

CHURCH SOCIETY.

Annual Meeting, January, 13th, 1864.

The Annual Meeting of the Society, was held on the evening of Wednesday, January 13th, 1864, in the Lecture Hall, St. Ann Street, Quebec, at 7 o'clock P. M.

The Lord Bishop having taken the chair, prayers were said; after which the Secretary was called upon to read the report for the past year.

It was then

1. Moved by his Excellency the Governor General, seconded by the Honorable L. S. Huntingdon, and

Resolved—That the Report be adopted and printed under the direction of the Central Board.

II. Moved by the Rev. E. Hatch, seconded by C. N. Montizambert, Esq., and

Resolved—That this meeting desires to express its thankfulness to Almighty God for the spread of the Missionary Spirit through the church.

III. Moved by Geo. Irvine, Esq., M.P.P., seconded by Rev. J. H. Nicolls, D. D., and

Resolved—That it is the duty of Churchmen to support the Mission Fund of the Diocese.

IV. Moved by His Excellency the Governor General carried by acclamation, that the thanks of this meeting are hereby tendered to the Lord Bishop for his conduct in the Chair.

The Meeting was closed with the Benediction.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1863.

In their last Report, the sad duty devolved on the Central Board of recording the death of the President of the Society, the late venerated and beloved Bishop of the Diocese. On the first Wednesday in March following, the Church in Synod assembled, exercising the solemn function for the first time, proceeded to

elect a Successor to the See.

The election terminated in favour of the Reverend J. W. Williams, M. A., Oxon: Rector of the Junior Department, and Professor of Belles Lettres in the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville. Most heartily do your Board join in the aspiration since wafted from the Mother Country, "May he have grace to follow the steps of the good and devoted Bishop Mountain."

The Report of the Diocesan Board on the subject of Missionary Labour during the past year, is as

follows:

MISSIONARY LABOUR.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN BOARD.

It is with feelings of devout thankfulness to Almighty God, the Diocesan Board, in presenting their Annual Statement, announce that the actualcon dition and immediate prospects of the Diocese foreshadow a bright future for the Church. The returns of the past year, if they leave much to be desired and something to be regretted, yet sufficiently attest that the Church's work is being zealously and aithfully carried on in many parts of the Diocese. Moreover they give assurance that so soon as the church shall

have supplied the machinery rendered necessary by the altered circumstances of the Diocese, the Laity will show themselves not less liberal nor less zealous in her maintenance than the Laity of other Dioceses. The question which, in the judgment of the Board, at this time takes precedence of all others is how best to secure the efficiency and permanency of the Church's Ministrations in this Diocese. tions which have agitated other portions of the religious world relative to the comparative excellencies of different systems, find no room for discussion here; where, if founded at all, the Church must stand sustained by the willing efforts of her own children, and where nevertheless the deep poverty of her widely scattered communion precludes the expectation of any considerable number of Rural Missions being able for many years to come to support themselves. Here, then, they who are in favor of an Endowed Church, who point to endowment as the principle on which the Churches of all countries and of all ages have been founded, and they who regard the Voluntary principle as best adapted to develop and sustain the energies alike of clergy and laity, may work harmoniously together, in furtherance of a system common to them both, the only system, of which our circumstances admit, and one which our exigencies have already put into operation by the creation of the Diocesan Board. The means entrusted to the Board for securing the well-being and maintenance of the Church are (1) the General Sustentation Fund, and (2) the Revenue Account or Mission Fund, as it is more generally called. It is highly important that the precise objects of these two funds should be kept prominently before the Church. The object of the General Sustentation Fund is to anticipate as far as possible the withdrawal of the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel; or in other words to become the nucleus of a Diocesan Endowment Fund, when the Society shall no longer extend to us its aid. The object of the Mission Fund is to supplement the deficiency occasioned by the periodic

reductions of the S. P. G.; to raise the stipends of the clergy to a minimum of £150 currency per annum; and to open new Missions. It is proposed to augment the General Sustentation Fund, which now consists of \$1900 funded property, by the following means: (1) the addition of the annual interest arising thereon; (2) the addition of any surplus from the Revenue Account; (3) the addition of special subscriptions, donations and legacies. Now, as all the resources at the command of the Board are inadequate to satisfy the demands of the Church, it is obvious that any material increase to this fund must arise from special subscriptions, donations, and legacies. Board therefore anxiously trust that those who have inherited wealth, or, with God's blessing, have been successful in their callings will not fail to augment the General Sustentation Fund, not merely by Annual Subscriptions of a few dollars but by generous donations, either in their lifetime or by bequest, which

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shall bear some proportion to their means.

