





**\$10,000,000 IS  
POTATO CROP  
VALUE IN N. B.**

Estimate Based on Average  
Price of 195 Yield  
Sold

FREDERICTON, Nov. 24—New Brunswick's 1926 potato crop is worth \$10,000,000 to the farmers of the province, according to an estimate made here today. This statement is based on the price of \$1.25 per cwt. which was given as the average price for the 1925 crop, valued at over \$7,500,000, and the preliminary estimate of yield given out yesterday by the Provincial Department of Agriculture which estimates the total 1926 production at 6,090,000 cwt. as compared with 4,232,000 cwt. last year.

**PLAN TO ENLARGE  
CHATEAU LAURIER**

New Wing With 200 Rooms to  
Cost \$2,000,000,  
Proposed

OTTAWA, Nov. 25—Construction work on a \$2,000,000 extension to the Chateau Laurier, the local Canadian National Railways hotel, will commence early in the New Year, providing the Federal Government and the House of Commons approve of the expenditure. At a conference between Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R., and the city board of control, Sir Henry said that he believed the Government was in sympathy with the plan, and he expected no material difficulties. The board of control decided unanimously to recommend to the City Council that the fixed assessment be granted. The addition will consist of a new wing containing 200 rooms.

**Canada's Debt To  
Be Cut \$60,000,000**

OTTAWA, Nov. 25—A total of \$60,000,000 cash will have been paid this fall by Hon. James A. Robb to meet maturing loans, and in a short time the national debt of Canada will have been reduced by \$60,000,000, as the result of the improving condition of the Dominion's finances. It was also made known at the Department of Finance that no large refunding operation will be necessary in the near future.

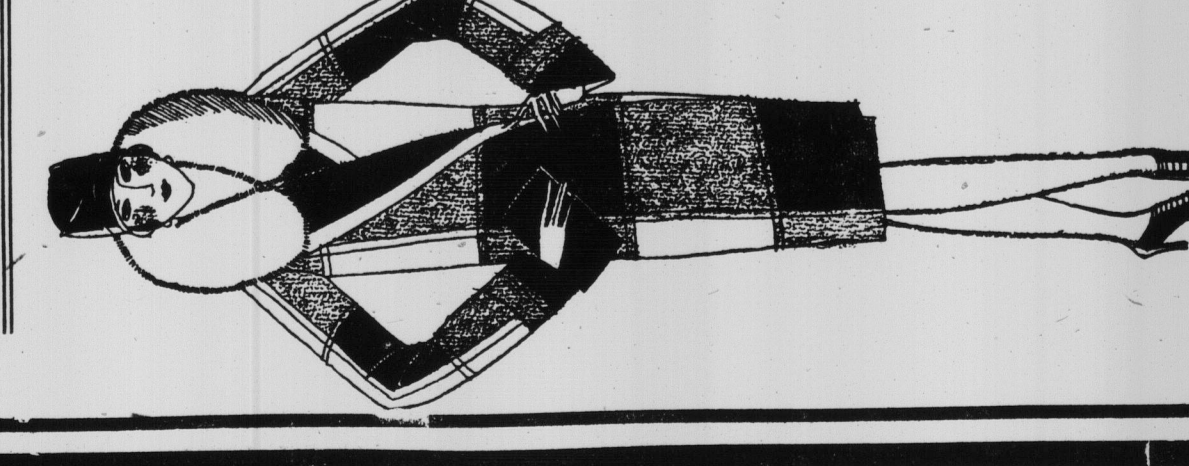

OTTAWA, Nov. 24—"I have not yet had time to give more than hurried consideration to the report of the Imperial Conference," said Hon. Hugh Guthrie, acting leader of the Conservative party today.

upon the dominions not only absolute equality with the Mother Country, but at the same time denies the Mother Country any directing power as the head and front of the Imperial Commonwealth. While the report assumes to bestow absolute autonomy upon the dominions, not only in domestic but also in foreign affairs, I doubt very much if, in practice, this affords anything more than what the dominions have actually enjoyed for many years.

