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CRUEL TRAMPS AGAIN COMMIT AWFUL CRIME

Sudden Deaths and Strange and Accident Sadden Canadian Homes.

PARRY SOUND: A letter received last night from George Copeland, J.P., of Spruceville, addressed to Crown Attorney Spruceville, tells of a heinous and horrible assault made upon a deaf and dumb youth, and which, it is feared, will result fatally. The outrage occurred near Fern Glen, a few miles south of Spruceville, and not far from the Canada Atlantic Railway, in this district. The victim, named Nolan, 20 years of age, was out bringing in the cows, and was set upon by two tramps, who were occupying a vacant house in the vicinity. After beating him severely, they mutilated him with a knife in such a manner that the doctors entertain no hope of his recovery. No arrests as yet have been made, the men having made off promptly in the direction of Parry Sound. The following description of the men is furnished: One a tall, thin man, with sunken chest and sandy black moustache, black hat, brown gaiters and plaid trousers of large pattern.

CHANGEVILLE: A serious accident occurred at a barn raising 3 miles north of Alton Mills, near here, Monday night, when Wm. Atkinson and Joseph Harty were injured. The latter will die. Harty was on top of the north side of the barn and was falling with the board into place, when it fell, Atkinson and Harty falling 20 feet. Harty and his hip joint broken and several ribs fractured, and sustained some serious internal injuries. One of Atkinson's arms was crushed to a jelly and will have to be amputated.

JORDAN: Gordon Foster, a man employed by Woodman Bros., of Hamilton, in looking after the wires of the Cataract Power Company of Hamilton, in this section, was instantly killed yesterday morning by coming in contact with a live wire. Foster was working on the Mountain wire, two miles south of Jordan, cutting limbs from trees which projected into the wires. He lost his balance and fell on a live wire. His weight broke the wire and he fell to the ground unhurt. He started to retreat from the wire, and a heavy current was passing, and made contact through his boots, the fracture of his hip joint instantly. Foster was 40 years of age, and leaves a wife and six small children, who live here.

WOODSTOCK: Ed. Gillies of London, a brakeman, was badly injured at the G. T. R. yards here yesterday. While switching cars he fell from the top of a car with the result that his left leg was amputated at the knee.

VANCOUVER: Carl Corser, an employee at the Hastings mill, fell across a circular saw last night and was literally cut in halves. The deceased was a native of Lake Mills, Iowa.

PETERBORO: Wm. Craig of Ottawa, while traveling a portion of the Trent Valley Canal, fell 45 feet and was killed. The fatality was caused by the scaffold breaking.

ALLANBURG: Peter Upper, well known throughout this district, dropped dead while cutting hay on the farm of Peter Upper, near the township. At the last August sizes held at St. Catharines, Mr. Upper secured \$2000 in reward for the recovery of this village, for the loss of his wife's affections.

BROT SHERIFF, LYNCHED NEGRO. Scottsboro, Ala. June 30.—A party of fifty persons marched from Larkinsville last night and took Andrew Diggs, colored, from jail to the woods and lynched him. Diggs had confessed to assaulting Miss Alma Smith, white, at Larkinsville, last Sunday night. Sheriff D. O. Austin resisted the mob until he was shot down and the keys taken from him.

STATE COMPTROLLER MURDERED. Austin, Texas, June 30.—State Comptroller R. M. Love was assassinated in his office in the state capitol today by W. G. Hill, a discharged employe. No cause for the deed is known. The assassin committed suicide immediately after the shooting.

AMERICAN PRESSURE AND INTRIGUE. London, June 30.—The consul-general of a union of the Hay-Herran treaty by the Colombian minister of war in an attempt to subject of American pressure and intrigue for many months. Gen. Reyes opposes the bill and is in a position to proclaim a revolution and unseat President Marroquin. He considers that the terms of payment are insufficient.

Fought Duel With Revolvers. Paterson, N.J., June 30.—James Conlito is in the hospital dying from wounds inflicted in a revolver duel with his brother-in-law, Joseph Musto. Musto escaped. About a dozen shots were fired. It was the result of a family feud.