The Mission Fund consists (1) of the Annual Grant of the S. P. G.; (2) of Local Assessments; (3) of Annual Subscriptions in behalf of the Mission Fund. This year, the S. P. G. has reduced its grant by £100 stg. and for this reduced sum it is only pledged till the expiration of 1865, when a fresh arrangement will have to be entered into with the Society. Local Assessments comprise the Annual payments which the Missions in connection with the Board contribute towards the general maintenance of the Olergy. Formerly, these Missions contributed directly towards the support of their respective Olergymen; but as these contributions were seldom punctually, and sometimes never paid, and as, under any circumstances, such a system necessarily brought the Clergyman into unpleasant contact with his people on the subject of his stipend, it is needless to remark that the position of the Clergy has been considerably improved by the Board becoming responsible for the entire payment of their salaries. The annual amount contributed by each Mission, as well as the amount for which any Mission may be in arrear, will be found in the Tabular Statement appended to the Report. It is a subject for regret that notwithstanding the trouble taken to make known the objects and constitution of the Board, misapprehension should still prevail on these points, as is evidenced by persons confounding Local Assessments with annual subscriptions in aid of the Church Society. It cannot be too clearly understood, or too plainly stated that the local assessment, once promised, ceases to be voluntary. It becomes at once the condition of a solemn compact between the Mission and the Board. It is the condition which by the Canon the Board are compelled to exact of every Mission, and only on its faithful fulfilment are they at liberty to continue the payment of the Clergyman's stipend. A further proof of the misapprehension just mentioned is one to which the Board refer with pain and regret, viz: the decrease in Rural Missions of annual subscriptions in aid of the Church Society. It is true, and it is to be regretted that the distinction is so frequently overlooked, that there is a wide difference between a man contributing in order to secure for himself and those belonging to him the ministrations of the Church, and the same man contributing to enable others to participate in like blessings. But after allowing this distinction every weight, a heavy responsi-bility will still rest on Churchmen to assist those who are similarly circumstanced with themselves, and who, besides, have a special claim on their liberality, being members of the same household of faith. It is to be hoped however that the charity of Canadian Churchmen will spring from a higher and nobler motive than this: even the "love of Christ," which has constrained their fellow Churchmen in the Mother Country to plant the Church in every dependency of the British Empire, and to erect the Cross of the Redeemer in the vast wildernesses of heathendom, thus judging "that if one died for all, then were all dead." And there is the greater need for this solemn appeal, since at the request of the Central Board, the Board on the death of the late Bishop, circulated an Address throughout the Diocese, showing that in order to meet the deficiency occasioned by the Bishop's death, who in addition to his other numerous benefactions, had been a contributor to the Mission Fund of \$800 per annum, and by the reduction of the S. P. G's. Grant, as well as to raise the salaries of all the Clergy to £150 per annum, \$3000 per annum would be required in addition to the sums already promised or contributed by the Country and City Congregations. And here, once more, the Board would implore attention to the fact that even with the accession of \$3000 per annum, it will be barely possible to maintain the existing arrangements of the Diocese. And until this amount shall have been raised, it will be both unjust and improvident for them to listen to any appeal, however urgent, for the subdivision of unwieldy Missions or the extension of Missionary operations. Clergymen, whose means barely suffice to provide their families with the necessaries of life, must still continue in charge of Missions, over which it is physically impossible for them to exercise due pastoral supervision. But this is not all, the necessities of our present condition oblige us to appoint young and inexperienced Deacons to sole and independent charges, who feel more keenly than others can do their unfitness, and consequently the injustice of their position; being also not unfrequently appointed to the most difficult of all ministerial tasks, that of raising a Congregation out of materials unused to doctrine and discipline, and of retaining it after the first impulse of novelty has subsided. It can hardly therefore be a matter for surprise that every succeeding. year should bear witness to the increasing difficulty of procuring either suitable candidates for the Sacred Ministry, or Clergymen willing to undertake Missions which it is impossible for them to serve, and with incomes on which it is barely possible for them to live. "And yet we expect from a superintendence so defective all the benefits of the parochial system;

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from ordinances so imperfectly administered all the blessings which Christ has covenanted to His Church: We are disappointed if no miracle spring out of this mockery of a cure: We marvel if the dry ground become not suddenly fertile, as the garden of Eden, and the desert fail forthwith to "blossom as the rose." But it is not in this way we shall win over to us those that are without, or build up those that are within the walls of our Zion. If we would increase the efficiency of the Church; if we would retain amongst us godly and learned men, we must exact from the Clergy no more work than they are able to perform; we must make a better provision for them, such a provision, at least, as shall suffice for their decent support, and having raised the salaries of all the Clergy to a minimum of £150 currency per annum, we must then establish a graduated scale of income, in proportion to the resources of the particular Congregation, and in consideration of the length of the services of the Clergyman within the Diocese. For now, if ever, the time has arrived when Churchmen must lay a foundation that shall ensure the efficiency and permanency of the ministrations of the Church in this diocese. May God, for Christ's sake, grant us, in this our day of visitation, grace to perceive and know what things we ought to do, and also grace, faithfully and effectually to fulfil the same.

The Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Board, has made the following appointments during

On the retirement, through ill health, of the Rev. C. Roberts from the Mission of Bourg-Louis, the following Resolution was adopted by the Board:

Resolved,—That the Board entertaining a high

opinion of the irreproachable life and conversation of the Rev. C. Roberts, and of the manner in which he has discharged the duties of the sacred Ministry of the Church during his residence in the Diocese, beg to convey to him the expression of their regret at the prospect of his removal to another sphere of duty, and to assure him that he has the hearty prayer of the Board that it may please Almighty God to grant him a safe voyage to the Mother Country, and if it be His gracious will, the speedy restoration of his health."

It will be necessary for the Society to supply the vacancy at the Board, occasioned by the resignation

of his seat, by the Rev. A. W. Mountain.

Of the Reports received from the Clergy, the following extracts have been selected for publication. If these extracts should appear meagre in interesting matter, it must be borne in mind that extreme caution is necessary on the part of clergymen in speaking of the condition and prospects of their Missions, and in furnishing reports intended not only for circulation throughout the Diocese but also among their own people. It must surely be sufficient to hear from the lips of authority that the work of the Church, if calm and noiseless, is none the less progressive: even as of old was the erection of God's material Temple, though
"No hammer fell, no ponderous axes rung."

MISSION OF FRAMPTON.

This Mission, distant from Quebec about 35 miles, comprises the township of Frampton, the settled part of Standon and Cranbourne, with a part of Buckland and parts of the Seignories of St. Clair, St.