#### FOREIGN AFFAIRS

"There has been an evident attempt to proclaim to the world that Great Britain is hereafter shorn of that authority in foreign affairs which in association with the dominions she has always heretofore exercised and which in the practical working out of Imperial and world problems it is absolutely essential she continue to possess. There has been nothing substituted to take the place of the practice which has heretofore prevailed.

"As a declaration of the actual status quo, as between the Motherland and the dominions, the report may be of some value, but my fear is that the whole tendency of the document will be to loosen rather than strengthen the foundations of the Empire without conferring any practical benefit upon the dominions. No doubt, there are some minor clauses in the report which may be helpful, both to Imperial and Dominion interests, but I feel that the outstanding feature will cause great misgivings in that large and influential body of British citizens, both in Canada and elsewhere, who believe that the present and future strength, solidity and influence of the British Empire is a matter of paramount importance not only to Great Britain and the dominions, but also to the world at large.

MONTREAL, Nov. 24—"No reason for excitement exists," declared W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen tonight, when questioned in regard to the railway situation in Canada caused by a ballot of conductors, trainmen and yardmen, which refused a recent award of a conciliation board which refused them a wage increase.

Some 300 representatives of these employees met here today and adjourned this afternoon to meet again tomorrow. No statement was issued from the conference.

Mr. Lee made his statement when he was questioned tonight as to the prospects of a strike developing. Matters with us are conducted in a business-like way," he said, and explained that following the termination of the conference, the matter would then be one for approach to the railway companies.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—William Beebe, scientist and explorer of the New York Zoological Society, is planning to descend into that strange world Jules Verne imagined and wrote about in "Forty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea."

In a steel cylinder he is now having made, Dr. Beebe hopes to go a mile or more beneath the ocean's surface so that he can observe deep sea fishes in their native haunts. He has fished some of them up in nets and found them most interesting specimens, but they all died before reaching the surface or soon after.

Albrecht Seeks Italian Royal Bride Report

BUDAPEST, Nov. 25.—Archduke Albrecht, the most promising pretender to the Hungarian throne, has gone to Rome to be received by King Emmanuel. As the local press interpreted the visit, Albrecht is expected to be the hand of the youngest Italian princess, and is double-crossing the hopes of one section of Hungary for an alliance with the Rumanian royal house.

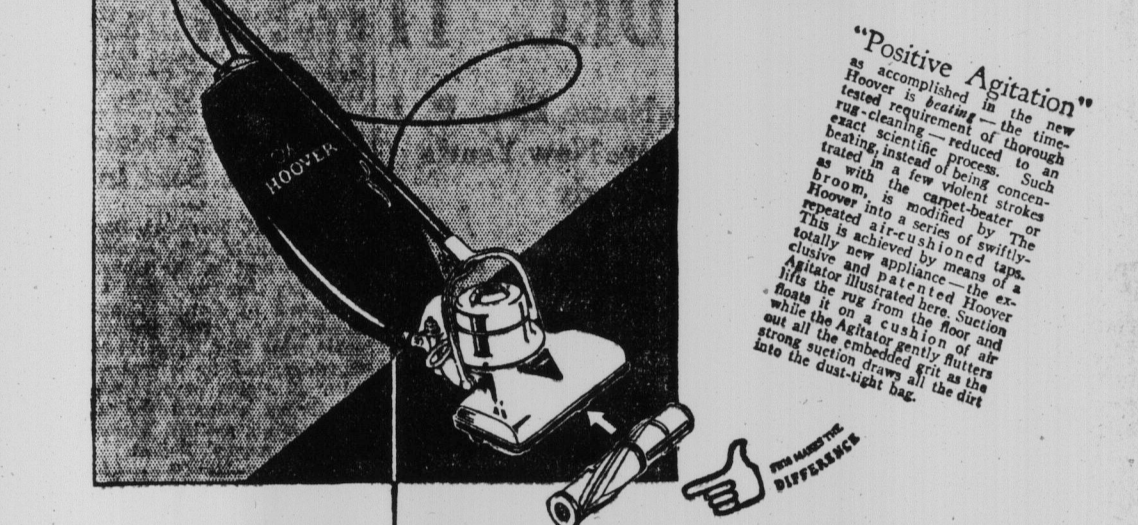
Eloping Couple Receive Surprise From Girl's Mother

