NOTION TO LIMIT  
G. T. STOCK VALUE**

**Lougheed Announces to Sen-  
ate, Arbitrators Will Be  
So Instructed.**

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—The amendment by  
Senator Ross to the Grand Trunk Rail-  
way purchase bill, providing for post-  
ponement of consideration until next  
session, was defeated at 1:30 by a vote of  
39 to 35. Second reading was then car-  
ried on the same division reversed.  
Eight senators on the government side  
voted with the opposition for the  
amendment. They were Senators  
Nichols, Ross, Dow, Montclair,  
Gerrard, McLennan, Foster and White,  
(Montclair).

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—That the govern-  
ment has decided to accept an amend-  
ment putting a limit on the amount  
the arbitrators will be allowed to fix  
as the value of the Grand Trunk  
stock made today in the Senate by  
Sir James Lougheed in reply to a  
question by Senator E. D. Smith.

The figure beyond which the arbi-  
trators would not be permitted to  
go had not been decided, but it  
would be inserted in the bill when it  
reaches committee stage.

Several speeches against the meas-  
ure were made in the upper house,  
and one in favor of it. Those oppos-  
ing the bill and supporting Senator  
Ross' amendment were Sir Charles  
McLennan, White, Casgrain, Power,  
Beaue and Roche, while support for  
the bill came from Senator Smith.

**Tells Conference.**

Senator Beique, in opposing the  
purchase, said that before the con-  
struction of the transcontinental  
Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson, head of the  
Grand Trunk, and Sir William Mac-  
Kenzie together, and suggested that  
the Grand Trunk in the east and the  
Canadian Northern in the west should  
be amalgamated for the purpose of  
transcontinental development. Sir  
Charles Rivers-Wilson was not dis-  
posed to make the arrangement with  
MacKenzie & Mann, and broke off the  
negotiations rather abruptly, leaving  
the Canadian Northern magnates  
rather indignant.

## Commons Hears Argument for Increased Soldier Gratuites Beck sometimes Plan for Ontario's New Hydro Radial System

**SUSPEND WORK TWO MINUTES  
TO CELEBRATE ARMISTICE DAY**

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—A complete suspension of all normal activities for a  
period of two minutes on Tuesday, Nov. 11, the first anniversary of  
Armistice Day, is the desire of His Majesty King George, as expressed in  
a cable from Lord Milner, secretary of state for the colonies, to his ex-  
cellency, the governor-general. The message, which was read in the house  
of commons tonight by Sir George Foster, acting prime minister, follows:  
London, Nov. 6.—I am commanded by His Majesty the King to send you  
for immediate publication the following message, which is addressed to  
all the peoples of the empire:  
"To all my people, Tuesday next, Nov. 11, is the first anniversary of  
the armistice which stayed the world-wide carnage of the four preceding  
years, and marked the victory of right and freedom. I believe that my  
people in every part of the empire fervently wish to perpetuate the  
memory of that great deliverance and of those who laid down their lives  
to achieve it.  
"To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feel-  
ing, it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the armistice came  
into force, the eleventh hour of the eleventh month, there may be a  
cessation of all normal activities. During that time, except in the rare cases  
where this might be impracticable, all work, all sound and all locomotion  
should cease, so that in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be  
concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious deed.  
"No elaborate organization appears to be necessary to give a signal,  
which can easily be arranged to suit the circumstances of each locality. I  
believe that we shall all gladly interrupt our business and pleasure, what-  
ever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance."  
"Arrangements are being made for the general observance of the two  
minutes silence at 11 o'clock next Tuesday. Trains will be stopped on the  
railway lines, except in the rare cases where this might be impracticable,  
and effort will be made to get work suspended everywhere, in schools, shops,  
mines and factories and to ensure complete silence.  
"His Majesty hopes that your ministers may be willing to arrange for  
a similar observance in their simple service of silence and remembrance."

"It is, of course, impracticable, owing to distance, that the ceremony  
should synchronize throughout the empire. It is therefore suggested that 11 a.  
m. local time should be adopted everywhere.  
"Similar messages are being sent to India and to every dominion and  
colony in the empire."