Margaret, and St. Mary; containing in all about two hundred and seventy five square miles. There are 141 Protestant families in the Mission, of whom 131 belong to the Church, numbering about 850 souls, of whom 163 are communicants. There are four Churches, two of stone, and two of wood, affording accommodation to 380 persons, the average attendance being about 250. The Churches are distant from the Parsonage respectively three, nine, fifteen and fifteen miles. There is Divine Service in East Frampton, every Sunday, except when I go to Cranbourne; in West Frampton, and Standon, every second Sunday, and in Cranbourne twice in seven weeks, once on a Sunday and once on a week day. On Fasts and Festivals, service is held at one or other of the Churches which have not weekly services.

There are no regular Sunday Schools, but the School-master in Standon, and a lady in West Frampton, when the season and circumstances admit, gather together the children in the vicinity for religious instruction. This want however is supplied in great measure by my following out, in three of my Congregations, the Church's system of catechizing

after the Second Lesson at Evening Prayer.

There are two well-conducted day Schools under Church control, one in West Frampton and the other in Standon, attended by about one hundred children; the Cranbourne people are now making an effort to get a school in operation by the New Year, having secured the services of a competent teacher; the school in East Frampton has been closed since July for want of proper support. We have in our Library about 250 vols. of good books. The amount contributed by the Mission for Church purposes will amount to about \$350, including their proportion of my salary and subscriptions to the Church Society. Our Endowment Fund in December 1862 amounted to \$3,200, and will become available for the use of the Mission when the annual interest reaches \$200. During the year, we have acquired a Parsonage with good out-buildings, and nearly 50 acres of land, on

which however there is a debt of \$350. Besides this, we have also 50 acres more near the Church in West Frampton, a lot of 50 acres in Cranbourne, being a gift to the Church from the late Mr. Poole of Quebec, 45 acres in Standon, 40 of which are a gift from William Henderson, Esq., and 5 from Mr. J Nicholson; and Mr. W. A. Henderson has offered to give 10 or 12 acres opposite the Church in East Frampton in case of a parsonage being built there,—an event to which the people look forward at no very distant date.

I have thus given a plain statement of the condition of my Mission in accordance with the request of the Diocesan Board, and I think I am justified in considering it on the whole as a satisfactory one.

The contributions of the people are treble what they were a few years ago: the services of the Chuch are much better attended; and the number of communicants is largely and steadily increasing, so that looking back upon the eight years I have spent here, I can thank God for the past, and take courage for the future.

But while speaking thus hopefully of the prospects of the Church here, I would take the opportunity of urging upon the Diocesan Board the great necessity that exists for a re-division of this Mission. I say a redivision, for previous to my coming here, there were two Clergymen to do the work which I have since had to undertake single-handed—to undertake—not to do, for I have not done it. I could not do it. It is a physical impossibility for any one man, let him work as he will, to do his Master's work here, either with satisfaction to himself, or with due benefit to those committed to his charge. The miserable state of the roads, the long distances to be travelled, and the great extent of country over which the people are scattered, render it impossible for him to give them that pastoral supervision which is so necessary to their spiritual well-being and growth in Grace, and which tends so much to draw together both Pastor and people in the bonds of sympathy and affection.

Our late beloved Bishop felt very strongly the ne-

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cessity of which I speak, and in one of the last letters he wrote to the S. P. G. he urged upon them the great want of another Clergyman in this mission. I may mention en passant that the number of Church people here is greater than in any other country mission in the Diocese, and is exceeded only by the Congregation of the Cathedral and of St. Matthew's in Quebec; (vide Reports of Clergy to Synod, 1862.)

If then the work of the Church has made some progresshere, in spite of the imperfect manner in which ithas necessarily been done, what fruit might we not expect if proper provision were made for supplying the spiritual wants of the people. The interest of our Endowment Fund, which will soon amount to \$200, might be made available for this purpose by the Board, and I think I can answer for the people doing all that can reasonably be expected of them. Though they are poor, there being but three or four men of substance among them, yet I have ever found them ready when called upon (of course there are exceptions) to lend their aid, as far as their means would allow, to any good work in the Mission, and they would not be less likely to do so when the measure proposed would tend so materially to advance the best interests of themselves and their families.

BURY.

The Rev. J. Kemp and other clergymen have furnished the Board with valuable statistics relating to extent of Mission; number of Church services, pastoral visits, &c., but it has not been thought necessary to publish them as they have for the most part already appeared in the Journal of Synod for 1862.

EATON.

The Rev. J. Dalziel expresses his belief that his Mission is in as favorable and prosperous a condition as under the circumstances could be expected, and reports with much satisfaction encouraging indications of the increased estimation in which his people hold the Ministrations of the Church.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. J. Foster writes:—When I entered on my labours a little more than twelve months ago, there was not a church edifice within the limits of my Mission. I am now happy to say that on Wednesday, 21st of October, a beautiful little Church in this village was consecrated to the service of Almighty God, by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. The building is capable of seating 150 persons comfortably, and is strictly ecclesiastical in every res-As my people are so few in number, and their energies have been exhausted in building the Church we have not been able to do as much in the way of contributing to the funds of the Church Society as we could wish, but we hope to do more next year. On the whole, I have great reason to be cheerful in the discharge of my sacred duties: the people generally are exceedingly zealous, and manifest a desire to strengthen my hands in the performance of every good work.

KINGSEY

The Reverend A. Balfour writes as follows:— By order of the late Bishop, the charge of the Church at Lower Durham was placed conjointly in the care of Rev. Mr. Wood and myself.

During the former part of the year, I served this

Church, alternately in the afternoon—bestowing the alternate afternoon on some out-post in Kingsey. The congregations at Durham were large and hopeful.

At St. Paul's Church, Kingsey, my services were regular every Sunday morning, with a monthly administration of the Holy Communion.

The attendance at this Church is very fluctuating, sometimes numbering sixty and again as low as fifteen.