SAINT JOHN COUNTY BY-ELECTION DATE FIXED FOR DEC. 11

Polling Day in Gloucester, to Name Hon. P. J. Veniot's Successor, to be Before New Year's Also—Both Parties Ready

THE by-election in Saint John county to fill the vacancy caused by the death of former Mayor Frank L. Potts will be held on Saturday, Dec. 11, with nomination day on the preceding Saturday, Dec. 4.

The by-election in Gloucester county made necessary through the resignation of Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot to contest a seat in the Federal house, will also be held before the New Year, the date to be set at the meeting of the Provincial Government today in Fredericton. Premier J. B. M. Baxter made these announcements here last evening following a conference with party representatives. This is the first by-election since the Baxter government was victorious at the polls in August, 1925.

The decision of the Government to bring on the elections before the winter is not entirely unexpected, and both parties have been quietly organizing for the test. The Government meeting to select a candidate for the Saint John county election will be held here in the Seaman's Institute on Monday evening, November 29, it was also announced.

CANDIDATES MENTIONED. Liberal leaders said last evening that their nominating convention would be called before the end of the present month. All the delegates have been named, and it could be summoned together within 24 hours, it was said.

Speculation as to the choice of the conventions has been rife for some time in view of rumors regarding an early decision from the electorate. Names prominently mentioned as likely to go Monday night include H. Colby Smith, well-known West Side merchant; Thomas Nagle, of Nagle & Wigmore, Ltd., shipping agents; Dr. J. H. Barton, councillor William Golding, of Lancaster, and Robert McAllister.

At the nominating convention a year ago that selected Hon. Dr. Baxter and the late Mayor Potts, the Premier's selection was unanimous and a ballot was taken among the 65 delegates present between Mayor Potts and Mr. McAllister. Other names put forward at that time were Dr. Barton and T. B. Carson.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS' POSTS ARE VACANT

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—The Department of External Affairs has been notified by the secretary-general of the League of Nations that there are vacancies in the translators and interpreters' department of the League Secretariat. Examinations for the post will be held in London and Geneva on Jan. 4, 1927, and Canadian candidates can secure details from the Department of External Affairs, Ottawa.

Strathcona Takes His Seat in Lords

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Baron Strathcona, formerly Hon. Donald Howard, took his seat in the House of Lords yesterday for the first time, being sponsored by Lords Congleton and Somersetton. Letters patent were read announcing that Margaret Howard, his daughter, was to be created a peeress with all rights of succession. Baron Strathcona assumed the title on the death of his mother, Baroness Strathcona, on August 19 last.

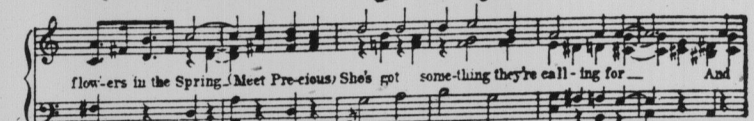
the campaign, at a dinner meeting of campaign councillors and division heads at the Harmonic Club. The total now is over \$4,000,000. The goal is \$4,750,000.

CLASH OF LAWYERS SENDS HALL-MILLS TRIAL IN ECLIPSE

Efforts of Defense to Use Carpenter on Stand Cause Dispute

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 24.—Clouds of argument hanging over the Hall-Mills case during the afternoon today came to a head just before adjournment and sent the trial into eclipse over Thanksgiving in a legal storm.

Efforts by the defense to use Henry De La Bruyere Carpenter as a witness to discredit Mrs. Jane Gibson's story, told as a state's witness, precipitated a clash of lawyers that was not decided when court suspended for the holiday. Carpenter, a New York broker, is a cousin of the three defendants on trial and is under indictment with them on the charge of murdering Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills. He is awaiting a separate trial.

