BATTLE FOR THE BABIES BY INVESTIGATING MILK

Mayor of New York Appoints Special Commission to Seek After Purity of Lacteal Fluid.

New York, April 12.-The battle for the babies' lives in this city has culn inated in the appointment of a special milk commission by Mayor

He has selected five experts and charged them with the duty of recommending plans for the protection of the public, and especially the babies, from infected milk.

The commission consists of Prof. Abraham Jacobi, the famous American authority on the hygienic care of infants; Dr. Joseph D. Bryant, former president of the Academy of Medicine; Dr. Mitchell Prudden, bacteriologist; Dr. Rowland G. Freeman, milk expert, and Dr. L. Emmett Hot, speialist in infants' diseases.

Gotham Aroused. This report confirmed similar demonstrations made last year by Dr. D. E. Salmon, then chief of the dairy ture, who proved also that for the communication of the tubercle bacilli to the milk and thence to the human ody, it was not necessary for the udder of the cow to be attacked by

So thoroly aroused is the New York public that it now seems certain that large part of the city's milk supply shortly be properly pasteurized and that only such portion as can be certified to be safe and free from inection will be allowed to be sold-

Such bodies as the People's Institute and the Women's Municipa League have strongly indorsed the demand for pasteurization, and Academy of Medicine has recognized the gravity of the situation by advising all consumers to boil their milk for three minutes, unless they know that they are getting milk that is safe and not affected.

London, April 12.-Interest in the rial of Harry K. Thaw for the murder of Stanford White, which at first was intense here, lagged during the later stages of the proceedings, but the unexpectedly prolonged deliberations of the Jury, and the novelty to the British public of the circumstances sur-rounding the final scenes raised curiosity here to a fever-point to learn

what the outcome of the strange case would be.

Within a few minutes of the receipt

Within a few minutes of the receipt of the cable despatch announcing that the jury had disagreed, the streets of London, in spite of the lateness of the hour, echeed with the shouts of the newsboys, the newspapers were bought up eagerly, and the people everywhere discussed with anusual avidity the likelihood of a fresh trial.

The chief criticisms heard were upon the comparative leniency of American opinion towards homicides, and what Englishmen consider a lack of dignity and method in the proceedings of the courts. It has been the boast of Englishmen that hanging invariably followed killing, here, but Home Secretary Gladstone's leniency toward Horace G. Rayner, the young man who ace G. Rayner, the young man who shot and killed Wm. Whitely last January, and the unexpected wave of sentimentalism which demanded it, led to the discussion as to whether the swift and stern processes of British law will not, in the future, more frequently, bend before public opinion. Only two Americans are practising at the British bar as barristers.



FIVE THOUSAND CHINESE

Parents Exchange Children to Be Eaten and New Graves Are Rifled for Food.

Shanghai, April 12.-Telegrams received here from 20 points in the famine district report that the conditions are growing worse.

The Chinese Government and people up to date have contributed over \$4,000, 000 for famine relief, and the sums received from all foreign sources total a half million dollars.

There are 50 missionaries, with the higher class of Chinese, engaged in overseeing the relief distribution, Confucianists, Catholics and Protestants working together.

Twenty thousand famine sufferers are employed in building dams and

canals to prevent a recurrence of floods.

The relief committee here is prompt ly sending supplies to the front, but the funds are nearing exhaustion. All the relief measures up to date are inadequate. Ten million persons are suffering from inadequate supplies of food, and three millions are nearing starvetion.

starvation.

The members of the committee at the front report that they find the bodies of the sufferers bloated, and that their faces turn green or black as the result of starvation. The people are pulling up the growing crops for food. Whole families have been found dead in their houses and corpuses are seen in their houses, and corpses are seen lying by the roadside. Probably 5000 persons are dying daily from starva-

A few cases of rioting for food have occurred, and cannibalism is beginning to be reported. Newly-made graves have been rifled of the bodies, and parents are exchanging their children to

CITY TO BE COMPETITOR WITH OWN LIGHT PLANT

oronto Electric Light Company Makes Bargain Impossible-City Gladly Withdraws.

Whatever the Toronto Electric ight Co. may feel about it the city authorities felt a great deal of relief over the withdrawal of the expropriation clause from the city bill in the private bills committee yesterday

Hon. Mr. Hanna said that the city, having made the best offer possible, could not go ahead and build a new plant and no one would be able to make any charge of breach of faith or violation of contracts. This fairly re-

presents the government view.

The citizens' view may be taken from
Hon. J. J. Foy, who said after the committee: "As a citizen of Toronto I much prefer this plan. We will now get a tresh up-to-date plant."

Fair to Others.

Corporation Counsel Fulierton sounded a note worth echoing when he reminded the committee that the city was tied up to the other municipalities which were linked in the hydro-electric power scheme, and in fairness to them the city could not do anything to prejudice their interests.

It has been remarked that the issue of \$1,000,000 new stock by the Toronto Electric Light Co. will not now be a natter of concern to the city. It is even doubted whether, in face of a duplication of the distributing plant in the city the company will desire at present to go on with their extensions. They may prefer to wait the outcome of the power scheme.

The plans of the hydro-electric pow-

orably. All the municipalities of the Western Union but six which voted in January to adopt the power bylaw have made formal application to the commission for the power they require. Toronto's application was received yesterday, and the other six, Water-loo, Preston, Hespeler, Harriston, Hamilton and Toronto Junction are exearly in the week to send in their applications. As soon as these are complete the commissioner will then sub-mit the contracts caled for by the bylaws, containing the terms, condi-tions and prices upon which the commission will supply power.

