Not Half the Requisite Number Polled

212,723 Votes Needed, Only 170,862 Got

Incomplete Returns Show That the Cause of the Prohibitionists Has Not Been Supported With the Necessary Force—Vote Everywhere, Except Toronto, Was Small—Bad Roads and General Apathy Put Down As the Cause.

Yesterday the people of the Province of Ontario voted on the question, Are you in favor of bringing into force the Liquor Act of 1902? The returns received up to the hour of going to press were very incomplete owing to the bad state of the roads in the country districts. But sufficient figures were at hand to show that the vote is not large enough to bring the Liquor Act into force. Those favoring the act had to poll 212,723 votes.

The latest returns by the Great Northwestern Telegraph Company show: For the Act.....105,193 Against the Act.....65,669 Majority.....39,524 Total Vote 170,862

But fifteen constituencies are not included in these figures. They have not reported or reported only majorities. In fact only a few constituencies have sent in completed returns. It was impossible last night to get full returns.

The figures given by the Canadian Pacific Telegraph Co. differ immaterially from the above. They are: For the Act.....101,033 Against the Act.....60,469 Majority.....40,564 Total Vote 161,502

Hence from the G.N.W. figures it is shown that the friends of the Liquor Act have fallen short of its enforcement by 107,850, having brought to the polls fewer than half the requisite number of voters.

This vote does not compare well with the vote polled in the first plebiscite in Ontario in 1894. The vote then was 122,880 for the plebiscite, and 110,720 against it. The cause for the prohibition is also shown by this to have lost heart, for they fell by the wayside to the number of 45,051. Perhaps they considered it useless to vote.

The total vote cast yesterday was 170,862. The total vote cast at the last general election was 499,000. Hence in seeking for a cause for the prohibition we are brought to the conclusion that it is down primarily to indifference on both sides of the question. Other

REEVE CALLED ON FREMEN RIOT FOLLOWED THE ORDER

Streams of Hose Turned on Brick Builders Because Grand Trunk Tore Up Old Structure Before Agreement With Town Was Signed.

St. Catharines, Dec. 4.—Rather a serious riot occurred at Merriton today. The G.T.R. had planned to erect a new bridge over its tracks on the main street of the village, and had a new structure almost complete to place in position. To-day the company tore out a portion of the old bridge to make room for the new frame.

This proceeding was not according to the expectations of the Merriton authorities. The railway men were told to desist from the work, and the bridge was not to be erected. No one of authority representing the railway was present, but at 3 o'clock William Carter for the village and Reeve Wilson conferred with the foreman in charge of the work and agreed to allow the work of clearing the wreckage from the tracks to go on.

Toronto Gave 1490 Majority for Act Nearly 27,500 Votes Cast Yesterday

South and East Divisions Against Prohibition, But the Majorities Were More Than Offset By the North and West—Remarkable Interest Evincend in the Situation By All Classes.

Nearly 27,500 votes were cast in Toronto. With five sub-divisions to be counted from the total was 27,334, giving a majority of 1490 in favor of the act. Voting was reported brisk all day in most sub-divisions, and there was every evidence that both sides were working hard. The large vote which came out was a surprise. The returns from South and West Toronto came in quickly, but in the north and east a foolish system had been adopted in numbering the sub-divisions, and there was confusion in these two constituencies, which leaves the returns hardly complete. The north gave a majority of 1377 for the act. This was offset by a majority of 1298 against in the south. In the east the majority was 442 against, but it was in the west where the prohibitionists piled up their votes, and the majority there was 1843 in favor of the act.

GOVERNMENT MUST NOW FACE A NEW SITUATION

REV. J. A. MACDONALD CALLS ON MR. ROSS TO ACT

Secretary Spence Says Temperance People Are Gratified At the Result.

Rev. J. A. Macdonald, editor of the Westminster, and the man who suggested the referendum, said last night: "I am perfectly satisfied with the vote. It justifies the reference to the people and the conditions of the referendum. That so large a vote was polled in Toronto and so large a majority for the act, is very significant, all the more so because it was polled on a special day. The government must now face the new situation, and face it honestly. This vote can not and dare not be ignored. The cities have virtually voted that the bar-room should be abolished. That was the rallying cry of this campaign, and it is a most encouraging result. What saved the situation was the fact that the act was placed on the abolition of the bar. If the required number is not obtained, it may be a good thing after a better act for the interests of Ontario may be secured. In any event, the government must face the situation."

SECRETARY SPENCE PLEASED.