**FOREIGN-OWNED SHIPS  
WILL BE REFUSED COAL  
IN UNITED STATES PORTS**

**Drastic Measure Adopted by  
U. S. Government to Con-  
serve Supply—Precedence  
to Be Given to All Land  
Traffic Before American  
Ships Supplied—Communi-  
ties Calling for Aid.**

Washington, Nov. 6.—Still hopeful  
that coal developments at Indian-  
apolis Saturday night point the way  
to an early ending of the coal strike,  
government agencies nevertheless put  
forth renewed and more determined  
efforts today to protect the public  
against distress almost certain to re-  
sult from a protracted suspension of  
mining operations.  
Realizing that the country is burn-  
ing three times as much coal as  
before the war, and that the railroad  
administration is turning out the rail-  
road agencies, thru its recently estab-  
lished central coal committee, took  
drastic action in ordering that the  
supplying of coal to foreign-owned  
ships in American ports be stopped  
immediately.

With a view to assistance from rail-  
road agencies, the coal shortage  
growing more numerous, the cen-  
tral administration turned loose a re-  
gularly available bar to meet the appear-  
ing situation.

Orders went to regional directors of  
the nation's railroads from Director  
General Hines to eliminate train ser-  
vice, where absolutely necessary, in  
order to conserve coal for the public  
interest, but it was offi-  
cially announced Saturday.

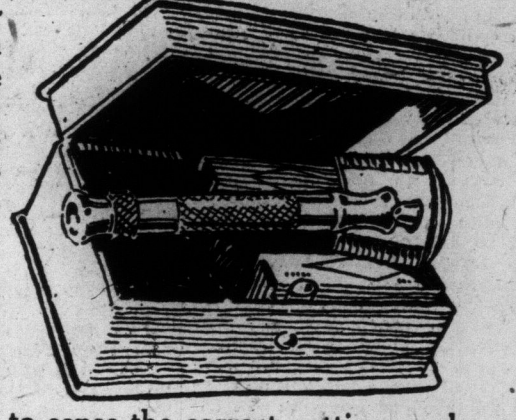

The dead woman is Mrs. Emma Baumbach, 65 years of age, who fainted in the crush and died in an ambulance on the way to a hospital.

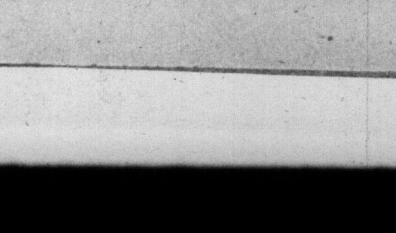
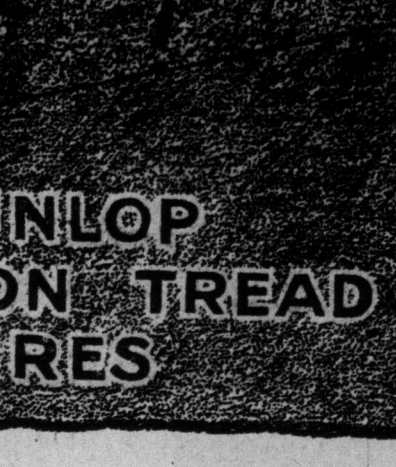
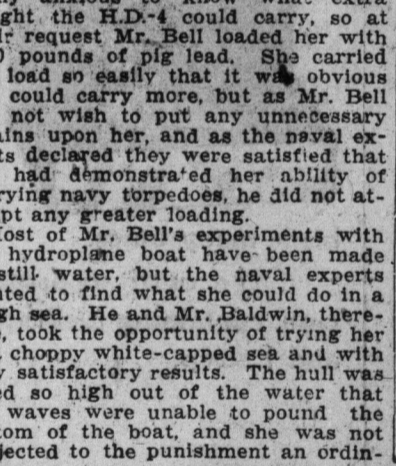
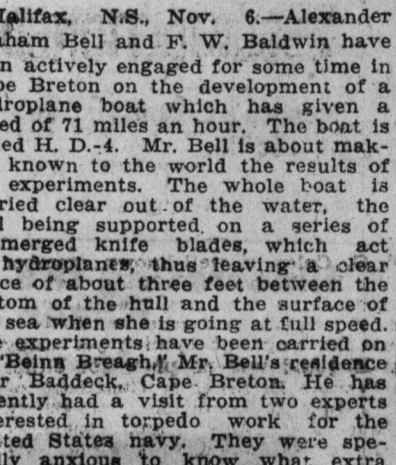
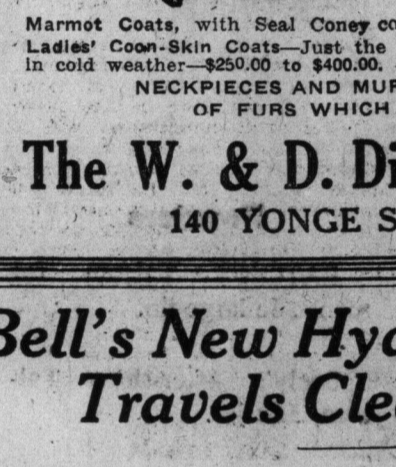