Mrs. Whalen Released. Kingston, June 30.—Premier Harty's release to the Mercer Reformatory lately for six months, has, thru the Attorney-General's department, been pardoned. Her offence was selling liquor illegally, but on account of her having had one son and husband being an invalid, and a family of five being largely dependent upon her, she was pardoned.

IMMIGRANTS BLOCK STATION. RETIREMENT OF MR. IRELAND.

Large Parties Arriving Interfere With Traveling Public. An interesting incident occurred yesterday in the offices of the Trust and Loan Company of Canada, when Col. Edye, on behalf of the commissioners and staff of the Canadian offices, presented James O'Neill Ireland, manager of the Toronto office, with a handsome silver bowl, on his retirement after a long career of 47 years of faithful service in the company. In addition, Col. Edye read a letter from Capt. MacDonnell, written on behalf of the whole staff in Canada, eulogizing Mr. Ireland's splendid services and lauding the same out as an example to the younger members of the company. Mr. Ireland, who entered the service of the Trust and Loan Company in the year 1856, is the last representative of the company's first staff in this country, when it opened its offices in Kingston in 1851, at the corner of King and Princess streets, under the management of F. A. Harper, the then commissioner. The company's offices being removed to Toronto in 1877, Mr. Ireland left his native city to follow the fortunes of the pioneer mortgage company of Canada, and has since actively participated in its development in the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. In his retirement, Mr. Ireland, in addition to his substantial pension voted by the shareholders at their last annual general meeting, carries with him the glowing words of the president, Charles Morrison, who said: "He is the senior member of the staff in Canada. He has been with us a very long time—forty-seven years—and during all that time he has served us faithfully."

CRAZY ON RELIGION.

Napanee, June 30.—There is no change in the condition of the murderer Butts. He talks on religion all the time, and while alone prays incessantly. Parties who know Butts say he was never very bright, but showed no signs of insanity until recently. Religious meetings were held in the neighborhood recently, and he attended these, and immediately after he started out into the fields praying and preaching. Butts has been quiet since his incarceration, but the sheriff deemed it advisable to put on a night watch to prevent any unforeseen accident. He eats and sleeps about as in his usual state.

INSULTS HEARD AT PREMIER'S.

Buda Pest, June 30.—Premier Harty's appearance today in the Lower House of the Hungarian Diet for the purpose of upholding the ministerial program, was signified by scenes of extraordinary uproar during which many insults were hurled at the Premier. The Premier was charged with treachery in his program. He concluded his announcements by declaring himself a warm supporter of the dual system of government of a common Austro-Hungarian army and of liberal principles.

Schwab Cries for Help.

New York City, June 30.—At the request of Charles Schwab, owing to his continued ill-health, W. E. Corey, president of the Carnegie Trust, has been appointed as a temporary president of the United States Steel Trust, to fulfill the active duties of president.

**IS TIRED OF POLITICS LOOKS FOR OTHER BIRTH**

Montreal, June 30.—(Special).—Premier Parent, in the opinion of many of his nearest friends, has sat in the legislature for the last time. It is well understood among his intimates that he is tired of politics, and especially of leading the administration, and that he is anxious to withdraw. He will not again meet the House if the present understanding for utilizing his services in the interest of the country at large is carried out. His friends are anxious that he should accept a seat upon the new railway commission to be appointed by the federal government. He is being pressed to accept the appointment, which it is believed has already been offered him.

It is altogether likely that the chairmanship of the commission will be taken by Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways, and that the salary of the other commissioner will be \$8000 or perhaps \$10,000 each. The commission will be appointed for a term of eight years. If Mr. Parent accepts his position he will naturally seize the opportunity of getting out of politics, and will refuse to accept re-nomination to the majority of Quebec. His worship will doubtless, however, continue his connection with his law office, and may also continue to act as president of the Quebec Bridge Company.

There is already much speculation as to Mr. Parent's successor in the Premiership. Both Mr. Turgeon and Mr. Gouin have their following. It is generally supposed that the retiring Premier will recommend the name of one of the senior members of the Cabinet, and in that case Mr. Turgeon will probably be Mr. Parent's choice.