F. S. Spence, secretary of the Ontario Alliance, was not at all disheartened by the result of the day's polling. At 10 o'clock he handed to the press the following statement: "I believe the temperance people, as a whole, are very much gratified with the result of the campaign, in fact, it has been a gratifying campaign all the way along. We had, I think, the most thorough organization we have ever had in any such contest. There was not an electoral district in the province without its central committee and its force of workers. Perhaps the most distinctive feature of the campaign was that it was largely a campaign of the central point around which all the temperance societies and all the church organizations could rally. We had representative conventions in all the constituencies and out of these grew the detailed organization that produced this result."

Surprised at the Majority.

"The figures are not sufficiently complete yet to enable one to say whether or not the act has come into operation. I am a little surprised at the largeness of the majority that we have had. We are especially pleased with the good workers that the act has increased the liquor vote far beyond its lawful dimensions, and our majority in Toronto of legal votes is very much greater than the returns show. The liquor men's campaign was a very quiet campaign. They did not come out into the open as on former occasions, they did not hold any meetings, and the result was that there was not

the same controversy drawing out our people and leading to enthusiasm. I think that if the liquor men had fought openly and vigorously, as they did before, both our vote and our majority would have been very much greater. While I believe the vote is the expression of opinion, both on the question of temperance and prohibition, the campaign took largely the form of a campaign against the bar-room feature of the liquor business. As you know, it was "Banish the bar," and as it was no one can mitigate the force of the meaning of that vote as a condemnation of the bar-room system by the intelligent people of the Province of Ontario. We did not court this contest; it was forced upon us, and we took it as part of the fight in which we have been engaged. We took it in the general line of our work."

Next Move Uncertain.

"If the act should be carried, I cannot tell you what will be the next move; it will be considered by the people and the conditions of the referendum should be abolished. That was the rallying cry of this campaign, and it is a most encouraging result. What saved the situation was the fact that the act was placed on the abolition of the bar. MEN IN CLERICAL GARB IMPERSONATE PRIESTS

CITY POLICE MAKE FOUR ARRESTS AT THE POLLS

Crooked Work by the Wholesale Charged by the Advocates of Prohibition.

The temperance people claim that wholesale impersonation was practised in Toronto yesterday on behalf of the liquor interests. Four men were arrested during the day, and many other cases were brought to light. At one place three men of a clerical appearance were brought in and actually impersonated three priests. They were suspected by one of the scrutineers, but in spite of the letters pleading to have them sworn the returning officer did not deem it advisable to do so. It is not unlikely that future developments of an interesting character will come out of this particular case, as it is said that one of the impersonators at least is known.

Will Look Up Barrister.

Alexander Mills, barrister, has in hand a large number of reported wrong doings. Several of the reports which he has ascertained to be true, while others will require further investigation before they are made known.

At one division ten ballots were found against the Liquor Act without any initials. These, of course, were not counted.

A man giving his name as Montague tendered a ballot at another poll, and although he was not on the list the ballot was counted. This will be given further attention.

In another there were 14 extra ballots, and in another nine extra without initials. These had been stuffed into the boxes, but lacking initials were thrown out. In the former division three short brothers of 278 Wellesley-street were impersonated. This division is at the corner of Windsor and Wellesley-streets.

Voiced for Priests.

It was at poll 20, South Toronto, that the votes were being counted. This division is at 222 East King-street. The parties who did the impersonating were three men of clerical appearance, and they were dressed in clerical robes. They were seen by the scrutineer, but were not detected until after the pseudo priest had voted the three real ballots, but were entered to cast their ballots, but were duped of their privilege.

THE REFERENDUM VOTE. The prohibitionists yesterday secured a heavy numerical majority over their opponents, they hopelessly failed to poll half the number of votes required to bring the Liquor Act of 1902 into force. On the whole, the vote may be characterized as one of indifference, and there is no doubt that the advocates of prohibition refrained from going to the polls because 60 per cent of them considered that the vote would be a referendum on the liquor issue, and because they believed that no such measure as the Liquor Act submitted to them could, even if carried, be enforced. At any rate, the vast majority of voters—fully four-sevenths of those who exercised the franchise in the last provincial election—failed to vote in the referendum.

Improving the Library. The regular monthly meeting of the Public Library Board was held to-day. All the members were present. A number of accounts were passed, the sum total amounting to \$420.44. It was recommended by the Library Committee, and passed by the board, that a number of books amounting to about \$150 be purchased. The Building and Finance Committee recommended that the tender of G. H. Milne for hinged wire screens, to be used in the reading room, be accepted, and additional shelving for the book department, at a cost of about \$25, be accepted. This was also carried.

