
RODGERS CAPTURED

The battleship is, in its primary role, a vessel of offence. Its main object is to smash the enemy's | wild. ships and-though rarely, and perhaps never in modern war-land forts. The cruiser, while far from lacking offensive potentialities, is more largely defensive, a screen to her battleship squadron and the patroller of ocean lanes. To Great Britain it is in the latter form of utility that the cruiser is of vital importance. Acknowledgement of this is made by the New York Times which

"The British Admiralty contends that the Empire's need of cruisers to protect trade routes is greater than any need of the United States for warships of the same type. The Mother Country would face starvation if transportation of food supplies were cut off during a great war. There is the additional reason that she has colonies all over the world that must be protected. In no war with a great Power, or with a combination of Powers, could the people of the continental United States be starved into submission."

The cruiser for patrol and distant protection cannot be disregarded by the United States. She has the Philippines, Guam, Samoa, the Hawaiian Islands, the Isthmus of Panama, Porto Rico and Alaska. But this compared with Great Britain's utter dependence on the command of the sea is a trifle. In twenty-five years the death rate from tuberculosis in Canada has been reduced by more than 100 per 100,000 of population. The death rate from this disease in Canada last year was lower than that of the United States, or of any country in Europe except Denmark. This information, given out by Dr. R. E. Wodehouse, General Secretary of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, has a particular significance for the people of New Brunswick, where the death rate from this disease is far too high. The World's Best

Dessert Apple

"THE apple is the leading fruit in the world; it is grown more largely and more widely than any other fruit," said Mr. T. G. Bunting, Professor of Horticulture at MacDonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, in a recent address. He estimated that Canada had some ten million apple trees bearing fruit and about 2,500,000 that would bear fruit in the near future. Canada, further-more, produces apples of fine varieties and of excellent quality that are appreciated in the British market. Judges at a recent British fruit show demonstrated that fact when they proclaimed the Canadian McIntosh Red the world's finest dessert

Yet, Mr. G. E. McIntosh, the Dominion Fruit Commissioner, gave the Quebec Pomological and Fruit Growing Association some figures concerning home consumption of apples that, in the light of Canada's position as an apple-growing country, are surprising. He said that in 1924-25 about 32 per cent, of the apples consumed in Montreal were imported into Canada from the United States. In 1925-26, he asserted, 2.8 per cent. of the apples consumed in Montreal were from Nova Scotia, 5.62 per cent. from New Brunswick, 3.32 per cent. from Quebec orchards, 76.8 per cent. from Ontaio, 4.8 per cent from British Columbia, and approximately 17 per cent. from the United States. He added that in Toronto the consumption of foreign apples was proportionately larger than in Mont-real. In Toronto, 47 per cent. of the apples con-sumed in 1925-26, were imported from the United States. Mr. McIntosh noted that the total area of land devoted to the cultivation of fruit in Canada had decreased by something like 90,000 acres since 1919, but he expressed the opinion that growers were getting better results now than in the past from their orchards. At the same time, the average Canadian's consumption of apples has not been increasing. On the contrary, it has de-creased, according to Mr. McIntosh. In the United States, Mr. McIntosh said, consumption of apples amounts to five per head of the population per week. In Canada it amounts to only three per person per week. An increase of one per person per week would not bring the average Canadian's consumption of the fruit up to the proverbial apple a day that is alleged to keep the doctor away. On the other hand, an increase of one apple per person per week, Mr. McIntosh calculated, would swell the total domestic consumption

Market conditions that have raised the prices of high grade apples and made imported citrous of high grade apples and made imported citrous fruits more easily procurable may have led Canadians to eat a greater variety of fruits than they used to eat in bygone years. Still, citrous fruits are not cheaper or more plentiful in Canada than they are in the United States. That being so, persons and organizations interested in the Canadian apple-growing industry would do well to enquire why Canadians, in proportion to population, eat fewer apples than the people of the United States and why Canadians go to the United States for a considerable quantity of the apples they do eat. Is it possible, for instance, that lower prices and more aggressive advertising methods might afford relief?

Why Don't Old People Take the Trouble to Make Themselves Attractive in Manner, Dress and Conversation? -For Just as We are Repulsed by Old Age That is Bitter and Fault-finding, So We Love and Cherish Old Age That is Mellow and Appreciative.

WE ARE always advising young people to "mind their manners," as our nurses used to say. We impress upon them the necessity of being clean and neat and well dressed, of improving their minds and of making themselves agreeable to other people.