DEFENCE PLAN PROTESTED.

The defence plan to place in the record and before the jury his statement that he was not on Phillips farm or near De Rusey's Lane on the night of Sept. 14, 1922, when Mrs. Mills and the Rev. Edward W. Hall were slain, brought prompt protest from the state. Justice Charles W. Parker, presiding, took the problem of the competence of the testimony away with him, a decision being expected Friday when court reconvenes.

The state's objection was based on the fact that the witness is not a defendant in the present trial, although under indictment with the other defendants. Carpenter at the scene in her direct testimony but under cross-examination.

All of the defense witnesses today were used to attack testimony of the state, efforts being made to show discrepancies in the stories told on the witness stand by a score of the witnesses put forward by the prosecution.

CANADIAN AND U.S. ENGINEERS SPLIT IN DEEP WATER PLAN

Dominion Section Talks of Power Development at Ogden Island

OTTAWA, Nov. 23.—The main features of the report of the joint board of Canadian and American engineers which has been studying for 20 months the problems of deep water development of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence waterways are as follows: The Canadian and the American sections failed to agree. The American section propose a full single-stage power development in which all the practical head available in that section of the river would be concentrated in one high dam below the Long Sault Rapids at the foot of Barham's Island.

CANADIAN PROPOSAL.

The Canadian section contemplates the development of power at Ogden Island near Morrisburg, and at the Long Sault, in a double-stage scheme. The total installed capacity of the two schemes: Single-stage (American plan) 2,700,000 horsepower. Double-stage (Canadian plan) 2,619,000 horsepower.

The estimated cost of the development of the power alone in the St. Lawrence under both schemes: Single-stage, \$290,172,000; double-stage, \$308,972,000.

CANADA TO DEFINE STAND.

Canada's attitude on the perplexing problems of deep water development of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence waterways, indicated by the published report of the joint board of Canadian and American engineers, will probably

receive the consideration of the Dominion government as soon as the report is fully completed.

With the Canadian and American sections on the board failing to agree on the best method of securing and developing the proposed power and canal scheme, the belief is that the federal government will likely refer the question to the National Advisory Commission on St. Lawrence waterways, headed by Rt. Hon. George P. Graham for advisement. Action of this nature will probably, though, not be taken for two months, pending the completion of the seven appendices upon which the lengthy report of the joint board of Canadian and American engineers is based. It is thought also that a meeting of the board will be necessary to put the report in its final form.

COAL DUTY HEARING HELD UP.

OTTAWA, Nov. 24.—At its public hearing on Jan. 18 next, of the application in respect of tariff changes on coal and coke, filed by the Dominion Coal Company, British Empire Steel Corporation, the tariff board will not consider that phase of the appeal requesting an increased duty on bituminous coal. At the request of the Dominion Coal Company this particular portion of the application is deferred for hearing at a later time.

5 OF 6 MEN TRAPPED 9 DAYS IN PIT SAVED

Caught by Flood; One is Feared Drowned; Rest Go Back to Families

HAZLETON, Pa., Nov. 24.—Five of the six men entombed nine days ago by a flood in the Tomhicken mine of the Lehigh Valley Coal Company were taken out alive tonight and will spend Thanksgiving with their families. All except Charles Smith were rescued. He was some distance below the section where they had been working on the day of the accident. Whether he is alive or dead was not determined, but it was feared that he was drowned.

The rescued men are: Henry Kirchdoerfer, assistant foreman; August Yenchick, Michael Lawrence, John Gondera, John Lorincz.

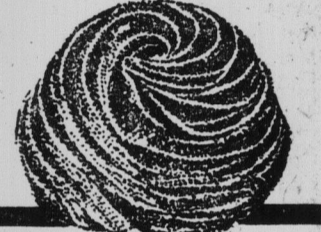

NEWSPAPERS IN CHINA UNDER MILITARY RULE

Papers Have Editors But No Reporters—Few Ads Shown

PEKING, Nov. 25.—China, the scene of perhaps the most ancient effort at newspaper publication, is struggling along in the rear of modern journalistic development.