CANADA'S DRAWING POWERS. A clear indication of how the "Americans" themselves regard the recently inaugurated "American" trek into the Canadian Northwest is found in the action just taken by a group of railroads operating in the Southwest States. A great many of last summer's immigrants into Manitoba and the Territories were drawn from Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas, and the transportation companies running there these immigrants are evidently afraid that the exodus will continue next season. And so they have held a joint consultation, with a view to stimulating the tide in their own direction.

WE NEED A DEAD MEAT TRADE. It is imperative that Canada should develop a dead meat industry. We have been campaigning in favor of the establishment of an export cattle trade for some time, and the necessity of such a trade in this country is emphasized by the recent outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in the New England States. Should the epidemic become even more widespread than it is across the line, the United States cattle trade would find an outlet in the United States dead meat industry. Even in case Great Britain entirely shut off all live-food imports from the United States, the Americans could still send their animals in the shape of dead meat. But Canada is in a different and much less advantageous position. Should the epidemic get into this country, Great Britain would place an absolutely prohibitive embargo on all our export cattle, and the effect of such an embargo would be most disastrous to a trade that is worth \$10,000,000 to the Dominion. Without a chilled meat industry, as we are at present, we would be unable to export our cattle in the form of chilled beef.

PILOTING DISEASED JEWS. Solomon Asmenski of Montreal arrested in Odessa, N.Y. Odessa, N.Y., Dec. 4.—Solomon Asmenski, a Russian Jew from Montreal, was arrested here to-day by Immigration Inspector Estell, while plotting to this side Russian Jews, suffering from eye diseases that had caused their rejection by United States inspectors at Montreal. Asmenski was held for night in the Central Prison, now sitting at Ulka, and was taken there to-night. The afflicted Jews will be taken to Canada and returned to their native land at the expense of the steamship company, on whose vessels they came from Russia.

ROYAL TEMPLARS' CONCERT. About 3000 people attended the Toronto District Royal Templars of Tennessee concert in Massey Hall on Thursday night, and between the numbers of those who attended the returns. The band of the 48th Highlanders was in attendance, and the program was an excellent one. Harold Jarvis sang several selections, which were highly applauded. Readings were given by Hattie Moore Hamberger, very pretty airs, and later on by Mrs. Leonard James-Kennedy, a couple of feeling and expression a song of Mrs. Jarvis, W. W. E. R. Eddy, one of the most prominent teachers of Ontario County, and for many years principal of Brookline Public School, passed through the city last night on his way to Denver, Colo., where he is ordered by his physician to rest. The news came like a bolt of lightning in a clear sky, to the residents of Brookline, and deep sympathy for Mr. Eddy and his family pervades throughout the community. Many of Mr. Eddy's more immediate friends assembled at his residence in Brookline last night to bid him farewell, and incidentally to present him with a purse of \$125 in gold. Mrs. Eddy, who remains in Canada a week or two before joining her husband in Denver, accompanied him to the city last night, where she received the heartfelt sympathy of several friends, who were at the Union Station to meet her.

TORPEDO BOATS CARRY MAILS.

Marsilles, Dec. 4.—The prefect and Admiral Rouvier had a conference this afternoon with the president of the syndicate of the merchant marine and another large ship owner, both of whom declared that they had no authority to discuss the claims put forward by the sailors. Later in the day the syndicate met, but a statement was given out that no negotiations were pending.

CASTRO DOES NOT SATISFY.

Note to German Minister at Caracas a Week Ago is Considered Inadequate.

ULTIMATUM TO BE PRESENTED SOON.

All Hope of a Peaceful Settlement Has Been Abandoned in Berlin.

Berlin, Dec. 4.—The note of President Castro of Venezuela presented to the German minister at Caracas a week ago, is not satisfactory to the German government. It is deemed inadequate and as being probably designed to gain further territory. Its partial acceptance by the German demands was coupled with conditions that are unacceptable.

The exchange of views with the British Foreign Office resulted in a decision to proceed with the joint action. An ultimatum will almost certainly be presented in a few days. The phrasing of the note is the subject of present correspondence between the governments of Germany and Venezuela. All hope has been abandoned in Berlin of a peaceful settlement, and Venezuela has greater grounds for confidence in Germany's consent, coupled with improper comments.

SMALLPOX AT LUNDY'S LANE.