For a few Sundays past the congregation has been unusually large; owing probably to a rumor respecting my removal, but as these apprehensions subside, the attendance at church settles down again.

It is but fair to state, that the unsatisfactory progress of this Church is not so much owing to the absence of a becoming appreciation of the Church itself, as to the ill-chosen locality where the material structure is placed. The congregation generally are inclined to build a new church in a more acceptable position; and I think the condition of this Mission would be much improved by the change.

I have spoken above of "the former part of the year" with reference to Lower Durham; because I was for a little time separated from that pleasing Congregation, by assuming the temporary charge of the Mission of Danville and Tingwick conjointly with Kingsey.

My health suffered under this onerous task, and since the Mission of Danville has been filled by another, I have resumed my place at Lower Durham with Kingsey as formerly.

In the discharge of duties so scattered and decentrated I have little to say of material progress; but by God's help we continue to labor as best we may.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Revd. A. C. Scarth thus writes:—
From this Mission there is little more to report than

the ordinary routine of parish work. The Church is generally and steadily progressing, and her influence is felt by all classess of the community. Besides regular duty, I have with the assistance of the Rev. Dr. Nicolls and Rev. Professor Dodwell opened two stations in the neighbourhood. In both the services have been pretty well attended. The number of Sunday Schools 8, total number of scholars 83.

RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. J. L. Gay, after giving a detailed account of the extent of his Mission, proceeds to state that the Congregations of both of his Churches are "pretty good," averaging in that of St. Ann's, in which he officiates twice every Sunday, 120 to 160 persons. He is of opinion that larger congregations might be expected, if the pews (now held in fee-simple and some of them by non-residents who pay nothing for them) could be apportioned and rented by the Wardens. At St. John's, which he serves every second and fourth Sunday, and which is only three miles distant from St. Ann's, the Congregration averages from 25 to 35 persons. "On the third Sunday of every month, Igo to Silver School house, five miles eastward on the road to Danville. Our services are held at 3 o'clock P. M., and are well attended." The Missionary, though happy to be able to report some improvement in the attendance and devout deportment of his Congregations, regrets that the distinctive doctrines of the Church do not seem to be understood or cared for as they ought to be, and mentions that there is much neglect of the Holy Communion. After speaking in high terms of the liberality of his people in general, he states—"Altogether we have raised this year \$300. over and above our Assessment which has been regularly met. There is an Insurance on our Church and Parsonage."

DANVILLE

The Rev. G. J. Magill writes:—I have so recently entered on the charge of this Mission that I am not able to furnish you with a full report of its condition and prospects.

The Church at Danville is still unfinished, the congregation at Tingwick still worship in a school-house, though they have begun to speak of erecting

a small wood building as a house of prayer.

I cannot speak too highly of the energy and liberality which the Church people of Danville have manifested in the erection of the Church. From a report of the Auditors appointed at a vestry meeting, Iselect the following particulars.

This debt of \$175 has, I am thankful to say, been reduced to \$75 since I came here, by the liberality of the parishioners.

ACTONVALE.

The Rev. I. C. Wurtele writes:—Since last New Year's day there have transpired in this Mission many things for which we can raise our hearts in gratitude to our Almighty Father.

The English speaking population has been gradually increasing; rendering it necessary in the opinion of the Board to disconnect the congregation of

Acton from those of Ely and Lower Durham, and to make it a sole charge. Events have confirmed the wisdom of this decision, for, since the 1st of July, when this new arrangement was made, Holy Communion has been administered on the first Sunday of every month, with an average attendance of 14 Communicants. Last Spring a Church, 60 by 30 feet was erected; and, though not yet completed, \$1200 have been spent on it, the product of private subscriptions, a grant of \$100 by the Church Society and of two Concerts given by some kind members of the Congregation. There still remains a debt of \$260.00, besides which it will require \$700 to furnish the Church. On Sunday Divine Service is held three times, twice in English and once in French. The Sunday School is flourishing; the average attendance being 44 children.

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PERCÉ.

The Rev. S. Cross writes:—I am pleased to be able to inform you that the work in this Mission is going on smoothly and I trust satisfactorily. During the past year it has met with little or no interruption. There are two full services every Sunday, with Holy Communion once a month, and a week-day service during the seasons of Lent and Advent. The Services are, on the whole, well attended. There is a Sunday-School superintended by Mrs. Cross: the children are making some progress.

CAPE COVE.

The Rev. W. G. Lyster writes:—The present condition of the Mission seems to be on the whole satisfactory. The Church people are, I believe, without exception, contributors towards the clergyman's, stipend, and owing to the action of the Diocesan Board, the amounts subscribed have been so far paid

with greater punctuality than has ever been known before. The contributions towards local objects have also been liberal. Within the last two months, fifteen pounds have been collected, and expended in furnishing the Church, the appearance of which has been much improved. Some necessary work has also been done to the Parsonage. I may mention here that we have lately become possessed of an excellent bell, the gift of some generous people in Quebec. The two Sunday Services are attended regularly and numerously. The attendance at Holy Communion is not so large as I could wish, but it is I believe fully equal to the proportion in other Missions. Sunday-school has been held regularly since my appointment.

The spiritual condition of the people is a subject I approach with great diffidence. The Searcher of hearts alone can estimate it truly. But so far as my observation goes, the Congregation is serious and attentive, and in the case of many families losing no opportunity of attending Divine Service. There is no dissent among us now. I am glad to acknowledge the kindly and cordial manner in which I am met by the people in my daily walk among them, the friendly disposition which has hitherto been evinced, and the numerous acts of substantial kindness for which I am to some of them a debtor.

GASPÉ BASIN AND SANDY BEACH.

