

## THE ARMIES AT SANTIAGO.

Yesterday's news showed that the American front had been extended further north almost to El Caney. The Spaniards have abandoned their strong position at Aguadores on the left flank, but still hold the fortifications near the sea at the port of Aguadores.

At this hour a report has just reached here that Gen. Lawton, aided by fresher regiments, sent him early in the afternoon, had turned the enemy's left, and has troops already in the city, where almost a hand-to-hand encounter is going on in the streets.

General Shafter, however, sent word this afternoon to General. Calixto Garcia that the surrender of the city would not be long delayed.

A conservative estimate by army men, not official, is that the American casualties during yesterday's fighting were nearly, if not quite, a thousand, about 15 per cent. of which were deaths. To-day's casualties on the American side were much fewer, because their troops had been well entrenched the night before.



A Plethora of Money.

There is more money in the United States than there are investments seeking it, and in a short time so much more money will have been let loose that capital will fairly be a drug on the market. Men who should know say that it looks as though present offers of 1½ per cent, for call money and 2 to 3 per cent, for time money would not be improved upon for the balance of the year. There can hardly be any improvement. In fact, the situation must get worse, for with July 1 began the large disbursement period, when from the coffers of the dividend-paying companies started to come huge sums to be distributed throughout the country, and this money will return again to the field of investment looking for interest, and having, perforce, to be content with a very small return. It is calculated that the amount of money being distributed at the first of this month totals nearly \$150,000,000. Another factor in the flooding of the money market is the enormous expenditure by the United States Government on account of war expenses of vast sums for the equipment and rationing of troops, meaning the adding of much more to the floating currency of the country. With so much money available, therefore, the natural result is that, instead of the investments seeking the investor, it is the other way. Investors are seeking an avenue for the placing of their money. In this state of affairs is to be found a prime factor on which a buil movement in the stock market may be based. In fact, such a movement is predicted to begin next Tuesday on Wall-street.