BUT nobody ever says a word to older people about the importance of keeping themselves personally attractive and of cultivating the charms and graces that would make them agreeable companions. Indeed, on the contrary, many men and women consider that age gives them the privilege of being dirty and frowsy and as cantankerous as they like, though why any one has any more right to be disagreeable at 80 than he or she had at 18 is a mystery past finding out.

THE general impression seems to prevail that only the young can change their habits and mode of thought, and that only the young can improve themselves. We even have a proverb about the impossibility of teaching an old dog new tricks, but this is all nonsense.

WE ARE never too old to learn. We we are never too old to change until we are in our dotage, and the reason of their age, but because they are self-indulgent and are not willing to make the effort and take the trouble to keep themselves at-

AND why should not old people bear continually in mind that it is particularly incumbent upon them to exercise good manners since nearly always they live in other people's houses and sit at other people's tables?

THEY seldom do. If grandpa likes to gargle his soup, he does so undeterred by the qualms it induces in those about them. If grandma wants to eat with her knife, she performs her sword-swallowing feat at every meal. If Aunt Sally has a throat affection, it never occurs to her to retire to her own room and have her little coughing fits in private.

TO ALTER the habits of a lifetime might take some slight effort of will, but surely it would be a small price to pay for making oneself persona grata with one's children and grandchildren instead of being an affliction that a sense of duty forces them to endure. For the chief reason that old people are not welcome guests in a house is because of the way they indulge themselves in their unpleasant personal habits.

GOOD manners also require that we should use tact in dealing with our GOOD manners also require that we should use tact in dealing with our fellow creatures, and surely it is even more necessary that the old should be more diplomatic than the young, because youth can form new relationships, while age is dependent for its pleasures on those it already has established. Yet you find many old people who are rude and insulting has all their contacts with others and whose tongues drop nothing but renom. We all know gruff old men who swear and curse at all about them. We know peevish, fretful complaining old women, who are a thorn in the sides of all who are unfortunate enough to have to live with them.

We know mothers-in-law who criticize every act of their daughters—in-law and fathers who nag their children almost to death by finding fault with everything they do.

YET it never seems to dawn upon these old people that they are making enemies instead of friends and alienating their children from them, and if they want to be beloved and cherished they must show some suavity in dealing with other people.

For just as we are repulsed by old age that is hard, selfish, bitter and fault-finding, so we are attracted by old age that is tender, gentle, loving and appreciative, and that sees in us only our best.

AND age, even more than youth, should try to keep itself interesting. There is no reason why old people should feel that they have a sacred commission to be bores. As long as one is not senile, one can heroically refrain from talking about oneself and keep tab on one's stories, so as not

The old should be far more entertaining companions than the young, because they themselves have lived through all sorts of dramas; they have seen so much and known so much and have such a vast storehouse of information to draw upon. IT IS a fault that they should correct if they would, just as they should correct their other faults of bad manners and of slovenliness in dress.

THEREFORE, I say what we need is a society for self-improvement among the old.

#### QUEBEC MEAL TAX BE EXTENDED

Legislation Meets in January But Session to be Short One

QUEBEC, Que., Nov. 25-The fourth session of the sixteenth Legislature of the Province of Quebec will open January 11, 1927, and will be the last of the present Assembly.

There are two vacancies in the Lower House, both caused by the deaths of the occupants in the last session, namely, Quebec West, vacant through the death of Hon. Martin Madden, who was also a member of the Cabinet as representative of the Irish minority and Temiscousta, vacant through the death of Jules Langlas, former Conservative M. L. A. In the Upper or appointed House there are three vacancies to be filled.

Premier Taschereau will lead the House for the sixth time, as he became Premier of the province in 1920. As

Premier of the province in 1920. As far as the Cabinet is concerned there has been no change in its composition since last session, and it is not thought that any appointments will be made before dissolution of the Legislature takes place at the end of the forthcom-

It is not expected that Government measures will be numerous. However, it is current rumor that a further move will be made by the Government to reduce the burden of the debts of the municipalities as far as the system of

He said that in his view one of the most important things in the Maritime Provinces is for the Boards to assist in placing desirable people on the farms. In view of the action of the Overseas Settlement Board, and the desirable the Rikitis Cov. of the Overseas Settlement Board, and the desire of the British Government to find a suitable location for the surplus population of the Mother Country, there was an especially good opportunity for us to perform, not only a provincial but an Empire service, and have the assistance at the same time of the Imperial Government. 





That was the statement made last night by Dr. R. E. Wodehouse, general secretary of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. 