The Revd. M. Kerr writes:—With every disposition to comply with the desire of the Board, it is not easy to compile an accurate and interesting review of Missionary labour. The bare detail of so many sermons preached, so many visits paid, so many administrations of the Lord's Supper, &c., are to most as uninteresting as arithmetical tables. The deepening spirituality, the growing hunger and thirst after right-eousness, the awakening of the careless: in a word, the powerful though gentle and noiseless operations of the spirit of God, are not easy to be described. Who

shall describe the silent, gentle, yet irresistible progress of Spring and Summer, yet the result is the golden harvest. In the fall of 1860, the Revd. F. De Lamare found it necessary for the re-establishment of his health, to return to Jersey. The care of his Mission (Gaspe' Basin) devolved on me in addition to my own of Sandy Beach. That fearful scourge, Diptheria, set in about the same time, with alarming violence, and many families lost two or three members each. The near prospect of death was not without its effects. Attention to religious duties was aroused: an anxious and inquiring spirit pervaded the community. I was much cheered too by the faith and patience which some of the poor sufferers In spring of 1861, Mr. De La Mare displayed. returned, and my labours were again confined to Sandy Beach. At the close of the year, Mr. De La Mare again found it necessary to leave this country, and in November last finally gave up the Mission. In July last I was regularly appointed to the charge of both Missions with a promise of an assistant. have service in each Church every Sunday and on The attendance the chief Fasts and Festivals. at the Basin Church has increased considerably; indeed a new and more capacious building is needed. When I remove to the Basin, which I propose doing as soon as the summer comes, I hope to be able to do something for the sailors, by holding services in those ships in which I may be permitted.

In Sandy Beach there continues the same earnest attention to public worship which has characterized this people, since my first connection with them. In the Basin Parish there are 3 Sunday-schools; all of which are flourishing, owing principally to the care and attention given them by Mr. Pope, the Schoolmaster of the Colonial and Continental Church and School Society, who is unwearied in his efforts to do good, and has, I am glad to say, been licensed as a lay-reader by the Bishop. In Sandy Beach we have one Sunday-school, which is well attended. There is also a Congregation at Little Gaspé about 16 miles

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from the Basin, where I hold service once a month; here too the attendance has increased so much that the people have determined to erect a new church, the old one being too small and dilapidated to be advantageously repaired or enlarged.

NEW CARLISLE

The Revd. G. Milne writes:-Since the first of January 1863, though not enjoying very good health, I have been able, except on two occasions when I was prevented by storms, to maintain the regular performance of Divine service; and in general the Congregations have been large and apparently devout, and though we ought not to rely on outward appearances, it is to be hoped that some have been edified in their most holy faith. During this year, there has been more than the average amount of sickness and number of deaths: and I feel thankful to say that in my visits to the sick and dying, I have been encouraged by the patience and resignation to the Divine Will manifested by several, and have good hopes that as they departed in the faith and fear of God, they will obtain a blessed resurrection. To God alone be the praise and glory for what good may have been done.

There is a considerable amount due for the Chancel and Vestry of St. Andrew's Church, New Carlisle, finished last year; to pay off which the pew-rents for several years will be required. A patent for a glebe of 212 acres, purchased by the congregation of St. Peter's Church, Paspebiac, from Government, has been received, vesting it in the Incumbent and his successors. Besides the above, during the first part of the year I gave two Sundays to Hopetown and Port Daniel then vacant, when large congregations attended at Port Daniel Church and at the school-houses of Shigouac and Hopetown. I also made a considerable number of visits to sick members of the Church in that Mission, and for other services.

MALBAIE.

The Revd. J. De Mouilpied thus writes.

In the course of the past year, I held Divine service, in the Church at Malbaie every Sabbath morning, and had also during the summer, an afternoon or evening service, when not similarly engaged in other parts of the Mission. Once a fortnight, during the season of navigation, the Morning service has been conducted in French for the benefit of those of Jersey extraction who are better acquainted with it than with English. In the long summer days the Evening service has been held at 6 p. m. instead of at 3, at which latter hour a Sunday School was taught. But I am sorry to say, that a second service, be it held at what hour it may, is not well attended here. Indeed I must not conceal the fact, that the people generally attend Church very irregularly, especially in the Summer. This is partly owing to their active and laborious occupation in their fisheries during the week, and their consequent desire to take rest at home on the Sunday. At the corner of the Beach, a small settlement, 9 miles from Malbaie. I had a monthly service till September; since which time I have held it there, once a fortnight, The Saband purpose doing so during the winter. bath school which can be kept up only during the Summer, has not given us, in the number attending it, the encouragement we expected, and we have been obliged to close it this year earlier than usual. have no day school, and but very few Parents can send their children to a distance to be educated.

I have done what I could to remedy this state of things, but as my plan involved some sacrifice on the part of the Parents, I met with no encouraging response from my people. I had expected in consequence of this destitution of the means of education, a large attendance at the Sunday School, and we were prepared to put our whole soul in it, and some good friend at Quebec had kindly

offered me books to form a child's library, but we have been disappointed in our reasonable expectations. I must however say in extenuation of their conduct that many of our families are poor, and their children are not always clad as their parents would like to see them on Sundays. I have often desponded, and perhaps have done so too much in beholding the comparatively small work that has been achieved during the four years, I have been in this Mission; yet though there is much to be lamented, my heart is occasionally cheered by some proofs, that the work has been in some cases instrumental for good, and I trust that many are awake and in earnest praying for the prosperity and increase of our Church.