### LABOR NEWS WOULD HAVE UNION DOMINION-WIDE

Inspector Gregory Advises  
New Police Organization  
to Widen Scope.

The new police union constituted, as advised by the royal commission, held two meetings yesterday for organizational purposes. President White, Vice-President Martin and Secretary Tom Forbes took up their new offices. Secretary Forbes and P. C. Evans were delegated to confer with Sir William Meredith at Osgoode Hall Saturday morning. Sir William was chairman of the royal commission, and in presenting his report against a police union with outside affiliation, made several recommendations that he would favor in an independent organization. Forbes and Evans will endeavor to find out these suggestions and present them to the next meeting.

Inspector Gregory of the morality department attended the meeting and spoke briefly. He advised the men to cultivate a spirit of get-together, and when they were thoroughly organized to get the police outside of Toronto to join them and make it a Dominion-wide independent association. The inspector attended the recent chiefs of police convention at Calgary, where the convention went on record as favoring independent police unions.

New Members Enrolled.  
One hundred members attended, and during the day 19 new members were enrolled. Morality Officer Jack Kerr was appointed to represent the headquarters men.

J. Walter Curry, M.L.A. was appointed counsel for the local organization. Five hundred of the \$1000 donated by S. Parsons, one of the members of the royal commission, will be invested in the Victory Loan. A deputation asking for substantial increases to men of the force will appear before the commissioners Nov. 18. In the event of Judge Morson returning in time from his vacation, a number of promotions will be made. Four sergeants recently resigned, and it will require the promoting of four patrol sergeants to fill the vacancies. Four first-class constables will be given the rank of patrol sergeant.

### GREAT BRITAIN FULLY RATIONED

Returned Canadian Says Liberty of Individual is Itself Rationed.

F. G. Coles, a well-known member of the Brotherhood of Carpenters in Toronto, who has returned from a trip of several months in Britain, stated his emphatic opinion yesterday that England was no place for either the average Britisher or Canadian today, owing to conditions prevailing throughout the country, and especially in the great industrial centres. He showed The World several national ration books, now in use throughout the country, and which are ordered to be used by every householder and every family in the kingdom. "That there may be need of these ration cards I will not question," said Mr. Coles. "However, nothing has in many a decade proved so subversive of the liberties of the individual, and now one has to have his ration ticket signed by one particular butcher, one particular grocer or some particular someone else. If they haven't the things you want, well you just take what they have, and be thankful you can get anything. "I returned on the Metagama. When I came to Canada in 1908 the trip cost us (myself, my wife and one child) \$87.50; today I paid \$58 for myself alone, and the trip for me, my wife and three children cost us \$300. Take it from me, Canada is in a far more comfortable condition for the individual than England."

