prohibit the importation and domestic manufacture  
of all alcoholic liquors; provided in the mean time,  
there shall not be such an expression of public  
opinion, as to make it appear that such a measure  
would not be sustained by it."

To which Mr. Parlow moved the following  
amendment.—Strike out the whole of the resolution  
and insert—  
"That so long as the importation of spiritous  
liquors and their distillation are sanctioned and au-  
thorized by the Imperial Parliament, and other parts  
of the British dominions, and the world at large, it  
would be both inexpedient and unwise to adopt any  
prohibitory measures, and to subject the subject  
particularly as such measures would tend to increase  
their illicit introduction to a most alarming degree;  
would have a most baneful influence in demoralizing  
the habits of the people, and would impede the  
beneficial operations of the Province, by the enormous  
amount of money necessary to attempt the enforce-  
ment of any Law which might contain such prohibi-  
tions, without being attended with the consequences  
contemplated and intended by the Legislature."  
While upon this subject it may not be amiss to  
state, that in Quebec the Magistrates in Session  
have decided, that it is inexpedient and unwise  
to grant a special license to any Grocer, Buttery Cook,  
or persons relating spiritous liquors, and that the  
of 241 applications 69 were refused, reducing the  
number granted to 172. Last year the number of  
applications was 326, of which 298 were sanctioned by  
the Special Sessions, and 281 were ultimately ap-  
proved of by the Commander in Chief, and the  
approval must be obtained before any license can  
issue.—Fredericton Sentinel.

Read Extract from the Report of the Society for  
the Propagation of the Gospel for the year 1829, as  
follows:—  
"From New-Brunswick, Archdeacon Coster reports  
most favourably of the progress of increasing  
prosperity of the Province, and the great im-  
portance of promoting the Society's objects in that Colony."  
The collections (the same) made during the past  
year greatly exceed every one's expectations, and the  
appropriations (chiefly in aid of building churches)  
appear to have had a beneficial effect. The greatest  
assistance is expressed in every quarter for the speedy  
appointment of a travelling Missionary, and it is  
noted, it will be observed, not less than £200 is set apart for  
paying the expenses to be incurred in travelling; and  
any person or persons who may be appointed to fill  
the important and arduous, and the kindest  
reception and the most liberal encouragement."

It is unnecessary to say how desirous the Society  
are to comply with this laudable request, but they  
have not yet been able to engage a Clergyman pro-  
fessionally qualified for the office in question. They have  
however assured Archdeacon Coster how deeply they  
feel the importance of encouraging and supporting  
the Church Society in New-Brunswick, and that lib-  
eral grants of money will be made both for the sup-  
port of a Travelling Missionary, and for the purpose  
to engage one in the Colony, and for any of the other  
excellent purposes for which the Church Society has  
been established."

Resolved, on motion, that a sum not exceeding  
£100 be placed at the disposal of the Executive Com-  
mittee for "Missionary visits to neglected places,"  
and a further sum of £150 be placed at the disposal of  
the Executive Committee for procuring other Books suit-  
able for the objects of the Society, in any way which

"It is an early day that time does not appear to have

of some duration in the approaching summer, to lay the Society
