Crude and uncertain as were the opinions and prognostications of the ancients from their observances of the celestial bodies, yet they had the sanction of many coincident circumstances to justify their conclusions, as to the effects of certain appearances and combinations of the heavenly aspects, connected with the changes that successively occurred in terrestrial affairs. The uniformity of events with appearances among the constellations influenced the learned to conclude, that such coincidences must arise from the effects of certain conjunctions and positions of the PLANETS, and of the starry firmament, then visible to their observation; and, therefore, they named the signs, or divisions of the STARS, according to those incidental circumstances.

How vague their calculations must have been will appear from the fact, that several new comets, planets, and thousands of fixed stars, have since been discovered, of whose influences they could have no idea, as they were not aware of the existence of such

The stars discernible in the signs of the ZODIAC, by the help of telescopes, are found to be so numerous, as to alter the figure and structure of the whole; and to show how chimerical any hyothesis on that subject must have been—a long time, and even o this day, curious notions were, and still are, entertained among he vulgar, relative to the influence of the Moon upon our GLOBE, its changes of weather, diseases of body and mind, and egulation of mundane affairs; and though many of those notions ave been exploded, much of error and superstition yet remain on us subject.

MAY, the fifth month, is derived from the Latin word Majores, so called by Romulus in respect towards the Senators: hence Maius, or May.

JUNE, the sixth month, from the Latin word Junius, or the

SEPTEMBER, the ninth month, from the Latin word Septem, r seven, being the seventh month from March.

OCTOBER, the tenth month, from the Latin word Octo, the ighth; hence October.

NOVEMBER, the eleventh month, from the Latin of Novem, ine, being the ninth month from march.

DECEMBER, the twelfth month, from the Latin word Decem, ten; so called because it was the tenth from March, which was anciently the manner of beginning the year.

JANUARY was expressed by a Saxon word, signifying Wolfmonth, because in that month wolves were most mischievous to them, for that through the extremity of cold and snow, they could not find beasts sufficient to satisfy their ravenous appetites.

FEBRUARY was expressed by a Saxon word, signifying Colewort, or Spring-wort; because then the worts begin to sprout.

MARCH was called the lengthening month; because then the days begin in length to exceed the nights.

APRIL was signified by a word implying the Easter month; because their Easter generally fell in April.

MAY was called the three milkings; because they then milked

their cattle three times a day.

June was called the Meadow-month; because then they tur-

ned their cattle out to feed in the meadows.

JULY was called a Hay-month; because then they generally cut their hay.

AUGUST was called the Barn-month; for in this month the

SEPTEMBER was called the Grist-month; for in this month they carried their new corn to the mill.

OCTOBER was called the Wine-month; for then grapes we usually pressed to make wines.

NOVEMBER was called the Windy month; because of the

DECEMBER was called the Winter month; because of a cold then growing intense; and afterwards the Holy-month, account of the nativity of Christ.

DAYS OF THE WEEK.

OUR Saxon Ancestors were exceedingly idolatrous, doing homage to various objects; some material, and others the material of their own untutored imaginations.

Seven of their deities were more particularly adored than rest; viz, the Sun, Moon, Tuisco, Woden, Thor, Friga, Seater, to whom, respectively, the days of the week were comerated.

SUNDAY, called by the SAXONS, Sunandaeg, was dedicated the Sun, which was their chief deity, as well as that of the Pisians. In the Temple consecrated to the Sun, was an idd presenting the bust of a man set upon a pillar, his face dath bright rays. His arms were extended, and he held a wheel fore his breast, typical of the circuit which the Sun is poeter represented to make round our Earth.

Monday, (Monandaeg), was devoted to the Moon, which was represented by a female image standing on a pedestal, dressed in a very fantastic manner.

Tuesday (Tuisdaeg), was consecrated to Tuisco, who, as legend reports, was father of the GERMANS and SCYTHIANS, from whom the SAXONS sprang, and was held in so much estimation by his countrymen, that at his decease they deified him. was represented by the figure of a venerable old man, with a long white beard, standing upon a pedestal with a boar's skin upon his shoulders, and a sceptre in his right hand.

Wednesday, (Woden's-daeg), was consecrated to Woden, or Odin, who was considered by the northern nations the father of all the DEITIES, and the "God of War," uniting the

characters of JUPITER and MARS of the ancients.

Woden was represented by the figure of a warrior in a martial The figure was clad in bright armour; in his right hand

was a broad and crooked sword; in his left, a shield.