LEVIS AND NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Incumbent reports the total extinction of the debt on the Church at Levis, which for many years has been a heavy burden on the congregation, as well as a hindrance to the consecration of the Church, which event now only awaits a favourable opportunity. During the past year, an elegant and commodious Parsonage-house has been erected on the Parsonage-ground adjoining the Church, at a cost of \$1800, of which amount the ladies of the Congregation raised \$505.00 The Church has also been repaired at a cost of \$200.

At New Liverpool a Chancel and Vestry have been built, and the Church thoroughly repaired, at a cost of \$1013.81., the whole of which, excepting a trifling sum, has been defrayed by the ladies attend-

ing the Church.

Through the laudable exertions of a lady of the congregation, a Sunday School has been maintained here for many years. It was attended last summer by 38 children.

The amount towards the Clergyman's stipend promised on his appointment to the Mission, continues

to be paid with unfailing punctuality. The proximity of the Mission to Quebec and other circumstances, render it undesirable to publish a formal statement of the spiritual condition of the Mission, of which, however, the Incumbent would be sorry if any other than a gratifying opinion should be formed.

RIVIERE DU LOUP (en bas.)

The Revd. E. G. W. Ross writes:—"I was much occupied during the summer, in preparing Candidates for Confirmation. I found no backwardness. Some of the adults came a distance of 40 miles. After receiving his Lordship's directions, I gave 8 days previous notice when all the candidates (15) presented themselves in Church, and were confirmed by the Bishop, who gave them an appropriate exhortation. I afterwards learnt with pleasure from several, that they felt themselves much affected by the solemn and impressive manner in which the Bishop administered this holy rite."

PORTNEUF.

The Revd. A. von Iffland reports that the last twelve months have not passed by without evincing some little improvement; that the Congregations are attentive and respond heartily, particularly at Halesborough; that a Melodeon has been obtained for the Church at a cost of \$60, which has contributed greatly to the interest felt in the services; that the Church has been painted and repaired at a cost of \$30, defrayed by Sunday collections; and that the Parsonage is being completed and made comfortable at an expenditure of \$280. Towards this amount the Society has granted \$40, and kind friends have subscribed \$50. The Incumbent, whilst promising that his best exertions shall not be wanting in reviving an interest in behalf of the Society, yet fears that after meeting the local assessment, (\$120 per annum) his people will not be able to do much for the Church Society. "In the death of the Hon. E. Hale, the Mission has also sustained a loss, which will make it all the more difficult for the people to meet their engagements."

BOURG LOUIS

The Revd. F. J. Cookesley, temporarily appointed

to the charge of this Mission, writes :-

"Since I have ministered in this place, the services on Sunday have been well attended both in the morning and afternoon. I may also speak with satisfaction of the attendance at the Sunday-school. I find the people exceedingly thankful for the Ministrations of the Church, and glad to receive frequent visits at their homes. A commodious Parsonage is in course of erection at a convenient distance from the Church on glebe land. The people are determined to finish it, and have shown a most commendable spirit with regard to it."

STONEHAM AND LAKE BEAUPORT.

The Revd. R. Mitchell writes:—"During the course of this last summer, I have had services and preached in Stoneham and Lake Beauport once every Sunday. The attendance for small congregatious was uniformly good except when prevented by bad weather, and I feel a good deal encouraged in my arduous work."

THREE RIVERS.

The Revd. J. F. Torrance writes:—This Parish may be considered, as in a healthy condition. The congregation during the past twelve months has much increased.

When the present Clergyman came to reside here, a suitable residence was much required for his accommodation.

The Parishioners in a praiseworthy manner met and determined on pulling down the interior of the old Rectory, which had originally been, at different periods a Monastery and a Nunnery, as well as used for other purposes foreign to that now intended. an expense of \$2,200 the interior of the ancient building was demolished and rebuilt in a creditable manner, and may now be considered second to none in the Province, in solidity, respectability and comfort as an Ecclesiastical building. A debt of only \$400 of the above amount remains to be paid. There are no outbuildings upon the grounds, which will require \$400 The old antiquated pews in the Church have also been cut down during the present year, and three rows and two aisles have been substituted, which have added to the appearance, comfort and accommodation of the congregation. Much remains yet to be done, and it is to be hoped that the good beginning which has been made, will be an incentive not to relax our united efforts until the Temple of the Living God is complete and finished with every appendage necessary to the due and proper celebration of the Word and Sacraments.

NICOLET.

The Revd. F. A. Smith, writes;—
But little more than one year has elapsed since I entered on my present charge, and besides the usual routine of Ministerial labour, I have, indeed, little to record. In a quiet country place, such as this, there is seldom much to vary the clergyman's weekly round of duty, although in the faithful discharge of that duty, he may humbly hope that his labor "is not in vain in the Lord". But vary few Protestant families reside in or near the village of Nicolet, the greater number are widely scattered over a large space, some as far as thirteen or fourteen miles from the Church. As may be supposed the difficulties in the way of their regular attendance on my ministrations

are great; especially when the weather and the roads are bad. Yet I think on the whole, these poor and remote settlers and their families appreciate the religious privileges which we endeavour te place within their reach, and some of them evince a gratifying anxiety to be present when the House of God is open

and to join in the services of the Sanctuary.

We have recently lost by death two of the most valuable and esteemed members of our little congregation. One has left a blank which must be felt for years to come. Filling a prominent position, he took a lively interest in the Mission, and generaly devoted his time, his talents, and his means to the promotion of its welfare. To him is mainly due our Endowment Fund, without which it would be scarcely possible to maintain a Clergyman in the place. The other moving in a humbler sphere of life, was a conscientious and consistent churchman, and set before his brethren of the farming class, an excellent example."

CATHEDRAL DISTRICT ASSOCIATION.