Niagara Falls, Dec. 4.—A virulent type of smallpox was located in Lundy's Lane, about half a mile from the village of Drummondville, last evening. The patient is J. E. R. Birdsell, who has been visiting his mother the last few weeks. Mr. Birdsell is from near South River, northern Ontario, where he has a sawmill. A few days ago he visited Rochester, N.Y., where he is said to have contracted the disease. Dr. J. McArthur, who is attending him, pronounced his case to be smallpox, and reported the case to the Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Bryce Toronto, who has ordered the house quarantined, the inmates vaccinated, and medical attendants appointed.

RUSSIA ANSWERED.

England Declines to Submit Suez Question to Arbitration.

London, Dec. 4.—Replying to a question today in the House of Commons on the subject of Russia's offer to submit the question of Russian sugar and all other goods to the arbitration of The Hague Tribunal, under Foreign Secretary Cranborne, said the government had informed Russia that it did not consider the question a proper one for submission to international arbitration, but that Great Britain was still ready to denounce the commercial treaty of 1850 if Russia desired.

U.S. MINISTER TO JAPAN DEAD.

Washington, Dec. 4.—Alfred E. Buck of Georgia, Minister to Japan, died today. He was on a duck hunting trip. The cause of death was apoplexy.

WITHDREW CASE FROM JURY.

Charge of Seduction Against Robert Muir Fell Thru in the Criminal Sessions.

FRAUD CHARGE WAS DISMISSED.

Michael Vaher, Injured in Hotel Row, Sues for Damages—At Osgoode Hall.

In the Criminal Sessions on Thursday Judge McDougall withdrew from a jury the case of Robert Muir charged with seducing under promise of marriage Mabel Tyrell, a girl of 18 years. The complainant is the daughter of deaf and dumb parents, and met Muir in a knitting factory, where they were both employed. In the witness box she swore that she asked her father if she would should herself if he brought down a revolver. Judge McDougall decided that as she was not positive that an actual engagement to marry had been made before the offence was committed there was no foundation for the charge. He, therefore, discharged the accused.

County Court Cases.

PROVIDE AGAINST TIGHTNESS.

Chamber of Commerce Suggest Getting Down to One Legal Tender.

New York, Dec. 4.—The Finance and Currency Committee of the Chamber of Commerce made a report today on a “Feasible Measure” to provide against tightness in the money market. The report says in part:

“We must come right down to the proposition that the only thing which can be done to make our financial system safe and sound and solid is to get down to one legal tender, and that is gold, and then to bank upon a currency of gold coins, and to have the present authorized issues of national banks, and based upon the credit of the legitimate trade of the country, and rigidly safeguarded under the law.”

The report suggests that banks be permitted to retire their circulation at will; recommends that the coinage of \$1,000,000 silver dollars per month cease, and that the silver dollar and silver dollars in the treasury be converted into subsidiary silver coins, and that the Secretary of the Treasury be permitted to deposit national receipts as well as internal revenue receipts in national banks.

The report was adopted, and the committee was directed by resolution to present the report in person to President Roosevelt, and in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Chamber of Commerce to send a copy of the report to the Senate.

MAY HAVE WOMAN RULER.

Czar Likely to Alter Succession to the Throne.

Vienna, Dec. 4.—Die Ziet to-day asserts that the Czar intends to alter the succession to the throne of Russia, enabling his daughters and their heirs to succeed him.

This plan, the paper continues, has caused a hot dispute between the Czar and his brother Michael and Uncle Vladimir, whose rights in the matter are threatened.

PARISHES TO OPENING.

The new church of the Holy Family at the corner of Close Avenue and King-street will be solemnly blessed on Sunday next at 10:30 a.m. by His Grace, the Archbishop of Toronto, assisted by a number of the clergy of the archdiocese. After blessing the church His Grace will preach. The music will be under the able direction of Mrs. Frances Sullivan-Mallon, and Mrs. Charles Smith will preside at the organ.

COUNTERFEITING SILVER DOLLARS.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 4.—U. S. Secret Service operatives have raided a home in Highland Park, and arrested three men, giving the names of Frank A. Hurd, who will be assigned to work on the charge of counterfeiting. It is said thousands of dollars' worth of spurious silver dollars have been circulated here.

MURDERED HIS ENEMY.

Albuquerque, N.M., Dec. 4.—City Marshal Peltier of Serrano has shot and killed David Baco, a prominent citizen, at the Windsor Hotel. A bullet fired by Baco passed thru the Marshal's hat, grazing his head. The men had long been enemies.

JUST FEIGNING INSANITY.

Madrid, Dec. 4.—Perez Pulgar, the anarchist arrested recently at Orense, is held in close confinement. He is a Spaniard. The police are searching for his accomplices. The officials believe that Pulgar is feigning insanity.

CRISIS IN GERMANY.