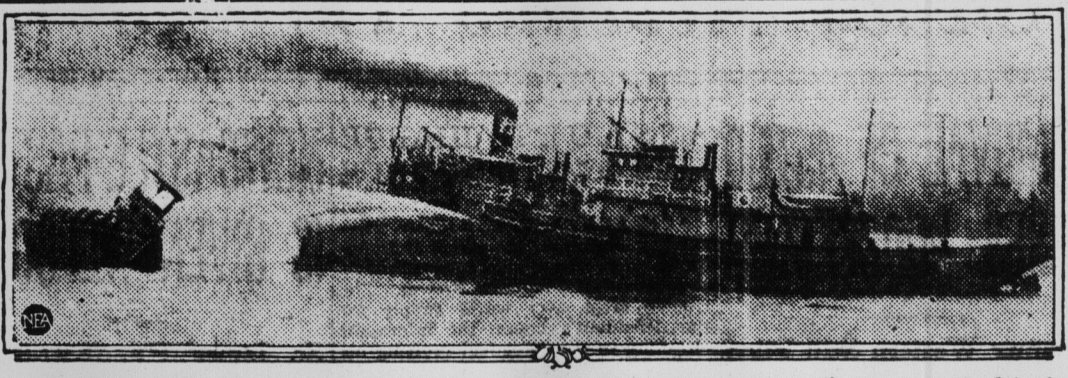
For instance, the papers have editors, but no reporters. Such news as is not furnished by the scores of subsidized native agencies and a dozen foreign purveyors, just filters in to the papers or is furnished by retained underlings in government offices, military headquarters, tea-houses, restaurants and theatres.

Occasionally an editor will "cover" an event, but nothing approaching American methods of news gathering obtains in China.

Foreign news, unless it has a bearing on China or Chinese interests abroad, arouses little interest. The papers cater to the native fondness for gossip and spicy tidbits of local news, and to a lively sense of humor. In the larger centers, illustrated supplements

and special editors are being attempted. Cartoons are popular forms of expression, and in at least one instance a woman's page has been developed.

Although relieved from old imperial restraints, publishers are still subject to official domination. Within recent months one editor was shot apparently out of hand, for offending a military official by his writings.

ARE SMALL IN SIZE. A Chinese newspaper usually consists of one to four or five sheets, divided into four inch horizontal spaces and printed, with further vertical subdivisions, in columns of type. The reading is from top to bottom and by columns of characters from right to left.

Posters and billboards long have satisfied the native desire for publicity and the utility of the newspaper in that direction is slow in gaining recognition. Such advertisements as appear in the more progressive centers deal largely with theatres, tea-houses, lotteries, patent medicines, cigarettes, banks and exchange shops. Full page and classified advertisements are non-existent, away from foreign patronage and direction.

Subsidiary political and military interests is an accepted fact in Chinese newspaperdom, with the exception of a few journals.

DEATH RATE OF TUBERCULOSIS HERE REDUCED

General Secretary of Canadian Association Visits City

Within the last 25 years the death rate from tuberculosis in Canada has been reduced by more than 100 per cent.

That was the statement made last night by Dr. R. E. Wodehouse, general secretary of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

At Charlottetown on Tuesday night a special meeting had considered ways and means of obtaining treatment for the cases which had to be taken out of the homes immediately and these exceeded 90 in number.

CONFERENCE HERE Last night Dr. Wodehouse was in conference with Dr. R. J. Collins, superintendent of the John County Hospital; Dr. G. J. Wherrett, traveling diagnostician under the Maritime committee, and E. L. Morris, who is assisting in organizing the tuberculosis campaign in New Brunswick.

SPEAKS OF CO-OPERATION Dr. Wodehouse spoke most appreciatively of the co-operation of the newspapers in the publicity campaign that is now being carried on and in the matter of publicity he was of the opinion that the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals, apart from the financial returns, was of tremendous educational value and some of the best publicity obtainable.