QUEEN'S MEN CAN'T VOTE LOCAL MAN BURNS ASHES

Amendment to Manhood Suffrage At Test Held Yesterday Solution Act Hits Blow at Many, Says

Clause 606, which has led to so nuch petitioning of the legislature this session, was modified yesterday in committee of the whole sitting on the Municipal Amendment Act, 1897. A distinction was made between misfeasance and non-feasance to enable municipalities to escape some of the suits under which it is stated very heavy and unjust damages are now frequently assessed against them. The act remains as it was in the case of mis-feasance, where damage is the direct outcome of work done by the municipality itself, leaving a road in a dangerous condition. In cases of non-feasance, however, when the dangerous condition is the result of floods, or such neglect as had gradually es-tablished the condition, before dam-ages could be claimed it would be ne-cessary to serve express notice on the officials of the municipality, so as to enable sufficient time for repairs to be A. G. MacKay had little sympathy with the amendments relieving corporations from responsibility. He thought

a stranger in cases of careless negli-gence should not be robbed of his ight to damages.

Hon. Mr. Hanna pointed out that the statute law was being dealt with. The thru traveler would have his recourse under the common law.

Relieve Mineral Lands.

An amendment in one of the clauses of the Assessment Act by which, in-stead of assessing the mineral rights on lands where these are held separately from the surface rights, petroleum rights only are assessed, will relieve the Eastern Ontario mineral lands which have been worked, but are now lying idle. A good deal of discussion preceded the adoption of the amendment, Hon, Mr. Matheson speaking strongly for the exemption of the mineral lands of Eastern Ontario. The amendment as carried will bring the Canada Company and other petro the tax collector. The provincial trea-surer argued that the imposition of the tax on full values of mineral deposits would simply prevent foreign investment; and would amount to con-The two cent an acre tax fiscation. was sufficient, he thought.

Assess Vacant Lands. The assessment of vacant lands in cities caused a general discussion. I was decided that blocks of land of not less than fifty acres should be as-sessed at farm values. Under that quantity shall be rated at foot frontage values. The bill as amended was





They ask a nine-hour day and the trade situation here during the past week. Wholesalers in most lines are still the trade situation here during the past week. Wholesalers in most lines are still working hard to catch up with the orders in hand, and they are still much handicapped by the slowness of manufacturers' deliveries. The sorting trade is taking a good hold in drygoods. It may not be a record one in the matter of volume, however, as a good many early orders had to be sent out short. Textile prices all hold very firm. The movement in hardware continues very heavy, altho it will be still heavier as soon as navigation opens. Small goods are moving briskly, but it is in heavy lines that the great trade of the year is going to be done. Machinery shops of all kinds are exceedingly busy, and the car foundries here have unlimited orders on hand. Metal prices are generally firm. The grocery trade is fairly active. Sugars, teas and canned goods hold firm. All lines of wholesale trade report there is some slight improvement to collections, altho from some parts of the country they, are still inclined to be slow. Last year navigation opened at this port about April 7. This year it is likely to be a week or two later on account of the thickness of the ice. Ice-breakers are at work in the River St. Lawrence, and by this means it is expected the harbor will be clear ealier than it otherwise would be this means it is expected the harbor will be clear ealier than it otherwise would be. The government will this year spend \$2,000,000 on the waterway from Montreal to

the sea, and it is expected to shortly \$3,000,000 towards the completion of \$3,000,000 towards the completion of improvements now under way in this harbor. The coming season promises a record volume of shinging baselone. they would not welcome any further de-mands upon their capacity. Drygoods men still loully complain of the slowness of deliveries of textiles. They are now endeavoring to keep up with an active sorting trade. 



Two Historic Pictures



OLD KNOX CHURCH.

T AKEN from recent photographs which already might be termed historic, since the landmarks they perpetuate are now themselves no morethe two above "coarse-screen, half-tone" engravings, as they are called, appear in our advertisement to-day to mark the beginning of a great change.

In 1820 Jesse Ketchum gave the block of land extending from Queen to Richmond Streets and from Bay Street nearly to Yonge Street, for the purpose of found-

ng a Presbyterian Church. His son-in-law, the Rev. James Harris, was the first minister. The manse house, a little frame building, with a garden in front, stood on Bay Street - and still stands, although the garden has given place

to a small store. In 1847, after the fire of 1846, Knox Church, as we have so long known it, was erected for what was by then the largest and wealthiest congregation in Ontario. Rev. Dr. Burns was the minister, and the most prominent citizens of Toronto attended the services, including over 1000 regular communicants. In 1870 the school house was built on the Richmond Street

KNOX CHURCH SCHOOL HOUSE

For fifty years the steeple tower of Knox Church has been a landmark for all Toronto. In 1896, however, during the big Simpson fire, the steeple caught fire and burned down to the top of what might be termed its pedestal. It was never entirely rebuilt, and the picture shows its appearance when the repairs decided upon were complete. For even then it was felt that the days of the old church's usefulness were numbered - the situation was too far "down town."

In the summer of 1905, after the whole matter had been thoroughly thrashed out in the Synod, orders were issued to demolish the old Knox edifice and to use the materials to help build a new Knox Church at Harbord and Wilcox Streets. Here a \$250,000 building is now in pro-

cess of construction. Meanwhile, on April 1, 1907, The Robert Simpson Company came into formal possession of the historic old Knox Church site, and on that day at seven o'clock the first shovel of earth was taken out of the foundations for a new building, a building which shall, in its way, become as noteworthy a landmark for this city as has been its famous predecessors, the pictures of which we revive to-day.