The Rector thus writes:-On the 24th of March 1863, a Meeting of the members of the Cathedral Congragation, was held in the Lecture Hall, for the purpose of taking into consideration, what steps should be adopted for increasing the Mission Fund of the Church Society. Resolutions were passed, showing that the present financial position of the Church Society demands increased exertion and liberality on the part of all members of the Church, and accordingly it was resolved that an Association should be formed to be called the Cathedral District Association of the Church Society. A Subscription list was opened, when several persons present promised contributions towards the Revenue fund, amounting to \$710, while one lady gave a donation of \$400 to the Sustentation Fund. A Committee of gentlemen was named for soliciting subscriptions, and several ladies consented to form themselves into a Committee for the same object.

At a subsequent Meeting held April 14th, measures were adopted for carrying the above intentions into effect under the presidency of Mrs. Williams, Mrs. C. N. Montizambert consenting to act as Secretary-Treasurer. The ladies have been very successful. The City was divided into districts, and the Church of England families in each division were visited and contributions amounting to \$155.07 were collected, while many persons promised monthly or quarterly subscriptions. Missionary Boxes were likewise distributed to those willing to undertake the charge of them. At a meeting of the ladies held Jany. 8, 1864, it was found that \$31, had been received as subscriptions and that the Missionary Boxes yielded \$36.87.

It is gratifying to find that in the present emergency there is so much energy shown on the part of those able to advocate the Church's work, and no lack of liberality among those who are solicited to contribute towards its support. In accomplishing the Church's work there will ever be many difficulties to overcome, but if there be a willing mind and an active effort displayed by those who are called upon to aid in diffusing among the people the unsearchable riches of Christ, it will be found that under the Divine bless-

ing the labour will not be in vain.

ST. MICHAEL'S CHAPEL ASSOCIATION.

The Revd. A. W. Mountain thus writes:—In compliance with the desire of the Central Board, I beg leave to repeat the information furnished to the late Secretary with reference to the formation of an Association in connection with St. Michael's Chapel. This took place at our last Easter Vestry meeting, when a committee was appointed consisting of the Incumbent and Wardens and F. H. Andrews, Jr., Esq., Treasurer. The total amount raised by the Association during the year (including the proceeds of sermons) has been \$369.72.

Three sermons have been preached as usual, in aid of the Society's funds, besides the annual Whitsunday

sermon in aid of Missions to the heathen. ber of annual subscribers at present on the list is 22, (including two whose subscriptions have not been collected this year, owing to their absence in England) contributing an aggregate amount of \$113. 50. There are ten life members of the Society connected with the Association, not including his Excellency the Governor General, whose subscription has been paid to the Parent Society. I have used to a very limited extent the collecting cards drawn up by Dr. Adamson when Secretary of the Society, and have found the use of them very successful in the hands of children of the Sunday-School. My absence from the Diocese during a large portion of the year, and the state of my health since my return, have prevented my doing what I had hoped to do in behalf of the Association, but if it please God to bless our efforts next year, I hope the number of contributors may be increased and our organization rendered more complete, though the total amount to be contributed may probably not exceed that which we have remitted this year, as it includes two life subsciptions. The number of life members mentioned above does not include several persons who have left the country, and were, during their residence in it, members of the Congregation of St. Michael's.

EDUCATION

Your Board regret their inability to report much progress in the furtherance of the second object of the Society's incorporation: the encouragement of Education and the support of Day Schools and Sunday Schools in conformity with the principles of the Church. In addition to the appointment of a special Committee on Education, the Board have requested the Clergy to send half-yearly reports as to the efficiency of the teachers and progress of the scholars. Your Board cannot leave this subject without expressing regret at the want of interest shown by Clergy

and Laity in the establishment and support of good schools.

Whilst it affords. Your Board satisfaction to be able to repeat that the progress of this Department has kept pace with the means at their command, they beg to renew the expression of their regret that the condition of the Society's funds has not hitherto admitted of a larger allowance for this object. At present, the only resources of this department are the proceeds of an annual vote of £25 and the proceeds of an annual sermon in the Cathedral. A large selection of very interesting works has just been received at the Depository.

INSURANCE OF CHURCHES AND PARSONAGES.

Owing to the continued neglect of Church Wardens to insure the Churches and Parsonages, under their charge, the Board have been compelled to adopt the following stringent Resolutions.

[RESOLUTION OF CENTRAL BOARD, MARCH 12, 1863.]

That, whereas it appears that several Churches and Parsonages within the Diocese are not insured, the Central Board is of opinion that Congregations showing so little care for their own interest as to omit effecting insurance to an amount sufficient to cover any probable loss by fire, are highly reprehensible, and are not entitled to expect from this Board any assistance in rebuilding their Churches or Parsonages in the event of destruction by fire.

[RESOLUTION OF CENTRAL BOARD, MAY 27th 1863.]

That in consequence of the recent destruction by fire, of the Church at Drummondville, which was uninsured, the Secretary be requested to transmit to each Missionary in the Diocese the Resolution of the Central Board adopted March 12th 1863, in reference to Insurance; and that the Incumbent and Church Wardens of each Mission be requested to take immediate steps for the insurance of Church and Parsonage, if not insured, and to report, on or before the first of September next, as to what has been effected.

SECRETARY.

The vacancy in the Secretaryship occasioned by the resignation of the Revd. H. J. Petry, in consequence of his removal to the Rectory of Chambly in the Diocese of Montreal, has been filled by the appointment of the Rev. A. J. Woolryche to that office.

DECEASED MEMBERS.

In recording the deaths during the past year, of two of the original members of the Society, both of whom bore a prominent part in its formation, and whose names indeed have been associated with the history of almost every institution of the Church within the Diocese during the past five and twenty years, the Board are desirous of calling special attention to points in connection with their relation to the Society, in which their examples may be profitably followed.