THURSDAY, (Thor's-daeg), was consecrated to Thor, who was the eldest son of Woden. He was considered the supreme governor of the Air, LIGHTNING, and THUNDER, in which latter particular, he answered to the Roman Jupiter, and he was supplicated for fruitful seasons.

The idol by which he was represented, was seated on a splendid throne, its head decked with a golden crown, adorned with twelve glittering stars. In the right hand was a regal sceptre.

FRIDAY (Friga's-daeg), was consecrated to FRIGA or FREA, the wife of Woden, and mother of all the Gods. She had the attributes of the Roman Venus. She was represented by a female figure, holding a naked sword in the right hand, and in the left a bow.

SATURDAY (Seater's-daeg), was consecrated to SEATER, who is by some, supposed to answer to the Roman SATURNUS. He was represented by an idol standing upon a pedestal upon the prickly back of a PERCH. The figure, whose head was bare, and the countenance thin, was c'ad in a long coat, confined about the waist and shoulders with a linen sash. In his right hand was a pail of water, in which were fruits and flowers.

Such, with inferior idols, as Prono, Fidegast, &c. were the DEITIES to whom our forefathers not only offered up prayers,

but even sacrificed human victims!

ECLIPSES.

THERE will be three Eclipses during the Year 1835, viz. two of the Sun, invisible here; and one of the moon.

The First will be of the Sun, on Wednesday, May 27th, at 6h. 19m. in the morning, visible in all Africa, part of Spain and Italy, the Azores Islands, and all South America; between the parallels of Latitude 30° South and 40° North the Eclipse will be annular.

The Second will be an Eclipse of the Moon, visible here, as follows, on Wednesday, June 10th.

57 min. Evening. Moon rises, eclipsed partially, 7 h. End of the Eclipse, - - - - 8 h, 15 min.

The Eclipse begins at 4 h. 18 min. in the Afternoon, and consequently only the latter part of the Eclipse will be seen here,

Digit eclipsed on the Moon's northern limb.

The Third will be an Eclipse of the Sun, on Friday, November 20th; this Eclipse will only be visible in all Africa, the south west parts of Spain, France, England, and Ireland, and the Madeira Islands, and to a small part of the north east of South America; in the middle of the Island of Madagascar, and the centre of Africa it will be total.

There will be a transit of Mercury on Saturday, November 7th, as seen from the Earth's centre, at mean time, as follows:-

First contact of Limbs, 1 h. 15 min. Afternoon. Last cortact, - - - - 6 h, 26 min.

The ingress will be visible from the western extremity of Africa, and the whole continent of America; the egress from the western balf of North America, the western coast of South America, New Holland, and the north eastern part of Asia.

The Sun sets on November 7th, at 4 h. 54 min.

Owing to the great southern declination of both the Sun and Mercury, very little of the transit can be visible here; Mercury will appear as a small black spot crossing the southern part of the Sun's disc.

COMETS.

THE great Comet of Halley, whose periodical revolution occupies from 74 to 761 years, and the return of which we stated in the last Nova-Scotia Atmanack, might be looked for after Sept. 1834, as the average mean of its orbit is 751 years, and its last perehelion was in March, 1759.* By the calculations of the most eminent English and French Astronomers, its return is looked for on August 4th, 1835, in the Constellation Taurus, and will be in perehelion, that is nearest the Sun, on or about November 4th, and continue visible until February 11th, 1836, when it is supposed it will disappear in the Constellation Libra. We subjoin the Ephemeris of its Kising, Southing, and Setting, for every fourth day of its appearance, by which it will be perceived the Comet will first be visible just after midnight.

*The times intervening between its appearance, have been as follows:-1531 to 1607, 76 years, 63 days; 1607 to 1682, 74 years, 322 days; 1682 to 1759, 70 years, 178 days.

The signification of the word Comet has varied as new bodies have appeared, which analogy has led astronomers to include under that name. It was first given as the word denotes to bodies which appeared in the heavens with a train of light, or tail, and this included some of the meteors which belong to our own atmosphere. We now apply the word to those heavenly bodies without the limits of our own atmosphere, which are nebulous in their appearance, and with or without a tail. We may divide all which have been observed into three classes.-1st. Those whose returns have been predicted, and the prediction verified by fact. are three in number, viz. the celebrated Comet of Halley, observed by him in 1682, which returned according to his conjecture, (for it could then hardly be called any thing more) in 1759, and will appear again this present (1835). The other two are those of Encke and Beila, which perform their revolutions in rather more than three years; the Encke will return also this year, but neither are visible to the naked eye .- 2d. Comets whose return have been predicted unsuccessfully .- 3d. Comets which have been observed, the predicted return of which are yet to be expected. The most remarkable of these is the one observed by Olbers in 1815, which is confidently expected to return in 1887. there have appeared many comets when neither theory nor observation was in a state sufficiently perfect to enable the observers to say whether they would return or not.

