Woman's World...

Devoted Specialty to the Interests of our Women Readers.

A roomful of silent women is a difficult thing to imagine, but the colorist them. Can you believe it, girls? Yet The Yokohama Mail declares that such a phenomenal community exists at a place called Yunakana, about seven miles from Hakodate. They are recluse women, ranging from sweet sixteen to sunny twenty-seven, and annually they are said to be recreated as beautiful as hours. How they came to congregate there, what their object is, and above all how they came to voluntarily yield up their secular feminine privileges of using their tongues, or Japanese contemporary sayeth out. The building which houses these eccentric females is located on a farm of some 200 acres, the work of which is not done by the women, and the presiding genius of the institution is a matron of mature years who exacts implicit obedience. They spend their time indoors, studying their Bibles and, says the pawky writer of the article, they "appear" to observe a strict rule of silence. It is, however, one thing to "appear" and quite another thing to be, as we all find out sooner or later in this life. One of the most incoherent gossips I ever knew, one of the biggest mischief makers, and one of the most inveterate talkers, was a countrywoman of mine, who, being convinced that silence was her peculiar gift. She always prefaced the choice bit of gossip or scandal with which she was about to regale her bosom cronies with "Ye ken, Jean, I'm a silent woman, so you see it is one thing to profess restraint of the unruly member and another to observe it. I fancy my colony of silent women is something like my ancient Scotch friend.

It seems odd to us, who some dozen and more years ago began to graduate women from our universities, to read of the slow progress the higher education of woman has made in Germany. But in spite of the Kaiser's famous dictum that four K's are sufficient to fill any woman's life, the women of the Fatherland are beginning to wake up and are rapidly emulating their more independent sisters of the west. Within the last two years there has been a remarkable increase of women students at the universities. In the winter of 1898-99 only 177 female students were enrolled upon the books of the ten great schools of Germany, and these were chiefly concentrated at Berlin. At the end of 1897 the number rose to 247, and every university except Muenster could boast of female students. At the beginning of this year the total reached 414, Berlin securing more than half of the girls of the cap and gown. They seem to be taking a keen interest in the sciences, and philosophy together with ethics and logic. Next comes history, art and natural science. Medicine has attracted the attention of many, law, six, and education seven.

During the past four years, in spite of the fact that many of the girls are sent to teachers, the subject of pedagogy is having a wide berth in mathematics so far have only attracted 15.

YAKUTA BAY EARTHQUAKES.

A Man Who Was at the Scene, Tells an Interesting Story About Them.

DOORS SLAMMED, DISHES RATTLED, TREES SWAYED TO AND FRO AND A GRAVEYARD WAS WASHED OUT OF EXISTENCE.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 23.—Climb E. Hill has arrived here from Yakuta Bay, the section most violently disturbed by the earthquake of Sunday, Sept. 3 and 10. Of the terrible visitation and what he saw and experienced during it, Young Hill said: "On Sunday afternoon we were eating dinner in Steve Gee's house, when the house began to rock and shake violently. This was Sept. 3, about 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon. The house rocked so violently that the door swung to and fro, and finally with a crash. Dishes rattled, the table moved and it seemed every article was going to be overturned. "We all rushed to our feet and ran towards the street. As it was enough to frighten almost anyone for looking towards the timber, we could see the trees rocking back and forth and the water crossing the reef in the bay was whipped into a mass of seething foam.

The Following Week. "During the week that followed there were one or two slight tremors, but nothing of any consequence until Sunday morning, Sept. 10, at 8 o'clock. We were all asleep in the mission, when about 10 o'clock the one of the week before past the former one, and from the same direction, only we noted this difference by watching the swaying of the lamp, the tremor would start almost due south and would work its way around until the lamp was swung almost due west to east. We all piled out of the house as soon as we could and witnessed the same swaying of the trees, but much more than before, and the house crashed and groaned as if being shaken to pieces. Not one of us had stopped to dress, before rushing out to see what was going on over us returned and got our clothing on.

The Missionary. Mr. Johnson did not intend to hold services that morning, because the slight shaking kept coming every few minutes, and he was afraid to go into a crowd in the building, but the Indians, all, who had once more fled to the hills, begged him to have services, saying that they were afraid to go into the hills. "Just as the earthquake ceased, we saw a wonderful sight. The sea was rolling in great tidal waves. There were three of them, following each other at intervals of about five minutes, and we stood and watched the bay rise from 15 feet above the tide to 30 feet above the highest tide point. The whirling trees, lumber and what were around and about, so fast that the eye could hardly follow them.

Graveyard Was Gone. "Just across from Yakuta in the bay is the island of Kaitum, on which an old Indian village was situated on a point and a yard and all had disappeared, sunk out of sight. The next day, however, a boat was rowed over to the island. Our boat was rowed over to the place where the boat had formerly been, and looking down into the water, we could see the tops of trees.

Still More Quakes. Victoria, B.C., Sept. 24.—The seismograph installed here by Mr. J. N. Davidson of the Dominion Meteorological Service today recorded yet another earthquake in the north, the most severe of the series. The instrument, which had been in operation since May 1, at 5.48 there was a severe shock of two minutes duration. Further disturbances makes the arrival of the steamer from the north anxiously awaited.

ROSWELL MILNER DROPS OUT.

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 23.—At the annual meeting of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Company, held here today, former Second Vice-President Albert J. DROWNED AT LINDSAY.

Lindsay, Sept. 24.—(Special.)—Yesterday morning Homer G. Kennedy, six-year-old son of Mr. Robert Kennedy, was drowned in the river here below Kennedy & Davis' lumber yard. He attempted to swim a lumber saw with a pile pole, when he fell into the water. Boys who were playing with him ran home without giving an alarm. At dinner time one little boy said Homer had fallen into the water and this was the first intimation of the accident. The boy who told his mother pointed out the spot, and the body was found at 2 p.m. The funeral took place today.

MRS. BOOK DECLARED INSANE.

Woman Who Drowned Her Baby Will Be Sent to an Asylum.

St. Catharines, Ont., Sept. 23.—At inquest on the drowning of the infant child of Rosa Book of Silverton, near here, was held there this afternoon before Coroner Comfort. The jury returned a verdict stating that the child came to its death by being thrown into the well by the mother, who did so in a fit of temporary insanity. Mrs. Book will be removed to an asylum.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 23.—Plymouth, capital of the island of Montserrat, reports the destruction by fire of many buildings which had escaped the recent hurricane and most of the remaining ruins, greatly increasing the distress of the population. A week's growing drought over the island has added to the distress.

INSANITY CURED.

A Missouri Doctor Has Discovered That Lymph From Goats' Glands is Effective.

Joliet, Ill., Sept. 23.—Irwin Fuller Bush, a young man, was sent to Kanakake Asylum last March, pronounced hopelessly insane. To-day, through treatment with lymph from glands of goats, Bush is at home completely restored in mind. The physician of Green City, Dr. Roberts, a lymph was discovered in the laboratory of the University of Missouri, where Bush was taken. He showed a steady gain until he was discharged last Tuesday. The treatment has gone to Europe to lay his discovery before Prof. K. N. Pridmore, and other foreign scientists, with a view of having them adopt it in insane asylums there.

SUSPICIOUS OF BANKS.

Mexican Ladies Had a Strong Box for Their Money, But Were Robbed.

City of Mexico, Sept. 23.—Gundulpe Vasquez, 35 years of age, and her widowed daughter, were robbed of \$50,000 which they kept in a steel box. They did not know the box was safe in the banks and kept it in the house. The police have made a number of arrests and are endeavoring to locate the robbers.
