

Manager Hays Blames Business Depression and High Operating Expenses— Either Wage Cut or Raise in Rates.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—(Special.)— Discussing the passing of the G.T.R. dividends to-day Charles M. Hays to-

night made the following statem "The dividends of the Grand Trunk "The dividends of the Grand Trunk are, of course, paid out of the balance of the surplus earnings available for that purpose and at the end of June there was not a sufficient balance to declare a dividend upon anything but guaranteed stock. It is, however, aspected that the earnings of the second six months, which is the heavy portion of the year, will be at least sufficient to permit of a resumption of dividends on the first and second preference stock.

ference stock.

"And to what do you attribute the reduction in earnings?" was asked.

"To the same causes which have led so many American railways to either pass or reduce their dividends. With this heavy depression in business and the inability of the railways to reduce their expenses correspondingly, we are all doing less business than last year, but the rates of pay to our employes are higher than last year, while the cost of fuel and supplies of all sorts has not gone down with our earnings. All thru the United States and Canada the earnings of the railroads for the year so far have fallen from sixteen to eighteen per cent, in gross, and very few, if any, have been able to make corresponding reductions in their expenses."

The Only Remedy.

Asked as to how this position was to be met Mr. Hays said: "All the railways hesitate to make any attempt to reduce the pay of their employes, because it is a question whether they are not entitled to all they are getting. Neither the Grand Trunk nor any one else wants to reduce their pay. But the railways must either do that or increase their rates, and you know how popular that would be by the recent agitation in the United States.

"But there is no other solution. When receipts fall off you can only secure the same net profits by reducing erence stock.

"But there is no other solution. When receipts fall off you can only secure the same net profits by reducing expenses or increasing receipts, and to do that you must have higher rates."

Big Crop Will Help.

With regard to the general situation Mr. Hays said: "I do not regard the half year ending this June as indicative of the full year's earnings, as it is always the light half of the year, and we shall not get into the business caused by the handling of the crop for nearly a month yet. With the big crops that are promised and the prospects of an increase in general business consequent thereon I look for a much better six months from all points of view than that ending June 30, which has compelled the Grand Trunk to drop its dividends on all ex-

points of view than that ending June 30, which has compelled the Grand Trunk to drop its dividends on all except its guaranteed stock."

Surplus Cut in Two.

At this time last year there was nearly twice as great a fund available for dividends, 368,500 pounds sterling and dividends were paid upon the first, second and third preference stocks, while provision was made for the establishment of a pension fund for the employes. 

IBA D. SANKEY DEAD SANG TO SAVE SOULS

Career of Man Who, With Moody, Attracted Millions to Religious Meetings.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.-Ira D. Sankey, the evangelist, died at his home in Brooklyn last night. Ira Sankey is dead.

The multitudes who have heard his rich and inspiring voice in "The Ninety and Nine," "Jesus of Nazareth Passeth By," and "When the Mists Have Rolled Away," will hear with sorrow that the greatest voice of modern times devoted to the work of the Master has

been silenced forever.

While Sankey had many successors in evangelistic hymnology, he was the His life was a stirring example of

the converting and sanctifying power of sacred song. He added a thrilling chapter to the triumph of the Cross. His biographer, Theodore L. Cuyler,

His biographer, Theodore L. Cuyler, wrote:

"His songs are a precious legacy by a faithful veteran of Jesus Christ to his fellow-soldiers in all lands who are battling for the cause of the crown of the glorious Captain of our salvation, and who 'wait for His appearing."

Ira D. Sankey was a son of Hon. David Sankey. He was born in the Village of Edinburg in Western Pennsylvania, Aug. 28, 1840. When six years old moved to Western Reserve Harbor, where his father engaged in a commission business. Later his father moved to a farm and the boy assisted in the work. Sankey, senior, was elected to the state legislature during the thirteen years of his life as a farmer. During these years the boy met a Mr. Fraser, who aroused his first interest in a holy life.

In 1857 the family moved to Newcastle, where the father became president of the bank. Here Ira attended high school and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. Soon he was superintendent of the Sunday School and leader of the choir.