That a Comet is a material body, is proved by the same sort of reasoning which is applied to the planets. First, it either reflects the light of the Sun, or shines by its own light, which of the two has never been distinctly proved; perhaps both suppositions may be true. Matter is always present where light is either emitted or reflected, at least on our globe. Secondly, Comets are found to be acted upon by the laws of gravitation, exactly as all other material bodies are. They are attracted by the Sun, and move in ellipses or other conic sections, and this motion is disturbed by the attraction of the planets, especially of the larger planets, Jupiter and Saturn. These facts being substantiated, we are justified in assuming that comets are material bodies, subject

like the planets to the attraction of the Sun and other bodies of our system, and describing an elliptic orbit round the sun nearly, the difference being attributable to the action of the planets, or

perhaps in some degree to a resisting medium.

The next point of consideration is, Comets being material, what is their quantity of matter? that is, are they light or heavy in proportion to their size? Now as it has been proved that they are subject to the attraction of the planets, and that the planets, nay even their satellites have never been sensibly affected by them, although a comet has passed between the satellites of Jupiter; it must follow that their density is not in any proportion to their apparent bulk: Thus if Halley's Comet, which was retarded more than 500 days in its passage between 1607 and 1682 by the action of Jupiter, had been only the twenty-thousandth part of the mass of Jupiter, its effect upon that planet would have even then been most distinctly perceptible by good instruments. The Comet of 1770 approached between the Earth and the Sun, but no alteration in the length of our year or any unusual phenomena took place.

The tail of Halley's Comet, when it appeared in 1682, was one hundred and forty-one millions of miles in length; and the Comet itself has assumed various tints of colour and degrees of

brilliancy, differing each time of its return.

INFLUENCE OF THE MOON ON THE WEATHER.

IT appears from Tables recently formed, the result of many years' experience and observation, of scientific men in Europe, that the following data have been satisfactorily ascertained; but how far they may be applicable to our climate and situation, re-

mains to be proved.

The greatest number of rainy days take place between the first quarter and full moon; and the least between the last quarter and new moon.-It therefore seems that there is more likelihood of rain in the increase, than in the wane of the moon. Moon is nearer the earth, or in perigee, at one time of the month than another, it would seem to follow, like her influence on the tides, it must be greater on the weather; and it appears by observation, that when the moon is in perigee, the greater the chances The times of her apogee and perigee are marked in the of rain. And contrary to the generally received opinion, the result of these observations is, that new moon is the least active in a change of weather; and that at full moon a change of weather happens 5 times out of 6; and the changes at the quarters, twice as frequent as the continuance of the pravious weather.

According to this theory, we have calculated as to what weather may be expected, for the Year 1835. We know of no method that would enable us to come nearer the truth, than the one we have adopted; but should any of our friends be in the habit of making similar observations, we will be glad to hear

from them on the subject. We are far from attributing infallibility or certainty to the above; we only quote them as the result of the experience of more than half a century: our local situation affords cause for a change of weather totally unknown and un-

experienced in the centre of Europe.

It is our intention to keep a meteorological account. and give a comparison in our next annual publication, as to its agreement with the above.—The agency of the moon has not been confined in popular opinion, to the changes of the weather; she has been allowed in all ages and countries to exercise a direct and important influence upon organic life. Many of the opinions vulgarly entertained on this head are curious, and founded on well established facts; the error lying not in the observations, but in the theory, which makes the moon the cause of phenomena of which she is only the silent and unconcerned spectator.

ORIENTAL AND OCCIDENTAL STARS.

Venus will be Morning Star, from January 1st. until October 18th, then an Evening Star until the end of the year.

Jupiter will be an Evening Star until May 17th. and a Morning Star from July 16th. to the end of the year.

As the Moon's orbit round the earth is an oval, she is nearer the earth at one time of the month, which is called perigee; she then has the greatest influence on the tides, and causes them to be greater than ordinary; and during her apogee or greatest distance from the earth her influence is weaker; therefore the tides are lower than ordinary.