### BANK CLERKS TO BLAME Should Not Be Too Proud to Ask Increase, Say Labor Men.

Banks and their employees did not come in for much consideration at the hands of most Labor men interviewed yesterday afternoon by The World. The general opinion was that if the men and women employed at the various institutions were so proud that they could continue to live upon \$11 and \$12 a week without raising complaints or attempting to organize, they alone were to blame, and Labor could do nothing to help them out. "Of course it is a disgraceful situation," assented Herbert Wright, "but what can anyone do with those who are too proud to lend themselves a helping hand? I know a number of fine young men in banks in various parts of Ontario. I like them fine. But, you know, it is the old story. They won't do anything to help themselves, and for that reason everyone else is helpless in the matter. Why, if the tellers were suddenly to decide to organize and push their demands forward, nothing could prevent them from getting all they wanted."

John Cottam, financial secretary of the Toronto Trades Council, believed that many of the clerks, men and women, were with their parents, and for this reason could well afford to work for the salaries noted. The young people were alone to blame.

### CIVIC EMPLOYEES' STATUS DECIDED

Civic employees have been apprised of their exact status by an agreement decided upon yesterday. This agreement is to the effect that any employee following nine months' continuous work in any calendar year shall be eligible for three-quarter holidays and three-quarter sick pay while ill; those who have worked continuously with the civic authorities for slightly more than 50 weeks shall be considered eligible for full holidays, full sick pay. The maximum time allowed for sick pay shall be four weeks.

STANDARD-RELIEF PROBE RESUMED

Colonel Dinnick, Former Vice-President, Makes Many Disclosures.

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Mr. George H. Kilmer, K.C., objected to the inquiry being restricted and was sustained by Reference J. A. C. Cameron, whereupon Mr. Starr announced that he would appeal to the presiding judge for a ruling on this point. It was announced that a decision might not be ready for several days.

The more recent history of the Standard-Reliance Corporation was then taken up, the hearing lasting until 4 p.m., when Mr. Kilmer announced that he did not feel like going on until the scope of the investigation had been determined. Mr. Starr replied that his client, Colonel Dinnick, was anxious to hurry the matter thru, and they might decide to waive the objection taken in the morning and give Mr. Kilmer leave to cover the whole field.

The Only Witness. Colonel W. S. Dinnick, former vice-president of the Standard-Reliance Mortgage Corporation, was the only witness heard yesterday. There were a great many transactions cited by Mr. Kilmer, but Colonel Dinnick could not recall, and was repeatedly asked to refresh his memory from the books. In reply to counsel's suggestion that he should recall, he was fencing, Colonel Dinnick replied that he was not there to fence, but to tell everything he knew.

Witness said he never received a salary as vice-president of the Standard-Reliance Company; his salary had been paid by the Dovercourt Land Company. He held 54 shares in the Standard-Reliance. In answer to questions, witness said he had been asked to resign his position with the Standard-Reliance in June, 1917, by H. Waddington on the ground that he was giving too much attention to other matters, but witness felt the real reason was that he was engaged in promoting the Devonshire Hotel Company, which was to erect an hotel on the site of the Yonge street Arcade.

The Mother's Silver Cross.

There will be a general approval of the decision to adopt Mr. W. A. Fraser's suggestion to award a silver cross to every mother who was bereaved of a son in the great war. Among those who grieved none felt the pang of separation so bitterly as those who had rejected that a man had been born into the world. None remembers so long and none makes such a complete renunciation and sacrifice as the mother who yields the hope of her old age to the cause of liberty.

Hart House Theatre.

In the interesting address given by Mr. Roy Mitchell to the Women's Canadian Club on Tuesday he brought for the first time in a formal way before the public the existence of the Hart House Theatre at the University of which he is director. Mr. Mitchell is probably the best appointed man in Canada for the position he is to fill.

Denizens of Ruined Villages

Berne, Nov. 6.—The inhabitants of the destroyed villages in western Galicia are reverting to the cave dwelling customs. They are utilizing the remains of the prehistoric underground homes. In the little patch of territory 400 families are prepared to spend the winter in an underground village.

Port Affects All Trains.