His voice attracted attention and before long the Sunday School came to hear crowded with people who came to hear

crowded with people who came to hear his singing.

In 1860 he responded to the call of the civil war and his company was sent to Maryland. His father was appointed collector of inland revenue at Newcastle by Abraham Lincoln.

In 1863 Mr. Sankey married a member of his choir, Miss Fanny V. Edwards, a daughter of Hon. John Edwards.

Later he bacame secretary and then president of the Newcatle Y.M.C.A., and by the sale of gospel hymns raised \$40,000 for a new building. 340,000 for a new building.

In 1870 at a Y.M.C.A. convention in Indianapolis, Mr. Sankey met the late Dwight L. Moody, with whose name his own was to become immortally associated. Sankey at one of the meetings sank, "There is a Fountain Filled With

Congregations since then thruout the civilized world have raised their voices in the words of Sankey's hymns. Sankey did not write the words of "The Ninety and Nine," which more than any other hymn made him fam-ous. He discovered the poem, "There were ninety and nine that safe-

In the centre of the fold." The air came to Sankey during an impromptu rendition of the words, which he had read first in a newsnaper on a train in Great Britain.

That air will last as long as the human voice is lifted in song to the worship of God.

WELDING WITH ACETYLENE. Some Facts as to Rapidity of Opera-

Catholic Total Abstinence Union Con-demns Liquor Advertisements.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Aug. 14 .- Denunciation of the liquor traffic, an appeal for sanctification of Sunday and the exclusion from membership in Catholic societies of these engaged in the liquor traffic, were the striking features of the resolutions adopted by the national convention of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union to-day.

We earnestly suggest that Catholic organizations which exclude saloonkeepers from membership and which forbid the use of liquor at their meetings should not tolerate the for-mation of clubs within their member-ship which despise the letter and the spirit of those laws that have been made by their organization for their







Let them not forget that the older breeders had made their mistakes and had had their ups and downs, but he thought they could testify that the downs were as important and sometimes as suggestive as the ups. He ad-

downs were as important and sometimes as suggestive as the ups. He advised young breeders to set before them a proper ideal, and work up to it. The age demanded utility, and the Shorthorn properly managed could supply the demand. Their purpose was two-fold—to produce beef and milk, and if to these they could add in their cattle beauty of style and color, by all means do it—a thing of beauty was a joy forever. But let them in their cattle breeding, as in their lives, put the first thing first. Begin with the individual animal, and see that it possessed what was termed general goodness, then carefully examine the pedigree, more particularly in the upper crosses. He believed in the place and power of pedigree, for he saw its effects very day. In its proper and skilful use lay the In its proper and skilful use lay the past success and the future hope of Shorthorn breeding. But, above all, the one indispensable thing in the breeder was character. Like the wife of Caesar, he must be above suspicion Confidence. he must be above suspicion. Confidence was the very essence of their business, and it was a pleasure to think of the high character and personal probity of Shorthorn breeders in all lands.

The egg laying contest carried on last year in Australia proves to be "catching." A similar competition will begin in England Oct. 1 and run until March 31, 1909, under the auspices of the Utility Poultry Club. The contest will be carried on near Glastonbury and 200 wire pens with a grass run of 12 square yards, with a separate scratching shed, will be provided for each entry of six birds. The eggs will be regularly collected weighed and booked and will be valued according to weight at the prevailing market price in the district. A large number of prizes will be awarded.

Bulletin No. 289, issued by the agricultural experiment station at Geneva, N.Y., teaches some important lessons on orchard fertilizing, as follows: That an orchard soil may not need potash, phosphoric acid nor line, even the the soil may have been cropped a half century; that in a soil which produces apples of poor color, potash and phosphoric acid may not improve the color; and that the apple does not seem to be as exhaustive of soil fertility as farm crops. The experiment suggests, as well, that to assume without definite knowledge that a tree needs this or that plant food often leads to the waste of fertilizing material; and that in the matter of fertilizing an orchard a fruit grower should experiment for himself, since an orchard's need of fertilizer can be determined only by the behavior of the trees when supplied with the several plant foods.



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
