THE BATTLE OF SAN PABLO

But the Spanish Rifle Pits Were Not Much Damaged by the Big Guns at Santiago.

Of Santiago de Cuba, July 1, via Kings- ton, N.Y., July 2, 8 a.m.—Before 5 o'clock this morning the crew of the flagship New York was astray, eating a hurried breakfast, and at 5:50 "general quarters" was sounded and the flagship headed in towards Aguaduros, about three miles east of Morro Castle. The other ships retained their blockading positions.

Along the shore between the smoke of an approaching train from Altaras was seen. It was composed of open cars full of Gen. Duffield's troops. At a cutting a mile east of Aguaduros, the train stopped and the Cuban scouts proceeded along the railroad track. The troops got out of the cars and soon formed in a long thin line, standing out vividly against the yellow rocks that rose perpendicularly above, shutting them off from the main body of the army which is on the other side of the hill, several miles north. From the quarter of the flagship there was a signal by a vigorous zig-zagged letter, and a few minutes later from a clump of pines at the water's edge came the answer from the army. The landing of the army at Baliqui and Altaras was purely a naval affair. With the flag in the hand the soldier appeared like a butterfly.

Waiting for the signal, "Are you waiting for us to begin?" was the signal made by Rear Admiral Sampson to the army. "Yes, we are," came the answer from the shore to the flagship. By this time it was 7 o'clock, and the Admiral ran the flagship's bow within three-quarters of a mile of the beach. She remained almost motionless, and the forenoon, and the daring way she was handled by Capt. Chadwick within sound of the breakers made the Cuban pilot on board stare with astonishment.

The Suanave was in company with the flagship, still closer in shore, and the Gloucester was to the westward near Morro Castle. From the southward the Newark came up and took a position near Morro Castle. Her decks were black with 1000 or more troops. She went alongside of the flagship and was told to disembark the troops at Altaras.

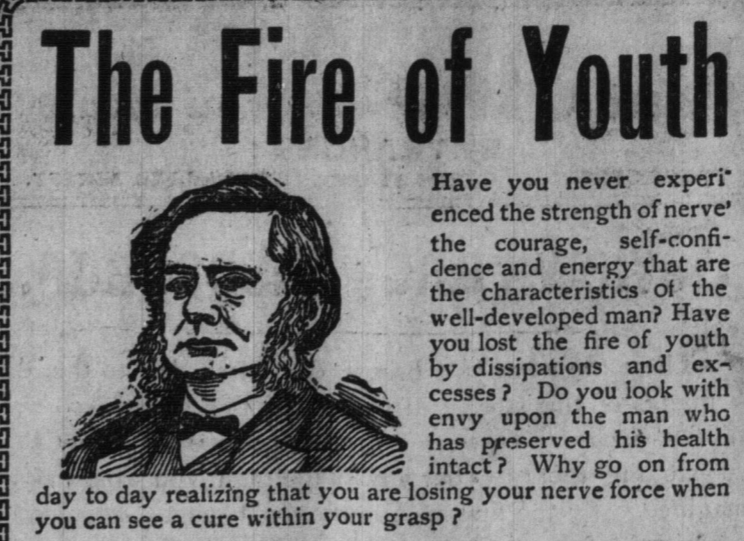

FIRST ARTILLERY FIGHT

Ended in Silencing a Spanish Battery. The Spanish battery on the right of the San Juan blockhouse. The shells burst like clockwork.

There was a blunder in allowing the infantry to be massed behind the battery's position, and most of the fatalities on our side are attributable to that error. Law's division bivouacked near El Chero last night without fires.

At 7 o'clock this morning there was a sudden boom. It was the first shot from Capron's battery, fired to arrest the killing of his son.

The battery's losses, the officers state, was as follows: Killed—Pike, Underwood and Helm. Wounded—Pike, Underwood, Helm, Kelly, Vetter, Ferguson, Cornford, Corporal Keene.

The battery was supported by the Rough Riders, about 100 Cubans, with a Hotchkiss gun and a detachment of the 10th Cavalry and a squad from Company C of the 2nd U.S. Infantry.

Most of the Spanish shells fell low over the crest of the battery's position and exploded in the air, doing little damage.

The Cuban leader, Gonzalez, reports that the Cubans lost 20 killed and wounded.
