Supporters of the Scott government are claiming 21 Liberals elected to 12 opposition, with several seats in doubt, but this total is arrived at by including seats where their candidates have more or less considerable leads, but where returns from outlying polls are not available, nor are they likely to be until the morning.

Of these it is likely government supporters will win Moosejaw County, Saltcoats and Cannington.

On the other hand, the opposition look like beating the minister of education in the latter's own riding in Prince Albert County, in Mooseomin and North Battleford, where opposition leads stand in 15 polls, heard from; and Lloydminster, another doubtful constituency, which is not likely to be decided before morning.

One of the biggest surprises of the day has been the crushing defeat of the provincial rights candidate in Regina City, where he was only beaten by three last election. This is no doubt due to large additions to the electorate, which doubled the total poll cast and destroyed the old landmarks.

Hon. J. Ferguson, attorney-general, who contested two constituencies, wins in Duck Lake by 10, but is badly beaten in Prince Albert.

WELDING WITH ACETYLENE. Some Facts as to Rapidity of Operation and Cost.

By means of the blowpipe, using acetylene and oxygen gases, steel and copper sheets a quarter of an inch thick or less may be welded cheaper than they can be riveted, and therefore steel and copper tanks for high and low pressure of almost any dimensions are easily constructed by this process.

It is as easy to weld sheet iron, steel or copper plates in tanks as it is to burn up a lead tank in the usual manner with the oxy-hydrogen blow-pipe.

As to the rapidity of the operation and the cost of sheet welding, it may be of interest to note that the following data are given: Steel or copper sheet three-eighths inch in thickness can be welded at the rate of five feet per hour, the cost being six cents per inch.

Sheets one-eighth inch in thickness can be welded at the rate of ten feet per hour; one-sixteenth inch thick about 17 feet per hour and one-thirty-second inch thick at the rate of 34 ft. per hour, the cost being one cent one-half per foot in each case, respectively.

It is stated that no fluid or moulds are required to weld metals such as iron, steel or copper, but for brass, bronze and other alloys a little boracic acid or borax is used, moistened with water or oil in order to prevent zinc vapor from interfering with the welding by being deposited on the joint.

At a plant at Worcester, Mass., a complete installation has been made for using the autogenous process of welding, the flame produced by the oxygen and acetylene blowpipe flame being such that holes can easily be burned in flat plates half an inch in diameter without the slightest difficulty.

SCHOLAR AND PLAYWRIGHT. The author of "The Servant in the House," Charles Rann Kennedy, is an Englishman, 37 years old. Mexico Puts Vest Falls to Work. This is the story of Nexaca. A dozen little rivers are so gathered on their watersheds that they must pass a narrow outlet and turn in various directions and generators that change their water-power into electricity. Carried over a high mountain range by means of this power is distributed for the needs of half a million people with their electric lights, trolley cars, factories and mining.

It required a cost of thirty-four millions in gold to accomplish this and the result is one of the most interesting hydro-electric systems of the world. Where, before, there lay at one end a water-wheel with hurrying rivulets and leaping cascades that challenged the world for their native beauty, there is now a chain of reservoirs with dams, canals, tunnels and pipe lines by which the water is fed to turbines and generators. At the other end, where there was a great city troubled with all the ills attendant upon a lack of fuel supply and mines operating under enormous disadvantages from want of power, both city and mines are well and cheaply supplied. Between them is a transmission line with great, square, steel-towered towers, carrying aloft their burden of copper cables, each with a current so powerful as only the perfected insulators and switch-boards of recent years have been able to control.

PASTOR RUSSELL'S SERMON

OLEAN, N.Y., Aug. 12.—Pastor C. T. Russell of Pittsburg, Pa., preached twice here to-day. Notwithstanding the heat, he had a large and attentive audience. Of the two discourses, we report one from the text, "Ye have said, We have made a covenant with death, and with hell (sheol), the grave, we have an agreement. Your covenant with death shall be annulled and your agreement with sheol will not stand, when that overflowing scourge shall pass thru, then shall ye be trodden down by it." (Isaiah xxviii, 15-18). The speaker said:

The prophet in the language of our text and its context, gives us the divine foreview of present-day conditions and their results. In the preceding verses he has pictured symbolically a description of intoxication with false doctrines to such an extent that the teachers of Christendom are represented as being all out of the way, confused, and disposed to vomit forth the various creeds and theories of the "dark ages" which have produced this intoxication. This is in full accord with the declaration of revelation that all nations would be made drunk with the doctrinal wine from the cup of the woman who sat upon the beast. (Rev. xviii, 4). The fulfillment of the prophecy is with us; confusion prevails amongst religious teachers of every denomination; they lose their doctrines; they fear to discuss them, as well they may; for although their doctrines are the elements of truth, yet the mixtures as a whole are an abomination to reason, to justice, to love, and in violent opposition to the cup of the understanding of God's word.—Verses 7, 8.