RULE FOR CORRECTING SUN'S DECLINATION.

The Sun's Declination is given in the Calendar Pages, for every day, at apparent noon, at Greenwich; and the following observations will be found useful in correcting it for any place and time.

Take the difference of Declination between the required day, and that following it in West Longitude; and by the rule of proportion, say as 24 hours is to the difference found, so is the longitude of the place turned into time, to the correction required; which must be added if the declination is increasing, or subtracted if the declination be decreasing.

EXAMPLE.—Required the Sun's Declination at Halifax at apparent noon, on January 25th, 1835.

January 25th, Sun's Dec. at Greenwich, South, 19° 3'
26th, do do 18 48

Daily Variation, 0 15

As 24h is to 15' so is 4h. 14' to 2' 38" = the correction required; which as the declination is decreasing, must be subtracted from the declination at Greenwich for the required day, thus—

January 25th, Sun's Declination, Greenwich, 199 3' 0"
Correction, 0 2 38

Sun's Declination at Halifax, at apparent \ 19 0 22

This Rule must be strictly attended to in working the Latitude, as a great error will otherwise arise, when the daily variation of the Sun amounts to about half a degree.

USE OF THE EQUATION TABLE.

When the Sun is on the Meridian at any place, it then indicates Apparent Noon; but as the Sun comes to the Meridian sometimes earlier and sometimes later, a correction becomes necessary, to give Mean Time, or that shewn by a well regulated Clock. The Table, on page 14, shews therefore, whether a clock keeps true time, as by the following Example:—

On January 4th, 1835, the Sun is on the Meridian, or a properly erected Sun Dial or Meridian Line indicates Apparent Noon

Equation correction added

12h 0' 0" 0 5 6

True Mean Time, or the Clock should indicate 2 12h 5' 6"

*** The Equation Table for exact astronomical use, will require for any place a similar correction as the Sun's Declination, and is performed in like manner; but as the difference is but small, it is not required for general purposes.

PLACES OF WORSHIP, SCHOOLS. &c.

Eastern Division.—County of Halifax—District of Halifax comprises the townships of Halifax, Dartmouth, Preston, and Lawrence Town. In this district there are about 25 places of worship, and 30 schools—The District of Colchester contains three townships, Truro, Onslow, and Londonderry, besides several settlements. It contains 13 places of worship: 2 established church of England, 10 Presbyterian, and 1 (at Onslow) for all denominations. Number of schools about 20.—District of Pictou, containing three townships, Pictou, Egerton and Mexwelton. There are 17 places of worship, nearly all Presbyterians, and about 25 schools.—County of Cumbertand, contains 2 townships, Amherst and Wallace. Places of worship, 8: viz 1 church of England, 1 Baptist, and 6 Methodist.—County of Sydney, contains 7 townships; Arisaig, Dorchester, St. Andrew, Tracadie, Manchester, Guysborough and St. Mary. It is divided into two districts, Upper and Lower. In the Upper District there are 18 places of worship, viz. church of England 3, Roman Catholic 11; Presbyterian 3, Baptist 1. Number of Schools 20, 17 receive government aid; 3 are female. The people pay £252 3 0, government £97 10s. per half year. No. of scholars 429, and 42 poor scholars. Antigonish, in this district contains 109 dwelling houses, besides barns and work shops. Population 509. Master tradesmen, &c. 5 blacksmiths, 6 carpenters, 8 shoomakers, 4 tailors, 4 wheelwrights, 3 saddlers, 4 tanners, 5 coopers, 1 tinsmith, 3 masons, 2 dep. land surveyors; and 2 saw mills, 3 grist mills, 2 oat kilns, 2 carding mills, 6 taverns, and 15 shops.—Lower District, places of worship, 4 church of England, 3 Boman Catholic, and 3 of other denominations.

