossoming. It should not be exposed to the scorching sun, but after being partially cured it should be forked up into cocks, and left to cure in this position.

MISCELLANEOUS.

WHEN the Duke of Wellington was sick, the last thing he took was a little tea. On his servant handing it to him in a saucer, and asking if he would have it, the Duke replied, "Yes if you please." These were his last words. How much kindness and courtesy is expressed by them! He who had commanded the greatest armies in Europe, and was long accustomed to the tone of authority, did not despise or overlook the small courtesies of life. In all your home talk, remember, "If you please." Among your playmates don't forget, "If you please." To all who wait upon or serve you, believe that "If you please" will make you better served than all the cross or ordering words in the whole dictionary. Don't forget three little words, "If you please."

THE COW.—When George Stephenson, the celebrated Scotch engineer, had completed his model of a locomotive, he presented himself before the British Parliament and asked for the attention and support of that body. The grave M. P.'s looking sneeringly at his invention said: "So you have made a carriage to run only by steam, have you?" "Yes, my my lords." "And you expect to run on parallel rails, so that it cannot get off, do you?" "Yes, my lords." "Well, now, Mr. Stephenson, let us show you how absurd your claim is. Suppose when your carriage is running upon those rails at the rate of twenty or thirty miles an hour, if you're extravagant enough to even suppose such a thing is possible, a cow should get in the way. You can't turn out for her—what then?" "Then 'twill be bad for the cow, my lords."

Even the maid of Saragossa (but that, observe, was before our time), about whom so many romantic untruths have been written, was an old woman with a large family, the wife of an artilleryman, who, when he was carried off by a French shell, served his gun in order that she might secure his rations for her devoted offspring, none but combatants having claims upon the patriotic kitchen. Nay, I am convinced that Joan of Arc was an old maid, who had no other way of bringing herself into public notice, and that the Moll Flagon of one of our farces, is the true type of these martial daughters of Eve.

A REMEDY FOR SLEEPLESSNESS.—How to get sleep is to many persons a matter of great importance. Nervous persons who are troubled with wakefulness and excitability, usually have a tendency of blood on the brain, with cold extremities. The pressure of blood on the brain keeps it in a stimulated or wakeful state, and the pulsations in the head are often painful. Let such rise and chafe the body and extremities with a brush or towel, or rub smartly with the hands, to promote circulation, and withdraw the excessive amount of blood from the brain, and they will fall asleep in a few minutes. A cold bath or a sponge bath and rubbing or a good run, or a rapid walk in the open air, or going up or down stairs a few times just before retiring, will aid in equalizing circulation and promoting sleep. These rules are simple and easy of application in castle or cabin, mansion or cottage, and may minister to the comfort of thousands who would freely expend money for an anodyne to promote "Nature's sweet restorer, balmy sleep."

RECIPES FOR HARD AND SOFT SOAP.—A correspondent in the *Germantown Telegraph*, offers the following recipe as one to be perfectly relied on:

Take ten pounds of soda ash, and dissolve it in twenty gallons of soft water, with twelve pounds of fresh lime and three fourths of a pound of rosin, by boiling them all half an hour, stirring the while to keep them from setting or burning; then pour all the contents into a tub to settle, washing your kettle clean. After these contents have settled, take the clear water that comes on the top and put it in the kettle; now hunt up all your fat and skins till you get about twenty-three pounds—if clear fat not quite so much—put over the fire to boil till all the fat is eaten up; perhaps it will take two hours, or not nearly so long; then take fine salt to divide, and add salt till the hard soap comes on the top. It will at first look like froth, and the waste will look very dark in the bottom of the kettle. Pour all out in a tub. I forgot to say, fill up your tub with cold water after taking off the first clear lye,

ready to boil your soap froth with the second time ; put two good bucketsfull of this clear lye in the kettle, then with an iron ladle take all this soap froth off the top of the tub and put it in with these two buckets of lye-water, to boil again a few minutes, to make your hard soap clear and nice, adding salt till it separates well. Then pour all out in a tub, to remain undisturbed over night. In the morning you will have over thirty pounds of as nice white soap as you will wish, for either washing or toilet use, which will not chap the hands at any time. Again, if you would wish a half barrel of nice white soft soap, fill up this said lime tub again with cold water till it settles, then take the hard soap that sticks to the kettle and the pitcher that you dip out with, and three or four ladles full of your hard soap, with two pitchers full of this lye-water, and let it boil a few minutes, then fill up your kettle nearly full of the lye-water, and let boil a few minutes, then pour it out into a vessel, and you will be much pleased with the result of your labor. This soft soap will be thick and solid, and it is very nice for boiling clothes or washing, as it makes a very nice froth.

In order to have plenty of soap fat, you must begin at the beginning to save all the skins of meat, and all the fat scraps that come from your table, which, in warm weather, should be put in some of this clear lye until you get enough to make some soap. By this course, in an ordinary family, you will always have enough soap without buying.

TO SWEETEN RANCID BUTTER.—An agriculturist, near Brussels, having succeeded in removing the bad smell and disagreeable taste of some bad butter, by beating or mixing it with chloride of lime, he was encouraged by this happy result to continue his experiments, by trying them upon butter so rancid as to be past use ; and he has restored to butter the odor and taste of which was insupportable, all the sweetness of fresh butter. This operation is extremely simple and practicable for all. It consists in beating the butter in a sufficient quantity of water, into which had been mixed 25 to 30 drops of chloride of lime to two pounds of butter. After having brought all its parts in contact with the water, it may be left an hour or two ; afterwards withdrawn and washed anew in fresh water. The chloride of lime used, having nothing injurious in it, can safely be increased ; but after having verified the experiment, it was found that 25 to 30 drops to two and a half pounds of butter, were sufficient.

RECIPE FOR MAKING RHUBARB WINE.—Cut the rhubarb into small pieces, put it into just enough water to keep it from burning, boil until quite tender, strain through a coarse cloth. To one gallon of this liquid, add two gallons of water ; to each gallon thus made, put four pounds of sugar ; ferment in an open vessel forty-eight hours, then take off the scum, and add one pint of best brandy to every four gallons, after which put it into an air-tight cask ; then let remain six months undisturbed when it will be ready for bottling. In each bottle put one raisin, and seal the bottle well.

A TABLE

For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year forever.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *vane* where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