As if looking about amongst the people of our day, the Lord inquires thru the prophet, "Whom shall I call to understand doctrine?" The answer is given, "Them that are weaned from the milk and turned from the breast, and in a word the difficulty with Christendom to-day is that a large proportion are not and never were Christians in the real sense of the term. They were not and never were believers in Jesus as the Redeemer of the world, thru Whom alone is forgiveness for sin; and are not and never were converts to the religion of Him, earnestly desiring to know and to do the will of the Father. And even amongst those comparatively few who were true Christians thru faith and consecration, few have gone beyond the infantile stage of development. As the apostle says, "When ye shall be taught the words of the prophets, ye shall be able to discern the things which are the first principles of the oracles of God, and shall become such as have need of milk and not of strong meat." (Heb. v, 12-14). The Lord points out (verse 9) that none may expect to understand His word, unless they are except those who will progress from the position of babes in Christ, that they may become strong men in Him, and that none of them shall be able to attain this development in a feeding upon the truth of the divine revelation. Let us, dear friends, be satisfied with babyhood in Christ, but who will go on to perfection and to a realization of the privileges that are ours in the present life and in that which is to come.

The Lord proceeds to show how and why the divine revelation has been given in its present disconnected and broken form in the scriptures. He explains us that he has a two-fold purpose in this: First, that His true people may be more particularly led to depend upon the present life, and secondly, that they may be enabled thru their search for the truth, here a little and there a little, line upon line and precept upon precept, with the stammering lips and foreign language, rather in plain statements in our native tongue. These conditions are the result of the fall of man, and the right attitude of heart in which we learn the lessons which otherwise might escape them. STRONG RESOLUTIONS

Catholic Total Abstinence Union Condems Liquor Advertisement.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Aug. 14.—Denunciation of the liquor traffic, an appeal for sanctification of Sunday and the exclusion from membership in Catholic societies of those engaged in the liquor traffic, were the striking features of the resolutions adopted by the national convention of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union to-day.

The resolutions say: "Catholic periodicals that cannot live without liquor advertisements should die. Let them not drag down the Catholic in their greed. We earnestly suggest that Catholic organizations which exclude saloonkeepers from membership and which forbid the use of liquor at their meetings should not tolerate the formation of clubs within their membership which despise the letter and the spirit of those laws that have been made by their organization for their honor."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 14.—An unpleasant impression was created here owing to an alleged proclamation of the young Turk Committee declaring that should the powers intervene in Turkey's internal affairs a rising would occur which would imperil the residence of foreigners.

UNION LABEL IN POLITICS.

Should Be Attached to All Campaign Literature.

BOSTON, Aug. 14.—(Special).—The final decision for the meeting place of the next convention of the International Stereotypers and Electrotypers Union will be reached to-morrow, with sentiment to-night rather strong for Toronto.

As president of the Toronto union James Simpson said to the I.T.U. delegates to-day: "I had to suspend but two members during the entire two years of the eight hour strike, and we had the same conditions to fight as you have. Some designing individuals wish to separate the bond that exists between organized labor of Canada and the United States, but on both sides we have constant watch on proposed legislation. In Toronto we employ one of the best lawyers in Canada."

"The Canadian working man," said Mr. Simpson, "is beginning to take a decided interest in politics, and in the eastern section is forming an independent labor party, while in the western part we have the socialist party with three members in the parliament of British Columbia. We are going to elect those who believe in the ideals of the workers."

In this afternoon's session the Toronto delegates strongly voiced their approval of the resolution requesting all political candidates to attach the union label, not only to their political printings, but as well to all private printing matter connected with their campaign.

Big Storm in New Brunswick. CHATHAM, N.B., Aug. 14.—(Special).—A terrific wind and rain storm struck Chatham this afternoon. The wind blew at seventy miles an hour and rain fell as in a cloudburst.

FLOODS DO DAMAGE.

Dykes Along New Brunswick Rivers Are Carried Away.

HOPWELL CAPE, N.B., Aug. 14.—(Special).—Enormous damage has been done to the dykes in this county from the unusually high tides in the Bay of Fundy and Pettaucodid River. A large abutment costing an immense sum of money has been carried away and a hundred acres of fine marsh and grass land submerged.

Dykes all along the river for a hundred miles have been carried away, and at Moncton, near the head of the Pettaucodid, all low lands are under water and a number of families in town forced to leave the houses.

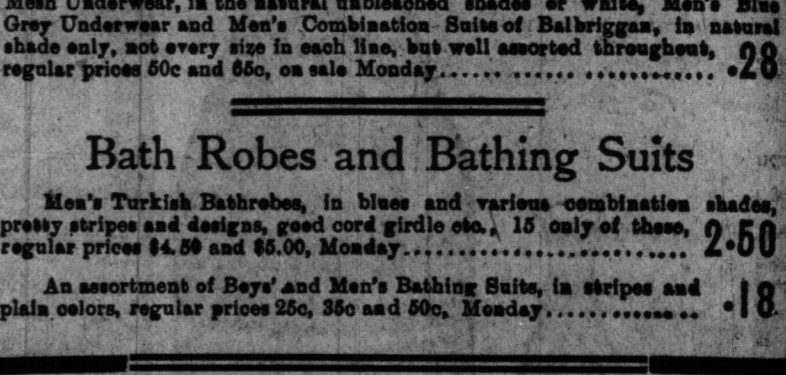
