Massacre of Christians By Turks Reported

Saloniki, March 8—Thousands of Christians are fleeing from the towns of Western European Turkey into Bulgarian territory to escape massacre by the Turks.

Refugees who arrived here today, asserted that massacres started in the interior towns so soon as the Ottoman troops were withdrawn to concentrate along the Dardenelles and that everywhere Christians were being tortured or slain.

According to unverified reports which the fugitives brought, eighty Christians were slain at Tekke, while Christian homes at Ortaja, Maltepe and Tehene have been pillaged and burned.

Athens, March 8.—Popular demons trations favoring war with Turkey took place in Athens today. Eleutherios Venizelos, who resigned as premier because King Constance would not accept the cabinet's decision to open hostilities, was wildly cheered when he appeared at his officie to conclude some unfinished business, while M. Zaimis, who has been asked to form a new ministry, was jeered and hissed as he went to the royal palace for a conference

A great crowd surrounding the parliament building shouted "down with Turkey" and "we want war," as the members of the chamber of deputies arrived for today's session.

Because of the resignation of the Venizelos cabinet, the session was brief.

M. Zaimis, a former premier, and now head of the national bank, is reported to have asked the ministers of finance and war in the Venizelos cabinet, to retain their posts, but the proffer of the portfolios was rejected. Allies Carry Fighting To **Germans All Along Line**

Demonstrations in the Streets Today Another Strong Offensive Begun — Enemy Compelled to Give Way in **Vosges Region**

Paris, March &—Another strong of fensive movement has begun by the allies all along the line. In official despatches the operations of the Germans in every sphere are spoken of as counter attacks. Another desperate struggle has developed in the Vosges Mountains east of the Pass of Bonhomme and not far from Hartmannsweiler Kopf. Fighting in that region extends over a ten mile front with heavy infantry and artillery engaged.

Advices from Belfort say that the French operations in the Vosges are uniformly successful. The Germans, being outnumbered, have been compelled to give ground, despite their stubborn resistance. The Germans are reported to have lost 500 men in killed, wounded and captured during the last two days of fighting north of Arras.

Fighting for trenches continues in Champagne, north of Les Hesnil, Perthes and Beausejour. The Germans in that region, upon being compelled to abandon a piece of forest which they had been using as an artillery support, set the woods on fire, and the flames swept over a big area.

Information received here from Sluis, Holland, by way of London, indicates a renewal of hostilities on a big scale along the west Flanders front. It is said that the sound of terrific firing can be heard at Sluis, coming apparently from the vicinity of Ypres. Many train loads of wounded German soldiers passed eastward through Roulers.



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THE WAR NEWS

The Greek Cabinet has resigned because King Constantine does not approve of its war policy. Premier Ventacios and his colleagues believe the time has come for Greece to enter the war on the side of the Allie. The king favors continued neutrality. Both king and premier are popular, and public sentiment is therefore divided. The premier declares, however, that his party will refuse to support a government that favors continued neutrality, and a very serious crisis in the affairs of the country has therefore been reached. The people owe much to the ex-premier who has proved himself a brilliant statesman, and the outcome of the controversy is avaited with intense interest, for the entry of Greece into the struggle at this time would very materially affect the fortunes of the war against Turkey as well as Austria. Today's cables convey the impression that the majority of the people favor participation in the war.



The War News In Last Night's Cables

London, March 7, 10.45 p. m.—Greece apparently is at the parting of the ways, with her king exerting his influence to maintain the neutrality of his country in opposition to Eleutherios Venizelos, the retiring premier, and the man to whom Greece owes her revival.

M. Venizelos yesterday announced the resignation of himself and his cabinet, as King Constantine did not approve the policy of the government. Today, in the Chamber of Deputies, M. Venizelos clearly indicated that the difference between him and the monarch was over the question of peace and war. He said he had advised the king to select as a new premier M. Zaimis, governor of the National Bank, who, he said, "will follow a policy of neutrality, which I hope will not endanger our newly acquired territory."

A grand council of ministers was held at Athens today, under the presidency of King Constantine, and as Venizelos was leaving the palace at its conclusion, he was acclaimed by the populace.

London, March 7—The British battleships Queen Elizabeth and Prince George and the battle cruiser Inflexible, with their eight 15-inch guns and an even dozen 12-inch guns, on Friday opened an attack on the principal forts on the European side of the narrows in the Dardanelles. Two of the forts were damaged, and the magazine of a third was blown up. These forts, which guard the narrowest part of the Straits from the European side, are believed to be the strongest along the entire waterway, although those on the opposite side of the

narrows almost equal them.

One of these forts, marked on the Admiralty maps as L, is armed with two 14-inch guns that could hardly reach the Queen Elizabeth, which fired twenty-nine rounds from her 15-inch weapons by indirect fire, and had the advantage of aeroplanes to direct her gunners. The other two forts were armed with three

of aeroplanes to direct her gunners. The other two forts were armed with three 11-inch guns and some smaller cannon.

Meantime lighter cruisers continue attacks on the fortifications along the coast of Asia Minor, from Besika, which is near the entrance to the Dardanelles, to Smyrna, doubtless with a view to preventing reinforcements being sent to the Straits, where there already are a large number of Turkish troops with whom the marines who were landed to complete the destruction of the forts at the entrance to the Straits have been in contact. It was in this land fighting that the Allies suffered casualties, according to the British report, of nineteen killed, twenty-five wounded and three missing.

Last night's official despatch from the Admiralty disclosed that the East Indies fleet, under Vice-Admiral Sir Richard Peirse, who is flying his flag on the Ruryalus, has joined the allied fleet, and that he undertook the bombardment of the fortifications of Smyrna which were seriously damaged.

On Wednesday last the ships continued the bombardment of Fort Dardanus, on the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles. Destroyers and mine-sweepers are pursuing the work of clearing the outer Straits of mines. French ships are keeping up a bombardment from the Gulf of Saros.





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
