## VANCOUVER IS CRIPPLED

By the Tremendously Heavy Mantle of Our Lady of the Snows—A Week's Storm.

Vancouver, B.C., Jan. 7.—Snow has been falling almost incessantly for a week now, and its depth, combined with the heaving of everyone being unprepared for such an unprecedented occurrence on this coast, has resulted in demoralizing trade. Lumber mills are closed down and shipping generally is suspended. The streets are blocked and the coast service has been both damaged in collisions with icebergs south of Skagway and extreme weather is reported from the north. Today the snowstorm has been unusually severe and much damage to property is reported. The roof of the Vancouver Sash and Door Factory, of a large lively stable and other lesser buildings have caved in with the weight of snow, and street cars are blocked on tracks all thru the city, the company's plows and staff being totally unequal to the task of keeping the lines open during the present storm. Such a snowstorm is unprecedented in the history of the city.

## WILLIAM POLSON IS DEAD

Head of the Polson Iron Works Passed Away Last Night After a Brief Illness.

At the Age of Sixty-Seven He Had Lived to See Life a Great Success.

Mr. Wm. Polson, superintendent of Polson Iron Works, passed away last night at his late residence, 102 Pembroke-street, after a brief illness. In his death Toronto loses one of its most prominent business men, and one who was widely known.

Mr. Polson was born in Montreal 47 years ago. There he spent his early days. After receiving an education in the Montreal Collegiate Institute, he became mechanical superintendent of the Cobourg, Peterboro and Marmora Railway, with headquarters at Cobourg. Later he engaged with the Grand Junction Railway, running out of Belleville, as mechanical superintendent. In 1888 he removed to this city and inaugurated the business of the Polson Iron Works, an industry which has rapidly expanded.

# MAYOR HENDRIE HAMILTON'S MAYOR BY AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

Complexion of the Council Decidedly Conservative—Ottawa Elected Ald. Morris With Emphasis, and Mayor Rumball Has a Second Term in London—Kingston Council is Liberal—Politics Not in the Game to Any Large Extent.

Hamilton, Ont., Jan. 7.—(Special.)—The municipal elections were conducted quietly, but a good sized vote was polled all round. The majority fight resulted in an easy win for Hendrie, his real opponents, Finlay and Tompkins, being left a long way behind. He had a majority in every ward. The votes secured by the four candidates were: Mayor Hendrie, 4280; Aik, Finlay, 2188; Ald. Tompkins, 1141; William Barrett, 442. Hendrie's plurality over Finlay was 2068, over Tompkins, 3118, majority over all 485. The election of Mayor Hendrie was duly celebrated during the evening by his friends.

London, Jan. 7.—The municipal elections here today passed off quietly, and the vote polled was only an ordinary one. The majority contest the return of Mayor Rumball by a good majority was not a surprise to the general electors. His most serious opponent being Ald. H. M. Douglas, who the electors voted against.