Thomas Trigge, Esq., was for many years the Society's Treasurer at Quebec, and the unflagging interest which he manifested in its welfare is still well remembered by many amongst us. It is indeed to his prudent management and valuable counsels that the Society is in no small degree indebted for the stability of its financial position, arising from the comparatively large amount of its invested capital. And it is entirely owing to his foresight, in taking early advantage of the encouragement afforded by the By-laws, that the Congregation at Nicolet, though one of the least numerous in the Diocese, has been provided, from very small beginnings, with a larger endowment fund than any of the Rural Missions, and

which has already reached a point sufficient to render it almost independent of external aid. To the day of his death, this fund, which is held in trust by the Society, enjoyed the benefit of Mr. Trigge's judicious management and undiminished zeal in watching over

its interests.

The Honorable William Walker who survived Mr. Trigge but a few weeks, had been all along one of the Vice-Presidents of the Society, and this was not in his case merely an honorary distinction, considered to be due to his position in the Province, for he was ever ready while his health permitted him to take part in public affairs, to give the Society the advantage of his support, at its public meetings as well as in those of the Central Board and of different committees. His name too, was always to be found among those of the largest contributors to the Society's funds, and he gave a proof of his constant interest in its prosperity; a proof unfortunately but too rarely exhibited, by remembering the Society in his will, having bequeathed \$400 to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Deputations appointed to bring before the City Congregations the financial position of the Church. The Resignation of Rev. H. J. Petry as Secretary accepted, and a vote of thanks tendered to him for his able performance of his duties during his time of office. The Secretaryship unanimously offered to Rev. A. W. Mountain.

APRIL.

Letter read from Rev. A. W. Mountain assigning reasons why he could not accept the office of Secretary. The Clergy, in whose Missions there are Schools aided by the Society, requested to send to the Education Committee half-yearly reports of their progress. Revd. A. J. Woolryche, appointed Secretary.

MAY.

Resolution in consequence of the destruction by fire of the Church at Drummondville which was uninsured. Secretary's Letter prepared by order of the Committee appointed to consider the practicability of simplifying the financial arrangements of the Society, ordered to be printed for circulation.

Letter from the Missionary of Labrador, read. Church at Actonvale reported to be insured for \$1000.

DECEMBER.

A Statement from the Rector and Church Wardens respecting the division of the interest arising from Chapelries Endowment Fund referred to the Clergy Trust Committee.

REPORT OF THE CLERGY TRUST COMMITTEE

TO THE

CHURCH SOCIETY

OF THE

DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

At the Annual Meeting held in the Lecture Hall St. Ann Street, at Ten o'clock, on Wednesday, 13th January, 1864.

The Clergy Trust Committee most respectfully beg leave to report—

The Revenue arising from the securities held by your Committee has been regularly paid, with the exception of two years' interest of Constitue on seignory of St. Hyacinthe and interest on Hamilton debentures.

On the former, the amount due will shortly be paid; with respect to the latter it is to be hoped that an honest effort will be made by the City of Hamilton, to remove the stigma of being the onlydefaulting City in Canada

The Investments made during the year were for the following Endowment Funds:

Clergy Trust	1000
Quebec Chapel	1200
Three Rivers Rectory	200
Frampton Mission	600

At the close of another year the Revenue arising

from the Frampton Endowment will be available toward, the support of the Clergyman in charge of that Mission.

Seven Clergymen still draw from the Clergy Trust Fund, the original number was twelve: three of of these are dead, and two have left the Diocese.

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The death of the beloved Bishop Mountain, has caused the Revenue of the Quebec Chapel Endowment Fund to become available towards the support of the Chapelries. It has therefore been apportioned by the Rector and Wardens of the Parish, in the following manner for the present year:

St. Paul's the remainder.... \$160 do.

The time having arrived for the division of the Quebec Bishopric Endowment Fund with the Diocese of Montreal, and, in accordance with the terms of the Trust deed, for equalizing the two Funds, the following arrangements have been made by your Committee, and now remain for ratification by the Society.

Market value of Quebec Funds... \$96,042.05
Market value of Montreal do..... 57,582.05
making \$19,230 the amount to be paid to the Diocese
of Montreal with interest at six per cent from 1st Jan.
1863. It will be necessary also for the Society to
authorise the Right Rev. President of the Society
and the Treasurer of the Clergy Trust, to pay the said
amount and receive a discharge therefor; after which
settlement the revenue arising from the Eudowment
will be available for the support of the Bishop of this
Diocese.

The Capital forming the Bishopric Endowment Fund at six per cent interest would not yield the contemplated amount for the support of the Bishop, viz \$5000, were it not for the present investments, which yield more by about \$200, per annum. Your Committee therefore think it advisable that the surplus revenue at the end of each year should be added

to the capital, until it has reached the sum, which at six per cent would give the necessary annual amount for the support of the Bishop. The reason for making this recommendation is obvious; for as the securites come due, your Committee find it difficult to invest in reliable securities giving a larger amount than six per cent: any surplus revenue then will be available for the Diocese generally.

Your Committee in taking a retrospect of the past, find that since 1855, the period when the Clergy Trust Fund was formed, to the present time the follow-

STATED MEETING JULY 9th, 1856.

Resolved,—That it be an instruction to the Treasurer, when transmitting the amount of any grant of memory, made by this Society, to any Parish or Mission in the Diosese, to require a receipt signed jointly by the Incumbent of such Parish or Mission, and one or both of the Churchwardens.

STATED MEETING OUTCOME STH, 1856.

Resolved,—That is a consequence grants of money (other than personal) a rused by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid, to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

STATED MEETING-JUNE 15TH, 1859.

Resolved,—That, with the exception of grants to sid in building churches, when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.
