NORTH TORONTO, May 10 .- (Special.)-Sentiment in the town to-night following the conference between the board of control and the town council at the city hall this morning is immensely strengthened toward the immediate annexation of the two municipalities, the absolute rejection of the Metropolitan double-track agreement as at present proposed, and the framing up of a new and comprehensive pro-

It was a splendid meeting and abun-dantly justified. Councillor Ball, in his efforts to bring about a joint con-ference and head off in some way the indecent haste which had hitherto marked the action of a majority of council. The frank admissions and statement of Mayor Geary embodied in these words: "It is the sense of the council to agree to the annexation of North Toronto if the proposed agree-ment with the Metropolitan Rallway is not carried out," was one of the fea-tures of Friday morning's conference In this his worship was joined by practically every member, of the board of control.

On the part of the town there was at the outset a disposition to stand out against any overtures, but the heartiness with which the board of con-trol took up and endorsed the plan had a good effect.

"If you gave North Toronto your civic railway system we would consider annexation profitable."

"That's what we propose to do," said Controller Hocken. Controller McCarthy, too, was opti-mistic and said: "I am convinced that Toronto would agree to the annexa-tion of northern territory, including North Toronto, if a comprehensive scheme of sewerage was a part of the scheme of annexation."