MIDDLE DIVISION.—County of Hants.—This county contains 6 townships, Windsor, Newport, Rawdon, Kempt, Douglas and Falmouth; places of worship, 23.—King's County. Four townships, Horton, Cornwallis, Parrsboro', and Aylesford. Places of worship 18; 4 church of England, 2 Presbyterian, 6 Methodist, 5 Baptist, 1 Congregational. WESTERN DIVISION .- County of Annapolis. It is divided into 2 districts, the Upper and Lower; the former contains 3 townships, Wilmot, Granville and Annapolis, the latter 5; Clements, Digby and Clare. Places of worship, and Annapolis, the latter S; Clements, Digby and Clare. Places of worship, church of England 12, Baptist 12, Methodist, 11.—County of Shetburne. County of Cape-Breton.—This county is divided into 3 Districts, called, County of Cape-Breton.—This county is divided into 3 Districts, called, the First or North Eastern, of which Sydney is the capital; Second, or Southern, capital, Arichat; Third, or North Western, capital, Port Hood.—The county contains 5 townships, viz. Sydney, Arichat, Margarie, Port Hood, and Canso. Places of worship, North Eastern District, at Sydney, the Episcopal church of St. George's, the Roman Catholic chapel, both stone buildings, the latter a spacious and handsome structure; and a Dissenting meeting house, built of wood, in which a Methodist missionary at present meeting house, built of wood, in which a Methodist missionary at present officiates, but in which Baptist ministers occasionally preach. There is a church at the North West Arm of this river, in which a minister of the church at the North West Arm of this river, in which a minister of the church of England officiates, and a Dissenting meeting house; also a Roman Catholic chapel at the Mines, one at the French Village, and one severally at Catholic chaper at the Mines, one at the French vinage, and one severally at Low Point, the East Bay, the great Narrows, and in some other parts of this District, as well as several Dissenting places of worship, some already built, and others in contemplation of being built. Common schools. Education seems to be greatly neglected by the Legislature in this quarter; it can hardly be said there is even a common school kept in Sydney by a male teacher; certainly none that can be considered permanently such. In the Southern District there are one Academy and four common schools. Western District.—Places of worship, one Catholic church each, at the following places: Cheticamp, Margarie, Broad Cove, Mabou, Port Hood and Judique. Protestant one each at Margarie, Baddeck, Broad Cove, Mabou, Port Hood, Gut Canso, River Inhabitants and River Dennis. No. of schools in the District, 22, scholars, 670.

The CHOLERA.—This dreadful disease, made its appearance in Halifax, on the 5th day of August, 1834.—The number of deaths reported by the Board of Health, from that date to September 30—when reports ceased to be issued in consequence of the abatement of the disease-is 400. impossible to ascertain the number correctly, we may not be charged with But as it appears exaggeration in asserting that one-eighth more may be added to the number reported, which would swell it to about 450. The number of cases reported exceeded 1200.

Synney Mines.—There are at present about 300 men daily employed at the Mines and Rail Road, and about 200 are employed during the winter months. There were 14,966 chaldrons coal shipped in 1831; 19,957, in 1832; and 15,302 in 1838; total 50,225: averaging 16,742 chals yearly, for 3 years.

They do not raise more coal than is sufficient to keep a stock for one summer's shipping; but have capabilities of raising and shipping 40,000 chaldrons annually, which could be increased if required.—The present mines-windingengine is 24 horse power, depth of shaft 60 yards; another 20 horse power winding-engine is being erected; and a 70 horse power pumping engine will be put up next summer ; depth of shaft 112 yards.

There is a large Foundry for either iron or brass, with a 20 horse power engine, and a blowing apparatus equal to 15 horse power; it also drives a circular saw, turns a lathe, and pumps; is intended to drive one gang of 8 saws and another of 2 saws ; can also be connected to a boring apparatus, capable

of boring cylinders, &c. up to 3 feet 6 inches diameter.

Agricultural Societies.—We indulged the hope of being enabled to record in this Almanack, the names and officers of Agricultural Societies, which we supposed to be existing in various parts of the province; but wherever we applied, the answer has been, that "there are none." A variety of arguments might be brought forward to incite the formation of these useful associations; and we feel convinced, that were their utility properly considered, societies would be organized in every settlement of the province. Various publications on agricultural improvements are continually issuing from the Press; many of which are lost to individuals, that could be easily procured by small contributions, if associations were formed, and agricultural libraries established. The utility of many inventions might be tested, where they are only heard of and forgotten; experiments made on the nature of our soil and climate, by which means a number of important questions would be satisfactorily answered; and subjects connected with the growth and prosperity of the province brought under discussion. The pressure of the times which has been of late felt all over the province, calls loudly on the industrious and informed; and it is only by united efforts that we may look up in hope to future independence and prosperity. Let then the farmers look to their own interests; the soil of Nova-Scotia, with the blessing of Providence, is capable of doing much to turn the balance of trade in our favour; and by taking advantage of every means of improvement which suggests itself, abundant harvests will reward the enterprise.