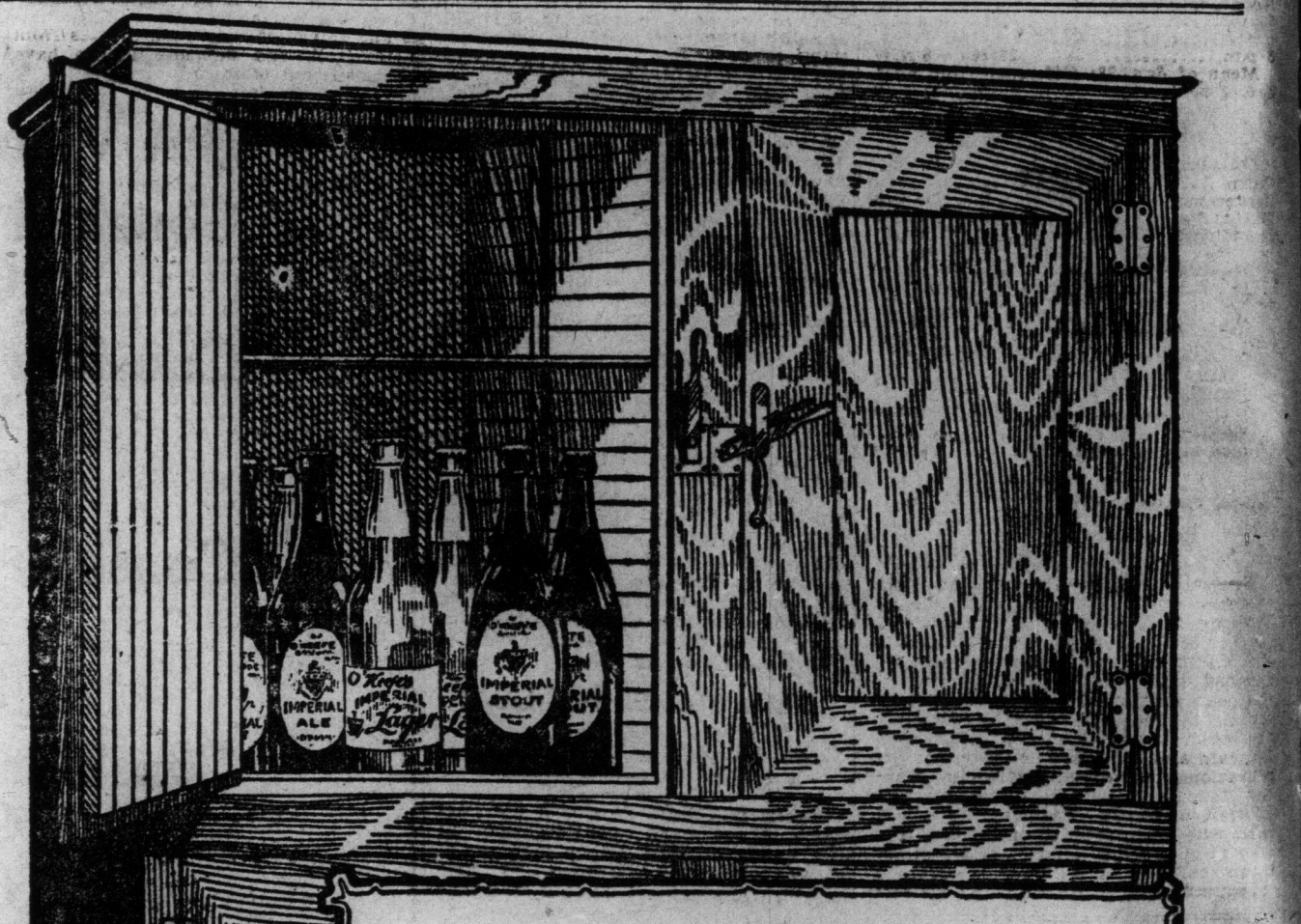

NEW YORK STOCKS SWING FEVERISHLY

Vagaries of Money Market Cause Concern—Railway Issues Are Firm.

New York, Nov. 6.—The stock market was extremely unsettled and reactionary today, the trend of prices being influenced to a greater degree than at any previous period of the year by the monetary situation.
